### Annual Education Bill Is Two Billion

Education of their children costs parents in the United States 2 billion dollars annually. They support a 10-billion-dollar educational plant. They make it possible for a million and a half American young persons to attend college, compared with 50,000 not many years ago. Over three-quarters of all children now get to school.

"Are the results worth the price?" That's the question Dr. Henry C. Link, psychologist and author, asks after presenting the above figures, in the current Rotarian Magazine.

"The free education which parents so often force on their children," says Dr. Link, "may be a source of more than good. The ideal education program would be one in which all children, rich and poor, had to work to pay at least part of their expenses, especially during the summer months. Some colleges already follow this plan, with very satisfactory results.

"In the absence of the ideal program, parents can make further education of their college student contingent upon his getting a job during the summer, doing some paying work at school, or, at least, keeping his expenses to an absolute minimum. If a student has time for nothing but his studies, and even so finds college work difficult, then probably he would do better to get a job.

"The longer a young person postpones the getting of a job, the less likely he is to find it, or the less fit he may be for it when he does find it. This is a matter of personality, not economics, not, as we are often told, the reverse."

### Texas Will Seek Two Super Roads

Texas highway department forces will endeavor to get both an east-west and north-south super-highway planned by the federal government, Highway Engineer Julian Montgomery announced at Austin Monday.

The federal highway act directs a report be made to congress not later than Feb. 1, 1939 on feasibility of building six such trans-national routes. Feasibility of establishing them as toll routes to pay initial cost also is to be reported upon.

"The investigation will no doubt include Texas on at least one east-west route and on one north-south route," Montgomery

**Methods Frowned On**

Summarizing, the magazine states its investigation disclosed:

"1. The president's objectives are popular, the president more so, but his methods are not popular at all.

"2. Although the nation approves of Roosevelt, it believes he has too much power in his own hands.

"3. Without giving him more power, the nation hopes the next congress will work more closely with him.

"4. Although the New Deal commits us to federal centralization, states' rites lingers on.

"5. The depression has marched on, reached every class and place; but better times may come soon.

"6. Hardly anyone believes that the general situation would improve if labor took a wage cut.

"7. Every division of the public lands firm against government ownership of railroads.

"8. The ino-Japanese war is more shocking than seizure of Austria, and we don't want refugees here."

Remarking that no single group, however, conservative, dislikes the Roosevelt rearmament and international policies, Fortune says:

"These (answers) give the lie to the image of a nation dotted with knots of diehards hating Roosevelt with a whole-souled hatred, finding in him nothing but evil and passing the time of day swapping 'Wall Street stories.' The sharp mass cleavage on Roosevelt seems to be confined to his methods and policies of internal economy."

### FDR Still Has Public Support Magazine Finds

WASHINGTON. — President Roosevelt has a comfortable surplus of popular support to carry him through "his depression," the Fortune magazine quarterly survey reported recently in a compilation of graphs and tables reflecting a national sampling of American thought. However, evidence was presented that Mr. Roosevelt's methods and political associates and advisers are unpopular.

The survey states that Mr. Roosevelt and his policies are most popular geographically in the southwest and southeastern states; most widely supported among economic level by negroes and the poor; most uniformly endorsed among occupations by farm laborers, factory laborers and miscellaneous laborers.

The northeast and northwest (plains states) alone among areas showed majorities, although small, in disapproval of Mr. Roosevelt in general.

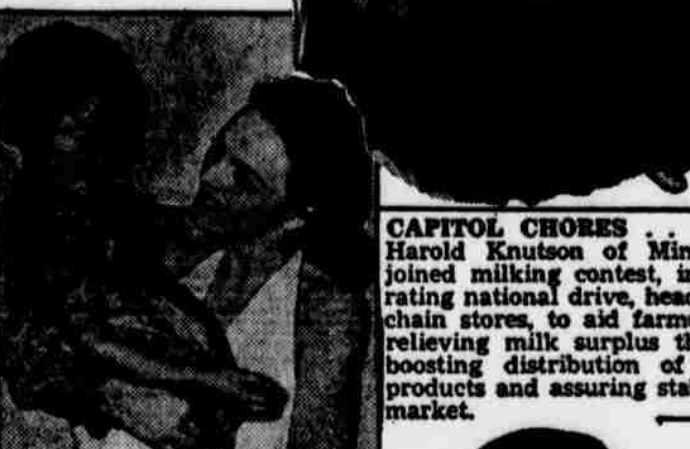

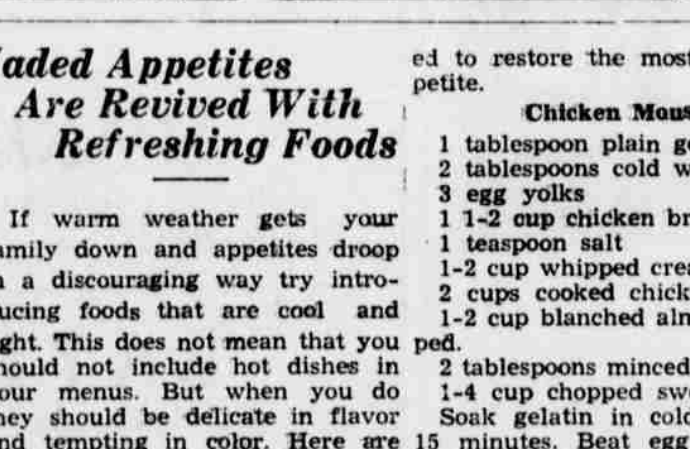

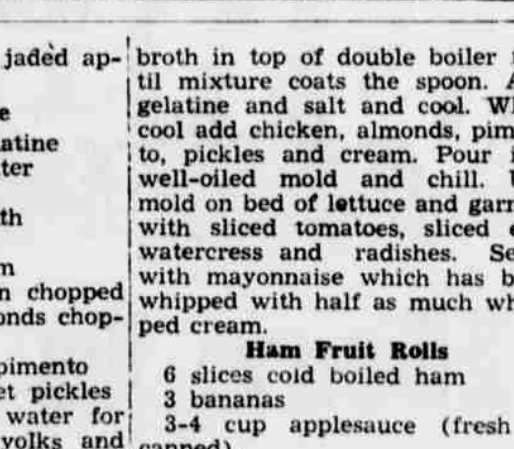

## Strip Crops are Aid to Terraces But Not Substitutes; Three Kinds of Strip Slopes

It has been remarked that there are many fields terraced which should have been strip cropped. That is true; but it also is true that there are many fields strip cropped which should have been terraced. To know when to use terraces, when to use strip crops, and when to use both, requires an understanding of these two methods of erosion control.

Strip crops are useful on gentle slopes to slow up the movement of rain water flowing downhill and make it drop most of its soil. For this reason strip crops are sometimes called filter crops. Such slopes are technically known to soil conservationists as "A" slopes, and in most parts of the Southwest they include land with a fall of not over three feet to the hundred. If strip crops are planted on land steeper than three feet to the hundred ("B" slopes), they will not work satisfactorily, because the impact of the water rushing downhill is greater than they can withstand.

That much is basic, and is observed by all erosion control workers who make any pretense of being scientific. But there is another important thing determining the effectiveness of strip crops that is often overlooked. Strips will not work satisfactorily on gullied land, even though the fall is only two feet to the hundred. A strip depends for its effectiveness on keeping water spread. If gullies cause water to concentrate, strips cannot filter the soil from it as the water passes.

To begin with, a strip of oats, wheat or other close-growing vegetation, especially when young, is not equal to the strain of holding a stream of water in check. In addition, gullies have little or no soil on their bottoms in which strip crops can grow. When strip crops are planted on gullied land, the result is they are weakest right where they are needed most. Sometimes the small-grain or other strip crop will not germinate in the gully at all. In other cases, it germinates and grows feebly, but is swept out by the first heavy rain after planting.

**Wide Water Channels Best**

If strip crops are planted on land that is slightly gullied, the gullies should be plowed in and flattened before the land is bedded. Wide water channels wash much less than narrow ones carrying the same amount of water. This plowing in also supplies the seed on the gully bottoms with something to grow in, and, above and below the strip, causes the beds to be higher where they cross the gully and thus to retain heavier rains before breaking.

Terraces are useful on moderate to rolling slopes, and should be backed up with strip crops. This combination is most effective when the strips are placed midway between the terraces, but rotation should be practiced. On moderately steep "C" slopes terraces are not effective. Such slopes should be kept, partly or wholly under a continuous cover of close-growing vegetation. Only terraces (or a constant cover of vegetation) can check erosion on land already gullied.

Strip crops are such a new device that we do not have any Bentley's rule to regulate their spacing, as we do with terraces. In general, strip crops on "A" slopes should be about 100 feet from center to center. They should not be less than twelve feet wide at their narrowest points, and should be wide enough elsewhere to cover most, if not all, of the point rows. On "A" slopes, strip crops should cover about 25 per cent of the field; on "B" slopes about 35 per cent, and on "C" slopes 50 to 10 per cent. This is true whether terraces are used with them on the "B" and "C" slopes or not.

**Temporary Strip Crops**

Strip crops may be temporary or permanent. Temporary strips

entirely by widening one or both adjacent strips to include them.

**When to Lay Off Lines**

The season following grain harvest is the best time to lay off strip-crop lines on land which has been in grain. Late winter is the best time to lay off strips on land that was planted to cotton or corn. Stakes may be set on the whole farm after crops are laid by and the land breaking or bedding done piecemeal as the land is cleared. In this way the lines will run straight over the farm, even though part of them may have fall oats or wheat on them, and the remainder has spring-sown grain.

It is difficult to find an ideal time to do terracing. Summer is the best time to do the work, but the land usually is then covered by crops. A solution of this is to lay off the terrace lines on the desired grade this summer and stake them permanently. As quickly as possible after crops are removed, small grain may be planted on spaces allotted to terraces. When this grain comes off next summer, the land will be open for running of terraces. Care should be taken to make these strips wide enough for a tractor to operate. If a terrace eighteen feet wide is desired, at least a twenty-four-foot space should be left open, and so on.

Strip crops do no harm, even though poorly designed, and though they appear to injure gullied land. Let's use them where they are needed, and terraces where they are needed.

### Jaded Appetites Are Revived With Refreshing Foods

If warm weather gets your family down and appetites drop in a discouraging way try introducing foods that are cool and light. This does not mean that you should not include hot dishes in your menus. But when you do they should be delicate in flavor and tempting in color. Here are some summer "specials" calculated to restore the most jaded appetite.

- Chicken Mousse**
- 1 tablespoon plain gelatine
  - 2 tablespoons cold water
  - 3 egg yolks
  - 1-2 cup chicken broth
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1-2 cup whipped cream
  - 2 cups cooked chicken chopped
  - 1-2 cup blanched almonds chopped.
- 2 tablespoons minced pimento  
1-4 cup chopped sweet pickles  
Soak gelatin in cold water for 15 minutes. Beat egg yolks and add chicken broth. Cook yolks and

broth in top of double boiler until mixture coats the spoon. Add gelatine and salt and cool. When cool add chicken, almonds, pimento, pickles and cream. Pour into well-oiled mold and chill. Unmold on bed of lettuce and garnish with sliced tomatoes, sliced egg, watercress and radishes. Serve with mayonnaise which has been whipped with half as much whipped cream.

**Ham Fruit Rolls**

6 slices cold boiled ham  
3 bananas  
3-4 cup applesauce (fresh or canned).  
Melted butter  
Lay ham slices on flat surface. Peel bananas and cut in half. Spread ham with applesauce. Lay bananas on ham slices and roll up, fastening with toothpicks. Place on a broiler pan and broil thirty minutes under a moderate broiler flame.

**Ginger Fruit Salad**

1 package lime gelatine  
1 cup hot water  
1 cup ginger ale  
1 cup grapefruit sections  
1 cup fresh or canned oxbheart cherries  
Lettuce  
Mayonnaise  
Pour hot water over gelatine and stir until dissolved. Cool. Add ginger ale. Chill until slightly thickened. Fold in fruit and pour into a ring mold. Chill until firm. Unmold and garnish with whole cherries and mayonnaise.

**Pineapple and Strawberry Salad**

Combine pineapple (one small fresh pineapple peeled and cut in cubes) with 1-2 cups strawberries. Both well chilled. Arrange on lettuce leaves or leaves of romaine and serve with a French dressing made of 1-2 cup olive oil, 1-4 cup cider vinegar mixed with 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon sugar and a dash of paprika.

**Layer Cake Salad**

**Tomato Layer:**

- 2 tablespoons gelatine
- 3 cups tomato juice
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Few grains pepper
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon onion juice

Melt gelatine in hot tomato juice add other ingredients and pour in oiled mold. When set add second layer.

**Cucumber Layer:**

- 1 pkg. lemon-flavored gelatine
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 3 tablespoons green pepper chopped
- 5 tablespoons chopped cucumber

Make gelatine according to directions.
