# Tax reformer crusades in Midland

The size of Texas' state government and the cost of operating it are increasing faster than the population count. To put a hold on these numbers, Howard Jarvis was in Midland Wednesday advocating the right of initiative and referen-

Jarvis, 78, author of Proposition 13 in California, held a news conference in The Midland Hilton and spoke at a public meeting in Midland Center during the evening. Traveling with Jarvis and drumming up support for Texas 13 was Waggoner Carr, former state attorney general and speaker of the Texas

Texas 13, explained Carr, is a non-profit organization of Texans dedicated to pushing through legislation allowing residents the right of initiative and referendum. Deane Stoltz of Midland is on the Texas 13 board.

Jarvis contended that citizens have two basic rights - the right to vote and the right to petition the government. The latter isn't allowed in Texas, he said.

In California, the right of initiative allows any citizen who wants to add a law to the books to write the legislation and obtain 550,000 signatures. Once this is done, the proposal goes before the voters, said Jarvis.

Although Jarvis wrote Proposition 13 in 1963, it wasn't until 1978 and many property tax increases later that the public took note. Previously, Jarvis had encountered difficulty get-

ting enough qualified voters to sign the petition. Instead of causing a decline in state services as some California legislators had claimed, the proposal "created

600,000 new jobs. "I've never seen too much tax relief," he said vehemently. "Half of all you make goes for taxes. If you raise taxes, you create unemployment. We need to do everything to create em-

He explained that although taxes have been cut, instead of decreasing state revenues, the cut in California created more jobs and thus more revenue.

Jarvis, who has been in demand for speaking engagements

thoughout the country since the passage of Proposition 13, said taxes in his home state had increased so much that many people couldn't afford to pay taxes on their property. "They were foreclosing 7,000 properties a month for non-payment of taxes. It was just impossible to pay them. What had started at \$40 a month had gone up to \$160 a month."

To explain his theory that the "tax system here is manufac-turing poor people very rapidly," Jarvis said he purchased an \$8,000 car last year. He had an organization research what all the taxes on that car cost, from the time the ore was dug for the body until it was delivered to the car lot. On that automobile, he said, \$4,500 of the price reflected taxes.

Unless a restraint is placed on the State Legislature through initiative, Jarvis forecasts a future of gloom for the nation. He talked with Britain's Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher recently, said Jarvis. She spoke of the problems with her country and said it is going down the drain.

But what bothers her more, according to Jarvis, "Is that the U.S. is following England down that drain. Do you have the guts to do something about it?" he asked of the audience. "Yes," replied a few of the 75 Midlanders in the room while others nodded their heads.

In supporting Jarvis's contention that government is costing too much, Carr claimed that cost of state government has gone up 158 percent in the past 10 years. Meanwhile, state

population has risen only about 17 percent, he said. The state welfare department has upped its cost 370 percent. And a study shows that 64 percent of state employees reported they didn't have enough work to keep them busy, Carr

recited. Today, 45 cents out of every dollar a person earns "is going

to the tax collectors. By 1988," said Carr, "you will keep only 37 cents of each dollar. How are you going to live on 37 cents if you can't live on 55 cents?" The state government has grown so large it no longer hears

the taxpayer but turns its ears to the lobbyists, Carr

He called for the taxpayers to unite and push for the right of initiative and "put reasonable restraints on state govern-

# New hostage meeting held

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) - America's chief hostage negotiator, on a hastily arranged visit to Algeria that stirred fresh hopes for the release of the 52 Americans held in Iran, met today with Algerian Foreign Minister Mohamed Benyahia.

In Tehran, meanwhile, an official at the Algerian Embassy sounded a cautiously optimistic note.

A reporter who telephoned him from Lebanon asked the official whether he believed the American hostages would be freed soon. "We hope so. Be patient," he re-

The Algerians are acting as intermediaries in the U.S.-Iranian negotiations for release of the Ameri-

The U.S. negotiator, Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher. met for two hours here with Benyahia. Neither side released any information on the meeting. Earlier, Christopher said the U.S. and Iranian

positions appeared a bit closer. In Washington, Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie said the purpose of the Christopher mission was to provide the Algerians with a "full understanding" of the U.S. position.

Interviewed on the Cable News Network, Muskie said the fact that Iran had posed a series of questions about U.S proposals indicated a "show of interest" in ending the crisis. But he added that it was not clear whether

The money would be released when the 52 hostages, spending their 432nd day in captivity today, were freed.

Last month the Iranians demanded that the United States put \$14 billion in the Algerian Central Bank to ensure that the estimated \$8 billion to \$14 billion in Iranian assets frozen by the United States is eventually released, and that it deposit an additional \$10 billion to guarantee that any assets of the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi in the United States would be turned over to Iran.

But \$5 billion or more of the frozen Iranian assets are blocked by U.S. courts that are hearing claims against the Iranian government by American firms and individuals. And the U.S. government has no control over the shah's wealth and is not known to have offered any financial guarantees to Iran regarding it.

# Many Midlanders coming down with the flu bug

Winter to some means the thrill of snow skiing, bobsledding and ice skating. To the medical professionals, however, winter means the onslought of colds and flu.

This winter's flu season seems to have increased in length and severity. Although Midland doctors say the flu is not at epidemic proportions, the number of people affected is high.

A spokesperson from Midland Memorial Hospital said although the number of flu patients does not seem worse than any other season, there is currently a heavy number of patients arriving in the emergency room with flu symptoms, bronchitis and pneu-

Oliver Gooch, a otorhinolaryngologist (ear, nose and throat physician), said the situation this winter has been a recurrent one. Usually, Gooch

said, flu comes in spurts at the begin-ning of the school year and then again around the holiday season. This season, however, Gooch said there has been relatively no let up.

This year's strain has proved to be more virulent with a longer period of infection, although the strain seems to be of no exceptional class.

Beginning with a low-grade fever and body aches, this flu moves into secondary infections, Gooch said, which may include sore throats, in-

flamation of intestines and diarrhea. Gooch said the symptoms may last from four to seven days or as long as three to four weeks. The doctor said not only are some people more sus-ceptible to the viral flus, but also may not necessarily take care of them-selves. Such things as overindulgent eating, lack of rest and exposure to the outside elements may aid in the

# Playing with matches called cause of blaze that killed four children

The fire at the Tall City Apartments that killed four small Midland children Dec. 29 was caused by children playing with matches in the bedroom of the apartment, District Attorney Vern Martin announced during a press conference this morning.

Further information indicated that 3-year-old twins Noel and Joel Bennett, 2-year-old Rudy Bennett Jr. and 8-month-old Jennifer Ann Bennett were not trapped in the apartment by a locked or jammed door, as previously thought, and may not have even known they were near a door that could have led them to safety before they died.

There were two doors, in opposite walls, leading into the bedroom. Reports indicate that the family used the door on the west side of the apartment for access. After the fire, the children were found huddled next to the door on the east side. In the excitement, they may not have known the door was there.

"The fire prevented them from get ting out of the room, and not a locked door." said Martin.

Martin released information gathered by State Arson Investigator Greg Whitlock and Investigator Bobby Williams of the Midland fire marshal's office.

Representatives from the fire marshal's office and Whitlock, who was called into the case and began his investigation Tuesday, were not at the press conference because of another investigation which needed Whitlock's attention before he left Midland late today.

Martin declined to say which investigation Whitlock was now working

A release issued at the press conference said, "The fire at the Tall City Apartments, on Dec. 29, 1980, has been determined by the State Arson Investigator, Greg Whitlock, and Investigator B.D. Williams of the Midland fire marshal's office to have

### Bodies of two Iraan men found in wreckage of plane

IRAAN (AP) - The bodies of two Iraan men were discovered Wednesday in the wreckage of a single engine plane that crashed about three miles east of this Southwest Texas town, authorities said.

The Bellanca plane took off from the Iraan airport about 6:15 a.m. Tuesday, but the wreckage was not discovered until shortly after 11 a.m. Wednesday, said Texas Department of Public Safety and Federal Aviation Administration officials.

A DPS official identified the dead as Eugene Clemons and Lloyd Keith Blakeslet, 42, both of Iraan.

He said the plane was en route to Wichita Falls. An FAA spokesman in Fort Worth, however, said it was headed for Amarillo, but that no flight plan was filed. Federal authorities were investi-

gating the crash site Wednesday.

NEW YORK (AP) - His critics call him a "clown" and a "Wizard of Oz type," but few people can shake up the stock market the way Joseph E. Granville

If there was any doubt about that, it was removed on Wednesday, after the Holly Hill, Fla., investment adviser recommended in his telephone "early warning service" that subscribers dump all the stocks

they owned. As the market opened, it was inundated with sell orders that forced trading delays in more than 100

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which had soared past the 1,000 level Tuesday to its highest closing level in more than four years, abruptly

turned around and plummeted. By mid-afternoon Wednesday, the Dow was down more than 30 points. Even after a modest rally before the close, the Dow still showed a 23.80-point loss, to 980.99, wiping out a large portion of the nearly 41-point gain it had built up in the first three trading

At present, they add, the most recent issue of the letter, dated Jan. 3, is emphatically bullish. "Straight up," it is titled. It advises new subscribers to "do some aggressive new buying. The market is signaling a sharp upswing ahead.





# Sky sculptures launched

If you see strange objects in the sky, don't call the Air Force. They're "sky scuiptures," not UFOs.

Launched this morning from the Midland High School campus, the four aluminum-colored, helium-filled creations are a project of teacher Joyce McDonald's art class and took two days to construct. Mrs. McDonald's students have been studying about how sculpture occupies space and how it may affect our environment.

The sculptures were made of a lightweight mylar-type material used by campers as protection from the elements, and each carried long, streaming, crepe paper

Launch time was delayed by a half-hour when the students discovered the helium tank was empty. After

another was secured, students inflated the sculptures and turned them loose in cold, shifting breezes.

The first one, shaped like a turtle, hovered 30 feet in air for a few moments before clearing the gymnasium roof and finally settling onto the band practice field on the north side of the gym.

A leak was patched with Scotch tape and the creature was later attached to a larger, cone-shaped creation that carried it high into the overcast sky toward Lamesa. The remaining two sculptures - one designed like a

giant starfish, and the other like a box - took off without a hitch and seemed to debate whether they wanted to trail their counterpart to Lamesa or go off on their own somewhere

development or prolonging of flu symptoms, he said Gooch said about half his daily patient load now is composed of flu

victims.

Dr. Mourad Mensour, of the Family Physicians Medical Group, said he, too, has seen an increase in flu cases. He said the patients seen in his office show symptoms which vary from fever, general malaise, bone and muscle aches and nausea to spasmodic colic, some diarrhea, coughing,

sore throat and ear aches. Mensour said he has noticed an increase in patients displaying such symptoms since "just about a week or two before the Christmas holidays. Mensour also said about half his daily patient load consists of flu victims.

The doctor said he did not know if this flu was a particular strain since the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, Ga., has not sent out any bulletins on any spread of a particular type of flu. However, he said he felt the strain was not of the Asian variety.

New York City recently began reporting epidemic proportions of the A-type Bangkok Flu with an above average number of pneumonia deaths.

Mensour said one reason this dose of flu seems to be lingering in Midland is because afflicted persons are not remaining home during the incubation period. "The people may not stay home but one or two days," he said because of the way sick days are set up at most businesses. However, when they return early, "they are still in their infectious days.

Also, Gooch said the flu spreads when people return to their normal routine too soon. "They go out when

they don't feel like it," he said, adding that even though the patient may feel a little better after a day or two, the symptoms linger and can become

Both doctors said the best prevention for this flu was to stay away from infected individuals. "The best prevention," Dr. Mensour started out seriously, "is to know and spot those who are sick with the flu - and stay

worse without the proper rest.

Although many businesses have felt the affects of this latest surge of flu with a decreased number of workers, Jewel Smith, director of the Midland Health Department, said there is no epidemic here. "We really haven't heard that much about it," he said. 'And we haven't heard anything official on it." But, Smith did say that some of his employees were out with

WASHINGTON (AP) - The heavy attack by environmental groups against the nomination of James G. Watt as interior secretary apparently is having little effect with the people who count most - the senators who must confirm his appointment.

Watt received a generally warm reception Wednesday from the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee. Several senators predicted confirmation would be no problem, even though some of the country's largest environmental groups strongly denounced Ronald Reagan's selection of Watt for his Cabinet.

And a senator who asked some of the toughest questions of Watt, Paul Tsongas, D-Mass., told Watt, "You are going to be confirmed. I can count and you have the votes.

Another tough questioner was Sen. Gary Hart, D-Colo., who asked Watt about a statement he reportedly made in October 1977, that, "As a white man, in 10 years, I'm going to be very hesitant to let a black doctor operate on me because of concerns that he may have been carried by the quota system.

Watt refused to deny he had made the statement, telling Hart, "I think we should just let it rest where it is and not try to create a fight over it.' Watt added that he was against discrimination, but that he was "opposed to quotas in every measure."

The environmental organizations focused on Watt's role as president and chief legal officer of the Mountain States Legal Foundation for the past 31/2 years.

Watt said the 10-lawyer foundation specialized in protecting individual rights against "excessive regulation and government control.

But the environmental groups said the foundation's main purpose was to help pro-development interests in the West battle the Interior Department and other federal agencies over access to federal lands.

The foundation's suits have dealt with such subjects as grazing rights

on Western lands, the government's authority to block oil and gas drilling in wilderness areas and the power of the National Park Service to limit motorized rafts in the Grand Can-

The environmentalists said contributors to the foundation, which has an operating budget of more than \$1 million, include some of the West's biggest oil, mining, and timber interests. That would make it hard for Watt to avoid conflicts of interest as interior secretary, the conservation groups said.

But Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., said he found "ridiculous" the argument that Watt had a conflict of interest because he had sued the federal government several times. He said former lawyers for environmental groups had not been denied top jobs in the Carter administration and Watt's nomination should not be denied

"Mr. Reagan was elected because he expressed certain philosophies. He is entitled to appoint Cabinet secretaries who support those philosophies," Domenici said.

In his testimony, Watt pledged to work for a "reasoned, environmentally conscious program for developing and utilizing the tremendous energy resources our nation possesses.

He said he and Reagan had discussed four goals - defusing the Sagebrush Rebellion over federal control of Western lands by promoting "mul-tiple uses" of that land, increasing production of domestic energy resources, developing a policy to insure adequate supplies of strategic minerals and preserving the country's national parks.

MIAMI (AP) - A husband and wife who refused to accept a \$75,000 court settlement because it wouldn't cover their expenses stand to go \$19. 000 in debt if they accept the award to avoid being jailed for contempt, their lawyer says.

To go a step further, Mr. Reagan's goal of improving communications and trade between this nation, Mexico and Canada is an idea whose time definitely has arrived. In fact, it's an idea that has been presented more than once before in previous administrations.

Somehow presidents always seem to get sidetracked, what with all the concerns of the world before them and, ostensibly, resting squarely on their shoulders. Problem areas elsewhere in the world attract their attention -Iran, Africa, the Middle East,

Vietnam, the Soviet Union — and the goal of improving relations with the good neighbors here at ome is relegated to a back burner. All too often, in fact, it's virtually forgotten.

WASHINGTON - The slaying Saturday of land reform director Rodolfo Viera has removed one of the few remaining figures in El Salvador's teetering government with any claim to popular support or contact with the country's vast majority of poor peas

Salvadoran President Jose Napoleon Duarte has said he believes extreme rightists killed Viera, along with U.S. advisers Michael P. Ham mer and Mark David Pearlman, as they sat finishing dinner in the restaurant of the San Salvador Sheraton Hotel. As usual following the brutal slayings that are now a daily oc curence there, others have blamed leftist guerrillas.

But regardless of who pulled the trigger, it is clear that the target was Viera and the peaceful road to radical reform he represented.

Viera, a rough and tumble man who prided himself on the fact that "I started to work the land when I was 9 years old," was a peasant leader who chose to work within the system. while others long ago turned to revolution as the only hope for change in El Salvador "A leader in the cemetery doesn't do anybody any good." he said in a 1979 conversation I had with him

"Nobody can work here if there is no tranquility, no peace," he said as others called the Salvadoran masses to insurrection. "If there is no work. there is hunger, and hunger is a bad political adviser.

Viera's presence as head of the Salvadoran Agricultural Transformation Institute gave that much attacked organization - the focus of U.S. hopes that redistribution of wealth can avert a leftist takeover one of its few vestiges of political and

popular respectability. Yet, just before his death Viera, too, was ready to join the scores of Salvadoran leaders who have given

reform program by refusing to turn over land titles to new peasant owners and blocking needed loans to peasant cooperatives, friends reported, he had decided to resign.

Viera had been the target of at least five assassination attempts. His enemies included the extreme right, the left and many in the government for which he worked.

In many ways, Viera was for years a pivotal figure in the bloody tangle of Salvadoran politics.

Before joining the government last March to direct the agrarian reform, Viera-headed the Salvadoran Comthan 150,000 members and ran dozens of peasant cooperative farms.

The union was started in 1971 with the help and funding of the American Institute for Free Labor Development, an AFL-CIO affiliate, and in 1977 it was recognized by the former rightist military government as a legitimate representative of El Salvador's peasants

Viera claimed to be under no illusions about the repressive character of El Salvador's past and present governments. But he said in 1979 his way of doing things had gotten results. The peasant cooperatives exist-

We believe there is a way to exert pressure without violence," he said. Why do people have to die for change?

## United States' economic woes also are hurting Mexico

Mexico is relying on the Ronald Reagan administration to help the Aztec republic help itself. Mexico expects no handouts, no gifts, from the new U.S. govern-

But what Mexico does hope is that Mr. Reagan will bring U.S. inflation under control, that prosperity will return to the United States and, with it, increased demand for the goods

and services Mexico has to offer. As things stand now, all that Mexi-co has to export that is readily sold broad with no great difficulty is oil

and natural gas.

While the dollar income from its oil wealth is more than welcome, Mexico is cognizant of the problems that countries depend overly on some one export item, even petroleum, can experience when the unexpected hap-pens to the world market. But as Mexico does over 60 percent

But as Mexico does over 40 percent of its foreign business with the United States, what would most help the Mexican economy would be a strengthening of the U.S. dollar.

A sound dollar, perhaps even a dollar as "good as gold," would aid Mexico, as well as most of the other hemisphere republics. Their curren-

hemisphere republics. Their currencies depend on the dollar.

The Mexican peso, and the other countries' monetary units, are "floating" against the dollar. The peso has been for over four years now, since the devaluation of August 1976.

What that means is that there is no

fixed rate of exchange between, say, the peso and the dollar. Whereas, prior to the 1976 devaluation, the peso was pegged at 12.50 to the dollar, since devaluation the peso has been floating at around 23 to the dollar, with the precise rate of exchange theoretically, at least, determined by the law of supply and demand at the

moment of a transaction. In the case of Mexico, and other countries, too, the float has been what the monetary specialists call "dirty." That is to say that the government has entered the money market at times, buying pesos and selling dollars, or whatever was necessary to prevent what it considered extreme fluctuations in the exchange rate.

The fact that the dollar has been

floating too has complicated their task, even though the dollar movements have been slight, in compari-

If the United States were able to stabilize the dollar, so thinking in

Mexico and elsewhere goes, the problems of the money managers would be eased.

Of course, that would mean that the

United States had brought inflation under control. Inflation, much of it "imported" from the United States, is a problem in Mexico. Since 1976, estimates are, inflation

in Mexico has averaged around 25 percent a year, about double that of the United States That has given rise to recent specu-

lation that Mexico may be forced to devalue the peso again. President Jose Lopez Portillo has tried to calm such fears.

He said that many businessmen

have suggested he devalue "to increase the country's competitive capacity" in foreign markets. "But I have considered that domestic demand at this moment is so extraordinarily strong that Mexico does not have much to sell abroad and that, to stimulate sales abroad, there are other aids for our economy that

# Autopsy slated on body found in recreation area

Tate was last heard from Monday evening after he, Mrs. Price, and a male friend of the Prices, Holly Gentry, 28, went to the Price's apartment. They were found dead, all shot in the head, the following day on an Arkansas River bottomlands farm near Van

The fourth body was discovered in the Clear Creek Recreation Area near the Arkansas River, said Capt. Bill







# Peru 'fishing' for new solution

#### By KERNAN TURNER Associated Press Writer

LIMA, Peru (AP) - The fishmeal factories, silent and empty, dot the coastline like monuments to the anchovy, the little silver fish that for decades supported Peru's fishing industry, once the world's

Because of 20 years of overfishing, the anchovy population has dropped to such a level that it is

unlikely to fully recuperate.
The Ministry of Fisheries estimates some 2 million tons of anchovies are left in the seas off Peru, less than one-tenth the amount which used to supply most

of the world's fishmeal. Recognizing the problem head-on for the first time, the ministry last year banned anchovy fishing and abandoned the traditional fishmeal industry, which supplied much of the world's poultry and hog producers, in favor of food fish.

Except for a 150-mile stretch north of the Chilean border, anchovy fishing is prohibited along Peru's entire 1,400-mile coastline.

'We won't touch them for several years," Rene Deustua, the fisheries minister, said in a recent interview with The Associated Press. "No one knows if this bio-mass will someday recuperate. But what is known for sure is that the population will never again reach the levels of the past."

Deustua said the number might grow to between 4 million and 5 million metric tons, enough to permit

'a very limited catch.' We ought to have declared an anchovy emergency" when the catch dropped from a high of about 15 million tons in 1971 to 3 million tons in 1973, Deustua said. "Fishing should have been prohibited for two or

three years. Now it's a little late. Deustua said catch limits will be based on recommendations from the Peruvian Sea Institute, an

independent, scientific agency. They will tell me the volume they believe can be fished without endangering the species and that is the amount I will authorize," he said.

The minister's approach is a new concept in Peru, where the military regime which relinquished power to a civilian government in July virtually ignored the advice of the Sea Institute for 12 years and tried to maintain the fishmeal industry at any cost.

The ministry's position has been accompanied by a cut in the fishing fleet and its return to private ownership

The military government expropriated some 100 fishmeal plants and 1,500 anchovy purse seiners in 1973, the year the anchovy practically disappeared.

By 1979, only 33 fishmeal plants and 500 seiners were left. Just seven of the fishmeal plants were in use this past year, all of them on the southern coast. Owners are selling their seiners or converting them for use in the food fish industry

Scientists give two causes for the anchovy's disap-

One was the obvious overfishing. A U.N.-sponsored study by an international team of biologists warned in 1970 that the Peruvian anchovy fishery could not sustain a catch of more than 9.5 million tons a year.

But the extens in 1972 term in 1972 term is a catch of more than 9.5 million tons a year. But the catches in 1967, 1968, 1969, 1970 and 1971 all exceeded that amount.

Water temperature also affects the population. Anchovies thrive on the nutrients in the cold Humboldt Current which sweeps northward from the Antarctic along the Peruvian coast.

But a warm current called "El Nino," The Christ Child, which originates in the Gulf of Guayaquil near the Equator, sometimes dips further south than usual, into Peruvian waters. When that happens, the anchovies die or swim south into Chilean waters.

Some figures: When Peru was the world's leading fishing nation and fishmeal was king in the late 1960s and early 1970s, annual catches of between 10 million and 12 million tons of anchovies were made.

Fishermen landed 2.25 million metric tons of fish in the first 10 months of 1980, including just 572,252 the species."

to 385,710 tons, compared with 634,487 tons in the first 10 months of 1979.

Earnings from fish exports dropped from \$364 million in the first 10 months of 1979 to \$280 million for the same period of 1980.

Deustua said the vacuum created by the disappearance of the anchovy will be filled by the sardine, which has a higher economic and food value.

"The logical thing is to utilize the sardine exclusively for canned and frozen projects and to restrict fishmeal production from the leftovers of the canning process and from the temporary fishing of other species...which are abundant," the minister said.

'I don't believe Peru will be a big producer of fishmeal in the future," he said. "Our policy is directed at increasing the fishing for human con-sumption at home and if possible for export. All of this will be done within the framework of conserving

They don't use wood as fuel anymore in this age of modern, efficient energies like electricity, city gas and oil, but are talking about making alcohol from wood and other plant material as an alternative

energy source. That is, of course, all because of ever shorter supplies and ever higher costs.

The number of potential biomass is legion, including terrestrial and aquatic plants and vegetable waste such as wheat straw," says an energy

The Japanese efforts parallel biomass energy research overseas - in Canada, Sweden, the Philippines and Thailand, to name a few countries for making ethanol from wood scraps and farm produce

Biomass energy just may be the wave of the future as a diverse, renewable energy source as nations of the world are trying to exploit every conceivable source of alternative energy from solar to geother-

In oil-short Japan, which depends on imports almost entirely for its oil supplies and faces an acute need for alternative energies, the government and the business community are jointly undertaking biomass energy research.

The Ministry of International Trade and Industry

and the Agency of Natural Resources and Energy are sponsoring a semi-governmental biomass energy development project. Seventeen Japanese firms are taking part in the project.

Biomass energy is nothing new in itself. Brazilians have been making alcohol from sugar cane since colonial days and mixing alcohol with gasoline since the 1930s. In the United States alcohol made from corn is mixed with gasoline to make gasohol.







# Actress visits starving Africans

NEW YORK (AP) -Despite her UNICEF work in other underprivileged parts of the world, actress Liv Ullmann found she wasn't prepared for what she saw in a two-week tour of East African refugee

"I had my questions ready - you know, 'What are your hopes for the future?' And the an-swers you would get: 'I need food. Look at my child....We need water. Tell them about our children. Do they have chil-Tell them what our chil-dren look like."

The 41-year-old Norwegian actress came away from a two-week, pre-Christmas tour of refugee camps in Ethio-pia, Somalia and Djibouti with a head full of images — pictures of withered, hunger-wracked victims of war and drought.

"I see women sitting, completely gray from dust, sitting and waiting to see if they will get food this day.... You know, you don't have the yerbal contact, so you take their hand, and you know it's a wrinkly and thin, tired hand," she said in an interview Wednesday.

"You're sitting close to the woman and you can see that she is your own age, but she is 100 years older."

Then, she said, "I met an old man — he was very old and very angry. He shouted, 'I'm hungry, I'm hungry, and I'm not getting food. You must tell them to give me food.

She says she will not undertake any film projects until next fall and in the meantime, she hopes to travel on behalf of UNI-CEF and write a book on the co-existence of poverty and affluence.

In the interview at Miss Ullmann's elegant apartment off Central Park West, the actress admitted that the Afrihunger and suffering of can trip - and previous

"But you don't change," she said.

# Much of volcano area reopened following 'lull'

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) - A decrease in seismic activity and a lull in the growth of the lava dome in Mount St. Helens' crater has prompted the reopening of much of the restricted red zone around the volcano to logging operations.

Hundreds of loggers who had been out of work for more than a week because of the closure returned to the field Wednesday after the state lifted the ban on entry.

Meanwhile, scientists studied the volcano's slopes and steamy crater. There was no seismic activity around Mount St. Helens on Wednesday, said Steve Bryant, spokesman for the University of Washington geophysics

Early in the day, a steam plume flecked with old ash rose 1,000 feet above the 8,400-foot mountain, but later the plume barely climbed to the crater rim, said Tom Corcoran, a U.S. Forest Service spokesman.

The pilot of a Forest Service spotter plane reported seeing the red glow of ated rocks inside the crater, said

The red zone - actually two red zones under the separate jurisdictions of the state and the Forest Service around the volcano had been closed because scientists said that the mountain could erupt without warning, said U.S. Geological Survey geologist Kathy Cashman

The Forest Service red zone, which extends 10-12 miles from the mountain and mainly on its east side, remained closed Wednesday

But Ed Chow, state Department of Emergency Services director, said that the state red zone was reopened Tuesday afternoon from 12 to 20 miles from the mountain.

Nearly all logging operations are in the 12-to-20-mile range.

Some 650 Weyerhaeuser Co. loggers worked Wednesday about 17 miles from the mountain to harvest trees knocked down by the mountain's devastating May eruption, said Bob Williams, a Weyerhaeuser spokes-


### Hotel fire kills one

## Amount of sleep individual matter

Dear Dr. Solomon: Will you please settle a family argument? How much sleep should an adult get each night? I say eight hours; my husband insists no more than five hours of sleep are needed. What's the answer?--Mrs. V.H.

Dear Mrs. H.: I'm afraid there is no definite answer to your question. Some studies have suggested that seven to eight hours of sleep during every 24-hour period is the most satisfactory pattern to follow. However, the amount of sleep a person requires is very much an individual matter and cannot be established according to a formula.

Many people can get only five to six hours of sleep a night and feel rested and raring to go the next morning, while others can sleep for nine or 10 hours and still be dragging when they get up. Most adults follow the seven to eight-hour-a-day sleep pattern, with elderly persons generally sleeping ess than they did when they were younger adults. If I may add a word of advice: The argument is not

important enough to lose sleep over.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I met someone over the weekend who has scleroderma. He says he is being


treated for it although there is no cure. I'm not familiar with the disease, and I'm puzzled by what he meant. Can you shed some light on this?-Mrs.

Dear Mrs. K.: Scieroderma literally means "hard skin," and is believed to be caused by a narrowing of the blood vessels. It affects about 300,000 people in the United States, although this figure may be low since the condition is difficult to diagnose. Localized scleroderma, which involves the skin and the tissues under the skin, causes cosmetic problems and tends to restrict the patient's mobility. Systemic scleroderma is more serious and may pose a threat to life since it affects the organs, including the esophagus, heart, lungs, intestines, and the kidneys,

Since the cause of the disease has not been established, there is no cure as yet; however, physicians do treat the symptoms in an effort to make the patient more comfortable.

Dear Dr. Solomon: If Down's Syndrome is caused by genetic factors, why is an older woman more likely to have such a child than a younger woman? It seems to me that if the condition is inherited, either the mother carries the gene for it or she doesn't, regardless of age.-Carol

Dear Carol: It is not completely clear why an older woman has a greater risk than a younger woman of bearing a child with Down's Syndrome. Some researchers point to the fact that women are born with all the eggs necessary for bearing chil-

# Public sees economic reality

NEW YORK (AP) - You must by now have had your fill of the so-called experts proclaiming their beliefs about (1) the economy and (2) what they think you think about the economy and why you

Why not listen to some people who never claim to be experts, and who are always shocking the experts right out of their forecasts because the experts didn't listen to them? To the views of ordinary Americans?

The New York Stock Exchange, which learned respect for ordinary views after unexpectedly losing (and partially regaining) 5 million investors in the early 1970s, put its ear to

the phone and listened. After 1,012 interviews in November it found, for example, that

by a 61 to 35 percent margin Americans believe their economy is in a crisis, and that more than half say a depression is possible.

This point of view, you may note, bespeaks a greater recognition of reality than is sometimes attributed to the American public. A few days ago, for example, the esteemed Arthur Burns, former Federal Reserve chairman, publicly cautioned President-elect Reagan against declaring a state of economic emergency, suggesting it would frighten the public.

The next finding also might be viewed as a criticism of political and governmental attitudes toward the public. The finding: Eighty cent of Americans believe the political leadership -Congress and the President - have failed to understand and control economic problems.

The realism, and perhaps wisdom, of Americans shows through in another conclusion reached by the surveyors: The public does not expect any improvement in inflation and unemployment in the

'Approximately 65 percent of Americans believe it will take three years or longer to reduce inflation and unemployment to 5 percent levels, and to balance the budget," states the study

Though, according to the researchers, your views are represent ed in their scientific sampling, you might have some reservations

"Sixty-four percent are willing to give (Reagan) three years or longer to implement changes. Fully 93 percent are willing to give his policies a chance, even if they personally disagree with

This attitude has not always been demonstrated. In fact, say some economists, one of the great difficulties facing the nation today is that economic change take longer to achieve than political

The American public also declares it is willing to sacrifice to solve the economy's problems. Again, it hasn't always been so; the consumptive '70s are testimony to the unwillingness to

Still, this is the people speaking, and one lesson to be drawn from the recent election results it is that leaders should listen because, on election day, the people have the strongest views of

Listening, the stock exchange students learned this: -Americans are feeling the economic pinch even more than they did in April, when a similar survey was completed.

-In the next few years Americans expect increased interest rates, tax incentives for business to build plants, import restrictions, credit controls and a tax cut.

-Americans favor lowered interest rates, personal tax cuts, tax incentives for business, import restrictions on foreign cars, and wage-price controls.


-Americans want a balanced budget. Fifty-one percent believe balance can be achieved even though taxes are cut. They feel a 10 percent tax cut would not be inflationary and would oppose it if it were. They say they would save or invest the money from

-While Americans support increased tax incentives for business they do not want to cut taxes on corporate profits.

-In overhwelming numbers people believe there has been too little cooperation between government, business and labor. Eighty-three percent say the three sectors should strive for more cooperation.

In all, not a bad program. The country's problems, it seems, about another important finding, regarding public patience, to may be caused not so much by ordinary people as by leader-

# New Polish confrontation shaping up

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — A new confrontation between Poland's independent labor movement and the communist government appears to be taking shape over the 40-hour work week

The presidium of Solidarity, the nation's largest independent union with about 10 million members, was expected to give final approval today to a demand for a five-day, 40-hour work week with no

The government, seeking a solution to the nation's grave economic problems, says the country cannot afford the 40-hour week yet.

Deputy Premier Mieczyslaw Jagielski, who negotiated the agreements that ended last summer's wave of strikes and recognized the workers' right to form unions free of Communist Party control, said in a television appearance that the government was standing by its counterproposals.

They call for either two Saturdays off each month or all Saturdays free but with an extra 30 minutes on the job each day.

Not everyone was unanimous in this complicated matter," Jagielski said. "However, taking into account all factual arguments, a close study of the possibilities and the economic aspects basic for every citizen, the government expects that its decision will meet with understanding on the part of the crews and trade unions.'

Solidarity claims the Gdansk strike settlement on Aug. 31 promised a five-day work week with no extension of the working day.

Meanwhile, the government was grappling with a regional labor dispute in the southeastern corner of the country 10 miles from the Soviet border.

Workers and farmers occupying a government building in the town of Ustrzynki Dolne refused to negotiate with a government delegation led by Stanislaw Ciosek, a minister without portfolio responsible for trade union affairs.

Jan Wolinski, a spokesman for Solidarity's regional office in nearby Rzeszow, claimed the govern tant workers and farmers in a town near the ment delegation "cannot undertake any decision and is not authorized to sign any agreements.

He said the militants would not negotiate until the Warsaw government dispatched a "competent commission" to deal with their complaint that local authorities were harassing Solidarity activists.

# Derailment forces evacuation

ADDIS, La. (AP) - Officials of this Louisiana town, where the derailment of four chemical tanker cars forced a brief evacuation of all residents, say they had complained to federal officials months ago about the area's frequent rail troubles.

Four railroad tanks cars carrying 30,000 gallons of toxic anhydrous ammonia derailed in a switching yard Wednesday, and two overturned. There was no

It was Addis' 22nd derailment of cars carrying hazardous material in just over a year, said Mayor Carroll Bourgeois.

"We wrote to the federal authorities. They came and found some discrepancies, and we were under the impression that it was all taken care of," Bourgeois said. "And here we are 77 days later with another one.'

The latest accident forced the temporary evacuation of all 1,300 residents of this community near Baton Rouge. A crane righted the two cars without incident within a few hours, and everyone was allowed to return home



# Tijuana also known for Caesar Salad

TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) - To most of the 12 million tourists who annually pour through this border city, Tijuana is best known for its notorious nightlife, gory bullfights and bargain

Only a few know it as the birthplace of the original Caesar Salad, one of the salad family's most celebrated

It happened almost half a century ago, at the downtown Caesar Hotel and restaurant, built and operated by Caesar Cardini, an Italian restaura-

According to published accounts, Caesar had concocted a salad dressing that became a favorite of his customers. As business boomed, he was joined by his brother Alex, a World War I ace pilot in the Italian air

In a tribute to the pilots at a nearby San Diego air base, Alex took his brother's salad dressing, modified it with other ingredients and called it 'Aviator's Salad."

Soon, however, the popular, oftencopied dish became internationally known simply as "Caesar Salad."

Today, the famous salad remains a major drawing card at the restaurant. The beige-colored, three-story hotel is a landmark along Revolucion Avenue, Tijuana's busy main street. Patrons have included such Holly

wood greats as Gary Cooper, Elizabeth Taylor and Victor Mature, says restaurant manager Carlos Spinga "We used to have a menu with the

autorgraphs of all the famous people, but that was stolen," Spinga said. "A lot of people, maybe 60 percent, just come to eat the salad," said

Maitre d'hotel Tony Espericueta Up to 150 a la carte orders of the \$2.75 salad are served per day, mostly to American tourists, Spinga said.
"The secret is the oil," said Raul Miramontes Najera, owner of the res-taurant. "Cloves of garlic are placed in a gallon jug of olive oil for a month

to add flavor. Traditionally, Caesar Salad is prepared from scratch at the patron's table. That formality, however, has been phased out except on demand. "Everybody's in a hurry today, so

we make the dressing in large quantities," explained Spinga. Although the original recipe called for anchovies, Miramontes said they

Some recipes called for bacon, too, but we don't use that," he said.

Here is the Original Alex-Caesar Cardini Salad Recipe:

Wash and dry 10 romaine lettuce leaves and refrigerate in a bowl before crisping. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Put six half-inch slices of french bread onto an ungreased baking sheet and bake until crisp - 45 minutes to one hour. Brush with 11/2 tablespoons from one-quarter cup of olive oil and return to the oven to brown, about 15 minutes.

Crush together three cloves of garlic and six anchovy filets and gradually add one tablespoon of the oil. Spread this mixture onto the bread slices, cut into cubes and set aside. Cover one egg in boiling water and cook for one minute. After placing the lettuce leaves into the salad bowl, add one tablespoon of fresh lime juice, one teaspoon of Worcester Sauce, quarter cup of freshly grated parmesan cheese, and the cubed bread, toss the ingredients and add salt and pepper

### Cellmate forged petition NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The cellmate of con-

victed arsenic killer Katie Stricklin forged 166 signatures on a petition and letters sent to the governor seeking Mrs. Stricklin's release, corrections officials

Jack Bursack, head of internal affairs for the Corrections Department, said Tuesday the cellmate, Irene Jan Calhoun, voluntarily demonstrated her efforts for officials.

"Resident Calhoun readily admitted that she had signed all the names on the petition in the behalf of her cellmate, Katie Stricklin," said a report to Commissioner Harold Bradley from the internal

'Resident Calhoun stated she only wanted to help her roommate Katie, mainly because she felt Katie was innocent of her charge and had spent too much time in prison for a crime that she had not commit-ted," the report said.

Mrs. Stricklin, 41, was convicted in 1972 in the

arsenic poisonings of her father-in-law and mother.

In 1979, then-Gov. Ray Blanton commuted a life sentence in her mother's death. It could not immediately be determined what term she currently is

Mrs. Calhoun is serving a three- to five-year sentence for passing bad checks and a two-year sentence for a drug conviction. The petition urged Mrs. Stricklin's parole and the

If New Year's resolutions could change your life, could New Year's resolutions for the home change your home life?

In an effort to find out whether a few resolutions could make a decorative difference, we went straight to the people who ought to know home-furnishings professionals who make their living by pulling homes together for other people

What is your New Year's resolution for your own home in 1981, we asked a cross section of individuals who are designers, manufacturers and editors in the home-furnishings field. And their responses made it clear that it is easier to put somebody else's home in apple-pie order than it is to do the same thing for oneself. Resolutions to do better in 1981 were thick as flies around honey. Bebe Winkler, an interior designer in New York with a national clientele, has already started on her resolution.

"I'm finally getting my closets organized. It's getting embarrassing, since I'm about to sign my second lease and the closets are still a mess. With clients, reorganizing closets and storage areas and adding new ones, if needed, is one of my first priorities. It's typical to take better care of others than of oneself. But 1981 is going to be the year I get my things organized. Who knows? If I can get all my tennis things put away, it may even improve my game."

Carleton Varney, president of Dorothy Draper & Co., the New York design firm, and a decorating-book author, said, "I want a less cluttered life with fewer things to hem me in So. I have resolved to remove all the curtains at the windows of my house and to do away with wall-to-wall carpet. There are so many simpler things you can use at the windows like screens or blinds or window shades. And area rugs that show the wood floors will look less cluttered."

Two designers have resolved to live closer to nature in 1981. Said Everett Brown, winner of the 1980 American Society of Interior Designers (ASID) designer of the year award, "I'm going to make it a point to keep fresh

flowers in at least one room of my house at all times in 1981. And, I'll also get out some big vases and put

for other rooms as well. Allesandro, the home-furnishings product designer who was also cited by ASID for his design work in 1980, has the same idea. "I will live closer to nature. I'll have more plants and fresh flowers in my apartment in New York. And in the Catskills, where I have a country place, I am going to put a skylight in the ceiling so I can look up and see the trees. I will install outdoor lights, too, so I can look out and enjoy the view at night," he





## Future meat markets will offer meat for less money

The meat market of tomorrow may be in California today. This past week I have visited two markets that could be the way of the future in meat merchandising. One, in San Jose, "Moore Meat - for less," the other in San Rafael, "The Meat Deal." Both are based on the same premise, "Do it yourself and save" or "Don't pay

the butcher — be one. Harlan Moore has been in the meat business for years. He has owned and operated old-fashioned conventional meat markets as well as modern self service stores. What he has now in "Moore Meat - for less" is, in a sense, a combination of the two - a newfangled old-fashioned do-it-yourself meat market.

He provides the same

consumer that the old-fashioned butcher used to provide, such as answering such questions as, "How do you roast this roast?" or "What cut should I use for this reci-' But he doesn't cut it for you. You buy the whole sub-primal piece own. By doing so, you save from 30 to 60 per-

In a food processor with the coarse shredding disk, coarsely grate mushrooms; or knife-chop coarsely There should be about 3 cups.

In a medium saucepan melt the butter; add the onion and cook gently, stirring often, until golden brown and tender. Add mushrooms and cook rapidly, stirring often, until wilted — have heat high enough so mushrooms do not give off their liquid. Stir in the flour, salt and pepper. Off heat, gradually stir in the broth and milk, keeping smooth. Over moderate heat, stirring constantly, cook until thickened. Makes 31/2 cups.

Note: Because this soup is a gray color, you may want to sprinkle servings of it with minced fresh parsley or chives.



# Allen Ludden recovering

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Television game show host Allen Ludden says doctors and relatives "expected me to die" when he lapsed into a five-day coma, but "the good Lord and Betty White," his wife, pulled him through.

"I'm going to live because of her," Ludden, sounding weary but in good spirits, said in a telephone interview Wednesday.

The long-time host of "Password" collapsed while vacationing Oct. 7, two days after his 62nd birthday. Originally diagnosed as a stroke, his collapse was later determined by a Los Angeles doctor to have been the result of high levels of calcium apparently associated with a previously diagnosed cancer.

"The one that pulled me out of the coma up there was my wife, because the doctors up there had said, 'Forget it,'" Ludden said.

"My brother came out, my son came out, and everybody came out and expected me to die when I was in the coma, and Betty just sat there and held my hand and said, 'No he isn't, he's not going to

After three weeks in Monterey Community Hospital. Ludden flew to Los Angeles in producer Grant

Tinker's private jet and entered Good Samaritan Hospital, where he stayed until Nov. 15.

Except for brief walks and some Christmas shopping, he's been resting at home with his actress wife ever since, taking medication, drinking a lot of water "to wash this calcium out" and watching his diet.

Ludden said he has been advised against chemotherapy or radiation treatments for a malignancy that was mostly removed from his side during an operation last year.

He said the coma may have been triggered by the malignancy, but doctors think the calcium condition can be controlled by drinking water. 'I'm doing remarkably well. Every day I seem a

little stronger and the doctor's very pleased," he said. "Whether I go back on the air is another thing, as far as 'Password' is concerned. They tell me I'm going to be operative and going again within the forseeable future but I'm not ready yet.

"I'm planning very much to go back on the air," he added, "but whether or not I stay on the air, I don't know. Tom Kennedy (who is filling in on 'Password') is doing such a marvelous job that I think maybe





# Teacher likes old algebra texts

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The telephone calls are rolling in at Stan Hartzler's home, and the Universi-

ty of Texas math instructor hopes each will yield another antique algebra book.

Less than 10 days after a column in the Chicago Tribune outlined his fascination with old algebra tests and growing anger with newly published schoolbooks, Hartzler already is reaping the benefits and in a series and the schoolbooks are series and the schoolbooks. fits, and is getting leads on new additions for his current collection of 215 old algebra books.

Hartzler hopes the publicity dragnet will help him obtain enough books to "investigate why the (high school algebra) books coming off the press now are so bad."

His experience as a coach for high school math teams in suburban Chicago several years ago convinced him that algebra texts written between 1890

and 1910 are good enough for today's students.

After he started using a turn-of-the-century text to drill his math teams, they won five straight division championships. And classroom use of old books resulted in nine students scoring perfectly on national college entrance exams when 30 neighboring schools didn't produce even one perfect scorer, he said.

Less-than-brilliant students benefited from using the old texts, too, Hartzler recalled. "I can remember the names and faces that I had in remedial math classes. They had fine minds, but nobody had shown them how to do long division."

So, Hartzler said, he has acquired a "large dis-

gust" for current algebra texts. He's irked by modern books "written by teams of people who too often never see each other to coordinate their philosophy and objectives.'

"Previously, books were written by one teacher who wrote out of his experience — what had worked best for him. These books needed no revisions because they were good in the first place," Hartzler

Books of the educational era - "the heyday of organization," Hartzler calls it - often were written by a one-room schoolteacher. He said those books had to be self-contained because the busy one-room schoolteacher couldn't take time away from other students to present long lectures.

Hartzler's enthusiasm becomes overwhelming. "It is artful the way those students moved from one exercise to another. I get emotional about it, like when I hear Handel's 'Messiah.' Today, those exercises are not even written by the authors. Too often, they are written by high school teachers who live close to the publishing houses," he said. "They pay the authors less that way."

Hartzler is irritated by today's frequently revised math texts, updated with trendy layout and educational fadism. "It was 'new math' in the '60s, 'back to basics' in the '70s and now it's 'problem solving' in the '80s," Hartzler said. "I want to start a new fad -

call it balance — and let's stop the pendulum."

Hartzler said he wants to "develop an informed demand for better books among those (state and school officials) who buy them. A lot of politics is involved here in Texas, and there's not much hope. But plenty of high school teachers are aware of how bad the books are."

Hartzler, who warns "I'm a rather outspoken little beast," suspects that modern math books are "being written for the teachers, not the students.

He sees the use of large, colorful graphics as "the most criminal of fads." Research, he said, indicates that "the more pictures there are in books, the less

Hartzler's algebra textbook research is designed "to show that there have been sudden changes in topics that have no foundation in the classroom.

And he wants to set up guidelines teachers can use to evaluate textbooks, policies to replace politics or high-pressure tactics of publishing firms.

Finally, Hartzler said, he wants to "listen to my customers," the elementary education students he's now teaching at UT, and "to teach in ways I hope they can understand, not in higher educational

The old-fashioned math teaching he advocates may be on a comeback. Until then, Hartzler and his family - wife Shirley and her children Beth, Amy and Michael — will scour antique stores, Salvation Army shops, garage sales and junkyards for old

### CRMWD shows gain

BIG SPRING — The Colorado River Municipal Water District delivered a half-billion gallons more water to its customers in 1980 over the previous year for a 3.10 percent gain.

This was not a record year by any means, for the 16,754,098,382 gallons was well under the peak of 20,357,040,622 in 1974. However, had oil company deliveries been the same for both years, 1980 would easily have set a new high mark for production. In 1974, when there were no restrictions upon oil repressuring deliveries, CRMWD pumped 7,016,668,122 gallons to these customers. Last year, with an almost complete cutoff except for brine wells and unpotable low-flow of the river, the oilfield deliveries stood at only 1,833,178,082 gallons.

Last year's 14,920,920,300 gallons was a record for municipal deliveries topping the previous peak of 13,603,331,200 in 1979. If the 1974 oil deliveries were added to last year's municipal total, the new record would be 21,937,588,000 gallons. The 1980 cities' gain over 1979 was 503,636,000 gallons.

An unprecedented continuity of days of 100 or more degrees and no rain conributed to the record demand of the cities. Heavy rains in September replenished surface supplies, and by the end of the year deliveries to oil companies were being stepped up slightly and should gain substantially in 1981. Total of these deliveries for 1980 was 1,833,178,082 gallons which was 813,902,166 gallons less than the previous

During 1980, Midland took 3,949,728,900 gallons, up 3.38 percent; Odessa took a record 6,763,463,000 gallons, up. 12.63 percent over 1979. Big Spring received 2,964,426,000 gallons, up 9.41 percent; Snyder 1,088,366,000 gallons (the first time it used more than a billion gallons in a year), up 16.35 percent; Stanton, 133,400,000, up 4.74 percent; and Robert Lee, 32,437,000 gallons, up 108.73 percent.

### El Salvador, Guatemala Latin America's bloodiest

NEW YORK (AP) — El Salvador and Guatemala have replaced Argentina as the bloodiest violators of human rights in Latin America, says the Council on Hemispheric Affairs.

In its annual report on human rights released Sunday, the council said that last year "politically motivated violence" accounted for nearly 10,000 deaths in El Salvador and more than 5,000 deaths in Guatemala.

El Salvador's death toll, the report charged, was higher than all other Latin American nations com-

higher than all other Latin American nations combined, largely as a "result of government-condoned right-wing 'death squad' killings."

The council said that despite "shortcomings" in the Carter administration's human rights policy, "lives have been saved, repression has been reduced, and in a number of instances, a movement toward a move democratic society in Latin America toward a more democratic society in Latin America has taken place because of it."

## Busbee appeal dismissed

AUSTIN — The Court of Criminal Appeals this week dismissed the appeal of William Durwood Busbee, who pleaded guilty May 25, 1978, in Midland County to possession of more than four ounces of marijuana.

# British draft draws military fire

LONDON - Two out of three Britons favor bringing back compulsory military service, if only to ease the nation's 27 per cent unemployment rate. But a draft faces a formidable opponent: the military

Of those under the age of 21, who would be most affected by a draft, 52 per cent favored it, according to a Gallup Poll conducted for "The Daily Telegraph." Of those who would be least affected — people over 35 — 75 per cent were in favor of consecutation.

In addition to lowering the rate of unemployment, a draft was seen as "smartening up" British youths and military discipline as helping to reduce vandalism.

But the Armed Forces let it be known unofficially that a draft would force a lowering of standards now imposed on volunteers. Further, there aren't enough personnel to train recruits or barracks to house them ent to arm them. Finally, there is no

or equipment to arm them. Finally, there is no money to pay them.

Most of all, the military were said to protest that a draft would ruin the armed forces image as a small, highly-competent group of professionals.

JAKARTA — An Indonesian midwife was arrested after 18 newborn babies were found in her house. She was charged with selling babies to childless Dutch couples at prices ranging from \$40 to \$100.

Police said the babies had probably been sold to the 20-year-old midwife by unmarried women too poor to take care of their children. But they also are checking to find out if any of the babies had been stolen.

**BUENOS AIRES** — An undisclosed number of Argentine army officers have been retired against their wills in order to smooth the transfer of power from President Jorge Videla to General Roberto Viola next March.

The ex-officers receive full pensions but were not officially told why they had to resign. They led the government's anti-terrorist campaign in 1976-77. ### Meningitis outbreak worries health officials

SAN RAFAEL, Calif. (AP) - Marin County health officials are baffled by an outbreak of bacterial meningitis that has killed one youngster and struck 11
others in the past two months.

Dr. Theodore Hiatt, the county's chief of public
health, said Tuesday the outbreak apparently has
been confined to Marin, where it has hit all

The cases, involving children from age 2 to grade-school age, seemingly are unrelated, said Dr. Peter Miller, assistant county health officer. "It doesn't seem to be an epidemic, since the children haven't had direct contact with each other,"

and another child remains hospitalized with compli-

cations, said Miller. The other victims have recovered or are recovering, officials said.

Bacterial meningitis can cause widespread damage to the brain. Death has been reported in under 10

The illness starts as a sore throat, but the affected individual may develop a high fever, stiff neck and severe headache accompanied by nausea and vomiting. When the organism attacks the lining of the brain — sometimes in less than 24 hours — the disease becomes meningitis and the individual needs

Hiatt said the carriers of the disease are adults who have developed an immunity to the bacterium.

### Bangkok flu reaches epidemic proportions

NEW YORK (AP) — Outbreaks of an A-type Bangkok flu have reached epidemic proportions in New York City, causing above-average pneumonia deaths, according to the Department of Health. Spokesman Marvin Bogner said health officials have considered the flu, which first struck the city in late November, to be at "mild" epidemic levels for three weeks. The outbreak is expected to peak in two

weeks.

The assistant health commissioner said officials were concerned about senior citizens and the chronically ill although "not overly concerned for the average healthy New Yorker."

The strain of influenza is a relatively new type of flu virus isolated in Asia two years ago. It produces fever, headache, runny noses, body aches, sore throats and sometimes nausea and vomiting.

In the elderly and the chronically ill, it can cause pneumonia which can lead to death.

Statistics on the number of pneumonia deaths directly linked to the flu were not immediately available.

The health official also said it was virtually impossible to determine how many people had been hit by the flu, but added: "The bug has bitten vir-tually someone in every office, government and

private." The city is operating nine free health clinics and giving free flu shots to those over 65 and the chronically fil, according to Bogner. He said officials began the program in October.

He added that the department was not advising flu immunizations for the general public.



### Sinatra party criticism angers William Smith

WASHINGTON (AP) - Attorney General-designate William French Smith says news reports questioning the propriety of his appearing at a birthday party for Frank Sinatra are "nothing less than scurrilous," a published report says.

The Washington Post reported today that Smith acknowledged attending the party for the entertainer Dec. 12, the day after he was selected for President-elect Ronald Reagan's Cabinet. But the Post said French said he was "totally unaware" of reputed ties between Sinatra and organized crime fig-

Critical accounts of Smith's appearance at the party were in a Washington Post column last month and in a column by William Safire in New York Times on Monday

Sinatra was a part owner of two Nevada casinos in 1963 when his gambling license was revoked by the State Gaming Commission because of his "continued association with Sam Giancana, well knowing his unsavory and notorious reputation." Giancana, who later was murdered, was an alleged mob boss banned from gambling activity in Nevada.

Smith, describing his relationship with Sinatra as 'social and rare - mostly chance meetings on the golf course and that kind of thing," said the appearance at the party would "not affect me in the slightest in making any prosecutorial decisions in the future.

Smith, 63, is a Los Angeles attorney who is also Reagan's personal lawyer. He is in Washington to make courtesy calls on members of the Senate Judiciary Committee. The committee next week begins confirmation hearings on Reagan's nomina-

# Reagan will inherit high inflation

it a 1981 inflation rate exceeding 12 percent and a sluggish economy that will push unemployment as high as 8 percent, the outgoing Carter administration predicts in its forthcoming economic outlook.

The grim forecast, which parallels other projections by the Congressional Budget Office and private economists, is the reason strategists for Reagan are warning the president-elect that the current budget deficit will be "far worse" than originally predict-

David A. Stockman, Reagan's budget director-designate, said Wednesday the task of controlling federal spending - in light of double-digit inflation and sky-high interest rates — "is going to be even greater than we expected."

He told reporters the 1981 federal budget is fast piling up a \$60 billion deficit, the same as last year's red ink and double the figure predicted only months

ago by the Carter administration. As recently as last spring, Carter vowed that the

fiscal 1981 budget would show a slight surplus. Carter's budget for fiscal 1982, which is to be delivered to Congress less than a week before Reagan takes office, is expected to project a deficit of about \$40 billion after \$740 billion in federal spending, sources say.

That budget is based on the Carter administration's economic outlook that sees consumer prices advancing at more than 12 percent for the third year in a row

The Carter budget predicts inflation, as measured by the Consumer Price Index, will rise 12.6 percent in 1981, about the same as last year and only slightly less than the 13.3 percent pace in 1979. This lack of progress on the inflation front occurs

despite last year's severe but short recession, which kept the economy at a virtual standstill for all of The Carter administration assumes that the Gross

National Product, after adjusting for inflation, will not grow at all in the first six months of 1981. However, a 3.4 percent annual growth rate predicted for the second half would mean a 1.7 percent expansion for the whole year.

Historically, that is a meager improvement, particularly after a recession. In 1982, the Carter administration foresees a 3.5 percent growth rate, sources said.

Even if progress is made, "no significant decline in the inflation rate is likely in 1981," with consumer prices rising about 11 percent, the bank said.

Despite the dim outlook, Stockman and Treasury Secretary-designate Donald T. Regan insisted Reagan still can cut federal spending by 2 percent in fiscal 1981 and balance future budgets if the president electic sweeping tay cuts are enacted. dent-elect's sweeping tax cuts are enacted.

Without a 30 percent tax cut over three years, "the deficit will be worse," Stockman warned. "The economy will falter and we won't have the reve-

# Artist, moved by animals, seeks to move viewer

To view an exhibit of Jacquie Marie Vaux paintings is to enter a wildlife preserve. Endangered species, breathing eternal life from water-colred canvases, invite your compas-

And Jacquie Marie Vaux, living amid an animal menagerie in California's Marin County, solicits your

"I want people to be moved," she says. "I want people to appreciate the relevance and beauty of animals and to realize the world would be a much less beautiful place without them."

So Vaux, 36, paints and paints in her San Rafael studio, guiding her brush with her heart and her

more than 10,000 collectors enjoy samples of her work, sold throughout the world. "I have donated paintings to every animal organization I can think of," she says.

Many of the paintings were adapted from photographs taken by Vaux's husband Dr. Jim Damon, on the cou-

ple's trip two years ago to Kenya.

They brought back 3,000 photographs from their trip, which they took in a Volkswagen van throughout the jungles, plains and deserts of the African nation. They encountered, among other

things, an elephant that had designs on derailing their van, two jousting elephants blocking the road, and a tribe of Kenyans whose disdain is such that they raised their spears at the sign of a camera.

For three weeks, Vaux and her husband camped out in the bush, rising before dawn to photograph ani-mals in their natural habitat, unencumbered by the constraints of man. "The animals are so conditioned to

Vaux, "that I saw a lion hide behind a bus before attacking a wildebeest.
"If you get out of the bus or car, you can get attacked. Most of our

seeing people in tour buses," said

photos were taken from our van. But if you go by in a car, they will put their noses on the window. They don't associate people with the vehicles."

Vaux's fascination with animals far preceded her interest in art. As a young girl growing up near Seattle, Wash., she was exposed to wildlife and the outdoors.

Today she has her own gallery and studio in San Rafael, not far from the home she shares with her orthopedist husband, two daughters and numerous animals.

Her current menagerie includes goats, ducks, geese, a pony, a rabbit, five dogs, four cats and a chinchilla on one acre of property in rural San

There are enough animals, it seems, to open a zoo. But zoos, with the restrictions they place on animals, are often not among Vaux's favorite places.

She prefers environments like San Diego Zoo's Wild Animal Park or Marine World Africa, south of San

Francisco, where animals are dis- and endangered species. played in their natural habitat. Many of the animals she paints are housed at Marine World Africa.

"I won't work from a dead animal," she said. "If I can't see the light in their eyes, I can't be moved. I can't feel with them enough to paint

Among Vaux's favorite subjects are cheetahs and a black-maned African lion. She loves zebras and cats, both domestic and wild.

Vaux works four days a week, usually six to eight hours a day, fol-lowing the sunlight as it moves across her studio from the skylight. She alternates between sketching and painting - sketching a figure here, painting over a sketch there.

"I will never run out of animals to paint," she said. "I could paint for three years from the material I have

"My goal," said Vaux, "is to help
the World Wildlife Organization raise funds for the preservation of wildlife

"Animals need all the help they can get. I represent them as truly as possible and each as an individual.

"Unfortunately, there are approximately 11 million patients in the United States who have decreasing vision due to irreversible eye disorder. Some of these visual problems can be corrected through surgery medication and or ontical surgery medication and or be corrected through surgery, medication, and-or optical aids," says Dr. Eleanor E. Faye, medical director of the Low Vision Service for The Lighthouse, the New York Association for the Blind, headquartered in New York City.

Dr. Faye, who is also chairman of the Committee on Low Vision of the American Academy of Ophthalmology, adds, 'Although the majority of patients respond to optical aids, we have not been able to explain the lack of response in a significant number of people."

These are the patients for whom Dr. Faye and other eye centers such as The Lighthouse believe there is promise in this of \$5 billion. decade because of pioneering laboratory and clinical research endeavors in the United States and elsewhere.

Primary funding has come from a \$283,640 bio-medical grant from the National Institutes of Health, and additional funding has been received from philanthropic organizations such as the DeWitt Wallace Fund and companies such as the Westinghouse Electric Corp.



The individual patient's ability to perceive varying degrees of contrast in patterns of different sizes is being measured. According to Marty Schmidt, Ph.D., and John Camisa, Ph.D., sensory psychologists responsible for the contrast-sensitivity testing, "This testing is able to furnish an objective evaluation of visual acuity and also provide statistically significant measurements. With it, we can obtain far more revealing data than is possible through the conventional eye

In their view, "The computer is invaluable because it also measures very small changes in the ability to see, especially important in monitoring patients after treatment for various eye diseases."

These investigators suggest that because contrast sensitivity testing is both accurate and objective, it may well replace the current methods of vision testing for all patients.

"Neither miracles nor cures are expected for our low-vision patients," all members of The Lighthouse clinical research team are careful to explain.

NEW YORK (AP) - Cornerback Lester Hayes, whose 13 regular-season interceptions were a principal reason for the Oakland Raiders' return to the playoffs, was named today The Associated Press Defensive Player of the Year for the 1980 National Football League season.

Hayes came within one interception of tying the NFL's single-season record set in 1952 by Dick "Night Train" Lane when he played for the Los

Angeles Rams. He also has intercepted two passes in each of the Raiders' two playoff games, paving the way to victories over the Houston Oilers and Cleveland Browns and putting Oakland into the American Conference championship game, one step away from the Super Bowl.

Hayes, a four-year pro, received 26 of 84 votes cast by a nationwide panel of sports writers and sports broadcasters, three from each NFL city. His teammate, linebacker Ted Hendricks, was second in the balloting with 18 votes.

The other players receiving more

than two votes were Dallas defensive tackle Randy White with eight, safety Nolan Cromwell of Los Angeles. seven, and New England linebacker Steve Nelson, Atlanta linebacker Al Richardson and Buffalo nose tackle Fred Smerlas, three apiece.

Along with his 13 interceptions (he also had four nullified by penalties). Haves had 43 regular season tackles, nine assists, three quarterback sacks, 25 pass deflections and two fumble recoveries. coach of the Saints. Allen's philosophy, frequently expressed, is that "the future is now. He is noted for trading draft choices including choices he had already swapped away - for established vet-


# Mets sign Tom Hausman



Now that deer and turkey seasons have closed in Texas, the only thing remaining is waterfowl, varmint and quail hunting.

Too many people hang up their guns after deer and turkey are illegal and start preparing for upcoming spring-time fishing bouts. There are a lot of hunters turned fishermen who do not take advantage of some of the finest fishing Texas has to offer. Of course, the winter months are cold and dreary, but those freshwater and saltwater fish don't seem to mind.

There's no way we can describe all good winter fishing locales, but we can relate to you previous winter fishing experiences on the lakes and methods that should produce for

TOLEDO BEND: This resevoir on the Texas-Lousiana border is one of the finest freshwater reservoirs in the state for winter fishing. The temperatures don't drop so drastically in this neck of the woods

Bass anglers can have a heyday on big toledo. Weither you obtain a Toledo Bend fishing guide or not, you're going to be fishing in 20 to 30 feet of water for the most part. Toledo guides will fish creek channels, dropoffs and the edges of moss beds in colder months. Using weighted spoons, jig-n-eel balts and deep running crant balts, clients can load the boat with oversized largemouths.

Striped bass fishing is also excellent on various winter days. Once again, fishing is performed in deep water by the use of silver spoons and stab type baits. Sometimes stripers move to the surface to forage on shad schools on cold days. Crapple fishermen can catch all the slabsides they want when they locate a school of

AMISTAD RESERVOIR: Former fishing guide Larry Scruggs once said of Amistad, "I live in this part of Texas because we'll average the warmest temperatures in the winter than anywhere in Texas."

Amistad is experiencing a tremen dous fishing comeback the last two years. Winter fishing is now as good as it was back in the early '70s. Fishing for black bass requires some deep water angling tactics by the use of slabs, heavy spinnerbalts bumped over the bottom along dropoffs and deep running crank baits. Chances of catching a trophy bass are much better in the winter months as the big females will be carrying spring spawning eggs and seem to be more

The newest craze at Amistad is the striper fishing. The best chances of tripers in the winter is to find flying-feeding birds. Sea gulls and erns constantly search for foraging schools of stripers, making it quite easy for the angler to find striped bass.

Rio, Texas 79940 or call 512-775-5571. POSSUM KINGDOM: If it's white bass you're after, Possum Kingdom can't be beat. White or sand bass fishing is excellent from January through March. Anglers can get into schools of sandies and can catch 100 or more with relative ease. White bass can be easily found in the regionw of The Peanut Patch, Broadway and Caddo Creek. Look for working birds and always keep an eye on the depth sounder. Using white and chrome slab baits in sghools of deep water sandies is a sure bet. Some days the sandies hit the surface and feed on threadfin shad.

PORT ARANSAS: The big red snappers and warsaw are caught this time of year at Port Aransas. Anglers fishing from the party boats can fish for eight hours and come in with several hundred pounds of snapper and warsaw. For some unknown reason, winter fishing here will produce larger fish than in the warmer months. January and February are peak months to catch those oversized deep sea giants. Bay fishing for redfish and speckled trout are also good in the cold months.

LAKE GUERRERO: This Mexico lake is one fine spot to catch black bass in winter months. The lake's water temperature stays warmer and the bass are more active. Winter anglers can catch bass on just about any type of bait and the boat can be

The lake is located near the town of El Fuerte and promises to be one of the finest big bass takes in the world. It's not uncommon to spend 1/4-day fishing and come in with 20 to 30 bass that average four pounds apiece. All you need is plastic worms, spinnerbaits and jigs.


The Sooners outscored the Lumberjacks by 30 points in the second half, but the first half was a different







# Committee wants **UIL** power diluted

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A State Board of Education committee is recommending that the power of the University Insterscholastic League governing body for public school athletics in Texas - be diluted and competition among junior high schools be de-emphasized

The Committee for Special Schools and Athletics recommends the UIL governing body be enlarged from nine to 13 members, not including the league's executive director, and that any junior high sport that makes a student miss even part of a class be

The committee said interscholastic programs require students to spend significant amounts of time during the regular school day in athletic endeavors.'

ATHLETICS IN grades seven and eight are "nonessential activities" that can be reduced to lift students' grades and save taxpayers money. the committee said.

Many junior high schools in Texas offer extensive athletic programs.

The committee offered this recommendation to the Board of Education. which meets Saturday:

'The junior high level program should emphasize regular physical education and intramural activities. Emphasis on interschool competitive activities should be reduced. No athletic endeavor, including preparation and travel time, should be scheduled in a manner that would result in a student's loss of instructional time during the regular school day.

Athletic Director Bill Farney of the University Interscholastic League said, "Local school districts already can do that themselves. It's up to each district.

"The idea is that the students' grades will pick up, that they will go straight home and do homework and study," said Farney, "but I think as one who has a doctorate in education - they probably will throw Frisbees, work on cars or do everything

THE COMMITTEE recommended that the current nine-member UIL state executive committee, which includes seven University of Texas professors, UIL Director Bailey Marshall and Farney, be enlarged to 13 members - seven professors and six citizens "who are knowledgeable in public school extracurricular pro-

Farney said he and Marshall, who are voting members of the executive committee, presumably would remain on the committee, without a vote. "Since we bring cases before the committee, we tend to be looked upon as prosecuting attorneys," said Far-

Nothing substantive is changed

The special committee said the ex-

ecutive committee should govern all UIL operations. Currently, the special committee said, the executive committee is primarily concerned with interpreting rules and "does not function in the true sense as governing-policymaking board."

FARNEY SAID he thought the larger committee would still go to the UIL's 1,151 member schools to get administrators' opinions before changing a UIL rule

"We've been called inflexible," said Farney, "but we are a democratic organization with built-in safeguards

Farney said the special committee's recommendation to make it easier to get a proposal on the UIL's statewide ballot could result in conflicting propositions, such as different dates for the state track meet.

The committee said an official request by three separate UIL district committees from each of the four regions should be sufficient to get a proposal on the ballot. The UIL's Legislative Committee of administrators now determines which proposals are placed on the spring ballot.

Farney said, however, South Texas where the weather is warmer might want a March date for the track meet so schools from that region would have an advantage over Panhandle teams. Schools from the Panhandle might favor a late June date to give their athletes more time to get in shape

The Board of Education committee MHS netters also recommended that:

The UIL's constitution and con- defeat OHS test rules be rewritten to avoid inconsistent rulings by the 169 UIL district committees

- A group of educators be set up in each region to review and rule on written appeals of UIL rulings and interpretations.

- UIL policies should be revised 'to ensure that students are not needlessly penalized for the inappropriate behavior or activities of responsible school district employees."

THE COMMITTEE said its research had shown that the majority of sanctions imposed on school districts for rules violations "actually penalize the students" where "in most instances, the students neither perpetrated nor are they responsible for the rule infraction.

"It is very, very difficult for the UIL to penalize a coach or often even to find out whose fault it is," said Farney. "For one thing, there is the question of civil rights. ... There is no way you can penalize a school without penalizing the youngsters. No state (organization) has found a way to do

'It's a very idealistic recommendation," said Farney, "and if we could WANT ADS find a way to do it, we should copy right it and make a lot of money.

Beck, who was highly recruited following his high school career at Perryton, Texas, told Eastern officials he decided to transfer to the New Mexico school because he was unhappy with the amount of playing time he was getting at Texas.

"I left Texas because of playing time," Beck told ENMU officials. "I wanted to play more my senior year, so I left Texas to gain that opportuni-

Beck reportedly had more than 200 scholarship offers after his high school career, including offers from such schools as Oklahoma, Mississip-

pi, Alabama, and Notre Dame. In the 1979 Sun Bowl game against Washington, Beck rushed for a game high 98 yards in the Longhorns' 14-7 loss. This season Beck was used primarily on punt returns and carried the ball only 15 times for 48 yards.

Goode said Beck will provide much needed help to the Eastern offense

While he will only be playing his senior year at Eastern, we are very excited to have an athlete of his galiber on the team," said Goode. "He is definitely an excellent runner."

# North Carolina upsets Terps

The Maryland Terappins are rated No. 8 in the country, but it's tough to pull rank in the Atlantic Coast Conference — especially on the other team's

In few other leagues does the homecourt advantage mean as much. And North Carolina, rated No. 16 in America, had it Wednesday night, upsetting Maryland, 75-66.

Maryland Coach Lefty Driesell, as expected, was not too happy with his team's performance.

In other action involving the nation's ranked teams, No. 3 Virginia beat North Carolina State 63-55; No. 4 Kentucky stopped Auburn 79-66; No. 6 Wake Forest tripped Appalachian State 63-42; No. 9 Louisiana State whipped Vanderbilt 77-61; No. 13 Tennessee turned back Mississippi 73-68 and No. 20 Clemson outscored Georgia Tech 65-54.

Al Wood's second-half shooting and some clutch free throws down the stretch keyed the Tar Heel triumph. Wood wound up with a team-leading 22 points, while Albert King scored 21 for Maryland.

Ralph Sampson scored 24 points and Jeff Lamp had 17 to lead Virginia over North Carolina State. The victory was Virginia's second in the ACC this season without a loss and improved its overall record to 10-0. The Cavaliers have won 15 straight games going back to last season, the nation's ongest winning streak for a college basketball team.

"Quite obviously, Ralph Sampson was the difference," said North Carolina State Coach Jim Valvano. "He's just a great basketball player. If you wanted to start a pro or college franchise today, Sampson is the starting point. He is the most valuable player in the world in that aspect."

The balanced scoring of Sam Bowie, Fred Cowan and Dirk Minniefield helped Kentucky beat Auburn. Kentucky led by five points at 58-53 with 7:18 remaining, then pulled away from the Tigers with solid defense and deadly free throw shoot-

Cowan scored 17 points, Bowie 15 and Minniefield 13 for the Wildcats.

"We almost lost it at one point, but building the lead back is a good sign this team is growing up," said Bowie, referring to the stage where Auburn had trimmed the Wildcats' lead to five points.

Clutch second-half shooting by Jim Johnstone and Danny Young led Wake Forest past Appalachian State. The Mountaineers remained close to Wake Forest throughout the first half

by using a deliberate offense.

But then Johnstone took charge, pouring in nine of Wake Forest's first 16 points in the second half. As Appalachian started collapsing on John-d stone, Young began hitting. Young and Johnstone both wound up with 12 p

Howard Wood scored 29 points, in-cluding 17 free throws, to lead Ten-nessee over Mississippi. Chris Dodds, hit four straight 18-footers at the start of the second half as Clemson bolted to an 18-point lead and coasted past Georgia Tech.





HOLLYWOOD (AP) - With characteristic modesty, John Forsythe terms himself "a vastly usable, not widely talented actor."

Many of his colleagues would say he underestimates himself, but Forsythe

persists: "I figure there are a few actors like Marion Brando, George C. Scott and Laurence Olivier who have been touched by the hand of God. I'm

"My daughters have left the family home, my house is paid for, i have 'Charlie's Angels,' the Michelob commercials and my outdoor series, 'The World of Survival.' I don't have to play the same ... part all the time."

Forsythe is the envy of his fellow actors because of his positions as the boss of "Charlie's Angels." The latter chore requires so little of his time that he terms himself "the most grossly overpaid actor in history

# Whistles, wolf calls greet orchestra's performance

A multitude of talent graced the stage of Midland High School Tuesday night as the Glenn Miller Orchestra performed for an almost full

The original orchestra was organized in 1937 by Miller who was considered to be a giant of the "big band By 1940 his band was one of the top musical organizations in the United States.

When World War II broke out, Miller entered the United States Air Force and organized the famous Glenn Miller Army-Air Force Band. On Dec. 15, 1944, Maj. Miller's military plane disappeared over the English Channel. Many people mourned the passing of such a great talent who had brought enjoyment to so many.

But, Miller's distinctive sound had caught the public's attention. Twelve years later, the Miller Estate authorized the formation of the present Glenn Miller Orchestra. Thus his sound lives on

The concert was an evening of yesterdays with a few sparklings of modern hits — Glenn Miller style.

After playing a couple of introduc tory ice breakers. Jimmy Henderson, the orchestra's conductor since 1975. explained that they tour "50 weeks a year, seven days a week." It is a highly organized unit "with no fill-in musicians and no rental orange coats that must be returned in the morn-

# More subs to be converted

WASHINGTON - The Carter administration has decided to let the Navy proceed with the conversion of two more aging Polaris fleet ballistic missile (FBM) submarines to attack types before the first of the big new Trident boats is combat ready.

This was reported yesterday by Pentagon sources who said the conversions would begin sometime early this fall at about the time the Navy is to take delivery of the USS Ohio, first of the 18,700-ton Trident submarines. But although General Dynamics' Electric Boat Division, the builder, is expected to turn over the Ohio in late August or September, it will be the spring of 1982 before the ship is ready to go on "boomer duty" or patrol, because of crew trainments.

Some administration officials had argued that taking the Polaris submarines out of the deterrent force before the first Trident was ready could send a wrong signal (unilateral disarmament, for example) to foes and friends alike at a time of Soviet aggression in Afghanistan and Kremlin threats against Poland

The Navy, however, contended and contends that, even though it now has 80 fewer ballistic missile launchers at sea because of the withdrawal of five of what had been its remaining 10 16-tube Polaris boats, it has actually increased its nuclear striking capability by retrofitting the longer-range, more accurate Trident I missile into five Poseidon FBMs.

The Polaris boats are armed with the 2,500-mile Polaris A-3 missile, which carries three warheads. But these warheads are not independently targetable and, therefore, would strike a single target. On the other hand, each 4,000-mile-range Trident I now aboard five 16-tube Poseidon submarines carries eight MIRVs or multiple independently targetable re-entry vehicles (warheads).

Seven additional Poseidon submarines are due to be retrofitted with the Trident I. Nineteen other, Poseidon boats will continue to carry the Poseidon missile, which has 10 MIRVs and a range of 2,500

When the Ohio, which will be delivered more than two years later than originally scheduled, goes on patrol it will be armed with 24 Trident Is, each carrying eight MIRVs. Thus, the Ohio, the first of 14 Trident submarines now planned, will be capable of attacking 192 separate targets.

The Navy has already inactivated two Polaris boats, the Abraham Lincoln and the Theodore Roosevelt. Their missile sections have been removed. Three others, the Ethan Allen, Sam Houston and Thomas A. Edison, are undergoing conversion to the attack type

With the permission of the Defense Department the Navy will go ahead with plans to similarly convert two of the remaining five Polaris FBMs the Robert E. Lee, Patrick Henry, George Washington, John Marshall and Thomas Jefferson. Three of ve will continue as ballistic missile submarines until their nuclear fuel runs out. They are expected to operate with one crew each. Then they, too, may be converted to attack types.

The Lee, Washington and Jefferson, however, each have only one crew now assigned them.

# Flying Tiger may return to China mainland

PEKING (AP) - Anna Chennault told Chinese aviation officials during her visit to Peking that despite her ardent championship of the Nationalist Chinese regime in Taiwan, the cargo airline her late husband founded wants to do business with the People's Republic, Chinese sources reported today.

The sources indicated the Chinese government was receptive to the idea of letting the Flying Tiger line operate in mainland China again. They said such a foreign cargo line would be useful as Chinese-Ameri-

Mrs. Chennault, the Chinese-American widow of the late Gen. Claire Chennault and a member of the Republican Party's finance committee, and Sen. Ted Stevens of Alaska, the deputy Republican leader of the U.S. Senate, spent three days in Peking last weekend and are now meeting with Nationalist officials in Taiwan.

Mrs. Chennault was asked at a news conference there if her airline would serve China and replied "no." But the sources in Peking said she made overtures to officials of the Chinese Civil Aviation Administration at a meeting Sunday.

She indicated at a news conference before leaving Peking that her militant opposition to the Chinese communist regime was easing. "I feel we must reassess our position and broaden our base," she

The Chinese sources said other Flying Tiger representatives have made inquiries previously about operating in China, but no formal application has been submitted. They said the line already has permission to fly over southern China on its Southeast Asian routes but is not allowed to land

The airline, which claims to be the world's largest cargo carrier, takes its name from Gen. Claire Chennault's volunteer air force, the Flying Tigers, which in World War II flew for Chiang Kai-shek's Chinese government against the Japanese before the

United States entered the war. A native of Peking, Mrs. Chennault married the general in China in 1947 and went to the United States with him in 1948, the year before the communists took over. He died in 1958. She was the airline's vice president for international affairs from 1968 to 1976 and is now listed as a consultant to its office in Washington, D.C., where she makes her home.

try of El Capistrano. A Marine spokesman said the evacuation exercise held Dec. 11, was modeled after similar Marine operations in Saigon and Cambodia during the Vietnam war and "had nothing to do with Iran," where 52 Americans have been held hostage for more than





# Careful reading, right tools help at tax time

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first in a series of tax tip articles provided by the Permian Basin Chapter of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.

Most chores aren't hard if you've got the right tools. With proper study of the instructions, and perhaps people to turn to for advice, you can usually handle any task.

Taxes are no exception. The instructions that come with your tax package should answer most of your questions.

Your questions concerning 1980 tax returns will be answered at the "Taxes and You" program. This public service course is sponsored by the Permian Basin Chapter of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service. This informal two-night course will be offered on Jan. 13

and 15 from 7 to 10 p.m.

More than 25 CPAs will volunteer their time to provide taxpayers with instructions and question-and-answer sessions. The program is open to the public at a charge of \$1 per person to cover administrative costs.

Advice is also available free by calling the IRS forms/tax information number listed in the telephone directory. Here are some tax "tools" to get you through the job of taxes with maximum ease:

1. Be organized. Starting in January, keep tax records, even if you think of yourself as "just an average taxpayer." Keep all your wage statements (check stubs) together. They're useful to check the accuracy of Form W-2, "Wage and Tax Statement," you get from your employer in January. They're invaluable if you don't get your W-2 for some reason.

Even if you don't think you'll itemize deductions, keep receipts or records on expenses that are tax deductible. A list of the most common deductions is in your tax instruction book. Sometimes we get financial surprises that suddently make it advantageous to itemize deductions.

If you already know that you will do something that will make it beneficial to itemize, good records are doubly important.

2. Start early. Even if you plan to file later in the season, look over the tax instructions, forms and your tax records in January.

You may find that you need formsnot included in your tax package or
you might discover that you're missing an important receipt. Whatever
the case, if you require additional
documents before you can prepare
your return, it's a lot easier to allow a
couple of months than to wait until
you're up against the deadline.

This is particularly true if you find you need to contact an employer, a financial institution or a place of business for a copy of a document, because you have no control over the speed with which they'll respond.

3. Take full advantage of available free help. Free information and assistance are available from IRS by calling the forms/tax information number listed in the telephone directory. The IRS also has more than 90 free publications available. Use the order form in your tax package to obtain any of these. Your public library may have step-by-step tax instructions available on cassette tape, prepared by the IRS.

Many communities have free tax assistance available at VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) sites. VITA volunteers serve any taxpayer who has a basic return and needs assistance, but feels he or she cannot afford a professional tax preparer. Tax Counseling for the Elderly is a

similar service for taxpayers who are 60 or older. The volunteers are specifically trained to handle tax matters important to older Americans.

Information on VITA and Tax Counseling for the Elderly locations is available by calling the IRS forms/tax information number.

4. Read the instructions. Most of your questions are answered in the tax instructions, which follow the sequence of the tax return. Tax instructions are now easier to read and understand and are in less technical language than ever before.

Most forms are designed so that if

you take them line by line, reading and following each line carefully, the form will lead you through itself.

Careful reading is the key. A missed line or a figure carelessly placed on the wrong line — say, your wages on the line that asks for interest — can result in inconvenience to you or a possible delay of your refund.

Check back over the basics. No matter how careful you think you've been, recheck your whole return before you file it.

One of the most common errors is caused simply by copying the wrong dollar amount from the tax table. Be sure you are reading from the correct

Une and column

Double check for math errors and transposed numbers. It's easy to write 417 when the correct number is

A few minutes spent checking accuracy is worth you while. Errors cause you inconvenience and may even result in a bill for more tax or a delayed refund.

6.Check attachments. You may use additional forms or schedules, such as Schedule A for itemized deductions. Make sure your name and Social Security number appear on each and that all of them are attached to the return.

It's easy to omit an additional form or schedule and such an omission can delay the processing of your return. Attach your schedules in alphabetical order and your forms in numerical order. Use a stapler, if possible. Paper clips or folded corners are not secure ways of attaching things.

Be sure your W-2, "Wage and Tax Statement," is securely stapled in the place marked for it. If you had more than one employer, be sure you have a W-2 from each one. If you do leave out any of the required attachments, wait until the IRS notifies you. Then send the requested document back with a copy of the notice.

7. Late W-2s. If you worked for more than one employer, be sure you have received W-2s from each before you prepare your taxes.

If you find you omitted income because you filed before all your W 2s arrived, you will need to file an amended return, Form 1040X. If you have a refund coming from your original return, wait until you receive it before you file the amended return.

Identify your payment. If you have a balance due, always pay by check or money order. Never send cash with a tax return.

On the face of the payment, write the tax form number and the year for which you are paying and, especially important, your Social Security number. If your payment is separated from your return, there will be no problem getting them together again.

 Sign the return. A return with no signature is not a properly filed return and cannot be accepted as a legal document.

The Internal Revenue Service Center will have to contact you for your signature, a sure way to slow down refunds. Remember, on a joint return, both husband and wife must

Each signature must be original. If you file a photo copy of a return, be sure to sign after you make the copy.

10. Use peel-off label and coded envelope. The peel-off label is one the cover of the tax package you get in the mail. The coded envelope is inside the package.

Both are designed to speed up pro-

cessing. Using the label eliminates two of the most common causes of refund delays — illegible names or addresses and incorrect Social Security numbers.

If your address has changed, the correction should be written on the label. If the Social Security number is incorrect, contact the IRS for directions before you file your return.

Wait until you have the final copy of your return prepared before you put on the label. While it's a "peel-off" label, it only peels off once. If you choose to hire a tax preparer, insist that he or she uses the IRS label too.

11.Choose a preparer carefully.

Most preparers maintain high professional standards of integrity, but you need to be wary of the few who don't.

Remember, no matter who prepares the return, you are legally responsible for its contents.

ble for its contents.

Some things to look for when choos-

ing a preparer:

(1) He or she will complete the Paid Preparer's Use Only section at the bottom of the return. You get a copy of the return which contains that information (this applies only if you pay this person to prepare your return).

(2) Be uery cautious of anyone who claims a special relationship with the IRS or who "guarantees" refunds before seeing your tax information.

(3) Many reputable preparers work only during the filing season. However, you should be able to find them at any time of the year in case there is a question about your tax return.

Finally, mail the return (or have the preparer mail the return) as early as possible, particularly if you want a

quick refund.

Remember, good records are the key to everything in taxes. If you aren't keeping 1981 tax records yet,

aren't keeping 1981 tax records yet, now's the time to start. To register for the "Taxes and You" program, fill out the registration form that will run in The Report-

# Standardized test recalled following theft of booklets

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — A Scholastic Aptitude Test is being recalled throughout the nation after 120 test booklets were stolen from a car.

bookiets were stolen from a car.

The Educational Testing Service ordered the recall because of the possibility the standard college entrance

sibility the standard college entrance exam may have been photocopied.

A box containing 120 copies of the test was stolen Christmas week from the car of a test supervisor in a suburb of Los Angeles while the supervisor was mailing a packet of the test booklets, said Mary Churchill, an ETS spokeswoman.

"We think someone was just trying to help themselves to a Christmas present," Ms. Churchill said. "They were probably greatly disappointed to find a bunch of SATs."

The box and 119 of the test booklets were found New Year's Eve in a trash bag behind the home of a suburban newspaper editor.

Ms. Churchill said the theft would have no affect on other tests or scores by high school students.

The stolen test, which took 18 months to prepare, will cost about \$100,000 to replace, she added.

# Principal 'would drop' three girls

BUCKEYE, La. (AP) — Without "some show of judge power" at Buckeye High School, the school principal said he would drop from the rolls three white girls who had been attending class there in defiance of a federal busing order.

Michelie Laborde, Linda McNeal and Ramona Carbo have been escorted to the all-white Buckeye school this week by police and then by state District Judge Richard Lee.

But Lee said Wednesday his appearance had disrupted education at the rural school, and he would not return until after a hearing before a rival federal judge next week.

"If the girls are here (Thursday) without some show of judge power or some law enforcement officers, I'll drop them," said Principal Charles Waites.

Lee, Waites and the girls' parents and guardians have been summoned to appear before U.S. District Judge Nauman Scott on Jan. 15 to explain why they should not be fined for defying his desegregation busing order for Rapides Parish public schools.

The parents gave custody of their daughters to friends in the new Buckeye attendance zone after Scott ordered 108 children in the seventh and eighth grades bused to racially integrated Jones Street Junior High in Alexandria, about 15 miles away.

Only 22 of the 108 Buckeye youngsters now ride the bus to Alexandria The others attend two new private

Scott to fine Lee \$1,000 a day and to impose \$500 a day fines on the parents, guardians, Waltes, Superintendent Allen Nicholls and a local constable who accompanied the girls to

classes Tuesday.

Lee's lawyer Dan Alexander said he expected the U.S. Supreme Court ultimately to rule on the question of whether parents may transfer custody of their children to avoid forced busing.

Lee approved the custody swap last fall, and Scott called it "a sham" to circumvent desegregation.

Lee, contending the case was strictly a Louisiana domestic matter in which his court had sole jurisdiction, ordered deputy sheriffs to enroll the girls at Buckeye on Dec. 4.

Scott ordered the deputies away and threatened to fine anyone who tried to enroll the girls at Buckeye after Christmas holidays ended Jan.

On Monday, Lee sent state police to Buckeye with the girls.

Scott ordered the troopers — and every Louisiana official — to stop interfering in the desegregation

On Tuesday, Lee came to the school with constable Newton Paul Jr., who escorted the girls to classes. Scott sent a U.S. marshal to order the constable out.

When Lee and his lawyer showed up on Wednesday, Scott ordered the con-

tempt-of-court hearing.

The Buckeye affair is the second confrontation between Scott and Rapides Parish parents, who are an-

noyed over the busing order. When classes began in September, parents in the Forest Hill community began a "squatters' school" in an elementary school that Scott had ordered closed. Its students were to be bused elsewhere.

Scott ordered the Forest Hill school off-limits to everyone, at the risk of fines ranging from \$100 to \$300.

# Police fear 'bounty hunters' at work in troubled Buffalo

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — Buffalo police say they're concerned about reports that some black "bounty hunters" are frequenting city bus stops in hopes of catching the killer or killers of eight black men.

"I'm concerned that these so-called bounty hunters might harm innocent persons mistaken for the killer," said Homicide Bureau Chief Leo J. Donavan.

"Individuals acting without police power are prone to make mistakes through inexperience or panic. Everyone has a right to protect himself, but to act as a bounty hunter might very well be in violation of the law," he said Wednesday.

His comments came as the Buffalo Courier Express said some blacks are trying to lure the killer or killers out of hiding.

"I guess you could call them bounty

hunters. They're after the reward money," Councilman James W. Pitts told the newspaper.

The Common Council has approved a \$25,000 reward, the Erie County Legislature is considering offering another \$25,000 and private groups have raised another \$50,000.

Donovan said anyone found using an illegal weapon to make an arrest might forfeit the reward money because he was acting outside the law.

Seven black men have been killed here and one in nearby Rochester since September. On Wednesday, checks totaling almost \$14,000 were distributed to families of the men

slain in the Buffalo area.

Daniel Acker, president of the Buffalo branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, oversaw the distribution of checks to the victims' families.

# Exporters signal oil price hike

The cost of the oil Americans obtain from the Persian Gulf and the North Sea is continuing to climb as more petroleum exporters signal their intentions to raise

In the latest moves since a new round of increases began last month, the United Arab Emirates was reported to be raising the price of its oil \$2 a barrel, while the British National Oil Corp. said a new price for North Sea oil probably would be set by the end of the

Industry sources said the British increase was likely to be between \$2.50 and \$4 over its current price of \$36.25 for a 42-gallon barrel.

'We are following world market prices," the Gulf News Agency quoted British Energy Minister David Howell as saying after meeting in Abu Dhabi with Mana Saeed Oteiba, the oil minister of the United Arab

Britain is not a member of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, but usually follows prices set by OPEC nations. OPEC decided recently to allow prices to rise by about 10 percent.

The increases by the cartel and other exporters are expected to add up to 8 cents a gallon to the cost of gasoline and heating oil in the United States. Most American refiners, who also are facing rising oil costs at home, have raised wholesale prices of these products by between a penny and 5.5 cents a gallon since late De-

Britain and the United Arab Emirates, which is an OPEC member, each provide the United States with

about 200,000 barrels of oil a day, or a total of 2 percent of American oil needs. America imports nearly half the 16.8 million barrels of oil it consumes daily.

Platt's Oilgram Price Report, a daily trade newspaper published in New York, said the increase by the United Arab Emirates would raise the price of a barrel of the country's high-quality Murban grade of crude

The reported move was not immediately confirmed by companies dealing with the Persian Gulf producer, which cut its oil output 5 percent on Jan. 1 to 1.62 million barrels a day.

An increase in British oil prices has been expected following recent price increases of \$3 to \$4 a barrel by Libya, Algeria and Nigeria, OPEC members whose oil is of similar quality to that produced in the North

Other OPEC members raising prices include Vene zuela and Indonesia

Libya's increase raised its price from \$37 a barrel to OPEC's new maximum of \$41 a barrel for official prices. The other two countries raised prices by \$3, to \$40 a barrel, but charge premiums of \$1.25 to \$3 a barrel on some sales.

Oil prices set by the United Arab Emirates often move in tandem with those charged by Saudi Arabia, the world's largest petroleum exporter. The Saudis, who supply 8 percent of U.S. oil needs, began the current series of OPEC increases in mid-December, raising their crude oil price from \$30 to \$32 a barrel.

OPEC oil ministers subsequently decided to let the cartel's prices risehby 10 percent to a new average of about \$35 a barrel - 171 percent above the average price at the end of 1978.

# Quaker State recalls defective oil

OIL CITY, Pa. (AP) - Quaker State Oil Refining Corp. has asked distributors of its DeLuxe 10W-40 and Super Blend 10W-30 motor oils to return the products if they don't perform in cold weather.

Use of the oil could lead to hard starting or possible engine damage, said a spokesman for Quaker State, producer of the nation's largest selling brand name motor oil.

'It is our understanding that we've only had several cases where there was any sort of engine damage. In all others it was hard starting or the (dashboard) oil light staying on," the spokesman said Tuesday.

In letters to distributors of the oiltacross the country, Quaker State also asked that sales of certain shipments of the oil be halted, the spokesman said.

"We don't have a figure for how much of it is bad. What we're doing is atting on hold all of this particular oil that was produced between Nov. 13 in Dec. 23 at our refineries if Congo, W.Va., and Farmer's Valley, Pa.." the spokesman said.

An additive bought from a Quaker State supplier caused the defect, the company said.

We corrected it by eliminating this additive so that all our current shipments have outstanding low-tem perature performance," the spokes man said in a telephone interview.

The affected oil does not flow as easily in cold weather as it supposed to because of the additive.

For instance, under low temperature performance the 10W-40 product performs like a 20W-40 motor oil," the spokesman said. The figures refer to oil flow characteristics. A 10-weight oil flows more easily in cold temperatures than an oil with a higher

The Quaker State spokesman said the company has received "more than five and less than 50 major complaints from consumers," because of the oil in question.

Quaker State has made arrangements to have those vehicles with damaged engines repaired. The spokesman said those cases were centered in the Sioux Falls, S.D.,

Distributors of the two affected

Quaker State brands are being asked to return affected batches for new oil on a even-exchange basis.

The spokesman said the company hadn't estimated how much the replacement will cost.

In December, Speedee Lube oil and lubrication shops in the Omaha, Neb., area called back about 4,000 vehicles because of Quaker State oil which turns jellylike in cold weather.

The company spokesman said Quaker State authorized that move, but he said that particular batch was isolated in Omaha and Sioux Falls and was unrelated to the replacement program now in progress. The number of vehicles that experienced problems in those two cities was small, he



# **Epitaph written** for Carter policy

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - Hodding Carter III may well have written the epitaph for President Carter's foreign policy when he said the bureaucratic fight between Zbigniew Brzezinski and the State Department produced a "Tower of Babel" that had many voices purporting to speak for the

U.S. government. Hodding Carter, chief spokesman for State when Cyrus R. Vance was secretary, calls the national security adviser a "rat terrier" and writes in the February issue of Playboy that the president should have told him to 'shut up." It is the latest and perhaps the

loudest shot yet fired in the bureau-

cratic war that has been going on between the State Department and the National Security Council, now headed by Brzezinski, since the NSC was elevated from obscurity in the Nixon administration by Henry A. Kissinger. The council, formed after World War II, is the White House organiza-

tion responsible for gathering and channeling intelligence and foreign policy information to the president. The fight between the NSC and State reached its peak last spring when Vance quit as secretary in the wake of the failed attempt to free the

52 American hostages in Iran. Brzezinski recommended the military mission be mounted and Vance opposed it. Carter chose Brzezinski's view, and the soft-spoken Vance submitted his letter of resignation after discovering that the raid had been approved at a meeting to which he had not been invited.

Though Vance indicated the raid decision was the chief cause of his departure, there have been persistent reports - which he has done little to dispute since leaving the administration - that he and Brzezinski were embroiled in a running battle for supremacy throughout their tenure in

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market lost more ground today after a weak attempt to rally from

Wednesday's selloff. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which fell 23.80 on Wednesday, was off another 6.74 at 974.15 by noontime today.

Losers held a slight edge on gainers in the mid-day tally of New YYork Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Trading slackened off from Wednesday's record pace.

Wednesday's sharp drop came after a well-known investment advisor, Joseph Granville of Holly Hill, Fla., advised his clients to sell all

their stocks. More than a hundred issues were delayed in opening as a result of the wave of sell orders that hit the market. By the close, trading volume on the Big Board had reached 92.89 million shares, breaking the old rec-ord of 84.08 million set last Oct. 5.

Today the Dow Jones industrials edged up a point in the first hour. But shortly afterward the market yielded to renewed selling

pressure. Among actively traded blue chips, DuPont rose 1/4 to 43 % and Union Carbide gained % to 53%. But Inter-national Business Machines slipped ¼ to 68¼, and General Motors lost ¼ to 46¼.
The NYSE's composite

index dropped .45 to 76.84. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index fell 1.19 to 337.90.

Volume on the Big Board totaled 23.86 million shares at noontime, down from 38.64 million at the same point Wednesday.

Bill would cut one tax, hike another

AUSTIN — Property taxpayers in Midland would receive more than \$1.4 million in tax relief while local sales tax revenues would increase by more than \$2.9 million under a plan by Victoria Rep. John Sharp to substitute sales tax revenues for property tax revenues.

sharp has prefiled a proposed constitutional amendment (HJR 16) to authorize exemption of residence homesteads from taxes for any purpose other than retirement of bonded indebtedness. Also prefiled by the second-term lawmaker is HB 317, a bill to make up the revenues lost from the exemptions by allowing cities and counties to split a one-cent increase in the sales tax.

The bill also provides for reimbursement to school districts of \$350 million by the state to further reduce property taxes.

Pay increases proposed for top federal officials

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is recom-

mending a 22 percent pay raise for Congress, Cabinet members and other top federal officials.

In making the recommendation Wednesday, the outgoing president said he realizes "the salaries already being paid these officials look very large to the average to provide the salaries." the average taxpayer."

But he said the people qualified for top government jobs normally are already highly paid "and there is a limit to the financial sacrifices they can afford to

"Compensation levels today have fallen below the point at which they provide adequate monetary recognition of the complexity and importance of top federal jobs," Carter said in a written message to Congress. "The financial sacrifice demanded of top federal officials is becoming far too great."

The raise recommended by Carter would affect about 40,000 people. Cabinet salaries would go from \$69,630 a year to about \$84,000 and congressional salaries from \$60,662 to \$74,000. The salaries of top White House aides and thousands of other officials also would be raised by the same percentage.

# McGovern gets tacky with priest

HOVEN, S.D. (AP) - A Roman Catholic priest who criticized campaign workers for leaving leaflets on cars parked outside church says he's sad that a letter from former Sen. George McGovern called him a "horse's ass" and "a disgrace" to the church and to politics.

"The letter doesn't hurt me, but it saddens me," said the Rev. Leonard A. Nemmers of St. Anthony's Rectory at Hoven.

Nemmers had asked McGovern for an apology for some campaign tactics during the November election, which the veteran senator lost to Rep. Jim Abdnor.

A McGovern campaign committee distributed literature on windshields of cars parked at church services, and the priest, a registered Democrat, objected, contending the workers were using the church for politics.

Nemmers said he received an apology from campaign manager Harvey Wollman and thought the issue was dead.

Then came McGovern's letter, dated Dec. 18. "Far from giving you an apology, I want to say that if I had to pick the Number One candidate for the biggest horse's ass in South Dakota in 1980, you would win hands down. I think you are a disgrace, both to the church and to decent politics," said the letter.

Nemmers paid to have the letter printed in the

"I had the letter printed ... because a man of his stature shouldn't be writing letters like that," Nemmers said. "It's uncalled for. Throughout attacked his person.

Nemmers said the letter indicated McGovern was bitter over the election loss.

McGovern was unavailable for comment on the letter, but longtime aide George Cunningham said the letter had to speak for itself.

McGovern's secretary, Pat Donovan, said she typed the letter for McGovern.

# Taxpayers will lose in banks' lawsuit

DALLAS (AP) - Taxpayers will be the big losers "as usual" - if 52 Dallas-area banks win a lawsuit being tried here that challenges local governments' rights to include bank stock in making tax assess-

'If they (the banks) win this one, it will have statewide effects," said Dallas County tax official A.L. Curtis as jury selection began for the trial. "It would set a precedent ... that the banks could not be taxed on anything but real estate and that would take a great deal of money from local governments. The taxpayer - as usual - would pay in the long

Jury selection for the suit continued today, with local officials estimating the City and County of Dallas would stand to lose at least \$15 million in tax revenues if the banks can carry the field.

Financial administrators said bank taxes account for about 5 percent of the budget in Dallas County

The 39 bank members of the Dallas Clearing House Association initiated the suit. They claim taxing bank stock violates the Texas Constitution and feder-

The government agency has given General Motors, Ford, Chrysler and American Motors until 1983 for seven of their engine models to meet the 1981 standard for carbon monoxide of 3.4 grams per mile. Cars using these engines will be allowed to meet the standard of seven grams per mile.

"The EPA granted the waivers to give the finan-cially troubled companies flexibility to improve the competitiveness of these cars.

"Agency officials said the cars are particularly important both to the economic health of the companies and to the nation's need for more fuelefficient vehicles," the EPA said in its official announcement.


