Progress noted in hostage talks

The Speaker of Iran's Parliament said today "all roads" are open to settling the hostage problem and that he expects approval of two emergency bills aimed at solving the crisis by Friday - four days before the inauguration of Ronald Reagan, who has

warned he will conduct talks with a "clean slate."

In another action that could indicate progress, the prime minister's office today advised Iranian ministries, firms and individuals with claims against the Unit-

ed States to submit documents to substantiate their claims to a government "claims committee" within 30 days, according to the official Pars news agency.

Parliament Speaker Hojatoleslam Hashemi Rafsani told a news conference in Tehran that "There is nothing important in these bills that would necessitate a no vote. However, it depends on the discussion and the elaborations in the Majlis tomorrow.'

Asked whether approval of the bills would lead to the release of the hostages by Friday, he said, "I can't predict when the hostages will be reeased but we have opened all roads for settling the hostage problem. They will be released if our rights are

Iranian Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai also hinted of a hostage release, saying in a state radio broad-cast, "According to available information, the issue is making progress. We are trying to approach it logically and doing our best to maintain the main line in our relations with American imperialism.

"At any rate, as long as we consider America as an aggressor in the world, we shall not retreat from our position. Even presuming that the hostages are

not abandon our main position, which is fighting imperialism and which emanates from the heart of our ideol-

The two emergency bills were introduced today by Iran's top hos-tage negotiator, Behzad Nabavi, who said in presenting the legislation, "If we do not reach a result by Jan. 16 it is not clear how the negotiations will continue with the new incoming administration.

President Carter has set Jan. 16 as the deadline by which a hostage agreement must be reached if the terms are to be put into effect before Reagan is inaugurated Jan. 20.

Reagan said Sunday he will start on the hostage talks with a clean slate if Carter fails to get an agreement. "I still hope and pray the president will succeed in what he has been trying to do. If not, then we have to start," Reagan said.

The Washington Post, quoting in-formed sources, reported that American negotiators are trying to draft an international agreement, to be signed by President Carter before Jan. 20 and legallly binding on Reagan, setting down terms of a settlement for release of the hostages.

Nabavi said the first emergency bill

asks the Parliament, or Majlis, to approve a third-party arbitrator to settle financial and legal claims between Iran and the United States.

The second bill asks the Majlis to nationalize the wealth of the late shah and his relatives, Nabavi said, a move that would make it easier for the United States to return the shah's assets to Iran.

After Nabavi announced the legislation, the Majlis went into closed ses-sion. A vote is scheduled on the two bills Tuesday.

Another Iranian hostage negotia-tor, Ahmad Azizi, said earlier that the Iranian government has accepted the "commitment" offered by the United States for the release of the 52 American captives.

"We have accepted the commit-ment the United States is making before the government of Algeria." Azizi told a Western reporter in Tehran.

Algerian sources in the Iranian capital said on Sunday they believed a breakthrough in the negotiations was near after the Tehran newspaper Enghelab Islami said Azizi told it in an interview his government would accept U.S. "guarantees" instead of the \$24 billion deposit demanded for

Four persons injured in fire in Dallas Street home

A house fire at 603 N. Dallas St. about noon today resulted in a woman and three children being taken to Midland Memorial Hospital. Few details were available at press time.

According to a spokesman with the Fire Department, the call came in at 11:37 a.m. Six fire trucks and two ambulances responded. By 11:55 a.m., two of the fire units had left, said the spokesman.

Twenty-year-old Pater Madrid was taken to the hospital's emergency room with burns to her face and hands. Hospital spokesmen said the woman had suffered third degree burns and probably would be admitted. The children received minor injuries. Two were Mrs. Madrid's chil. ed. The children received mi dren and the third is related.

The house apparently was rented by the Pater family. No cause for the fire had been determined this morning.

11 children

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill. (AP) - The mother of 11 children who died in a house fire as they slept unattended had often left her children alone and said they were "too bad for anyone else to watch," a neighbor says.

Virginia Williams, 28, was held in the city jail while police investigated the blaze, which broke out early Sunday morning and roared through the brick house. No charges were filed.

Lt. Norman Stevens of the fire department said a space heater in a downstairs living room was to blame for the

One officer with responsibility for juvenile affairs, Gregory Cox, said authorities had spoken with Ms. Williams several times in the past about leaving her 12 children unattended.

'She told me that her 11-year-old girl kept an eye on the other kids all the time," neighbor Ethel Bobo said of Ms. Williams, who was pregnant at the time of the fire.

"I told her I'd keep an eye on the kids, but she told me they were too bad for anyone else to watch. But they were nice kids, real nice kids," she said.

Ms. Bobo said she had taken groceries to the house several times and frequently fed the children. 'Those kids were alway hungry," she said. "They were over here all the time getting something to eat. And they

didn't have any clothes."

Eleven of Ms. Williams' children, aged 10 months to 11 years, were home when the fire broke out shortly after 2 a.m., authorities said. A 12th child was believed to have been staying with friends or relatives.

"I kicked that back door open and called to them," said Lonzo Blain, who lives across the street. "I could hear their little feet hitting the stairs. But the smoke got them - they never made it.

"They stood there a long time," he said, "and they never made it.'

An East St. Louis police officer said Ms. Williams told authorities she had been riding around at the time of the fire. When she arrived at the scene, "She just turned away screaming, 'Lordy, Lordy, Lordy. Why my children, Lord?"' said neighbor Joyce Brown.

The fire brought charges from firefighters that city officials "played Russian roulette with citizens" by laying off 15 firemen recently.

Mayor Carl Officer, whose 1981 budget forced the layoff of 90 city employees, said more firemen would have made

"It was the professional judgment of my fire department that nothing could be done to save those children,' Officer said. "That house was a matchbox."

Early elections expected for new Israeli Knesset

JERUSALEM (AP) - Prime Minister Menachem Begin said today he favors early elections, making it virtually certain that Israelis will go to the polls in June instead of Novem-

"The tendency by most of the ministers was for early elections. This is also my position," Begin told reporters after a special Cabinet meeting, called after the resignation of his finance minister Sunday stripped the Begin coalition of its majority in the Knesset, or Parliament.

Begin's ministers were to consult with their parties before convening another Cabinet meeting Tuesday or Wednesday to reach a final decision on elections, officials said.

If new elections are ordered, Begin would remain the chief of a caretaker administration until the new Knesset met and approved a new govern-The newspaper Maariv said Begin's

advisers urged the adoption of legislation dissolving the Parliament and advancing the November election of a new legislature to June. The opposition Labor Party, which

is favored to win the election, said it would introduce the legislation if the government didn't.

'The last curtain will almost certainly come down today," said

The crisis for Begin's 31/2-year-old coalition government came to a head Sunday when Finance Minister Yigael Hurvitz quit after the Cabinet rejected his demand that it postpone

indefinitely pay raises for the nation's 58,000 teachers.

Instead, the Cabinet voted 11-2 for a compromise accepting the teachers' demands in principle but postponing the payment of higher salaries. The increases, recommended by a government commission, would raise the monthly salary of a teacher with nine years' experience from \$480 to \$546. The average Israeli's wage is about

Hurvitz argued the raises would spur other groups to demand pay increases that would fuel a new inflationary spiral at a time when he was trying to curb the inflation rate, which hit a world record of 131 percent last year.

Hurvitz, whose resignation takes effect Tuesday, said the other two Knesset members from the Rafi Party would bolt Begin's coalition, leaving the prime minister with 58 seats at most in the 120-member Knesset and dependent for survival on a handful of independent parties.

Hurvitz' resignation was the sixth defection from Begin's Cabinet since it took power in June 1977. It was the first Israeli government not headed by the Labor Party since Israel became a state in 1948.

Shlomo Lorincz, the chairman of the parliamentary finance committee who tried to work out a compromise between Hurvitz and Education Minister Zevulum Hammer, said Begin, who heads the Likud Party, told him he would call for early elections before the Labor Party could carry out its threat to bring down the govern-

"It is impossible to continue with a limping government," Lorincz told Israeli Television. "My understanding is that there will be a motion to dissolve the Knesset.

Hammer, who had threatened to resign himself if the teacher's raises were blocked, said his personal preference was "that the cabinet endure. But it depends on whether the government can get honorable support in the Knesset.'

Haim Corfu, the government whip in the Knesset, predicted the govern-ment could survive Hurvitz's walkout and said there was no need for Begin to resign or call for an early election. But he said he thought early elections were likely, adding, "There were governments that resigned over much less honorable issues than this."

Calls from citizens were instrumental in making some of the arrests, he adds.





Paratroopers hurt when chutes tangle

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Two National Guard paratroopers whose parachutes became tangled during a jump suffered broken bones and were hospitalized after they came down together, supported only by one par-tially working chute, their command-

Capt. Dan Vaughn and Warrant Of-ficer Rodney Fakatou, both of Salt Lake and members of the 19th Special Forces, were in stable and satisfactory condition at the Veterans Administration Hospital here.

Maj. Carmen T. Bria, commander of the Service Company of the Green Beret unit, and Lt. Col. Terry Haslam said Fakatou released some equip-ment on a long line and it fell on Vaughn's chute during the jumps

The equipment, a rucksack and other gear, normally is released be-

fore the paratroopers hit the ground.
"He didn't see Vaughn's chute under him. The equipment landed on the chute and slipped over the side and the line became tangled in the webbing," of Vaughn's parachute, Bria said

Fakatou was then immediately above Vaughn, whose parachute prevented the air from entering Fakatou's chute.

"It took the air out of Fakatou's chute," which collapsed, Fakatou dropped "and they became entangled." Bria said.

Vaughn's chute, then supporting

the weight of both men, was pulled askew by the equipment line, Bria and Haslam said.

"That spilled air out of it and it partially collapsed," and they fell, Bria said. "Then Vaughn's chute caught some more air," slowing them, he said.

Vaughn hit the ground "and bounced up four feet," Bria said. His chute collapsed and Fakatou fell 20 feet, Haslem said.

Vaughn suffered a separated pelvis and fractured right heel bone, and Fakatou suffered a dislocated knee which will require surgery an injury to the lower back, Bria said.

Bria said he was told the two were in the same room at the hospital, "in good shape, talking and joking, but in some pain.

Bria, a social worker at the state prison, was on crutches Sunday night after suffering heel and knee injuries in the same jumps that day. The landing site, an icy field near Park City, east of here, was like "a block of cement," he said.

Spec. 5 Jerry Graham and Sgt. Mike Parr, both of Salt Lake, also suffered minor ankle and knee injuries, he said.

The jumps were made over Ri-chardson Flats, privately owned

property.

The Service Company was in a C-130, which dropped 12 troopers on each pass. The jumps were from 1,250 feet above ground, the normal altitude for the jumps, Haslam said.

Suspected 'Freeway Killer' found hanged in jail cell

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Private letters and legal papers, but "nothing like a suicide note," were strewn in the jail cell where a man accused in six "Freeway Killer" slayings was found hanged, officials said.

The body of 23-year-old Vernon Butts, who also was a potential wit-ness against another defendant in the series of Southern California slayings, was found Sunday in his high-security cell in the Men's Central Jail near downtown Los Angeles.

He was hanging from a towel wrapped around his neck and attached to a towel rack.

"We're certain" it was a suicide, said Lt. Jerry Minnis.

"There were no inmates in the area at that time of night," he said. "All of the inmates are locked down. Only three people have keys to that

The prisoner was not known to be suicidal, sheriff's Deputy Ralph Mar-

Minnis said one letter found in Butts' cell indicated he was upset about the release last week of preliminary hearing transcripts detailing his confession to police of his part in the slayings.

Butts was checked by a deputy 40 minutes before he was discovered. Minnis said it appeared Butts had placed the towel over the towel bar. tied the ends together, "then lowered himself into the noose by getting into a kneeling position.

Jailers and a doctor were unable to

According to the hearing transcripts, Butts had referred to the slayings as a "good little nightmare" and implicated the chief defendant in the case, 33-year-old William Bonin, who is accused of 14 of the 44 killings which have occurred since 1972.

Butts, an aspiring magician, had not agreed to be a prosecution witness, and prosecutors have said his testimony was not crucial

Two children home from burn center

The children's cousin, Lakephine, 3, will remain in the Oklahoma Children's Memorial Hospital burn center where she is listed in good condition.

According to Nancy Bunch of the Child Welfare Department, the boys were to be immediately transported to Midland Memorial Hospital after their arrival here for follow-up medi-

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Republican majority on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee hopes to ete action Wednesday on the nomination of Alexander M. Haig Jr. as secretary of state, Sen. Charles H. Percy, R-Ill., said today.

Percy, the committee chairman, announced the schedule today at the opening of the third day of hearings on the Haig nomination.

The path to quick action on Presi-dent-elect Ronald Reagan's choice of Haig was cleared under a Senate compromise that also threatens to keep Watergate smoldering after he

is sworn in. Under the compromise, Percy issued a subpoena Sunday night for logs and the index to 100 hours of taped conversations between Haig and then-President Richard M. Nixon in

Senate confirmation hearings began today on two other Cabinet nominations, New Jersey construction executive Raymond Donovan as labor secretary and former South Carolina Gov. James B. Edwards as energy secretary

Edwards testified that "we need to sustain and increase our use of nuclear power." He said the workings of the marketplace were more important in meeting the country's energy needs than regulations, which he said should be reviewed to determine

which are "necessary, valuable, ap-

propriate and cost-effective. Republicans on the Foreign Rela tions Committee agreed to subpoena the index so the committee can determine whether any of the tapes themselves are relevant to Haig's suitability for the top State Department job. In return, Democrats agreed not to

delay his confirmation hearings. The deal cleared the way for Haig to be confirmed by the Senate as soon as President-elect Ronald Reagan is inaugurated Jan. 20.

While Senate Majority Leader Howard H. Baker noted there "is no way you can undo a confirmation," the Democrats presumably would try to force Haig's resignation if the tapes turned up proof of illegal conduct. The tapes, covering May 4 to July

18, 1973, include a June 4 conversation in which Haig, as White House chief of staff in the climactic days of Watergate, advised Nixon he could answer questions by saying "you just can't

recall" details. In his opening statement Friday, Haig denied he was telling Nixon to "pretend not to recall something." Rather, Haig said, he was advising Nixon to review the facts instead of relying on his memory.

Baker, interviewed Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press," said he was confident the committee would find nothing damaging to Haig because the retired four-star general "says there's nothing on those tapes.'

"If there is something on them, Al Haig's in trouble anyway," Baker







When Baker sends his telegram Jan. 19 bearing the names of all those Americans who also demand the unconditional release of the hostages, he will likely be transmitting the message of more Americans than he realizes. That's because many Americans have become distillusioned and disenchanted with the government's handling of the hostage situation.

And when the telegram arrives in Iran more than a few Iranians will know that the American public is extremely upset because of the outright illegal holding of the hostages.

Baker thinks that if the American public expresses its dissatisfaction directly to the Iranian students, there might be a better chance of the hostages being released. Maybe he's right. Hopefully he's right.

At the very least those who participate will have the satisfaction of knowing they became physically involved in trying to resolve the situation instead of merely sitting by watching it happen without them.

The press, however, has spent a lot of time on it. Somebody conducted a lengthy interview with the keeper of the gym. There were several stories spun off the original statement.

There's nothing wrong with that. A good 80 percent of news is pure entertainment and elaboration, but now comes the clinker. Some members of the press, after having itself made the one-liner into a federal project, then begins to criticize Mrs. Hawkins for making too much of a small matter She didn't; the press did. Unfortunately this is an example of a relatively common phenomenon that results from some people of the press deriving most of their information from the press. Too often we stare at our own navels, create our own fantasies and then comment on them. In the meantime, the real world has gone on about its business.

There is a parallel between us and some literature professors. A guy like William Faulkner writes a novel. Professors begin to study it and then write lengthy, ponderous analyses about what Faulkner really meant when he said the tree cast a shadow on the outhouse. Pretty soon, other professors are writing articles about the articles. In the meantime, Faulkner has gone on and written several other novels (no doubt having meant nothing more than that the tree cast a shadow on the outhouse).

You can see the same phenomenon at work in academic work in foreign policy areas. You see someone create a mental concept to describe a situation. From that point on, often the concept itself is accepted as an axiom. All further analyses are of the concept which may or may not have had any bearing on reality when it was first created and most surely no longer does months and years later.

CIA looking for a few 'obedient robots'

WASHINGTON - The Central Intelligence Agency's recruiting methods have soured many applicants who can't understand why they have been denied employment in the spook

Some of them, in their frustration, have called my office for help in landing jobs with the CIA - an action which, in itself, raises serious doubts about their grasp of reality and suitability for the spy business

Nevertheless, their complaints bore looking into, because the disappointed applicants suspected they were turned down on grounds of race, gender or religion, or perhaps a skeleton in their family closet, or failure to pass the agency's highly intimate lie detector test.

My associate Dale Van Atta has investigated the CIA's recruitment practices, tapping more than a dozen sources in the intelligence community. He has found evidence of a systematic, and disturbing, policy aimed at hiring a particular type of person and only that type. What the agency wants are people who are bright, but not too bright, imaginative, but not creative, sociable and action-oriented

- but above all, obedient. In short, the CIA wants team players, not boat rockers. "Everybody's cut from the same cookie mold now, observed one high-level CIA official.

"They're looking for conformists, people who are imaginative, but not too pushy. Under this system, Dulles couldn't qualify" - a reference to the agency's ratiocinative founder. Allen Dulles

'Cap' Weinberger's moves panicking the defense community

WASHINGTON - Unease within the defense community over Caspar (Cap) Weinberger has blossomed into panic now that the secretary of defense-designate has booted out "Reaganaut" military advisers, trashed their recommendations and at least pened the door for soft-liners. The certain appointment of Frank

Carlucci, the Carter administration's deputy CIA director, as deputy secretary of defense is the visible tip of concealed events. In a Dec. 20 shouting match, Cap the Knife fired defense expert William Van Cleave as transition chief, blackballed him and his team from Pentagon posts and consigned their reports to ash cans. Since then, a collection of personalities never connected with strong defense have been edging into the Reagan transition.

The most charitable explanation is that this is no conspiracy but the product of Weinberger's nearly total gnorance on defense questions, which was fully revealed in his Senate confirmation hearing. But assuming Weinberger finally learns the names and issues involved, he has lost valuable time in revising defense spending and lost invaluable experts he

In this as in other transition wars these past two months, Ronald Reagan's presence is barely felt. There has been no gesture from either the president-elect or his chief aide, Ed Meese, that they regard a radical reconstruction of the nation's deplet-

od defenses as top priority.

Consider the Reagan-Meese view toward Weinberger's insistence on Carlucci, a civil servant with no Defense Department background, as deputy secretary. Reagan's "kitchen



Novak cabinet" unanimously recommended against it, as did his defense transition team. The president-elect might then have suggested saving the deputy secretary's spot for an expert.

Instead, Reagan acquiesced. That was the situation when Van Cleave, Reagan's defense adviser throughout the campaign, went to California Dec. 20 to brief Weinberger. The secretary-designate was in an ugly mood. He unjustly believed Van Cleave was responsible for a press campaign against Carlucci.

An icy Weinberger informed Van Cleave that he and his team's services were terminated forthwith. The hot-tempered Van Cleave shouted that his responsibility was to advise Reagan himself and Weinberger could not fire him. Weinberger shouted back that Van Cleave was deceiv-

ing himself; he was gone. Weinberger was correct. Early in the transition period when Van Cleave crossed swords with transition overseer William Timmons, a Timmons aide asked Meese whether Van Cleave was under the president-elect's protection. No, replied Meese, fire him if you want. The trouble blew over temporarily, but Reagan has not come to his defense adviser's aid.

Van Cleave was not the only victim. His team's members, including some of the nation's leading military experts, are blackballed. That includes the highly-esteemed Ben Plymale of Boeing, who made the disastrous Dec. 20 trip west with Van Cleave. Plymale had been expected to be an adornment of the Reagan Pentagon as under secretary for research.

The defense plans fastidiously prepared by Van Cleave, Plymale and associates will never be read by Weinberger. That may well prevent any Reagan hurry-up plans for accelerated spending in the current fiscal

Pentagon offices formerly occupied by the Van Cleave team are now mostly empty. In charge of the skeleton crew there is an old Weinberger-Carlucci comrade from HEW days in the Nixon administration: William Howard Taft III, a Washington lawyer who knows even less about defense than Weinberger and Carlucci. Yet, incredibly, Taft has wound up on the list for the department's No. 3 post: under secretary for policy.

Taft has been conferring on defense matters with Richard Stubbing, a Carter administration anti-defense expert at the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) whose views generally coincide with Sen. George McGovern's. With Reaganauts exiled to oblivion, among those briefing Weinberger for his confirmation hearing were two Carter officials: Jack Stempler, assistant defense secretary for legislative affairs, and Brig. Gen. Carl Smith, military assistant to Defense Secretary Harold

Carlucci has been consulting with his close friend (another HEW old hand), John Rhinelander - who was a passionate arms-controller as a State Department lawyer. Carlucci told us Rhinelander will not go into the Reagan administration and denied he even knows Barry Blechman, a former Carter administration armsdowment. But a memo circulating on Capitol Hill lists Blechman as a possi-

Texas Legislature will convene Tuesday

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas' lawmakers meet in their 67th regular session Tuesday to consider a long list of problems brought on by a rapidly growing and shifting population.

Threats of a tax revolt linger in the background as the senators and representatives try to ease the bite of inflation and mounting government costs.

The 140-day lawmaking session must end at midnight June 1, although Gov. Bill Clements, the state's first Republican governor this century, could call one, or more, special 30-day sessions.

30-day sessions.

The Legislature remains predominantly Democratic although Republicans show small gains in both the House and Senate.

The political feeling remain mostly conservative, partikcu-Furthermore, the session will be the testing ground for

Clements' expected plans for a re-election campaign in 1982, and any Democratic wanting to run against him. Gavels rap in both the Senate and House chambers at noon

Tuesday for the formal opening.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby will preside in the Senate where there are now seven Republicans, two more than the 1979 session. Secretary of State George Strake will call the House to order and swear in the 150 representatives, which include 36 Repub-

First order of House business will be the election of a speaker, with Rep. Bill Clayton, Springlake Democrat, expected to gain his fourth term easily. Rep. John Bryant, D-Dallas, will be nominated as an opponent but admittedly does not have enough votes to best Clayton

Clayton told a news conference last week he would not be adverse to still a fifth term as speaker in 1982. Prior to his Houston federal court trial on federal corruption charges, where he was acquitted, Clayton had been considered a possible gubernatorial candidate in 1982.

Housekeeping duties, such as hiring employees and setting expense account limits, will occupy both house the rest of Tuesday and Wednesday. Both Houses are expected to adjourn on Thursday until the

following Monday. Before the formal opening Tuesday, senators will hold a closed-door caucus to elect their president pro tempore or assistant presiding officer for the session. A number of senators whose seniority date back to the 1973 session are eligible for the mostly-honorary job, but Sen. John Traeger, D-Seguin, is expected to be picked.

House action on an election contest involving Rep.-elect

Brown, D-San Antoio, has been delayed for maybe a week. The House committee investigating Brown's claims that many illegal ballots were cast has not completed its report and recommendations. The election canvass showed Schoolcraft

winning by 1,038 votes.

Normally, the governor speaks to a new legislature about the second day of a session giving them his recommendations for a budget and other legislation.

However, Clements has put off his state-of-the-state mes-sage until Jan. 22. He will lead a delegation of about 1,500 happy Texas Republicans to Washington for the festivities surrounding the Jan. 20 inaguration of President-elect Ronald Reagan and Vice President-elect George Bush.

In a news conference last week, Clements said he still felt the Legislature should provide as much as \$1.4 billion in tax relief, in some form.

He said his budget would recommend trimming at least \$600 million fromm the \$26.3 billion budget drawn up by the Legislative Budget Board, which is used as a base by both houses in writing their separate state spending bills.

Clements gave his proposal of initiative and referendum, which would let citizens propose legislation for a statewide vote, a 50-50 chance. He was optimistic about his plan for Alan Schoolcraft, R-San Antonio, and the current Rep. Al legalization of wiretapping in drug control cases.

Bangkok flu epidemic strikes Massachusetts

BOSTON (AP) - A new strain of influenza is sweeping Massachusetts, causing a serious health hazard for the elderly, and health officials say it's likely to get worse before it gets any better.

Type A Bangkok Flu and its major complication, pneumonia, were responsible for 18 percent, or 36, of the deaths in Boston last week, according to Nicholas Fiumara, director of the state Division of Commu-

He stressed the figure may climb higher when the flu season peaks in

The average percentage of deaths attributed to flu and pneumonia at this time of year runs between 4 percent and 5 percent.

Fiumara said this year's flu and flu-related mortality rate is higher than normal because Bangkok Flu is a new strain.

"People have no immunity and they succumb quickly," he said. Health officials say the Bangkok Flu reached epidemic proportions in the Bay State by Thanksgiving. An epidemic is determined by 10 percent absenteeism in schools and industry. Fiurmara said absenteeism has been around 15 percent since the end of November.

The elderly are particularly susceptible to the flu and are most likely to develop complications such as pneumonia or other respiratory infec-

Surgeon general urges smokers to switch to low-tar cigarettes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Smokers who can't or they do not increase their smoking or change their won't quit should switch to lower tar and nicotine smoking in other ways," he added. cigarettes because they may pose less danger of causing heart and lung disease, the surgeon general said today.

"There is no 'safe' cigarette," Surgeon General Julius B. Richmond said in his 237-page annual report on smoking and health, "but some cigarettes may be less hazardous than others, reducing the risk of smoking in a limited and selective fashion."

Richmond added, however, that researchers still don't know how much less dangerous low-tar and nicotine brands are, and he cautioned that smoking more or inhaling more deeply may easily negate any benefits from a lower tar or nicotine cigarette.


"The single most effective way to reduce hazards of smoking continues to be that of quitting entirely, Richmond declared.

But the 54 million Americans "who are unwilling or as yet unable to quit are well advised to switch to cigarettes yielding less tar and nicotine, provided

than its predecessors."

The surgeon general's report said there is insufficient scientific and medical data to measure exactly the impact of low-tar and nicotine cigarettes on heart disease and chronic obstructive lung disease.

But it noted that smoking by pregnant women has been shown to increase the risk of vaginal bleeding, spontaneous abortion, premature delivery, fetal death and infant death shortly after birth.







was succeeding in its effort to curb the growth of the money supply. Oil stocks led the advance. Texaco gained ¾ to 46½ in trading that in-cluded a 200,000-share block at 47; Exxon was up ¾ at 78¼, and Phillips Petroleum, which raised its dividend, picked up 1/4 to 53 1/4.

The NYSE's composite index rose .50 to 76.94. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 1.10 at 341.03. Volume on the Big Board reached

25.94 million shares at noontime, up from 23.78 million at the same point

Whistleblowers ineffective, says GAO

WASHINGTON (AP) - Two years ago, the government opened a new office to protect whistleblowers bureaucrats who complain of being subjected to reprisals for reporting waste, mismanagement or corruption within their agencies.

In a report released Monday, the General Accounting Office blew the whistle on the whistleblowers' friend - saying the new system wasn't working well.

The report by the GAO, an investi-gative arm of Congress, focused on the operations of the office of special counsel in the Merit Systems Protection Board, created in 1979 as part of a reform of civil service.

The GAO said that when the special counsel's office received complaints, it submitted them to the complaining bureaucrats' agencies, then often took the agencies' word that the situation had been corrected without investigating independently.

And the GAO said the special counsel's office moved too slowly in handling complaints.

An average of 71 days was required 'just to notify the whistleblower that the special counsel had received the agency's report" and "it took an average of 98 days before complainants were notified that their complaints had been referred to the concerned agency," the report said. Of 72 complaints sampled, 12 were

sent off to agencies for responses. "The special counsel's office did not

question any of the 12 reports received and considered all 12 reports closed after receiving the agency reports," the GAO said, adding:

"In eight cases, agencies reported to the special counsel that they had either taken corrective action or would further study the alleged problem. The special counsel's office, however, did not monitor either the implementation, timeliness or effectiveness of the action taken or proposed.

Mary Eastwood, acting special counsel, disputed some of the GAO's findings. She said the GAO based much of its criticism on what it was told by still-disgruntled whistleb-

"Even where this office is successful in securing relief from reprisal ... the affected employee rarely expresses or feels appreciation or gratitude," she said.

"The pain of having been unfairly removed, reprimanded or reassigned normally continues even where the action has been corrected."

Anyway, she said, the GAO review covered cases handled during the first three months of 1979 when her office was operating with only a third of the people it needed.

TAX TIPS

There's a tax advantage in attaining age of 65

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fifth in a series of tax tip articles provided by the Permian Basin Chapter of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.

Growing older may have its problems. But when it comes to your federal income tax return, you'll find a few nice breaks awaiting you as the years go by.

For tax purposes you're considered to be 65 years old on the day before your 65th birthday. You can claim the benefits set aside for those 65 and older for the entire year in which you turned 65. For instance, if your 65th birthday falls on Jan. 1, 1981, you can claim the tax benefits set aside for older Americans for the entire year of 1980.

One of the first things an older taxpayer needs to look at is whether he or she has to file a tax return at all. Older taxpayers can earn more than the general population before they have to file.

This and other information about 1980 tax returns will be explored at the "Taxes and You" program. This public service course is spon-sored by the Permian Basin Chapter of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service. The informal two-night course will be offered Tuesday and Thursday from 7 to 10 p.m.

MORE THAN 25 CPAs will volunteer their time to provide taxpayers with instructions and questionand-answer sessions. The program is open to the public at a charge of \$1 per person to cover administrative costs.

If you're 65 or older and single and had gross income of less than \$4,-300, you don't need to file a federal tax return. For married couples, if one spouse is 65, the couple can have up to \$6,400 gross income and not file. If both married persons are 65 or older, the limit is up to \$7,400. Remember, this is gross income. It includes such things as rent, royalties and taxable pensions in addition to wages. It does not include social security or railroad retirement benefits.

Everyone who files a tax return is entitled to a \$1,000 exemption, but if you're 65 or over you get an additional \$1,000 exemption. A married couple both 65 or older will get a total of four exemptions, which results in a \$4,000 reduction in taxable income.

THERE'S ALSO a tax credit for the elderly to cover those who have some taxable income and a tax liability. If you're eligible, the credit can amount to as much as \$375 for single taxpayers and \$562.50 for married couples filing joint returns. The tax credit for the elderly is even available to some taxpayers under 65. This particularly benefits those receiving income from some sort of public retirement system - teachers or firefighters, for example.

Not all older taxpayers are eligible for the credit - those collecting maximum social security or railroad re-tirement benefits, for instance. To find out if you are eligible, check your tax instructions. Or call the IRS forms/tax information number listed in the telephone directory.

There's one important benefit involving the sale of a residence that you may claim as early as age 55. Taxpayers who sell their personal residences after they have turned 55 may be able to exclude from taxes up to \$100,000 of the gain from the sale (\$50,000 if they are married filing separate returns).

For this purpose, the residence can be a house, condominium or a cooperative apartment. You must have lived in the residence for at least three years out of the five-year period ending on the date of the sale in order to claim the exclusion. This is a oncein-a-lifetime tax exclusion. It will benefit those who have decided to sell their homes in order to move to a smaller home or an apartment. Check your tax instructions or ask the IRS

TAXPAYERS WHO recently retired or are about to retire are in a good position to do some tax planning. For example, if you're on a pension plan to which you've contributed from your wages, you'll generally recover your own contributions within your first three years of retirement. Because your pension contributions were taxed while you were working, your pension will be tax free until you recover all the money you put into the plan. During this time your tax-able income will probably come only from interest or dividends.

That may be the time to think about selling savings bonds, securities or real estate that you accumulated while you were at work. You won't pay as much tax on the gain from such sales during this period, be-cause you'll be in a much lower tax bracket than you were as a wage earner. Even if you recover your contributions over a longer period of time, a little each month, a portion of each pension payment will be tax free so your taxable income will still be

A note of caution about your pen-sion — when it does become taxable, you have two choices. You can ask the company that pays your pension to withhold taxes from your pension by giving them a Form W-4P, "Annuitant's Request for Federal Income Tax Withholding." Or you can start making quarterly estimated tax pay-ments directly to the IRS.

YOU MAY HAVE to estimate taxes on your other income anyway income from rent, royalties, interest or dividends, for example. Estimated taxes are required if you expected your tax due at filing time to be \$100 or more. You'll need to estimate if your gross income exceeds certain limits or includes gross income in excess of \$500 that is not subject to tax withholding. Although there are certain exceptions allowed by law, failure to make sufficient estimated tax payments may result in a penalty that cannot be waived for any rea-

SOME TAXPAYERS who are 60 or older may prefer to receive free own neighborhoods. A recently es-tablished program called Tax Counseling for the Elderly may be available near you. Tax counselors are specially trained to handle tax problems and tax forms of particular importance to the older taxpayer.

A large number of neighborhood sites will be available from Jan-uary to mid-April. They may be locat-ed in libraries, nursing home lobbies, nutrition centers, church halls or other convenient locations. You can find out if there's a Tax Counseling for the Elderly site near you by calling the IRS forms/tax information number.

One other note of caution: not frequently, but every so often, a few people try to impersonate IRS em-ployees with the intention of bilking unsuspecting citizens. All IRS employees carry distinctive identifica-tion which they must diplay when conducting business outside an IRS office. If you suspect that someone may be posing as an IRS employee, ask for identification and examine it

IF YOU AREN'T satisfied that the person is a bona fide employee, do not give that person any information. By no means give him or her any money. Notify the IRS or your local authorities immediately. If possible, be ready to supply the name the person gave you and any other details you can remember about the content.

UT share cellar

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - There is no logical explanation for it, but the Philadelphia Eagles are on their way to the Super Bowl.

Thank you, Wilbert Montgomery In a season pockmarked with disabling injuries that sat him down for all or part of seven games, Montgomery erased the memories of all the aches and pains Sunday.

He slashed his way to 194 yards and led the Eagles to a 20-7 National Football Conference championship victory over the Dallas Cowboys. Here were the Eagles, bruised and battered, playing for the championship for the first time against the playoff-toughened Dallas Cowboys. Philadelphia had looked ragged a week ago against weak-sister Minnesota. Dallas looked brilliant against tough Atlanta.

THE COWBOYS were favored and it seemed no one believed in the Eagles - except them-

All week long, Coach Dick Vermeil expressed concern about the mental condition of his team. He said he could not read it. But on Saturday, he thought he saw a breakthrough.

"I thought last night you could sense an air of confidence that we could win," said Vermeil. Today, I felt that the squad just knew it could win. And when you have that kind of confidence

The confidence got a big boost early. On Philadelphia's second play from scrimmage, Montgomery slashed his way 42 yards to a touch-

"The play was designed to go through left guard and tackle," he said. "I cut it back to the right and I had a great hole. It's the kind of play you read on the run. The quarterback gives you the ball deep enough to make your move. My first thought was to cut it back.

Tackle Stan Walters knew right then and there that Montgomery was headed for a special

"He made a 90-degree cut back," said Walters, "not 45 the way he had been. With his knee injury and his leg not stable, he couldn't make his full cut. Today, he did."

WALTERS recalled a play last week against the Vikings. "I was blocking for Wilbert. He cut behind me, but he only cut 45. He ran right into me and the man I was blocking and we all went down. That didn't happen today.

Montgomery, who later ripped off 55 yards with an almost identical play, said his runs Sunday were a throwback to his college days at Abilene Christian.

"That's the kind of cutting, slashing runner I was in college," he said. "That was my style of

running in college. I was more of a cutting, slashing runner there. But my first year in the NFL, I was so scared of Dick Vermeil because he was so demanding and he didn't believe in my

was so demanding and he didn't believe in my kind of fancy running.

Dallas came back to tie the score with a 68-yard 10-play drive in the second quarter. It was the only time all day the Cowboy offense was able to move the Eagle defenders.

Before halftime, Philadelphia had an apparent touchdown nullified by a penalty and two field goal attempts misfire. The score was still 7-7 but the Eagles had lost so many opportunities. the Eagles had lost so many opportunities that it only seemed a matter of time before Dallas would catch up with them.

THE COWBOYS, however, never did.
Halfway through the period, Dallas quarter-back Danny White was sacked by Carl Hairston and coughed up the football. Dennis Harrison recovered at the Dallas 11 and Tony Franklin kicked a 26-yard field goal for a 10-7 lead.

On Dallas' next series, Tony Dorsett fumbled and Jerry Robinson recovered for Philadelphia, giving the Eagles the ball at the Cowboy 38. Montgomery ripped off 11 yards on three carries, Leroy Harris went for 12 and a pass from Ron Jaworski to Rodney Parker went for six more. Then Harris carried for the final nine

Eagles' Wilbert gives Cowboys that blue feeling

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys were feeling blue, and not because they wore their blue jerseys or played the Philadelphia Eagles in 16-degree temperatures.



What action do you take? A. - Possession of a sevencard major is not, in itself, a license to bit at any level. Had North shown a minor suit in response to your one no trump, you would have introduced your suit at the two-level. Now that North has shown, at minimum, a six-card suit, we suggest you pass while you are still at a safe level. You have respect able support for partner's suit, but he might be void in your suit.

Q.2 - As South, vulnerable, you hold: ◆A ♥J4 0 AJ10672 ◆KQ98 The bidding has proceeded: South West North East Pass 1 🛡 Pass Pass 4 7 Pass

What action do you take? A .- Partner's rebid of four hearts is not a "drop dead" bid. With that sort of hand, he would have simply responded four hearts over your one diamond opening. Partner's actual sequence hints at slam, and you have a most suitable holding. You have first or second-round control in all side suits, a ruffing value and decent trump support. Rather than tip off your holding by cue-bidding, we suggest a bold leap to six hearts. There are no guarantees, but it's difficult to imagine a hand partner might have that will not offer a play for slam. Checking for aces en route is also accept-

Q.3-Neither vulnerable, as South you hold: +Q84 ♥K103 0 AQ65 +AQ8 Partner opens the bidding with one spade. What do you respond?

A.-We know that some scientists will come up with a convoluted method for describing this hand precisely. However, there is a much simpler bid available - three no trump. It says you have a hand with 4-3-3 pattern and 16-18 points. When a bid describes your hand so exactly, why not use it? Partner will know you have three






