# Sunday they'll be homeward bound

(AP) The freed American hostages are scheduled fly to the United States on Sunday for reunions with their families, U.S. officials said today And the chief of the medical team examining them said some show guilt feelings and other signs of temporary psychiatric illness

Announcement of their impending return to a "private location" for the reunions followed a \$15,000 shopping spree today by most of the 52 Ameri

U.S. Pentagon sources in Washing ton said the former hostages will be reunited with their families at Stewart Air Base in Newburgh, N.Y. Sunday and will be driven to the nearby U.S. Military Academy at West Point for a few days of rest

Dr. Jerome Korcak, head of the State Department medical team examining the former hostages in Wiesbaden, said they were generally very happy" at the news. But he also, spoke of psychiatric symptoms and physical ailments following their 14% month ordeal in Iran

Korcak said some hostages feel guilty about statements they made to the Iramans during the 441 days of

Asked about a US report that a suicide watch was maintained on four of the former hostages. Ted Curran of the State Department press office in Frankfurt noted that some of the hostages were so depressed that they did not leave their rooms. But Korcak said there was no particular night monitoring of anyone except for routine checks by night nurses

The Iranians, meanwhile, denied reports that the hostages were treat ed brutally by their captors

A spokesman for the U.S. Consulate in Frankfurt said that medic Donald R. Hohman, 39, of West Sacramento, Calif . was expected to return with the other ho tages. Hohman was transferred to Tehran in August, 1979 from Frankfurt and his wife and two continued to live in Frankfurt during

Korcak said the psychiatric symptoms include episodes of flashbacks and disrupted sleep, part of what he called post traumatic stress syndrome. Asked whether he thought they will recover he said. It's variable but it passes with time and

## Former hostage asks...

CHICAGO (AP) In an emotional scene at an American military hospital, a freed American hostage with tears in his eyes reportedly confronted former President Carter and asked. Why did you leave us there so

The man then turned and walked away, according to a copyright story in today's editions of the Chicago Tribune

The newspaper said the incident occurred at the US mili tary hospital in Wiesbaden, West Germany, where the hostages were taken Wednesday after their release from Iran

The newspaper also quoted a nurse as saying that some hostages, angry over their long cap tivity, had been reluctant to meet with Carter when he visit ed the hospital Wednesday night

Other patients reported learn ing harrowing details of the hostages' experiences, their mistreatment by Iranian captors and their fear of imminent

proper treatment

As might be expected, the 52 Americans are in varying states of mental and physical health," Korcak

'A number of those released are showing signs of transient psychiatric illness, including post traumatic stress syndrome which is directly related to their captivity in Iran

Koreak refused to discuss individu al cases, saving that would violate the patients' rights to privacy. He said the treatment begun here would continue in the United States

He said some feel guilty " men tioning that one hostage had made anti American statements on condition some of his colleagues would be released

Korcak said another hostage made a television statement after being told his mother had died and that if he made the statement he would be allowed to return to the United States

for the funeral He apparently was referring to U.S. Marine Sgt. Johnny McKeel of Balch Springs, Texas, who reported being told his mother was dead and finding out when the hostages were freed that she was alive

Iran on Thursday denied that the hostages had undergone brutal treatment at the hands of their captors Iran's chief hostage negotiator, Behand Nabavi, called the Americans "comfort-seeking diplomats" who were "ungrateful" and who did "not understand the meaning of kind-

Korcak said weight losses by the former hostages ranged from 10 to 80 pounds, and some were so depressed they are not leaving their rooms or participating in activities at the hos

Many of the hostages have de scribed beatings to us," Korcak said, adding that the beatings were administered in ways that would not leave marks on the body

One hostage who was beaten into unconsciousness continues to suffer from a ringing in the ears, he said.

The beatings were administered at times during interrogations to obtain safe combinations and other information, Korcak said, and others were beaten as punishment for escape at We're seeing about what we ex-

pected, but you can't tell from looking at a person," Korcak said of the psychological toll of the hostages'

Some of them have been more severely affected by the experience than others

"We feel these people will not be permanently disabled by their illnesses," Korcak said.

Barry Rosen, former press attache at the Tehran embassy, told reporters he is getting "better and better every day "Asked about reports of physical abuse, Rosen said, "Everybody must speak for themselves on that."

# Panel favors new elementary school

Rapidly rising enrollment and a deteriorating physical plant at De Za ala Elementary School on the effy seast side necessitate construction of a new school in the area.

That's the consensus of the Mexican American Advisory Committee Its members met for a luncheon Thursday at De Zavala to discuss the situation and form committees to seek citywide support for a proposed bond issue election on the matter this spring

Citing dilapidated condition and a record 100 students at the oldest of Midland a schools. Manuel Carrasco, director of elementary education for the school system, outlined two sites being considered for construc-

The first would be on property owned by Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church north of the present De Zavala building. The alternate location would be near the intersection of Fairgrounds Road and Cuthbert Avenue property already owned by the school district

People in the neighborhood are opposed to the Fairgrounds Road site and want to keep De Zavala in the immediate area," said Carrasco. The rea on for such opposition is that the church property is readily

accessible to residents of the neighborhood. Another reason, according to Carrasco is that the Fairgrounds Road site lacks adequate streets and new ones would have to be built

Carrasco and others at the meeting pointed out that De Zavala is part of the city desegregation plan that clusters' students in various schools

The need for projects such as hous ing rehabilitation and sewage water system improvements in low income areas in Midland County, Big Spring. Lamesa, Pecos, Seagraves and Se minole was ascertained Thursday. when the Permian Basin Regional Commission's development review committee reviewed and approved the applications for federal funding by the governing bodies

Midland County and the five cities and towns are competing for funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development programs.

The pre-applications will now be reviewed by the PBRPC's board of directors at 1:30 p.m. Feb. 4 at PBRPC headquarters at Midland Re gional Airport before they are submitted to HUD

Only fixe of the Li member review committee showed up for the session moderated by PBRPC - Planning Director Jerry Tschauner

All seemed to agree on validity of the pre-applications but committee member Alvey Bryant of Midland expressed concern over the percent. age up to 20 percent of funds to be used for administering the programs

Bryant said that personally he thought more of the funds should be used to help the needs and to upgrade their housing and services and that the federal fundings would go fur ther by (Midland County's and the other cities') keeping their own house.

He submitted that city and county inspectors and administrators al ready on payrolls could supervise much of the programs

"They could use the money to help more people instead of helping the

cities. Bryant said. I understand. the cities need assistance

Bryant, a farmer and former Mid. land County commissioner, reviewed Big Spring's \$1 8 million application to undertake a neighborhood revitalization program that would include street paying of 25 blocks and rehabil itation of 33 substandard houses in north Big Spring Overall, 20 percent of the proposed funds would be used for administration (\$180,000), contingency (\$90,000) to assure completion of the project, and code enforcement (\$90 000)

"They've got employees already that could do most of that." Bryant surmised. If they were on my payroll, they would (enforce the codes). But he almost relented: "I guess I'm

just too conservative Notwithstanding, Bryant did con cede that the northern sector of Big Spring is in dire need of upgrading. "I would say," Bryant said, "I'm familiar with Big Spring, and they do need the help in their low-income

The pre-applications propose: - Midland County: The Midland County Commissioners' Court is seeking \$1.67 million "to undertake the revitalization" of a so-called window pane" area in south central Midland. That area, though surrounded by the city, is outside the city limits and falls within the jurisdiction of Midland County.

The approximately half-squaremile area, just north of the Permian Basin Petroleum Museum, has some "substandard" and "dilapidated" houses that are without water and sewer systems and such conditions "present some health hazards," said Some houses are without bathroom

At a school board meeting last week, trustees noted that it would be cheaper to build a new school than it would be to renovate the old one Figures presented to the board by school Superintendent Dr. James Mailes showed it would cost \$2.5 million for a new building, while the cost of rebuilding the old one would come to \$2.9 million

Should voters approve construction of a new De Zavala, the old one would be converted to a storage building for the school district. The structure could also be used as a "community service facility," according to Ms. Carrasco, which would include a nursery that area residents could use for a nominal fee-



# You'll know just what to do...

Homecoming will be a "good of Nebraska steak" for one of the freed American hostages. For others, it will be a lobster, a game of golf, lots of hugging or a parade. But if any of the 52 former captives don't want a fuss, well, that's OK too.

Neighbors, friends, relatives and

well-wishers of all descriptions are waiting eagerly for the 50 men and two women to return from West Germany to the United States

The former hostages will fly back to the United States on Sunday, U.S. officials said today. But where the first family reunions will take place still is uncertain. Among the possibilities are the U.S. Military Academy at West Point and Dover and McGuire

# German recalls 'total terror'

NEW YORK (AP) - Former hostage Bruce German said today that he and some of the other American captives experienced "total terror" during what the Iranians called a "security shakedown."

In an interview on CBS-TV's "Morning" show, German, 43, of Kensington, Md., said the "shakedown" occurred because, "they (the Iranians) had reports that we were passing notes and communicating. And some of the guys may have had weapons. How that was possible I don't know. What weapons, you know, a spoon?

'So they brought in these goons with the Uzi's and G-3's and shook the place down and we assumed the classic position against the walls with our blindfolds," he said. "And they cocked the guns in our ears and we experienced total terror."

In a telephone interview with radio

station KMOX in St. Louis, Marine Sgt. Rodney V. Sickmann, 22, a former hostage from Krakow, Mo., described how he privately relieved his pent-up tensions and emotions while in captivity.

You were taken to a toilet, you know...and there, you know, myself, I would beat on a wall just to get my tensions out, you know, so you wouldn't let it out in the room. If you let it out in the room, it affects everybody, you know, and it gets everybody

German was asked how he felt waking up a free man in a West German hospital.

"The first night I woke up and I wasn't quite sure this was real. I looked around for the guards to ask permission to go to the toilet." he said. "Just to see my country again, I've never been prouder of being an American as I am now.'

"We'll play anything you want to play," his father replied.

If the 22-year-old Marine and his family approve, the Chamber of Commerce in Washington, Mo., will hold a 'Welcome Home Day" on Feb. 12, including a parade and an assembly at Washington High School, which Sickmann attended.

The first thing William Belk wants

to do is go fishing, according to his 22-year-old son Steven in Virginia Beach, Va.

Bells will ring 52 times in Port Angeles, Wash., and residents will burn their yellow ribbons when Belk visits his foster mother Gertrude

## Red tape keeps U.S. 'treasure' in Havana

WASHINGTON - For 20 years, a treasure trove of uncalculated value has been gathering dust in the basement of the former U.S. Embassy in Havana, dumped there for safekeeping by American citizens fleeing Cuba in the chaotic days of Fidel Castro's seizure of power.

Although the booty is still technically in the custody of Swiss diplomats, a modest staff of Americans has occupied the embassy building since 1977, when the United States and Cuba resumed partial relations by setting up "Interests Sections" in Havana and Washington Oddly, the State Department passed up a golden opportunity to fly the stuff out in the first weeks of renewed relations and return it to its lawful owners

their heirs. A recent confidential memorandum describes the bizarre background of the buried treasure in the embassy basement. It began when the United States severed relations with Castro in January 1961 and left the Havana embassy and its contents in the hands of the Swiss.

"During the time the Swiss represented our interests in Havana," the memo relates, "they accepted for storage personal possessions of Americans fleeing Cuba. These items ranged from Picasso paintings to suitcases full of money, to items of sentimental value only." 'A similar description was given by former Undersecretary of State Philip Habib, who described the items in a memo as ranging from "family jewels to personal mementos of no intrinsic

My associate Bob Sherman has learned how the State Department blew its chance to get the goods back safely, albeit unofficially, to the United States. When the interests section was opened in Havana, Nestor Garcia, the Cuban government's contact

'Garcia's reply was that if we asked officially, the Cuban government would have to deny us permisexport the dential memo disclosed. "He went on to say, however, that the best solution for everyone would be for us to remove it quietly to the U.S. His government, he said, had no intention of questioning what precisely was in the air shipments to and from our Interests Section on the initial support flights.

In other words, the planes bringing in necessities for the U.S. staff could load up with the stored valuables on their return flights, with no questions asked. There was a certain urgency in the opportunity offered, because the State Department wasn't sure how the Cubans would react if the removal were attempted at a later date.

We have no reason to believe Garcia spoke frivolously," the memo went on, allaying suspicions of a Castro trap. "We believe the Cuban government would at this point prefer to look the other way so that we can get rid of the problem.

But the legal nitpickers at Foggy Bottom cautioned against such an informal solution, on the astonishing grounds that removal without official approval would be a violation of law

This reasoning led one irate official to write: "The Act of State doctrine is a well-accepted doctrine of international law which states that one state does not interpret another state's internal law for it. In other words, if a Foreign Ministry says it is all right to do something, we should not tell it we think it is illegal under its domestic

The State Department, neverthe less, took the easy way out. It left the goods to gather more dust in Ha-



Jody Powell, Carter's press secretary, emerged from his office at 11:35 a.m. to tell reporters that, with 25 minutes left in the Carter presidency, there likely would be no announcement by him that the hostages were known to be out of Iranian airspace and thus considered freed by the United States.

Five minutes later, Powell was gone. And within two minutes, a woman from the housekeeping staff was vacuuming the carpet in his of fice, making it ready for Mr. Reagan's press secretary, James Brady.

John Rodgers, after making the changes in the Oval Office, moved into the Cabinet Room to oversee workmen affixing brass plates bearing Mr. Reagan's cabinet members' names onto the chairs ringing the long oval table.

Portraits of Jefferson and Truman had just been taken down, replaced by Coolidge and Eisenhower. Lincoln remained.

Clement E. Conger, long-time White House curator, rushed over from the family quarters in the mainpart of the White House to join Rodgers and his colleagues in the West Wing, where the Oval Office and the offices of a president's chief aides are located.

When Rodgers told Conger that the sofas already had been moved around, the courtly curator exclaimed: "Oh, good. I didn't like the way it was.

The remark seemed to relieve Rodgers. It also forged an immediate bond between these two men who would be doing a lot of business together.

The only hint of politics was Conger's observation that Rodgers, who had done similar work in the Ford White House, had rearranged the sofas into the configuration favored by Carter's predecessor.

And when reporters checked back a few minutes later, Granum had vanished. It was 15 minutes before the official oath-taking at noon. Speakes and his aides were in charge

The final hour of the Carter administration was one of frustration and tears for many who stayed at their posts answering endless telephone calls. Their bitterness at the Iranians appearing to have deliberately denied Carter the opportunity to announce the hostages' freedom seemed clear.

But by noon, the jobs belonged to Mr. Reagan's people. And in the late afternoon, press secretary Brady held his first official briefing in the press room, revealing the happy details of the hostages' release that Jody Powell had hoped deeply that his president could have announced.

President Carter and his men were basking in the perceived success of their hostage-freeing operation, President Ronald Reagan and his men have been plotting a long-overdue U.S. campaign against terrorism in all its forms.

One of the new president's senior advisers put it to us this way: "The preoccupation of the Carter administration with human rights is going to be radically switched to the Reagan administration's preoccupation with international terrorism." The switch connotes a promise of "never again" in responding to the 443 days of Irani-

Behind this lies a fundamental distinction between the world views of Carter and Reagan. Privately affronted by Carter's handling of the hostage crisis from the start, the Reaganites saw no glory in the 11thhour hostage release after endless haggling; instead, they saw national infamy in once-feared, once-strong America held at bay for nearly 15 months by a South Asian third-rate

military power. It is partly as a measure of national atonement for that infamy, but principally to prevent its repetition, that Reagan's top national security officials are moving against a global curse. They have quietly sworn to start an immediate international effort to reduce the use of terrorias an

international political weapon. The atonement will make itself known soon enough. Reagan and his high command may phrase their words carefully, but what they say about the hostage affair will add up to this: Never again will the U.S. allow itself to be held hostage by seizure of American citizens.

The president's men in effect want the world informed that Carter's payoff to Tehran will not be repeated. International terrorists, whether or not cloaked in the guise of a government, must understand that Reagan is changing the rules of the game as played by Carter - whatever the cost. "We are moving into a very, very tough four-year period. Make no mistake about that," one presidential adviser told us.

Iranian perception of these changed rules may have contributed more than quiet diplomacy to the hostage release. Reagan's men are convinced Tehran finally accepted the deal because of fear of Reagan. "They-were

petrified, and rightly so," said one Reagan operative who had helped construct Reagan's deliberate escalation of anti-Iranian epithets from criminals to kidnappers to barbari-

Reagan's promise expanded to battle against terrorism

Brought into the firing sights of the new administration's anti-terrorist planning is the Soviet Union. As we reported on Jan. 2, Reagan never doubted that the Kremlin tried to the end to sidetrack Carter's hostage negotiations with Iran. Every piece of evidence presented to Reagan since his election persuaded him that Moscow's real intent was to prevent the release of the hostages and use the issue to enhance its own influence in

It is far too early to predict the precise shape of Reagan's campaign against terrorism. The president's national security officials are studying a just-published treatise called "Terrorism: Threat, Reality, Response" by two sometime Reagan advisers, Robert H. Kupperman and Darrell Trent. Another soon-to-be published work anticipated in high administration quarters is by one of Europe's best-known experts on terrorism, journalist Claire Sterling.

However the campaign progresses, one emerging theme has been fortified by anti-American Soviet propaganda in Iran: Moscow must cease its support for terrorism, which so helps the Kremlin in the U.S.-Soviet competition, or pay dire consequences.

These consequences, according to preliminary planning, will include the

use of American and (if Western Europe agrees) of European sanctions againt Moscow. One senior Reagan adviser claims the U.S. and the West-"have the assets to put into play" food and strategic trade - if the Soviet superpower is caught redhanded aiding international terror, as it was in the agonizing hostage cri-

But the first-line weapon against terrorism in a beefed-up worldwide intelligence system to anticipate terrorist activities. If that fails, Reagan would treat terrorists, whether posing as governments or not, as criminals, not bargaining partners. Failure of the Carter administration to give the Iranians such treatment or to exact any clear punishment at all has agonized Reagan's men. It also has magnified the challenge of the new administration's anti-terrorist cam-

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

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# Alexander's companions testify in murder trial

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — Billy Wayne Alexander Jr., charged with capital murder in the shooting death of a DPS officer, told friends, "I just shot a goddamn cop, let's get outta here." seconds after the trooper was gunned down, ac-

DENTON, Texas (AP) - After deliberating two full days and reporting they were deadlocked, jurors convicted Terry Wayne Williams in the Sept. 12 shooting death of a North Texas State University football player.

The jury returned its verdict Thursday shortly before 6 p.m. at the end of its second full day of deliberation. The punishment phase of the trial was scheduled for today.

Mechanical bull rests with jury

HOUSTON (AP) - A jury must now decide whether three Houston manufacturers are rustling the mechanical bull from Gilley's Enterprises Inc.

Gilley's - which operates the Pasadena, Texas nightclub where the movie 'Urban Cowboy'' was filmed - claims the trio infringed on the patent rights to the lifeless bucking beast that ignited a nationwide craze in western clubs and bars.

But attorneys for Buck N Broncos Inc., Southwest Rodeo Enterprises Inc., and Texas Rodeo Bulls Inc., contend the patent was obtained by fraud and accuse Gilley's of trying to monopolize sales of the mechanical bucker.

Attorneys for both sides wrapped up the legal bucking Thursday, and the jury recessed after deliberating one hour without reaching a verdict.

U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals instructed the panel to resume deliberations today

Seals asked jurors to decide if the patent is invalid because it lacks novelty, if the bucking marvel is superior to similar devices and if the patent was fraudulently obtained. They also must rule whether Gilley's is entitled to damages.

During closing arguments. defense attorney Ned Conley said the patent Gilley's purchased from Joe D. Turner in 1979 is invalid because many of the parts "have been around for 100 years."

But Gilley's attorney, Wayne Harding, compared the argument to "a combination lock. It doesn't do you any good to know the numbers if you don't know the combination.'

Harding also dismissed the notion that country-western singer Mickey Gilley, part-owner and namesake of the honky tonk, attended the 10-day trial to impress jurors

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Leftists took over the Embassy of El Salvador here today and draped the

Embassy of El Salvador here today and draped the two-story building with red banners.

The banners identified the occupiers as members of the Revolutionary Workers' Party, a small far-left Mexican party. An annonymous telephone call to The Associated Press said members of the Mexican Communist Party and the Socialist Workers' Party also were involved. The embassy is in a colonial house in the quiet,

upper-class Polanco d'strict. It is splattered with splotches, apparently from paint thrown at it during previous demonstrations.

It was not known of the occupiers were armed. A spokesman said a they would hold a news conference later. There was no word on whether any hostages were taken.

The takeover follows a massive street demonstration in front of the American Embassy on Thursday in which 30,000 persons protested resumption of American military aid to El Salvador.

Mexico, especially its left, has been fiercly critical

of the civilian-military junta that has ruled El-Salvador for 15 months. The Mexican government recently issued a statement apparently aimed at the United States telling other countries not to meddle in the internal affairs of the embattled Central American nation.

Mexican relations with El Salvador have been chilly for more than six months.

Appeals court affirms sentence for murder

AUSTIN - The Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday affirmed the 25-year sentence for murder with malice assessed Manuel Galindo Suchil in the stabbing death of Jose Pablo Bejarano Vazquez in Midland on April 17, 1970.

Court records indicate Vazquez was stabbed fol-lowing a fight between him and Suchil, with the body being taken to another location in the county where it was found in November, 1974. Suchil was indicted March 14, 1974.

He appealed the conviction on grounds the trial court erred in failing to grant his motion for an instructed verdict of "not guilty" after the state rested its case, contending the only testimony connecting him with the offense was that of an "accomplice witness."

The trial court refused to grant the motion, and the appeals court noted that Suchil "subsequently...tes tified in his own behalf and admitted his participation in the death." He also contended that the trial court erred in

failing to include a charge on murder without malice 'over objection.' The appeals court, however, said it could not find

anything in the record to show that such a charge had been requested. In another matter, the Court of Criminal Appeals

ordered a reduction in ball from \$185,000 to \$65,000 for Carlos Mayola Medellin, charged in Ector County with aggravated rape, two counts of burglary of a habitation, aggravated sexual abuse and burglary of a building.

Bail had been set at \$50,000 in each case but was reduced by the trial court to total \$185,000.

The appeals court ordered the ball reduced further, concluding it was excessive.

"We are just overrun with flowers for Jimmy," Mrs. Chappell said. "We had a couple from people who usually order flowers for them when he comes home, but these are from all over the country ... it's unbelievable. I don't know if we'll ever catch up."

Mrs. Chappell said a few orders trickled in Monday, but the brunt of the 50 or so flower orders came on Tuesday when Carter returned to Plains for a tumultuous welcome home cele-

Carter was home only 14 hours, however,

before jetting to Germany to greet the newly reed hostages.

Virtually all the orders came with messages of gratitude to the former president, and most were for yellow flowers or arrangements with a yellow ribbon attached to the sprays. Yellow ribbons had come to symbolize American unity with the captives during their 14 months in Iran.

'Thank you from the Whitefish Bay Home of David Roder. He is one of the hostages. God bless you, and our prayers are with you," said a message from Milwaukee, Mrs. Chappell said.

Welcome back to being a citizen and congratulations on the release of the hostages. Glad you did something no other president has ever done, getting them out without force," said a message from Chicago, according to Mrs. Chappell.

The flowers were delivered to the Carters' home, which remains under tight Secret Service security, by Rosalynn Carter's 75-year-old mother. Allie Smith. Mrs. Smith works at the flower shop on weekends and normally makes flower deliveries to the Carter home.



# DR. NEIL SOLOMON 45 good age to do surgery

Dear Dr. Solomon: As I grow older, the idea of having plastic surgery to remove some of the wrinkles from my face and neck becomes increasingly appealing to me. Is there any age at which it is best to have this kind of surgery done?-Mrs. D.V.

Dear Mrs. V.: It has been suggested that from a biological standpoint, the period from 45 to 55 years of age probably is the best time for plastic surgery to be performed. Before the age of 40, the full relaxation of facial tissue has not been completed; after 55, the facial tissues may no longer be pliant and workable.

My comments should not be taken as a recommendation either for or against cosmetic surgery. But I would say that I see many women in their 50s, 60s, and older, who simply have let nature take its course, and whom I consider beautiful.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I've hesitated a long time before writing this letter, but finally decided it should not be put off any longer. To be blunt about it, ever since my husband's heart attack, our sex life has been zero. He claims he is too sick to engage in sex, even though his doctor has told him repeatedly that there is no such restriction on him. We are both in our early 40s, but if I thought for a mo-ment that sexual relations would be harmful for him, I would willingly adjust to that set of circumstances. But that is not the case, and it is having an adverse effect on our marriage. Since he reads your column religiously, I'd appreciate your comments.-Mrs.

Dear Mrs. R.: While your husband's concern about engaging in sexual relations after having had a heart attack may be understandable - and, in fact, is shared by many other cardiac patients - the fact that his doctor has told him he need not restrict himself in this area indicates that his concern is not

A number of research studies have shown that there are few, if any, medical reasons for a patient who has recovered from a heart attack to limit his sexual activities. Dr. J. Mehta and his associates the Veterans Administration Medical Center and the University of Florida at Gainesville have pointed out that the average energy expenditure during sexual activities appears to be well within the capacity of most recovered cardiac patients. The same holds true for the average heart rate of 115 to 120 beats per minute, which is reached during sexual intercourse.

You do not indicate in your letter whether you and your husband experienced any sexual difficulties prior to his illness. If that were the case, obviously these difficulties would still exist and might account for your husband's behavior. But if your sexual relations were satisfactory before his heart attack, there is no reason why they should not continue to be satisfactory today.

You might want to suggest to your husband that you both discuss with his doctor his reluctance to resume sexual activities. If his physician cannot be helpful or if he does not feel qualified to help, you might then want to consier sexual counseling.

## Ex-hostage's wife denies him being investigated

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The wife of ex-hostage Jerry Plotkin has criticized a newspaper story that reported Plotkin was being investigated by Los Angeles police for possible drug dealings just before he was taken captive in Iran. 'The shock of this ridiculous story has oversha-

dowed and interferred with the joy and relief that I shared with all of you for the past three days," said Plotkin's wife Deborah, wiping tears from her eyes, as she read a statement Wednesday at the office of the Plotkins' attorney, Steven Klein

The story was published Wednesday by the Daily News of Van Nuys, Calif. Daily News City Editor Sandi Gibbons said the newspaper stands behind its

It quoted Lt. Clark Wardle as saying Plotkin was suspected of being a "heavyweight in cocaine and some heroin dealing" in the Los Angeles area.

Los Angeles police officials, in a statement they issued after the story was published, said the department "does not have and has not had an active narcotics investigation involving Jerry Plotkin."

"Any statements attributed to a narcotics lieutenant of this department are not accurate and are denied by the lieutenant," police spokesman Dan Cooke said. Wardle was not available for comment. Police said

he had some injured ribs from an auto accident last week, and was taking vacation days prior to retiring from the department. The Daily News also said a State Department debriefing team was expected to question Plotkin

about whether he had a contact in the embassy, and if so, the nature of that association. An official of the Los Angeles office of the federal Drug Enforcement Administration said, however, that his was the only federal agency that would conduct such an investigation, and denied that there was any federal narcotics investigation concerning

Plotkin, 47, a private businessman, happened to be visiting the embassy when he was taken hostage.



# Price report confronts Reagan with continued high inflation

The government's final consumer price report for 1980, being released today, was sure to confirm the most prolonged period of high inflation the nation has experienced since the end of World War I.

Government and private economists predicted the December price report would show an inflation rate of between 12 percent and 13 percent

for the full year That would be only slight improvement from the 1979 rate of 13.3 percent, despite a severe recession last spring that slowed inflation for a

The last time inflation exceeded 10 percent two years in a row was 1918-19, when the United States was returning to a peacetime economy.

A separate government report due today was expected to show that the buying power of American workers in 1980 declined about 5 percent for a second straight year because of high inflation.

The Carter administration, in its final economic report last week, forecast inflation will continue at about 12.5 percent during the first year of the new Reagan administration.

President Reagan has vowed to fight inflation and revive a sluggish economy by slashing taxes and cutting the fed-

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

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

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## Billy Betts' museum

KENTON, Tenn. (AP) - Tucked away in a building that has housed the town's bank, post office and city hall is a treasure-trove that would make a

Others may boast of greater wealth, but few can match Billy Betts' collection of "one-of-a-kind"

"It's not a Smithsonian Institution, it's just a private musuem," said Betts, proprietor of the Betts Old Clock Shop & Museum, "But what I've got here, if it were scattered out, would be one of the biggest collections anywhere.'

Betts' collection, crammed into display cases, includes more than 200 antique pocket watches, scores of antique desk clocks, Indian artifacts, early American items, a Japanese Samurai saddle and dozens of old firearms. Most of those items were collected by his father, the late Grover Betts.

"When my father died in 1965, he left his collection to me because he knew how I loved it," Betts said. The rest of the collection - items Betts picked up while stationed in Turkey with the Air Force in the early 1960s - includes a gold leaf.

"When a Roman emperor died they used to put a gold leaf over each eye," he said.

Betts, who bought his gold leaf from a villager, said he had seen a similar gold leaf in a museum in Turkey. Much of his collection, he said, came from digs he made in Turkish ruins and from villagers who used to comb the ruins.

He bought a velour robe with gold thread in Turkey 17 years ago, but said he doesn't know the history of the garment although it is reputed to be 1,300 years

Betts, 45, retired from the Air Force in 1974 and settled in his wife's hometown, about 100 miles

northeast of Memphis. Four years ago, the couple bought an old building which originally housed Kenton's first bank including a massive safe. Betts uses half of the

building for his clock shop and antique business and the other half for his museum items

The museum is open every day except Wednesday and Sunday, and there is no charge for admission. Still, few people from outside Kenton ever visit.

"I don't advertise," Betts said. Betts, whose collection includes about 300 gold and silver Roman coins, said he has never calculated the value of his holdings.

# Easy hang-up for a hot iron

Almost everyone who uses an old-fashioned solder iron will have a few burn marks on the bench top because it's just too. easy to lay the thing down there before it cools. R.R.W. sent me a picture of his workbench to show something else, and I noticed he has a good place for his solder iron. He has installed a screw eye into the end of the solder iron handle. It's as close to the center as possible without getting into the wiring. Then he has a cup hook installed under the top of his bench. The cup hook is far enough back so that when the iron is hanging he won't accidentally bump into a hot iron. It does eliminate the burn marks on the bench, and the iron is always handy.

Dear Al: Maybe you'll like my method of patching leaks in rain gutters. I clean away any rusted metal, and then coat the edges around the hole with asphalt roof repair compound. I then cut a piece of heavy duty aluminum foil from the kitchen to cover the hole and overlap a little. This is pressed over the hole and into the repair compound. After the comound sets up, I brush on another thin layer of the asphalt to completely cover the foil, and the patch is ready for what ever Mother Nature

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

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Rep. John Bryant says the legislative program Gov. Bill Clements pitched to lawmakers on Thursday could fail because of the governor's "arrogant, aloof and pushy" style. While many legislators talked substance after Clements' Thursday

"The speech was really outstanding," said Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, although he and Clements differ on major issues.

Clements-backer Bob Davis, R-Irving, praised Clements' \$26.2 billion proposed budget as being "very well thought out." 'It shows me he is dealing with the complexities of state financing and

is not involved in what people have sometimes accused him of, sloganeering," said Davis. Speaker Bill Clayton said Clements' budget - \$500 million below the

Legislative Budget Board's proposal — would spark "a good debate in the appropriations process.

The governor's anti-crime package, keyed to legalized wiretapping to catch drug dealers, drew some negative response.

Rep. Lynn Nabers, chairman of the House committee that would consider wiretapping, said he does not like Clements' plan "I generally do not like the concept of wiretapping but I also can draft a

bill I can live with," he said. Nabers, D-Brownwood, said legislators should not allow clandestine entry into homes or businesses to set up phone taps.

That offends me. That reminds of Nazi Germany," said Nabers. The chairman of the Senate committee that would consider wiretap, Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas, said, "I think it's an unconstitutional invasion of privacy. I hope it doesn't pass and I'm going to work against

#### New virus seen

HOUSTON (AP) -The number of influenza cases in Houston is decreasing but scientists at the Baylor College of Medicine Influenza Research Center are puzzled over a possible new strain of virus.

Dr. W. Paul Glezen, an epidemiologist at the center, said Thursday the epidemic appears to be on the way out. But, he said, 16 samples of newer virus have been sent to National Center for Disease Control in Atlanta for evaluation.

Glezen said, "the vari ant is so new it hasn't been named and it needs much more checking.

The epidemiologist said it was possible that people already felled by one type of flu virus could be stricken again with a different strain.



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
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# Season hasn't been bed of roses for Raiders

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Their record was 2-3 and Coach Tom Flores' face was sending a shiver through some of the veteran players on the Oakland Raiders

"He had a look of dismay," said guard Gene Upshaw, captain of the team. "He looked like a man wondering where his next job would be, like a man saying to himself, 'What's going on here? What have I gotten

Tackle Art Shell, who plays alongside Upshaw on the left side of the Raider offensive line, saw the same ashen look in Flores and it hit him in the pit of his stomach.

'I told Gene, I thought we needed a meeting," said Shell. "He called it Closed doors. No coaches.

There was some soul searching done at the session and a lot of the Raiders will tell you that the team which will play Philadelphia in the Super Bowl Sunday, turned the corner that day.

We were ready to blow apart," said running back Mark van Eeghen. "We had just lost to Kansas City 31-17 and it could have been 61-17. We had 11 games looking us in the face. There had been some back biting and finger pointing. You know 'He missed a block,' or 'He didn't make a tack-

All the signs of a season falling apart faced the Raiders. They had to find a way to save it.

"The elders spoke," said defensive end Cedrick Hardman. "Some feel-

ings were aired. We got a lot done. We re-established our faith in old fashioned football. We turned it around 180 degrees."

Upshaw, the eldest Raider, presided. 'Gene is an excellent leader," said Hardman. "He sometimes appears to be a direct descendent of (Raider owner) Al Davis.

"I told them the coaches were doing all that they could, but the players were not putting out 110 percent," Upshaw said. "I said they'd better get going or we'd have new coaches and new players in the room and that's something I don't want at this stage."

Then it was Shell's turn.

The essence of what I said was that we had a bell of a coaching staff and they were getting us prepared. But we were not getting the job done on the field. I said I thought we should all reassess whether we were giving all we should in mental preparation, practices and the games." Then Shell quoted one of his favorite philosophies from ex-Raider Coach John Madden.

Big John used to say, 'If you're not gonna help us, get out of the way because we're comin' through.

The message took and created a togetherness atmosphere among the Raiders. It helped Thursday when rambuctious defensive end John Matuszak was located dancing on Bourbon Street at 3 a.m. and was fined \$1,000 for his curfew indiscretion.

"It was Wednesday night and I had to get out a little bit. I was wrong

"It was my one night out, four nights before the game. I wouldn't do anything to affect the outcome of this game" he added.

After the 2-3 meeting, Oakland won nine of 11 regular season games and three more in the playoffs, posting the 16th consecutive winning season for the franchise, longest streak of success in the National Football

At about the same time, Philadelphia was zooming to an 11-1 start, posting the best record in the league. Then suddenly, the Eagles seemed to go flat, losing three of their last four games. But there were no team meetings, no soul seaching sessions for this team.



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# Larry Nelson overcomes putting woes for Phoenix lead

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - A brief recovery from some putting woes helped stake Larry Nelson to a share of the first round lead in the \$300,000 Phoenix Open golf tournament.

But a return to his erratic behavior on the greens - he missed three short putts coming home - cost him sole control of the top spot and dropped him back into a tie with Australian David Graham.

"Kind of a strange day," Nelson mused Thursday after his 6-under-par 65 on the 6,762-yard Phoenix Country Club course.

"I didn't birdie No. 1 or 18 (both par-5 holes) and they're critical on this golf course," Nelson said. "For a while I couldn't make a threefooter, then I felt like I could make everything, and then I missed a lot of short putts coming home.

"Kind of strange. But I'm delighted with the score. I've always wanted to win in the West. I'd really like to play well this week."

Nelson and Graham shared a 1-stroke lead over John Schroeder, who scored eagle-3 on consecutive holes, veteran Bobby Nichols and Canadian Jim Nelford, tied at 66.

Bill Kratzert and George Burns headed a bulky group of 13 who shot 67's in the warm desert sunshine. Among those at 67 was Midland's John Adams, who had a 34 on the front side and a 33 on the back nine. Bruce Lietzke, a winner last week, had a 69. Arnold Palmer, as usual trailed by the largest gallery of the day, also was 2 under par. Johnny Miller, a winner at Tucson two weeks ago, was I over par at 72.

As usual, the flat little course yielded some extremely low scores. Well over half the field, 85 players, shot par or better.

"You expect low scores this week," said Graham, a former PGA cham-pion who didn't make a bogey in his first competitive round of the

"The course is in excellent condition. It's a short golf course. If you keep it in the fairway, you can shoot some very low numbers. And Graham had a very low number, 5-under-par 31, on his front side

He scored four birdies on putts in the six-eight foot range and flipped a wedge to within three feet of the flag for the other one.

His best shot, however, failed to produce a bird. He hit the bottom of the flagstick on the fifth hole, tearing up the cup. But the ball bounced out, rolled some four feet away and he missed the putt.

His only birdie on the back nine came on the 13th, where he holed a

short bunker shot.

Nelson, a soft-spoken man who won the Atlanta Classic last year, said he'd been putting very poorly in the first two tournaments of the year, missed a short one on the second hole and "I thought, well, here we go

But he got his approaches very close on the third and fourth, birdied both and then holed out a wedge shot for an eagle-3 on the seventh. And Nelson's putting turned around on the 10th. He birdied three holes

in a row and "I suddenly felt like I could make everything." But the putting touch left him as quickly as it had returned

With sole control of the lead, he made his only bogey of the day, missing a five-foot par-saving putt on the 14th and then failed on a couple of six-eight foot birdie putts on the 16th and 17th.

# NFL players seek pay hike

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - The Na tional Football League won't have to worry about the free agent issue anymore if it buys a proposal being prepared by Ed Garvey, executive director of the NFL Players Association. All it will cost is a doubling of

player salaries. Garvey said when negotations begin next year on a new collective bargaining agreement, the union will ask for 55 percent share of gross

'The free agent system doesn't work in the NFL," Garvey said. "No free agent system would work even if you eliminate compensation and the right of first refusal (which gives clubs a chance to match contract offers and retain players).'

Since free agency was introduced in the NFL in 1977, precious few players have switched teams. Garvey says he knows why

"The NFL smartly decided that each team receive one twenty-eighth of its television revenue," he said. 'The owners share the revenue equally. There is no economic incentive for management to win."

For that reason, said Garvey, teams see no need to bid for free agents who might improve their clubs. That being the case, Garvey is prepared to scrap the free agent concept for football players. But it will

"The NFLPA will negotiate for a percentage of gross revenue," he said. "As the league grows, we'll be happy and grow with them."

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

Toxic substance reported

NEW YORK (AP) - Oil containing traces of the toxic substance PCB has been found in gas delivered via an interstate pipeline originating in southern Louisiana and Texas to New York and Long Island utilities com-

The first discovery of PCBs in gas lines locally came 10 days ago, when oil containing traces of the substance was found clogging a Long Island Lighting Co., gas meter at a home in Suffolk County, a utilities spokesman

Since then, similar oil has been found in 11 other meters in scattered Suffolk locations, officials added.

On Monday, LILCO vice president Ira Freilicher said oil contaminated with PCBs had been found among the impurities cleansed from natural gas arriving by pipeline from the south-

western United States. Meanwhile, Con Edison announced it found traces of PCBs in oil removed from some of the gas coming into its system through interstate pipelines. Con Ed said it has found no traces of the chemical in the gas system serving its customers.

PCBs, or polychlorinated biphenyls, have been linked to cancer and liver damage.

Freilicher says LILCO buys its gas from the Transcontinental Gas Pipe Line Corp. and receives it through a pipeline that originates in southern Louisiana and Texas and travels underwater from Linden, N.J. to Long Beach, Long Island.

Before the gas is distributed to customers, it goes through a process called "scrubbing" at a "gate station" in Garden City, Long Island. It is there that Freilicher said conta'Most likely the PCBs are coming

Con Edison said it had no knowledge of PCBs coming through the pipelines in the past. It added that no PCBs had been found in gas purchased from the Algonquin Gas Transmission Co., which goes into the Con Edison system in northern Westchester County.

LILCO has not ruled out the possibility that PCBs have been entering its "gate station" for a number of years, Freilicher said. But he added, 'I have no reason to believe that. Our employees of the station so far have shown no ill effects.'

He said LILCO was "satisfied" the substance was not affecting its customers or employees. "It is just gumming up their meters," he said.

Freilicher said the most recent tests on the oil found in customers' gas meters showed maximum PCB concentrations of 0.8 percent. Con Edison said it found PCB concentrations of 2,000 parts per million in the case of Transcontinental gas and 1,-400 parts per million in the case of Tennessee Gas.

Comment from Tennessee and Transcontinental was not immediately available.

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

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# American grain, supplies now rolling across border to Mexico


BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Carloads of American grain and industrial supplies have begun to roll south across the border now that Mexico has relaxed its four-week-old general embargo against rail shipments from Texas, officials say.

Ferrocarriles Nacionales, Mexico's national railroad, has exempted grain, automobile parts, newsprint, scrap paper, iron ore, propylene, wood pulp, and some other industrial supplies from the embar-

go, said Texas Mexican Railway President Andres Ramos

"I guess they were getting a lot of pressure from people who buy these commodities. Some plants might close if they don't get these parts," Ramos said Thursday

The Mexican railway halted rail shipments from Texas in December because of a 32,000-car backup of foreign freight cars in the country.

The exemptions, which also include items imported by the national oil company Petroleos Mexicanos, were announced last week

Mark Barnett, sales manager for Missouri Pacific Railroad in Brownsville, said shipments to Mexico have resumed from the Missouri Pacific railhead. But he said he didn't know when the general embar-

go might be lifted. "I don't have any idea on that matter. It has to be up to the Mexican national line," he said. He declined to say how many tons of supplies have

Ramos said it could take a week to 10 days for some railways to secure supplies, permits and railcars necessary to resume shipments.

Grain shipments will be resumed only to three towns in the northern state of Tamaulipas - Rlo Brava, Rosita and Matamoros.

George Nicol, manager of the Port of Brownsville's grain elevator, said rail shipments also may resume from that terminal.

'There's been a translation problem and we don't know if we can load Mexican railcars," he said. "We're still sending everything by truck," he

Trucks carry between 50,000 and 60,000 bushels of grain to Mexico each day from the Brownsville port. Most of the freight is locally grown sorghum and

Severe drought and increased oil revenues last year prompted Mexico to buy almost 10 million tons of American grain.

Ramos estimated that his company, a short line with operations in Laredo and Corpus Christi, would ose at least \$1 million because of the embargo.

# Polish carry out warning strike

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - Streetcars and buses stopped, factory sirens blared and more than 60 plants and offices shut down today as Solidarity. Poland's largest independent trade union, carried out a four-hour warning strike in Warsaw to protest the government's rejection of a five-day work week.

Both blue and white-collar workers took part in the 8-to-noon shutdown, including the Polish Lot Airlines, the Academy of Sciences Institute for Physicial Chemistry and the staff of the Warsaw mint. Dozens of other institutions flew Polish flags and banners supporting the strikers.

Similar walkouts were reported in the southwestern coalmining city of Walbrzych and in Grudziadz in the north, a union spokes-

The strikes coincided with a Soviet newspaper report of joint 'field training' between Soviet and Polish troops. No date was given for the exercise, which appeared aimed at putting pressure

Solidarity went ahead with the strikes despite a Polish government spokesman's statement that the communist regime will not be "pressed" into a compromise.

The strikes are the latest in a series aimed at forcing the communist government to comply with terms of the Aug. 31 Gdansk agreement, which ended last summer's nationwide labor rebellion and authorized the Soviet bloe's first labor organizations independent of Communist Party control

Warning strikes Thursday shut down more than 800 plants in the tri-city region of Gdansk, Gdynia and Sopot, the Baltic seaport

spearhead of last summer's strike wave. Initial reports said a dozen cities were hit by strikes Thursday, but the official PAP news agency listed only five strike centers.

Union leaders are pressing for a five-day work week, while the government, claiming Poland's tottering economy cannot afford a five-day week, wants two Saturdays of work a month from the nation's workers.

Union representatives took notice of the nation's economic woes and offered to compromise over the hours to be worked each week. The two sides have moved to within one hour of each other, with the union proposing a 41 % hour week, while the government wants

However, they are still divided over Saturday work. Solidarity has ordered its estimated 10 million members to stay off the job this Saturday, a government-scheduled work day. It will be the second Saturday strike this month.

A hint of a compromise over working hours came Thursday night when government spokesman Jozef Barecki said the union's proposal for a 411/2 hour week was "a good step forward" that needed further study.

He said the government was willing to meet again with union leaders, even on television, "but not if we are pressed." Union leaders said they were unable to call off today's strike

because of mounting pressure from the rank and file.

Solidarity officials said the warning strikes are also in support of their demand for greater union access to the mass media, relaxation of censorship and enactment of labor legislation, all of which were promised in the Gdansk agreement.

Chun ordered the death sentence given Kim by a military court commuted to life imprisonment.

The Carter administration repeatedly warned that Kim's execution would have a very damaging impact on U.S. Korean relations. Since Reagan's inauguration on Tuesday there has been was considered a significant move to accomplish that.
