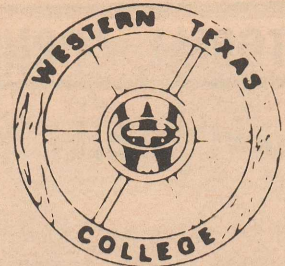

The Westerner basketball team of WTC honored Miss Sharon Johns of Snyder by naming her 1973-74 basketball sweetheart. At Snyder High School, Miss Johns was a nominee for Miss SHS, a member of the choir, and played volleyball.

As a highlight of the last home game of the season, awards were presented to those students who have helped to promote the cultivate spirit on campus.

Engraved plaques were presented to those students who projected the best attitude of school spirit and the pride throughout basketball season. The winners are chosen by the cheerleaders.

This year Danny Rose and Lisa Weaver were crowned Mr. and Miss SPIRIT.

Lisa is a sophomore pre-vet major. She was a cheerleader in high school, president of the FHA, and student council secretary. She was chosen football sweetheart and Valentine Sweetheart. She played volleyball and basketball, participated in the Regional One-Act Play Cast, and a nominee for Miss Heart of Texas.

At WTC, she was a student senator, a member of Los Vaqueros, a member of the WTC rodeo club, and a nominee for MissWTC of 1973. Currently, she is vice-president of the student body, Student Union Board, inter-club council, and intramural girls basketball team.

Mr. Rose is a graduate of Central High School in San Angelo. At Washington High School in Washington, Indiana, he was active in all sports, a member of student council for two years and a Certificate of Merit of Distributive Education.

During his two years at WTC, he has been a member of Phi Theta Kappa for two years and Eta Mu Theta. He also participated in intramural sports.

### AFOQT TEST GRE Dates

#### Set By Hood

Students interested in taking the Air Force Officer Qualifying Test (AFOQT), slated March 11 and 12 in the Student Center, should contact Dr. Mary Hood, director of testing, at 573-8511, ext. 275.

The test qualifies student to receive financial aid as well as determines their qualifications for the Air Force ROTC Commissioning Program. Also, according to Dr. Hood, students may compete for full tuition scholarships.

No test fee is charged, and students are not obligated to the Air Force.

Graduate students enrolled in extension courses from Sul Ross State University will have two opportunities to take the Graduate Record Examination if they have not done so.

Each test scheduled through the office of Dr. Mary Hood, director of testing, requires a minimum of 15 applicants.

Deadline for filing special requests for the test scheduled April 27, 1974, is March 13. Deadline for the test scheduled June 15, 1974, is May 1.

Registration forms must be turned in to Dr. Hood's office, room 103 in the Student Center.

# Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor,

WTC faculty and students still have time to register to vote in this year's elections. Those registered as recently as 1971 are still eligible to vote.

The Democratic Primary election will be held May 4, and General Election Nov. 5. Voters must have been registered at least 30 days before election day.

Four WTC students, freshmen Tomibeth Hunt, Kevin Jones, and Jerry and Gary Brooks, have been deputized to receive voter registration applications.

Registered students from other counties who live in dorms or other residences here are eligible to vote in Scurry County elections. If they have registered in their home counties they must re-register here and note the county of original registration.

If registered voters have moved their place of residence since registering, they must report their new address to the Tax Collector as early as five days before election.

Registered voters who plan to be out of the county May 4 may vote absentee ballot at the County Clerk's office. Absentee voting begins April 15.

# Green Machine Dumps Tall Hawks

The Howard Hawks strutted into town last Thursday leading the conference with an impressive 12-2 mark and ranked 16th in the nation.

But the Westerners and a huge hometown crowd were waiting.

When the bedlam in the coliseum had subsided and the stands began to look sparse, the hawk eyes were glued to the floor. The high-flying conference leaders were stunned.

A talented Western Texas quint, which owned only an 8-6 loop ledger going into the contest, had plucked the birds naked.

The hawks staged a powerful late rally.

Being threatened, in the closing minutes to have victory swept from their grasps, the Westerners played as professionals.

Eugene Harris and Norman Barnes, two big stalwarts who have controlled the boards all year, went to the bench via the foul route midway in the second half.

This gave Howard the incentive it needed.

The Big Spring school began to run and gun. Down by 20 points the Hawks smelled fresh life.

Leroy Lumzy became a crackshot from the outside. When he did happen to miss, Howard's "Big Men," Thomas Bledsoe or Taylor Williams, were there for the follow-up.

Things were going so well for the birds that they thought an intentional foul wouldn't hurt them.

This strategy proved fatal for the Big Spring school.

In the first half the Westerns had attempted 13 charity line tosses with 12 true aims. The second frame was no different.

The Hawks would take the ball down and snare their two points, then on the ball's return trip play would be stopped for a free-

throw. The Hawks fouled intentionally.

Luis Blanco and Danny McDaniel took turns at the line. There was never a miss-fire. The Westerner's final 9 points came here—9 of 9 at the free throw line.

With the score standing 95-94 and three seconds to play, the Birds drew another foul giving Western an insurance of victory. This foul was a technical called against the HC head coach.

McDaniel coolly made the toss, then held the inbounds pass as the last three seconds ticked away: 96-94.

Howard will remember McDaniel. If he wasn't hitting a 25-foot jump shot, he was weaving in toward the basket for a rebound. McDaniel finished the night with 31 points.

His defensive heroics were also evident. McDaniel collected numerous steals and guarded his opponent like a "hawk."

The bench was also instrumental in the victory. Players like Kevin Jones, Greg Hill, and Luis Blanco had to play as starters when the foul epidemic hit the Westerner team.

These second-stringers had seen very little action. They rose to the occasion and played like the best in the conference.

With probably the largest home crowd of the season and surely the most vocal, the Westerners produced a supreme effort.

They had the crowd and gave the effort.

Supporters help win ball games. Ask Howard College.

The regional tournament is a week away (March 7-9). If Western Texas can get everything together in Brownwood, then it can bring home the championship trophy.

With a regional crown, the Westerners would have a shot at the national title.

## WTC To Region Mar. 7-9

It's official! Western Texas College's talented basketball squad is going to the regional tournament March 7-9 in Brownwood.

Seeded No. 7, the Westerners will face the No. 2 team, Hill County Junior College, March 7 at 4 p.m. Earlier that same day at 2, the Number 3 and 6 clubs, Amarillo and Odessa, will square off.

In the evening at 7 p.m., the No. 1 seeded Howard Hawks will tangle with the No. 8 school, Weatherford Junior College. Following that affray will be a meeting between McLennan College of Waco and Clarendon at 9, the Number 4 and 5 quint.

The following day at 7 p.m., winners of the Hill County-WTC tussle and Amarillo-Odessa

encounter will clash. Victors of the Howard-Weatherford game and McLennan-Clarendon contest will square off at 9.

The championship will be played at 9 p.m. Saturday, Mar. 9, with the winner advancing to the national tournament in Hutchinson, Kansas.

Selection of the schools was made Sunday, Feb. 24. The committee consisted of three coaches from the Western Junior Athletic Conference, two of the Eastern, and one Independent.

Howard has the best overall record, standing 32-5. Other teams' records are Hill 21-10, AC 19-5, McLennan 22-9, Clarendon 20-10, OC 17-7, WTC 21-8; and Weatherford 16-11.

## McMurry's JV Popped, 84-64

Controlling the boards, the WTC basketball squad dumped McMurry's junior varsity, 84-64, Feb. 16 in a non-conference tilt in Abilene.

The Westerns snared 48 rebounds from the Indians.

Dominating the contest, the Westerners were out to as much as a 19-point margin in the first stanza, holding a 45-32 advantage at the half, and a 28-point lead in the last frame.

Western Texas employed a 2-1-2 zone throughout the game, while the Indians used the same

part of the time and also a man-to-man press.

WTC hit 37 of 79 from the field for 48 per cent. At the line, they put in 10 of 18 for 55 per cent. McMurry connected on 6 of 9 at the line.

Danny McDaniel and Harold Ward paced the Westerners with 25 and 24 points, respectively. Brian Minor added 10.

Minor lead in the rebounding department, grabbing 13 caroms. McDaniel snatched 10 and Ward nine.

# WTC Linksters Begin Season

The Western Texas College golf squad is competing in its initial meet of the spring today at the 23rd Annual Border Olympics in Laredo. The tourney is scheduled to run through Saturday.

Being one of the major collegiate meets in the United States, WTC will be expected to challenge many major four-year schools and other outstanding junior colleges.

The spring edition of the '74 golf team consists of four sophomores and five freshmen. Two of the sophs are this year's co-captains, Danny Walters of Abilene Cooper and Mark McCraney from Big Spring.

Other second-year linksters are Ricky Hooper of Sweetwater and Larry Hall from Iraan. Marty Pate, Robert McFaul, Mark Hargrove, Fred Liner, all of Snyder, and Kyle Howard of Odessa Permian are the frosh.

**SECOND PLACE**

The Westerners now stand in second place in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference race, trailing Odessa College by a mere point, 22-21.

But, other teams in the league also have outstanding personnel. "I expect a strong field in conference again this spring. Actually, six teams are capable of winning any conference tourney," stated WTC golf coach, Bob O'Day.

The six teams are the squads which hold the first six places in the standings now: OC, WTC, Howard College, New Mexico Junior College, Amarillo College, and South Plains College.

Initial loop play will start March 8-9, when Western Texas and Howard host the HC and WTC Golf Tournament.

Friday the league members will play 18 holes in Big Spring, then the next morning the same at the Snyder Country Club.

Trophies will be awarded to the first, second, and third place teams, the low ball squad, and individuals—medalist, runner-up medalist, and third place. Each day counts as a separate league tournament.

April 25-26 two more loop meets will be held at Borger in conjunction with the Great Plains Tournament, so trophies will again be given. Borger is hosting two meets since one of the tourneys at South Plains was rained out last semester.

The final conference meet will be staged at Roswell, N.M. May 3. The 18 holes played will count as the first 18 of the 54 to be played for the regional championship.

Every team from the WJAC is entitled to participate in the regional meet. Other schools competing will be Schreiner Institute, McLennan, Hill County, Grayson County Junior College, and Vernon JC. These teams are in the geographical region.

**TOP TO FLORIDA**

The top two teams will journey to Ft. Myers, Florida for the nationals. Also, the individual who cards the lowest score and is not a member of either of the squads may go.

Over the past eleven years, a squad from this region has captured the national title five times, and has never finished any lower than ninth place.

One of the main reasons for competing in a meet like the Border Olympics is to let four-year college coaches view these Juco linksters.

Three of last year's sophomores are now playing for four-year schools. Max Tenorio, only individual from WTC to have competed in nationals, is No. 2 at West Texas State.

Blake Arnwine is No. 3 at Stephen F. Austin, and Tim

Suerzenberger is No. 5 at Hardin-Simmons University.

So far this spring, Walters holds the lowest qualifying average at the Snyder Country Club with a 71.1. Hargrove is not far behind with a 72.9.

Other linksters and their averages are McCraney 75; Howard 75.6; Hopper 75.9; Pate 77.1; McFaul 77.4; Liner 78.4; and Hall 81.3.

Poor weather conditions the past three weeks have been the main reason for no better averages. "It has been cold, or the wind has been blowing," remarked O'Day.

Three of the sophomore golfers had excellent averages this past fall. Walters had a 70.8, and McCraney and Hopper each had a 73.9. Freshman Hargrove also played well with an average of 74.3.

These four linksters and two others who Coach O'Day was uncertain about at press time are playing today at Laredo.

"Our spring depends on the way our sophomores play. The most important thing for us is to qualify for the nationals," O'Day concluded.

# Cagers Catch NMMI Off Guard

Western Texas extended its winning streak to seven Monday, Feb. 18 with a 97-96 trouncing of New Mexico Military Institute in a conference tussle at Roswell.

The Westerners established their dominance early, and went on to build up a 20-point advantage, 46-26, at intermission.

With WTC's reserves playing the majority of the second period, the Westerners and NMMI fought on almost equal terms.

Western Texas connected on 37 of 75 from the field for 46 per cent. At the line, they netted 27 of 34 for 78 per cent. The Roswell school hit 12 of 13 at the line for

99 per cent.

Danny McDaniel was high-point man for the Westerners as he notched 26. Eugene Harris and Harold Ward each added 17, and Kenny Fowler meshed 11.

The Westerners grabbed 49 rebounds. Harris and McDaniel paced the team with 10 and 17, respectively.

New Mexico claimed the game's leading scorer as Robert Blue ripped the cords for 32 points.

The win left WTC with a 20-8 season record and an 8-6 conference mark, and NMMI 0-15 in loop play and 4-18 for the year.

# WTC Clips South Plains

The Western Texas Westerners clipped South Plains College, 74-66, Feb. 14 in a loop affray at the Scurry CCounty Coliseum.

After falling prey to an early Texan margin, the Westerners took control of the contest and led by seven to eight points throughout the initial half, holding a 39-32 margin at intermission.

WTC continued its domination in the second period, holding a 14-point advantage at one point. Reserves saw action in the latter stages of the tussle, enabling SPC to cut away on the lead.

The Westerners hit only 27 to 77 shots from the floor for 35 per cent. At the line, they put in 20 of 38 for 52 per cent. South Plains notched 10 of 14 at the charity

line.

Danny McDaniel and Harold Ward shared scoring honors for the Westerners with 22 points each. After the game McDaniel's scoring totaled 577 for the year, breaking Walter Hannibal's single season scoring record of 567.

Braian Minor was also in twin figures with 17 points.

The Westerners snared 49 rebounds. Eugene Harris grabbed 13 and Ward snatched off 11.

South Plains employed a zonne defense, while Western Texas countered with a man-to-man press throughout the meeting.

Leading the Texan scoring was Val Stephens of Lamesa with 18 points.

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
