## GLT Students Attend Compost Seminar


A very useful and informative seminar on the use of compost was given to GLT students on Wednesday, February 19. Presenters were Brian Noble and Scott McCoy from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ).

The seminar, arranged by Instructor Sam Fare, was presented to all the students in the Golf and Landscape Technology program. "The information presented by these gentlemen was very timely for our students," explained Fare, "Compost has some real benefits for anyone going into the landscape or golf course management business."

William Tinkler, president of the student chapter of the Golf Course Superintendent's Association of America (GCSAA), said that he was impressed with the presentation. "We learned that compost has amazing properties in improving the soil and fertility," Tinkler said. "They showed some turf research with compost top-dressing, and the differences in the composted plots versus the control plots were amazing. It makes me think about incorporating this material into a turf management program."

Scott McCoy gave a presentation that emphasized the relationship between the use of compost and water requirements. "He showed us a slide of two lawns side by side," explained Dwayne Robertson, "and even without additional water the composted lawn was green, while the other lawn was brown. I didn't realize that the comparison would be that dramatic."

Randy Weaver, GLT instructor and campus Golf Course Superintendent, added, "They showed us a lot of ways compost could improve a golf course. They even had a great demonstration on the use of compost for erosion control and grass establishment. I think the students got a lot of good information from this seminar.
