



YOU MIGHT SAVE YOUR OWN LIFE:

As a nation we continue to make records and set new highs in many statistical fields.

Along the improved highways of the country we take pride in the modern automobiles that speed us along to where we are going. Sometimes the end is death, or at least for about one hundred persons every day of the year in this land of enlightenment and chance taking.

Figures released by the National Safety Coun-cil reveal that January, of this year, set an all-time high in the number of riders and pedestrians killed by automobiles. Exactly 3,050 reported fatalities put the month 200 deaths ahead of the former record, set in January, 1934.

The death list can be reduced. The fact has been established wherever officials, backed by public opinion, relentlessly pursue safety programs.

NEW DRIVER'S LAW

A great deal of thought is now being given to careful driving by the state department and efforts are being made as nearly as possible to make the highways safer for travel. This has been urged for the past few years, but active steps are now in the formation to complete the work.

The new law will require that everyone take a test as to their ability to drive a car. This will embrace eye sight, quick action and thinking, and a number of other things that will be taken into consideration. One thing especially that should be put in the law is drinking. The man or woman who drinks should not be issued a license at all, for there are more wrecks caused from this one thing

alone than any other. The number of accidents and deaths taking place each day in this and all other states is something appalling. A person who can not drive in a sane manner, and think quickly enough to take care of an ordinary situation, should not be allowed behind the steering wheel of a fast moving automobile. It would be bad enough if they were just endangering their own lives, but they are endanger ing the lives of other people who are on the highways -Paducah Post.

The farmer has not been the only sinner in this short staple business. Somehow the market have not favored the man who raised a good grade. Buyers for the state or a county have had the habit of lumping the whole community together under one classification, and the man who produced a really good staple received very little more for his trouble than the one who raised Half and Half. If that condition can be corrected, it ought not to be hard to convince the producer that it is to his best interests to raise a better grade. Whenever that is done it is going to eliminate a part of the handicaps under which the cotton farmer has been laboring for the past several years.

What we know of as "The Lord's Prayer," was a model prayer given by the Master to his disciples and might more correct ly be called "The Disciples' Pray-The prayer of Jesus as recorded by John in Chapter 17, is in fact "The Lord's Prayer."

Jesus opens his prayer with ords concerning himself, verses 1.5. He has finished the task which his Father had assigned him, asking God to "glorify" him in order that God himself might be glorified. Everything which Christ did on earth had the ultimate purpose in view of "glorifying" the Father. How well might we adopt the same aim! Such an aim would certainly inspire us to greater service in his name and would also cause us to consider more thoughtfully our actions each day.

The situation confronting the cotton growers in this section, a condition brought about by the extreme dry and drouthy conditions prevailing during last summer, has impressed the entire cotton fraternity, including ginners, farmers, and bankers with the necessity of getting high-class planting seed for the coming crop. This action is being stimulated all over the territory, by those who realize something must be done, or else a poor prospect is in view for a good cotton market during the 1937 cotton harvesting season.

The seed now being used in this section, according to tests that have been made, show an extremely low germination, and the fact that cotton will germinate does not mean that it will produce a healthy stock of cotton.

In order to increase the yield per acre, and the staple of cotton, the HASKELL territory is going to be forced to introduce better grade planting seed from sections that were blest with more generous rainfall.

Cotton is a dry weather plant and will stand more heat than most any other commodity, yet a certain amount of rainfall is essential to its proper maturity.

The gins and allied business men affected by the cotton industry are alive to the seed needs of this territory, and are making a united effort to encourage better planting seed, and a cottonseed that will produce a more salable staple and yet make a lint out-turn of a satisfactory nature. The farmers themselves, realize that in a majority of instances they are going to have to sacrifice their old seed, and purchase others.

It is a fact recognized by the cotton dealers, that during the past year, fewer outside cotton buyers were attracted to this immediate section than during any former year. The absence of these representatives of shippers made it more difficult to get a good price for the cotton, and this loss was the more keenly felt by the cotton raisers.

Haskell County can produce superior cotton whereas there are many sections in Texas as well as in other parts of the world where only short staple cotton can be produced.

Why then should we try to compete with the lowest type and cheap labor when we can produce the type of cotton that spinners are ever seeking.


