Productivity figures down; Caution urged

WASHINGTON (AP) A key barometer of the nation's future economic health fell 0.8 percent in December, and the productivity of American business and industry declined for the third straight year, the government reported Friday

Still another report showed sales of single-family homes down 25 percent last year, including a 3.4 percent drop in December.

However, economists cautioned against any reading of the figures as an indication that a big new recession was in the offing.

The Commerce Department's deputy chief economist, William Cox, conceded that the decline in the Index of Leading Indicators - after six consecutive monthly increases signals at least a slowdown in the nation's economic recovery from last spring's recession.

But he said it would be "premature to assume from one month's figures that we're headed over the hill and onto a downward slope again on any

Michael Evans, president of Evans Economics in Washington, agreed, saying that "if I were talking recession, I would have expected a bigger

The index provides a broad look at 10 different economic conditions in a

way designed to predict future activity In another report, the Labor Department said the productivity of private businesses fell at an annual rate of 19 percent in the fourth quarter of 1980 and was down 0.3 percent for the year. Productivity declined 0.4 per-

cent in 1979 and 0.2 percent in 1978 The fourth quarter decrease occurred because paid working hours declined 0.5 percent while output fell off at nearly twice that rate, 0.9 percent. That followed a third quarter in which business and labor registered a productivity gain at a 1.5 percent annual rate

Hours rose by 84 percent while output in goods and services rose by 6.3 percent last year, the department said

Manufacturing showed a 10.6 percent productivity gain in the fourth quarter but was about steady for the year, the report said. Overall, nonfarm business productivity declined by 0.5 percent for the year.

Economists have shown mounting concern about the recent national productivity decline, seeing it as a principal cause of inflation and economic stagnation

When productivity drops, rising wages cannot be offset by increased production. As a result, unit labor costs go up even more sharply, producing upward pressure on prices

The home sales report indicated that new house prices rose only about 3 percent to a median of \$64,600 for all of 1980 from 1979's median of \$62,900 but that they had risen to a median of \$67,900 by year's end

December's estimated sales of 31,000 houses translates into a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 545,000, compared with November's rate of 564,000, according to the report by the Commerce Department and the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Meanwhile, Cox said the decline in the leading indicators index "is con sistent with our long-held belief that the economic growth would slow substantially from the rather robust pace of the third and fourth quarters."

Seven of the 10 indicators dropped in December, with a 0.7 percent decline in the nation's money supply contributing most to the overall loss. That decline, however, could also mean less inflationary pressure and eventually lower interest rates

In New York on Friday, Citibank lowered its prime interest rate to 19.5 percent, becoming the second big bank this week to lower the rate from Other government indicators that fell in December were new orders for

consumer goods, contracts and orders for plant and equipment, prifes for key raw materials, building permits, stock prices and liquid assets The previously reported decline in building permits means housing starts

probably will be down in the first part of 1981, leading to construction job losses, Cox said

Among the other indicators, the average workweek and vendor activity were up in December, while the worker layoff rate was unchanged, the Commerce Department reported

Suspects sought in beating of officer, theft of DPS car

LAWN, Texas (AP) - One or more men believed responsible for beating a Department of Public Safety officer and taking his patrol car were being hunted in this small West Texas town late Friday night.

We believe we have at least one subject on foot in Lawn, and we have road blocks up in case they try to steal a car," said Wendall Reahm, a DPS officer in Abilene

Trooper Jay Moses of Coleman was reported in good condition at a Coleman hospital with a slight concussion, and hospital officials said he probably would be kept overnight for observa-

Moses was beaten, disarmed and his patrol car taken from him after he began chasing a pickup truck about 9:30 p.m. on U.S. 283 south of Santa Anna, the DPS said.

Someone in the pickup, registered

to a Midland man, reportedly fired a shot at Moses' patrol car while he was giving a ticket to the driver of another vehicle he had stopped moments ear-


Santa Anna is eight miles east of Coleman and 22 miles west of Brown-

Other officers were sent to the scene after Moses failed to check back with the DPS dispatcher after 10 minutes. He was found beaten and unconscious, two miles north of where his patrol car was found.

Road blocks were set up, and Reahm said a DPS unit intercepted the pickup at Lawn, which is eight miles northwest of Coleman and 25 miles south of Abilene.

"I believe some shots were fired, but no one was injured," said Reahm. One or more persons in the pickup then field on feet he said then fled on foot, he said.

Heart surgeon testifies in Sandiford's defense

HOUSTON (AP) - Noted heart surgeon Dr Denton Cooley testified Friday that while a slain colleague may have threatened to kill him, he believed the man wanted to frighten his own wife rather than destroy Coo-

Defense attorneys called Cooley as their last witness in the murder trial of Kathleen Sandiford, 41, widow of Dr. Frank Sandiford

Mrs Sandiford is accused of shooting her husband five times with a 357-caliber Magnum pistol during a Jan 29, 1980, argument at their fashionable River Oaks home

She said she fired in self defense, claiming her 47 year old husband physically, emotionally and psychologically abused her

During earlier testimony, Mrs. Sandiford testified that her husband had planned to kill Cooley in order to further his own career and warned the Mafia would "take care" of her if she told Cooley of his plan

Cooley testified Sandiford never openly threatened him or any associ-

It must have been an effort to terrorize her and indicates just how unstable he was But I don't believe he would have had the courage to do something like that," he said

Sandiford came to Houston in 1968 and worked a year under Dr. Michael DeBakes at Methodist Hospital Hethen joined Cooley's staff for a reported \$370 000 a year

Cooley said he noticed changes in Sandiford's personality shortly before his death and knew he had been tak ing drugs

Sandiford accused other cardiovas cular surgeons of "conspiring to prevent him from getting ahead." omplained about the competency of



staff members and threw instruments in the operating room when they did not function to his satisfaction, Cooley

Cooley said he also was aware of Sandiford's intense desire to have Cooley's job, chief of surgery at the Texas Heart Institute

I told him that as long I was remained active, the best he could hope for would be second in command, and probably third or fourth,

Cooley said Prosecutors asked if Sandiford realized he would not get the post

He apparently was unable to see what everyone else did." Cooley said He was a very self-assured man, and since he was the oldest (of the associates) he probably assumed he would be named as chief

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Cubans won't be moved to East Texas communities

DALLAS (AP) — Opposition from residents of seven East Texas counties has prompted an Illinois organization to scrap plans to relocate Cuban refugees there from Fort Chaffee, Ark.

At a news conference Friday, Texas Gov. Bill Clements said he had not been informed of the decision, but said he was "satisfied the Cuban issue

"I have been adamantly opposed to such an idea and will fight it unless they have jobs and can be assimilated into the community and the community says they can handle them."

State Attorney General Mark White, who also got involved in the controversy, said Friday he had received notification of the decision and

In a statement issued Thursday from its Wheaton office, World Relief Organization noted "the communities indicated they were not in favor of the resettlement" of the 5,800 refugees still in Arkansas.

The statement said the East Texas plans were laid after the organization resettled a group of Cubans in Haltom City last fall. After this experience, which was very favorable, we were asked again

for help through the citizenry of East Texas," the statement said. The Justice Department contacted key East Texas public officials about the proposed relocation, and the officials were told as many as 2,000 Cubans would be sent to the area if jobs and housing could be found. After receiving permission from Washington, local U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service officials began scheduling exclusion hearings for some 4,000 Haitians caught trying to enter the country since Oct. 10, said Richard Gullage, deputy director of the INS office in Miami.

The hearings are the first step in deportation

There are an estimated 27,000 refugees from the impoverished island nation seeking political asylum in the Miami area. The government says they came here for economic, not political, reasons.

Those who arrived before Oct. 10 are exempt from the hearings because the State Department created a new immigration class for them and for new Cuban refugees during the Cuban boatlift last year. Their final status has not yet been determined.

Haitian leaders and their attorneys reacted angrily to the news. But they said no decision has been made on whether to fight the hearings in court.

"No other ethnic groups are going to be taken to court," said the Rev. Gerard Jean-Juste of the Haitian Refugee Center Inc. "This is the beginning of our troubles all over again. We do hope the hearings, if they have to take place, will be fair and will allow the Haitians to obtain asylum in this

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Texas cities may receive Cambodians

DALLAS (AP) - Ten U.S. cities, including Dallas and Houston, tentatively have been selected as resettlement areas for between 300 and 1,000 Cambo-

dian refugees apiece As many as 25,000 Cambodians now living in camps in Thailand may immigrate to the United States during the next six months, but relations betwen Thai and American officials will determine the actual number, said Cindy Coleman of the office of refugee resettlement in the Health and Human Services Department in Washington.

Other cities targeted for the refugees are Boston, Phoenix, Ariz., New York, Cincinnati, Atlanta, Ga. Syracuse, N.Y., Columbus, Ohio, and DeKalb, Ill. Other U.S. cities could receive between 300 and 500

Indochinese immigration is limited to 168,000 people a year or an average of 14,000 each month, said H.B. Cushing, director of the office of Asian refugees at the State Department in Washington.

During the past six months, he said, 84,000 Indochinese immigrants were admitted to the United States, including 2,000 to 3,000 Cambodians. In the next six months, however, as resettlement of the Khmer Republic increases, Cushing estimated Cambodian refugees will account for 20,000 to 25,000 of 84,000 Indochinese admitted.

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Circumstances may stop Spanish king's U.S. visit

MADRID (AP) — King Juan Carlos, faced with Spain's worst political crisis since the dictatorship of Gen. Francisco Franco, may have to cancel a visit to the United States next month unless Parliament

approves a new government quickly, U.S. officials said Friday.

The king began formal consultations with political parties on a replacement for former Premier Adolfo Suarez, who resigned unexpectedly Thursday after nearly five years in office.

Palace sources said the resignation would not prevent Juan Carlos from making a controversial visit next week to the rebellious northern Basque region, where separatist guerrillas claimed responsibility for 95 assassinations last year.

But U.S. officials, who asked not to be named, said the king may have to cancel a Feb. 9-17 visit to the United States if a new government is not in

Suarez' ruling Union of the Democratic Center has nominated Deputy Premier Leopoldo Calvo Sotelo, 54, to succeed him as premier and party chief.

Calvo Sotelo, a former Minister for Common Market Relations expressed confidence of parliamentary approval for the appointment, despite the party disarray Suarez blamed in part for his resignation. But the constitution requires Calvo sotelo to win at least 176 votes in the

350-seat lower house of Parliament for confirmation as premier. The UCD controls only 168 seats.

If two attempts to confirm a new premier fail in the lower house, Juan Carlos is required by the constitution to call elections within two

months.

Juan Carlos picked Suarez, 48, to replace Carlos Arias Navarro as premier eight months after Franco's death in 1975 ended 36 years of dicta-

Suarez subsequently persuaded the Franco parliament to vote itself out of existence, instituted a multiple party political system and presided over the nation's first democratic elections since 1931 and the passage of a constitution.

a constitution.

A top UCD official who asked not to be named said Suarez resigned because he believed the party was about to dump him.

He said the premier had come under increasing criticism that he had run the government and party in a high-handed manner, isolated himself from voters and failed to curb terrorism, inflation and unemployment.

Only 14 votes saved Suarez from a no-confidence motion in Parliament last September.

Diplomatic sources said the Suarez' aides reported he had been taking sleeping pills and tranquilizers for the past few months.

But the dark, handsome politician left the door open for a comeback by resigning undefeated.

"He has gone with dignity, with head held high, although he failed to explain many things," the newspaper Diario 16 said.

South African commandos raid Mozambique, defense chief says

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — South African commandos crossed into Mozambique in a daring night raid Friday, smashing a black nationalist headquarters and killing several guerrilla commanders, South Africa's defense chief announced.

The attack, the first known South African military raid into neighboring Mozambique, was confirmed in a military communique from Mozambique reporting several killed, including one Portuguese national.

A diplomatic source in Maputo, capital of Mozambique, a former Portuguese colony, said the attackers used rockets, mortars and automatic weapons in the 2 a.m. attack and spoke of seeing the bodies of six guer-

rillas, some with their ears cut off.

Gen Constant Viljoen, chief of South African defense forces, refused to provide details of the 40-mile assault to strike at the outskirts of Mapouto. He said the attack was aimed at the African National Congress, ANC, a group that seeks to overthrow the South Africa's white-minority government.

A statement by the defense forces said the attack followed information that Maputo "iy used as a springboard for terror against South Afri-

Viljoen said the "targets were completely destroyed and numerous ANC terrorists, including senior commanders, killed in the attack." His statement said weapons and sabotage equipment were seized.

Viljoen's statement mentioned no South African casualties, but the Portuguese national news agency said one member of the strike force was killed.

The agency said the slain Portuguese, identified as Jose Antonio Ramos, was caught in a cross fire between the South African commandos and ANC members. The agency reported five ANC members killed in the assault on an ANC house in the suburb of Matola, 10 miles northwest

of the capital.

The Portuguese news agency said Mozambican soldiers and armored cars rushed to the scene of the attack, but arrived too late.

Mozambique became independent in 1975 under the Marxist government of President Samora Machel.

In Quito, the Ecuadorean government said all was quiet in the disputed border zone, where Ecuador announced Wednesday that the Piquisha military post had been attacked by Peruvian helicopters and planes.

It reported two of its soldiers were killed and an unspecified number of others were wounded during those air raids. Peru said Thursday there were casualties on both sides, but gave no figures.

The Peruvian Armed Forces Joint Command maintained strict silence on military operations since the dispute became public and did not say if the claimed ouster of Ecuadorean forces from the area involved fighting.

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

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

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

of the city's children. Renfrew said he was uncertain how much additional federal help could be given in the investigation, but he said he would discuss the problem with other federal agency heads when he returned to Washington.

Renfrew said he intends "to have a series of progress reports on what we do. I can say we will keep in close contact with the mayor. I don't intend to go back to Washington and not be

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

'Apostle of peace' or 'traitor in Tehran'?

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) - He calls himself an "apos-Expelled from Brazil, Jalled in Chica go, the Rev. Darrell Rupiper is again under fire this time from some of the 52 Americans who were held hostage in Iran for 141/2 months.

Rupiper, a priest of the Roman Catholic Oblate order, is accused by some of the ex-hostages of not accurately describing their treatment while in cap-

Rupiper, 43, visited the hostages twice, once in February and April 1980. He said after both trips the hostages appeared to be well-treated, and told of "a spirit of camaraderie, joviality and fellowship be-

tween hostages and captors.' Publicly supportive of the aims - though not the tactics - of the Iranian militants, Rupiper urged the United States to comply with their demands.

After the hostages were released and began telling of brutality, mock executions and other mistreatment. Rupiper said he was "shocked and surprised" by their stories. He said the hostages with whom he had talked "were effusive in their praise of how they were being treated."

Former hostage Charles Jones said earlier this week one of the three clergymen who visited Iran last April was slipped a note by one of the hostages detailing mistreatment. Jones, while not identifying either the hostage or the cleric, said the clergyman promptly turned the note over to the mili-

Rupiper said he had been handed a note by a hostage, whom he declined to name, and that he turned it over to the Iranians after they asked him to do so. He said he did not read the note

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
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Reagan accused of 'distortions' about Soviet goals

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet Union on Friday accused President Reagan of making "deliberate distortions" about Soviet foreign policy goals. It said the new president made "unseemly" remarks at his first formal news conference.

Soviet television, meanwhile, accused U.S. Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig of insulting the Soviet Union by saying earlier in the week that this nation encourages international terrorism.

A statement carried by the official news agency Tass said Reagan told reporters "in particular that so far detente has been a one-way street that the Soviet Union has used to pursue its own aims, and that the Soviet Union stood to gain more from detente than the United States."

'Such contentions" raise the question of which country stands to gain from peace, even though "peace is equally needed" by all peoples, including Sovie ts and Americans, Tass

"Then Ron ald Reagan spoke in an unseemly ma nner about some insidiousness of the Soviet Union's policy which supposedly sets the aim of creating one world socialist or com-munist state," the statement said. "Such worcls." it said, "can only

mean that the people in Washington apparently cannot understand the meaning of the changes taking place in the world."

These chan ges "are generated by the striving of peoples for national liberation, in dependence, economic and social progress" and are not dependent on eit her the United States or the Soviet Uni on, the statement said.

Reagan "ob viously distorted the essence of the rmatter" in referring to the SALT II tr eaty to limit U.S. Soviet strategic we apons, the statement

The preside nt contended that the

treaty in its present form encourage growth of such weapons and he calls for holding new talks, the Soviet delaration said.

'But it followed from what was sal by Reagan that the main matter ; these talks should be not the discusion of the terms of limiting the arm race but the linking of this probles with other unrelated issues," it said

The statement made no reference i Reagan's characterization of Sovie leaders as men who feel free "I commit any crime, to lie, to cheat" i advance their interests.

Instead, it stressed Reagan's con ments about Soviet foreign policy i general and his economic policy t battle inflation in the United States. Soviet television also carried th

Tass statement in its main evenin news program without referring t Reagan's blast at Soviet leaders. In a separate comment - the firs Soviet reaction to Haig's statement of

"such assertions are at least absurd and insulting to our country. "The Soviet Union has condemned and is condemning terrorist acts. It is

sufficient to turn the pages of our newspapers to become convinced about our sharply negative position toward acts of the so-called Red Brigades in Italy or remnants of the Baader-Meinhof group in West Germany." Boris Kalyagin said on the early evening news.

Kalyagin did not dispute that the Soviets were supporting "national lib-eration movements" but he denied Haig's charge that this promoted international terrorism.



A survey of 17 large local unions Thursday showed votes against the contract outnumbered something both Chrysler 198 2 those in favor by 10,261 to 10,153, the Detroit News

reported. Some other large locals have reported apthem Local 372 at the en gine plant in Trenton, Mich. near Detroit, by 985-542, and Local 136 at Fenton, Mo., by "about 63 percent" of some 1,700 ballots.

"It's passing," UAW spokesman Don Stillman said of the contract.

Late Friday, union of ficials in Newark, Del. announced that mem bers of UAW Local 1183 voted by a two-to-one margin in favor of the contract concessions sought by the carmaker. The final tally at the plant which produces Chrysler's K-cars was 2, 007 for the pay cut and

1,046 against. 'We didn't enjoy putting a mark on that yes vote," said local president Richard McDonaugh. "But the alternative could be a whole lot worse.

Stillman said he had no other up-to-date figures. The union has about 85 locals in Chrysler with about 61,000 active and 49,000 laid-off workers eligible to vote.

Stillman said he expected eventual approv al because "most of the locals where we expected it to go down have al ready voted.

"We have to believe what (UAW President) Doug Fraser and (Vice President) Marc Stepp tell us, that it will pass, said Bill Stempien Chrysler spokesman.



as outrageous. It is more believable than "Dallas," the dialogue more intelligent, the characters more complex than the cardboard cutouts of the CBS

Hopkins' face was up around one eye and a cheek to make it look as though he'd been in a fight. In the story, he'd just come from a set-to with a man who tried to pin the blame for an accident on Steven, Forsythe's homosexual son, who now works for Hop-

kins "All the time I worked for Carrington (Forsythe), I was the son he wanted Steven to be," Hopkins said later. "And Steven always came to me with his problems. Carrington and I had a father-son relationship, so that it makes the break harder."

Hopkins' character of Matthew Blaisdel comes off as cool and competent between Robertson's blow-hard wildcatter (Walter Lankershim) and Forsythe's mixture of venom and urbanity as Blake Carrington. 'Matthew doesn't play games the way Walter and Carrington do," Hopkins said. "He tries to be honest, but he makes mistakes.

The actor admitted there is a lot of himself in the character. "That's the way the character's written," he said. "I've tried to make him vulnerable. We've made him complex so that he can go in five different directions. "He handles Walter by

making him laugh. He uses a different approach with Steven. He tries reverse psychology with his wife, who's been in a mental institution. "I like playing with

John," Hopkins said. 'There's an oppositeness between us that works. He has perfect diction and I mumble. He's very suave. He can tell a lie and make it sound like the truth. I'm more blunt.'


"I've turned down sev-eral series over the past two years," he said, "but when Dick and Esther Shapiro sent me their script, I liked that char-acter."

Plainview among cities trying to save downtown

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) - A familiar sight in Texas has become increasingly vacant downtown areas while development moves out to the city limits.

"I think the word is all roads used to lead to downtown and now they lead out of downtown," Anice Read of the Texas Historical Commission said Thursday

She was attending a meeting of representatives from 30 small cities - including five from Texas - starting a National Main Street Center project designed to prevent or reverse downtown deterioriation.

The stories the project managers from the Texas towns of Eagle Pass, Navasota, Hillboro, Plainview and Seguin tell are similar.

In Eagle Pass on the Mexican border, for example, plans call for a large enclosed mall on the outskirts of the city and for a highway leading straight from the international bridge to the new mall.

Arch March, the town's Main Street manager, estimated the vacancy rate downtown is 15-20 percent including the upstairs areas above stores.

He said many of the buildings have been modernized and as a result much of the flavor of Texas border architecture has been lost.

We can go to the building owners and say, 'Hey, there's a better way,' March said, noting that much of the restoration could be done for a small

"They will be working to change the image of downtown in the eyes of the community," Mrs. Read, the Texas coordinator for the project, said about

all five towns. She said Rita Clements, wife of Texas Gov. Bill Clements, is scheduled to tour the five towns in February to show "the governor's commitment" to the new project.

The National Trust for Historic Preservation has organized the Main Street project.

Tom Moriarty, the trust's coordinator of the Texas project, said the general idea is to make sure that all the elements of a healthy downtown are in place - including retailing, transportation and recreation - so residents don't have to travel elsewhere for the goods and services they

"There is a general impression of historic preservation being a museum," he said. "We're talking about economic development ... bringing those buildings to their highest use.

Moriarty said the project is designed to attract as much private participation as possible through spreading information about tax incentives and other means, although government funds are involved as

The project managers for the five Texas towns say their goal is not to follow a master plan of historic preservation and turn each downtown into a miniature Old Town Alexandria, a

historical area across the Potomac River from Washington where the national conference is being held.

"It's a terribly flexible plan," Mary Crites of Plainview said. "I don't particularly see it as a plan.

She said the South Plains city's downtown faces future problems because it will be bypassed by a new interstate highway between Lubbock and Amarillo, and a regional mall is planned on the outskirts of town.

Moriarty said the Main Street project in each town is tailored to meet specific needs.

Hillsboro project manager Paula Peters said downtown there remains occupied but merchants would like to recapture the customers they lost to more sophisticated shopping areas in the expanding Dallas-Fort Worthmetropolitan area just to the north.

She said the town's Main Street project will try to get merchants to capitalize on the local flavor to persuade customers to return. Marketing studies will be run to find out what the local people need to be able to find downtown

After that, Ms. Peters said the local atmosphere will be promoted outside of Hillsboro in an attempt to draw in new customers.

Mrs. Read noted that no one is predicting overnight success for the Main Street programs, even though the three pilot projects in the Midwest that started in 1977 were considered

"Downtown didn't die in one year, the Texas Historical Commission official said. "We see it worth at least a three-year program.'

She said the five cities were chosen because they had a "can-do attitude" and illustrated many of the problems typical in smaller Texas cities and

'We've had a tremendous amount of interest from all over the state from other cities," Mrs. Read said. She added that plans call for five cities to be added to the program next

Among the programs at the weeklong conference were sessions on real estate and banking, how to attract retailers, economics and architecture, design and promotion.

Mark Malnory, the Navasota project manager, said commercial development on a loop outside of town has started to make its impression felt on the East Texas city's down-

Seguin project manager Vince Houser said the vacancy rate in the town east of San Antonio is not as great as in the other towns, but physical improvements on the downtown buildings could make them more attractive and prevent future prob-

Is it 'curtains' for Central Park?

...Only if avant garde artist has his way

NEW YORK (AP) - Christo, the artist, envisions a Central Park lined with 27 miles of gates, each with a golden banner drifting in the breeze.

The Central Park Community Fund envisions a park ruined by "11,000 shower curtains flapping in the wind." City Parks Commissioner Gordon Davis is a man searching for

It is up to Davis to decide whether Christo, the 45-year-old Bulgarian-born artist who once built a 24-mile-long fence across two counties of California and wrapped up the sidewalks of Kansas City, Mo., can go ahead with his proposal for Central

For two weeks in October 1983 or 1984, Christo hopes to erect between 11,000 and 15,000 rectangular steel frames, each 15-feet tall, in rows along walkways throughout the 840-acre Manhattan

park. A woven nylon banner would hang from each frame, stopping 51/2 feet from the ground. The slightest wind would cause the

'It will make the walkways much more visible from the high-rise buildings around the park and will look like golden leaves touching each other," Christo said in an interview Thursday. "And underneath, you will walk through this promenade and there will be these incredible shadows."

The cost of the project, estmated at between \$4 million and \$5 million, will be borne by Christo, who says he will raise money by selling 500 sketches and other renderings of the project for sums

ranging from \$6,500 to \$25,000 each. Christo says 95 percent of the money will be spent here, with much of that going to hire 1,200 minority youths to erect "The Gates" in 21/2 days. Some 340 youths would remain as guides, distributing maps and samples of the fabric used and acting

The Amsterdam News, a newspaper with a primarily black readership, has published editorials in favor of "The Gates," praising the concept and the jobs it will bring. And Joe Bresnan, director of historic parks for the city, says most of the city's art establishment has lined up behind Christo.

It is the parks establishment - the Central Park Community Fund, the New York Audubon Society and similar groups which opposes the project.

"Just as you do not go around putting one painting one top of another, you do not go around putting pieces of art on top of the park," said Anna Levin, executive director of the community

Miss Levin's group has contributed \$1.5 million to the park in the past six years, and members feel "The Gates" could damage

It is the most massive, obnoxious intrusion on the park that has ever been proposed," she said.

By his own count, Christo has made almost 50 presentations of his proposal since last April. These meetings have ranged from polite to raucous, with Christo's critics arguing, among other things, that "The Gates" would disrupt bird migration and harm

'The shroud-like qualities of Christo's work, his mummification of buildings" indicate "a concern not with life, but with death," Community Board 5 Chairman Fred Beckhardt told a meeting last week. "Really, what he's trying to do is bury us and

But at the same meeting, Paula Dietz, an editor of the Hudson Review, a literary quarterly, said the project was "a vast golden river created by wind' that would create "a new awe and respect for the park by allowing us to experience its grandeur.'

Christo says he isn't surprised by the fireworks over "The Gates" He had to hire nine lawyers to fight challenges to his California "Running Fence." His "Wrapped Walk Ways" in Kansas City, Mo., also caused local outrage.

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
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20-footer with 3 seconds left beats Rebels


'The top four were so close for the last two rounds it seemed anything might happen," the 26-year-old Holman said. "I'm drained, every shot

Crowds, TV ratings all jumped

HONOLULU (AP) - Pete Rozelle said Friday that the 1980 National Football League season was the best in his 21-year tenure as commissioner - in all but one regard.

"From almost every barometer this was the league's best year," Rozelle said. "We had the highest average paid attendance, just under 60,000 per game; our television ratings were up; teams were very competitive and we had tight divisional

"But it's depressing to have off-field things diluting somewhat what was done on the field."

The "off-field things" were mavarick Oakland Raiders general managing partner Al Davis and his antitrust lawsuit against the NFL as he seeks to move the team to Los Angeles.

The suit asks that the court rules invalid an NFL rule requiring three-fourths of the league's 28 owners to approve any franchise move. The owners earlier voted 23-0 not to allow Davis to move the Raiders to Los Angales. The case is scheduled to go to court Feb. 7 in Los Angeles, but Rozelle said he believes it

'Both sides agree there's too much work to be done to start on Feb. 9," said Rozelle, who added that a motion also has been filed by the NFL to move the trial out of Los Angeles.

The commissioner, in Honolulu for Sunday's Pro

Bowl game, criticized "leaks" from depositions already given in the case. Davis reportedly testified about Super Bowl ticket scalping, saying Rozelle might even be involved.

Our attorneys feel that a great deal of material that has been given to the press is invalid and unlikely to be admitted in the court case," the commissioner said.

On other subjects, Rozelle indicated that the NFL would like a long-term host city commitment for the Pro Bowl (with Honolulu the obvious site); said a lack of officiating controversies this season was a matter of "good officiating and good luck," and that he was concerned about rising ticket prices.

The commissioner said an announcement would be made prior to Sunday's game regarding the 1982 Pro Bowl site. Since Honolulu is the only city the NFL has discussed the game with, the choice is obvious.

Ragarding ticket prices, rising rapidly in most NFL cities, Rozelle said: "I think you can price yourself to the point you're going to lose interest. I'd like to see the entire economics of the sport level

"Everything has been skyrocketing in recent vears - television, player salar-les."

Rozelle said there would be no additional televised games next year, since the league has always felt you go slowly so as not to overex pose the sport.

Super Bowl ring still Earl's goal

HONOLULU (AP) - Earl Campbell has demanded more money and he wasn't happy to see Bum Phillips fired, but Houston's superlative runner still hopes to wear an Oiler uniform - and a Super Bowl ring.

The NFL rents the huge Rivergate auditorium, hires

Count Basie, Doc Severinsen and hordes of logal musicians and entertainers, an army of waiters and chefs. They leak money going through Super Bowl week.

I saw people offering \$100 above the fare for airline tickets out of New Orleans the day after Super Bowl

Which brings up the matter of tickets: 75,500 Super Bowl tickets at \$40 a ticket comes to \$3 million. But everyone including the IRS knows the take was far more than that. Over a third of the people in the house paid as high as \$150 to \$200 a head. That's \$4.5 million or maybe even \$5.5 million. That's a lot of under-the-table revenue. Presumably, not all of it is re-

SINCE THE Super Bowl is played in the sun belt at a holiday site, it's common practice for travel agencies in the frozen north to offer package tours to their customers. It behooves them to get Super Bowl tickets and tickets to as many other glamor events as the week will schedule. They make an enormous profit on the tours but, since the whole thing balances on the procurement of Super Bowl tickets, they will pay almost any

The Super Bowl used to let the team and the host city walk off with as many as a third of the seats. This was because, in those days, they needed the support of the host franchise's season-ticket holders. You have to remember the Super Bowl did not sell out its first couple of years. Only 61,946 showed up for the first one in the 100,000-seat Los Angeles Coliseum. The next two years, in the Orange Bowl, it required salesmanship and effort and ingenuity to fill the seats. Not until the AFL achieved credibility with the Namath Jets in the third year did Super Bowling become an Ameri-

But not until last year did the league lop the allotment to the host team. The Rams got 30,000 for the 1977 Super Bowl in the Rose Bowl. The New Orleans Saints got 7,300 seats

TEE TIME

THE NFL now realizes that fans in a city going to the Super Bowl will find a way to make the trek there if they can only get tickets. So the competing teams got 16,000 tickets each this year. They sold most of them to their season ticket-holders. But they have no way of knowing how many of these found their way into the hands of scalpers. The NFL office gets 10,000 tickets and each team in the league

Various solutions have been offered: raise the prices to the level they will reach on the black market, or auction the tickets off.

The culprit is the character of the American people, their desire to be at the center of a great event. It ministers to one's sense of elitism. Tex Rickard, the fight promoter, knew this when he elaborately hyped his prize fights, then printed his tickets on gold cardboard till they looked like invitations to a coronation. When he died, it was no accident that the Broadway ticket speculators, notably Mike Jacobs, took over the sport.

Whatever the abuses, a Super Bowl puts a lot of people to work, and is big bucks to the entire nation.

The NFL hopes to do something to stop abuses at its winter meetings in March. There's really only one thing they can do: cancel the Super Bowl.

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
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

Some roads were still impassable in the southern Appalachians after heavy snow Friday that resulted from a storm that dumped up to a foot of snow in parts of Kansas.

Freezing rain and snow continued in mountainous parts of Kentucky, western Virginia, northern North Carolina and South Carolina.

On Thursday, the storm had pushed into Missouri from Kansas. More than 6,000 residents of southeastern Missouri lost electrical service when snow and freezing rain broke power lines.

Central and southeastern Montana also had freezing drizzle Friday.

In drought-stricken eastern New York, a January precipitation released Friday shows far below-normal figures for the month. Precipitation in the eastern Catskills was 0.66 inches or 20 percent of normal during January, while in the lower Hudson Valley, the figure was 0.8 inches or 31 percent of normal

Temperatures at 2 p.m. EST ranged from 79 at Laredo, Texas, to 7 at Montpelier, Vt., and Saranac

For Saturday, scattered snow was forecast from the northern two-thirds of the Mississippi Valley across the central part of the nation to Montana

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
Snow storm pushing eastward

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Sleep disorder program founded

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - Almost every person has difficulty sleeping at one time or another, but the problem is usually temporary.

If the sleeplessness persists for three to four weeks or longer, the type of insomnia is of interest to the sleepdisorder program established at the Oregon Neurosciences Center, operating in conjunction with Good Samaritan Hospital and Medical Cen-

The director of the new program, Dr. Gerald B. Rich, has been assistant professor of neurology at Johns Hopkins and co-director of the Baltimore Regional Sleep Disorder Cen-

The Neurosciences Center Regional Sleep Disorders Program here is the only one of its size in the Northwest. It covers the full spectrum of the field diagnosis, treatment and research. It plans to enroll about 500 patients during the first year. The Baltimore center sees some 1,000 patients a year.

"The main idea here was to develop the major regional center for the study of sleep-related problems," said Rich. Most patients will be re-

ferred by physicians. Among the disorders to be studied in the new clinic will be those involved

with initiating and maintaining

There can be a variety of causes, from simple situational and transient insomnia to the more persistent, serious psychological problems, some of them the result of using medication, particularly sleep-inducing drugs.
"Most of the sedative-hypnotic

drugs are fine for transient circumstances and can be used a week or two with impunity," Rich said. "But they can begin to exert major changes in the architecture of sleep itself." The drugs, and he said they include alcohol, can cause adverse changes.

Depression of any type, or a sense of loss from a variety of circumstances, can make it difficult to fall

asleep, he said. There are also physically or biologically based causes, such as manic-depressive illness in its depressed phase. Chronic pains are a great disturber of sleep.

A person's sleep is divided into cycles averaging 90 minutes. There are two different kinds of sleep, REM (rapid eye movement) and non-REM sleep. Most REM sleep, said Rich, occurs in the early morning hours just before awakening.

From 10 to 15 percent of the population has complaints about either the quality or quantity of sleep. The less severe problems are caused by psychological difficulties or emotional

Mother, principal fight after school spanking

School officials say they will prosecute a woman accused of assaulting an elementary school principal in a lunchroom after the administrator spanked her daughter.

why her 9-year-old child had been "whipped," police said.

Police said Ms. Pattee was trapped against a window during the incident and struck in the face. The blow, and several others left Ms. Pattee with a 5-inch cut on her face, a swollen black eye and soreness on the back of her head, police said. The principal covered her head and ran

from the room. Ms. Pattee, who declined to talk about the row, did not attend school Thursday.

Seattle School District policy and state law allow spanking by a teacher or district official. Parental permission is not required.

The daughter, who

school authorities said has been a disciplinary problem in the past, was sent to the principal's office by her teacher. The teacher called the girl's mother to explain why the child was being disciplined

Police said Ms. Pattee spanked the child seven times on the bottom with a ruler after asking the girl what she thought her punishment should be. The girl then left, but did not cry

The police report said Ms. Gosby arrived at the school about 45 minutes later and confronted the principal. Ms. Pattee pointed out that she was on lunchroom duty and would explain the situation in a few minutes, police said.

But the mother wanted to talk about it immediately, according to Jim Hawkins, school district spokesman.

Ms. Pattee had her glasses knocked off and some of her hair pulled out, Hawkins said.

Glowing creatures studied

LA JOLLA, Calif. (AP) Marine biologists are setting up shop about a half-mile off San Diego's coast to learn why many sea creatures glow in the ocean's gloomy depths.

The significance of bioluminescence is uncertain, according to Jon Warner, a University of California researcher involved in the project. But the Navy is helping to finance the \$800,000 project, and Warner said Thursday, without elaboration, "Uhuy'terested for military reasons."

Warner also said scientists have used chemicals from fire, which are alsm bioluminescent, to measure oxygen aldenzymes in human cells. Chemicals from jellyfish have been used to measure the cal-

cium level in cells. Until now, Warner said, it been virtually impossible to make longterm studies of sea creatures' bioluminescence. Up to 90 percent of the animals on the ocean's floor glow in the dark, he

But with the new equipment, which was to be installed today, "we have the capability to collect data 24 hours a day from our station," he

said. The instruments are being suspended from an anchored buoy floating 50 feet below the ocean surface. In La Jolla, scientists at UC's Scripps Institution of Oceanography say they will be able to obtain clear and undisturbed pictures of the creatures' light pat-

The buoy is expected to be held stationary by three steel cables tied to base stands, each weighted with four 800-pound locomotive wheels. But Warner says it may not be strong enough to withstand the currents in what is known as Scripps Submarine Canyon. Inchthick steel bars have been bent by currents

there. A photometer similar to instruments used by astronomers to measure starlight will be used to record the light flashes of marine organisms while a computer system back at Scripps will store the information and catalog it.

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


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
