employees' accounts with the commission. A social security account number must identify the earnings of each person, including those over 65, and each report must be signed by an authorized official of the employing unit.

Carpenter said that the payrolls of firms covered by the unemployment compensation act show an average of almost sixty million dollars a month for the first four months of 1938. Since there are some employers delinquent in filing monthly reports, the chairman estimated that this average would be considerably less than the actual monthly payroll.

Of the covered employers, the industry having the largest pay roll is the oil industry. Included are such varied phases as production of petroleum and natural gas, refineries, administrative offices, and pipe lines.

The 14,000 employers in Texas covered by the act contribute on the wages of some 750,000 employees.
