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# Burger attacks U.S. justice system

**HOUSTON** — Chief Justice Warren E. Burger Sunday attacked the nation's justice system, its schools and its prisons for helping to make Americans "hostages" to crime.
"Like it or not," he said in his

annual State of the Judiciary address to the American Bar Assocation, "today we are approaching the status of an impotent society - whose capability of maintaining elementary security on the streets, in schools and in the homes of our people is in doubt."

Burger said the legal system now provides too much protection for the accused and too little for the victims of crime. He called for new restrictions on access to the courts for convicted criminals trying to get out of jail, and greater leeway for judges to lock up potentially dangerous defendants who have not been convicted.

He blamed the schools for at least part of the crime problem because they have "virtually eliminated ... any effort to teach values of integrity, truth, personal accountability, respect for others' rights."

And he called for a "broad-scale" physical rehabilitation of prisons to provide "a decent setting" for education, training and counseling pro-

Though Burger has touched on all these themes before, the speech was his broadest and most vehement on the subject of crime. It sounded at

times, as many commented, like a citizens." conservative Republican stump speech worthy of a man running for office. Burger has been working on the speech for seven months and is believed to consider it the start of a major push for changes in the system, beyond what he can do in Supreme Court opinions.

Burger described the country as beset by the problems of "inflation, unemployment, energy, an overblown government, a breakdown of our edu-

He began his discussion of crime by citing the homicide rate in the District of Columbia, among other cities. He questioned whether a society was "redeemed if it provides massive safeguards for accused persons, including pretrial freedom for most crimes, defense lawyers at public expense, trials, retrials and more and more appeals - almost without end and yet fails to provide elementary protection of its decent, law-abiding

Bible translator held by guerrillas

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Calif. - A hostage drama unfolding in Colombia pits a Huntington Beach-based organization that specializes in translating the Bible for remote peoples against a heavily armed guerrilla group that has kidnapped one of its American workers.

The guerrillas took Chester A. Bitterman III hostage at gunpoint in Bogota on Jan. 19. The kidnappers say they will kill Bitterman unless Wycliffe Bible Translators withdraws by Feb. 19 the 209 people it has in

Wycliffe officials said Friday that the organization, whose 4,000 workers are translating the Scriptures into 750 languages in 36 countries, would "not vield" to the demand and will "cooperate fully with the Colombian gov ernment in its stand against the guer-

The governments of both the United States and Colombia have stated that they will not negotiate for Bitterman's release.

The kidnappers, who claim to be part of the April 19 Movement, known as M-19, charged in a statement delivered to a Bogota newspaper that the linguist and his organization are "an affront to ... our national sovereignty" and "a means by which the plunder of our national resources is institutiona

The Colombian minister of government, German Zea Hernandez, said that neither Wycliffe nor its subsidiary, the Summer Institute of Linguistics, is connected with the U.S. government, as the guerrillas have

The rate of "day-by-day terrorism in almost any large city," he said, "exceeds the casualties of all the reported international terrorists in any given year. ... Why do we show such indignation over alien terrorists and such tolerance for the domestic

We must not be misled by cliches and slogans that if we but abolish poverty, crime will also disappear." he said. "A far greater factor is the deterrent effect of swift and certain consequences: swift arrest, prompt trial, certain penalty and - at some point — finality of judgment."

Specifically, Burger challenged the process by which convicted criminals spend years filing habeas corpus petitions, suing prison wardens and parole boards and trying to get new trials by citing minor errors in the first trial or arrest. Once a person has been convicted and has exhausted the first round of appeals, Burger said, all later judicial review should be confined to past "miscarriages of jus-

"Our search for justice must not be twisted into a search for technical errors to guilt or innocence," he said. A true miscarriage of justice, whether 20, 30 or 40 years old, should always be open to judicial review, but the judicial process becomes a mockery, a mockery of justice, if it is forever open to appeals and retrials for errors in the arrest, the search or

He also criticized the current bail laws that forbid judges from considering a defendant's future dangerousness when setting bail. 'The crucial element of future dangerousness, based on a combination of the particular crime, the past record and the evidence before the court," should be restored to deter the "startling amount of crime committed by persons on release awaiting trial,"

Burger said. He also repeated recommendations he has made before for improving the prisons by making vocational and educational programs mandatory and giving good-time credit when a prisoner makes educational

# Iranians to release Dwyer

TEHRAN - Freelance American journalist Cynthia Dwyer, arrested on espionage charges last May, has been sentenced to nine months in jail but was expected to be deported soon as she had already served that term, But he suggested that prisoners a reliable source said here Sunday.

(In Washington the State Department said Mrs. Dwyer would be released to Swiss authorities Monday.)

Mrs. Dwyer, 49, of Buffalo, N.Y. was tried on Wednesday at Evrin Prison in the presence of several Iranian journalists and a representative from the Swiss Embassy, which has looked after U.S. affairs since the two countries broke off diplomatic relations as a result of the hostage issue.

Ettelaat newspaper here reported Sunday that the prosecution had accused the American journalist of

scheming to free the 52 Americans, who finally flew home last month after 14 months in captivity here.

The prosecution charged that Mrs. Dwyer had expressed interest in proposals put forward by an Iranian security agent who pretended to be in touch with an opposition group favorable to releasing the hostages.

The prosecution accused Mrs Dwyer of talking to her husband in the United States in code, charging that she knew of the aborted U.S. military bid last April to free the hostages before the attempt became public

The journalist denied all espionage charges, admitting only that she had attempted to deliver a letter from the mother of one of the hostages. She said, however, that she had done this openly, through the students in charge of the seized American embas-

Mrs. Dwyer appeared in court with two other defendants: an Iranian translator and a Foreign Ministry employee, both also accused of espionage. They were found innocent, Iranian officials said

Mrs. Dwyer said that she had gone to Iran to seek a clear picture of the revolution, views on which she believed were distorted by the hostage issue. Etalaat said that in court the journalist condemned the failed rescue operation, saying she had hoped for a "peaceful solution."

# Reagan budget cut proposals take wide sweep

WASHINGTON - President Rea gan's budget architects have put together an extraordinary package of proposed budget cuts touching every level of American society and dismantling dozens of popular federal aid programs that support everything from school lunches to airports, pub lic television and welfare

The sweeping nature of the spending cuts being considered by the Reagan administration is outlined in doc uments prepared as prelude to presentation of the president's economic policy program Feb. 18 and obtained Saturday by The Washington Post.

The budget documents, prepared by David A. Stockman, director of the Office of Management and Budget in the Reagan White House, were circulated confidentially last week among

key senators and House members who will preside over the budget and appropriations action this spring.

For example, the Stockman budget book proposes for fiscal 1982:

- A massive revamping and re writing of federal school aid policy, with a consolidation of at least 57 programs into a scheme of block grants that would go to the states to spend as they see fit. But the school aid would be reduced by 20 percent from what the states receive.

- A \$990 million reduction in child nutrition programs on top of at least a \$400 million cut proposed by the Carter administration.

The abolition of the Economic Development Administration, including all its \$425 m llion in loan guarantees, an end to the \$3.7 billion public service jobs (Comprehensive Educa tion and Training Act) program, and shutdown of the Appalachian Regional Commission and nine other sister regional commissions

- A \$1.3 billion reduction in highway, rail, airport and mass transit aid that would doom completion of the full 101-mile Washington Metro sub-

way system. House Democrats Monday will get, by courtesy of the Democratic Study Group (DSG), a first look at these

probable budget slashes totaling \$26.2 billion. Another \$10 billion to \$20 bil lion worth of reductions are anticipated before Reagan formally sends his unprecedented budget changes to Capitol Hill. The early delivery of the detailed

cuts — obtained independently by the DSG — seems certain to set the tone for what will be a knock-down, dragout brawl over Reagan's efforts to scuttle dozens of aid programs that have acquired forceful advocates during the last two decades.

Even in the Senate, now controlled by the Republicans, a melee is as sured. "We don't interpret Reagan's victory last fall as a mandate to scuttle all these programs," said an aide

to a key tax-writing Democrat. While some of the details of the budget proposals have filtered out sporadically in recent days, the full scope of the sharp alteration in federal suppot for so many activities - and the pain they are certain to cause leaps from the pages of Stockman's catalogue of cuts.

Stockman Saturday declined to comment on the specifics of OMB's proposals, saying only, "It's all still in the option stage, but the options are firming very quickly.

Presiden' Reagan, who has approved many elements in the program already, must clear these and other issues this week in order to meet his timetable for his economic message to Congress in 10 days.

Another unusual side to the Stock man proposals is the "probable reaction" assessments sketched out by OMB draftsmen as part of the presentation and defense of the projected slashes. On most proposals, the OMB foresees stiff opposition from Congress, state and local governments. as well as from labor, business and social welfare organizations.

Even at that, however, the GOP White House apparently is counting on support from friendly Democrats to carry through with the swing of the cleaver. In contemplating a \$671 million chop of aid to families with dependent children (AFDC), for example, OMB says the likelihood of winning "seems good," with leadership expected from Sen. Russell B. Long. D-La., who until this year was chairman of the Finance Committee.

The sweeping changes proposed in the energy area total \$6.4 billion, with the budding synthetic fuels program virtually wiped out. Support for solar energy and energy conservation are more than cut in half.

The reduction of \$712 million in synthetic fuels money in 1982, and much larger reductions in loan guarantees, is justified on the grounds that the private sector can do the job and that it is not up to the federal government to build synfuels plants.

As for an assessment of the probable backlash, the OMB doc7ments states: "The proposed actions would be strongly opposed by project sponsors and the array of business and labor interest that would benefit from (a) government-subsidized construction program (architect engineers, constructors, suppliers, labor unions, and development interests in areas where plants are to be built).

"Also," the document continues, "the popular perception that synfuels are a way of reducing dependence on imported oil and holding down OPEC prices would produce negative public and media reaction. Congressional delegations from West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, Alabama and Illinois would be affected."

# Retail gasoline prices up 10 cents

In the sharpest rise in a year, retail gasoline prices have surged 10 cents a gallon in the last five weeks to an average of \$1.32 a gallon, according to a nationwide survey by oil market analyst, Dan Lundberg.

Lundberg, publisher of the industry-respected Lundberg Letter, said Sunday that in addition to recent crude oil price increases posted by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries and President Reagan's decision Jan. 28 to decontrol domestic oil prices, the boosts reflect the first general increase in dealer profit mar-

gins in several months. Dealer margins increased by about half a cent per gallon to 9 cents nationally since the first of the year, according to Lundberg's survey of

14,000 stations. Since late last summer, competition and relatively bountiful gasoline supplies have forced dealers to sell at well under the 17-cent profit margins they once enjoyed.

Lundberg and other industry analysts said they expect retail gasoline prices to jump by another 3 cents a gallon by the end of this month.

Noted Lawrence Goldstein, an economist with the Petroleum Industry Research Foundation: "The full impact of decontrol has not worked its way through the market yet and we will probably see a little more of an increase before the market settles

When Reagan abolished controls, Secretary of Energy James Edwards estimated it would take two months for an increase of 3 to 5 cents to show up at the pumps. Analysts said the average 6 cent wholesale increase in just the last two weeks is a surprise only to the administration. "Everyone else expected this to happen,"

said Goldstein.

Most analysts said that in the months ahead the price disparity should diminish

Barring another major disruption of oil supplies from the Middle East, industry analysts say there are unlikely to be any more sudden gasoline price increases this year. Rather, they say, prices at the pump will increase beginning in March at a rate of about 1 cent per month or a little more, reflecting the impact of inflation and an expected small crude oil price hike by Saudi Arabia before

"There are no domestic market conditions that would warrant another big price increase," said Paul Premo of Chevron. Premo said Chevron lifted its wholesale prices six cents a gallon after controls were ended last month. "That was the full impact on Chevron and we don't expect another increase."

Whether or not dealers can continue to increase their profit margins depends on competition and supplies. Any boost in those margins, of course, would drive retail prices up beyond the increases in wholesale prices charged by the oil companies.

"If the war between Iran and Iraq does not end by spring, there could be some chaotic shocks to the market," commented the Petroleum Industry Research Foundation's Goldstein.

However, other analysts noted that if Saudi Arabia continues to pup 10.2 million barrels a day of crude oil and Iran and Iraq increase exports beyond their present level of 1.2 million barrels a day a mini-gasoline glut could occur in the spring.

"It's iffy, but my hunch is that we're going to see a substantial downward pressure on the market this spring," said the chief economist for a major East Çoast oil company. How much for that doggie ...?

### American childbearing rate nears record level

Police enjoy quiet weekend

WASHINGTON (AP) — American childbearing rates have declined markedly over the last decade, and the number of women who live out their fertile years without having a baby may exceed levels last experienced a century ago, the Census Bureau reported Saturday.

But there is debate among experts about the future fertility levels of American women, notes the new report by Martin O'Connell and Carolyn C. Rogers.

Some speculate that if current low rates continue, the proportion of women completing their childbearing years without having a baby could be as high as 25 percent to 30 percent - well over 1979's 14.2 percent and topping the record 22 percent of women born in the 1880s who went childless.

Other experts, though, "believe that the recent increase in childlessness merely reflects a temporary postponement of births that will be made up in the next few

-The longer a woman postpones childbearing after marriage the less likely she is to eventually have a child. Among childless wives aged 25 to 29, 88 percent of those married less than two years planned to have a child some day, compared to 68 percent of those married five years.

"It seems likely, then, that the process of delaying childbearing may provide women with the opportunity to develop lifestyles and other interests that may be seen as competing with their role as mother." according to the report.

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# Haig's maneuvering exposes vulnerabilities, strengths

WASHINGTON - Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr., in his first two weeks in office, has made long strides toward achieving the position he seeks as chief formulator and administrator of American foreign policy in the Reagan administration. But despite fancy footwork, Haig's bureaucratic maneuvering exposed vulnerabilities as well as strengths.

As foreshadowed by his past experience and pre-inaugural statements, Haig came on fast and strong to carve out the central role in America's diplomatic, military and economic relations with the rest of the world. It was so fast and so strong, however, that storm signals were immediately raised in the Reagan inner circle, especially among members of the senior White House staff.

THE WHITE HOUSE declined to endorse directives proposed by the secretary of state in the early hours of the new administration giving him the dominant role in foreign policy making of all sorts. One senior official described the proposed directives bluntly as an attempted "power

Haig's responses were deft: - Without the directives, he went

ahead to convene interagency meetings on a host of foreign policy issues in every region of the world. Other agencies sent representatives, lest they be left out of the action. Their attendance ratified the authority of the State Department to create and preside over the policy groups on an

 In public pronouncements, especially his news conference of Jan. 28, Haig continued to assert his primacy over policy. In public as well as in private, Haig traced his authority to a 'mandate" offered by Reagan along with the job of secretary of state.

- In meetings with his Cabinet counterpart, Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger, Haig negotiated a jointly approved version of the directives that previously were rejected in the White House. These negotiations are reported to have been completed at a State Department breakfast of the two Cabinet officers last Friday. The revised directives are being sent to the White House for Reagan's approval.

WHITE HOUSE APPROVAL of the Haig proposals, now the Haig-Weinberger proposals, is expected but it is not certain. Haig's maneuvers to establish a sweeping policy-making writ, plus his quick and forceful counterattack against the foreign aid slashes proposed by budget director David A. Stockman, raised the hackles of some of the Reagan insiders. These sources, by the way, predict that the final budgetary totals for the aid program will be closer to Stockman's numbers than to Haig's.

Under the rubric of "Cabinet government," the policy formulation proposals would give the central role to interagency committees, most of which are chaired by the State Department. The policy options created by these groups would flow upward to the Cabinet-level meetings of the National Security Council, including Reagan himself, for discussion and

Secretary of State Haig during confirmation hearings.

final approval. This is no mere formality, for Reagan has foreign policy ideas of his own.

As Haig informed his senior staff at Foggy Bottom, under this system the State Department, rather than the staff of the National Security Council, will have the major role in policy coordination beneath the Cabinet level. And as any bureaucrat knows, those below who draft the assessments and carve out the options usually have more influence on policy than those at the top who make the

A Haig-Weinberger policy coalition would be a formidable force in dealing with Edwin Meese III and other White House potentates, to say nothing of Richard V. Allen, the presidential national security adviser. Weinberger is of vital importance, because

he is not only a fellow Cabinet member but also a trusted Reagan insider, as Haig is not.

HAIG'S NEED FOR UNITY with Weinberger is among the reasons why the State Department reacted so sharply to refute and denounce a story in The New York Times story last Friday that the secretary of state had advised European allies to "disregard" Weinberger's public statements on the neutron bomb. The State Department went to the unusual length of releasing the text of a cable to embassies abroad in order to refute the Times account and set the record

Haig's sure sense of bureaucratic politics, arising from his extensive experience as Henry A. Kissinger's National Security Council deputy, as

White House chief of staff and NATO commander, was among the most striking features of his performance as secretary of state in these early weeks. The new man came on as confident, knowledgeable and bold, all to an extraordinary degree, in a government which is still, for the most part, groping for a handle on the levers of power. A major pitfall, as illustrated by the unsuccessful move for immediate approval of the initial policy-making directives, is the possibility that Haig could overplay his

Within the State Department, the early indications are that Haig will rely more on clear and established lines of organization and authority than did Kissinger or Cyrus R. Vance. Each leadership style is, to a great degree, the product of formative experience. Haig's experience as a military officer tends to make him more comfortable with the tables of organization than did Kissinger's experience as a professor and strategic thinker, or Vance's experience as a lawyer accustomed to the case-by-

HAIG IS DEPICTED by those close at hand as well organized in his first weeks as secretary of state, juggling internal policy making and a large number of unpublicized meetings with diplomats, political figures and Cabinet colleagues. he is a quick reader who insists on clear and concise reports, but major blocks of time are set aside on each day's schedule for solitary reading of the myriad reports and cables that flow across his desk.

He is regarded as more likely than

his predecessors to bestow responsibility on subordinates, and to hold them accountable if their performance does not measure up. He is leery of special bureaucratic positions grafted outo the organizational chart, such as that of ambassadorships at large or other special positions. He has made clear, for example that the poet of special advisor on ple, that the post of special adviser on Soviet affairs, held by Marshall D. Shulman the past four years, will be abolished and the main line of responsibility for policy returned to the es-tablished State Department struc-

WITH A FEW EXCEPTIONS, Haig selected experienced foreign policy operatives as his senior aides, people who know both the bureaucratic and outside world from extensive firsthand knowledge. Among the exceptions is his deputy, William P. Clark the California judge who is a close friend and former staff chief to Reagan, and who is expected to function as the White House eyes and ears ir the State Department, especially on behalf of those in the Reagan inner circle which may be suspicious of Haig's ambitions for the presidency.

Some officials see a contradiction between the rhetorical and ideological view of the world expressed by Reagan and many of his backers, and the more pragmatic view of Haig and his policy operatives. In this perspective, Haig's greatest challenge will be to connect the inner world of the Reagan administration and the turbulent world outside, to square rheto ric with reality, to bring objectives in line with capabilities.

I only bring it up because the news reporters, as they should, report what the Arab leaders say. However, if you only read what Arab leaders say, you will never understand what they are up to because they almost never say what they mean or mean what they

They love to tell Westerners, as they have done again at the Islamic summit, that the Palestinian question is the key to peace in the Middle East. This is a lie, of course, and they know it. If Israel didn't exist, the Arabs would have to invent it in order to have some excuse to pretend that there really is such a thing as Islamic unity. There is no Islamic unity just as there is no Islamic democracy and no developed Islamic country nor will any of the three ever exist. If you want to know why, study Islam.

Let's look for a moment at the reality of the Islamic world. Neither the chaos within Iran nor the Iraqi-Iranian war has anything to do with Israel. The hatred between the Jordanians and Syrians or between the Syrians and the Iraqis or between the Libyans and the Egyptians or between the Libyans and the Morroccans or between the North Yemenis and the South Yemenis - has nothing to do with Israel. The petty quarrels, rivalries and intrigues among the

rulers of the Persian Gulf States have nothing to do with Israel. The Lebanese civil war in which Lebanese Christians and Lebanese Muslims kill each other and Palestinians and Syrians shoot at everybody has nothing to do with Israel.

No Arab leader is really concerned about "liberating Palestine." They know, for example, that four-fifths of Palestine was turned over to the Arabs in 1922. Today, it is called Jordan and it is a Palestinian homeland. Furthermore, most Arabs despise Palestinians and most Palestinians despise most Arabs.

The charge that Israel is expansionist is also pure Arab baloney made for Western consumption. Israel, after all, is a tiny country with a population of just over three million and a land area of a little more than 35,000 square miles. Just the 20 nations of the Arab League have a land area of 35 million square miles and a population of 135 million people. Israel is no more of a threat to any Arab country than Belgium is a threat to the Soviet Union.

As for Jerusalem, which Israel has formally annexed, it, too, is of no real importance to the Arabs. In its 3,000-year history, no Islamic ruler ever bothered to even make Jerusalem a provincial capital. During the 17 years Jordan occupied the eastern half of the city where the Islamic holy place is located, not a single major Islamic ruler bothered to visit it. If they wanted to, they could do so today; the Israelis regularly admit Arab visitors even from countries officially at war with Israel.

It's true the Arabs don't like Israel and would destroy it if they could, but it is also true they don't like anybody, including each other, and most especially us.

The real threat to oil supplies in the Persian Gulf comes from the Arabs themselves. We are fools to sell them any arms larger than a rifle. If we arm these bandits with planes and rockets they will quarrel among themselves and go to war, just as the ranians and iragis nave blow up each other's oil facilities. The reason they will do that is that there is nothing else in any of these countries worth blowing up.

### Probes reveal potential space-shuttle ripoff

WASHINGTON - President Reagan and his advisers are considering across-the-board cuts in federal programs as the primary way to bring the budget under control. The trouble with this meat-ax approach is that it can damage good projects as well as bad ones - and still doesn't attack the problem of massive waste and

A better way to trim the fat from the federal budget without cutting into muscle is to go after the extravagance and corruption that characterize so many government programs.

The space shuttle would be an excellent place to start. It's already an two years behind schedule and about \$3.6 billion over its budget. But even its critics have kept silent, telling themselves that unexpected costs and delays were inevitable in such a pioneer space effort.

The truth is more sordid. Uncounted millions of space-shuttle cost overruns were apparently ripped off by Rockwell International, the prime contractor, and scores of Rockwell employees.

The basic trouble, as I reported last September, was the cavalier attitude of Rockwell officials toward taxpay ers' money. It's an attitude that is practically built into any cost-plus contract like that of the space shuttle. The government will pay all the cost overruns, so why worry

Rockwell carried its hang-the-expense approach to shocking lengths. such as sending two employees to Europe on the Concorde to review a James Bond movie - and then sending the bill to Uncle Sam.

A series of investigations - by government agencies and Rockwell's internal security division - have pro duced evidence to show that company executives were aware of the misuse of public money, but did nothing about it.

Here are some examples of the

space-shuttle rip-off: - When the spaceship Columbia was moved from California to Florida in March 1979, Rockwell employees



followed en masse. Even secretarial help was brought across the country. The taxpayers, of course, picked up


- One Rockwell executive drew \$2, 160 a month in per diem expenses, in addition to \$750 a month housing allowance, plus the cost of telephone, cable TV, laundry and dry cleaning. He also got \$225 a month for maintenance and security for his home in California, two rental cars and trave! costs of \$4,000 a month.

- By driving their personal cars to Florida instead of flying, Rockwell employees cost the government an estimated total of \$2.5 million extra in per diem, salary and fringe benefits while they were on the road.

 Some employees flew to Florida but claimed they drove their cars, so they could cash in on the travel-expense bonanza. One source told my reporters Frank Washington and Eric Yoder that a California prosecutor declined to press charges because he felt it would be unfair to punish a few employees for what so many were

- "In a number of instances," says one confidential government report, "the contractor authorized both husband and wife to drive separate cars, even though they were to leave on the same day. This results in charging the government \$7,000 or more while a family drives back and forth across the country for a period of three weeks or more.'

The regulations were promulgated to put the Hostage Relief Act into effect. Without the rules in force, the hostages won't collect educational benefits for their families or certain medical expenses not paid by their insurance coverage.

Even if the president decides to unfreeze the regulations, there's one provision the hostages will still miss out on, thanks to some stubborn nitpickers in the Treasury Department. The hostage act, passed by Congress last October, provides that the salaries of government employees taken hostage will be put into interest-bearing accounts.

But both the State and Defense departments routinely deposit overseas employees' paychecks directly into checking accounts in banks designated by the employees. In normal times, it's a convenience for the emplovees.

But for the hostages in Iran, it could mean the loss of an estimated total of nearly \$100,000 in interest. Though the hostages' families could have transferred the paychecks into interestbearing accounts, many did not. Some of the families, of course, used the money to meet living expenses.

### A CHANGING WORLD

### Jeane J. Kirkpatrick brings fresh perspective to U.N.

The United States has endured tough times at the United Nations during the last four years - but things are going to be better.

The reason is Jeane J. Kirkpatrick, President Reagan's choice as new ambassador to the world body, otherwise known as the "great debating society."

This woman, most recently a political science professor at Georgetown University, will not be a pushover for anybody - not the Communists, not the Communists' surrogates, not the U.S.-hating Third World delegates and not the American-bred apologists who can't seem to find anything wrong with Soviet, Cuban and Palestine Liberation Organization tyrants but can find everything wrong with policies seeking to protect and defend

One of Kirkpatrick's first statements of policy recently was that she would have nothing to do with the PLO, the Arab terrorist band that has vowed to destroy Israel.

This is a most refreshing reversal of the policy of Andrew Young, ex-President Carter's buddy and Carter's first appointee to the U.N. post. Young's defiance of U.S. interests eventually forced him to resign but the damage he had done to American interests was consider-

After Young came Ambassador Donald McHenry and he was of the quiet diplomatic temper. He didn't do any damage but neither was he very forthright in speaking out for his country's interests in the face of incessant Soviet-prompted attacks on the United States from most of the pipsqueak phony nations that make up the 154-member General Assem-

Kirkpatrick has been thrifty with words up to now but there is no mistaking the realism with which she views her job — to foster the interests of her own country while at the same time seeking peace, freedom and improved economic posture the world

This attitude is in clear contrast to the last administration's policies which coincidentally have just been expressed in a 3,500-word valedictory by Richard L. McCall, Carter's assistant secretary of state for international organization affairs. McCall, Carter, etc., thought so much of this wishy-washy apology of U.N. do-nothingness that they had it printed at taxpayer expense in the last days of the Democratic administration and distributed to newsmen nationwide.

McCall fails entirely to address U.S. interests in the United Nations but scolds those who doubt, the world body's value to America and continually pleads that we must continue to do more for others.

That is fine - to help others as is the American tradition - but national interests are important, too, and Kirkpatrick knows this. The leftists and liberals didn't like it much but she put her philosophy in clear focus when she discussed her view of U.S. policy in regard to dictators vs. Com-

munist-leftist terrorists. "I have called (slain Nicaraguan dictator Anastasio) Somoza a traditional autocrat — the shah of Iran was another," she said. "Some of these are important to us. I think we'd like to see the autocracies liberalized, but if it's a choice between a moderately repressive government friendly to the United States and a Soviet-Cubanbacked movement dedicated to imposing a much more repressive regime on a people — if there are only two alternatives - we should choose the former."

That is laying it right on the line and it is refreshing indeed to hear such words from the American delegate sitting in the United Nations. Perhaps it is the beginning of at least a four-year period when the United States will not willingly be pushed around by its enemies but rather will be applauded for defending its friends - and itself.

# Anger taken from Kent State tragedy

HOLLYWOOD - What went wrong with NBC's

If truth did become a victim of the 1970 Kent State tragedy, as many have charged, the same can be said of Sunday night's three-hour TV movie depicting it.

'There are problems with the movie - I'm the first to admit it," said J. Gregory Payne, an assistant professor at Occidental College in Los Angeles who was historical consultant for "Kent State."

'They left out the anger, didn't they?'' lamented Arthur Kruase, whose daughter, Allison, was a student killed at Kent State.

"TV is good at cutting the heart out of things," said John Getz, an actor with a prominent role in "Kent State." Try to make a movie about some people who shoot some students and got away with it - and still not offend anybody - and you really have some-

THE FACTS OF the case are these: On May 4. 1970, Ohio National Guardsmen fatally shot four Kent State University students and wounded nine others during campus demonstrations against the U.S. invasion of Cambodia. The demonstrations were part of general campus unrest concerning the Vietnam War.

An FBI investigation failed to substantiate National Guard claims that it had been seriously provoked and was in danger from a closing circle of students when the guardsmen opened fire.

On the contrary, photographs showed the students to be at a considerable distance from the Guard when the first of 67 rounds was fired without warning. One of the casualties was 750 feet away when a bullet entered the rear of his neck, and only two were closer than 200 feet.

However, in Sunday night's movie, an almost delirious young guardsman removed his gas mask after the 13 seconds of gunfire and said about the students. "They were gonna shoot us, weren't

The firing upon students by the Ohio guardsmen was "unnecessary, unwarranted and inexcusable," said the President's Commission on Campus Unrest

Yet there have been no convictions in the Kent State case, something alluded to only fleetingly at the end of "Kent State." The ensuing legal controversy, the charges of a conspiracy among guardsmen to shoot students and efforts to smear the dead students and wrongly depict them as leftist radicals were omitted from "Kent State."

Director James Goldstone had said that he was 'given to believe' that President Richard M. Nixon had wanted to "make an example of Kent." But Goldsotne added, "It doesn't make that much difference."

Not much difference?

No wonder then that the movie was so ambivalent, leaving an impression that the shootings were a regrettable tragedy resulting from overzealous Guard officers and guardsmen who were confused, green kids. In truth, nearly all the shooters were veterans with riot control experience.

As Goldstone put it, he wanted viewers to care not only about the dead students, but also "about the individual members of the guard."

He had concluded in his book that the Kent State shootings were an "accident" and the only crime committeed that day was by students who "brazenly defy soldiers, daring them to shoot." That version of events was contradicted by a mass of evidence and later Michener himself, who was quoted in the New York Times as agreeing that there may have been a conspiracy to shoot the students.

Payne, who has spent a number of years researching and studying the Kent State tragedy and all of its ramifications, said he was "embarrassed" by the movie's association with Michener's book.

Why was the Michener book involved? Box office.

### ENTERTAINMENT

Various Kent State projects have been talked about for some time, but it wasn't until Max and Micheline Keller of Inter Planetary appproached NBC with rights to Michener's book in hand that a green light was given.

Michener's name sells, and so does Gerald Green's, as was reflected in an NBC advertisement for "Kent State" showing the well-known Green as the author of the teleplay, although the final scrpt is the work of the lesser-known Kramer. According to Payne NBC thought that Green's script was "too political" and wanted "more human focus."

CAST MEMBERS WERE so "loaded with angry feelings" about the movie that they considered buying a newspaper ad saying "This is not what we wanted to do," Getz said. "It was important to all of us that we would not be doing a piece of revisionist history, one more Russian history book.'

Getz and Keith Gordon, the actor who played fatally shot student Jeff Miller, confirmed that things got so bad at one point that about 30 cast members signed a petition objecting to key elements of the script, including a depiction of the May 2 burning of the ROTC building on the Kent State campus. The scene originally made it appear that the burning was by students, which was contradicted by the evidence. In the movie the students are shown near the fire,

contrary to fact, but at least the scene was more ambigous than before. "It's a very problematic scene," Payne acknowledged.

Omitting the aftermath of Kent State was perhaps the movie's greatest flaw. It was only later, as Payne notes in his newly published book about the shooting and the movie filming, "that the generally hostile attitude of the Nixon administration toward student demonstrations was exposed along with the calculated moves that were used to downplay and sometimes thwart investigations of the Kent State shootings," including Nixon's order to J. Edgar Hoover "to 'find information' which would support the Guard's selfdefense argument." Getz himself refused to read a voice-over speech summing up the case at the end of the movie because it was "absolute pablum."



Checking Plus-Interest

That "Kent State" was as accurate as it was, many close to the production feel, is because of Payne - who wrote his doctoral thesis on Kent state, has written a play about it and lectured widely on the subject.

"I'm very proud of the movie — I want to make that clear," Payne said. However, it does "make the establishment look better than the facts" justified,









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
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### There are differences between cold, influenza

Dear Dr. Solomon: I don't know that it makes any difference, but I'd like to know whether I have a cold or the flu. Half the people in my office say they have one or the other, but the symptoms all appear to be the same. Is there any real difference between them? — Larry

Dear Larry: There is a difference between the two, athough the suffering patient may not be able to appreciate it; however, there also are some similarities.

The common cold and influenza (flu) are alike in that they both are viral infections of the respiratory tract: the difference is that each is

caused by different viruses. Colds usually are caused by a type of virus called "rhinovirus" ("rhino" referring to the nose), while flu can be caused by any of a number of influenza viruses. During any single flu season, however, primarily the fall and winter months, usually only one type of flu virus is common. A cold and flu also are alike in that the viruses are spread from person to person through close contact such as kissing, sneezing, coughing, and even talking.

A person who has a cold often feels run down, has a scratchy throat, watery eyes, a runny nose, and sneezes. A dry cough and headache also may be present. Very few adults who suffer from colds have fever, but the temperature of a child with a cold may reach 100 to 102 degrees Fahren-

The early signs of the flu are similar to that of the common cold — a generally run-down feeling and a runny nose - but more severe symptoms develop after a day or two. These include fever, sore throat, muscle pain, weakness, headache, dry cough, and loss of appetite. Ordinarily, a case of the flu will last from seven to 10 days, but the patient may not feel completely well for as long as two to three weeks.

### Teamsters may not re-join AFL-CIO

LOS ANGELES — The Teamsters Union is almost certain to reject an invitation to rejoin the AFL-CIO, according to Mike Riley, president of the Southern California Joint Council of Teamsters.

"It would cost us \$12 million a year in per-capita dues to affiliate with the federation at the national, state and local levels," Riley said. "I think we can and will find better things to do with our money.'

AFL-CIO President Lane Kirkland recently called on unions outside of the 14-million-member labor federation to rejoin the "House of Labor," and one such union, the United Auto Workers, is expected to accept that invitation, according to UAW Western Regional Director Jerry Wipple.

The UAW was ousted from the . AFL-CIO in 1968 in a dispute over the auto workers' charge that the federation leaders lacked "social vision and a crusading spirit" and were "com-placent defenders of the status quo."

In contrast, the Teamsters' ouster

was not based on ideology but on charges that the Teamsters Union was dominated by corrupt leaders, including its late president, James R. Hoffa, who served prison terms after being convicted of jury tampering and pension fund fraud.

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
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
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# Bones of contention for easy chewing

RIDGEFIELD, Conn. (AP) — Cleaning out the stew pot the other day, in keeping with Board of Health regulations, the resident mix master came across a few left over bones, undigested bits of fat and fact, for readers to gnaw, worry over and bury out in the back yard.

Did you know, for instance, that when the Civil War broke out William Tecumseh Sherman was president of a street car company in St. Louis, making \$40 a month? Congress paid the arsonist-general \$550 a month; to ride a horse named Sam through Georgia and provide the background for "Gone With the Wind"

Hookers, in case anyone is curious how they got their name, were mamed for "Fighting Joe" Hooker, the Union general who as a young officer during the California gold rush earned a reputation for patronizing brothels. Fighting Joe didn't do as much fighting as Abraham Lincoln would have liked. When the general sent the president a report boastingly datelined "Headquarters in the



Saddle," Lincoln acidly remarked, "the trouble with Hooker is he's got his headquarters where his hindquarters should be."

Margaret Truman's favorite movie, when she was a young lady living in the White House, was "The Scarlet Pimpernel," starring Leslie Howard. She had it shown so often in the private presidential theater the projectionist got to know every part by heart.

Speaking of the White House, there is a presidential seal set right in the presidential bathtub.

Blair House, the VIP presidential guest house across the street, was the home of Montgomery Blair, Postmaster General in the Lincoln administration. It was here that Robert E. Lee turned down Lincoln's offer to command the Union armice.

The graceful old home, furnished with Oriental rugs, fine crystal, Lowestoft china and some silver by Paul Revere, can accommodate about a dozen top drawer overseas guests. During the Eisenhower administration, King Saud Ibn Abd al-Aziz Al Saud of Saudi Arabia showed up with an entourage of 65, including five royal princes, the royal barber, two coffee makers, an incense burner, a food taster and a "keeper of the curry powder."

Luckily for the State Department flunkies who had to dash about booking luxury hotel suites to accommodate the royal overflow, the king left his four wives at home. Since the Saudis did not partake of alcoholic beverages, one of the foggy bottom Middle East desk experts programed goats milk for the official White House cocktail parties. Goats along the Eastern Seaboard as far away as South Carolina, were tapped for 16 pints a day, which were flown in and stored in the refrigerators at Walter Reed Hospital.

"You Americans drink a lot of goats milk," one of the royal princes complained at the farewell reception. "Most of us hate it."

The White House, by the way, isn't white. The nation's No. 1 split level (fewer floors on the sloping north side) was constructed with gray sandstone quarried at Aquia Creek, Va.

Benjamin Harrison (1889-1893) was the last president to wander where he pleased, day or night, without security guards. His successor Grover Cleveland (who also preceded him, apparently without guards), closed out his term with a round-the-clock security detail of 27 guards.

# Lyman Gilmore: Was he flying before Wrights?

GRASS VALLEY, Calif. — Visitors to this Northern California hamlet are told the Wright brothers were Johnnies-come lately.

According to many old-timers here the first man to fly was not Orville Wright. They say it was their own red-bearded, red-headed, locks-down-to-the-waist, unabashed eccentric Lyman Gilmore.

Grass Valley telephone books and Chamber of Commerce brochures proclaim unequivocally:

"On May 15, 1902, Lyman Gilmore seated in a 32-foot span monoplane powered by a 20 horsepower steam engine and flash boiler was launched down a chute 100 yards long into the air then continued in flight for some distance on its own power.

"There is conclusive evidence Gilmore built and flew his craft 19 months before the Wright brothers made their first flight Dec 17, 1903, at Kitty Hawk.

"Lyman Gilmore was robbed of his place in history by the remoteness of this place and by his own secretiveness..."

Postcards in local stores show photographs of Gilmore and his early airplanes.

A mural covering the entire front wall of the Lyman Gilmore Intermediate School on a high hill overlooking Grass Valley salutes the aviation pio-

The mural shows Gilmore standing amid a cloud leaning on a drawing board, his goggles pushed back on his forehead. His bright yellow monoplane, reproduced from plans he drew in 1898, is shown in flight.

"I believe Lyman Gilmore was the first man to fly because I want to believe it," says Carol Hughes, the school secretary.

Hjalmer E. Berg, 70, retired San Francisco State University American history professor and owner of a Grass Valley bookstore, insists:

"I'm sure Lyman flew an airplane before the Wright brothers. He recorded that fact in his log. Unfortunately, there is no verification for his

In his log Gilmore wrote that in 1902 he made more than 20 successful flights in the steam-powered monoplane, some as short as 100 yards, Gilmore, born in 1874, wrote that he flew a glider in the nearby hills in 1891 when he was 17.

In 1898 he wrote the War Department urging this country to "harness the air and make use of it as a means of transportation. America must build a fleet of air ships." He signed his letter, Lyman Gilmore, "The Aerial Fulton" (Robert Fulton designed the first commercial steamboat).

Although his claim that he was the first to fly an airplane has been universally ignored, except here, Gilmore is generally credited with the establishment of the first commercial air field in the United States on March 15, 1907.

It was on the 50-acre air field, now the site of the school named in his honor, that he built his hangar and early airplanes.

In the late 1920s, a certificate from the Daniel Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion of Aviation was sent to Gilmore applauding his "contributions to the establishment of a nationwide system of transportation." It was signed by Guggenheim and Charles A. Lindbergh.


"Lyman vowed in 1908 that he would never bathe, shave or get a haircut until William Jennings Bryan was elected president," recalls Arletta M. Douglass, 72, member of the Nevada County Historical Landmarks Commission.

"Bryan was never elected. And Lyman stuck to his guns."

She also believes Gilmore got his airplane off the ground before the Wright brothers. "But I don't think Lyan flew the plane. I believe he did it by remote control."

Gilmore died in 1951. Many oldtimers in Grass Valley knew him and still

# Irony in firing

WASHINGTON -There is extreme irony in the firing of Robert E. White as U.S. ambassador to El Salvador.

For it is White who played the leading role in building support for the centrist junta in El Salvador. So far, that group has fought off leftist guerrillas and right-wing terrorists.

And every day that it stays in power, the junta gives the Reagan administration more time to formulate a counterinsurgency plan against a Marxist takeover of El Salvador and other Central American countries.

A State Department spokesman made it clear that White was not fired for policy disagree-

Indeed, signals from the Reagan White House are that the new administration has bought the Carter administration's - and White's - final Salvadoran solution lock, stock andjunta.

No longer is there talk of bolstering the landowner oligarchy that ruled El Salvador for years. Many members of this group have fled to Miami, where some reportedly finance and assign targets for death squad assassins in their

former country. Now the new administration talks of steering a steady course between left and right, of bolstering the moderate junta and of supplying it with arms and military ad-

There is even guarded aproval of two major social reforms advocated by White — the breakup of large landholdings and nationalization of banks.

President Reagan himself - speaking to a group of editors in much more general terms showed a keen interest in dealing with crises in Latin America.

"I have a very strong feeling that we have not done all we should have in past years to tie the two Americas together



SANTA MONICA, Calif. - Evidence that the brain plays an important role in both causing and prevented but they were not subjected to psychological ing sudden death heart attacks suggests that drug treatment could be aimed at the brain as well as the

A Texas researcher presented the new evidence this week at a four-day scientific meeting on sleep research sponsored by the Intra-Science Research Foundation here.

The studies by Dr. James E. Skinner of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston support the much debated theory that psychological stress is as important as high fat diets and other risk factors in triggering heart attacks.

Using pigs as experimental animals because their heart action resembles the human's, Skinner showed that psychological stress is a necessary factor for producing the type of irregular heart beat (ventricular fibrillation) associated with sudden death.

The nervous input into the brain that the brain reads as psychological stress, the Baylor scientist has learned, is handled by a region of the brain called the frontal cortex. By blocking the nerve pathways that run from the

frontal cortex to another part of the brain that controls heartbeat, the researcher was able to prevent the lethally irregular heart rhythm - even in highly stressed animals whose coronary arteries had been obstructed so as to simulate a heart

When the animals' coronary arteries were occludstress, the animals were likely to survive. But when stress was added, death occurred unless the nerve pathway was blocked.

Skinner blocked that pathway by means that would not be acceptable in humans. Skinner's lab now is doing chemical and biophysical studies on the frontal cortex center to understand how the deleterious output arises to learn whether it can be prevented in humans with a pill.


Skinner and his colleagues learned about the protective value of the frontal cortex while studying the brainwaves of sleeping pigs whose coronary arteries had been occluded.

They discovered that during a stage of sleep called rapid eye movement (REM) sleep, the pigs' vulnerability to developing the lethal ventricular fibrillation was greatly reduced.

But during another stage of sleep, called quiet sleep, this protective mechanism was not as active. So the researchers have discovered that sleep has stages that can be either beneficial or harmful for protection of the heart from ventricular fibrilla-

"If we could invent a pill that would either enhance the protective effect that occurs during REM sleep or block the deleterious effect during psychological stress, we would have a wonder drug," Skinner said in an interview.






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
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
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
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

### Artist works for freedom

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — "Freedom is art," says Louis De Mayo, and he has fought to achieve his own particular idea of that freedom.

He has worked at jobs he didn't like; in commercial art; on magazines; in construction. He left the home his immigrant parents established in the East. He jeopardized his relationship with his wife and chil-

He moved to Arizona when everyone was telling him, "Louie, you're crazy," for he was determined to make it on his own; to paint; to find art. He says his only regret about leaving Philadelphia is that he didn't leave it sooner.

'Sometimes you just have to take things in your own hands and do it," he says. "At the end of the road when they put you in the ground, people aren't going to give a damn what your problems were - the kids; the wife; some business deal. They're just going to drop you into the hole and say, 'That guy just never did it.' "
Well, Louis De Mayo did it.

For about the last four years, he has been a free man. He has made his living at art; mostly painting the dark, shadowy figures of Indians against a stark white background.

Only now De Mayo has learned that even the grand and great freedom he has achieved carries its own form of restrictions and its own problems.

He can paint, which is what he always wanted to do. Only now he has

established a salable "style." He has created an image - Indian figures on a flat white background. He is expanding that a little, going into the Southwest's Spanish and Anglo heritages, but this worries him.

For art to mean freedom, it must sell, and De Mayo isn't so sure people will want to follow him through his

In addition to this, there is the artist's private battle with a special form of reverse discrimination. He was born and raised in south

Philadelphia, a first-generation Italian-American.

But he paints Indians. A gallery owner once suggested to him that he tell people he is part Indian, the theory being that people don't like to buy paintings of Indians unless they are done by Indians.

Victoria Voith, director of the University of Pennsylvania's Animal Behavior Clinic, doesn't like the term "animal psychiatrist." But her background in veterinary medicine and

psychology make her qualified to be The clinic handles about 160 cases a

"Most behavior problems of animals are not related to behavior problems of the particular owners," Dr. Voith said in a recent interview. "Very few pet owners who come in here could be described as disturbed or neurotic.

'These are normal people, who have a pet with a problem. Problems are a result of some interaction with

the environment," she said. For example, a dog may relate to human family members as it would to a group of dogs and vie for a dominant position, sometimes backing up demands with aggressiveness.

In the case of the Doberman, the humans in the family deferred to the dog so much that it felt like the leader of the pack and acted accordingly.

The prescription called for drug therapy at first. Then the owner taught the dog to sit or lie down for food rewards. Eventually the dog was taught to act that way — to show submission — for everything it wanted, such as dinner, going for a walk or being petted.

"This treatment," said Dr. Voith, "subtly reversed the dominance hierarchy.

In the case of an old English sheep-dog that was afraid of thunderstorms, the dog was exposed to stereo recordings of thunderstorm noise at gradually increasing intensity, without evoking fear. The dog was rewarded for its calm behavior with chocolate

# Keeping sole plate clean

Is there any simple way to keep the bottom of an iron clean? Certain fabrics leave a residue on the iron which then causes it to stick to the next piece being ironed.

I'm really hoping you can help me 'cause, believe me, ironing with a gunky iron is really a drag (in more ways than one)! - Mrs. Bess Rose

There are several things you might try but, to me, the simplest, easiest and most effective is to use a commercial iron cleaner to remove the

Just go to the notions counter of any large fabric store and buy a tube of iron cleaner. It sells for around a dollar. If they don't have it, ask them to order a tube for you.

Follow directions on the tube and you'll be amazed at how fast the crusty buildup disappears and at how smoothly the iron glides afterwards.

To my way of thinking, this cleaner is an absolute necessity for those who sew and use fusible interfacing. I can't think of anything that sticks to an iron faster when accidentally touched with a hot iron. The cleaner will remove even this sticky stuff in a

If you would like to try a home remedy rub a paste of baking soda

and water on the bottom of the iron (when it's cool of course) or try silver cream or very fine steel wool. (Don't use steel wool on a non-stick coated

Rubbing the hot iron over wax paper will sometimes help to reduce the drag of an iron if the buildup isn't too great. The above suggestions should put

the zip back into the iron. Now if we just had a magic formula to put some zip into us when facing that big basket of ironing. — Hugs, Heloise

### Officer saves man's life with phone tapping system

ST. CLAIR SHORES, Mich. (AP) -A policeman who answered a telephone call from a man who had suffered a stroke and lost his voice saved the city councilman's life by devising a simple tapping system to find out where he lived.

"All I could think while it was going on was that if I couldn't get the information from him, the guy was just going to lie there and die," recalled Officer James Zerilli.

He told the caller to tap once for yes and twice for no, then began asking what part of the city the man lived in, said Sgt. James Bell, who listened in on the call Thursday.

Did he live in the southern part of

"We just lucked out. He lived on one of the main streets. If he had lived on out.

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### Crusades against smoking create 'non-smoking ethos'

Without the anti-smoking campaigns of recent years, Americans would be smoking 41 percent more cigarettes than they are, a University of Michigan professor

has calculated. The crusades against smoking - and against smokers who foul the air for non-smokers - have created a growing "non-smoking ethos," he concluded.

The assertions are made in the weekly journal Science by Dr. Kenneth Warner of the Michigan School of Public Health.

Anti-smoking efforts, especially federal programs, often have been criticized as too weak. But Warner noted that downturns in smoking have repeatedly occurred in years with much anti-smoking publicity. Since 1973, per capita cigarette use has fallen about 1 percent

The years since 1973, Warner observes, have been years of the nonsmokers' rights movement and years when the anti-smoking atmosphere led several states to increase cigarette taxes

Yet, he added, there were other factors in the 1970s that might have been expected to increase cigarette use increased smoking by women, for example, and a drop in cigarette prices compared with prices of other goods.

There is no sure way to prove cause and effect, he said, but it is reasonable to believe there has been a deep change in attitudes and behavior. He uses mathematical regression equations to

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





### Settlements reached in federal suits

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) - Texaco and another company have reached out-of-court settlements totaling in the millions of dollars in 10 negligence suits filed in federal district court in Beaumont since 1977.

A federal civil trial was scheduled to begin Wednesday, but U.S. District Judge Joe Fisher dismissed a 12member jury after agreements were reached on the final three suits, filed in the aftermath of a March 17, 1977 blast at Texaco's refinery in Port Arthur that killed eight people and

Amounts of the settlements were not disclosed. Attorneys said they could not release specific amounts without their clients' approval.

"The families are very pleased with the settlement," said another attorney, who asked not to be identified. The suits had sought a total of \$15

million to \$20 million in damages. One attorney, who asked not to be identified, said the total of a few of the 10 cases netted "in excess of several million dollars."

Another attorney, who also requested anonymity, said a co-defendant with Texaco — Kraut Kramer-Branson, Inc., of Los Angeles — bore the biggest share of the settlement burden in the suit brought by his client.

Kraut Kramer-Branson manufactures an ultrasonic detection device used to check for corrosion in refinery

The blast occurred shortly after 7 a.m. According to depositions of witnesses, a pipe near a refinery stabilizer unit ruptured, releasing a cloud of vapor that exploded in a short series of fire balls. The rupture was eventually attributed to corrosion in the 43-year-old pipe.

Texaco spokesman Charles Rentz said the company would have no immediate comment.

TOKYO (AP) - An enterprising Japanese insurance company has given its clients a reassuring present for the New Year - a five-yen coin, worth about 21/2 cents, guaranteed by the gods to increase in value 10,000 times because it was washed in the magic waters of an 800-year-old Shinto shrine.

Accordingly, several hundred thousand Japanese bent on obtaining a hedge against their country's 7 percent inflation climbed the steep hill to the shrine in the ancient capital of Kamakura during the just-ended holiday period.

Besides washing their money, they tied twists of white paper with shrine fortune prophesies to trees and bushes lining the road.

But none of this was particularly necessary. As the eighth decade of the century begins, the Japanese have never had it so good, as individuals and as a nation.

And this Japan confronting the new Reagan administration is a far different Japan, in national mood and economic clout, from the one President Jimmy Carter knew.

Inflation, while nettling, is small compared with that in some other industrial nations. And it is true that Japan's trade deficit for 1980 grew to

\$12.9 billion, but this was due to a 62.8 percent hike in the cost of oil imports. Elsewhere, Japanese industry and know-how paid off handsomely. Steel and automobile production outstripped that of the United States for the

first time in history. Major industries

### Delay expected for three nuke plants

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Nuclear Regulatory Commission expects to delay considering final licenses for three nuclear power plants in California and North and South Carolina from this year until

The delays were outlined in a report to Congress listing scheduled licensing dates next year and the following year for 11 reactors facing possible safety problems or legal objections.

However, NRC spokesman Joe Fouchard said Friday that four other nuclear reactors at utility plants in Alabama, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Illinois could be issued final licenses this year.

The reactors being delayed were dealt postponements in the past in licensing, a complicated process that has pushed back the opening of virtually every nuclear power plant in the United States. It now takes upwards of 10 years for final licensing to

be completed. The reactors in question are at the Diablo Canyon plant near San Luis Obispo, Calif.; the William B. McGuire power station near Charlotte, N.C.; and the Virgil C.

Summer station near Jenkinville, S.C. Part of the latest delays could result from renewed moves to block the licensing following the near meltdown in March 1979 at the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant near Harrisburg,

That accident, the worst in the history of commercial nuclear development, brought about a reassessment of nuclear power in general and of NRC safety regulations and licensing practices in particular.

### No catchup after wage freeze ends

DETROIT (AP) r'ederal loan watchdogs and Chrysler Corp. do not plan to let the struggling automaker's workers regain lost ground compared to other autoworkers once their wage freeze ends in 1982, according to an analysis prepared by the loan board staff.

The analysis, prepared by the Chrysler Loan Guarantee Board's staff as it considered the recovery plan that was tentatively approved on Jan. 16, reveals many previously unknown facts about Chrysler's

The analysis says the recovery plan assumes labor costs will increase after 1982 at a rate that 'generally tracks costof-living and wage increases assumed for the industry in general." This would mean the company's workers would neither gain nor lose ground in relation to other autoworkers

However, the board's analysis, which has not been publicly released, does not say what labor cost increases are "assumed for the industry in general.",

Thanks to concessions made by lenders and workers in the recovery plan, the board's analysis says Chrysler should show cumulative profits of \$1.24 billion from 1980 through 1985, an increase from the \$889 million the company projected in an estimated made last Ju-

The analysis showed that while considering the recovery plan, the board assumed Chrysler's fourthquarter loss to be \$299 million. Chrysler has been saying it will show a loss of "about" \$200 million for the quarter. The company's actual losses for the first three quarters were \$1.475

billion. Another fact revealed for the first time was that Chrysler owed \$270 million in unpaid bills on Dec. 30 - more than the \$233 million the company was assumed to have in the bank.

Last July, the company projected a fourthquarter profit of \$170 million, but the board estimated it would only have been \$157 million. Because of a slowdown in auto sales the only month Chrysler actually did make money was October, when the board's analysis estimates the company was in the black by \$7 million.

Chrysler members of the United Auto Workers union have ratified a contract that freezes wages and gives up cost-of-living raises earned since September

The average UAW member makes \$9.47 per hour in base wages. Cost-of-living protection raised that by \$1.15 an hour in December and is expected to reach \$1.37 an hour in March, the last month it will be

The union already has signed a pledge that it will bear Chrysler's situation in mind in negotiations for a new contract in September

SAN DIEGO-"That's my boy!" It's as American an expression as "Twenty-three skiddoo," "Oh you kid!" "Outta sight!" "Some kinda!" "So what?" or "Like

It usually connotes a stage mother standing in the wings while her son or daughter steals the show from seasoned performers. Shirley Temple's mother, Jackie Coogan's

Or it refers to an Old Blue in a raccoon coat at the Harvard game pointing a pennant at the Yale quarterback.

Often it refers to an unathletic, underweight, undersized myopic parent who is living out his fantasies through his offspring after a lifetime of answering phones at the office, delivering fish, opening other peoples' car doors at a hotel or just living a 9-to-5 job at a drill press.

The presumption is, the boy in question is a glum kid who has been force-fed athletics or the theater since birth or had a football, baseball, basketball -- or even a piano or golf club -- thrust in his hands and told not to ruin his eyes reading books. While the other kids were out learning to dance or roller skate or tie Boy Scout knots, he was in the back yard, hitting ball after ball into a net or throwing curve after curve at the barn wall -- the Bob Feller's father syn-

THE KENNEDYS raised their boys to be president, the Tafts to be senators. Kings raise their kids to be kings but for most the American Dream is for No. 1 son one day to be No. 1 quarterback on the Rams. The training begins in Pop Warner football, Little League baseball. Mothers look at the payroll off the Ice Capades and get their daughters off double-runners and down to the local polar palace as soon as they can walk. The Peggy Fleming's mother syn-

But you look down the ranks of golf and, no matter where you look, every player is a product of the links version of the stage mother -- the fairway father.

GOLFERS used to come out of caddy sheds or were truants from Texas sneaking on the courses at twilight. Their fathers not only didn't push them into it, they probably beat them when they found out where they'd been "goofing off." Playing golf was like shooting pool in those days. A sport for bums and low lifes.

But you can't play golf on the tour nowadays if someone didn't put a club in your hand at age 6 and push you out there. Arnold Palmer's father gave him a putter for his third birthday.

JOHN COOK'S father wasn't a pro at a golf club. He didn't play in the NFL. But neither was he a junior partner in an ac-

counting firm, a guy who carried a briefcase and dreamed of carrying the ball for the Cleveland Browns instead. Jim Cook was a high school football

coach in Toledo when his son was born. He had been a college end at Denison. He became an assistant coach under Woody Hayes at Ohio State. He had been a threeletter man. ### KU's Lynette Woodard rates as gals' best

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) - At one end of the Allen Field House at the University of Kansas is a plaque honoring Kansas Hall of Famer Dr. James Naismith, who invented the game of basketball.

At the other end of the field house is a plaque for the newest Hall of Famer, a quiet, bashful 21-year-old woman from Wichita. It reads: 'Lynette Woodard.

Most people say Woodard, who has in various years led the nation in scoring, rebounding and steals, is simply the best player in women's college basketball today.

"There's no question in my mind," says Kansas Coach Marian Washnawks are 18-3 and ranked No. 3 in the nation. "One on one, I have never seen a player do what she can do. One on one, I think she is the greatest player I have ever seen, and I've played against the best in the world."

WOODARD is agile, and she has a launching-pad jumping ability that's earned her the nickname "Leaping Lizard." Some look to her to be the first woman to dunk the ball, and she is a top prospect for the star-hungry Women's Professional Basketball

"I'm looking for that dunk," she said. "Somebody's going to get it one day.

Woodard, a forward-guard who shyly admits to being an inch shorter than her officially listed 6 feet, is the favorite to win the Wade Trophy as this season's top collegiate female player.

Woodard, a cheerful but reticent woman with strong religious beliefs, would rather talk about her acrobatic shooting and lightning-quick ballhandling than her success

"I DON'T think you can just say a person, you know, is the best player or whatever," she says. A pause. Then a laugh, as the truth

"Some nights I am. Hopefully more nights than anybody else."

A glance at the record books shows that's been the case during most of Woodard's 31/2 seasons at Kansas.

In her freshman season, she led the nation with 14.8 rebounds a game and was second in scoring with 25.2 points. As a sophomore, she was first in scoring (31.0) and steals (193), and second in rebounding (14.3). She scored a career-high 49 points in one game.

LAST YEAR, Washington moved Woodard from forward to guard to stop opponents from double-teaming her, and she still scored 23.8 points a game, averaged 10.5 rebounds and led the nation with 177 steals.

In a game last month, Woodard wiped out the old women's collegiate career scoring record of 3,204 points by Cindy Brogdon of Tennessee. averaging 25.1 points and 10.1 rebounds this year while alternating between forward and guard, Woodard now has 3,316 career points.

Woodard got her first taste of competition playing "sockball" with her brother, Darrell. They would roll up socks and shoot them over open doors in their rooms. Her parents no doubt were glad when a basketball court was built across the street from their Wichita home

The court was part of Piatt Park, built on the site of an Air Force plane crash that killed 30 people and destroyed 14 homes in 1965, when she

"I realize now that it was the first thing that I remember," said Woodard. "I can remember just everything going so fast. I was at a neighbor's house ... and I saw all this smoke. This house just fell into the ington, a former star athlete whose fire ... and somebody took me

Woodard played pickup games at Piatt Park, occasionally with another current Kansas All-American, Darnell Valentine. Then it was on to CYO teams and Wichita North High School, which she led to two state

titles in three years and scored over 30 points a game as a senior. The scholarship offers began pouring in.

"I JUST knew I was going big time," said Woodard. "I didn't know where it was at the time. I just thought, well, this is my ticket out of Kansas.

But the pressure from recruiters got to her. A trip to the Lawrence campus and Washington's gentle persuasion convinced her to become

Jayhawk. 'Talking to all those other places, I kept waiting for the right feeling, said Woodard, who calls Washington her role model. "And this was it."

Since then, Woodard has toured with teams in Korea, China, Japan, the Soviet Union and Mexico. Last summer, she was a member of the honorary U.S. Olympic team (Americans did not compete in the Olympics because of President Carter's boycott of the Moscow

Games). Woodard, a speech communications major and an academic All-American, says she'd like to play in the WBL but is worried about the league's shaky financial status. She is also eyeing a career in public

relations. But Washington doesn't see how her star can miss bringing legitimacy and visibility to the fledgling

'Lord, she gets up in the air," said Washington. "She'll take a baseline shot and she'll be behind the backboard and she'll switch hands. When Robert Milo bought the New Jersey Gems two years ago, he blithely assumed the women's basketball fever boiling at nearby Montclair State College would spread in the pros.

Milo, an ad agency owner with no sports background, didn't bother with fancy marketing studies

He moved the Gems to an expensive, 5,000-seat arena in an affluent suburb, acquired ex-Montclair star Carol "The Blaze" Blazejowski, and waited for the fans to pour in at \$10 a head, just \$2 less than prime seats for the New Jersey Nets of the National Basketball Association.

HE'S STILL waiting.

Now, with losses over \$500,000, Milo reluctantly is looking for a cheaper college auditorium and plans to

drastically reduce ticket prices. His woes are typical of the owners in the eight-

team Women's Professional Basketball League, founded in 1978 and still an infant by sports standards. None of the owners had owned a sports team before joining the league, and few had any peripheral sports managerial experience.

Until two years ago, New Or-leans Pride owner Claudette Simpson spent nearly all her time running her gynecologist husband's offices. Other clubs are owned by lawyers, economists and assorted entrepreneurs.

'We don't have the physical attributes of a male," said Lieberman. "We can't dunk or shoot 30-foot shots with ease, but we can play some phases just like a man," said Lieberman, who plays for the Dallas Diamonds and is the second-leading scorer in the Women's Basketball League, averaging 25.7 points per game.

"If you've never seen women's basketball, you might imagine that all the women are heavy and overweight, that they are slow and can't jump, that they just stand there and shoot set shots," said Lieberman, who was the top college player while at Old Dominion.

But the women playing in the struggling league are good atgletes, she says.

Lieberman has been the drawing card for the Diamonds, who were attracting fewer than 1,000 spectators per game this time last year. Now they average about 2,000 spectators a game, twice as many as the seven other WBL franchises.

NONE OF the clubs is making money, says WBL Commissioner Sherwin Fischer, who is a co-owner of the Chicago Hustle franchise. But the owners are confident the television coverage and corporate sponsorship they need will emerge in the next few

Basketball is taking hold in high schools, fueled by dollars poured in since 1972 when Title IX was enacted, prohibiting sex discrimination in schools. In about 100 000 girls participated in all inters lastic sports, including field hockey and softball.

Three years later, in basketball alone, the number of girls playing intercholastically was 150,000. It has more than tripled since.

"There are millions and millions of little girls playing basketball in gym classes. Now, they see there's an opportunity for scholarships and they look at people like myself," said Old Dominion's Nancy Lieberman, now with the Dallas Diamonds and perhaps the most well-known player in the

But there is still a question whether there will be a league when those youngsters are ready for it. Generally, the struggling owners are dismayed, but not discouraged.

Smith went to the University of Kansas where he played basketball for the legendary Phog Allen. Smith was not a starter but played on the 1952 Jayhawk team that won the national championship. It was at Kansas that he got his first glimpse of the pressure defense that would later become such an integral part of the Tar Heel game plan.

By the time Smith enrolled at Kansas, he had resolved to become a coach. He steadfastly maintained that attitude through college, shaken only once by Allen.

"He tried to talk me into going into med school. He said there were too many heartbreaks in coaching," Smith said. "I wavered a bit, but ended up thinking I could teach math and coach high school."

That's not quite the way it happened. After a stint in the Air Force, during which he helped coach a military tram in West Germany, Smith returned home to be assistant at the Air Force Academy, where he stayed until 1958.

IN 1957, he returned to Kansas to watch the national championship game between Kansas and North Carolina. The Tar Heels won that one, and then-North Carolina Coach Frank McGuire offered Smith the job as his assistant.

Smith remembers putting off a decision because he was

upset that Kansas had lost. But he took the job in 1958, and when McGuire left to coach the pros in 1961, Smith became head coach.

The Smith era at North Carolina did not begin with a boom. His first team finished 8-9. But that is the only losing season he's ever had as a head coach. The closest Smith came to a losing season after that was 1964 when the

Then came 1967, the year Smith calls the turning point in his coaching career. The Tar Heels went 26-6 that year. Smith attributes the change to the appearance of one player in the Tar Heel fold — 6-foot-11 Franklin "Rusty"

"We were doing relatively well, 16 wins, but I think the change really took place when Rusty Clark chose to come to North Carolina," Smith said. "He was our first big man, at least, the first I coached. 'If Rusty hadn't grown up in the state, he probably

wouldn't have come to North Carolina, and I might not be coaching here." Clark graduated in 1969 and is now a doctor in Fayette-

ville, N.C. "I think he's being exceedingly kind," Clark said of

Smith's comment. "I think he would have done all right without me.' Clark is one of a multitude of former players who has

remained close to Smith. And that, it seems, may be the magic of Dean Smith.

His players come first. He starts any interview by stating he would rather discuss his players than him-



### Meggysey back in football as coach

some corners. Social critic Dave Meggysey, football coach. Sure, and Bob Dylan's a born-again evan-

The times really are a changing. Change they must, of course. These are the '80s; the '60s, they tell us, are dead. There are those who insist they never really existed, at least not the way some wish to remember them.

Dave Meggysey, a product of that time who once wrote that "when society changes in the way I hope it will, football will be obsolete," isn't sure. He doesn't believe in pat answers anymore, a legacy of his life

He still believes in questions, though, and so the man who shocked the football establishment with his book, "Out of Their League," has returned. To be a high school football coach in this trendy, artsy community just north of the Golden Gate Bridge.

MAYBE YOU don't remember the name. You have to go back a decade or so.

In those days, Meggysey was a professional football player for the St. Louis Cardinals. But he became disaffected and disillusioned, abandoning the game in 1969 to write his infamous (wherever NFL owners gathered) book, which became a sensation. It was an indictment of the NFL, of football itself, which he took to be a metaphor for war.

He called the game brutal and dehumanizing and said "No sane man likes to get hit."

But there he was last fall on a high school practice field, encouraging youngsters with "good hit," the what he once rejected, but he says he's teaching it in

HE SPEAKS gently, and somehow doesn't seem to be the way he described himself in his book — an animal, ready to attack, all-consumed by football. He rejected that part of himself, of society

'I had rejected the structure of the game," he says, "not necessarily the game itself. I view sports as socialization. Profound things happen to people who play, and to people who watch.

"I was locked into a grotesque system. Hate the guy you're up against. Don't respect him as an adversary. That's cultural garbage. That's what the purveyors want it to be. Athletes see it different-

Meggysey, now, sees it differently.

He's a man willing to share his views. He speaks like a college instructor, which he is, throwing out terms like social Darwinism, matrix, ethics, dialectic, revisionism. He also speaks like a football player, which he was, and a coach, which he is.

'Here's a chance to put theory into practice," he said. "To see what coaching, something I've written and thought about, is really like.

He has lived football. An All-American at Syracuse in the early '60s, he played seven years in the NFL before quitting, at age 29. He fell in then with sports activist Jack Scott, wrote the book, and has been a student and a teacher since. He writes for professional journals and he teaches a course at Stanford called "Sports Consciousness and Social Change." Many of his students are football players not a great deal different from what he was once

"I want them to question what they're doing," said Meggysey. "Why do they play? Would they play for

Of course, no one asked those questions in 1960. But there were no instructors and no coaches like Meggy-MILL VALLEY, Calif. - The news hit hard in sey. He became the coach at Tampalpais High when a friend of his son Chris, 17, recommended Meggysey to the principal. They met a few times and agreed he

would take the job, for \$800 a year. It was quite a year, despite the money. Priceless, really. The team didn't win a game, but Meggysey, who took over one that was 2-8 the year before, didn't seem too concerned, nor did almost anyone else. There was the biggest turnout in years at the high school banquet. It was such a good year Meggysey

will try it again. The game put me in touch with myself," he said. "I just haven't encountered many other situations that give me a complete high like football does.'

NOT THAT winning is unimportant. "We're not backing off one inch from winning," he said. "But there are other, more important, considerations. What we're doing is developmental. Win, sure, but not at all costs. Winning as part of a greater experi-

In sports, Meggysey preaches, there are moments that while not unique to athletes are more common there. The rushes of adrenaline, the roar of the crowd, one special moment when everything comes together in orgasmic frenzy. A peak experience.

'In my classes," he said, "we talk about why these peak experiences aren't replicable, why they don't occur more often. They most often occur during high school years where there is less-constricted control,

when the kids are less anxious, less uptight. "Sports at their best provide a sort of cosmic communion, a coming into touch with the whole

Meggysey has had those moments, a crushing very words he once scorned. He's teaching them, tackle, even a Jimi Hendrix concert. Those experiences, he says, are the stuff of living. He recalled how John Mackey, his teammate at Syracuse, told him of then Baltmore Colts owner Carrol Rosenbloom bringing cronies into the locker room to

rub up against the athletes. 'He wanted everyone to know that they were his stable," Meggysey said. "And the people who came

Things that Meggysey had, and that he can share with his wife and four children. When his youngest, a 7-year-old son, came in on a Sunday morning to tell him the Cardinals were winning, he said: "Good, that's our team." That's how much Meggysey has mellowed. He can even like the Cardinals again.

But he won't like management, on the professional or collegiate level. He feels in either case the athlete is subject to exploitation.

Sports is a reflection of the dominant culture," he says. "It's in the hands of the political-corporate-economic system which thinks only in terms of profit. They care nothing about the game, which, ideally, is life affirming. What we see as a game, owners see as a business. And the game suffers for t.

It's like being a farmer who grows food for himself. He's not going to ruin it with petrochemicals. He's going to produce a better product than the agribusiness farmers whose motive is profit.'

As for colleges, he thinks the NFL Players Association "ought to come in and organize. Nobody believes in the myth of student-athlete any more," he says. "The question is, is the athlete being properly compensated. The average salary (scholarship), according to one study, is \$4,600 a year. Is that enough: Maybe if a real education and a degree are garanteed the athlete, it would be.

Still a radical, yes. Still angry, sometimes. When he came back to football, the problem, he said, was figuring out how to reform a street fight.

He thinks he's attcking the problem from the right level. "This is where sport is most pristine, most pure. The kids are out there for the pure joy of They're at a very impressionable age, an age of passion. I'm trying to plug into that emotional level, to heighten the experience.


