

# Courtroom camera decision delayed

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas Supreme Court probably will not decide how and if television cameras should be allowed in courtrooms until October, the chairman of a State Bar committee said Friday.

State District Judge Tom Cave of Fort Worth, chairman of the Committee on Cameras in the Courtroom, said "at least a straw vote" will be taken among judges in September in Corpus Christi.

A recent U.S. Supreme Court decision upheld Florida guidelines allowing televised trials in that state. Televisions have been barred in Texas courtrooms since the early 1960s when the Billie Sol Estes case was overturned because of problems caused by the coverage.

The committee — including judges, lawyers and reporters — began its work before the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision. At Friday's session committee members looked at a proposed set of guidelines and an expensive camera system that would eliminate the need for cameramen in the courtroom.

The Texas Supreme Court is awaiting proposed guidelines from the committee.

Cave said advanced technology makes television far less distracting than it was in the 1960s.

However, he said, "One of the major objections is the tendency of everyone who is human to say, 'Hi mom,' or, 'Gee, I'm on Candid Camera, what should I say?'"

Adding cameras to a courtroom increases the problems for a judge, he said.

"In the high-publicity cases the judge is as tight as a G-string on a guitar...without worrying about TV," he said.

The proposed guidelines offered by the Texas Associated Press Broadcasters were taken from guidelines in effect in California. Among the decisions the committee must make before making a recommendation to the Texas Supreme Court is who will have control over whether cameras are allowed into specific trials.

Some states require approval from an administrative judge or an appeals court. However, Cave said the Texas Supreme Court probably would favor leaving the decision up to the trial judge.

"The judge has to run his courtroom," said Cave. "We'll never sell to the Supreme Court the idea that every trial judge must allow television at every trial."

The APB guidelines call for a one-year test of cameras in Texas courtrooms. The guidelines call for a pool arrangement, with only one television cameraman and one still photographer. Each must stay in a designated position, and is limited in what equipment could be used.

Additional lighting would be barred, as would any noisy equipment that might be distracting.

APB proposed a ban on televising or photographing undercover agents and rape and incest victims who testify. Robert Jones, president of the Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association, questioned whether an undercover agent is still undercover when he takes the witness stand.

Judge Truman Roberts of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals said, "I think you'll find some law that says once they take the stand" they are no longer undercover agents.

The demonstration of computerized camera equipment raised the question of cost. The voice-activated system, with five cameras, costs \$20,000 for black-and-white television. Color cameras cost about \$40,000 each, according to John Harms of Magnetic Media of Austin, who demonstrated the system.

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## Economic forecast appears optimistic

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration will soon publish a highly optimistic economic forecast predicting recession for the middle of this year but rapid recovery and a declining rate of inflation in 1982.

In the forecast, inflation falls to a 6½ percent rate next year from its current double-digit pace, on down to about a 4½ percent rate in 1983 and perhaps as low as 3 percent in 1984, administration sources said.

The forecast puts in concrete terms for the first time the most important, and critics say, least certain element in President Reagan's forthcoming economic program of large cuts in both federal taxes and spending. That is the assumption by Reagan economists that their government-shrinking policies will almost of themselves produce a near-180-degree turnabout in the economic expectations and behavior of consumers and businessmen. Beyond that, the predicted economic expansion and falling inflation rates are keys to balancing the budget in fiscal 1983.

But the crucial Reagan forecast already has been described by one

critic as "completely implausible," and will set off a major debate among economists and on Capitol Hill over whether the administration's new policies, to be unveiled Feb. 18, can produce such dramatic results.

While the final numbers still are being debated by administration economists, this rosy forecast will include a 7 percent increase in real gross national product next year — that is, after adjustment for inflation. That would be double the growth predicted last month by the Carter administration in its last forecast.

The fast growth would continue in 1983, with real output going up another 4½ percent or 5 percent. No details were available about how high the administration expects unemployment to rise during the expected mild mid-year recession or how fast it would come down in 1982 or 1983. Last month the rate was 7.4 percent, unchanged from December, the Labor Department said Friday.

The enormous reduction in inflation included in the Reagan forecast is sharply at odds with virtually all predictions made by other economists recently. The Carter administration, for instance, foresaw a 9.6 percent

increase in consumer prices in 1982, down from a 12.6 percent rate this year, and an 8.2 percent rate in 1983.

Even some strong backers of Reagan's tax and spending cut approach, such as Michael Evans, a Washington economic consultant, believe it could take several years to get inflation below 8 percent.

A forecast of such rapid growth in real output hand-in-hand with plummeting inflation rates "can only reduce the credibility of what they are doing," said Rudy Penner of the American Enterprise Institute, former chief economist for the Office of Management and Budget in the Ford administration. "It is sad," he said.

But Alan Greenspan, former chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, disagreed. Greenspan, who has helped shape the Reagan policy package as an outside adviser, said, "Remember what the nature of these numbers is. It is what you would expect to occur if all the president's program is initiated as recommended."

"There is a tendency when one looks at the numbers to say they are out of the ballpark," he acknowledged. "They are not."

## Strike leaders, Polish officials sign agreement

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Strike leaders and government officials signed an agreement in Bielsko-Biala on Friday to end a 10-day strike by 60,000 workers. Union leaders hailed the pact as a "full victory," but more trouble loomed ahead.

The agreement, worked out with mediation of the Roman Catholic Church, called for the ouster of the provincial governor and his two deputies and their resignations were announced hours later.

But labor trouble continued in the southwestern town of Jelenia Gora and workers have threatened a general strike on Monday if broken-off talks are not resumed.

The Soviet news agency Tass, meanwhile, issued a tough, new warning about Polish labor unrest. Tass charged that "counter-revolutionary forces" have launched a "frontal attack on the (Communist) Party and people's power."

The Soviet Union and other East bloc countries have shown growing concern about events in Poland. Reports of Soviet troops on the Polish border have raised fears that the Soviet Union may intervene to restore order.

Lech Walesa, leader of the independent trade union Solidarity who had a hand in the settlement in Bielsko-Biala, returned to Warsaw and met with Cardinal Stefan Wyszyński, the Polish primate. It was the first time the church had been involved in strike bargaining and it was understood that Solidarity had sought the church's intervention.

No details on the meeting were released. Walesa and other Solidarity leaders were expected to go to Jelenia Gora Saturday in an effort to bring about a settlement there.

The workers at Bielsko-Biala had accused Governor Jozef Labudek and his deputies Antoni Kobiela and An-

toni Urbaniec of corruption. The official news agency PAP announced that Premier Jozef Pinski had accepted their resignations.

Bishop Bronislaw Dabrowski, secretary of the Polish episcopate, and other church leaders were credited with having played a major role in the settlement.

The eight-point agreement also called for the removal of Bielsko Biala Mayor Marian Kalon and his deputy.

In other major government concessions, the strikers who idled more than 120 major factories in the area on the border with Czechoslovakia, were guaranteed full payment for the strike period.

To handle problems in starting up production in the struck factories, strike leaders announced that workers would return to their jobs on Saturday, officially a work-free Saturday.

## More than 30 injured in Iranian street fight

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Thousands of Iranian leftists, conducting an illegal anti-government demonstration, clashed with Islamic fundamentalists in a Tehran street battle with guns and knives Friday and Iranian sources said 30 to 40 people were injured.

Iranian police and journalists reached by telephone from Beirut said 7,000 to 10,000 Marxists took to the streets to protest the Iranian-U.S. agreement to release the 52 American hostages and rising unemployment in Iran.

Police spoke of "many" casualties in the three-hour battle and said some suffered bullet wounds. A Tehran newspaper put the number of casualties at 30, but other sources said 40 were injured in the melee.

The clash came at a time of increasing political tension in Iran between secular-moderate forces that tend to cluster around President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr and clergy-led

Moslem fundamentalists who control the Iranian Parliament.

Revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini has pleaded with Iranian politicians to stop "biting one another like scorpions."

According to various Tehran sources the thousands of members of the Marxist Fedayeen organization defied a government ban on demonstrations and massed at Freedom Square in the western part of the Iranian capital.

Some sources said they had rallied to mark the 11th anniversary of a bloody clash by the Fedayeen with troops of the late shah of Iran near the Caspian Sea.

But according to a spokesman for the paramilitary Revolutionary Guards, the leftists tried to march to Tehran University to disrupt Friday prayers on the Moslem sabbath and a speech by Prime Minister Mohamad Ali Rajai, who has the backing of hard-liners.

"One person who is a clean Moslem leaked the plan to authorities," said the Revolutionary Guard. He said members of the Islamic group "Hezbollah" or "God's Party," confronted the leftists and fighting broke out. He said the leftists were "carrying guns and knives" and "the Fedayeen started shooting."

But other sources said many of those wounded by bullets were leftists. Police reported that "those who have been shot are now hospitalized."

Meanwhile, Polish state radio reported progress in government talks with students who have been staging a sit-in strike at university buildings in Lodz, southwest of here, for two weeks.

It said that 21 of 25 student demands were agreed upon, including "the most important on self-government and participation of students in the management of higher educational institutions."

In a statement carried by PAP, Deputy Administration Minister Jan Jablonski said talks in Jelenia Gora broke down over two local grievances.

They involved public use of the rest house that had been available only to Central Committee members and workers' demands that a sanatorium under construction be turned into a general hospital.

Meanwhile, a spokesman in Rzeszow, the southeastern headquarters of the independent private farmers organization Rural Solidarity, said that a government delegation was expected for negotiations late Friday or Saturday.

Both in Rzeszow and in Ustrzyki Dozne, 50 miles southeast, farmers and some workers have been staging sit-ins for more than a month demanding registration of their union and settlement of several local grievances.

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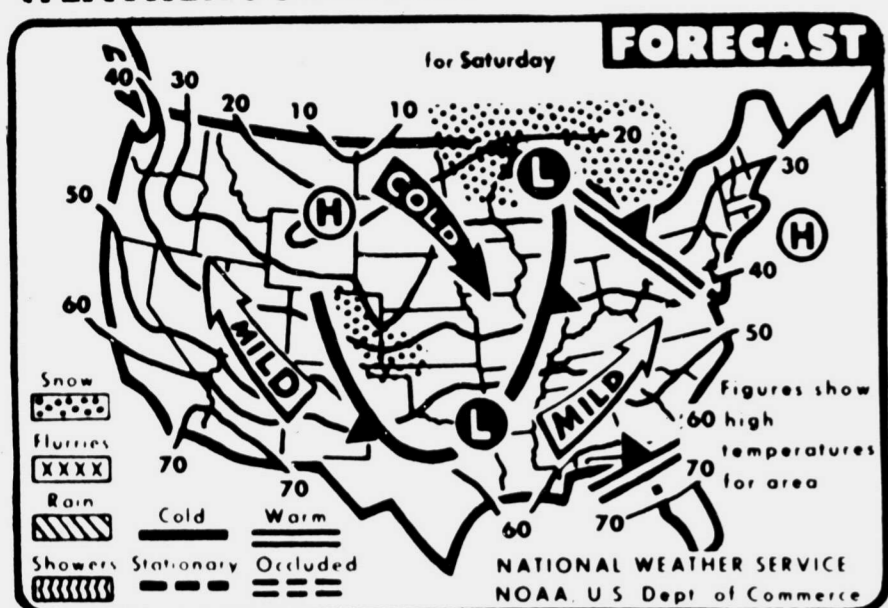

## Texas farmers getting more for citrus crop

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) — Florida's freeze-damaged citrus crop has boosted prices for Texas growers, who report no adverse impact from a farmworker's citrus strike.

"We're getting prices now that we normally only get at the beginning of the season," said Jesus Barrera, shipping manager of Frank Lewis Fruit Co. in Alamo.

Barrera said prices usually are high in November and December when quality in the early orange crop is best and demand for gift fruit packages is highest.

"The Florida freeze did have an effect on prices down here. They rose right about when Florida announced an embargo on fruit shipment," he said.

The \$70 million Texas citrus industry, third behind Florida and California, is expected to produce 360,000 tons of grapefruit, 149,000 tons of early-maturing oranges and 89,000 tons of Valencia oranges in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Eighty-three percent of production comes from Hidalgo County.

Les Whitlock, general manager of the Texas Valley Citrus Committee, said Friday prices jumped about \$10 a ton after Florida's damaging freeze. He said prices are averaging \$85 a ton for early oranges and \$80 a ton for grapefruit.

Isolated cash sales of \$100 ton for Valencias have been reported but almost 98 percent of that variety remains on the tree. About half the grapefruit crop and three-fourths of the early oranges have been harvested, he said.

"We could have done a little better during the Florida embargo but we had that drizzling weather that slowed things down," he said.

The Texas Farmworkers Union, an independent group, called for a "general strike" against the industry three weeks ago. The union wants higher wages and better working conditions in the groves. A roving picket line has demonstrated outside two juice factories, a packing shed and near groves.

"We've had no impact from the strike," Whitlock said.

An official of a large cooperative agrees the strike has not slowed harvesting or shipping. "None at all," was how Tom Newell of RioTex in Edinburg assessed the strike's impact. RioTex has 500 members.

Newell and others report receiving calls from potential buyers in the East who normally would get fruit from Florida.

Members of the farmworkers union were in Austin this week, pouring out juice on the capitol steps to dramatize a boycott against TexSun and Big Tex juice brands.

"The strike has stopped for right now down here until the strikers get back from Austin," a spokesman at the union office in Hidalgo said Friday.

A union organizer said she was not surprised to learn industry officials said the strike has failed.

"That's what they always say. That's the same process with all agribusiness," said Delia Gomez in a telephone interview from Austin. "This has just started. They're going to try to out-wait us."

## Deep freeze due in area Sunday

The weatherman's deep freeze will just about engulf the Midland area in the latter half of the weekend when the chilly weather turns frigid.

The mercury is to plunge into the mid-20s tonight and is to rise slowly to the not-so-cozy upper 30s Sunday.

But today, after the early morning clouds lift and the fog dissipates, early spring-like weather is to prevail. By comparison with earlier this week, today's high temperature will be seen like a warming trend; it's to top out in the mid-60s.

Friday's high temperature was 59 degrees, which was far behind the record high of 83 degrees for the date in 1950. The overnight low was 33 degrees, which was nowhere near the high record low of 2 degrees for the date in 1933.

# Reagan makes 'talented' appeal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Through his extraordinary speaking skills, President Reagan is trying to create a political groundswell for sweeping budget cuts that a long-resistant Congress may find irresistible this time around.

Reagan's economic message to the nation Thursday night was simple and dramatic: the economy is on the edge of calamity, it's the government's fault and there's no time to waste.

The way out is also simple, according to the president. Drastically reduce the role of government in an otherwise sound economic system. Only then can Americans be assured of a future of increased wealth rather than the prospect of more years of lowered living standards.

Now it's up to Congress to deliver the nation from this mess by cutting spending, reducing tax rates and rolling back regulation, Reagan concludes.

Many economists and members of Congress disagree with Reagan's analysis that the economy is in such desperate straits or that the problems

stem solely from government excess. They argue that the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, increased competition from foreign industries, and American business and labor also have had much to do with the nation's woes.

A lot of congressmen also have serious doubts about whether Reagan's remedy will cure the patient or raise his fever.

There does seem to be strong agreement in Congress, though, on the need to restrain federal spending. Legislators have been talking about cutting the budget for years, but when it comes down to actually restricting programs affecting voting constituents or powerful interest groups, Congress has backed off.

There also is strong agreement that the nation's 40th president is a superb communicator, a role for which he has been professionally trained, unlike his recent predecessors.

### An Analysis

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That's where Reagan can make a difference. He can take the political heat off of Congress by using the presidency as a pulpit to convert the populace to his dogma of less government. That includes making cuts in programs ranging from hot lunches for school children to export loans that profit corporations.

Rep. James Jones, chairman of the House Budget Committee, observed that Reagan's Thursday night speech was a good start toward mobilizing broad support for budget cuts.

But, added the Oklahoma Democrat, "It will take all of his communications abilities, coupled with dedication and determination on the part of both the president and the Congress,

to successfully build the public support required to restrain federal spending."

Another member of the budget committee was less hopeful. "Mr. Reagan is a good speech maker. It's difficult to disagree with his delivery," acknowledged Rep. Jim Mattox, D-Texas. But, he added, "It's one thing to deliver a good speech; it's another to deliver on it."

Mattox doesn't see Reagan succeeding where other presidents have failed. He says of the budget-cutting package, "I think it's going to fall apart before it ever gets started because you'll find the special interest groups are going to be protecting their programs," Mattox said.

## Funeral scheduled

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The nation's leaders paid tribute to Ella Grasso on Friday, as the state announced the former governor's body would lie in state Sunday and Monday at the state Capitol. It is the first time that honor has been accorded since Gov. George L. Lilley died in 1909.

A state funeral is planned Monday for Mrs. Grasso, who died Thursday evening at Hartford Hospital after a long battle with cancer. She was 61.

Gov. Bill O'Neill asked that Monday be set aside as a day of mourning.

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# Garwood now in seclusion

## Sentencing hearing set next week

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (AP) — Convicted turncoat Robert Garwood went into seclusion Friday as lawyers for the former Marine jeep driver lined up sympathetic witnesses to testify at his sentencing hearing next week.

Garwood, a 34-year-old private, faces a possible sentence of life in prison for collaborating with the communists during two of the 14 years he spent in captivity in North Vietnam. He is the only Vietnam prisoner of war to be found guilty of such an offense.

A jury of five Marine officers, all of whom served in Vietnam, returned the guilty verdict on the collaboration charge Thursday. The jury acquitted Garwood of maltreating a fellow POW, but

found him guilty of a lesser charge of assault.

Garwood was not available for comment, but one of his attorneys said Friday that the Indiana-born Marine spent a quiet night. He said Garwood will have no comment in the near future.

Assistant defense counsel Vaughan Taylor said Garwood's lawyers are planning to have several character witnesses appear at a hearing next week before the jury. He said he expects the sentence to be handed down next Friday.

Both government and defense psychiatrists testified during the 12-week trial that Garwood suffers from at least two and possibly three serious mental disorders.

Garwood, who dropped out of school in the 10th grade and was captured by the Vietnamese communists when he was 19, was found guilty on all five accusations in the collaboration charge.

# Former prisoners support Garwood

Some of the American fighting men who wound up as prisoners of war in North Vietnam think convicted turncoat Robert Garwood has suffered enough.

Retired Air Force Col. Robert B. Purcell, who spent 7½ years as a captive of the communists, said Friday from his home in Fort Worth, Texas, that Garwood's "sentence should be commuted to a symbolic day's confinement on pumpkin soup and rice."

"The scarlet letter of guilt is sent ice enough for the lonely private who found himself the scapegoat for all those Americans who could not measure up to the pressures of combat or confinement," Purcell said.

Garwood, a 34-year-old Marine private and the only Vietnam veteran to be tried as a turncoat, was convicted Thursday by a court-martial jury at Camp Lejeune, N.C., of collaborating with the enemy and assaulting a fellow POW.

He could be sentenced to life in prison. The former prisoner Garwood is accused of assaulting also doesn't think he should be locked up for long.

David N. Harker, 34, a parole officer in Lynchburg, Va., who was a POW for five years and two months, said Thursday night, "He received a fair trial and had the best possible defense."

Harker, who earlier this year offered some of the strongest testimony against Garwood, added, "I have tested the situation and I have forgiven him. I don't think it would be productive to sentence him to any great length of time, or any time at all."

At Garwood's home in Adams, Ind., the half-dozen yellow ribbons that his sister had planned to use for his homecoming were put aside Friday.

"Well put those away for another time," said Sharon Messenger, 31, Garwood's sister, tears glistening in her eyes. "I definitely thought he was going to be found innocent. At this time, Bob needs someone in his corner."

Garwood, a former Marine jeep driver, returned to the United States in March 1979 after 11½ years in Vietnam, but he spent little time at home before the Marine Corps filed collaboration and desertion charges against him and he was sent to North Carolina. The desertion charge was dropped last week.

His family is bitter. "I don't see how they could have come to that decision," said Garwood's father, Jack Garwood Sr., a 62-year-old printer.

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## 'Impossible' surgery on brain successful

BALTIMORE — The operation on the back of the brain had been called impossible.

The occluded artery that had to be cleaned out was no larger around than a drinking straw. It was buried well beneath the skull and was surrounded by some of the body's most delicate nerves and brain structures. At most, only an inch and a half of its length could be reached, and no one knew whether that might do more harm than good.

But 14 months ago, Johns Hopkins neurosurgeon George S. Allen successfully did what surgeons had been calling impossible.

Operating on a 60-year-old Baltimore teaching nun who had been having repeated attacks of dizziness and hallucinations — tiny, temporary strokes that can presage a major and crippling one — he first removed a 2-by-3-inch piece from the back of her skull.

Then, in a 10½-hour operation, peering through an operating microscope and painstakingly wielding instruments like long needles, he lifted an offending chunk of yellowish cholesterol from that straw-like artery.

In medical parlance, he had successfully removed an atherosclerotic plaque that was preventing an adequate blood supply from reaching the brain.

This month, sure at last that his patient is well, he published his results in a neurosurgical journal.

And Thyrday Johns Hopkins Hospital introduced the patient, a healthy and vigorous-looking Sister Regina Marie Albert, a mathematics teacher at a Baltimore high school.

The cautious Allen told a news conference only that the operation had been a success so far, and "we do not know whether or not it will really prove safe and effective" and prevent strokes in other patients.

But a surgeon at a large Washington hospital, asked to comment, said: "Dr. Allen has done a very exciting thing. I see no theoretical reason why this operation should not be repeated now, and I predict it will be done at least by the hundreds."

In short, the operation could give medicine a new weapon against the common kind of brain damage known as stroke. Nearly a half million Americans have strokes every year. Nearly 200,000 die annually of a stroke or its aftermath. And strokes cause one-fifth of all senility in the elderly.

For her part, Allen's patient, a member of the School Sisters of Notre Dame, told Thursday how she teaches regularly and takes daily walks and rides on an exercise cycle.

"The doctors had told me there was a great possibility that I would have a stroke," she said. "I had seen many of our sisters who had had strokes, and they were really helpless."

"I would rather have died under the surgery than lived to be a vegetable or be dependent on other people."

Allen said he did not want to exaggerate the operation's importance. At most, he and his colleagues calculated, it might help about 2½ percent of potential stroke victims; that is, those with a blockage in an accessible section of either of the two vertebral arteries at the back of the skull.

## Deaths of CIA-linked Laotian refugees still unexplained

All were men, relatively young and apparently healthy, refugees of a Laotian tribe who reportedly fought for the U.S. cause in Vietnam. At least nine have died from unexplained causes in the past two years, many after awakening in the night, screaming in pain.

In Portland, Ore., Dr. Larry Lewman, Multnomah County medical examiner, noticed the similarities among four of the deaths there, two in 1980 and two more in January. He checked with medical authorities in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area, where there is a fairly large refugee community and found five more such deaths during the past two years.

Of the nine, eight came from the mountainous Hmong tribe, which, according to published reports, had been enlisted by the Central Intelligence Agency during the war. A spokesman for the CIA in Washington said the agency does not comment on such matters.

Sudden, unexplained deaths are seen from time to time by medical people. "We see sudden deaths like this that we can't explain sometimes," Lewman said. "But this is an extremely high incidence for such a small group of people." The Hmong in Portland number about 2,000 of the city's Indochinese population of 10,000.

Autopsies on the Laotians failed to uncover any apparent cause of death, the medical examiner said. More detailed laboratory analysis of body fluids and tissue is continuing, he said.

The connection of the Hmong with the Vietnam war, and the mention of the CIA, triggered speculation that some kind of nerve gas may have been involved. But Lewman discounted this thinking, saying he had found no indication of any nerve disorders. He also said that since any such exposure would have taken place several years ago, it probably would have shown up earlier.

A Hmong tribesman now living in Montana told The Oregonian newspaper in Portland that he knows of at least a dozen similar mysterious deaths among Laotian tribal refugees.

The tribesman, Yang Pao, who said he commanded a secret CIA-backed army of Hmong, added that he believes the deaths were caused by chemicals or nerve gas dropped on Laos by North Vietnam.

Yang said the other deaths have occurred in Texas, Michigan, Iowa, Pennsylvania and Orange County, Calif., but this has not been confirmed.

Another suggestion came from a reporter who was

in Vietnam in 1951, and who recalled that tribesmen driven from the mountains by the communist Vietminh then would appear near starvation and consume large amounts of rice. The rice consumption apparently caused similar deaths at the time, he said.

Similarly, there is a phenomenon known as the "bangungut syndrome," from a Philippine word for "nightmare," used there to describe the deaths of young, seemingly healthy men after the consumption of large amounts of rice.

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## Flu deaths still high

ATLANTA (AP) — Deaths nationwide from influenza and pneumonia increased above the national norm for the eighth consecutive week, and 14 states reported widespread outbreaks of flu, officials at the national Centers for Disease Control said Friday.

For the week ending Jan. 31, pneumonia and influenza were blamed for 6.5 percent of all deaths in the nation, compared with the normal rate of about 4 percent, said the CDC, which monitors 121 cities.

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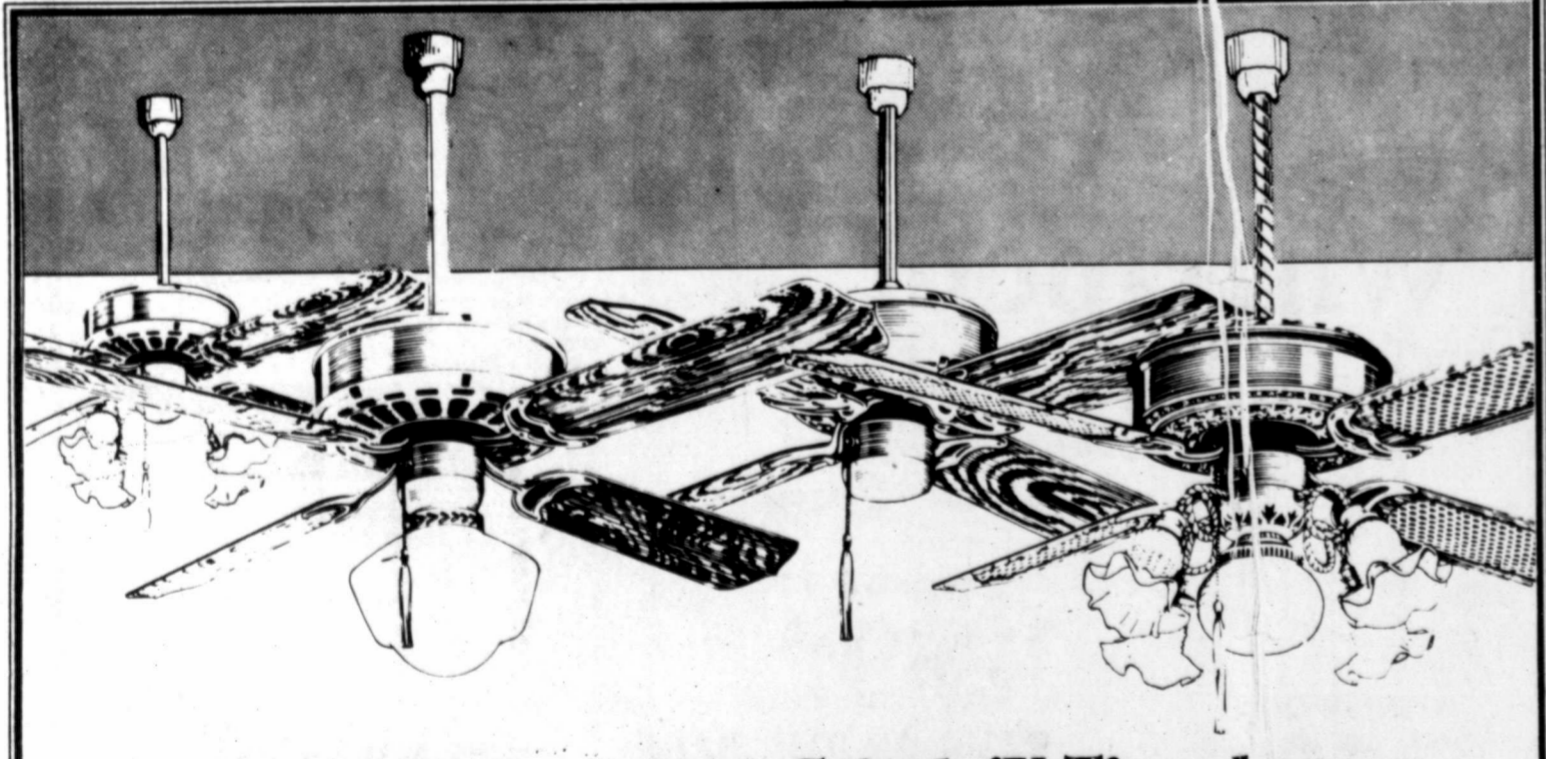

# Filipinos raising funds to pay for Pope's visit

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Filipinos have been making special donations at Sunday Mass and holding benefits, such as basketball games and movies, to help defray the costs of the six-day visit of Pope John Paul II starting Feb. 17. The pontiff will visit nine cities and expenses are expected to run high.

No specific figure has been set but Felix Bautista, director of the media center for the papal visit, said "the amount could be very staggering."

He added that the church, for example, is being charged \$30,000 for telephone lines and \$45,000 for a sound system. He said the budgeted expenses for speaking platforms in Manila alone is \$225,000.

Most of the expenditures are being raised by the Roman Catholic Church of the Philippines and civic groups. Bautista said big business firms have been approached for large donations.

In addition to Manila the pontiff will visit Pasay City, Quezon City, Cebu City, Davao, Bacolod, Iloilo, Legaspi and Baguio.

About 85 percent of the Philippines' 49 million people are Catholic.

It will be the second visit of a pontiff to these islands, where Catholic explorers first set foot 460 years ago and which now make up Asia's only predominantly Christian nation.

Pope Paul VI made the first visit in November 1970, attracting huge crowds in Manila and surrounding suburbs — and surviving a knife at-

tack by a deranged man. It is the first trip by the much-traveled John Paul to the Orient. He is to visit Japan and the American island of Guam in addition to a hectic schedule covering some 1,700 miles through the Philippine archipelago.

In the first ceremony of its kind outside Europe, the pontiff will beatify 16 martyrs in Manila. He will address Catholics in China and the Soviet Union via a powerful shortwave radio from a Manila suburb, join a university youth rally, address the poor in a Manila slum, give awards to local media people and meet privately with local Chinese, with diplomats and with Moslem representatives.

He will say Mass in public parks, on airport runways and in sight of the pyramid-like Mayon volcano, ride in motorcades through a half dozen cities, visit poor sugar workers and their planter bosses in Bacolod, meet with lepers and greet Indochinese refugees in their camp at Bataan.

The pope also is to spend two hours with President Ferdinand E. Marcos at Malacanang Palace.

"We gave the Holy Father three schedules to choose from, and he picked the most hectic one," said Cardinal Jaime Sin, archbishop of Manila.

The papal trip was originally planned more than a year ago, amid controversy over whose invitation he was accepting — that of first lady Imelda Marcos, or one from the Philippine bishops.

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## Computer birth control acceptable for Catholics

LONDON (AP) — Four scientists here have reported the development of an electronic computer that signals a woman's period of fertility — an advance that could help Roman Catholics practicing non-artificial birth control.

A sensitive thermometer that reads minute variations in a woman's temperature determines when she is infertile.

For Roman Catholics obedient to the church's strictures against artificial birth control, the only acceptable form of contraception is the rhythm method, which also is based on determining the period of infertility.

Father Anton Mowat, a spokesman for the Roman Catholic Church in England and Wales, said the new device "would be perfectly acceptable for use by Catholic couples as it does not interfere with the process of the transmission of life."

"It is not essentially different from any of the other methods which are acceptable to the church, and in fact it is obviously easier and sounds more accurate."

A Vatican spokesman, Rev. Romeo Panciroli, said the Vatican would not comment until it had seen the details of the plan.

The inventors — a World Health Organization team of three Britons and an American — call the device an "intelligence thermometer," and say it has proved 100 percent reliable in recording the fertility cycles of 500 women who took part in tests.

Dr. Heinz Wolff, 52-year-old head of the bio-engineering unit of the Medical Research Council here, described the "intelligence thermometer" Thursday.

The woman places the thermometer in her mouth for three minutes. A lead connects the thermometer to a bedside clock containing a micro-chip computer which gives a green "go ahead" light when her temperature indicates she is infertile.

The researchers said that besides helping Catholics obedient to the church's dictates, the invention would be useful to couples who do not want to use mechanical methods and to women worried about the effects of the pill.

"This method can never be as safe as the pill or a mechanical contraceptive," Wolff said. "It depends on voluntary abstinence for the fertile period which is about half the month."

"We will be able to get the packaging down much smaller," said Wolff in a telephone interview. It could be contained in, say, a necklace which the woman wears on her person.

The thermometer and clock will cost between \$120 and \$240 initially but only about \$24 when mass produced, said Wolff.

Robert Abrams of the University of Florida Medical College, Gainesville, Fla., worked on the project during a one-year sabbatical at the center in Harrow, north-east London. The four worked on the device part-time for two years.

About 100 of the thermometers will be supplied to British family planning clinics within the next six months and more substantial numbers are to go on sale by the end of the year. The WHO also plans to distribute them in Third World Countries.

"As far as we know, we are the first people to develop the device," Wolff said.

"But I've had letters from several organizations, particularly in the United States, who are clearly working along similar lines. So if we wanted to market it in the United States, we would have to reach some agreement on patents."

"We haven't, of course, found a new contraceptive method. We've computerized something that people have been doing using paper and pencil charts for years."

## Baptist leader denounces 'electronic churchmen'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A national leader of the Baptist Church today told state officials and delegates to the Texas Conference of Churches that "electronic churchmen" aid divisiveness.

"We can't jump on the black and white bandwagon of the electronic churchmen who have been lately taken up in an involvement in politics which they, until recently, denounced," said the Rev. James M. Dunn, national director of the Baptist joint committee on public affairs.

Dunn addressed the traditional legislative breakfast — attended by church delegates, legislators and state officials — at the annual assembly of representatives of the Texas Conference of Churches.

"Religion at best doesn't offer a prescrip-

tion for every ailment," Dunn said. "Religion functions best when it is teaching, persuading, setting an example, holding up ideals. We are agents of reconciliation."

Legislators as well as churches "share the blame for deadly dual-

ism," Dunn said, citing Texas' low payments to welfare recipients as an example.

"The votes of the Texas Legislature for years now regarding Aid to Families with Dependent Children have been brutally inhumane, a na-

tional scandal," he said.

The conference supports doubling average AFDC payments, allowing farm workers to or-

ganize unions, and the removal of restrictions in the education code banning illegal alien children from free public schools.

The group is an ecumenical agency representing Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox and 13 Protestant denominations in Texas.

## Proposed foreign aid upsets agency

NEW YORK (AP) — Church World Service has expressed "its alarm" at cuts proposed in U.S. foreign aid by President Reagan's budget director — cuts also opposed by the new secretary of state, Alexander M. Haig Jr.

The agency, international relief arm of the National Council of Churches which carries on relief work in 70 countries, cited a proposed \$2.6 billion cut in the \$8 billion foreign aid program proposed for 1982 by the former Carter administration.

"The reductions in aid would mainly affect the poor countries of Africa and the Asian subcontinent," the agency's committee says. "The primary casualties are likely to be many of the poorest developing countries and poorest people in them."

The statement adds that even without cuts, U.S. foreign aid programs "represent an inadequate U.S. contribution" to alleviating serious human need.

## Pope taking more foreign language

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II, fluent in a half dozen languages, is studying a couple more in preparation for his trip to the Far East — Japanese and Tagalog, the native language of the Philippines.

Besides his native Polish, the pope speaks Italian, French, German, English and Spanish, and has a working knowledge of at least six other languages. In preparation for his trip Feb. 16-26, he was reported concentrating on Japanese since in the Philippines he can get by most of the time with English and Spanish.

### Convict escapes as jurors read judge letter of praise

SEATTLE (AP) — Judge George T. Mattson impressed the jurors at his first felony trial so much that they read him a letter of praise. But the defendant, who had just been convicted, put a damper on the celebration by slipping out of the courtroom.

"The defendant was directed to sit down and wait for custody officers," Deputy Prosecutor Fred Yeatts said of Thursday's incident in the King County Superior courtroom. "I turned my back. Then he was gone. It took the custody officers no longer than two to three minutes to arrive. But by then it was too late."

Yeatts said a witness overheard defendant Leroy Anthony Pines mutter to his girl friend, "Let's go," and off they went.

Pines, who was convicted of robbing a service station with a deadly weapon Oct. 2 and taking about \$800, surrendered late Thursday night and was returned to jail, authorities said. The 19-year-old Seattle man had been free on bail and was not under guard at his trial.

Mattson was a District Court judge in Renton for 10 years before he was appointed to Superior Court on Jan. 1 by former Gov. Dixy Lee Ray. The Pines' case was Mattson's first felony trial on the Superior Court bench.

### Confessed killer freed on 12-minute technicality

BALTIMORE (AP) — A man, who admitted killing his girlfriend's infant son by throwing him down an 11-story trash chute was freed by a court Friday on the grounds that his confession came 12 minutes too late.

State's Attorney William A. Swisher called the release of James McClain, 25, "a travesty of justice" and called him "a very dangerous man."

McClain was convicted and sentenced to life in prison in connection with the Sept. 11, 1976, death of 10-month-old Philip "Muffin" Thomas. His conviction and sentence were later upheld by the Maryland Court of Special Appeals.

However, in a later case, the Court of Appeals ruled that a defendant had to be taken be-

fore a court commissioner within 24 hours of arrest or the state could not use subsequent confessions. That ruling was found to be retroactive in McClain's case.

McClain admitted killing the child because he thought his girlfriend, 18-year-old Debora Thomas was seeing another man.

Jurors finished deliberating Thursday morning, but the verdict could not be read at that time because Pines didn't show up until about 1:30 p.m.

He sat quietly as the verdict was read, and during a reading of the jurors' letter, in which they praised the judge for his performance during the trial and his courtesy toward them.

### Deputies recapture one young escapee

ALEXANDRIA, La. (AP) — Deputies recaptured one of two young inmates who crawled through a ceiling while awaiting a Friday hearing in the Rapides Parish courthouse, but they said the other escapee apparently got away.

Sheriff Marshall T. Cappell said Tommy Letourneau, 20, was found hiding in attic ductwork within the six-story building about 90 minutes later, but there was no trace of Clifford P. Conella, 18. Both men are from Alexandria.

The sheriff said a third inmate, charged with a misdemeanor, chose to remain because he might not have fitted through the hole in the ceiling through which the others escaped.

State troopers, deputy sheriffs and city police

who immediately surrounded the downtown building, said they found only a pair of prison trousers on one of the ramps leading out of the courthouse.

When recaptured, they said, Letourneau was wearing what appeared to be military fatigues rather than the regular jail-issued uniform.

Cappell said Letourneau was being held for allegedly burglarizing a church, for escape from a New Mexico jail, and also was wanted in Denton, Texas, where he skipped bond while under a felony indictment.

# Task force checking out Reagan's regulatory powers

WASHINGTON — In the breathing period permitted by President Reagan's 60-day freeze, a task force of regulatory experts is determining how much leverage the president has to reverse, reopen and redirect the environmental, health and safety regulations that Reagan and his aides say have "shackled" the economy.

The administration's leverage is limited in some cases by specific congressional directives, and in others by political factors. Even so, Reagan's deregulators believe they can have a direct impact on scores of major rulings by executive branch agencies like the Environmental Protection Agency and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration — two agencies whose economic impact is particularly great.

"I think this administration is thinking big on regulatory reform," said James C. Miller III, executive director of the Cabinet-level Task Force on Regulatory Relief headed by Vice President George Bush.

The new administration has not yet filled the top posts at EPA or OSHA, but in Miller it has a student of the bureaucracy who served in the Ford administration and spent the Carter years at the American Enterprise Institute in Washington, developing a strategy for deregulation.

Miller, regulatory administrator at the Office of Management and Budget, and other OMB officials are preparing a new presidential executive order that will make "a significant change in the way

agencies issue regulations," Miller said this week. The order, which could be issued within weeks, will impose "very hard rules" to assure that regulators issue only those rules that are essential and even then impose the least expensive of the alternatives.

One regulatory issue, of the many that Reagan aides are reviewing, illustrates the potential reach and limits of the new administration's deregulation authority. That is the six-year fight over federal control over noise in industrial plants, where day-long sound levels could threaten the hearing of more than 5 million workers.

OSHA has called for expensive changes in equipment and plant layout in a General Motors plant where noisy, high-speed stamping presses are used to make auto components. But Miller and Thomas F. Walton, manager of regulatory economics for GM, writing in the September 1980 issue of the AEI publication Regulation, contend that the problem could be solved by requiring workers to wear earplugs or ear muffs.

The costs of equipping workers with ear protection would be much less expensive than the OSHA plan, which could require construction of an addition to the plant to permit the machines to be spread farther apart and surrounded with sound-deadening enclosures.

OSHA's policy is centered in two regulations: A basic 1974 Noise Exposure Standard requires that when workplace noise exceeds an average of 90 decibels over an eight-hour day (or higher levels for briefer periods), employers must make engineering changes in machinery or reduce the workers' exposure to noise by limiting their time on the job. Only when these controls aren't feasible does the regulation permit companies to use ear muffs and earplugs to protect workers.

On Jan. 16, in the final week of the Carter administration, OSHA issued a new regulation saying that when the average noise exposure exceeds a lower trigger point of 85 decibels, companies must begin a hearing conservation program, installing noise monitoring equipment to give precise warning when the 90-decibel mark is reached, and establishing testing programs for employees.

According to sound measurement, a bus accelerating from a curb records 85 to 90 decibels. A Boeing 727 jetliner, on takeoff, records 91 decibels when measured one-quarter mile from the side of the runway.

The issue of whether protective equipment should be used instead of the much more costly changes in plant equipment and layout runs throughout OSHA's regulatory calendar, usually pitting companies against unions. Attorneys for the unions have opposed the use of masks, respirators and other personal equipment as permanent protection, noting that they often are uncomfortable, interfering with vision and voice communication. Some do not fit well over safety glasses, for example, nullifying their protection.

In Miller's view, however, an OSHA administrator has the discretion under the law to rule that personal protective devices are acceptable methods of meeting noise control standards and other health and safety standards. And because of the vast economic savings resulting from that least-cost approach, the Task Force would not hesitate to ask the new OSHA administrator to consider taking just such a position, Miller told reporters.

"I'm sure we would precipitate a few lawsuits," Miller said.

Such a shift by OSHA on the noise issue would permit a much wider use of personal equipment by companies, safe in the knowledge they were in compliance with federal safety rules. The burden would then fall to unions or other OSHA critics to try to reverse OSHA's rulings by appealing to the independent OSHA Review Commission and, if unsuccessful there, to the federal courts.

Rebels rout OHS, 70-58

ODESSA—Alvin Dunson ripped the cords for 25 points Friday night to get the Midland Lee Rebels off to a fast start in the second half of the District 5-5A basketball game in routing the Odessa High Broncos, 70-58, in the OHS fieldhouse.

Dunson hit all types of shots from the 18 to 15 foot range as Coach Paul Stueckler's crew connected on 33 field goals. It's good that they did because the Rebels were unimpressive at the free throw line, hitting only four of 14.

While Dunson waxed hot with his fine shooting performance, teammates Andre Van Buren and Randy Pepper added to the attack with 14 and 10 points, respectively.

RAYFORD Wright, Odessa's 6-2 senior, led the Bronco attack with 22 points, with 14 of those coming in the second half as the Broncos trailed the Tall City team 38-18 at half.

The game started slowly with Lee taking a 10-6 first period lead, but with Dunson hitting five field goals in the second period, the Rebels erupted for 28 points to Odessa's 12. Van Buren also hit well in the second period, hitting on five field goals as the frustrated Broncos were unable to hit effectively from the floor.

Odessa came back in the third quarter to outscore Lee 20-18, but still trailed 56-38 going into the final eight minutes of play.

Once again the Broncos outscored Lee in the final period, 20-14, but the damage had already been done.

Lee travels to Big Spring Tuesday with Stueckler a little more optimistic than he was at the end of the first half of the race. "We possibly could be 3-0 after our first three games. And if this happens, we might be a contender in the second half."

STUECKLER added that he was happy that his team was hot from the field because, "We sure didn't do well at the free throw line."

Lee is 1-0 in the second half and 12-16 for the year while Odessa is 0-1 and 4-23.

Odessa swept the two preliminary games from Lee, winning the sophomore game 60-57 in overtime. Sutton and Barton led Lee with 13 and 10 points, while Rodriguez and Jones scored 18 and 15 for OHS.

In the JV game, Lee just got too far behind and finally fell to the junior Broncos 55-47. John Bailey, who had averaged more than 30 points per game for Odessa, led the way with 24 points while Lee's Jay Pendleton had 12.

History doesn't repeat

Bulldogs storm past Panthers, 81-65

The Midland High Bulldogs proved at the Chaparral Center Friday night that history doesn't always have to repeat itself with an 81-65 District 5-5A basketball victory over the Odessa Permian Panthers.

It was a year ago at this time that old Mojo pulled off an overtime victory over the Bulldogs, which eventually forced a league playoff for the state playoff berth. Permian went on to win that one too, and the 30-7 Bulldogs got to stay home.

Friday's game put all that in the back of the mind as the Bulldogs, now 25-3 on the year and 1-0 in district after the second half opener with Permian, are now rolling toward a district title.

Even as satisfying as the win over Permian was, it didn't come easily despite the final 16-point bulge. It was a game of contrasts for the Bulldogs.

MHS CAME out of the shoot gunning from all angles and jumping to a 14-point, 20-6 lead in the first period. They still led by 13 at the end of the quarter with a 27-14 margin.

It was Herbert Johnson's magic that ignited the first period spurt. The 6-foot-9 senior pumped in 14 points in the first period alone as a one-man

wrecking crew. He hit seven of 11 shots in the period.

But Johnson went sour in the second period and came up with only three points as Permian wiped out the huge deficit, trailing only by a 41-38 count at the half. In fact, MHS went dead, hitting only four of 17 from the field as Permian hit nine of 14. Rusty Inzer scored all eight of his points in that period to lead the Permian charge, which featured a nine-point run.

"Sometimes when you jump out to a big lead early, you lose a little intensity, and that's what happened to us," MHS coach Jack Stephenson said. "You can't play a better quarter of basketball than we did in the first quarter, but we did lose our intensity. Still, I'm pleased with the way things turned out. It was a big win for us."

Johnson said, "It just didn't fall in the second quarter and I really don't know why, but it was going pretty good there for a while."

WITH JOHNSON not hitting and Horace Brown, who had 10 points, in foul trouble, the Bulldogs had to have some help and they got it from Mike Velasco and Justin Morrett.

Permian and MHS each scored 17 points in the third period. Mike Williams, who scored 14 points, led Permian with six in the third quarter and the Bulldogs would have been in trouble if it hadn't been for Velasco's three field goals and Morrett's defensive play and five markers in the period.

Velasco ended the night with 18 points, hitting 10 of 11 shots from the free throw line. Morrett came off the bench with 11 second half points when Brown was in foul trouble. Morrett did everything right and may have been the most single important factor in the victory.

Velasco said of his performance at the free throw line, "When one shot

hit the back of the rim and went straight up before falling through, I knew things were going right. Sometimes it's like that and I'm glad it was tonight."

MHS PUT the game away in the fourth period when they opened play with 11 unanswered points. Morrett keyed the period with six points and Velasco hit five of six from the line. Permian was held to a mere 10 points in the deciding fourth period while MHS rolled off 23, hitting 17 of 23 foul shots.

Permian also got 12 points from Ken Armstrong and 11 from giant center Mike Woolley. No other Bulldogs were in double figures, but 11 got in on the scoring. Steve Miller scored six points with limited playing time.

Midland High, the first half champion with a 7-0 mark, is now one game closer to the championship and every time out against a good team is a giant step. Friday's win was a giant step. At least, they are ahead of last year.

How could \$21 million disappear?

How could \$21 million disappear from the nation's 12th largest commercial bank?

Bank security experts said Friday that an intricate scheme involving false withdrawals and deposits and the transfer of funds between checking accounts may offer the most plausible explanation of how Wells Fargo Bank fell victim to one of the biggest bank embezzlement schemes ever, allegedly involving a bank branch officer, L. Ben Lewis, boxing promoter Harold J. Smith and others connected with Muhammad Ali Professional Sports, Inc. Former champion Ali is not now associated with the organization.

AND, DESPITE sophisticated security procedures, federal bank regulators warned that there is virtually no way to prevent determined individuals from carrying out such schemes at just about any major bank in the country.

"Reasonably intelligent people with a modestly sophisticated scheme can subvert or manipulate even the best (bank security) system," said one high-ranking bank regulator. "There is no such thing as a fail-safe procedure."

Officials at Wells Fargo Bank refuse to discuss details of the alleged embezzlement. They say it could take weeks or even months before their own auditors and federal investigators can sift through reams of bank records and piece together the puzzle that will explain where the money went.

Big Spring pulls upset; Bobcats skim by Cooper

The San Angelo Bobcats keep playing them close and the Big Spring Steers finally won a big one in District 5-5A basketball action Friday.

San Angelo slipped past Abilene Cooper by a narrow 60-59 score to avenge a loss to the Cougars in the first half. San Angelo is now 1-0 in the second half while Cooper is 0-1.

Big Spring outscored Abilene High 18-10 in the second quarter and went on to take a 48-42 upset over the Eagles. Big Spring had lost by nine to the Eagles in the first half. However, Wells Fargo vice president George Caulfield disputed speculation that computers played an instrumental role in the fraud. "Obviously, everything you do in a bank these days involves a computer," he said Friday, "but you would not consider this a computer fraud."

WELLS FARGO has charged Lewis, a former operations officer in a Beverly Hills branch; Smith, and others connected with Muhammad Ali Professional Sports, Inc., with stealing \$21,305,000. Lewis and Smith disappeared around the time that the bank realized that the funds were missing, on Jan. 23.

Donald Parker, a computer fraud expert at SRI International, a Menlo Park, Calif., think tank, said "There are thousands of ways" of siphoning funds out of a bank, adding that he had no direct knowledge of the Wells Fargo affair. But, he emphasized, "the key to the whole thing is debiting accounts — the money has to come from somewhere."

The secret to a successful bank fraud, Parker added, depends on a mechanism for covering the shortage of funds in looted accounts before the bank issues its monthly statements.

This reasoning suggests that some of the funds in the Wells Fargo case might have been drained from accounts belonging to unwitting customers. At a branch located in affluent Beverly Hills, some account balances could fluctuate substantially without the knowledge of the depositors.

SRI's Parker cited the example of an officer at a New Jersey bank who transferred funds from accounts selected at random. After taking the money, he destroyed the withdrawal slips, covering up any trace of the fraud. The only problem was that he had to flee with the funds, before the diminished balances showed up at the end of the month.

This scam failed, Parker said, because the bank officer tried to continue the fraud into the next month.

Wells Fargo officials have indicated that the \$21 million theft took place over the course of several months at least. This suggests that whoever executed the scheme had a method for covering up the losses, perhaps by transferring funds from other accounts or by forging loan agreements to obtain cash.

# Baseball's first Black manager becomes its fourth, too

**LOS ANGELES** — Three years after Frank Robinson's demise as manager of the Cleveland Indians, he got a phone call from Bob Lurie, the owner of the San Francisco Giants, asking if he'd be interested in managing Lurie's team.  
 Shortly after that, baseball had its fourth black manager.  
 Robinson ran the Indians from opening day of 1975 to June of 1977. "June 18, 1977," he says, just to show he hasn't forgotten. June 18 was Father's Day and Robinson had compiled the best career record of an Indians manager in 12 years, but they let him go anyway.  
 This might sound a little unusual, especially since Cleveland officials now concede privately that Robinson had become a pretty good manager by the time that they fired him. But if you look at Robinson's 2 1/2 years, it wasn't much of a trick, getting fired with a decent record. There had been a lot of passion in 2 1/2 years. Some Indians players were going to the club owner, Ted Bonda, asking that Robinson be retained. Others were going to the general manager, Phil Seghi, asking that Robinson be fired.

In mid-1977 and here it was, 1980, and I'd never been contacted by an organization about a job."  
 Between mid-1977 and Jan. 14, 1981, Robinson got one offer, but only to be a coach, from Dave Garcia who was then managing the California Angels. Robinson says, he was invited back by Garcia and then fired by Angels Vice President Buzzie Bavasi.  
 It would be nice to say that whatever happened to Robinson had happened to him, not because he was black, but because he was a manager and managers are hired to be fired, etc. It would also be a little naive. Not only had baseball not had a black manager before Robinson, it had never had a tough black manager.

ROBINSON made up for that in a hurry. He fired players, sent one home from a road trip and challenged another in the dugout. He took on the entire American League umpiring staff and finally he took off on his boss, Seghi.  
 He was asked recently if things might not have been simpler if he'd walked softer. "Things probably would have been simpler," Robinson said, "but it wouldn't have been me."  
 Jackie Robinson, the first black allowed to play in the major leagues, was a proud man, himself. But the Dodgers' Branch Rickey, who brought him in, suggested it would be better to swallow the abuse he would encounter, which turned out to be

massive. That was in 1947.  
 When Frank Robinson became manager, nobody wanted or expected him to sit still for anything, or nobody said they wanted him to, anyway. That was progress of a sort.  
 That was a good thing since Frank Robinson was pretty assertive. Eight years after Jackie Robinson broke in, Frank was playing minor league ball in Columbia, S.C., when a fan started yelling "nigger!" at him. Robinson went into the stands with a bat and chased him into the parking lot.  
 "I waited until after the game, though," Robinson says. "The guy had really been getting personal. I wasn't going to jump into the stands because someone called me 'nigger.' If I did that, I'd have been in there after every pitch."

He went on to become an 11-time all-star, the only man to win an MVP in both leagues. He was widely admired and a little feared for his ferocity — any second baseman who stayed on the bag trying to complete a double play with Robinson coming down was toying with his life — but Robinson had a good sense of humor, too.  
 IN 1975, the Indians gave Robinson a one-year contract as player-manager. On his first at-bat, before 56,204 people at Cleveland on opening day, Robinson hit a home run. Gaylord Perry, the team's star pitcher and a native of Williamston, N.C., was the first man out of the dugout to greet him.  
 The Indians, who'd been 77-85 the

year before, went 79-80.  
 When it was over, Robinson called his first season "brutal," although he says now that he was only talking about the time he had to spend being interviewed.  
 One or two other unpleasant things had happened, though, starting with Perry, who had been a problem from the moment it became apparent that Robinson would be named manager. Perry announced that he wanted to be paid \$1 more than Robinson.  
 The next spring Gaylord made clear his dissatisfaction with Robinson's drills ("We're not running the marathon...Some superstar who never pitched a game in his life is telling us how to get ready.") The drills and the pay were only part of what was happening. Perry reported-

ly told friends privately that he would not play for a black man.  
 There were other problems, including catcher John Ellis, whom Robinson challenged one day in the dugout. And Jerry Neudecker, an umpire, whom Robinson bumped in his second month on the job, for which he was suspended three days. And the rest of the AL umpires.  
 Robinson's 79-80 first season was the Indians' best in eight years. Robinson asked for a multiyear contract but Seghi insisted on another one-year deal.  
 "Seghi said that was his rule," Robinson says. "I asked him why it was OK to give players more than a one-year contract and coaches more than a one-year contract and to give himself more than a one-year contract. He said we were working on different levels."

The Indians went 81-78 in Robinson's second season, which still stands as their best record since 1968. But by the time Robinson began his third season, with his last one-year contract, there were rumbles that he was in trouble. Robinson thinks that Seghi started the rumbles that destabilized him, then used the unrest to fire him.  
 "In '77, we got off to a so-so start. Before a game in June, Phil and Ted Bonda came down to the clubhouse and asked for a meeting with me and my coaches.  
 "Seghi had a habit of not talking to me but through me. He took the floor and started asking my coaches questions: Why doesn't this guy take a bigger lead off first base? My first base coach, Rocky Colavito, says, 'I tell you to take a bigger lead, what do you want me to do, push him off?'"

"Finally I slammed the desk. I thought I'd broken my hand. I said, 'That's it. I'm the manager and if you have anything to say, say it to me. The coaches just follow my orders.'"  
 NOT LONG after that came Father's Day, by the end of which Robinson was unemployed.  
 "Never at any time did I ever discuss with anyone what I was doing in the confines of my office," Seghi said from Cleveland. "At no time did I put out leaks. It's absolutely untrue."  
 "I think Frank has become more mature. Maybe if we'd been more patient, that would have happened while he was here. I'm glad he has another opportunity. He deserves it."

There had been some suspicion that once the pressure was off, once A Black Had Been Named Manager, everyone would go back to the old ways. Robinson wondered if the world was progressive enough that a black who was fired could get hired again. But in 1978, Larry Doby managed the White Sox for half a season, in 1980 Maury Wills became the manager of the Seattle Mariners and now Robinson is back.  
 Robinson starts in San Francisco with a two-year contract. An egalitarian society is one step closer.

## King to promote Cooney-Norton

NEW YORK (AP) — Don King picked up a piece of the shattered boxing show once set for Madison Square Garden on Feb. 23 when he stepped in Friday as co-promoter of a Gerry Cooney-Ken Norton heavyweight fight some time, some place.

"I just found out that Don King will co-promote the Cooney-Norton fight with me," Glass said at the end of a news conference called to officially announce the death of "This Is It," the big four-fight card that was to have been co-promoted by Muhammad Ali Professional Sports, Inc., and Tiffany Promotions, of which Glass is president.

AS FOR the other fight which was to be on Feb. 23 — WBA welterweight champion Tommy Hearns vs. Wilfred Benitez — Glass said, "They are going to put on that promotion in Detroit or New Orleans. That's hearsay but that's what I understand."

"Cooney-Norton is a great fight," said King. "The winner will fight Larry Holmes for the championship in late summer or early fall. I'm so happy to be part of the promotion. It gives Cooney the chance to show he's the No. 1 contender."

"It's okay with me," said Holmes, the WBC champion, by telephone from his home at Easton, Pa. "But I couldn't fight (the winner) until October... tax reasons."

Holmes is set to defend against Trevor Berbic at Las Vegas April 11 on Home Box Office and to meet former champion Leon Spinks May 22 at Las Vegas on ABC.

## Color snowless Rockies deep Red

Ski resort operators in the Rocky Mountains, already millions of dollars in the red after three nearly snowless months, say they hope recent storms that left more than six feet of new snow on some mountains will help usher in a profitable spring.

But resort officials admit it will be impossible to recoup between now and April the losses they suffered until the snow finally started flying in late January, and weather forecasters say they don't see a dramatic reversal in the dry weather pattern despite the recent storm.

"That storm was a one-time thing," said National Weather Service forecaster Jim Schultz in Denver. "We've got that high-pressure ridge back over the western face of the Rockies. The moisture blows up over the Pacific Northwest and into southwestern Canada and then goes around down into the Great Plains."

ONE NOTABLE exception to the downturn in the industry is Sun Valley, Idaho — an area that normally does its best business in the late spring but already has taken in 20 percent more revenue than last year, resort spokeswoman Kathy Hoy said Wednesday.

"Business is excellent," said Hoy. "Christmas was full. Every flophouse from Stanley, Idaho, to Twin Falls was booked. We also had a very good January."

But throughout the rest of the Rocky Mountain West — famous for its "champagne powder" skiing conditions — snowfall is off as much as 60 percent and attendance at ski areas has dropped as much as 30 percent.

IN COLORADO alone, state officials estimate the dry weather has meant lost revenues of more than \$30 million to ski resort operators and the hotel, restaurant and shop owners that make their livings from the skiing mountains.

Lift ticket sales alone dropped by \$7 million — or more than 500,000 tickets — through Jan. 1, according to the University of Colorado's Business Research Center.

Until the recent snow dumped 40 inches on the Jackson Hole ski area, the Wyoming ski mountain had only about 400 skiers a day, said resort president Bruce Nurse. Now, there are about 2,500 skiers a day, he said. "We lost \$1 million in revenues during December and January," Nurse said. "Teton Village (at the base of the mountain) lost about \$3 million and the loss for Jackson Hole (business) was about \$6 million."

Utah ski mountains got between five and six feet of new snow in a four-day period last week after a dry December and January that saw a 30 percent drop in revenue.

But, noted Julie Lawson of Park

City, "You just can't make up those two months that are the busiest of the year. We get a lot of business during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays."

IN SOUTHWEST Montana, the Bridger Bowl ski area near Bozeman did not open until Jan. 26, and expects to get only about 70,000 skier visits instead of the 150,000 that originally were projected, said resort manager Terry Abelen.

Some ski area operators blamed what they perceived as unfair negative publicity for some of their loss in business.

"It was almost impossible to get the word out when people saw pictures of chairlifts with bare grass under them," said Nurse at Jackson Hole.

In an effort to counter the bad image, many ski areas in the Rockies are offering discount tickets and specially priced packages including lifts and accommodations, or are starting intensive advertising campaigns.

The three-mountain Aspen Skiing Corp. in Colorado is buying newspaper space heavily on the West and East coasts, said resort spokesman Jack Brendlinger.

"At least the cancellations have stopped," he said. "We hope the advertising will help."

Officials at Vail Mountain in the central Colorado Rockies plan to spend \$20,000 this month in radio advertising aimed at Midwestern skiers, said resort spokesman Jon Goldman.

COLORADO SKI Country U.S.A., an industry promotional group, has started a "regional media blitz" concentrating on 11 cities considered prime territory — Atlanta, Dallas, Houston, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Kansas City, Saint Louis, Minneapolis, Chicago, New York and Miami.

In addition, Colorado Gov. Richard Lamm said this week he had appropriated \$10,000 in emergency funds to set up toll-free telephone lines providing up-to-date ski information.

But, Lamm said, "We cannot have large programs to relieve impacts of drought and I don't want to raise expectations needlessly."

In the second trial run, Giardini clocked 2:02.43. Then came Gilhooly, 2:02.58; Doug Powell of Chapqua, N.Y., 2:02.84; Renoth, 2:02.89; Oehrl, 2:03.03; Flaschberger, 2:03.19.

Grissmann had been fastest in one trial run Thursday in 1:58.65. In the other heat Thursday, Austrian Helmut Hoeflechner clocked 1:58.7.

## State judge reverses decision

DALLAS (AP) — A state district judge reversed his own decision and ruled that city and county governments can legally tax shareholders in 52 local banks — but \$26 million in back taxes, cannot be collected right away.

The ruling Thursday by State District Judge Jim Nobel Thompson voids his previous judgment that prohibited the taxing of bank shareholders, and parallels a Jan. 23 ruling by the state's Fifth Court of Civil Appeals concerning a similar bank case.

But Thompson also

ruled that the governments cannot collect the 1980 taxes for 30 days, to give the banks time to appeal the decision.

Attorney Earl Luna, representing Dallas County, says the local governments will try to recover \$26 million in taxes as soon as the banks file for appeal.

"They (the banks) will probably ask the court of civil appeals to stay the order to prevent us from trying to collect the taxes," Luna said.

Both sides have said the case will probably reach the U.S. Supreme

Court.

In the original suit, 52 Dallas-area banks claimed that city and county taxes against bank shareholders were discriminatory because shareholders of other financial institutions are not subject to taxes.

In the new decision, Thompson ruled that bank shareholder taxes and the local governments method for formulating the taxes are legal "and in all respects constitutional."

Officials in Dallas and surrounding suburbs — including Richardson

and Garland — say they will have to dip into reserve funds or cut back on services to offset the loss of revenue if they are unable to collect on back taxes.

## Farmers sagging profits may be below prediction

WASHINGTON (AP) — Many farmers are encountering sagging profits this winter and may wind up with less net income in 1981 than government experts had been predicting.

Commodity prices have been under pressure in recent weeks from favorable crop prospects in some Southern Hemisphere countries, larger-than-expected meat supplies, and high interest rates. A preliminary report by the Agriculture Department said Wednesday.

Also, it showed farmers' net income in 1980 at about \$23 billion, a drop of more than 25 percent from \$31 billion in 1979. Two months ago, a similar report estimated last year's net farm income in a range of \$23 billion to \$25 billion.

There was no 1981 farm income forecast beyond midyear in the latest report. In December, officials said

farm income this year could rebound sharply this year, "perhaps regaining all the loss of 1980."

For all of 1981, the previous reports — including one last November — said net farm income might rise to between \$27 billion and \$32 billion.

The latest report said farmers in the first three months are expected to have an annual rate of net income of \$22 billion to \$21 billion. Two months ago the first quarter's forecast was for an annual rate of \$21 billion to \$26 billion.

The forecast for the second quarter, April-June, was unchanged at \$26 billion to \$28 billion.

An annual rate, in this case, means that if farm income during a three-month period held steady over the entire 12 months, that would be farmers' net income for the calendar year.

## Arthritis is older than thought

CHICAGO (AP) — The swollen knuckles and wrists of many subjects in portraits by Flemish master Peter Paul Rubens appear to be symptoms of rheumatoid arthritis, a finding that means the disease is centuries older than previously believed, medical experts say.

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
