UTPB Education Dean **Scheduled to Visit Campus**

Dr. Pete Ienatsch, Dean of the School of Education at the University of the Permian Basin (UTPB), will be on the WTC campus, Tuesday, August 19th, from 9:30AM until 4PM, to visit with individuals interested in teacher certification programs at UTPB.

If you are planning on taking coursework with UTPB this fall, you need to make application as soon as possible. The information below provides a brief synopsis of the course offerings, as well as UTPB application information.

Area residents will have the opportunity this Fall 2003 semester to pursue Teacher Certification Programs in Snyder as the result of a partnership between Western Texas College and the University of Texas of the Permian Basin (UTPB). This fall, UTPB will offer the teacher education core courses, which satisfy introductory requirements for those wishing to teach elementary grades up to Grade 4 and those wishing to teach Grades 8-12.

The concept behind the joint effort would allow individuals to stay in Snyder while earning their bachelor's degree and teacher certification. While it may not be possible to complete 100% of the necessary coursework in Snyder, a significant amount could be available making the pursuit of the degree attractive. Junior and Senior level coursework and education classes will be provided by UTPB. Planned course delivery from UTPB to Snyder this fall will be via interactive television (ITV).

Proposed teacher certification fields will include "Early Childhood – Grade 4" and "Secondary Certification – Grades 8-12". Undergraduates in UTPB's teacher education program earn their bachelor's degree in an approved area while fulfilling certification requirements. Students typically complete a multidisciplinary major or an academic major and supporting minor, and will consult with faculty members in Education and the academic discipline for help in planning a program. Students who already hold a Bachelor's degree may be eligible to pursue Post-Baccalaureate certification.



On both the granite markers and bricks, there is only one character (letter, number, space) is allowed per block. Leave a space between names, and before and after "&". Limit one name per brick (except for husband and wife or names of children). Minor changes may be required to conform to engraver limitations and standardization procedures. Numbers are looking good for fall

Obviously, it is hard to predict what will happen for the Fall 2003 semester. On the one side, it seems that we will probably have an enrollment increase BUT the students aren't here yet - so, we have to wait until the 4th class day. Something about not counting your chickens before

However, here are some indications:

1. Student inquiries to admissions is greater than it was last year

2. Pre-registration is proceeding at a brisk pace 3. The DL schedule is filling up

Here is some more information about the DL schedule. We are currently (I say 'currently' because this schedule will probably change, maybe within the next few minutes) scheduled to teach 17 MWF, 9 TTh and 9 night classes (a total of 35 ITV classes). We are going to 30 high schools with these dual credit classes. Contrast this with the 28 high schools that we sent classes to in the Fall 2002 semester. Basically, a 7% increase in the number of schools. In addition, we are sending a college level class to TSTC and receiving classes from UTPB and ACU.

We added some new high schools this year - Comstock and Sonora. And, schools are still signing up for classes. Education and higher level Criminal Justice courses are coming in from UTPB.

Those are the classes that involve the ITV equipment on the WTC campus. We are also using the Borden County classroom to beam into Region 17 and using the ITV classroom at Northeast Elementary as a 5th ITV classroom because the maximum of 4 ITV classrooms are already

In TI#49, I predicted that we would reach 655 dual credit students in the Spring 2003 semester. Dual credit is given when a high school student gets both college and high school credit for taking a college course. The courses can be delivered via ITV, tape or face-to-face.

We did not reach the 655. So, in TI#64, I predicted that we would reach 655 in the Fall 2003 semester. To me, it looks like we will reach that prediction. Hopefully, right after Labor Day, I can tell you "I told you so". (If not, then I'll predict the same number for the Spring semester - one day, we will get there....)
