### Tonn Had First Real Experience as Auto Mechanic On "One-Lung" Liberty Brush

No, Tillie you're mistaken. Dixie Flyer, Flanders, Halladay Forty, White Steamer, Stanley, Rambler and Moon are not the names of race horses that ran on the Central West Texas track, neither is "EMF Thirty" or "N-R-S" brands of patent medicines that can be found on the shelves of local drug stores.

All are names of automobiles that grandpa and grandma considered the very latest in transportation for the upper-crust of polite society. Very few men and women today remember when autos of the above makes were being used, but Eugene Tonn, shop foreman for the Reeves-Burton Motor Company can name them over almost in the order in which they made their appearance on the American market. He began his training as an auto mechanic back in 1911 when a small boy, working overtime in a repair shop at night while holding down a job as printer on a small town newspaper.

In those early days most of the tools he used were hand forged by Tonn or his father and Tonn still has a few of them on hand. If you are interested, Tonn will be glad to exhibit them. Today's shop equipment is just as modern as the new Dodge-Plymouth in comparison with the old makes of cars named above, he says.

Tonn relates that his first valve grinding job was on a "Liberty Brush" a one "lunger" and he was exactly 6 hours grinding the one cylinder, using a grinding compound he made himself out of glass, emory dust and water, and to his surprise it actually "got the job done."

After six years of training as an automobile mechanic in Kirkland, Knox City and Haskell he

He played two seasons with the celebrated Italian conductor, making one tour abroad and holding down a solo cornet assignment. "Later he served in the 124th Field Artillery band overseas, and when the big slaughter was terminated, Meacham was ready to settle down and enjoy tranquility. He taught music at the Oakland Music Hall in Chicago until 1923 and then came to Texas. "Instructor and municipal band leader in Haskell the past 10 years, Meacham, after 38 years of music, lauds national band contests as one of the greatest movements in the development of good citizenship and music. "Under his tutoring, the Haskell band won in first year bands at Abilene in 1930. Organized instrumental music in the school was abandoned for several years, but now the movement is going momentum again. "Four members of his orchestra possess more than average talent, he believes, and will make some college or university good material. Joe Maples Jr., 15, played Clark's "Bride of the Waves" yesterday morning at the opening of the contests. The other solo entries were Riley James Face, on clarinet, Jim Bob Webb, trombone, and Paul Kuenstler, baritone."
