

Talk reaches 'engaging' end

LONDON (AP) - Prince Charles, heir to the British throne and one of the world's most eligible bachelors, is engaged to 19-year-old Lady Diana Spencer and the couple will be married this summer, Buckingham Palace announced today.

The announcement ended months of speculation about romance between the dashing 32-year-old prince and the daughter of an earl distantly related to the royal family.

The palace disclosed that Prince Charles proposed and gave Lady Diana a sapphire and diamond engagement ring a few days before she left for Australia Feb. 6. He then told his parents at their Sanringham

Britain's future queen is the girl next door. Lady Diana grew up on the Spencer family estate in Norfolk county next to the royal family's Sandringham residence.

Prince Charles and Lady Diana were quoted by the Press Association, Britain's domestic news agency, as saying in an interview today that they cannot recall meeting before November 1977 when the prince went to the Spencer estate for a pheasant shoot.

Prince Charles was also quoted by Press Association as saying the wedding will probably be in late July.

The Times of London said today Prince Charles "once said that he thought 'about 30' was the right age for marriage. The Press Association reported the couple offered these responses when asked about their age

Lady Diana: "I've never thought about the age gap." Prince Charles: "Diana will certainly keep me young. You're only as

old as you think you are."

The palace announcement, issued through the Press Association, said: "It is with the greatest pleasure that the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh announce the betrothal of their beloved son, the Prince of Wales, to the Lady Diana Spencer, daughter of the Earl Spencer and the Honorable Mrs. Shand Kydd.'

After the wedding the woman who has been dubbed "Lady Di" by British newspapers, which have hounded her since she became Charles' girlfriend, will become Her Royal Highness, the Princess of Wales.

He said Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, the leader of the Labor opposition, Michael Foot, and the Archbishop of Canterbury were among those notified of the engagement in the past few days. The Privy Council, the monarch's official advisers, will meet to approve the marriage

Commissioners won't join Welch

Midland County Commissioner Charlie Welch took another stand Monday for his people's fight against the city and its hydrologists. Again, he was thwarted.

His stance on the city's alleged pollution of underground water and Midland Draw through its sanitary landfill and sewage treatment plant got no support from his fellow commissioners during a regular meeting in the County Courthouse.

Welch, who has been an outspoken critic of the city and a 30-year defender of the people's right to clean water. accused the city of violating its state permit by dumping effluent water into the draw. Eventually, he asserted, the contaminated water seeps into underground water channels.

"It is physically, absolutely, positively impossible for them to live under their permit," charged Welch.

The permit, issued by the Texas Department of Water Resources, does not allow the city to dump any of its primary treated effluent into the draw. That permit also allows the city

to put its sewage waters through one treatment process instead of a virtually purifying secondary - and

costly - treatment. Too, the permit allows the primary effluent to be used for agricultural purposes after it has been in aeration

Welch, who says he has been campaigning for pure underground water since 1950, asked his fellow commissioners to take action against the city and request the city to thoroughly clean up its effluent before channeling it to aeration and holding ponds and allowing it to seep into the Mid-

County Judge Bill Ahders pointed out that Midland Draw wasn't on the agenda and no action, if any, could be taken. The judge suggested that Welch get the issue on the agenda for a later meeting.

But Welch's frustration was vented on hydrologist Joe Reed, who, along with his father Ed Reed, for years have been conducting water studies for the city.

Welch accused Reed of being in collusion with the city and in trying to "cover up" past errors. These errors, Welch claimed, have contributed to

pollution of underground water, the rising water table, water seeping into landfills and into mass animal graves, and draining off and further

polluting underground water

Welch was critical of the Reed proposal for a joint Midland city-county \$53,174 study of the water table in the vicinity of the landfill and the sewagetreatment plant in southeast Midland. The study by Ed L. Reed and Associ ates Inc. would incorporate a test sampling of both sub-surface and underground water, would evaluate seepage from the sewage lagoons and would measure the flow in Midland

But Welch said the study would be an exercise in redundancy and would yield nothing new or revealing.

Reed, who maintained his composure throughout Welch's onslaught. said he needed more information to make intelligent decisions on water problems

"Until we know the causes," Reed said, "we cannot at this time suggest any solutions.

Welch charged that the hydrologist has given "terrible advice" to the city, that the only real benefit of more Reed studies would be the fee drawn tial hydrologist apart from Midland should make studies of the rising water table, alleged landfill drain-off and sewage seepage into the underground water

"I think the people in this county are entitled to a different opinion, Welch said.

"You don't need any more of this (Reed) study," Welsh lashed out at Reed. You'll just have more money.

Reed took a cautious approach to proposals that the water in Midland Draw be dammed up or used for irrigation directly from the draw

"There's some question about whether or not it (Midland Draw) is public water," Reed said.

Monahans Draw, in which the city of Odessa has the state's permission to dump secondary-treated effluent, has been deemed a navigable stream and is public water

"I think we're going to have to get some legal opinion," Reed said, "so we don't compound our liability.'

Midland City Council today was to review the Reed water table-sewage-landfill proposal at City Hall.

Coup attempt fails; Spain's legislators free

MADRID, Spain (AP) - A coup attempt by a Civil Guard officer who tried to resurrect the Franco-style dictatorship by seizing the Parliament in a burst of gunfire collapsed today 18 hours after it began. Freed government and Parliament members left the building shouting "Long Live Democracy."

Most of the 200 submachine gun-brandishing Civil Guard members who followed Lt. Col. Antonio Tejero Molina in the daring attempt to topple the Spanish government, deserted by jumping from windows of the Parliament when it became clear they had lost

Tejero Molina, a Civil Guard officer with a long record of insubordination, surrendered inside the building. He was whisked away in a black official car with a motorcycle escort after telling his followers, "I will have to pay with 30 or 40 years in prison.

The coup failed when King Juan Carlos - his government and Parliament held hostage - told the nation he had ordered the Spanish army to "restore the constitutional order" and the army proved loyal. Tejero Molina and his followers took over the Parliament Monday with bursts

of gunfire during a debate on confirming Leopoldo Calvo Sotelo as Spain's third prime minister since the Franco dictatorship ended in 1975. Madrid Radio said Tejero Molina demanded that Parliament be replaced by a military junta. There were no gunshot injuries despite the firing of hundreds of rounds by the

Civil Guard members in the assault on the building The ministers and deputies emerged one by one from their all-night ordeal in

the Parliament building. As they stepped into the bright winter sunshine, they shouted to cheering crowd of several thousand, "Long Live Freedom!" "Long Live Democracy!'

As caretaker Premier Adolfo Suarez left the building he was embraced by members of his family and the crowd.

Tejero Molina and a hard core of his guardsmen remained briefly inside the building, then gave up. One of the freed hostages quoted Tejero Molina as telling the captives just before the ordeal ended: "You can leave quietly. Nothing will happen here. The only thing that will happen is that I will have to pay with 30 or 40 years in prison

Authorities said Tejero Molina, who plotted a similar takeover more than two years ago but got only a seven-month sentence, accepted full responsibility for the latest coup attempt but insisted that all non-commissioned officers and enlisted men involved in the takeover be given a guarantee against reprisals.

The hostages were freed after military authorities announced that Tejero Molina accepted conditions for a "face saving surrender.

Tejero Molina at first demanded he be allowed to surrender in the office of the late dictator Francisco Franco. He also insisted that no army officers or press photographers be allowed to witness his surrender to fellow officers of the Guardia Civil, Spain's paramilitary federal police.

Dozens of Tejero Molina's followers jumped from ground-floor windows of the Parliament with their submachine guns strapped to their shoulders after it became clear they had no chance of winning. About 20 of the hostages - including women deputies and sick captives -

were freed early today, and the captors then began surrendering by the Tejera Molina and his followers in the Guardia Civil seized the lower house

and Spain's caretaker Cabinet, but the attempted coup seemed doomed shortly after it was launched King Juan Carlos, in a radio and TV broadcast to the nation, ordered the

Spanish army to "take all necessary measures to restore the constitutional "The crown, symbol of the permanence and unity of the nation, cannot

tolerate any kind of action or attitude of persons intending to disrupt the democratic process by force.' The 221,000-man army remained loyal to the king everywhere. Armored units

moved into Madrid during the night in apparent readiness to join hundreds of riot police surrounding the Parliament, or Cortes.

Ten military police jeeps moved into the courtyard of the building. Shortly

after dawn, four armored personnel carriers advanced on the building, followed by several busloads of national police. Madrid Radio said the operation was commanded by the director general of the Civil Guard, Lt. Gen. Aramburu Topete. Topete, Madrid's civil governor Mariano Nicolas and the army deputy chief of staff, Maj. Gen. Alfonso Armada, entered the building and talked briefly with Tejero Molina, trying to persuade him his position was hopeless and he should surrender.

Suspect in girl's death apparently tries suicide

Murder suspect Stephen Wayne Morse was under close watch at the county jail today after an apparent suicide attempt Monday night.

Jail and hospital sources said Morse, being held under \$100,000 bond for the bludgeoning death of 17-yearold Karen Rickey last Tuesday night, swallowed an overdose of tranqulizers prescribed by jail physician Dr. Pat Leung.

He was taken to Midland Memorial Hospital about 7 p.m. Monday. His stomach was pumped and he was returned to the jail.

"The hospital told us it probably would have caused nothing more than a good nap," said a jail spokesman this morning, "but there definitely Ase a quabor poudice oroznous reacts differently to drugs."

Although inmates who are on medication are watched closely to see that they actually take the drugs prescribed them, Morse apparently had been "mouthing" the pills and saving them up for a suicide try.

Morse, 19, of Vacaville, Calif., was arrested about 12:15 p.m. Wednesday, following an intensive investigation into the Rickey girl's death. Her body was discovered in a field along County Road 1110 South shortly before 8 a.m. Wednesday. She had been beaten with a rock and run over by her own car.

Investigators are still awaiting an autopsy report and grand jurors are expected to hear the case sometime

American sets Midland flights American Airlines officials today announced service to

Midland Regional Airport will begin June 11 with three

The announcement came during a news conference this morning at the airport. Jim Godsman and Andy Simpson of American Airlines made the announcement at the press conference, one of 11 being held at the same time at different cities around the country.

Godsman explained that the service will be provided on 727s and will be to Dallas-Forth Worth Regional Airport. which is the inernational headquarters for American

Flight schedule will be announced April 5 and the public can begin making reservations then. AA's rate schedule also will be announced April 5, but Simpson did say "we will be competitive."

This is the second time American Airlines will be servicing Midland. Simpson laughingly explained when the airline pulled out 20 years ago, "it was a mistake." "It took us 20 years to correct our mistake," he said.

Godsman said that American Airline is looking at the long haul future for Midland, explaining the hook-ups with Dallas Forth Worth and 85 other cities

While American Airlines used to be an east-west airline, they are now focusing on northeast-southeast routes

They have about 900 departures a day, with 200 of those going through D-FW. This includes almost hourly departures to New York City.

Godsman explained the benefits to Midland will be for business travelers "because we're on time, we're tops in baggage handling in the industry and you can pre-reserve

Col. Wilson Banks, director of aviation for the city of Midland, commented about making changes at the

airport to accommodate American Airlines. "We do have enough room to accommodate them. We'll have to arrange with the other carriers here for counter space and we do have plans to expand," Banks said.

Simpson said American's move into Midland will bring about 20 employees here. Other cities to which American will begin service include Amarillo, Austin, Corpus Christi, Lubbock, Bigmingham, Ala., Baton Rouge, La., Shreveport, La., Jack-

The mercury should drop into the low 40s tonight after reaching the high 70s today, said the weatherman. inds should blow out of the south



his name was listed in the paper. Elizondo was not available for comment later. City councilman Gene Canavan may sue El Pueblo for libel because his name was published, according

to his attorney, Jack Pytel. Editors of El Pueblo have said if they are sued for libel, they will bring out in open court the price that alleged customers paid, their sexual peferences and who recommended them, information allegedly contained on each of the index cards.



The correct decision

This week the Public Utility Commission in Austin likely will decide on a case important to both newspapers, magazines, periodicals, television and the general public.

What the case involves is a proposal by American Telephone & Telegraph to test a new electronic information service in Austin. Under the proposal Southwestern Bell, the AT&T subsidiary in Texas, plans to install free video screen computer terminals in 680 Austin homes and 80 Austin bu-

Initially the telephone company says it plans to transmit only Yellow Page-type information. But it has also said that if there proves to be a demand for the service, it will provide expanded services.

That's where the hitch comes in. By becoming a provider of expanded news services, the company could become both the carrier of information and the generator of information. That's an extremely dangerous position because inherent in it is the possibility for the manipulation of the free flow of information to the public.

Under such an arrangement AT&T would have a lock on both advertising revenue and the

transmission of information. Many newspapers could likely die under such a setup. If that happened the diversity of news and opinion which is essential to the exercise of First Amendment guarantees of a free press also would be seriously affected.

That's why the Texas Daily **Newspaper Association and many** newspapers throughout the state, including ourselves, oppose the Austin test by Southwestern Bell.

Bell applied to the PUC for permission to conduct the test and the TDNA filed a complaint against it. The PUC examiner on the case has ruled that Bell does not need the PUC's permission to conduct the test and he has recommended against a PUC hearing on the

We do not believe the test is inthe public interest. We do believe that if the PUC will agree to a hearing on the matter, evidence can be presented showing how detrimental the AT&T proposal would be to the public's right to know. The PUC has an obligation to permit such a hearing.

The issues involved here are too consequential for careless action. The PUC should see it that way,

'Tip's' simplistic plan

House Speaker Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill says President Reagan is "acting very simplistic" in proposing large spending and tax cuts to cure the nation's economic woes.

Angry at the prospect of Mr. Reagan calling for reductions in many of the speaker's favorite spending programs, O'Neill indicated that he and other Democrats are prepared to drag their feet on many of the president's proposed budget cuts.

"We're not just there to let him tear asunder the programs we've put together over the years," said O'Neill.

"Tip" tipped the Democrats' hand when he urged Mr. Reagan not to package his proposals in a single bill - or to expect fast action by Congress. O'Neill knows very well that the president's best chance of getting most of his proposed spending and tax reductions through Congress is to keep them all in one package.

Obviously, from what O'Neill says, the Democrats' strategy for undercutting Republican President Reagan's program will be to split it up into as many pieces as they can and then try to kill off the proposals one by one. It is in Mr. Reagan's interest to insist that the package be kept together and acted upon as a unit.

The crafty O'Neill also knows that time is an important factor. The president's support now is near the maximum he will have. Democrats may attempt to stall, hoping they can muster through enough special interest opposition to defeat much of the Reagan program.

This appears to be what "Tip" O'Neill has in mind. But it may be much too simplistic to succeed. Taxpayers may see right through it and put so much pressure on O'Neill and other foot-dragging Democrats that they might have a feeling akin to being on the rim of Mount St. Helens when it explod-

Nations spits on its own charter. In 1975, the PLO helped provoke a civil war in Lebanon. Some 60,000 people were killed, more than 200,000 wounded and another 1.7 million displaced. Syria, which has long wanted to annex Lebanon, invaded under the pretense of restoring peace.
Today, Lebanon lies dismembered.

Syrians continue to occupy large areas while 10,000 to 15,000 armed PLO terrorists control other areas. In Beirut, a Lebanese government in name only sits at the pleasure of the Syrians but scarcely controls even a few blocks of Beirut, if that. In the South a few thousand Lebanese nationalists under the leadership of Maj. Sa'ad Haddad hold out against the PLO's savage attacks. The only na-tion which has helped Haddad is Isra-

During the death of Lebanon, the United Nations passed not one resolution in either the General Assembly or the Security Council. Instead, in an act of moral degradation, it granted observer status to the PLO, which is nothing more than a bunch of psychopathic killers who, in addition to hundreds of innocent Israeli and Lebanese women and children, have murdered two U.S. diplomats and a number of other American citizens.

In 1978, however, the United Na-tions acted after the Israelis went into southern Lebanon to clear it of the PLO terrorists who were savaging people in Maj. Haddad's areas and raiding across the border into Israel. The Israelis must withdraw, the U.N. said, and it established a United Nations International Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL) to verify the withdrawal and to insure strict respect for the "territorial integrity, sovereignty, and political independence" of Leba-

What a joke. UNIFIL stationed itself only in southern Lebanon. No attempt was made to force the Syrians to withdraw or to disarm the PLO. In fact, the PLO quickly moved right back into positions behind UNI-FIL lines. UNIFIL officers have been caught red-handed smuggling arms and explosives for the PLO into Isra-

From UNIFIL's point of view, nothing Israel or Major Haddad's forces do is right and nothing the PLO does is wrong. I have observed the U.N. forces and frankly they are mostly drunken mercenaries with no interest in the area, the people, or their own responsibilities.

To our shame, the United States has done nothing but tacitly, at least, agree to the Syrian takeover. No one single U.S. official has met with Haddad. The press, most of which is stationed in Beirut in the PLO sector, refers to Haddad, if at all, as a rightwing Christian. In fact, while Haddad is a Christian, half the people in his area and 60 percent of his soldiers are Moslem.

Thus, the United Nations serves the Arab fanatics rather than the Lebanese people or the principles of its

We, the American taxpayers, po-vide one quarter of United Nations budget. It is a disgraceful and immoral use of public money, and we should reduce it drastically to protest the U.N.'s rape of its own charter.

Forecast predicts martial law will be imposed in Poland

By ROWLAND EVANS AND ROBERT NOVAK

WASHINGTON - The Reagan administration's sharply revised private forecast for the crisis in Poland now rules out Soviet intervention for the next six months, but predicts martial law imposed by the communist government as the next step in repressing the free workers, farmers and students movement.

That switch from recent forecasts of imminent Soviet invasion is based on intelligence reports from Eastern European sources following visits of Communist Party leader Stanislaus Kania to neighboring hard-line Czechoslovakia and East Germany and the elevation of Gen. Wojciech Jarozelski to prime minister.

Kania is believed to have assured his communist brethren in Eastern Europe that Jarozelski, who is also efense minister, would impose martial law against the free workers movement if tenuous government control collapses. Although outright Soviet intervention would unify the Western alliance, martial law as an internal Polish affair would be less of an issue for Reagan to use against the Kremlin.

REHABILITATING NIXON

The Reagan administration's quiet ehabilitation of Richard M. Nixon ontinued last week when a senior White House aide was dispatched to brief the former president on the new

economic program. The duty was assigned to Dr. Martin Anderson, President Reagan's domestic policy chief who was a junior



White House aide during Nixon's first term. Anderson went to Nixon's Man-hattan apartment Tuesday to give him a 24-hour advance peek at Reagan's tax-budget plans.

A footnote: Although the Reagan

tax plan is diametrically opposite to Nixon administration policy, old Nixon economic policy-makers, Arthur Burns, George Schultz, Herbert Stein and Charls Walker were brought in to advise Reagan on the final stages. Even White House aides were surprised to see Stein, who has been publicly hostile to Reagan's economic views, at the Feb. 10 Blair House luncheon for the outside ad-

AN EXTRA BATTLESHIP Secretary of the Navy John Leh-man has sold Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger on demothballing not one but two giant World War II battleships, the largest ships of their

kind in the world. The New Jersey long was slated for return to ocean duty, but Lehman also will put the Iowa back in working order. Apart from their big military wallop, both are seen as valuable political weapons. Showing the flag from one of these dreadnaughts in the Caribbean would send a powerful political message to Cuba and Nicaragua. Duty in the Caribbean, the new focus of Soviet imperialism, is be-lieved likely for one of the battle-

In the longer run, the Navy hopes to equip both vessels with mediumrange cruise missiles capable of bombarding shore installations from the safety of the deep seas. Non-nuclear warheads are envisioned.

BAKER AND THE RIGHT







DR. NEIL SOLOMON Diabetes can

increase risk

Dear Dr. Solomon: My father will be entering the hospital soon for a hernia operation. He also has dia-betes and has been taking insulin for a number of years. To what extent does the diabetes complicate the surgery and influence his chances for a suc-

cessful recovery? — Paul

Dear Paul: As you imply in your
letter, diabetics may be at greater
risk during surgery because of their
increased possibility of infection, complications involving the cardiova-scular system, and delayed healing. On the other hand, one should not lose sight of the fact that the use of insulin and better management have reduced the incidence of operative deaths in diabetics from more than 50 percent in the 1930s to less than four percent today. The most common cause of death in diabetic patients undergoing surgery is acute myoca-dial infarction.

Dr. Richard L. Byyny, of the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center in Denver, says that the key to successful surgery is control of the diabetes. Patients scheduled for elective surgery can be admitted to the hospital a day or two before the operation. During this period, the patient's diet and insulin dosage can be adjusted so that the diabetes can be brought under the best control pos-


If the surgery must be performed on an emergency basis, the aim is to control the patient's diabetes to the extent that time permits. Not surprisingly, infections are more common in

patients undergoing emergency pro-cedures than elective ones. While it would be false optimism to suggest that patients with diabetes who undergo surgery face no greater risk than nondiabetic surgical patients, there is ample evidence that where glucose levels are controlled, may of the problems associated with diabetes can be preventd.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I have heard that all the publicity about the link between lung cancer and cigarettes hasn't been very effective in getting people to stop smoking. Do you have any figures to support or disprove this? Also, how much money is actually being spent on the so-called war on cancer? — Phil

Dear Phil: Despite the well-publicized association between cigarette smoking and lung cancer, many people continue to disregard all warnings. One result is that the number of deaths from lung cancer in the United States is expected to exceed 100,000 a year. During the past 10 years the death rate has risen by 50 percent in men, and by 260 pecent in women. Unfortunately, although cigarette smoking continues to be the most important cause of lung cancer, the incidence of the disease is rising among nonsmokers as well as among





Bolger fighting 'Zap the ZIP' drive

WASHINGTON (AP) — With scores of senators, already determined to "Zap the ZIP," Postmaster General William F. Bolger is facing an uphill battle in his effort to extend ZIP codes to nine digits.

Sen. Roger Jepsen, R-Iowa, announced Monday

that 63 senators support a bill he and Sen. Dave Durenberger, R-Minn., have introduced to kill the plan to lengthen the current five-digit code. "People simply do not want a nine-digit ZIP code,"

Jepsen said. Durenberger called the proposal "a numerical

nightmare. Bolger was called before a Government Affairs subcommittee today to defend his plan. Several opponents also were called.

The Postal Service had planned to start the nine-digit proposal this month, but postponed it until June 1 after congressional opposition. The Senate voted unanimously to order a delay late last year, but the amendment was dropped in the final version of the

The Postal Service says the longer code would lead to greater efficiency and reduce the need for future rate increases. "All of us would prefer not to have so many numbers in our lives," Bolger acknowledged, but he said the ZIP code extension would lead to

more modern mail-sorting.

Bolger said use of the nine-digit codes would not be required and that the plan is mainly for businesses.

Sheets make shower curtains

Did you ever price those beautiful shower curtains and go away empty-handed? Don't despair - get the same effect with a twin-size flat sheet.

The store-bought decorator curtains measure six feet by six feet, so all you need to do to the flat sheet is cut some of the length off. To determine how much, place the existing hem

either close to the floor or at the top of the rod, then m the other end to get a six-foot finished length. Now, buy a plastic liner, either a transparent one or in a matching color. Lay the top of the liner over the top of the sheet and mark the eyelets to match,

then make buttonholes for the curtain's hooks. When you hang up your curtain, the liner hangs on the inside of the tub and the sheet hangs on the

You can even buy an extra sheet and make matching window curtains or other accessories, perhaps a decorative trim on guest towels.

With the money saved, buy one of those plastic curtain rod covers and matching hooks for a finishing touch. - Diane Lagow



MC nabs first-ever WJCC title

Midland College made it official Monday night when the Chaparrals dazzled the Odessa College Wranglers with their fancy footwork then befuddled them with their rebounding and thieving defense for a 96-80 victory before a homecoming crowd of close to 3,000 at Chaparral Center.

It gave MC a 27-2 record for the season and 11th straight win, but most important it gave the Chaps something for their trophy case, a first-ever Western Junior College Conference basketball title. The Chaps take a two-game lead into Thursday's final game against Western Texas College in Snyder.

THE ONLY thing wrong with the Chaps' superb all-around performance was 6-6 Charles Johnson. "He asked me not to start him in the second half because his chest was hurting," Coach Jerry Stone said. "He never asked anything like before, so I know he must have been hurting. You can bet we're going to have him at the doctor's office in the morn-

You'd never have guessed Johnson was ailing from his performance. He played only 25 minutes, but still had 14 points, but his floor game was what impressed most. As MC moved to an early 13-8 lead, three Johnson defensive rebounds led to fast break baskets. A Johnson backcourt steal led to a court-length solo and resounding dunk by the former Midland High star and with it a free throw, which he calmly converted.

OC hung tough, rallying to lead 16-15, then trailing 22-16 as Scotty Tutwiler hit a 15-footer, Kevin Willingham took a Virgil Slay feed for a three-point play and then Puntus Wilson hit from the lane.

OC FOUGHT back to tie at 24, before the Chaps took charge with a 13-point unanswered spree in which Johnson, Slay and Wilson all contributed two baskets apiece.

It was 39-30 at half and even without Johnson for the first 10 minutes of the second half, the Chaps built up a 66-46 lead. MC led 52-42 and then broke away when Lance McCain set up Ernie Tate off a steal, Wilson and Willingham made swipes that led to Bobby Thompson baskets and Thompson made a couple of thefts for goals by Wilson and Willingham.

OC's Sterling Williams was the game's high scorer with 25 and, after a slow start, Craig Ehlo scored 22, but they were no match for MC's overall fire power. Wilson scored 24, Johnson 14, Tate 13, Slay 12 and McCain 10.

'We could have suffered a letdown after last week," said Stone referring to road games with Howard and Frank Phillips, the top contenders for the title, "but we didn't. It's this one Thursday night I'm worried about. It would be a shame to spoil it by losing there and it could happen."

Midland has never beaten Western

Scouts have called the 1980-81 crop of freshmen college basketball players one the least spectacular of the decade, a "famine after the feast," if you will. So, if college teams gorged them-

selves on the harvest of 1979-80, they are ready for food stamps this year.

THREE years ago, Sports Illustrated dubbed 10 players — a group that included Magic Johnson, Kelly Tripucka, Albert King, Jeff Lamp and Danny Ainge — the "Super Sophs" after a super freshman year.

Next year's sophomores might be called the "Secret Sophs." For the most part, only the most dedicated will have heard of them. Their statistics have been much

less impressive than their freshmen predecessors, and college coaches are shaking their heads, wondering if the 1981-82 high school senior class will produce a few more stars. Even when a clear trend develops.

SAM PERKINS, North Carolina: Since Pete Budko was injured, Perkins has switched from super-sub to starting center. This 6-9 freshman from Latham, N.Y., probably has as much potential as any of this crop.

Perkins has a 47-inch reach, and he rebounds like a 7-footer. He leads the Tar Heels in boards with an average of 7.36 a game, and he scores at a clip of nearly 15 a game, second on the team to Al Wood's 18. Perkins also is a 75 percent free throw shooter.



Oregon State, 23-0 and the only major unbeaten college team, collected 54 of 60 first-place votes and 1,193 of a possible 1,200 points in the nationwide balloting by a panel of sports writers and broadcasters. The Beavers, No.2 last week, were replaced in the No.1 slot by Virginia three weeks ago after holding the top spot alone for two weeks and sharing it with the Cavaliers another week. LSU, which now holds the nation's

longest major winning streak at 25, jumped two notches in taking over the No.2 position. The Tigers, 26-1, garnered four first-place votes and 1,087 points in edging both Virginia and DePaul, which dropped a notch to VIRGINIA, which saw its 28-game

winning streak shattered by Notre Dame, 57-56, last Sunday, was tabbed No.1 by one voter and picked up 1,079 points. DePaul, which raised its record to 24-1 with an 89-64 victory over Butler Monday night, was five points farther back and had the final firstplace vote.

AP Sports Writer NEW YORK (AP) — Franklin Jacobs is looking for respect. The way he thinks he can get it is with a "Bob Beamon" kind of jump. Jacobs was once the nation's pre-

mier high-jumper. Of late, he's been just another name in the list below the winner. He says pain in his problem knees - "maybe tendinitis, maybe worse, I don't know" - and a lack of personal incentive has short-circuited his performances in the past year or so. He was a mediocre second in Philadelphia and third at the Millrose Games, then pulled out of the Ottawa Citizens Games last week But he says he feels fit and the

juices are flowing again as he pre-pares for Friday night's USA-Mobil

Indoor Track and Field Championships at Madison Square Garden.

And what he's hoping to do (if not Friday night then sometime soon) is to do vertically what Beamon did horizontally — namely to achieve a leap of astounding proportions, setting a record which won't soon be broken.

Beamon did it in the 1968 Summer Olympics with a long jump of 29 feet, 21/2 inches, a record which eclipsed the world record by almost two feet, a record which still stands. Jacobs' world-record high jump of

7-71/4 in 1978 (and still the best indoors) wasn't as momentous, nor has it withstood challenges. The current outdoor mark is 7-8% by Gerd Wessig, an East German who, at 21, is a year younger than Jacobs.

Money recovery effort jeapordized

By WILLIAM KRONHOLM

WASHINGTON (AP) - Government efforts to recover some \$7.5 billion in alleged oil company overcharges are jeopardized by President Reagan's proposal to trim \$40 million from the Energy Department budget, a former department lawyer says.

Paul Bloom, the department's special counsel during the Carter administration, told a House subcommittee Monday the budget action signals the oil companies that they needn't bother negotiating settlements with the government.

"The moment it becomes clear that the government will not devote the resources needed, there ceases to be any cost-effective reason for them to talk about settlement," Bloom said of the companies.

Bloom became famous earlier this month with the revelation that he had given \$4 million in settlement money to four national charities on his last full day in office.

The charities agreed to distribute the money to poor people having trouble paying their heating bills. The Reagan administration is trying to

Bloom told the subcommittee the action was not "casual philanthropy," but an equitable and efficient way of returning the money to people who had been overcharged.

"I certainly was not trying to be a Robin Hood," Bloom said. "They (low-income heating oil customers) are simply a part of the heating oil economy.

In his testimony Monday before the House Government Operations subcommittee on environment, energy and natural resources, Bloom said he was more concerned about the Reagan administration's effort to trim the budget of his former office from \$52 million to \$12 million.

Bloom said the budget cut would end any effort to recover some \$7.5 billion in alleged oil company overcharges through legal actions still pending.

Bloom said oil companies, concerned that they might be hit by enormous court judgments against them, have been eager to reach outof-court settlements. The oil companies have been willing to pay 60 cents on the dollar or more to have complaints against them dropped, saving both the oil companies and the government the cost of years of court

But the pressure to reach such a settlement disappears if the oil companies can assume that budget-cutting will wipe out the government office responsible for prosecuting the claims, he said.

The former special counsel said two companies - unnamed by Bloom, but described as "among the largest" already have reneged on "handshake" settlements that would have forced them to pay millions of dollars to customers they have overcharged in the past.

During the three years Bloom served as special counsel, he reached settlements with oil companies that brought in some \$550 million.

He left office with the Carter administration, leaving behind pending cases totalling \$7.5 billion in alleged overcharges by Exxon, Gulf, Arco, Shell, Mobil, Texaco, Conoco and

Not all that would be recovered in out-of-court settlements, Bloom said. But he estimated the cases would yield at least \$2 billion for overcharged consumers if they were pursued by the Reagan administration.

"It could be substantially higher," Bloom said. "But I would be very surprised if it were not at least that much."

Bloom said it would be virtually impossible for either the Justice Department or private lawyers to pursue the cases if the Office of the Special Counsel is abolished.

One brother is found guilty, one acquitted in torture-robbery case

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Defense lawyers today were plotting appeals of "the weirdest thing" they'd ever seen: a guilty verdict for one rancher but an acquittal for his brother in their third trial in the robbery-torture of three illegal Mexican aliens.

Patrick Hanigan, 27, was found guilty Monday by one federal jury, while Thomas Hanigan, 23, was acquitted by another panel on three counts each of robbery affecting commerce.

"The evidence was almost exactly the same," said defense lawyer Alex Gaynes, who represented the younger Hanigan. "It's just...the weirdest thing I

Meanwhile, the groups whose lobbying and research convinced government lawyers to seek feder-al charges under the Hobbs Act against the Hanigans called the verdicts "half-justice." The case, nevertheless, underscored their conten-

tion that illegal aliens have certain rights, and that the Hobbs Act could be used to protect them, they

"The Hobbs Act means the undocumented worker has a tool to fight back," said Urcinio Salaiz, a spokesman for the National Coalition on the Hanigan Case, which held courthouse vigils throughout the deliberations.

The Justice Department had agreed to pursue the case if it could find an applicable statute, and Hispanic students at Antioch University's law school in Washington, D.C., suggested the Hobbs Act and four other possibilities after a year-long research project.

But "half-justice is still no justice," argued Tony Bustamante, a Douglas native who launched the research project. "It's incomplete justice."

The Hanigans had been charged in connection with an Aug. 18, 1976, incident in which three Mexicans, who were crossing the Hanigan ranch in Douglas seeking work, claimed they were bound, stripped, robbed, tortured and shot at as they were forced to flee toward Mexico.

The brothers were acquitted of state charges in the incident, and their first federal trial ended in a

This trial, unlike the earlier ones, featured separate juries and new evidence from Patrick Hanigan's ex-wife and a waitress.

One appeal, filed even before the juries reached their decisions, disputed U.S. District Judge Richard Bilby's determination that robbery affecting commerce includes robbery affecting the movement of undocumented laborers across the border.
