

An estimated 150 people met at noon on September 11 at the Western Texas College flag pole for a "Celebration of American Freedom" memorial to the victims of the terrorist attacks a year ago. Drama Instructor Ray Newton greeted the assembly and introduced Dr. Edward Barkowsky, who led a prayer to honor "those that gave their lives, those who survived, and those who dedicate their lives and labor to protect us everyday." Snyder Mayor Francene Allen Noah followed with a reading of a commemorative proclamation reinforcing American freedoms. Ray Newton preceded his Patriotic Reading with recognition of the people present representing the college, Emergency Medical Services, the Police Department, Texas Rangers, Fire Fighters, and the Sheriff's Department. He offered special recognition to John Roddy, the only living Snyder resident to have survived the bombing of Pearl Harbor. Newton referred to the aftermath of September 11, by saying, "We each remember the scenes of chaos and brutality and the acts of bravery and decency that mingled together on that fateful morning. Certainly this day, like those of the bombings of Oklahoma City and Pearl Harbor, will live in "infamy." In expressing sympathy for the victim's families, he used an altered soliloquy from MacBeth; "They were ripped untimely from the fabric of life, leaving a tear in the hearts of their family, their friends, their community, and their nation.'


