Pipeline repair in courtyard near complete

The large hole located in front of the Fine Arts Building in the central campus courtyard will soon be closed as repairs are near complete.

The hole was dug to repair a leaking underground water pipe, said Albert Conde, head of maintenance.


This water line is the second to spring leak in the same location during the last two years. Both involved water ines which serve the large chiller unit vhich provides both heating and coolng to campus buildings.

The first leak happened the second week of January in 1995. It involved a hot water pipe and the leak this year happened to a cold water pipe.

The leak was discovered towards the end of the summer. Repairs were delayed since the cold water line is not used until the chiller has to serve as a cooling unit, Conde said.

Maintenance workers have now repaired the leak and filled the hole with dirt but are delaying to pour asphalt on the top until the dirt has time to settle.

Conde said asphalt will be used instead of concrete as a temporary covering for the hole. The construction crew is planning to redo some of the concrete

See 'The Island of Dr. Moreau' and 'Courage Under Fire'

If you're in the mood for a weekend of H. G. Wells and his version of Science Fiction/Horror, the newly released version of "The Island of Dr. Moreau" is not a bad start. This is a strong adaptation of Well's story of a mad scientist isolated on a remote island in which Dr. Moreau (Marlon Brando) transforms jungle beasts into half-human abominations. Montgomery (Val Kilmer) is the Doctor's right-hand-man/veterinarian who helps Dr. Moreau "manage"


these unusual creatures. While off on a ship getting supplies for the island dwellers, Montgomery rescues Edward Douglas (David Thewlis) from the ocean after his own ship sinks. Montgomery decides to take Douglas to the island, and there Douglas falls in love with Dr. Moreau's daughter, Aissa (Fairuza Balk), who just hap-

pens to be half woman/half cat. Of course Douglas doesn't know

this about Aissa at first because of the serum Dr. Moreau gives her to help control the balance of her human/animal DNA. Dr. Moreau must have the blood of humans which are non "related" to the creatures he has created on his island to make this serum.

Not all of the Doctor's creations are as beautiful as Aissa, and many of these human/animals are predators by nature. Although Dr. Moreau has each of them on a strictly vegetarian diet, they want the taste of blood, and they want it now.

This isn't a bad adaptation of Well's original tale, but I prefer a couple of the original versions. Unfortunately, I haven't been able to find them here in Snyder. If



you get the opportunity, look for the 1977 version by the same name starring Burt Lancaster as the mad scientist Dr. Moreau, and the original 1933 version named "Island of Lost Souls." This version stars Charles Laughton and Bela Lugosi (the master of horror). If you really want to make a weekend of it, throw in Well's classic "War of the Worlds". pitch the popcorn in the microwave, pop open a soda, and enjoy some classic Sci-Fi/Horror.

This movie contains graphic violence and some nudity. This was an Edward Pressman Production and a John Frankenheimer Film.

"Courage Under Fire" is an candid look at the service men and women who fought in the Persian Gulf action. Lt. Colonel Nathaniel Serling (Danzel Washington) is a devoted and responsible commander of a tank battalion who mistakenly orders an attack on one of his own tanks. Sent home from the Gulf to await the verdict concerning his actions, he is assigned to an investigative committee for the posthumous candidacy of the first woman ever to be recommended for the Medal of Honor. Capt.

DILBERT ® by Scott Adams



Karen Emma Waldon (Meg Ryan) was a helicopter pilot, working on a rescue team, who was killed in action while trying to save four men pinned down by enemy troops.

As Serling begins the investigation into the death of Waldon, he interviews the four men saved by the rescue effort of the helicopter crew. Their stories seem to be in order until one man mentions that he heard firing from an M-16 which has a very distinctive sound. The other three men deny they hear the gunfire, blaming their lack of

memory on the confusion surrounding the escape, but Serling believes there is more to the story than what is being told by these men. As he investigates the hours before and after the death of Waldon, he begins to piece together the truth about what really happened to the Captain. Waldon's helicopter was a red-cross vehicle, used for rescue only. When they were ordered out on this rescue mission, a gunner named Monfriez (Lou Diamond Phillips) volunteered to accompany the rescue effort to help protect them in case of enemy fire. Joining her crew in the chopper, she accepted Monfriez offer, and he boarded along with her other crew members. Monfriez is a tough-asnails, heavily tattooed, weight-lifting soldier with an attitude as large as his biceps, and Monfriez doesn't



like taking orders from a woman. Waldon has earned the respect from her own crew members, but looses some of her authority when her orders are questioned by Monfriez. This situation is surely the epitome of the "boys locker-room." The death of Waldon creates a cloud of guilt, deception, and dishonor among those men who served under her, and it takes a man of Serlings own convictions to dig deep enough to get to the real truth behind the events surrounding this rescue and Waldon's death.

"Courage Under Fire" is a powerful movie which deals with the political maneuverings of war and the demons these men and women face when confronted with decisions they must make under extreme duress. It is an honest look at the difficult conditions that our military must live with, and in which most Americans never understand or even contemplate. This is an extraordinary film with first rate acting by Danzel Washington, Meg Ryan, and Lou Diamond Phillips, but to be fair, there are no sloppy performances in this movie.

"Courage Under Fire" is a Joseph M. Singer Production, and an Edward Zwick Film. It was written by Patrick Sheane Duncan. The executive producers were Joseph M. Caracciolo and Debra Martin Chase. This movie contains adult language and violence.



John: I'll leave that up to everyone's imagination.


