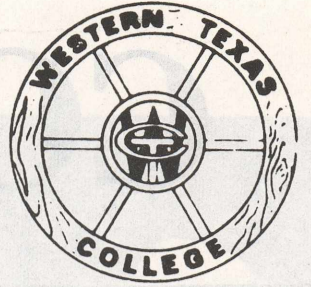

## Historical Week Also Planned

# Campus Dedication Is Scheduled This Week

WTC administrative officials have released a calendar of events encompassing the weeks of April 23 - May 7. A large number of activities will be centered around the Scurry County History Appreciation Week, April 23-29, and the formal dedication of the Western Texas College Campus.

### HISTORICAL WEEK HIGHLIGHTS

Highlighting the historical week will be several dedications of historically significant places throughout Scurry County. On April 24 at 12:01 p.m., there will be the dedication of the TOWNSITE OF LIGHT in Fluvanna. At 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, April 25, the dedication of the FORMER SITE OF WHEAT will take place in the Hermleigh Community Center. Wednesday will be the day for a historical bus tour which will travel to Lubbock. The office of The Snyder Daily News will be the scene of the SNYDER PRESS dedication on Thursday at 2:00 p.m.

On Friday, April 28, the dedication ceremonies for the college campus will begin at 10:00 a.m. with George Mahon as the guest speaker. A bar-b-que is scheduled at 12:00 at the Scurry County Coliseum.

### FINE ARTS PRESENTATIONS

Various demonstrations and exhibits in the fields of fine arts will be held on campus in conjunction with the dedication and simultaneously with the historical week. Exhibits will include the talents of faculty members from seven colleges and universities in this area as well as displays by persons in WTC and Scurry County.

Jasque Bakke, ceramics instructor at McMurry College, will have his work on exhibit in the college Fine Arts Center at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, April 26. On the 27th, the Texas Art Gallery will have a display of landscape artistry in the learning Resource Center. The students of Ted Bonham, Snyder High School art instructor will also be on exhibit, and WTC will award one fine arts scholarship to the student showing the most promise. The Palette Club of Snyder will also present paintings produced in Warren Cullar's art class.

A special dedication reception will be held in the Christian Student Center Thursday to precede the dedication ceremonies on Friday.

Immediately following the dedication exercises and the bar-b-que Friday, the Scurry County Historical Survey Committee will sponsor the official opening of Hidetown Drive on Deep Creek, and the Diamond M Museum will be open to the public from 2:00-5:00 p.m.

### VISITING INSTRUCTORS

Sunday, April 30 at 2:00 p.m., Dr. Walter Sorge, Head of the Department of Art at Eastern Illinois University, will present a lecture "The Print as Art" and will show his intaglio work in the lobby of the Fine Arts building. Dr. Sorge will also be present on Monday, May 1 at 10:00 a.m., for another lecture titled "The Value of Art." At 1:00 p.m. the lecture "Contemporary Film Technique" will be given by Russ Adams, filmmaker.

Avery Falkner, instructor of art at Abilene Christian College,

will show films in the Science Lecture Hall at 7:30 Monday evening.

A demonstration of watercolor landscape will be given Tuesday, May 2 at 10:00 a.m. in the Fine Arts Building by Sherwood Suter, Head of the McMurry Art Department.

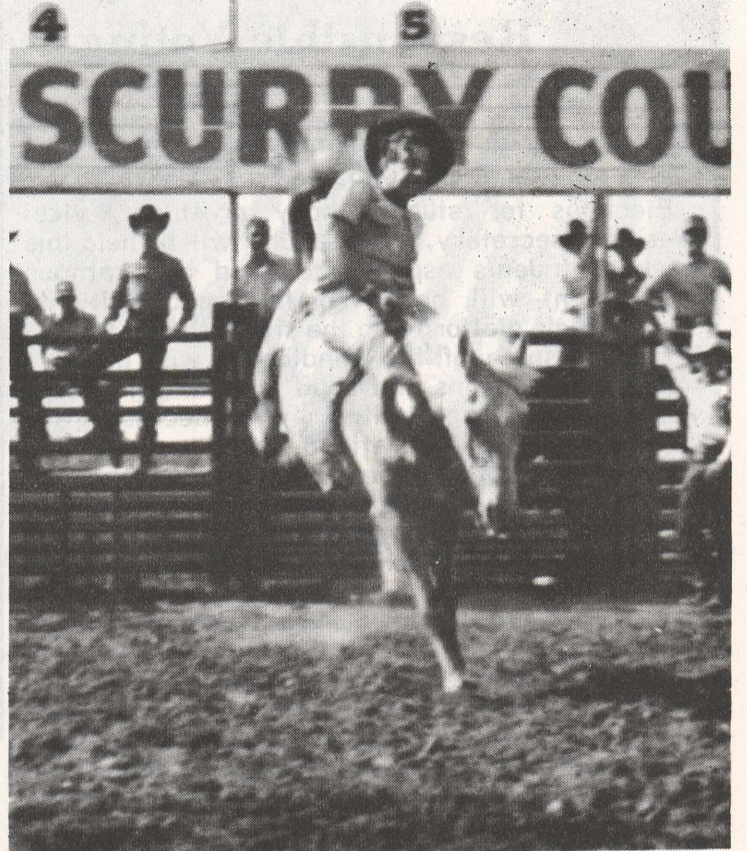
Wednesday afternoon at 2:00, Bill Worrell, instructor of sculpture and ceramics at Odessa College, will present a lecture and demonstration in the crafts studio of the Fine Arts building.

Portrait painting will be demonstrated and exhibited Thursday morning at 10:00 by J. Robert Miller, instructor in painting and drawing at McMurry College. At 8:00 p.m. Dr. William Race, Professor of Piano at the University of Texas will be featured in a piano concert.

### WTC DRAMA AND MUSIC PERFORMANCES

Friday morning, May 5, Marvin Dahmen will demonstrate his skills in sculpture and pottery at 10:00. At 8:45 p.m. the WTC drama department, under the direction of Charles Holland, presents the first showing of the musical comedy "The Fantasticks." A second performance will be presented at 8:45 Saturday night. Both performances will be on the Sentel Memorial Stage in the central courtyard.

Dr. Marvin Genuchi, head of the WTC music department, will feature his students in a music recital on Sunday, May 7, at 2:30 p.m. in the Fine Arts building. The music recitals and drama presentations of the WTC students will climax the activities of dedication week.

## Western Activities Considered A Success

Western week activities started with a splat Monday when tobacco spitters of the school met in the parking lot behind the welding shop. Tutt Garnett was the winner with a spit of 44' 11", Bobby Watson was second with 44' 5", rookie Henry Garland was third with 32' 7" and Obey Kelley was fourth with 28' 7". The field judge, Jerry Baird, said that the winning distance would be a world record if the wind had not been a deciding factor.

The egg tossing contest was postponed until Tuesday because of weather conditions, but the yoke was on more than one person. Connie Voss and Henry Garland were the winning team with a toss of 60' 11", Judy McLarry and Carl Evans were

second with a toss of 40' 5", Debra Lee and Ada Newsome were third with a toss of 36' 8", and Dorothy Addison and Mark Stephens were fourth with a toss of 27' 7".

In the girls singles sack races Ada Newsome was first, Debra Lee was second, Linda Tippens was third, and Kathy Welborne was fourth. While in the boys singles sack races Henry Garland won, Joe Wilson was second, Carl Evans was third, and Mark Stephens was a strong fourth.

In conclusion for Tuesday was the doubles three-legged race. The team of Ada Newsome and Scotty Scott lead the field, Judy Morris and Henry Garland were second, Kathy Welborne and Joe Wilson were third and the team of Linda Thompson and Joe Dan Jones were fourth.

Western week activities began with a boot and shoe scramble on Wednesday. The winner was Barry Rinker, second was Ada Newsome, third was Debra Lee, and Albert Cannon was fourth.

Western week was concluded with a buck-out at the Scurry County Rodeo Arena Wednesday afternoon. In preparation for the Texas Tech Rodeo the rodeo team had several practice rides, but the highlight of the afternoon came when Barry Rinker rode a bare-back bronc, Jim Palmer rode a bull, and Debra Murphy rode a calf. It should be added that their heroic efforts were appreciated, but that their ability is lacking in certain aspects.

The WTC rodeo team will spend the remainder of the week in Lubbock participating in the Tech Rodeo. If you are interested in seeing some good rodeo, then make a trip to Lubbock and cheer the Westerners on to a team win.

# Student Elections This Week

All candidates for offices in the student government of WTC will present their speeches to the student body, Wednesday, April 26, in the central courtyard and balloting will take place Wednesday and Thursday, April 26-27 according to Mickey Baird, director of student activities and sponsor for the student senate.

The four officers to be chosen are president, vice president, recording secretary, and treasurer. The tryouts for cheerleader will also be held and three cheerleaders will be selected. The remaining two cheerleader positions will be filled next fall by freshmen. Petitions and applications were filed Wednesday, April 19.

Candidates for president are Debbie Campbell, Joel Dyess, Henry Garland, and Doyle Sanders. Miss Campbell is a

member of the Phi Theta Kappa honor fraternity. Dyess is also a Phi Theta Kappa member and played basketball for the Westerners. Henry Garland is a member of Los Vaqueros and the WTC tennis team. Sanders is active in TSEA and many other campus activities.

Three students seek the office of vice president. They are Keith Dolloff, Greg Freeman, and Bill Martin. Dolloff and Freeman have senatorial experience and Martin, like many national political figures, is making a second bid for a government position following one unsuccessful attempt last fall.

The position of recording secretary, like last fall, is uncontested. Terry Canon of Gail is the only student seeking the office.

Ada Newsome and Darrell Taylor are the candidates for treasurer. Miss Newsome was a WTC cheerleader this year. Taylor is presently acting as treasurer of the senate. His appointment to that office was necessary to fill the position vacated by Bobby Wine.

Ten students have applied for cheerleader, but only three will be elected. Sharron Autry of Snyder is seeking reelection after serving as cheerleader this year. Tina Green is trying out for the first time, but Miss Green is no newcomer to WTC activities, being selected as the first Miss School Spirit. Sharon Moore received the most votes last fall and was selected as WTC's first head cheerleader. She is trying to repeat as spirit leader for next year. Debra Murphy and Ada Newsome are

also trying for their second season as cheerleaders. Both Miss Murphy and Miss Newsome are from Snyder.

Pam Petty is making her first try for cheerleader. Linda Thompson was elected alternate cheerleader last fall and on many occasions filled in as a regular.

Most big universities have male cheerleaders. WTC students will have the opportunity this spring to select one or all of three male candidates for cheerleader. The candidates are Charles Collins of Snyder, John Charles Davis also of Snyder, and Mack Porter of Post.

The balloting for cheerleaders will be held simultaneously with officer elections. Each student may vote for three candidates.

## WTC Vivaly Needs Responsible Voting

### Speeches Should Reveal Platforms

Elections for student body president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer will be held this week. Students aspiring to head our campus government will be given the opportunity to present their platforms to the student body today. Hopefully some of the candidates will produce some definite plans and solid programs for next year. Equally important, it will be necessary for the student body to attend the speeches and carefully evaluate what each candidate promises. Certainly each candidate will pledge himself to hard work, unceasing enthusiasm, and whatever else he thinks the students want to hear. It will be the responsibility of the students to critique each speech and to determine what promises are feasible.

### Legislative Programs Are Needed

Since I have not heard any of the candidates speeches, I cannot endorse any specific individual, at least not by name. I can however, outline some ideas and programs that I feel would be beneficial to WTC and endorse any candidate who offers similar programs. I had hoped that some of these ideas would be initiated this year by the student government for they involve aspects of school policy and curriculum. After all, the primary function of the student senate is "to enact the appropriate legislation to meet the needs of the student body of Western Texas College. In this way the Student Senate shall be instrumental in initiating college policy." The purpose of the senate, and therefore the responsibility of its officers, is much more than those purposes of - say, a high school student council whose sole concern is to furnish the students with social activity. On the college level a good student government should actively involve itself with policy making legislation. Social activities should be the responsibility of the various clubs and social organizations on the campus. Please do not misinterpret this as a condemnation of our student senate and its sponsorship of school activities. Considering the circumstances of a first year, the senate should actually be commended for its efforts to create some social activity. Had the senate not attempted to initiate social functions, it is doubtful that any activities would have been sponsored at all. Yet, I contend that this preoccupation with social creativity, whether spurred by necessity or merely a misconception of responsibility, has impeded the operation of our senate. Therefore, I will support the candidate who promises me legislative action and programs involving school policy, not the candidate who simply offers more social activity. Let those who offer social gaiety run for office in the fraternity of merry-makers.

### Specific Programs

Specifically, I would like to see WTC integrate into its curriculum a pass-fail system. Many courses offered at WTC as electives could, and should, be on the pass-fail system rather than the traditional graded system. I also feel that certain upper-level courses could be offered under an honor system which would include a code, upheld by students themselves, against lying, stealing, or cheating. This honor system could incorporate such teaching methods as take-home exams and student teaching assistants. WTC students could also benefit by cooperative study programs with other colleges.

Many schools allow a student representative to participate in interviews of prospective faculty members and administrators. Perhaps these ideas sound too idealistic or too far reaching for some of you, but they are feasible. Their feasibility has been demonstrated and proven on other college campuses.

All I can really hope for, however, is that each student will accept the responsibility of electing capable persons to the offices of the student government. Don't let the student affairs of WTC remain stagnant. Vote wisely.

## PTK Attends Convention

The Western Texas College Phi Theta Kappa club attended the PTK national convention April 13-15 in Rochester Minnesota, according to Edward Barkowsky, sponsor of PTK.

The members of the club attending the convention were: Linda Benitez of Snyder, Brenda Benitez of Snyder, Joel Dyess of and Ginger Howell of Snyder. The sponsor for the trip was Edward Barkowsky.

The convention theme for this year was "State of the Nation 1972-Toward Responsible Contributory Citizenship." There were many interesting speeches given at the convention by such notable people as: Rep. William Frenzel (R-Minn.), Mrs. Anne Armstrong (Co-Chairman of Republican National committee) and Senator Walter Mondale (D-Minn.).

The WTC group participated in all the convention happenings. There were tours made of Mayo Clinic, Mayo Museum, the IBM Corporation, and "Mayowood" (historic home of the Mayo family).

The PTK convention held a Presidential primary in which PTK delegates voted for their Presidential choice. The results were: Nixon won with 270 of 500 votes; McGovern and Humphrey were runners-up, with a Texas write-in candidate polling 56 votes—Bob Lilly of the Dallas Cowboys. Wallace trailed the pack polling only 40 votes.

There were 820 delegates from across the nation who attended the convention with 300 coming from Texas, giving Texas the largest representation at the convention.

The members of the club who went had a wonderful time and were very impressed by the national convention.

The club is planning another trip June 4-11 to the American University in Washington, D. C. where they will participate in the annual PTK Honor's Institute.

## German Class Attends Play

The German class attended a play on Sunday, March 12 in the Qualia Room on the Texas Tech campus in Lubbock, according to Wendell Jones, foreign language professor.

The play "Der Kaukasische Kriedekreis" (The Caucasian Chalk Circle) by Bertolt Brecht was done completely in German.

The drama, the Caucasian Chalk Circle, was written by Brecht during his stay in California and was first produced in English in 1948 at at Nourse Little Theatre, Northfield, Minnesota. The first production in Germany was in 1954 in Berlin.

Mr. Jones stated that the play was one in which the class benefited by being exposed to the language and customs by the use of the stage.

## WTC: The Marriage Factory

While sitting in the Student Center the other day two interesting things were brought to my attention. The first was that a number of the students are considering marriage in the near future. And second was the Sociology 232 book. Well, it just so happens that the book is titled "Marriage" and being the inquisitive person that I am, I investigated what Mr. Lantz and Mrs. Snyder had to say on the matter.

The authors indicated that the average marriage age of first marriage divorced females is 19.9 and the average age of first marriage divorced males is 23.2. And the average age of non-divorced females is 21.5, while the average age of non-divorced males is 24.1. That is to say people who get married after they are 22, for the female, and 24, for the male, tend to have happy and lasting marriages. But marriage under these ages are risky.

Furthermore the greater the age difference between husband and wife, the greater the chances of divorce. Especially, in marriages where the wife is older than the husband.

Statistics also indicate that the first 5 years of a marriage are the most crucial.

Concerning college marriages, the authors brought out the ideas that economic, sexual, and in-law or parental problems are the basic causes for divorce. This is because college students are experiencing intellectual stimulation, growth, and new experiences that can change their views on certain things almost over night.

This intellectual growth and change also adds to the pressures of the college marriage and leads into conflicts much more rapidly than a non-college situation.

Therefore, the successful marriages are those who are able to detect conflict, who learn from and can deal with conflict, and who are able to profit as a result.

I hope that if you are considering marriage that you will beware of the pitfalls and realistically know that it will work before you commit the rest of your and your loves lives to the trials and tribulations of marriage. And perhaps your marriage will be the one happy life out of three.

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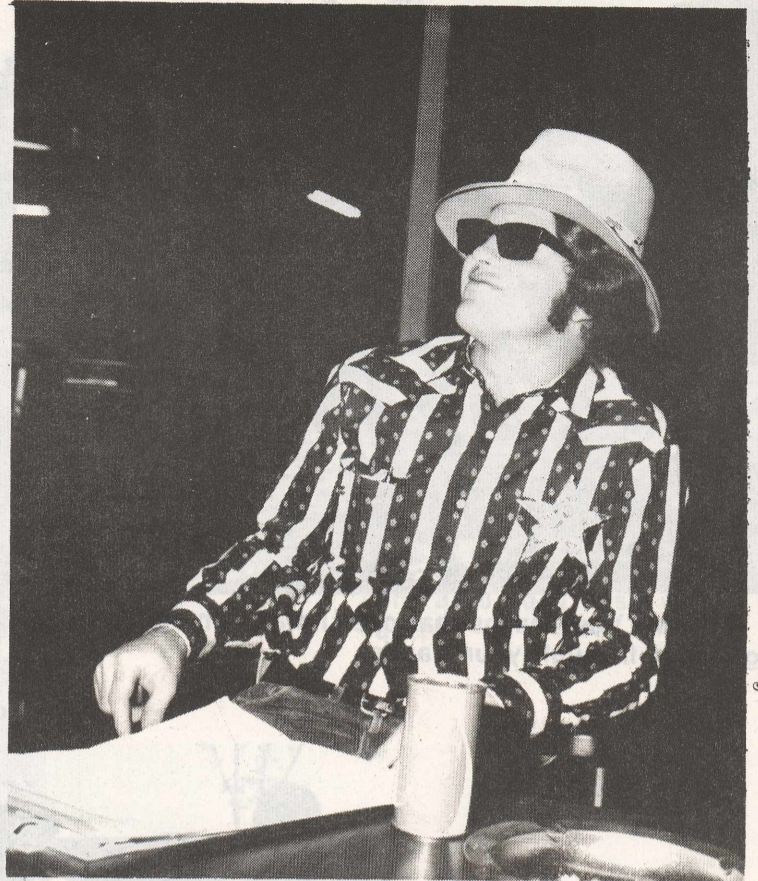
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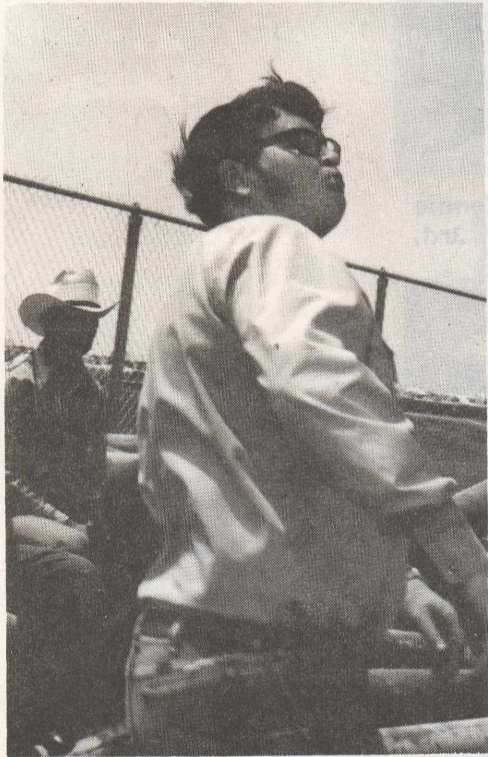

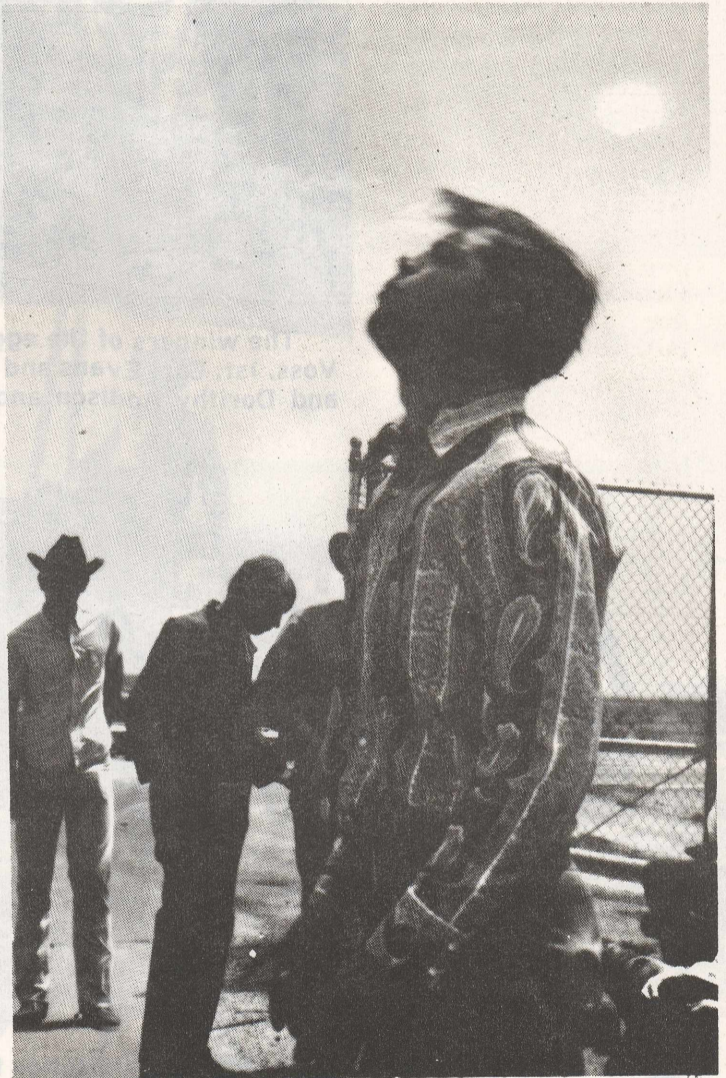

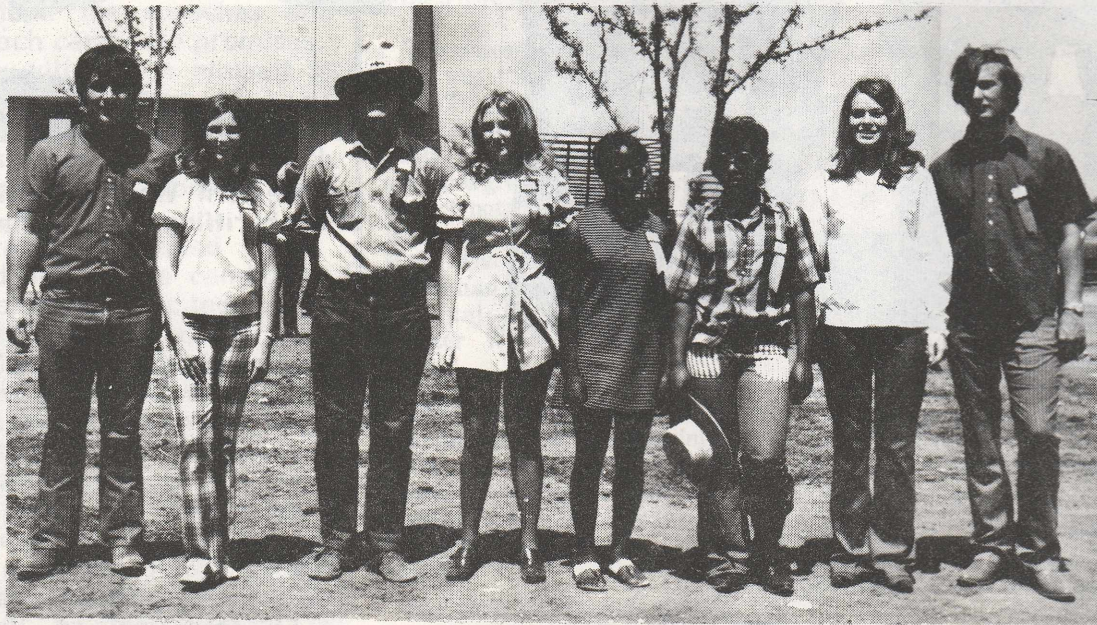

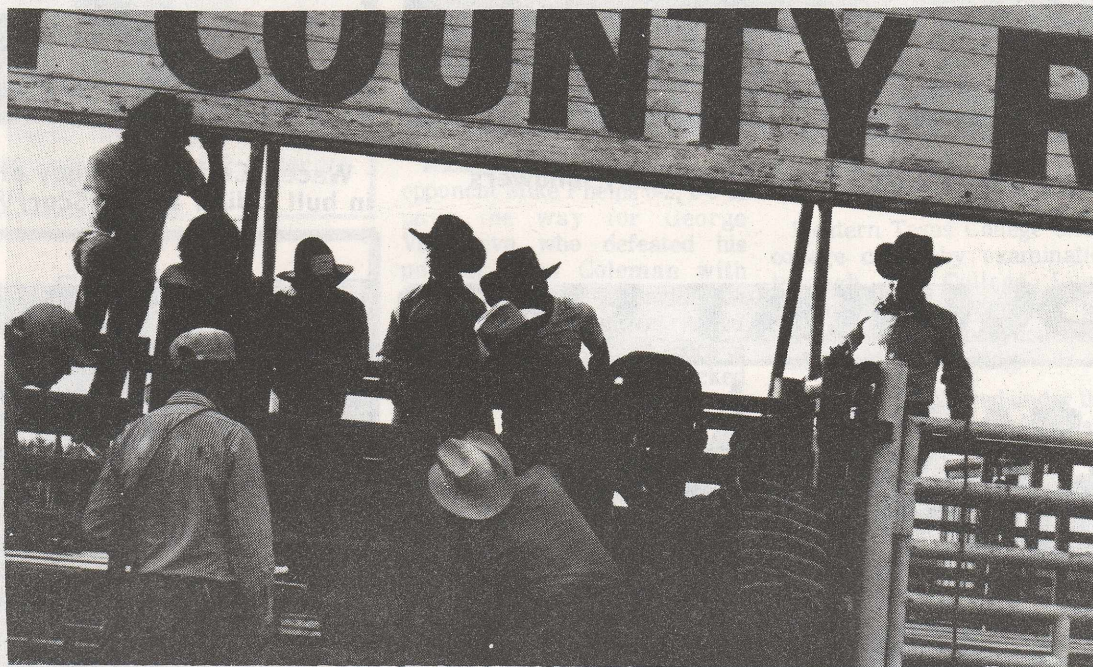

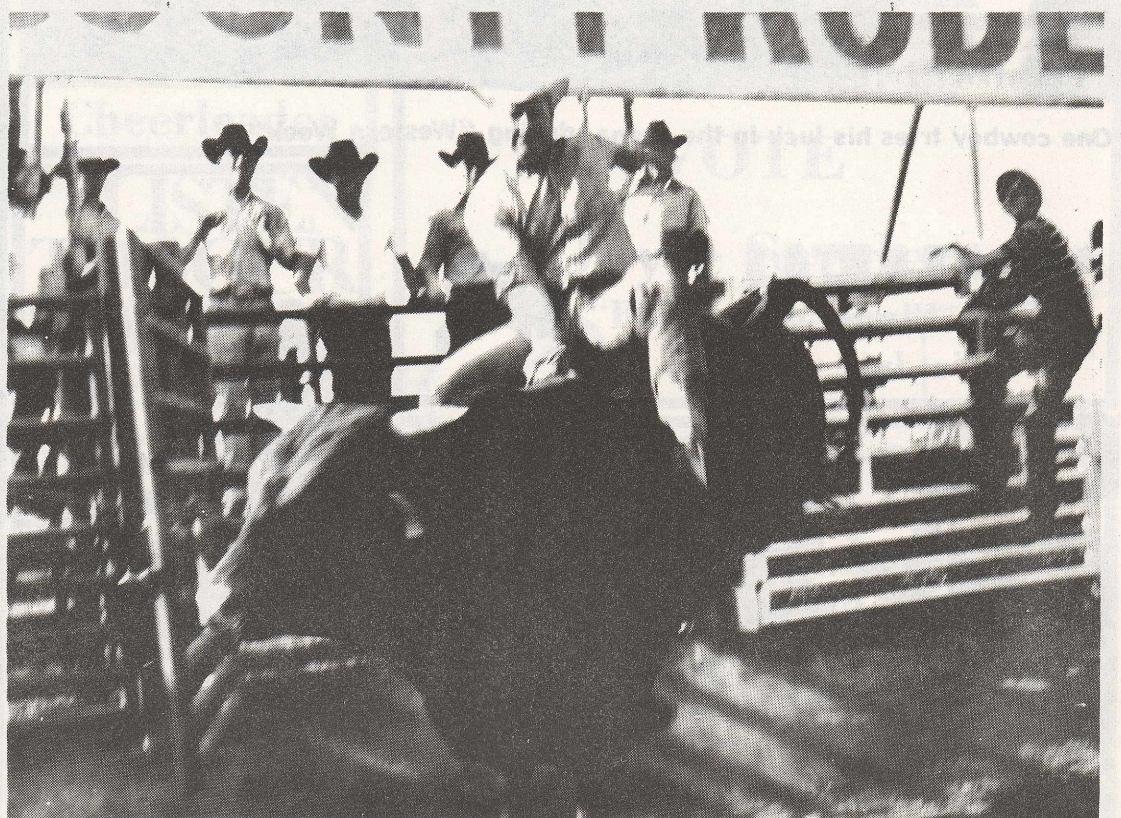
Speedy Joe Wilson wins a 50 yard dash with ease.

With help from the rodeo team the rider is made ready for an eight second ride.



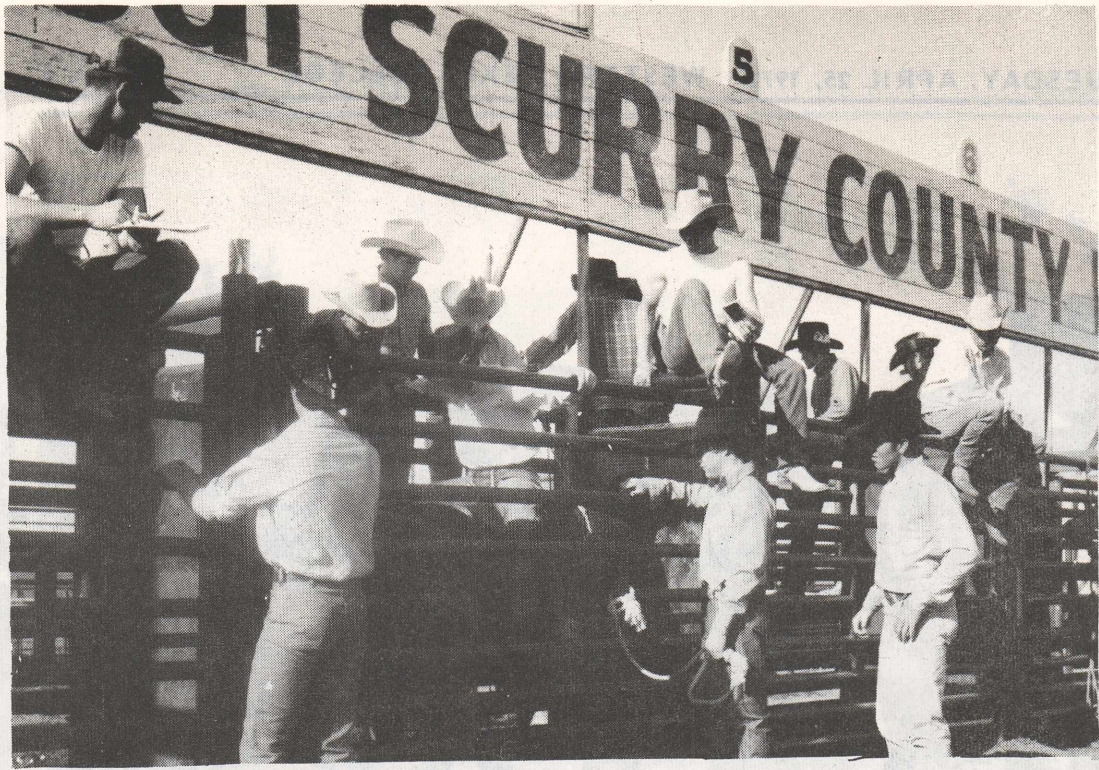
The shoot is opened and out comes bull and rider. It is too bad the ride did not last the limit.

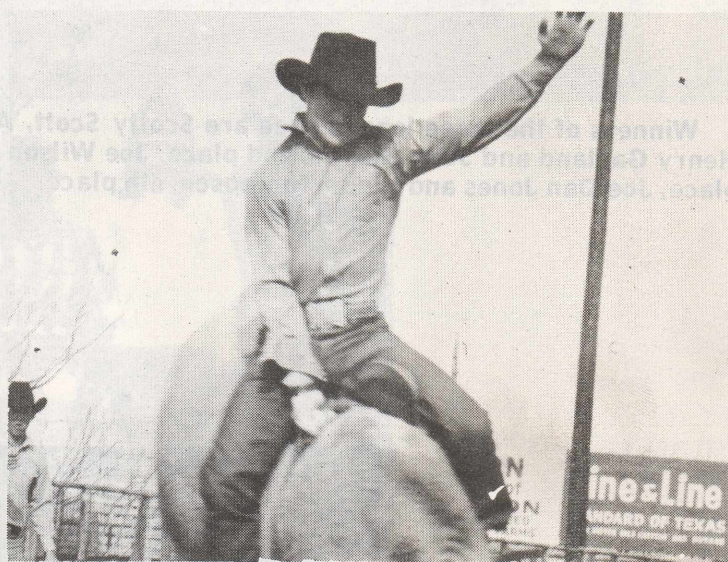
Gary Jones, tries to ride a bronc during Western Week at WTC.



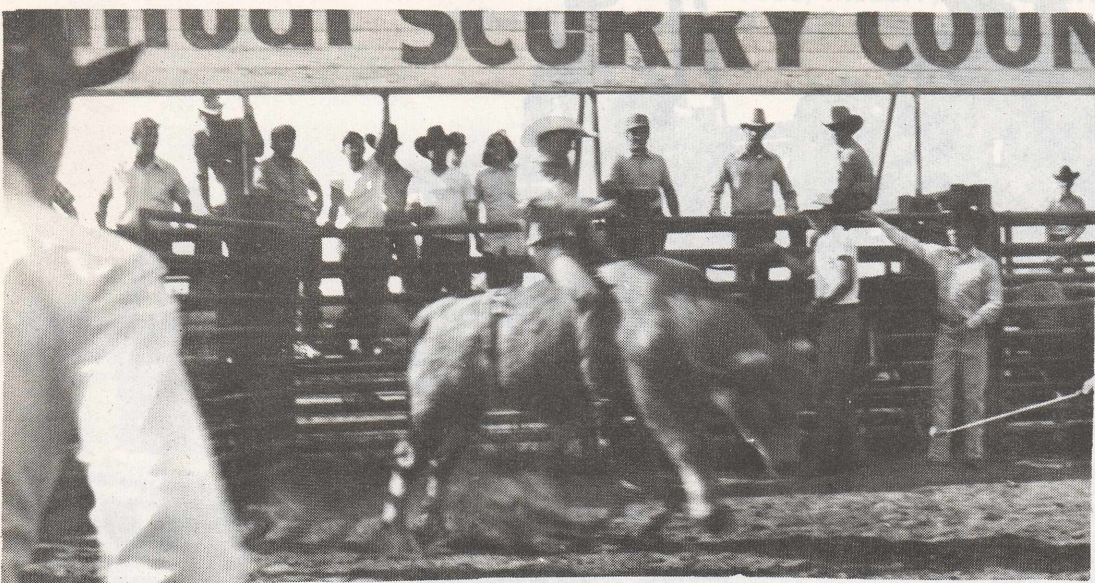
The cowboys enjoyed themselves during Western Week by participating in various kinds of activities. Bull riding was one of the many activities.



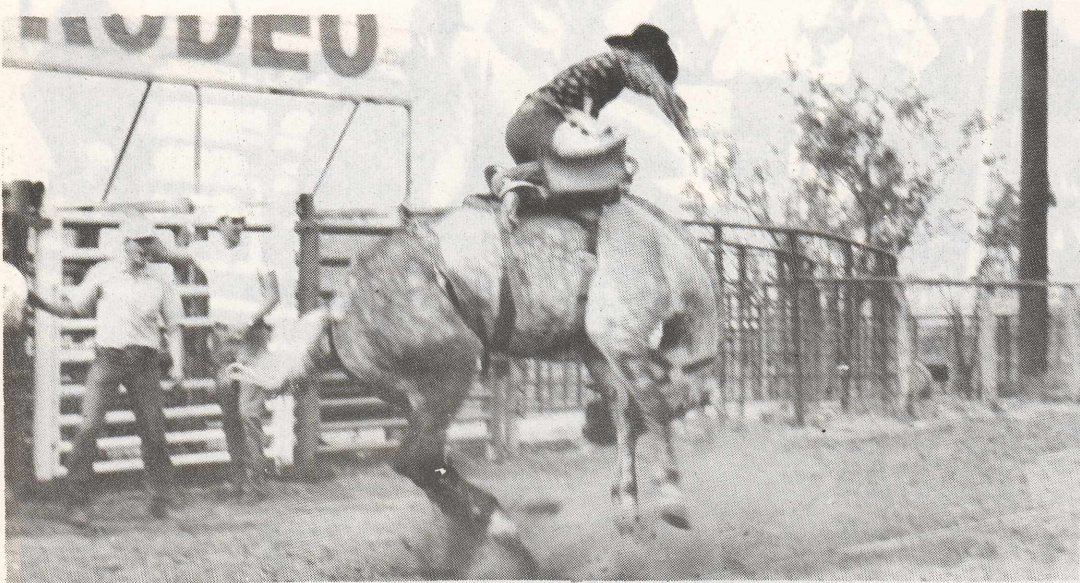
The gates are open! Vic Dodson comes out on a bull ride as many followers watch him go.



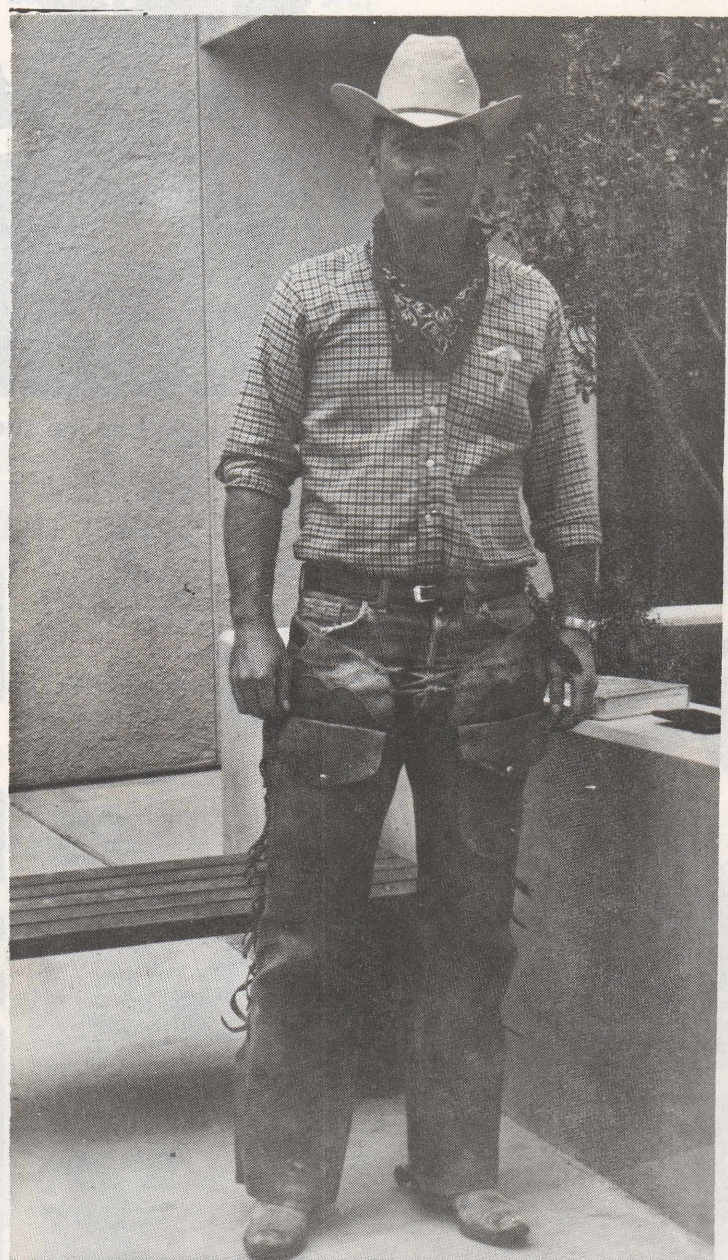
Wacey Cathey, cowboy at WTC, shows his skills in bull riding at the Scurry County Rodeo Arena.

## Golf Team Splits Matches With ACC Varsity Team

The Western Texas College golf team split a pair with Abilene Christian College varsity, at Abilene, on April 11, according to golf coach Bob O'Day.

The linksters eased by with a score of 289 to 290, then on March 27, the ACC team took a 302 to 303 victory here at Snyder Country Club, O'Day announced.

O'Day also stated that the ACC team turned in the best score that they had ever attained in five years while on their home course.

The top four scores were taken from each team to decide the team scores. Steve Rutherford

took medalist honors with a one under par score of 70. Other scores were:

- Stuerzenberger-71 (even par)
- Arnwine-74 (three over par)
- Tenorio-74 (three over par)
- Woner-74 (eight over par)
- Hays-82 (eleven over par)

The team scores for WTC during the ACC match which took place on March 27, in Snyder are as follows:

On March 24, WTC was involved in conference play with nine other junior college teams, here at Snyder Country Club. The team placed sixth with Odessa Jr. College placing first.

The conference matches are ruled on a point system. Each team is given a certain number of points according to what place it finishes in each match. Odessa Junior College still ranks first in conference playoffs with the other teams placing in respective order:

## Tennis Team Defeats New Mexico Military

The Western Texas College tennis team, coached by Wendell Jones has attained another victory for WTC. In singles and doubles match play on April 15 at Snyder High School, the WTC netters soundly defeated over New Mexico Military Institute.

Rick Riddle conquered his opponent Mike Phelps 6-2, 6-0 to pave the way for George Villanueva who defeated his partner, Ron Coleman with scores of 6-3 and 6-0. David Falk inked out his opponent Alibal Olmes with a smashing score of 6-0, 6-0. Henry Garland nicked Charles Hartz with a 6-2, 6-4 tally.

In doubles the WTC netters again whipped their N.M.M.I. guests. Scores were 6-1 and 6-0 for Rick Riddle and David Falk against Phelps and Coleman. George Villanueva and Henry Garland defeated their opponents with scores of 6-0, 6-0.

The WTC team journeyed to Frank Phillips on Wednesday, April 19 in hopes of claiming another victory.

## Students May Receive Credit By Examination

Western Texas College offers college credit by examination through the College Level Examination Program, according to Mary Hood, counselor and director of testing.

The courses offered under this test at WTC are as follows: History 131, History 132, English 231, Math 132, English 131 and 132, English 232, Psychology 231, Psychology 232, Sociology 231, and Math 133. All courses offered are 3 semester hours' courses. English 131 and 132 are offered together as six hours of semester credit.

C.L.E.P. examinations are offered during the third week of each month. The cost for each

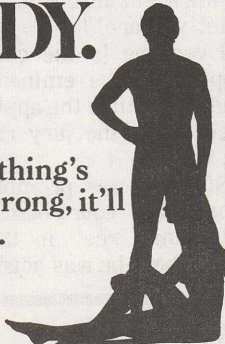
examination is \$15.00. The limitations are as follows: a student may receive a maximum of twelve (12) semester hours credit by examination; credit is awarded only after the student is enrolled at Western Texas College; the student must have either ACT or SAT scores on record in the Registrar's Office before he attempts the examination; a student cannot retake a test for a higher score if he has already attempted the course before.

The date for the first CLEP test here will be May 20, 1972. If any student should want to take the test, then you need to go by and see Mary Hood at the Counseling Offices.

### Quick Decision

The meanest horse thief from the Rio Grande to the Red River, known to one and all as Slippery, was hanged yesterday after a fast, fair-and-square trial in the thriving metropolis of Dusty Springs.
