ARNOLD NEWMAN: FIVE DECADES: Dec 11, 1988-Jan 29, 1989

This traveling retrospective exhibition presents the works of noted American photographer Arnold Newman. Included are 165 images in color and blackand-white, featuring portraits of some of the most famous and influential personalities of the twentieth century, as well as early experiments in photographic abstraction. Newman's portraits possess symbolic and abstract values, while presenting the subject's working life in a combination of powerful graphic design and significant environmental detail. The exhibition has been organized by the Museum of Photographic Arts, San Diego.

Fifth Sun competes in El Paso

The WTC drama department presented the drama "The Fifth Sun" on Nov. 28 at the American College Theater Festival. The performance was dedicated to the memory of Elaine Lambert, dance instructor and WTC drama supporter.

"The Fifth Sun", written by Nikolas Patricca, is based on the 1980 assasination of Arch Bishop Romero. It presents the events leading up to the assasination, beginning in 1977 and continuing until Romero's death in 1980. 
Spring schedule changes




