Lancaster earns Piper Professor award

Marilyn Lancaster, WTC associate professor of English-developmental studies, has been named a Piper Professor by the Piper Foundation based in San Antonio.

The award, given annually to only 10 individuals, is designed to recognize outstanding achievement in the field of teaching in Texas colleges and universities.

Mrs. Lancaster said she was "honored and a little amazed" to receive the award. "I can't imagine that I would have ever gotten this if I did not work with the people I work with," she said. "They force me to be better than I would be on my own."

As a Piper Professor, Mrs. Lancaster will receive an honorarium of \$2,500, a gold pin and a certificate. The award was announced May 1, but will be presented formally to Mrs. Lancaster at WTC's May 11 commencement ceremony. She is scheduled to speak at the program.

Mrs. Lancaster is the second

WTC instructor to be honored by the Piper Foundation. Ray Robbins, criminal justice professor, received the award in 1986.

"This is the highest honor for a community college teacher," said WTC president, Dr. Harry Krenek. "Mrs. Lancaster is an outstanding teacher. She is very concerned about student success and devotes a great deal of not only time and energy, but emotion as well, to her role as teacher." Krenek commented that the

award was an honor "not just for Mrs. Lancaster, but for the college as well. It demonstrates our commitment to excellence."

Mrs. Lancaster began teaching at WTC in 1980. She graduated from Texas Tech University in 1975 with a bachelor of science degree in education, and received her master's degree in education from Tech in 1977.

She completed graduate studies at the University of Texas and the University of Pittsburgh, and in 1981 she was awarded a \$3,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to study classical rhetoric at Carnegie-Mellon University in Pittsburgh.

She was recently elected as vice president of the Texas Junior College Teachers Association, and served as that organization's secretary last year.

Mrs. Lancaster's husband, Richard, is an English professor at WTC. They have two daughters, Amy, who teaches Spanish at Wilson Junior High School in Lubbock, and Jennifer, who is a freshman at WTC.

The fire-damaged wing of the WTC dormitory is currently being repaired by local contractors for use next fall. Eight rooms on the third floor were gutted in the Nov. 17 blaze.

According to Dr. Duane Hood, dean of student services, all electrical, cable television and phone wires have been replaced, and all walls in the wing have

been re-sheetrocked.

He said, "Work is going as well as anyone can expect. The workers are just about ready to begin painting."

Additional work to be done includes building new closets, placing new vanities and furniture in the rooms, re-tiling the floors, replacing the heating and cooling units, making plumbing improvements and exterior work.

"All rooms will now have

built-in closets, new furniture, desks and mirrors for the doors."

Also, new furniture and a new television set for the lobby will be purchased.

Repairs to the dorms were originally estimated to be \$40,000.

"I don't think that we'll spend more than that, but it is too early to tell.

"It will depend on how much new furniture we will have to buy," Hood said.

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

The golf team from Odessa College won the NJCAA Region V Tournament April 28—an event held at the Western Texas College golf course.

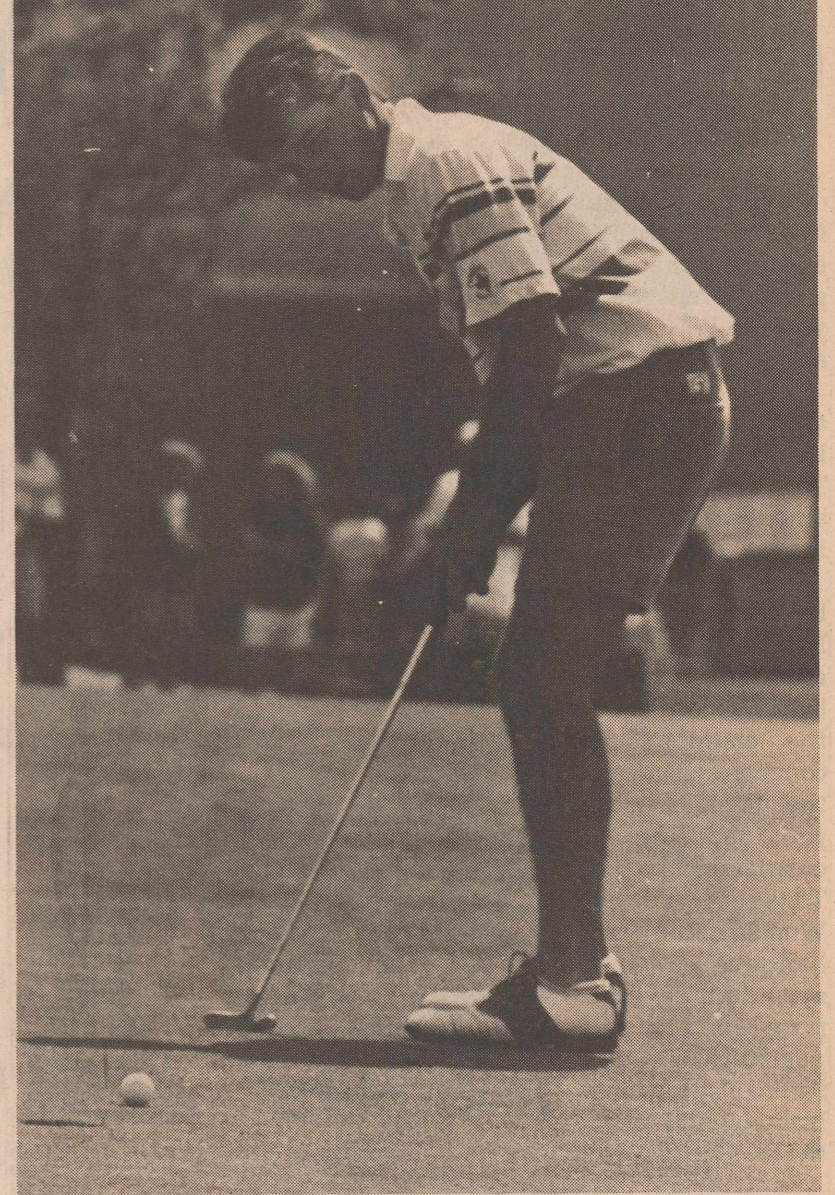
Competing to advance to Nationals were WTC, NMJC, Midland College, NMMI and Odessa College.

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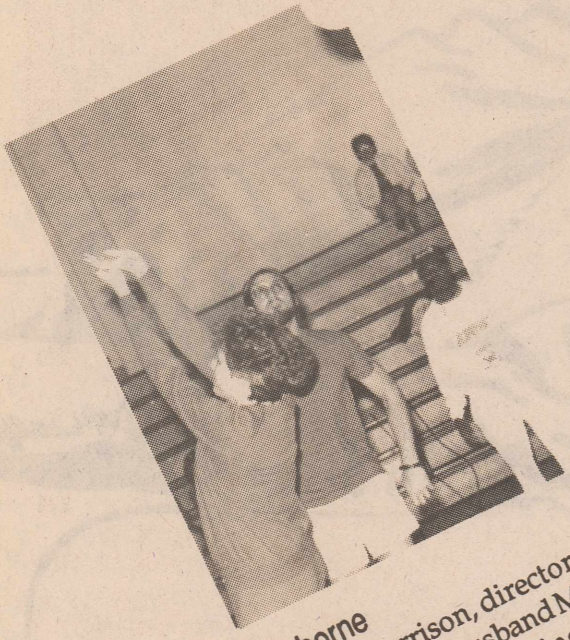
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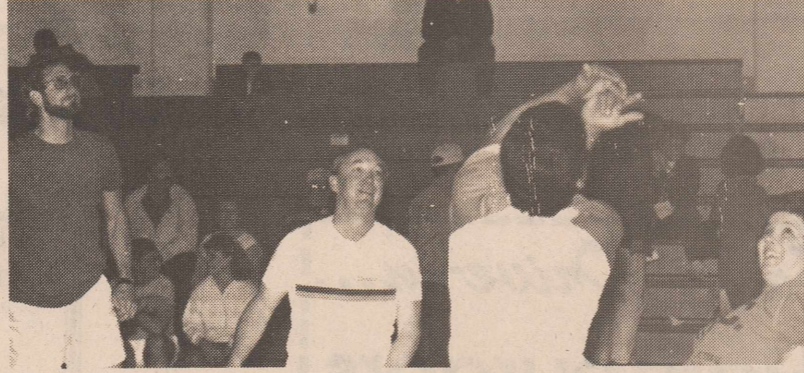

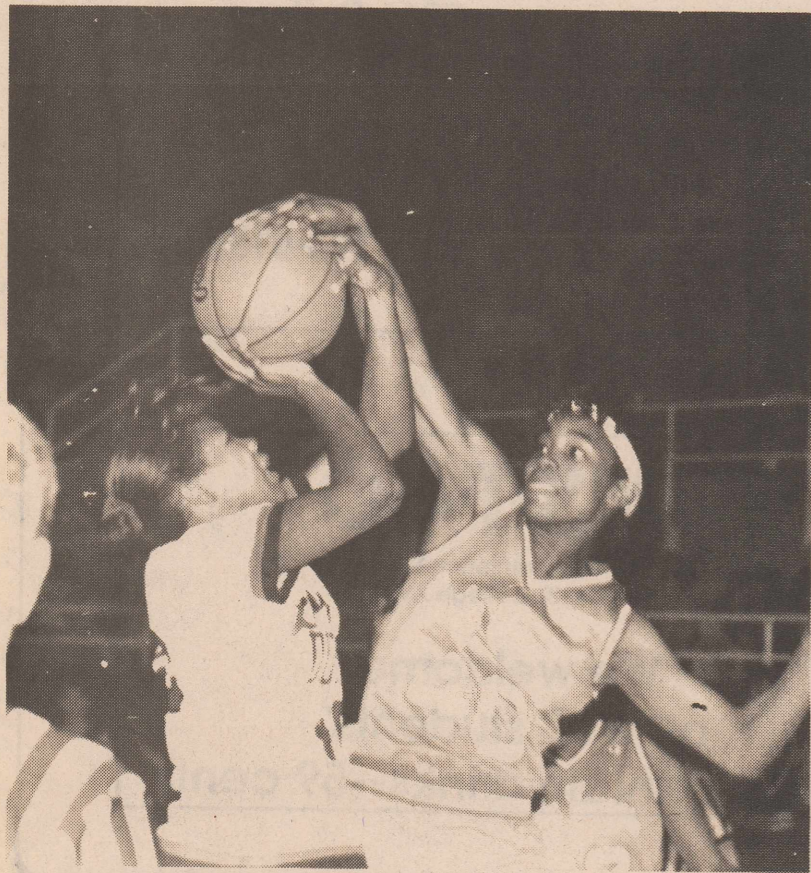

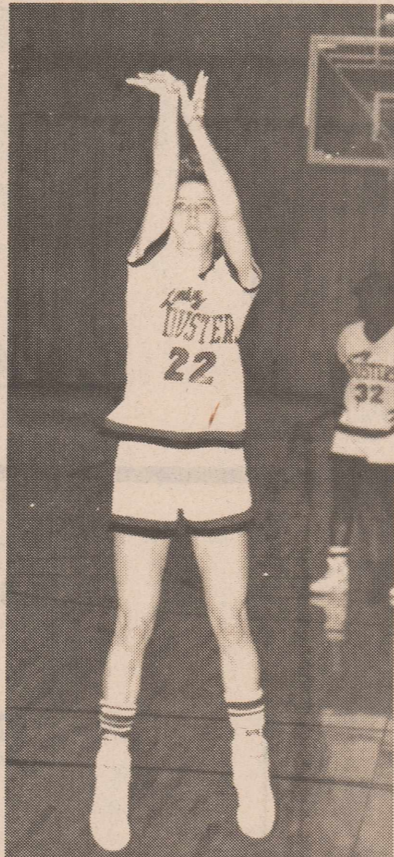

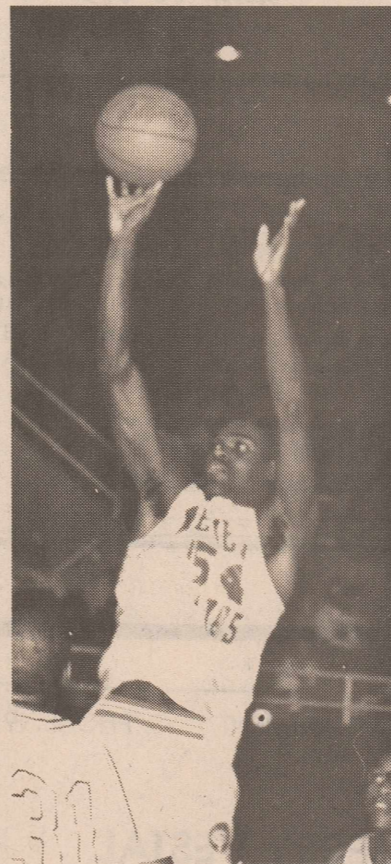

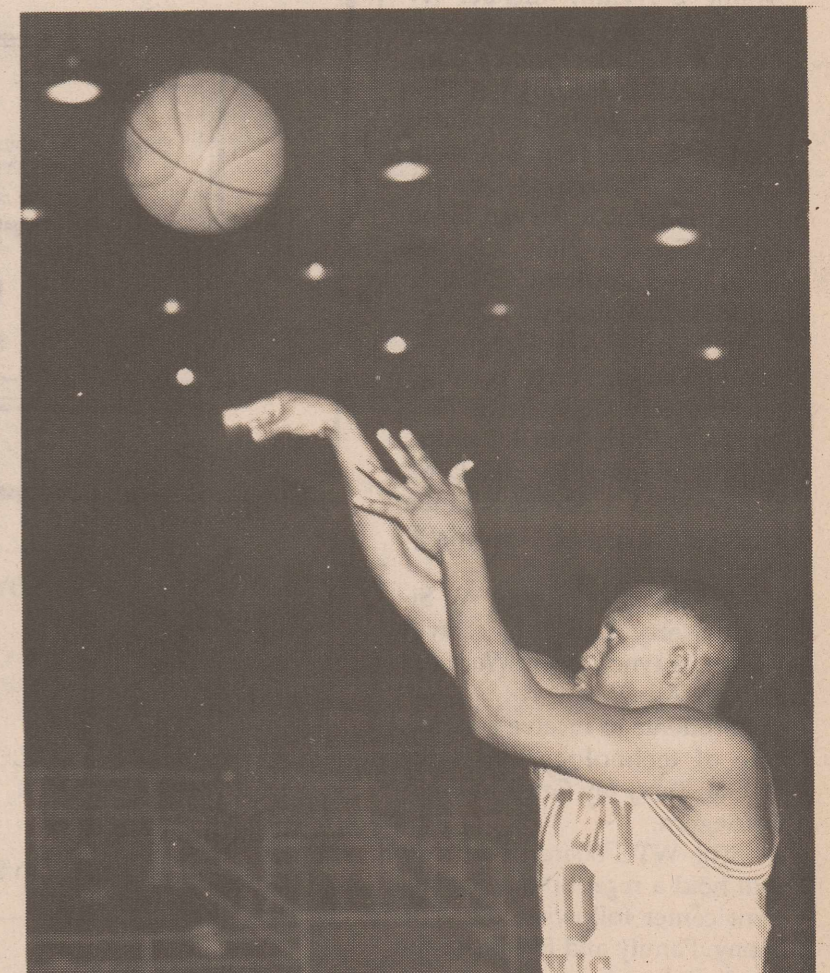
Raging Battle

To date, 77 percent of the students enrolled in the local program have passed the five-part G.E.D. test.

It allowed the students to both study for their high school equivalency certificate as well as earn money through a job training program.

Coordinators for the program here are Debbie Brunson and Pat Blakely.

Funding for it was provided by a grant administered through the Job Training Partnership Act. The college was initially given \$60,000 to assist a potential 16 students.

The nine-month study plan included basic education with an emphasis on computers. Applicants had to be between the ages of 17-21.

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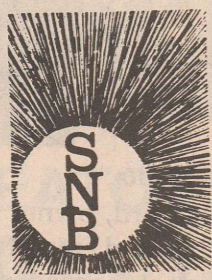
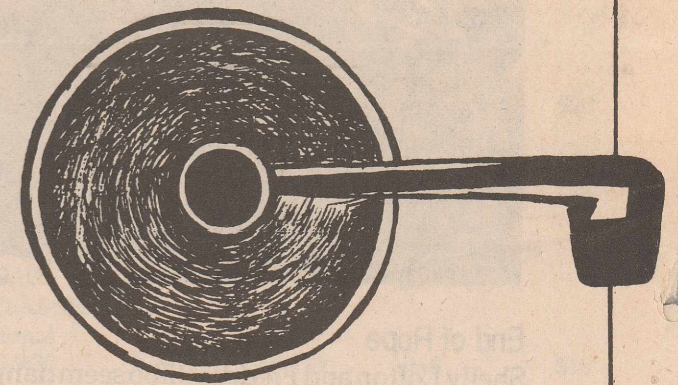
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
