## Business sign space to be offered at new Ballfield Complex

As you may know, WTC is in the process of constructing a baseball/softball complex on campus for our newly installed athletic programs.

The fields are scheduled to be completed this fall, and will be ready for college games, college and high school tournaments, playoff games, and college

intramurals. Once the outfield fences are completed, the college plans to place 4'x8' signs along the wall and offer the space to local and area businesses who would like to advertise their services while supporting the college

business name and support of the college will be seen by everyone who visits the WTC campus. With over 100 people at each

game, many from out of town, and more than 80 scheduled games on the fields each year, the signs offer a great way to promote your business. And since the ballfields are located near the main college entrance, your business name and support of the college will be seen by everyone who visits the WTC campus. The signs will be similar to those in place at Moffett and Cates fields and will be designed and constructed by Snyder Sign Company.

The initial cost will be \$225 to \$275 for the sign, depending on where it is placed, and \$100 to \$150 per year for the space after the first year. Individuals and businesses may purchase a sign on either the baseball or softball field fence or one for each field. We're looking forward to another record year at WTC, with a lot of excitement generated by having our teams playing here on our campus. #### WTC receives Federal Upward Bound Grant

Western Texas College has another success story to share with its service community. Last year, the college received a Federal TRiO grant called the Talent Search grant, giving WTC \$190,000 a year to service the students in area communities. Talent Search is designed to identify and assist students from disadvantaged backgrounds who have the potential to succeed in higher education.

One of its main goals is to begin with sixth grade students and follow

them through high school with study skills enhancement, exposure to higher education, information on financial aid, and mentoring programs. This grant reaches between 500 and 600 students in our service area.

The new grant the college will be enabling this next year, Upward Bound, has been designed to capitalize on the foundation of information gathered through the Talent Search and focus fundamental support on students who have completed the 8th grade but not yet entered the 12th grade. WTC has been given \$220,000 a year for the next four years to accomplish this goal.

Students will be chosen through a criteria provided by the Federal government, specifically aimed at serving students from low-income families and students from families in which neither parent holds a bachelors degree. Sixty students will be chosen from Mitchell, Scurry, Garza, Fisher, and Nolan counties for each of the next four years to help in-

crease enrollment and success rates in postsecondary education.

Upward Bound projects provide instruction in math, science, composition, literature, and foreign language. Students chosen for the program will receive academic, financial, and personal counseling to help reach their goals, assistance in preparing for college entrance examinations, and assistance in completion of financial aid applications.

Students who apply for this program must have a need for academic support services provided through the project in order to finish secondary school and undertake a program of postsecondary education.

The WTC Upward Bound program lists seven objectives to implement its role in the service area and help local students progress. In order to empower the participants in attaining academic skill, knowledge, motivation, and encouragement for secondary school completion and success in postsecondary education, Western Texas College intends

1. identify and select qualified participants

2. raise grade point averages through skills improvement 3. raise standardized testing outcomes through skills im-

4. increase retention of participants through high school

5. establish a College Bridge program through exposure to the college environment

6. encourage, assist, and maintain contact through the postsecondary enrollment process, and

7. follow the progress of participants for six years following postsecondary enrollment.

These objectives are designed specifically for the West Texas area, and particularly for the service region for Western Texas College. In our service area, 39% of all families are low-income, 26.5% live at or below national poverty levels, almost 90% of adults do not have a bachelors degree, more than one third do not have a high school diploma, and high school drop out rates have exceeded over 53% in some of the schools in the ten county region.

Since WTC opened its doors in 1969, it has operated with a sense of responsibility toward the people of West Texas who turn to the college for higher education and workforce training. The TRiO grants have given the college another avenue of approach in attaining its fundamental purpose of the improvement of the individual and the enhancement of the community.

We are excited to have the opportunity, once again, to bring assistance to students in our region. The college will be advertising and hiring three or four new employees to drive this project, and we are anxious to begin seeing the results that help our community and its families.

Web dialers are small - usually less than 100 KB that Trojans, viruses, worms and other malicious programs are — specifically, via e-mail attachments, inside downloaded software, etc.

The following is a short tutorial on the effective use of search engines. According to recent Nielsen ratings, the top search engine is GOOGLE (www.google.com). The study is found at: http://searchenginewatch.com/reports/article.php/2156451

Google has some neat features - such as the ability to search for images and news. It is fast and usually accurate - it is my personal favorite.

Here are some effective ways to search for information:

**RETURNS PAGES CONTAINING** A SEARCH FOR

ruby slippers "ruby slippers" +ruby slippers

+ruby +slippers

ruby and/or slippers, preferring pages with the phrase ruby slippers the word ruby next to the word slippers - looks for the exact phrase

both ruby and slippers in the document, although not necessarily next to

The word AND can be used instead of +, as in ruby and slippers

The word OR can be used if looking for one of two words, as in ruby or slippers NOT can be used to exclude terms, as in ruby not slippers (would find pages with ruby and exclude those with slippers)

If you don't find what you like in one search engine, then use another.

Some, such as www.metacrawler.com, will use several search engines and compile the results for you.
