City's building boom continues

The 1980 Midland boom was a gusher, gauging by the amount of building permits issued by the city.

Those permits reflected almost \$139 dustrial and residential construction in 1980.

The total of \$138,970,674 is a 47 percent increase over the \$94,353,133 in new construction announced in 1979. The comparable figure for 1978 was \$86.9 million, and for 1977, \$62.4 mil-

"It's pheonomenal; it's hard to imagine," Midland Mayor G. Thane Akins said of the Tail City's 1980 growth. "We don't see any end to it.

1981 will probably be even greater." Much of Midland's 1980 burgeoning prosperity has been in downtown office building expansion, such as the 12-story Paragon building, which utilimately may cost as much as \$100 million; office and other commercial developments in northern and western Midland, and the booming housing industry in urban and rural Midland County

coming from," Akins said of the influx of new residents. But he speculated that the oil-and-gas industry expansion is "bound to be the greater

The mayor alluded to problems, such as traffic and traffic related challenges and housing associated with relatively rapid urban growth.

"It's the nice kind of problems to have," he said.

Indicative of Midland's exploding growth is the planned \$1.2 million Midland Christian School at 2001 Culver St. The building permit for that expansion was issued this week by the city's Building Inspections De-

The mayor attributed much of the growth to the expansion of existing businesses and industries in Midland.

"I'm sure people (major oil companies) are expanding. I know our company is." Akins is an executive with Atlantic Richfield Co.'s Arco Oil and Gas Division.

"If we get decontrol (under President-elect Ronald Reagan's Republican administration). I can see some of this (boom) just continue to esca-

Midland bank deposits again reach record

Midland's total bank deposits and loans for the final quarter of 1980 once again hit an all-time record high with an average 20 percent increase in deposits over the third quarter and an average 10 percent increase in loans over that same period.

For the period from Oct. 1 through Dec. 31, Midland banks totaled \$1,544,-

034,704 in deposits. The figure represents an increase of 33 percent over the total for the same period last year when the figure was \$1,021,101,-573. At the end of the third banking quarter, the total deposit figure was \$1 228 407 048

Loans and discounts for the same period were also up, with \$007,562,630 recorded in loans from the six banks. Slightly less than \$1 billion, the figure is 31 percent above the loan total during the fourth quarter of 1979, when the figure was \$675,150,575. As of Sept. 30, the total loans in Midland amounted to \$879,465,632.

First National Bank again led the six institutions with the highest deposit figure and the highest loan amount. For the first time in its history, First National topped the \$1 billion mark in deposits with a total \$1,042,803,361. The new figure represents a 21 percent increase over the \$815,800,176 in deposits marked at the end of the third quarter. However, the current quarter end figure is an outstanding 37 percent above First National's total for the same period last year when the amount was \$656,873,064.

Loans and discounts at First National rose 10 percent over that of the third quarter to bring the total to \$716,863,870. The figure as of Sept. 30 was \$641,916,342. The fourth quarter tally was 35 percent above the 1979 fourth quarter total of \$459,469,236.

Midland National Bank kept pace with \$339,970,584 in deposits for the fourth quarter of 1980. That total was 17 percent above that of the rourth quarter of 1980. That total was 17 percent above that of the previous quarter and 28 percent above the total for the same period during 1979. Total deposits at the end of September were \$279,801,000, compared with the fourth quarter 1979 total of \$241,497,437.

Midland National's loans and discounts tallied \$180,147,282, showing an 11 percent increase over the third quarter's \$159,421,000 in loans. The current figure is 17 percent above the 1979 figure of \$147,997,006.

Commercial Bank & Trust showed a solid 20 percent growth in deposits over the previous quarter as well as last year with \$60,823,766. The total is a full fifth more than the \$79,575,541 recorded at the end of September and the \$79,240,013 marked at the 1979 fourth quarter deposit total

Loans and discounts at Commercial Bank & Trust also showed a strong increase to \$65,567,384, representing a 14 percent jump over last quarter's \$56,313,533 and a 24 percent increase over the end of the year 1979 total of

Western State Bank's total deposits placed an even 12 percent above the mark set at the end of September and last year's total, with \$25,240,550. The figure exceeded the \$22,038,161 recorded in the previous quarter and the \$22,034,534 recorded during the fourth quarter of 1979.

Western State's loans and discounts showed a minor 6 percent increase over last quarter's \$12,222,900 with a total \$13,007,815. The new figure is 8 percent above last year's final quarter calculation of \$11,963,700.

Metro Bank's total deposits of \$10,046,063 showed the greatest increase over last year's figures with a 46 percent jump over the \$5,378,477. The new figure was 17 percent greater than the third quarter's total \$8,251,057. Loans and discounts at Metro tallied \$7,828,750 this quarter, which again showed the greatest increase over the previous year's total of \$3,-473,589 by some 55 percent. The new total loan figure is 27 percent above last quarter's \$5,701,406 total.

Texas National Bank held its ground with \$26,049,826 in total deposits, which represents a 12 percent increase over the previous quarter's \$22,842,113. The new deposit figure is 38 percent greater than the figure for the same period in 1979 when the amount was \$16,078,028.

Loans and discounts at Texas National showed only a 4 percent increase over the previous quarter's \$3,890,353 to bring the total to \$4,057,-526. The figure was some 39 percent greater than the previous year's final

Economy seems to be 'holding up'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Factory orders and new construction increased modestly in November, the government said Friday, offering further evidence that the economy is holding up despite record-high inter-The economy's strength has surprised many forecasters who had

been predicting a downturn, if not another recession. They now foresee a weakening in the first half of 1981, but not the sharp decline once November's 1 percent rise in factory orders to a seasonally adjusted

\$159.6 billion does mark a continued slowdown in the rate of increase. Orders for manufactured goods had climbed 1.8 percent in October and 5.5 percent in September.

In addition, steel orders were down \$200 million, or 2.3 percent, to \$7 billion in November, following five consecutive monthly increases of 10 percent or more, the department said. Shipments of manufactured good also rose in November - 1.1 percent

to a seasonally adjusted \$158.4 billion, but this was less than October's 2.6 percent increase and September's 4.2 percent jump, the department With November's increase in both orders and shipments, the important inventory-to-sales ratio continued to improve last month, the department

said. It stood at 1.54 in November, compared with 1.55 in October, 1.60 in September and 1.66 in August. When inventories get too high because of waning sales, manufacturers are forced to cut production, and this could lead to layoffs. Such cutbacks are even more likely when interest rates are very high, because pro-

ducers don't want to finance their inventories. William Cox, the Commerce Department's deputy chief economist. said the economy "has a certain vitality." At the same time, he noted that it is "tapering down, as must be expected."

"The fact we have had surprisingly rapid growth in the third and fourth quarters (of 1980) is pushing against monetary restraint and is now creating fairly formidable pressure against continued growth," he added. In another report Friday, the Commerce Department said the value of new construction rose 2.5 percent in November to a seasonally adjusted

annual rate of \$231.8 billion, after increasing 1.1 percent the month be-Even after adjusting for inflation, new construction increased 1.5 percent to a seasonally adjusted \$101.4 billion, the department said.

Until October, "construction put in place" had declined for six consecutive months, reflecting last spring's recession and the imposition of temporary credit controls to fight inflation.

For the year so far, new construction has gone up slower than in 1979, the department added.

Following are highlights of the Commerce reports:

New orders for durable goods increased 1.3 percent last month to a seasonally adjusted \$81.8 billion, after rising 2.2 percent the month before. The biggest improvement last month was in the transportation sector, due primarily to aircraft activity.

-New orders for non-durable goods rose 0.7 percent to a seasonally adsted \$77.9 billion, following a 1.4 percent increase in October.

Radio commentary 'conciliatory'

BEIRUT, Leb-**DAY 426** anon (AP) - A Tehran Radio commentary took a conciliatory tone Friday on negotiations for release of the 52 American hostages as Algerian diplomats arrived in Tehran with the U.S. reply to Iranian

demands for \$24 billion to free the

captives. Three Algerian envoys, intermediaries in the negotiations, were greeted at Tehran airport by aides to Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai and went to meet Iranian officials

They declined to talk to reporters.

In Washington, informed sources said the U.S. reply contained an offer to deposit about half the money Iran has demanded in an escrow account in a neutral country so that Iran could claim the money once the hostages were released.

Officials in Washington said Iran had been told that Jan. 16 - four days before Inauguration Day - is the last practical day for reaching a settlement during President Carter's term.

There was no official Iranian response to the new American proposals, and unofficial comments have sent conflicting signals on whether Iran was willing to compromise on release of the hostages, spending their 426th day in captivity Friday.

The commentary broadcast by Tehran Radio indirectly praised President Carter's administration for restraint, contrasting it with sharp criticism of Iran by President-elect Ronald Reagan.

Reagan labeled Iranian militants "barbarians" and "kidnappers" for holding the Americans since Nov. 4,

The broadcast said the U.S. government was prepared to turn over \$6 billion to Algerian banks to cover Iranian demands and "because of this the (Western) news agencies called this the week of ending the hostage

Another Tehran Radio commentary that followed a news broadcast late Friday apparently was cut short, with the station switching to its sign-off

That commentary referred to two earlier U.S. messages as examples of "the filthy and devious nature of the U.S. government," but added, "If we study the texts ... we clearly see that the U.S.A. implicitly accepted all the terms set for the release of the hostages and produced the U.S. president's signature as a guarantee of the implementation of Iran's demands."

The commentary then stated: "However, in Iran's latest reply, made public by the government last week, we only saw two points, neither of them new." At that point, the commentary was cut off without ex-

Diplomatic relations between Syria, Jordan 'heating up'

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) - The war of words between neighboring Syria and Jordan heated up Friday with Jordanian allegations that Syrian troops massacred 200 anti-government activists last week.

The report by the state-run Petra news agency in Amman was dismissed by a senior Syrian official in Damascus as "ridiculous" and an attempt to defame the Syrian armed forces.

Syria and Jordan, political foes, massed troops and tanks along their common border a month ago in a tense faceoff that was eventually mediated by Saudi Arabia.


Petra quoted unidentified travelers arriving here as saying Syrian troops rounded up 200 people, alleged sym-pathizers with the outlawed Moslem Brotherhood guerrilla organization, and executed them in the central square of Aleppo, 200 miles north of Damascus. Aleppo has been a center

of anti-government Islamic fundamentalist activity since Brotherhood members attacked the artillery school there June 16, 1979, killing 63 cadets.

Syria, which has strong Soviet backing in the Middle East, has blamed Jordan's King Hussein, along with Iraq and Egypt, of training the insurgents and providing them with military bases. Jordanian officials have denied the charge, although the Brotherhood is known to have a presence in the country.

The Brotherhood advocates a social order based on the Koran, Islam's holy book, and opposes Syrian President Hafez Assad's socialist policies.

In an interview with The Associated Press last month, a prominent Brotherhood leader, 50-year-old Jordanian lawyer Mohammad Abdul Rahman Khalifa, said the fundamentalist group operated under constraints in Jordan



Black African states meeting to formulate peace strategy

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Six black African states meet Saturday in Angola to formulate strategy for next week's United Nations-sponsored peace talks on the war in South-West Africa.

South-West Africa, also known as Namibia, is a former German colony whose political status has been in limbo since World War I.

Wedged between Angola and South Africa, the largely desert area has barely a million inhabitants. But it is rich in minerals like diamonds, zinc. copper, lead, tin and uranium. The biggest uranium mine in the world is located there.

Namibia became a spoil of the First World War after South Africa invaded it and captured the Kaiser's German garrison in 1915. The old League of Nations gave it a mandate to administer the territory in 1920.

The United Nations rescinded this mandate in 1966, telling South Africa to pull out and endorsing a black nationalist group, the South-West African People's Organization, or SWAPO, as the legitimate ruler of the territory. South Africa refused to leave and has been wrangling ever since with the United Nations and with Western countries like the United States seeking peaceful independence for Namibia.

The Angola meeting, sought by the Luanda government and announced on New Year's Day, will discuss what the African states will do should the Geneva talks fail. These so-called 'Front Line States" have given material or political support to SWAPO and have condemned South Africa for what they call its "illegal" occupation of South-West Africa.

The war in white-ruled Rhodesia, the breakaway British colony, ended in 1980 when, after British-sponsored peace talks and an election, the independent, black-ruled nation of Zimbabwe emerged.

Geneva beginning Wednesday

The low-intensity guerrilla war between SWAPO insurgents, using Angolan bases, and 15,000 South African troops based in Namibia, remains the last active conflict in southern Africa. According to unofficial statistics, the war claimed the lives of more than 80 South African soldiers and some 1,500

SWAPO fighters in 1980. Even the most optimistic diplomats here are gloomy about prospects for success in Geneva, where SWAPO officials, representatives of South Africa and internal parties in the territory, and UN functionaries will sit down together.

Brzezinski won't help panel secure Watergate materials

WASHINGTON (AP) - National security adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski has turned aside a request by Senate Foreign Relations Committee Democrats for help in gaining access to Watergate-era White House tapes and other materials relating to Alexander M. Haig Jr., the Washington Post reported in its Saturday editions.

The Senate panel is slated to begin confirmation hearings Jan. 9 on President-elect Ronald Reagan's nomination of Haig, who served as White House chief of staff in the final days of the Nixon presidency, to be secretary

Committee Democrats have said they want the hearings to investigate Haig's involvement with decade-old wiretaps on U.S. officials and reporters, Nixon's Watergate defense and other controversial matters.

However, the Post reported that on Dec. 24 Braceinski, President Carter's

top national security aide, sent a letter to Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., saying all the Haig-related materials sought by Pell and fellow Democrats would likely be subject to executive privilege, thus preventing their re-

According to the Post account, Brzezinski also said that before pro-cessing any such materials the White House would wait for an additional request from the full Foreign Relations Committee — which will have a Republican majority when the new Congress convenes on Monday.

Brzezinski's position and the reluc-tance of Republican senators to allow a replay of Watergate during the Haig hearings reportedly have led Senate Democrats to lose hope for what they describe as "any meaningful investi-gation" into controversial areas of laig's past.

Workers repair pipeline leak

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) -Workers fixed a leak in the Trans-Alaska pipeline by replacing a small valve early Friday, after a 13-hour shutdown and the loss of up to 210,000 gallons of oil,

A spokesman for the Alyeska Pipe line Service Co., which operates the 800-mile line between Prudhoe Bay and Valdez, said a small valve on a

11/4-inch bypass line was replaced. There was no leak in the main 48-inch line, said spokesman John Ratterman, who added that repairs were made more quickly than expect-

As soon as the valve was replaced, he said, Alyeska engineers began building pressure to resume moving the usual 1.5 million barrels a day through the pipeline to supertankers at the Port of Valdez.

Tanker loading operations were unaffected because the company maintains several days' supply in storage in Valdez, Ratterman said.

Continued Polish reforms urged

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - A government-owned Polish newspaper published a commentary Friday calling for more reforms in society and the Communist Party as well as safeguards to prevent a slide into repress-

Meanwhile, the leader of Solidarity, the largest independent trade union, hinted Poles would resist if Soviet forces intervened here, according to a Japanese report.

The state-controlled media made no nention of a fresh warning from Moscow against "anti-socialist forces" allegedly using the labor movement to thwart communist efforts.

The signed commentary appeared in Zycie Warszawy, the city's largest morning paper.

'Reform of the economy is not enough, the renewal is not enough," it said. "What is needed is to build barriers that guarantee all reforms will not be annihilated." Brief periods of liberalization in 1956 and 1970 were followed by repression.

The commentary also called for 'openness of political life" in the party and attacked the principle of 'democratic centralism,' a Soviet doctrine that demands all party mem-

bers obey every party decision. The author said Polish authorities have at times been responsible for the "false interpretation" or "rejection" of Marxist-Leninist ideology.

"I don't understand why in such cases the honest and rightful activists are forced to back a group of people with whom they cannot agree," he said.

The article appeared a day after the Soviet Union warned Solidarity, which claims up to 10 million members, not to press for more reforms. The official Soviet news agency Tass said such action could lead to "chaos in the economy.

Tass also said "anti- socialist forces" were using Solidarity to undermine party and government efforts to "normalize the situation" in Poland.

Solidarity leader Lech Walesa was quoted by Japan's Kyodo news agency as saying Poles "would be ready to act in such a way we would not be criticized by the world as cowards" if Soviet forces moved into Poland

But Walesa said he did not think the Soviets would intervene, according to the agency

Kyodo also quoted Walesa as saying the union's top priority at the moment was the abolition of censorship, something officials promised during the negotiations that ended last summer's strikes.

The newly elected head of the Polish writers union was qwoted as say-ing censorship should be relaxed but "the climate cannot be changed at once.

Jan Jozef Szczepanski, a novelist and playwright who is not a Communist Party memeber, told Zycie Warszawy that authorities had been "deluded into believing that literature was a danger."

He said he was optimistic the eas-

ing of controls already underway would continue, but added, "It cannot change in one day. A parliamentary commission is drafting a new censorship bill that should be made public in a few weeks, but newspapers are already publishing commentaries and articles that

We have been feeling acute shortages of coal," the paper said.

The paper also said Polish railroads carried 473 million tons of goods in 1980, some 23 million fewer than planned. The coal shortfall contributed to the freight decline, since most of Poland's coal is transported by rail to the ports of Szczecin and Gdansk for

Bani-Sadr visits Iran's front line

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr, his conduct of the war under increasing criticism in Iran, visited front line positions Friday and urged Iranian soldiers to "try harder" to drive invading Iraqis from Iranian territory.

Bani-Sadr also responded to the criticism by a leading Iranian clergyman, telling him to "come to the front" and see conditions for himself before passing judgment, Tehran Radio said.

Tehran Radio said Bani-Sadr made the plea for a greater effort by armed forces during a visit to an unnamed base at the front on the 103rd day of the Persian Gulf war. The president also conducted a meeting with army and air force commanders at an undisclosed location in Iran's embattled Khuzistan provence, the radio said.

Bani-Sadr was quoted as urging pilots and airborne troops to increase their efforts and to "inflict flerce blows on the enemy to guarantee victory.

On Friday, two parliament members joined hardline religious leaders in criticizing Bani-Sadr's performance as commander of the armed forces and head of the Supreme Defense Council. They charged inaction has enabled Iraq's invading forces to reinforce positions and escalate bombardment of Khuzistan's main cities, Tehran Radio reported.

It quoted Adel Asadnia, the parlia ment member from Ahwaz, as saying Iraqi guns were inflicting 20 to 30 civilian casualties a day in Khuzistan's capital city and that relentless shelling had raged night and day for the last three weeks.

"The armed forces commander-inchief has failed to respond to parliamentary pleas for action and to secret session recommendations on how to break the military standoff in Khuzistan and in the western front," Asadnia was quoted as saying.

Another parliament member, identified only as Mr. Kiavash, was quoted by Tehran Radio as saying Iraqi artillery had "crushed the most sensitive areas" of Khuzistan and charged that "inefficiency" had allowed Iraq to strengthen its forces in

the province. The Iraqis keep getting reinforcements in," Kiavash was quoted as saying. "They keep crushing Dezful and Ahwaz.' Bani-Sadr's political base in Iran

ment to the people." "I think it would be useful if you met the battlefront commanders in these crucial days which will decide our fate and future," said Bani-Sadr in his telegram.

Revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini made a plea Thursday for cooperation among Iran's armed forces and told Revolutionary Guards to avoid friction with regular forces.

Congressman launches probe of alleged Navy dumping

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) -Rep. Toby Moffett of Connecticut has opened an investigation into the alleged dumping of atomic materials off the coast of New Jersey in 1947, an aide said Friday:

A former Navy pilot told this week of three flying missions on which he said he was ordered to dump the materials in 1947. Officials said they may have been a forerunner to mid-Atlantic Coast disposal of nearly 34,-000 barrels of nuclear waste through

Willie Blacklow, Moffett's aide, said in Washington that the pilot had been contacted and that there "was no question he flew the missions" on which the wastes were dumped. He said the Navy had no records of its

The radioactive waste, most of it encased in 55-gallon drums lined with concrete, was dumped at two sites about 120 miles and 200 miles off the New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland

coasts, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and records of the Atomic Energy Commis-

Over 52,000 barrels were dumped

off the Pacific coast, including some

within 30 miles of San Francisco. An unknown amount was dumped off U.S.coasts before federal monitoring began in 1950, officials say. "We really have no accurate records of what's down there and exactly where it is," John Spear, aide to Rep.

William J. Hughes, D-N.J., said Fri-George Earle IV, 64, a former Navy pilot in Reading, Vt., said he commanded three B-17 flights in October 1947 from Philadelphia to a point 100 miles east of Atlantic City to dump

Earle said Thursday he reported his missions because "it worried me"and federal agencies ignored his requests for information.



Railroad Commission orders Daisetta to shut off its natural gas system

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The Texas Railroad Commission, citing an "imminent threat," on Friday ordered the city of Daisetta to shut off its troubled natural gas system.

The order approved by the three-member commission requires the city of 1,100 people to shut the system down immediately. Commissioner Buddy Temple said the actual shut-down could come Saturday, unless the city decides to go to the courts to seek a stay of the order.

Commission Chairman Jim Nugent

said Daisetta officials asked the commission Monday for help in "evaluating and correcting certain safety problems." Temple said city officials were concerned about gas leaking into the sewer system.

"We felt we had no choice," Temple said, adding Daisetta has had "an awful lot of problems" with its gas system. "The commission inspector said there was no way they could

repair it."
Nugent said the city-run gas system sapplies 300 customers.





Carter trying to strengthen control of housing programs

- President Carter on Friday issued an executive order aimed at strengthening the government's ability to administer its fair housing programs.

Carter said his order is the result of a promise made in an urban policy report to Congress.

Carter said in a statement that the administrative changes he is ordering will not in them-selves "close the gap between the present reality and the national fair housing objectives set by Congress in the Civil Rights Act of 1968.

"That gap can truly be narrowed only by a heightened enforcement program such as the one that would have gone into effect had Congress adopted the Fair Housing Amendments of 1980, "the president said.

California justice considered

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - California Supreme Court Justice Wiliam Clark confirmed that he has been asked to become deputy secretary of state, the San Francisco Examiner re-ported Friday.

Clark, 49, who was appointed to the state Supreme Court by Presi-dent-elect Ronald Reagan when Reagan was governor, said he has not yet decided whether to accept the post as top aide to Secretary of State-designate Alexander Haig.

"It's an honor to be asked, but there are many factors that go into consideration before reaching any further conclusions," Clark said. "I have a position of substantial responsibility now and I enjoy what I'm

Clark, one of two Reagan appointees on the state's high court, said he was concerned that his departure would give Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. the opportunity to re-place him with a liberal. He said he also was considering the effect of the move on his wife and

five children. Earlier in the transition period, Clark report-edly had been mentioned as a possible choice for attorney general or director of the Central Intelligence Agency, two posts that have now been filled.





Nations urged to spend more to aid handicapped

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II, in a New Year's Day Mass for 20,000 people at St. Peter's Basilica. urged nations to spend more money on helping handicapped people and

The 60-year-old pontiff later stepped to the window of his private apartment over St. Peter's Square and read New Year's greetings in eight languages to a crowd of 80,000 people.

John Paul said the United Nations

has earmarked 1981 as the "Year of the Handicapped" and said scientists have shown many handicapped people can be rehabilitated.

"Science and medicine thus offer a message of both hope and duty for all of humanity," he said. "If only a small part of the budget for the arms race were spent for this objective, there could be important advances and success in alleviating many people's suffering.'

The Mass marked the Roman Catholic Church's 14th "World Day of Peace," which is celebrated on Jan. 1 each year.

"All humanity ardently desires peace and sees war as the greatest danger that exists on the earth," the pope said.

In the homily for the Mass, the pontiff also expressed concern over hunger in Africa and Asia.

'Hunger and malnutrition today constitute, in effect, a dramatic problem of survival for millions of human beings, especially children, in vast zones of the globe. My thoughts go particularly to the large regions of Africa hit by drought ... and to coun-

SMITHBURG, W.Va. (AP) - A northern West Virginia minister and his wife say they live in fear because of Ku Klux Klan threats since he refused to let Klansmen recruit in his church. He has been beaten and his

months," said the Rev. Michael Curry, "and we're still looking over our shoulders."

The Methodist minister and his wife Ella, both West Virginia natives, returned to the state this past summer after his graduation from Harvard Divinity School. He took over a small church in the Doddridge County community of Smithburg. Registration set for classes

"We thought we were coming home again," Mrs. Curry said. "But we found out it's not the same place."

Because of the threats, United Methodist Bishop William Boyd Groves said the church has decided to transfer the Currys to another community. They have already left Smithburg.

Their first encounter with the Klan came a few weeks after their arrival, Curry said.

"I got a request by phone from a man to come into the church to preach, and to use it as a recruiting base," Curry said. "I told him no, and he said, 'We'll get you for that.""

Soon after, Curry said, a group of robed Klansmen forced him out of his car as he was returning from a parish meeting in Buckhannon.

Curry said he has told the police and the FBI about the incidents.

A WEEK later, Pastorini was on a plane to Oakland. But Monday, Phillips let himself get painted into a corner. He's loyal to a fault. He spoke out to protect the feelings of his assistant coaches and said something that, this time, he wouldn't have a chance to take back. Instead of being openly defiant, he should have said diplomatically: "We'll consider all possible options."

Then he could have done what he dang well pleased, and nobody would have had a thing on him.

Instead, he gave Adams the opening he needed. Forget the verbal promise to extend Phillips' contract for another two seasons. That was yesterday. Adams had wanted to hang Phillips from the nearest tree for a long time. This finally gave him an excuse.

Why? Jealousy. It's that simple.

ADAMS RESENTED Phillips' larger-than-life image as a living, breathing folk hero who, through shrewd dealings and homespun charm, had hand-molded one of the best little football teams in the NFL, all by himself.

All the while, however, Adams was paying the bills and nobody ever said, Luv ya Bud. When his name came up, it was taken in vain just like in the old days when the Oilers were losers and he took the blame. To the public at large, he was still Bottom Line Bud, a black hat amid the

Phillips' square-jawed countenance and folksy humor was everywhere, carried along in a tide of cowboy chic. He, not Adams, was the Houston Oilers. He endorsed airlines and aluminum siding on television, cowboy boots and hats in magazine ads. We read about him in the pages of every conceivable sporting publication, not to mention Playboy.

Adams tolerated the hoopla, but he never liked it. He that's hog-wash. went so far as to accuse Phillips last summer of using the Oilers' good name for his personal gain.

"I wouldn't have to take any endorsements," Phillips said at the time, "if Bud would pay me fair."

PHILLIPS' salary was less than \$150,000. In comparison, Don Shula, Tom Landry, Chuck Noll, Bud Grant and John McKay - whose teams Phillips' teams have beaten in the last two years — make in excess of \$200,-000. Shula, who lost four of five games to the Oilers in the Phillips era, earns almost \$500,000.

At any rate, Adams' couldn't contain his pent-up resentment any longer ... He gave Phillips his walking papers.

Sure, a lot of people raised Cain. But the move won't prove to be as unpopular as the firing of Astros' General Manager Tal Smith because, frankly, a lot of people - a lot of them fans of Phillips - weren't happy with the way the Oilers played this season.

THE ASTROS, under Smith, exceeded everybody's expectations. The Oilers, under Phillips, fell short for whatever reason. Personally, I blame a poorly conceived

Others blame his purported "lack of discipline." I think

Phillips had his faults, to be sure. But we can't lose sight of what he accomplished in his six seasons. If Sid Gillman laid the foundation, Phillips molded the franchise into what it has become. Maybe the Oilers did take a step backward in 1980, as Adams claims, but they still won 11 games, as many as any team in the American Conference.

Should they do better next season, if a new regime does indeed lead them to the Super Bowl, Adams had best remember it will be because of Phillips' legacy.

Win or lose, I know this: The Oilers without Bum Phillips will never be as much fun as they were with



Campbell-type football team next year," Biles said. "Hopefully Earl will get the same yards on fewer calls But we want to get all of our talent into the offense Phillips, who guided the Oilers to

the National Football League playoffs the past three years, was fired New Year's Eve by owner Bud Adams following a dispute over the coach's refusal to hire an offenive coordina-Biles said he intended to hire an

offensive coordinator but he would make no quick decision.

BILES, who had been defensive coordinator throughout Phillips' tenure as head coach, said his contract was for more than one year and less than five years. "I can't count the money figure on five fingers, and the rest is my business," said Biles.

The Oilers finished second in total offense in the American Football Conference last season but had the lowest scoring average of any team that made the NFL playoffs. Biles said correcting that problem and beating the teams the Oilers should beat were his major problems.

"A couple of teams beat us last year that shouldn't have," Biles said. "Obviously that's a problem that kept us from winning our division. If we had won those games, Bum would still be here and I wouldn't be talking to you right now.

Players and fans had started to criticize Houston's offense as being too simple and lacking imagination.

This game is way too big for one guy to have any effect," Phillips said. "I've had to tell hundreds of players that we had somebody we thought could do a better job than they did. I'd be a hypocrite if I couldn't accept it when my cutting time came. "I came here eager and I'm going





Man kills hostage, self in thwarted robbery try

By RICHARD DE ATLEY **Associated Press Writer**

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A man who said he was a "three-time loser" and wouldn't "leave any witnesses like before" killed a hostage and then himself after police thwarted his robbery of a supermarket, officers said Friday.

Ronald Berryman, 37, and Raiph's supermarket assistant manager Claudio Santi, 29, were found dead late Thursday in an office of the store just west of downtown Los Angeles.

About 200 employees and customers had been cleared from the market during negotiations for Santi's life during which a pyschologist was

Police said Berryman, who nego tiated with officers through Santi, called himself a "three-time loser" and then broke off telephone talks. Two shots rang out from the store, minutes before an unmarked escape helicopter that Berryman had ordered landed at the scene.

Special Weapons and Tactics squad officers tried to telephone Berryman for nearly two hours after the shots were heard at 7:04 p.m. They then fired tear gas grenades into the market and rushed it, finding the two dead men inside

Authorities said they had no record of previous convictions against Berryman. But police in the the Orange County city of Santa Ana told Los Angeles officers that Berryman was out on bail for allegedly robbing at gunpoint two Fotomat stores in Orange County

The Santa Ana officers said Berry-

man's unidentified girlfriend had called them from her home near the market before the robbery attempt to warn them that Berryman had left to get some money.

Los Angeles officer Joe Suarez said the girlfriend did not know specifically where Berryman planned to go.

"He needed \$4,000 to cover legal defense expenses," Suarez said. "He told her not to worry, they'd have some money soon.

The girlfriend told officers Berryman said, "I won't leave any witnesses like before.

Police said Berryman took Santi hostage at around 2:30 p.m. after he drew a handgun inside the store and demanded money from the store's cash registers.

Santi's father, Angel, and sister, Adriana, said Santi had telephoned them from the store and told them, "I have a gun at my head. Call the police." Santi was found with a bullet wound in the head.

An employee tripped a silent alarm, and officers surrounded the market. They ordered Berryman to drop the gun, but instead he backed up the stairs to the office, taking Santi with

During the siege, Berryman referred to himself as "Juan." An officer outside the story called the gunman "psychologically disturbed."

Inside the market, police found a box with wires and toggle switches and a police bomb squad was summoned to investigate. "It was a phony," said Officer Gene Akesson. 'It was a bunch of highway flares wrapped together.

15-year-old 'pilot' crashes; Family, several friends killed

EL CAJON, Calif. (AP) - A 15year-old youth, trying to show his mother, stepfather and two others that he could fly, stole a twin-engine plane and took them all to a fiery death, police said Friday.

Investigators said Grant Thompson, a ninth-grader, promised the group a New Year's Day flight to Las Vegas, Nev

But the plane didn't get 100 feet off the ground.

The boy, described by a chum as 'nuts about flying," took a high school course teaching the principles of aerodynamics. He had been given plane rides by pilots who let him take over the controls only briefly.

But a neighbor, Frank Belville, said the boy had "convinced everybody he was a pilot.

Belville said he, too, had planned to leave with the group Thursday, returning in the evening, but bowed out at the last minute.

The 3,750-pound plane took off minutes before the Gillespie Field tower opened New Year's morning. It wobbled immediately, bouncing back onto the runway and smashing both

After surging about 50 feet into the air again, the craft turned abruptly and smashed down into a furniture warehouse, bursting into flames.

Investigators found the charred remains of young Thompson in the pilot's seat and the bodies of his 32year-old mother, Roberta Geruliatus; her 32-year-old husband, Joseph; and two friends, Navy Chief Petty Officer Richard Pehl, 37, and Robert Allen, 35, also in the wreckage.


The train was on its last run of the night from Joliet to Chicago when the accident occurred about 12:20 a.m. on the South Side.







MIAMI (AP) - The next time you board a commercial jetliner, the man settling in next to you may be a federal sky marshal with a gun tucked into his three-piece suit.

If you have a bottle of scotch or a jug of laundry detergent in your carry-on luggage, the guard at the security checkpoint may insist on opening your bag to make sure it isn't a bottle of gasoline.

And if you fit a secret "behavioral profile" of potential hijackers, developed by the Federal Aviation Administration, you may be taken aside for questioning before you are allowed on the plane.

Most passengers don't notice these special precautions — a legacy of a late-summer wave of hijackings that at its height saw six U.S. planes diverted to Cuba in eight days.

Despite their stepped-up security, authorities admit that one man was responsible for stopping the hijackings, which were blamed on disenchanted "Freedom Flotilla" Cuban refugees.

"I can answer that in two words," FAA spokesman Roger Myers said. 'Fidel Castro.'

Although the Cuban president's decision to turn over a pair of suspected air pirates for U.S. prosecution was more effective than all the security measures put together, Myers said they remain in effect just in case. 'We're deadly serious about this."

he said. The extradition killed rumors among the refugees that hijackers would be welcomed home to Cuba and not punished, said Bill Nettles, acting agent-in-charge of the Miami FBI of-

airliner being diverted to Cuba by refugees who complained of being homesick, homeless or jobless. Nettles said there was no evidence to support speculation Castro had

planted the hijackers among the 125,-000-plus boatlift refugees. There were three hijackings in one day, six in eight days. The total reached 11. There were hijackings by the dozens during the 1960s, but cooperation by the Castro government stemmed the tide in the 1970s.

The new wave came as the boatlift, which began in late April and was ded by Castro in September, was winding down. Resettlement proved difficult for many refugees, some of whom were rejected by sponsors and were left to roam the streets or huddle in a Miami "Tent City."

The Cuban government had served notice to the U.S. State Department that it would not cooperate with efforts to repatriate unhappy refugees. To some it seemed the only way home was in a hijacked plane.

One used a box wrapped to resemble a bomb. Gasoline-filled bottles and lighters then became the threat of choice for forcing unscheduled landings at Havana's Jose Marti International Airport. Some hijackers were frightening,

splashing gasoline on a flight attendant in one case, or themselves. Some, such as one refugee who was overpowered after he threatened to light a bundle of newspapers, were pathetic.

Some passengers were terrified. others took it in stride and carted home Cuban cigars and rum.

No one was injured, but airline officials feared for the day when a skyjacking would go awry. Their frustration mounted with the disruption and expense: One captain passed the hat and handed out IOUs to passengers to pay the \$2,000 landing fee the Cubans charged.

On Aug. 15, the FAA announced its security crackdown, including re-institution of checking suspicious-looking passengers with a behavioral pro-


Mom jailed for shooting son



There have been no successful hijackings since their return.

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — Officials said Friday that molten rock was moving beneath Mount St. Helens, indicating "an appropriate need for caution." But scientists disagreed over the significance of the development or whether it meant a new eruption was likely.

The U.S. Geological Survey issued an advisory notifying authorities that new molten rock, also called magma, was detected underneath the volcano in southwestern Washington.

"Until the nature of this new magma can be determined," the advisory said, "it is not possible to say whether further activity will be explosive, continued dome growth with or without mild explosions,

or non-explosive."

Shortly after the advisory came out, the state Department of Emergency Services said in a state-

Department of Emergency Services said in a statement that the change indicated "an appropriate need for caution."

Robin Holcomn, a survey geologist, said there was disagreement over the part of the advisory that said the detected molten rock was the "first influx of fresh magma since last March and April."

"Geologists I've talked to in the office say the data doesn't prove that, although it is a possibility," Holcomb said, adding that the geologist who wrote the advisory was not immediately available.

The movement of fresh magma would indicate molten rock rose quickly and directly from "tens of miles" inside the earth, Holcomb said. That, in turn, would mean the mountain could continue its current cycle of activity for months.

Interior minister, ousted police chief argue on air

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - The latest chapter in the bribery scandal engulfing the Israeli clergy was played over the national radio Friday in an exchange of angry recriminations between the interior minister and the ousted chief of police.

Former Police Chief Herzl Shafir accused the Interior Ministry of not backing him up and Interior Minister Josef Burg charged that Shafir was turning Israel into a police state and using "a Goebbels tactic," referring to Joseph Goebbels, Hitler's propaganda chief.

Israelis settling down for the peace and quiet of the Friday evening sabbath heard a broadcast news conference with Shafir over his dismissal at the height of a bribery probe.

Then Israel Radio handed the microphone to Burg, the man who fired the top cop.

Burg said he sacked Shafir as inspector general of police for planting a false story in the press to help his investigation of Religious Affairs Minister Aharon Abu-Hatzeira, who is suspected of taking bribes.

Shafir managed, without saying so outright, to insinuate that he had been sacked because his inquiries were taking him too high into the political establishment.

Abu-Hatzeira is alleged to have taken some \$15,000 in bribes in return for channeling state funds to religious institutions. A parliamentary committee is to decide whether to strip Abu-Hatzeira of immunity so that he can be prosecuted.

The investigation began shortly after Shafir, a tough-talking military man, became chief of police a year

The 51-year-old Shafir, in the words of one admiring newspaper, quickly breathed new life into a calcified

police force." He put two leading racketeers on trial, broke up an Israeli version of Murder Inc., fought for better pay for his men, even brought down the num-

ber of road accidents. And to the delight of a public that has long demanded a probe into the funding of the powerful clergy, Shafir set in motion the Abu-Hatzeira inves-

tigation. · Israelis were impressed enough to overlook his unorthodox methods phony news stories, police-sanctioned burglaries in search of evidence and the hiring of an old army comrade for a top police job even though the man was known to have friends in the underworld.

At his news conference, Shafir claimed Burg gave him no help. When he succeeded, the ministry was happy to share the credit, Shafir charged. But when he needed help "they sat on the fence," he said. "I'm not any old bureaucrat," stormed Shafir to the reporters. "I am the inspector gener-

The first question to Shafir was whether he had been fired to prevent the Abu-Hatzeira probe from spilling over into the Interior Ministry's financial affairs.

"No comment," said Shafir. The police chief also complained that was constantly under pressure to make life more comfortable for religious figures jailed as part of the Abu-Hatzeira investigation. And finally, he claimed that Burg's own spokesman had long ago warned him that the Interior Ministry was "cor-

rupt."
The charge that Burg fired Shafir to protect Abu-Hatzeira because both Burg and Abu-Hatzeira belong to the National Religious Party has been leveled by the respected daily Haaretz.

Burg dismissed the charge as "stu-pid, nonsensical and wicked," and indeed other prominent newspapers have praised the minister for giving no sign of ever having interfered with the investigation.

Burg charged that Shafir was fired because he was turning Israel into "a police state."

The German-born Burg claimed after Shafir's news conference that planting false information was "a Goebbels tactic," saying "I suffered from it in Germany and I don't want to see it in Israel."

'Baby' sends newest judge to work in Supreme Court

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Jim Wallace of Houston took the oath of office, two kisses from his wife,"Baby" and went to work Friday as the newest

Texas Supreme Court justice.
"Baby, thank you for getting me ready for work one more time," Wallace said after his wife helped him don his robe.

Wallace, formerly a member of the 1st Court of Civil Apppeals in Houston, defeated Republican Jim Brady in the November election. Wallace, 51, beat 3rd Court of Civil Appeals Judge John C. Phillips in a Democratic runoff in May.

The Friday ceremony in the crowded Supreme Court began with a farewell to Justice Zollie Steakley, Wallace's predecessor. Steakley, after 20 years on the state's highest civil court, did not seek re-election.

"These have been the grandest 20 years I've ever known, other than the 42 I've been with (wife) Ruth," Steak-ley said in a voiced choked "not by emotion but by cedar fever.

After Steakley walked down from the bench, Chief Justice Joe Greenhill quarterbacked the ceremonial shifting of seats required when a new justice takes office.

Wallace, an Arkansas native, was graduated from the University of Houston Law School in 1957 and practiced law until 1971 when he became a state senator from Houston. In 1975 he was appointed to a state district court judgeship. In 1978 he moved over to the the Lit Court of Civil Appeals.
