Contact hour increase equals \$600,000 jump

Pending final state approval

\$600,000 in state funding over the next two years—a funding jump linked to recent increases in student enrollment.

The final figure for state funds won't be determined until the budget process is completed by state legislators. However, Dr. Harry Krenek recently received the initial figures provided by the House Appropriation Com-

If these figures are approved, funds received from the state will increase from \$4.7 million to \$5.3 million for school years 1999-

2000 and 2000-2001. These figures show a total in-

crease of \$621,751.

The funding is directly linked WTC could receive more than to campus enrollment. This school year, WTC experienced an increase in contact hours of 13.9 percent.

In contrast, Dr. Krenek noted, the average contact hour increase for the 50 community colleges in Texas was 4.3 percent.

WTC's contact hours increased from 650,753 in 1996-97 to 741,670 in 1998-99. This equaled a total of 90,917 increased contact hours.

A state formula determines contact hours. Basically, most three-hour credit classes taken by a student equal three contact

Fu Manchu - 'Return to Earth - '91- '93'

In my opinion, Fu Manchu is a leading contender for the title of "best band you've never heard of." This San Clemente, California, based band has been around since the early 90's, and has received virtually no radio support but has managed to build quite an

underground following nonetheless.

If you can imagine the most crunchy, raw, loose, and just all around dirty sound you've ever heard, Fu Manchu are the ones to deliver it.

Their style of music, referred to by some as "frazzle rock," was pioneered by the band Kyuss. That group has since disbanded, and ironically enough, their former drummer is the current drummer employed by Fu Manchu. Since there is no more Kyuss, Fu Manchu seems to be the

leaders of the "frazzle rock" movement, which is the style being adopted by many underground bands today.

'Return to Earth - '91- '93' is a collaboration album, putting songs from the early days of Fu Manchu together on one compact disc. These songs were only previously available on vinyl, and the majority of these releases are out of print by now.

This album contains such "classics" as "El Don," "Senioritis," and "Pick-up Summer," which were anthems that helped to bring Fu Manchu onto the scene in their early days. Fans of Fu Manchu have been excited by this release because of the scarcity and rarity of these songs.

If you like what you hear, there are plenty of other Fu Manchu albums to pick up. 'No one rides for Free' and 'Daredevil' are available only through Beck's Bong Load Records, and I actually had to order these two through the mail. Their arguably best work can be found on 1996's 'In Search of....' This is the album that contains "Asphalt Risin'," one of their two semi-hits. That brings us to their most recent studio album, 'The Action is Go,' which is decent overall but can't match the quality of their three previous works. Their other semi-hit is found on this disc and entitled "Evil Eye." A new album slated for an early summer release is in the works

Their sound has been described as "school house rock meets the first four Black Sabbath albums." There is a lot of Sabbath influence to be found, but their most distinguishable quality, at least to me, is their one-of-a-kind guitar sound. If you can imagine the most crunchy, raw, loose, and just all around dirty sound you've ever heard, Fu Manchu are the ones to deliver it. This sound is probably the best on 'In Search of '

Overall, 'Return to Earth - '91 - '93' is not a mind-blowing album. It is more for the fans of Fu Manchu who are looking for their early work which is out of print, like I am doing. Still, if you're looking for a new band with a totally original sound, this album is a good place to start with Fu Manchu. There are tons of bands out there who are great but haven't and probably won't get much recognition because they don't fit into the mainstream. Fu Manchu just happens to be one of the better "undiscovered" bands out there.



AMONG GIANTS. Based on an earlier screenplay by "The Full Monty" writer Simon Beaufoy but filmed afterwards, this is as touching and likable a romantic comedy-drama as anything from Britain in some time: a real romance, about recognizable people set in a fascinating background. In the hills outside of Sheffield, the blighted English industrial city of "Monty," director Sam Miller shows us a wild bunch of modern cowboys — a team of power-line pylon painters, headed by Pete Postlethwaite - and the romantic and work crises after they welcome a female Aussie mountain climber, Rachel ("Hilary and Jackie") Griffiths, into their gang. With its gutsy humor and three-cornered May-September-May ro-

mance, "Among Giants" heartily celebrates modern independent spirits in the wastes of post-

Thatcherland. R. 3 stars. - M.W COOKIE'S FORTUNE. Robert Altman's new film, "Cookie's Fortune" — a comedy about an eccentric family in small-town Mississippi and a murder probe gone awry — is an absolute delight, one of the most sheerly pleasurable movies Altman has ever made. It's wry, jokey and sexy and, like most of Altman's best work, from "M-A-S-H" to "Short Cuts," graced with a top-notch ensemble of first-class actors — Glenn Close and Julianne Moore as dotty sisters, Patricia Neal as their raffish Aunt Cookie, Liv Tyler and Chris O'Donnell as a rebellious grand-niece and her randy deputy boyfriend and Charles S. Dutton as Cookie's faithful friend and hapless murder suspect — all seemingly having the time of their lives. PG-13. 4 stars. -- M.W

CRUELINTENTIONS. There's a "playing house" quality to this teen version of "Dangerous Liaisons," as Sarah Michelle Gellar vamps in overdrive as the fiendish Kathryn Merteuil while Ryan Phillippe glowers and pouts as heartbreaker Sebastian Valmont, who sets his sights on a sweet virgin played by Reese Witherspoon. Although first-time writer-director Roger Kumble moves the story along

briskly at first, you may eventually realize you neither care about these characters nor enjoy their scheming. With promiscuous high school culture replacing the repressed societies of "Dangerous Liaisons" and "Valmont," Kathryn and Sebastian just come across as spoiled, disaffected rich kids. Like the stylish, vacant "Jawbreaker," "Cruel Intentions" revels in its heroine's nastiness, then expects you to get charged up for her downfall. R. 2 stars. - M.C.

THE DEEP END OF THE OCEAN. This is a tale that should have touched audiences to the quick, moved them as effortlessly as many were moved by the book on which it was based:


Jacquelyn Mitchard's bestseller. But, for me at least, it doesn't. The problem may lie, partly, in the obliterating power of "Deep End's" central story. This film takes what must be a mother's worst fear — the sudden disappearance of a young child and gives it body and contour. As we watch, mother Beth Cappadora (Michelle Pfeiffer) looks away for a minute from her young child Ben (Michael Mcelroy) at a high school reunion, leaving him with his older brother. And in that instant, the child is gone. Will he be found? Will he be the same? Can she ever forgive herself? This is a movie that should have made us cry and bleed. But though it's an affecting, polished film, it's not satisfying: a nightmare that never achieves full intensity. PG-13. 2 stars. -

EDtv. Some movie actors have the gift of seeming always relaxed on screen, no matter what's going on around them - and one of the newest members of that club may be Matthew McConaughey, star of director Ron Howard's whimsical media fable "EDtv." The movie itself is a frenzied revisit to some of the notions in "The Truman Show" - about an ordinary guy, Ed, who's the hero-subject of a 24-hour-a-day (ital) cinema verite (end ital) cable TV show watched by millions. Director Ron Howard and screenwriting chums Lowell Ganz and

Babaloo Mandel turn Frisco and the rest of America into a nation of loud know-it-all, wise guy voyeurs — with a top cast that includes Woody Harrelson, Jenna Elfman, Martin Landau, Sally Kirkland, Dennis Hopper and Rob Reiner. But Ganz and Mandel ("Happy Days," "Laverne and Shirley") aren't the guys you'd expect to concoct a stinging comedy about how TV intersects with real life — because, most of the time, their idea of real life is whatever plays well on TV. The movie may be trying to sell us on the superiority of real life to TV (or movies), but like all sales pitches, we've heard it before. PG-13. 3 stars. — M.W.



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
















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Women win local rodeo

The WTC women made it almost no contest for first place at the WTC Rodeo—held in the Scurry County Coliseum April 8-10—while the men had to fight a close contest with only 60 points separating first through fourth place.

WTC cowgirl Jill Childers of Durant. Okla. also won All Around Cowgirl honors thanks to two 1st place finishes, in goat tying and in breakaway roping.

Her winnings pushed the WTC women to more than 333 points. Their closest competitor was Tarleton State with 250.

The men wound up in fourth with a total of 160 points, trailing Odessa with 185, Tarleton with 210 and, in first place, Frank Phillips College with 220.

Frank Phillips earned all of of 4.4 its points in a single event, placing the top three cowboys in calf


The WTC men earned points in bareback and saddle bronc riding; while the women placed in breakaway, goat tying and barrel racing.

The bright spot for the men was a first place finish by Wes Stevenson of Kaufman in the bareback. He had a point total of 73 in the long-go and a 78 in the short-go for an average of 151.

In the saddle bronc event, Zane Runyan of Roswell, N.M. split for 3rd/4th with an average of 138—scoring a 60 in the longgo and a 78—the highest point total of the evening—in the short-

Another WTC student, Matt Gully of Novice, teamed with a Tarleton cowboy for a 3rd place finish in team roping. The pair had times of 5.9 and 11.1 seconds for an average of 17.0 seconds.

Jill Childers' performances accounted for 225 of the WTC total of 333. Her 1st in the breakaway roping included twin times of 2.2 seconds in both the long and the short-go for an average

The Westerners Golf Team is playing today at the second qualifying tournament for the National Finals.


Going in, WTC was in sixth place for Region V and the top five teams from each region will advance to nationals.


