Jones Re-elected President Cast Announced for 'Charlie Brown' Of County Trustees Board

Scurry County Junior College District Board of Trustees ratified the April 6 election returns at their meeting on Monday, April 8.

W.A. Jones, president; Bill Wilson, vice-president; and George Patterson, secretary were re-elected board officers.

Tentative budget proposals were presented, based on \$1,574,223 anticipated revenues for 1974-75. Final budget proposals will be adopted in

Approval was given to payment of the golf course architect's fee, pending receipt of engineers' reports.

Plans for the Baptist Student Union Building were approved, with construction to begin soon.

Dr. Robert Clinton, WTC President, announced WTC's commencement exercises will be May 16.

Reassignments were approved to begin in the fall, including Dan Dever as associate registrar in addition to veteran's outreach coordinator.

Rex Hopkins, now director of occupational-technical education, will replace J.M. Kayser as dean of the evening school and continuing education. Kayser will assume full-time teaching duties in the fall.

Charles Holland, drama director, has announced cast and crew members for "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown," to be presented May 7-11 in WTC's Fine Arts Theater.

Leslie Anderson of Colorado City is cast in the leading role of Charlie Brown. The musical production will be Anderson's first appearance on WTC's

Cast as Snoopy is Joe Woolsey, who played the same role in the Colorado City Community Theater production of "Charlie Brown." He is a senior in Colorado High School.

Carla McCollum of Denver City, who appeared in

"Charley's Aunt," is portraying Lucy.

In a recent poll of junior college golf coaches across the nation, Western Texas College's golf squad was tabbed as the seventh best Juco team in the Unifed States.

Ratings were given on the basis of the number of returning lettermen, season records for last year and, so far this year, team scores and individual averages.

The poll was conducted by the Junior College Golf Coaches Association, and its president, Barry Rodenhaver of Odessa

WTC and OC were the only two clubs from Texas to be named to the top ten. The Wranglers were ranked third.

In 1857, a mission was esblished on the San Saba River in Central Texas. It was abandoned within twelve years, but the failure has been the focal point of a legend that has survived the centuries: the legend of the San Saba Treasure.

New Mexico University scored 421.5 points to capture first place at the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association rodeo April 4-6 at the Scurry County Arena.

Tarleton State finished second with a 315 total, followed by Western Texas College, who compiled 238.5 points. With a 106.5 total, Sul Ross State came in fourth.

Johnny Trout garnered WTC's only first place finish as he received a mark of 70 in bareback riding competition. Second place finishers for

a 10.2 in steer wrestling, and Johnny Gass a 65 in saddle bronc riding competition. David McLauchlin tied for fifth in bull riding with a mark of 68.

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NTSU Sinks Western In Dual Competition

Coach Bob O'Day's talented because of a death in the family. golf squad suffered only its second loss of the year in dual match competition, 621 to 602, April 5-6 at the hands of North Texas State University in Denton.

Turning in a fine 18-hole score of 297, the Westerners trailed the Eagles by only four shots after the first day of competition Friday.

Kyle Howard paced Western Texas with a one-over par 73. Other scores were Marty Pate 74, Mark Hargrove, Danny Walters, and Robert McFaul, all 75 each, and Ricky Hopper 80.

But with the coming of Saturday came the winds WTC has been plagued with all season. The southwest breeze gusted at times to over 40 m.p.h.

Hargrove carded the only round in the 70's for the Westerns with an 18-hole total of 78. This gave him a two-day total of 153 and third place in the dual.

Other Western Texas scores were Howard 73-81-154; Walters 75-82-157; Pate 74-83-157; Mc-Faul 75-84-159; and Ricky Hcpper 80-82-162 total.

Only the four lowest scores figured into the team total, medal play.

Eagle golfer Greg Sumrow was medalist with outstanding rounds of 72 and 75 for a 147

"The Eagles just played great in the wind," remarked O'Day. "It was good experience for us to play against North Texas.'

Coach Ferrill has one of the best golf programs in the U.S. North Texas has placed in the top ten (N.C.A.A.) 16 times since 1949 and has won four National Championships. They have won the Missouri Valley 12 of the last 14 years.

Abilene Christian College chalked up its first victory in two years against the WTC golf squad last Tuesday at the Abilene Municipal Golf Course.

In a southerly wind of about 35 m.p.h., the Wildcats downed Western Texas 299 to 310—an 11 shot win.

Individual Westerner scores were Ricky Hopper 76, Danny Walters and Kyle Howard 77, Mark Hargrove 80, Robert McFaul 81, and Mark McCraney

"We just had a bad day and took them too lightly," stated Western coach, Bob O'Day. "We didn't have a single player play a good round. It was the worst we've played this year as a team. I hope we bounce back."

ACC's Mark Brockman was medalist with a score of 73

"I wish the wind would quit, so we could have decent weather to practice," added the WTC coach

Western Texas owns two wins over the Wildcats this year, downing them in both meetings this past fall.

The Western dual match mark now stands at 11-3-1.
