



This year, the Lone Star Brass is celebrating its twentieth season! Twenty years of performing, touring, recording, and presenting countless educational programs. The Lone Star Brass has toured extensively throughout the United States. The quintet's members are principal musicians in the Midland/ Odessa Symphony & Chorale. Members of the Lone Star Brass have performed with recognized national and international orchestras, and have performed as soloists in a variety of venues.

Committed to education, they have conducted master classes at

colleges and universities and given countless children's performances around the country.

The Lone Star Brass is frequently featured on local National Public Radio and Public Television, which includes a yearly Christmas program. Their first CD, A Lone Star Christmas, was recorded in 1999 and has almost sold out. Members of the quintet include Michael Santorelli, Jamie Kent, Carol Deats, Ted Hale, and Scott Roeder.

Michael Santorelli earned his Associates of Applied Sciences degree from Onondaga College in upstate New York. From there, he studied at the Berklee College of Music in Boston and went on to graduate from Murray State University (in Kentucky) with a Bachelor of Music Education degree. After completing his Masters in Music at the University of Louisville, Mike's extensive professional performing career included stops with the Chamber Orchestra of the Northwest of Mexico, the Autonama University Orchestra (in Mexico), and eight years with the Guadalajara Symphony Orchestra. He has been Principal Trumpet with the Midland-Odessa Symphony & Chorale for eighteen years. During this time he has also been a member of the Lone Star Brass and has frequently performed as Principal Trumpet of the Big Spring and San Angelo Symphonies. In addition to his performing career, Michael is currently the Director of Bands at Trinity School and serves as a member of the adjunct faculty at Midland College. Michael is married to Shari, an outstanding keyboardist who frequently performs with the Midland-Odessa Symphony and Chorale, among others. They have three children and live in Midland.

Jamie Kent is in his first season as Co-Principal Trumpet with the Midland-Odessa Symphony & Chorale and the Lone Star Brass. Jamie brings us extensive performing experience, including; the San Angelo Symphony, the Quad-Cities Symphony, Cedar Rapids Symphony, the Houston Masterworks Chorus, the University of Houston faculty brass quintet and the Johnson County Landmark Jazz Ensemble. He has been a featured soloist with the Cedar Rapids Municipal band and with the Rice University Symphony Orchestra. Prior to coming to Midland, Jamie earned a Bachelor of Music degree with Distinction from the University of Iowa and a Master of Music degree from Rice University in Houston, TX. This is Scott Roeder's first season with the Lone Star Brass and the Midland-Odessa Symphony & Chorale. Prior to this, Scott taught music theory at the University of Akron as a graduate assistant. While in Ohio, Scott performed with the Canton Symphony, Summit Choral Society, and the Joe Wendel Orchestra. He was also the low brass instructor for Jackson Township Public Schools. Scott has also taught and performed at the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp and Sewanee Summer Music Festival. As a soloist, Scott has presented guest recitals in Ohio and Illinois. He has also competed in the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium and Tuba Conference in Regina, Saskatchewan. Scott earned Bachelors degree in Music Education from the University of Illinois and a Masters degree in performance from the University of Akron. In addition to his performing duties for the Symphony and Lone Star Brass, Scott maintains a tuba/ euphonium studio in both Midland and Odessa.
