When Kellye Block submitted a personal essay for publication in WTC's literary magazine "Aquifer," she had no way of knowing the chain

Barkowsky likes to watch the expression on people's faces when he tells them how much and how long he has enjoyed being a Girl Scout.

His involvement dates back more than 22 years, when one of his two daughters entered the Scouting program as a Brownie. From volunteer work at the local level, his Scouting effort evolved to a seat on the West Texas Girl Scout Council. based in Abilene—the policy making body which oversees Girl Scout activity for this area. He has served on the board of directors for 15 years, moving from a

member at large to first and second vice president. For the past five years, he has served as president of the regional Scouting operation.

"When you're the only male in the house, you don't stand a chance," said Barkowsky, English instructor and chairman for the Communications and Letters Division at WTC.

The West Texas Girl Scout Council oversees 16 counties with about 3,000 Girl Scout members. The council's duties include making budget decisions, setting salaries and hiring executive direc-

While he notes he has enjoyed his work with the council, he said its primary function as a policy-making board has made it difficult for him to participate in the more day-day-day Girl Scouts

"Unfortunately, I am able to work very little with the girls. (The council) is a wonderful job, but I secretly look forward to when I'm not on the board so I can work with the girls directly again."

"I enjoy watching the little girls grow and dads and daughters relating to each other.

"Scouts exist to provide an opportunity to help girls become as much as they can be," adds Barkowsky.

When we joke, does it mean what we feel? Writer says yes...

The word "bitch." Not a pleasant title, really. All of us have heard it. A good many of us have been called one. So it wasn't so surprising several weeks ago when Connie Chung revealed, using Newt Gingrich's mother as a source, that the new Speaker of the House had summed up his opinion for Hillary Clinton by this term.

A good deal of meaningless debate was geared toward the question of whether or not the mother of the Speaker was officially "on" or "off the record" in her disclosure. Even more controversy was focussed on whether or not the reporter was ethical in her revelation. But if this political skirmish is going to be treated seriously, then let us deal with what matters most.

Remember when Clayton Williams was running for Governor of Texas? He was ahead in all the polls. It looked liked he'd win until he made one mistake, one that

will probably plague him the rest of his life. He remarked that rape is a lot like weather, that one can't do much about it so she might as well just sit back and enjoy it. Don't the kinds of jokes a person tells reveal a lot about the teller? It is those side remarks, the things one finds amusing, the label he finds for others, that reveal so much about the person making the comment.

The label Gingrich used for the First Lady, like any other comment of the sort, was seemingly small and unimportant. Why make a big deal out of the flippant terms for which we choose to label others? Or the title racial slurs? Or the dirty jokes that denigrate women? Because the way in which we regard others reveals our own truth.

And the truth that often is there when we get past the surface remarks is a fierce hostility toward those who are other than what we are. America, the "melting pot" of all nations, is in reality a land of disharmony. We've seen what the results are when the hatred of intolerance rears its ugly head and manifests itself in such incidents as the shooting of the abortion doctors or the slaughtering of homosexuals.

It is fundamentalism, a small-minded intolerance for the views of others, the self-righteous belief that anyone who differs from me is wrong. And thus we shoot each other down with words. We dishonor and humiliate. And then the violent thinking transforms into violent hate crimes. Then none of us are free

One writer reminds us of the threatening nature of our hate:

"Hitler could never have risen to power had it not been for vast numbers of people who gave him that power. Although they did not share his hatred, they did not have a solid moral commitment to NOT HATE. Only a society in which there is widespread commitment to NOT HATE is safe from hatred." How can we protect our freedom, our diversity, the power that makes us strong? We cannot be so idealistic as to think we can burn away all injustice. Can't we, though, call forth the humanity within us all to respect others with whom we differ? Disagreement does not have to demean. And peace is still the password.

This coming Friday, March 27, is the deadline to submit applications for two \$200 scholarships sponsored by the WTC Faculty Association.

The primary consideration for selection will be a 300 to 500 word composition. Applicants must complete an application form also.

The essay topic is based on the institution's educational goals, which are: (1) "To provide courses for students who desire to further their education, enrich their lives, learn new skills or improve their personal efficiency; (2) "To provide programs designed to prepare individuals for employment in the business, industrial, and professional community."

Applicants are asked to write on the topic, "How does your educational experience at WTC reflect these goals?"

Students applying for the scholarships must meet the following requirements: 30 hours of credit or more; a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.25; and a full time student status.

Extracurricular or community activities may be considered in the selection process.


Finalists may also be asked to interview with a member of the Academic Affairs Committee.

Two members of the Lady Westerners basketball team have received "all conference" honors from coaching staff members of the Western Junior College Athletic Conference.




Along the way, they defeated teams from Tarrant County Junior College, Wichita State, Oklahoma Baptist, and Texas A&M.

In the first round of play at the Regional Tournament, Howard defeated Weatherford College 78-52, and South Plains downed Cisco Junior College by more than 20 points.


In its initial outing, the team from Frank Phillips was defeated by Grayson and Midland College was sent home early by McLennan.
