### Reagan's budget team seeks savings

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration vowed Friday to cut deeper into "the entire spectrum" of federal spending as a new government report showed the economy still weakening from the strain of high inflation and

Budget Director David A. Stockman refused to divulge any of the new budget-trimming areas, but told reporters that few programs would be spared. "We have reviewed every agency from the Veterans Administration to NASA,"

But even as the president's budget team sought new savings, opposition stiffened from organized labor and other groups on the cutbacks already

The United Mine Workers called for a two-day nationwide strike in March to protest proposed slashes in benefits for miners disabled by black lung disease. Meanwhile, a coalition of 157 labor, civil rights and consumer groups announced plans to lobby against the Reagan plan in Congress.

More than 100 programs which were not named in the list of 1982 budget reductions President Reagan proposed to Congress last week will be slashed in the new round, sources said.

tion plans to cut the supplemental nutrition program for low-income women, children and infants, known as WIC, by 30 percent, or about \$300 million from the \$1 billion proposed by the Carter administration.

Other new targets, it was learned, include the Veterans administration, farm price support programs, the Job Corps and other employment training, and nuclear energy projects.

Meanwhile, a government indicator of future economic activity pointed downward in January for a second consecutive month, suggesting the economy will be slowing in the months ahead.

The Commerce Department said its Index of Leading Indicators fell 0.4 percent in January, after declining 0.9 percent in December. The index had registered a gain for six months in a row prior to December's drop. Although the latest decline pointed to sluggishness, government economists said the index did not mean that the country was headed for another

recession. The economy has recovered from the recession of a year ago faster than had been expected, growing at a healthy 5 percent annual rate in the fourth quarter

Congressional sources — who asked not to be named — said the administra- of 1980. Most economists predict a significant slowdown from that growth rate in

President Reagan contends his package of spending and tax cuts, together with a slowdown in the growth of the nation's money supply, will reduce inflation and restore strong growth in 1982.

In his address to Congress on Feb. 18, Reagan urged that the budget for fiscal 1982, which begins in October, be trimmed by \$41.4 billion. At the time, however, he identified only 83 specific program cuts totaling \$34.7 billion. He promised to detail the other \$6.7 billion when a completed budget plan is submitted to Congress on March 10.

This week, however, Reagan ordered up to \$6 billion in additional budget cuts after learning that projected federal spending is running higher than his budget experts had estimated. Reagan called for the new cuts so he could limit his proposed spending plan to \$696 billion.

At a briefing for reporters, Stockman declared that "We have reviewed every agency from the Veterans Administration to NASA (the National Aeronautics and Space Administration), and there will be cuts across the entire spec-

### Panel draws up new compromise on Midland Draw

Its future nebulous in the morning hours, a joint city-county study of Midland Draw and related water problems was back on track Friday night after Midland County unofficially resolved its problem with approving the study.

Meanwhile, a county commissioner spent the day "rigging up a pump" as an alternative temporary solution to water in the draw flooding farmers' land, and a councilman warned the city may not be so anxious to proceed with immediate relief for county resi-

Friday began as a dismal day for the county commissioners and the council after discovering Thursday afternoon that a temporary solution which had bubbled up from a twohour debate on Thursday morning to provide relief for county residents living alongside the draw had drowned in objections of those same residents by that afternoon.

THE PROBLEM IS that the county had tied its approval of a six-month study by Joe Reed and Associates, a local hydrology firm, to immediate implementation of a temporary solu-

But County Judge William Ahders announced Friday night he had obtained permission from three commissioners for the county to proceed with paying its share of the \$53,000 study. That portion will be \$20,207 and will center on evalution of seepage from the city's sewage holding

The city, in approving the study on Thursday during the joint city-county meeting, had put no conditions on its approval. Its \$32,967 will pay for Reed and Associates to prepare a detailed water table map in the vicinity of the landfill and sewage treatment plant

which are southeast of the city. They would incorporate that data into a regional water table map, and also would sample water quality of ground

water and surface water in the area. Ahders said Durward Wright, Win Brown and C. Dewayne Davis told him on the telephone they would approve formally in a County Commissioners March 9 meeting proceeding with the study, despite the failure of temporary measures.

Those temporary measures involved the county digging a ditch in the middle of Midland Draw while the city would clean up its sewage water in a secondary treatment process before sending it through that ditch. Residents living along the draw could install pumps and use the treated water from the ditch for irrigating their land

THE RESIDENTS OPPOSED the idea. And without their approval, the city and county couldn't fish a temporary permit out of the Texas Water Resources Board to allow institution

Source of the controversy between the residents and elected officials is a combination of the unnatural phenomenon of water flowing in Midland Draw, a rising water table that is surfacing in the city and too much effluent at the sewage treatment plant. It is this effluent which county residents maintain is flowing in the draw, thus contaminating the ground water, which is what county residents

After hearing of the breakdown in a settlement, Mayor G. Thane Akins remarked early Friday that as far as the city was concerned, "the study is on and we shouldn't delay with it."

He explained that the temporary proposal would have been easy to implement.

### Murder-for-hire suspect testifies in own defense

Rex Shanks, testifying in his own defense in a murder-for-hire trial in which his co-defendants portrayed him as the drunken and hapless leader of the death plot, testified in 142nd State District Court on Friday that he had stabbed the victim, James David McPeters, in trying to protect himself, McPeter's estranged wife and her 31/2-year-old son, D.J., on the night of July 28.

Shanks' testimony was in marked contrast with that of his co-defendants and former traveling companions who testified that Shanks was the moving force behind McPeters' death near the Warfield Truck Stop between Midland and Odessa on that Sunday

"I had been on booze for several days," Shanks said in his own de-

Co-defendant Willie Wayne Jennings, 20, of Wichita Falls, testified that Shanks and the victim's estranged wife, Patricia "Patty" McPeters, 27, had promised him \$7. 000 to help kill McPeters. The money was to come from McPeters' life insurance policies.

Another co-defendant, Mrs. McPeters, had testified in her murder trial last December that Shanks coerced her into helping him set up her husband for the kill. A jury found her guilty of murder, sentenced her to 50 years in prison, and fined her

And Jennings' wife, Tammy, 22, who witnessed the events leading up to McPeters' death, testified that-Patty McPeters and Shanks had offered her husband \$8,000 to kill McPeters. But Mrs. Jennings, who has been granted immunity in exchange for her testimony, testified that she thought talk of killing McPeters was just flippant, idle conversation and did not take it seriously until moments before Shanks' allegedy assaulted on McPeters with a

butcher knife.

SHANKS, HOWEVER, said there was no plot to kill McPeters, 46, and that there was no talk of any life insurance proceeds. Other testimony indicated that McPeters, plant superintendent for Delta Solvents & Chemicals Co. of Odessa, had \$39,000 in life insurance.

Testimony in the week-long trial ended late Friday afternoon, and attorneys will make closing arguments Monday in leading up to the jury's deliberation in the verdict phase of

Shanks, who admitted to being a heavy imbiber of beer and whiskey,

maintained that he "stayed intoxicated" and that he and his friend Jennings were drinking all the way from Wichita Falls to Odessa on the weekend of McPeters' death, which was unplanned, he said.

"I DRANK A LOT," Shanks said. "Right now, I could probably drink two beers and be intoxicated."

He has been held in the Midland County Jail since July 30 and has been deprived of alcohol, cigarettes and brewed coffee. He indicated that he would never drink again.

"I stayed intoxicated," he said in cross-examination by Prosecutor, David Joers. "Before then, sir, I"

stayed intoxicated."

Shanks, an oilfield worker who said he earned up to \$60,000 a year in North Africa, said that he had renewed his friendship with Mrs. McPeters, a former high school friend, in an Abilene bar in mid-July 1980. He said he and the woman, who was unhappy in her marriage, later started cohabitating. With them was her and McPeter's son, D.J. for David James.

Shanks said that he and Mrs. McPeters and D.J. had driven from Abilene to Wichita Falls on July 26 to visit his friend, Jennings. Later, he said he and Patty McPeters, D.J., and Jennings and his then common-law

### Most Americans support tough talk on Soviets

NEW YORK (AP) - Ronald Reagan's tough talk on dealing with the Soviet Union is supported by nearly three-fourths of his fellow Americans. while only 5 percent think the president is being too harsh, according to an Associated Press-NBC News poll.

The public remains convinced that the United States trails the Soviet Union in military strength. And they want to see that situation changed, strongly backing Reagan's plans for

big increases in defense spending. Despite the general approval of Reagan's stance, about a third of the public is worried that the president may get the nation into war, a fear that Jimmy Carter played upon frequently during the presidential cam-

paign last fall. In the opening weeks of his administration, Reagan and other U.S. officials have publicly taken tough line on the Soviets. Reagan, for example, has said repeatedly that any negotiations between the two countries would have to deal with all issues, from nuclear arms to the situation in El Salvador

And Reagan's stance is just fine with most Americans.

Seventy-two percent of those interviewed said Reagan has set the right tone with the Soviets. Eleven percent said he has not been tough enough and 5 percent said he has been too tough. Twelve percent of the 1,597 adults interviewed by telephone nationwide Monday and Tuesday were not sure.

By contrast, in the AP-NBC News poll in late January 1980, only 37 percent said then-President Carter was setting the right tone in his dealings with the Soviets, while 56 percent said he was not tough enough.

Scores of people — some dressed only in under-wear — were forced to flee into the night as the flames swept through the 106-room Executive Inn Motel. Six of the injured were firemen. "I just went to bed, and I heard a bunch of glass break and also heard some kids running," said one

sleep.' The guy said, 'Hey, there's a fire on the second floor, and we'd like for you to get out.' I put my clothes on and got out after I saw smoke."

Others among the 136 registered guests told authorities they heard firecrackers exploding, but firemen were unable to confirm that report. The cause of the blaze, which erupted shortly before 1 a.m., was

not immediately determined.

The dead were identified as Cheryl Martz, 12, and Dale Darnell, 15, both of Durant, Iowa. They were in town for the wrestling tournament.

Firemen said when they arrived on the scene they found people waiting to be rescued on second-story balconies. Some occupants already had jumped to the ground, and others slid down ropes made of

McGinnis said he threw some of his clothing over the railing of the balcony of his second-floor room.


"Some of the girls didn't get out with their clothing," McGinnis said. "All they had on was their

West Des Moines Fire Chief Randy Bracken said the fire spread rapidly, fanned by night winds as occupants opened doors to the outside in their attempts to escape.

'We had to fight the fire in the hallways," Bracken said, noting that every room had a hallway door and a sliding glass balcony door. "Every room had two exits. I don't know why we had what we had here."
Authorities said the bodies of the two victims were

found in a second-floor bathroom in a different room from the one in which they were registered. Firemen said they may have been trying to escape but ducked into another room when they encountered dense smoke in the hallway.

Authorities said the fire broke out at the southwest end of the motel. It was spotted at 12:58 a.m. by a police officer on routine patrol who turned in the



### 30 La Vernia residents reveal sighting triangular UFO Sunday

LA VERNIA, Texas (AP) - At least 30 residents of this community 20 miles east of San Antonio say they spotted a triangular-shaped UFO hovering in the area at the same time television sets and telephones were disrupted and a false fire alarm was set off.

The incident happened between 10 and 10:30 p.m. last Sunday but the witnesses said in interviews published Friday by the San Antonio News that the sightings were not reported earlier because of fear of embarrassment.

The witnesses said they kept silent until they began comparing notes Wednesday and Thursday and discovered many other residents made simi-

'We're used to seeing aircraft. But, what we saw that night was some-thing we've never seen before," said Vernon Ramzinski, one of three men who have hunted raccoons together near La Vernia for 20 years. Ramzinski, Anthony Kotzur and

Karl Thompson told the newspaper they had just released their dogs when they saw a strange object moving toward them. 'It looked like two eyes at first,"

Kotzur said. "There were two lights, like street lights. They weren't blinding. They kind of glowed.

When it got on top of us, it was about the size of an eight-room house. The strange thing was it just made a humming sound. I flashed an SOS at the thing with our flashlight, but it didn't respond," Ramzinski said.

### Visiting prime minister believes citizens must live within means

WASHINGTON (AP) - British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher said Friday the United States and Great Britain will survive their eco-nomic woes only if their citizens learn to live within their means at a time when prosperity is suffering from prior government intervention.

"We have to persuade our peoples to match their expectations to a world in which growth is likely to be slower than in the early 1970s, and increases in living standards have to be hardearned," Mrs. Thatcher said.
"In public expenditure and in the

running of private industry the coat must match the cloth," she declared.

Mrs. Thatcher made her remarks in a foreign policy address after receiving an honorary doctorate degree at Georgetown University.

A handful of demonstrators gathered outside the campus carrying placards and shouting slogans protesting British policy in Northern Ireland. But there were no incidents.

The award came on the second day of her four-day visit to the United States. She planned to receive President Reagan at the British Embassy Friday night, reciprocating for a din-ner at the White House the previous

Meanwhile, a White House spokesman said Friday the president would meet with Mrs. Thatcher on Saturday morning. Deputy press secretary Larry Speakes said the second meeting was expected to last about 30

During her visit, Mrs. Thatcher has underscored the same conservative economic philosophy that guides President Reagan's attempt to resolve U.S. economic problems. Mrs. Thatcher said the same illness people trying to live beyond their means -- is responsible for high inflation, unemployment, and sluggish economic growth in both nations.

A related fault has been the grow-ing involvement of the government in the economy and people's lives, she said, adding that this must end.

She said economic freedom is one of the pillars for a free society and "is the foundation upon which the unparalleled prosperity of the West is

But she said the freedom for free enterprise has been eroded in both nations because "for many years the state has intervened more and more to limit or even to direct the behavior of both individuals and corpora-

While she said the motives for such regulation usually are well-meaning, "such intervention in the end gives rise to consequences which are neither free nor fair."

She said, "The role of government in a free society should that people can go about their busi-ness freely and without fear and to protect the weak and those in need. But both in Britain and also in the United States the reach of government has far exceeded this limited

She said, "Governments in both our countries have pursued policies of extensive and detailed intervention far beyond those one would expect to find in a free society."

She said her Conservative Party government is taking steps to free up business in Great Britain, including the British aerospace and telecom-

culties," especially at a time of world recession and rising unemployment. - Persuading the population to ad-Progress, however, is being made, just their expectations to slower eco-

### County ready to fund its share of study on draw

coming from the engineering firm of Black and Veatch. In 1969, the firm had submitted such a proposal for getting rid of the city's treated effluent. But county residents opposed the idea of it flowing down the draw, and permission for the deed was denied by

BEFORE MANEUVERING the plan into action again, Ahders had said early Friday that "It was like the meeting (Thursday) didn't happen. 'We have to come up with some-

thing. The study is absolutely necessary. The group doing it (Ed Reed and his son, Joe Reed) are professional people. Everyone tells me they are outstanding hydrologists. I don't have the expertise to know what to do immediately.

While Ahders was on the telephone Friday, County Commissioner Charlie Welch was on County Road 1140 South working with city personnel "to rig up a pump.

This, he said, will allow him to pick up the water flowing down the draw and put it in his sprinkler system. "I'll make use of it instead of letting it destroy those trees," he said, referring to pecan trees of Jon Whisler on County Road 1130 South which the draw has flooded.

In the Thursday joint meeting, Welch had claimed that the landowners would be in favor of his temporary plan involving the ditch. But on Friday night, he explained the landowners objected to the idea on the basis of

the open ditch. "It would be contributing more to the pollution problem. And with an open ditch, the water could still sink

into the ground," he said. The landowners wouldn't have been as opposed if the water was to be

pumped in a pipeline, he added. Ben Golladay, a farmer on whose land the ditch was to terminate, was

vehemently opposed to the temporary plan. That water, he claimed, would be nothing more than a cesspool in the front yard of all the landowners.

GOLLADAY SAID he had "plenty of water" for his land and didn't need the secondary treated effluent.

There also was another reason he objected to the plan, and that relates to a small natural wildlife area on his land farther south, but still in the draw. These "thousands of trees" ap pear like a small forest in the middle of a desert, and Golladay lets various groups use the land. Recently, a Boy Scout troop camped out there, he said. And the longtime Midland farmer retains the natural habitat for wildlife. Among the wildlife he's seen in that miniature forest over the years have been a mountain lion, coyotes and armadillos

"I've kept this the way the Master made it, and I'm going to fight like a so-and-so to keep it," he warned.

If a ditch is dug into the draw. Golladay explained farmers with wheel irrigation systems would be hindered because the pipes couldn't roll over the ditch to irrigate land or the other side. And he pointed to the numerous active oil wells located in the draw that would be affected by a flowing draw.

How fast another immediate solution is sought for those county residents may depend upon the people who are demanding action, according to one city council member.

After hearing of the residents' objections to Welch's proposal on Thursday, Tom Sloan said, "It's a crying shame. We've worked hard to accomplish this thing."

AND BECAUSE OF some shenanigans he claimed these residents pulled in two meetings this week, Sloan said the City Council "will take a business-like attitude. We lost our sympathy with this group. I'll continue to work on this problem, but only because of my obligation as a city councilman. I've really sincerely tried to help these people. And all they're doing is batting you about the

head and shoulders."
Sloan's source of irritation comes from what he described as an agreement of these county residents to support the joint city-county longrange study by Reed and Associates.

"I went into that meeting (Thursday) expecting these people to support this course. At the last joint meeting (Feb. 12) they agreed with the proposal," said Sloan.

He figures someone talked to these people and caused them to change their story by the Thursday meeting. "They tried to force the city and county into immediate action," he

THE COUNCILMAN agreed the city needs to find a solution to the primary treated effluent overflowing in the holding ponds into the draw. But he also charged that a county

road is blockading the draw, damming its natural flow. And the county residents' turnabout on the longterm study and the immediate proposal "just cooled everyone's (city and county officials)

enthusiasm," he added. Golladay, however, said he believes the City Council is sincere in its efforts to eliminate the problem with effluent spilling into the draw. "They want to solve the problem, but they don't know how to.

Speer replied that Amarillo has increased its tourist business 14 percent in the past year. "It seems gasoline won't be the biggest problem." In-stead, the heat wave last summer served as the biggest deterrent to tourism.

Directors of the new organization talked about putting package tours together through travel agencies in attracting outsiders to West Texas.

Theme of the program will be "West Texas — The Last Frontier." This theme was selected "to incorporate the authentic heritage of the West Texas area in a popular, salable form," according to Steely.

Included in the list of already existing attractions are Buffalo Gap at Abilene, the Big Bend area, Palo Duro Canyon near Amarillo and a restored brothel at San Angelo.

Purpose of this organization, explained Ms. Reeder, "is to educate people. A lot of people travel to Texas and aren't aware these things are here. We need to make them aware so they'll stay and take advantage." Membership in the travel council

will fall in three categories: regular membership for convention bureaus. chambers of commerce and travel associations; associate memberships for organizations and facilities such as hotels, motels and restaurants; and individual memberships for those who want to support the promotion of West Texas tourism and be apprised of the council's programs and projects.

Cities represented in the council include Midland, Odessa, Abilene, Alpine, Amarillo, Big Spring, El Paso, Fort Stockton and San Angelo.

wife, Tammy Karlic, drove to Odessa by way of Abilene.

SHANKS TESTIFIED that he broke into McPeters' Odessa house to get Patty McPeters' clothes, a suitcase, and a checkbook. Mrs. McPeters' key to the door lock would not fit, as McPeters apparently had changed the locks after his wife had left

Later, he testified, Patty McPeters telephoned her husband and asked

that he meet her between Midland and Odessa on the night of July 28 for Mrs. McPeters to get some child-support money from her husband. Co-defendants Jennings and Mrs. McPeters and witness Mrs. Jennings said the plan was to ambush McPeters and to kill him.

Shanks said he and the Jennings couple, who were ceremonially married Sept. 12 in the Midland County Courthouse, were waiting out of sight, while McPeters and his wife talked.

But Shanks said McPeters, whom he understood to be violent, had

shoved his wife. And Shanks, apparently angered over the treatment of Mrs. McPeters, rushed from behind a bush and toward McPeters. Shanks said he spotted what he thought was a knife in McPeters'

hand and promptly grabbed a butcher knife from the floorboard of Mrs. McPeters' car and confronted McPeters. Shanks said McPeters cut him

"The man had stabbed me in the

ear," Shanks said, "and I was trying to protect myself, Patty and D.J.

He said he fell in pain, dropped the butcher knife, picked it up, and "stuck" its blade in McPeters' "gut." Shanks said the knife slipped in his hand and cut it, even as the blade plunged into the man's abdomen. Thereupon, Shanks said he cried for

help.
"I believe I said, "Wayne, get him!

He said Jennings came to his rescue, got into a fight with McPeters, and the foursome, plus the child, then got in the car and left the mortally wounded McPeters behind.

TWO DAYS LATERS, both Shanks and Mrs. McPeters were arrested in Abilene. Jennings, a roofer, was arrested in Wichita Falls.

On Friday, Prosecutor Joers questioned Shanks on the discrepancies between his testimony before the jury and his two statements given to Texas Ranger David Byrnes on July 30. In his statements, Shanks reportedly told Byrnes that he yelled for Jennings to "cut" McPeters rather than "get" him.

But Shanks said he was still in a drunken state when he gave the state-

"I don't think I was in any condition to tell anybody anything," he said. His defense attorney, Michael McLeaish, contended that his client was not properly apprised of his rights and moved for suppression of the confessions. Presiding Judge Pat Baskins overruled the motions.

The Texas Ranger said he either read or recited the Miranda warning - rights - to Shanks.

"He (Shanks) just nodded," Byrnes

McLeaish, in one of his many objections, said Shanks was not properly warned. 'There was no knowledgeable, in-

telligent, waiver of the defendant's rights," McLeaish said. "...He was drunk and (was) suffering mental defects of delirium tremens ('D.T.s' for alcohol poisoning).'

Another witness, Jail Capt. Richard Sexton, testified that initially Shanks was incoherent and disoriented in his first few days in jail.

"(Shanks was) very incoherent, didn't understand what was going on...seeing things.

Later in August, though, after Shanks had been examined by psychiatrist Dr. Bill Youngblood, Shanks' demeanor changed.

"My opinion was that it (Shanks' behavior) wasn't a real illness. He was faking it," Sexton told McLeaish.

"Apparently he got better after he saw the doctor?" asked the defense

### Vickie Daniel fighting to keep her children

LIBERTY, Texas (AP) — A sobing Vickie Daniel lashed out Friday what bing Vickie Daniel las at a sister-in-law trying to take away two of her sons, saying they would be in "great emotional danger" with the aunt who purportedly told the 3-year-old his mother had killed his father.

Mrs. Daniel, charged with murder in the Jan. 19 shooting death of former Texas House Speaker Price Daniel Jr., is fighting to retain custody of the couple's two young sons in a suit brought by Daniel's sister, Jean Daniel Murph of Richardson, Texas.

Mrs. Daniel's former husband, Larry Moore of Dayton, Texas, revealed Friday that he is seeking custody of their 12-year-old daughter. The couple's 10-year-old son already lives with him. Moore was subpoenaed to testify in the Daniel custody

Mrs. Murph has asked for temporary custody of Franklin Baldwin Daniel, 3, and Marion Price Daniel IV, 1, claiming Mrs. Daniel is an unfit mother, emotionally unstable and prone to violence. Mrs. Daniel, 33, is free on \$50,000

bond following her indictment on charges she intentionally killed Dan-

Her voice cracking on the witness stand, Mrs. Daniel said her sister-inlaw "never once offered to care or do for my children." And Mrs. Daniel said that prior to Jan. 19 her sister-inlaw never indicated she thought Mrs.

Daniel was an unfit mother. "I feel they would be in great emotional danger if Jean were given custody because of what she told my little boy," Mrs. Daniel said.

"I am a good mother and I love my

children," she said. Mrs. Daniel said she knew Mrs. Murph had told the child about the shooting because "he said it out of his own mouth. He only repeats what he hears."

Mrs. Murph's attorney, J.C. 'Zeke" Zbransek, asked Mrs. Daniel how she had explained Daniel's death to his son.

#### Police seek man who molested Girl Scouts

CHICAGO (AP) — A man who abducted two children at gunpoint while they were selling Girl Scout cookies and sexually molested them was being sought by police in a suburban area Friday.

More than 60 officers from Chicago and the southwest suburbs of Justice and Bedford Park, a helicopter and six canine units joined in the search Thursday night after the two girls, aged 5 and 10, were released, officials said. They made their way to a house in Justice, where the owners called police.

The search centered Friday in Riverdale south of Chicago, police said.

The girls were abducted at about 6:30 p.m. Thursday by a man who forced them into his car, police

The girls told investigators that the man drove them around for several minutes, fondling them as he drove. They said he then took them to an abandoned house and forced the 10-year-old to perform a sexual act, police said.

The girls said the man then told them to "count up to 300" and fled. When he tried to escape in his car, the engine would not start and he fled on foot, the

The car was found near a monument company in Justice. The girls were treated at a LaGrange hospital and released.

### Foosball fanatics will love new film

HOLLYWOOD (AP) -The old Palladium, where Frank Sinatra once sat on the bandstand as vocalist for Tommy Dorsey's band, is seeing a lot of action these days.

Their travels take them to the climactic tournament at Lake Tahoe, and the Palladium was transformed into Nevada gaudy to duplicate Caesar's.

#### ABC hockey film skates on thin ice

LOS ANGELES (AP) - I wonder when it occurred to ABC that making a big TV movie out of the U.S. hockey team's startling win in last year's Olympics might not be the "natural" it seemed at the time.

Perhaps it was when someone realized that a whole lot of dramatic conflict would have to be contrived to make the thing acceptable to an audience widely indifferent to hockey. Or, perhaps it never occurred to ABC at all, which would explain this three-hour blimp of a movie, "Miracle on Ice," to be broad-

cast this Sunday. You can't blame ABC

#### ENTERTAINMENT

for trying, really. After all, that network covered the Olympics and had film of an event that sent chills of pride down the national spine.

But it turns out that some things that happen in this life are not perfectly suited to TV drama (surprise!), and the Olympic hockey vic-tory is one of them. Witness "Miracle on Ice."

For 21/2 hours, Karl Malden (playing U.S. Coach Herb Brooks) and his team of young actors struggle through the business of trying to create dramatic mountains out of molehills, or hockey pucks, if you will. Malden goes on and on about the nasty Ruskies, and since none of our Olympians was onelegged or blind or on parole from San Quentin, much is made of goalie Jim Craig's poverty and the fact that his mother had recently died. The presence of athletes' agents is even called upon to help pass some of the time.

But the hockey triumph was one of those national experiences meant to be savored in the quiet of individual memory; movie makeup and camera lights distort the moment.

The delight of that that it was unexpected, delivered in the night by unheralded strangers.





### **Budget panel** may face delays

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Budget Committee may be forced to delay work on President Reagan's request for spending cuts by as much as a week because of administration tardiness in providing detailed infor-

mation, aides disclosed Friday. The committee had hoped to begin work on budget-cut-ting legislation on March 11, but officials said it now appears the earliest the panel could start would be the week of March 16. "It looks almost impossible to go ahead then (March

11)," said one aide, who asked not to be identified by "There may be a remote possibility" of holding to the earlier schedule, the aide said, but added it was more

likely "we'd have to slip it a week." As part of a three-year, \$125.9 billion package of proposed cuts, Reagan has asked Congress to approve \$44.1 billion in spending reductions for 1982. But administration officials have not yet provided details on an estimated \$6.6 billion of next year's total.

In addition, administration officials announced on Wednesday the president will be recommending another \$3 billion to \$6 billion in cuts to compensate for the discovery that government spending is growing faster than anticipated.

The Budget Committee had hoped to have information on at least the \$6.6 billion by next Monday at the latest, but now doesn't expect the material until later, officials said. It would ordinarily take the committee a few days to begin hearings after receiving the material, since the Congressional Budget Office routinely reviews the figures submitted by administration budget experts.

Democrats in both houses have complained in the 10

days since Reagan announced his economic program that the administration has been slow in providing the mass of backup material that normally accompanies a formal legislative proposal. But the disclosure that the committee will put off its

work is the first confirmation that congressional action will be delayed because of the delay in producing material at the Office of Management and Budget. Under the procedure adopted by majority Republicans in the Senate for speeding Reagan's spending cut package through Congress, the Budget Committee will set targets for spending reductions. The panel also will prepare a set of instructions to the

other committees in the Senate, telling each one how much money to cut from the programs it is responsible



### Democrats attack Reagan budget plans

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congressional Democrats charged Friday that President Reagan's proposed budget and tax cuts discriminate against poor people and

fail to come to grips with energy problems. "The savings in the tax system have to be encouraged not just among the rich or the very high-income people, but all across the income sector," House Democratic

Whip Thomas Foley said. Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark., said that in some of Reagan's budget cuts "we may find that he has been a little too strict, cut too much and ... is likely to ... push people off gainful work and onto the welfare rolls."

Sen. Donald Riegle, D-Mich., said Democrats were stunned, frankly, when the president spoke to the Congress that in his entire address he did not mention the word energy one time. Everbody knows that that has been a major inflationary factor. So we are going to try to craft something into this program that makes up for

The three lawmakers appeared on the Public Broadcasting Service television program. Washington Weekend.

It was the second of three televised Democratic responses to Reagan's economic

Sens. Gary Hart, D-Colo., and Lawton Chiles, D-Fla., and House Majority Leader Jim Wright, D-Texas, appeared in programs broadcast on ABC and NBC last week. On Saturday night, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., is scheduled to appear on a CBS program featuring views on the Reagan program.

### Justice refuses to disclose UAW, American decision

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department refused Friday to say whether it would attempt to block a labor agreement between the United Auto Workers and American

Motors Corp., that would put a union member on the auto maker's board of directors.

Assistant Attorney General Sanford M. Litvack, head of the anti-trust division, said-there are serious unresolved anti-trust problems with the labor accord because Douglas Fraser, president of the UAW, already sits on the board of Chrysler Corp., an AMC competitor.

As a result, Litvack said in a letter to UAW attorneys, the department was unable to say at present whether it would or would not institute anti-trust action to block the

The union had sought the department's opinion because the agreement, worked out with AMC last fall, was conditioned on approval by the Justice Department and the Federal Trade Commission.

A FTC spokesman said a request for an opinion is pending before the commission.
Union officials were not immediately reachable for comment on Litvack's letter.
In his letter, Litvack noted that Section Eight of the Clayton Act makes it illegal for a

In his letter, Litvack noted that Section Eight of the Clayton Act makes it illegal for a "person" to be a director of two competing corporations.

Although upder the UAW's proposal, the member to the AMC board would be someone other than Fraser, the Litvack letter said the term "person" for purposes of the Clayton Act, encompasses corporations and associations, including labor unions.

The question of whether the union would be sitting on the board of two auto manufacturers is normally a factual one, turning on whether the UAW members would be serving as individuals or as union representatives, Litvack wrote.

But in this case, according to the material submitted to the department, Litvack said it appeared the union had obtained through negotiation AMC's agreement to nominate a UAW member acceptable to the union for election to the AMC board.

Moreover, Litvack said, "The UAW may see an interest on its part in the commercial and financial affairs of major autoworker employers. While such an interest may be only direct, it would seem to create an incentive to become aware of and influence such matters."

### Bus, rail fare hikes predicted

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mass transit officials predicted Friday that city bus and rail fares will increase 35 to 45 percent if President Reagan eliminates federal operating

subsidies and local communities reject tax increases to replace the money.

The top transit executives from 15 major cities came to Washington to map their plans for fighting Reagan's transit budget cuts, saying they hoped to enlist business leaders, many of them Reagan supporters, in the battle.

The Reagan budget calls for phasing out federal transit operating subsidies over the next four years and sharply curtailing money immediately for building new rail transit

While some reductions in federal money must be expected, said Jack Gilstrap, executive vice president of the American Public Transportation Association, the Reagan

proposal could seriously harm many cities who plan to rely on mass transit to help their

economies.

"I think it's short-sighted," added Alan F. Kiepper, general manager of the Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority. The city recently opened its first leg of its new rail system and is building another leg.

Allen Dekdebrun, chairman of the transit authority in Buffalo, N.Y., said fares in Buffalo will increase from 50 cents to \$1.10 by 1986 even with federal subsidies. Without the subsidies the fares will jump to 90 cents next year and to \$1.70 by 1986, he said.

Dekdebrun predicted sharp drops in ridership as a result of the fares, noting that pressures from high gas prices are blunted in his city because people drive into Canada where gasoline is cheaper.

### Sleep talking gives few clues to Jane Doe's life

PEMBROKE PINES, Fla. (AP) -A drug-induced "sleep talking" session prompted answers from an amnesia-stricken woman about her life. but doctors say it's too early to know if the leads will finally tell Jane Doe who she is.

The woman, found naked and near death in a state park on Sept. 19, has no memory of who she is or where she came from.

Since accounts of her plight were distributed nationally by The Associated Press last month, the hospital has been deluged by thousands of calls and letters.

ABC-TV flew the woman, whom doctors say suffers from traumacaused amnesia, to New York to appear on "Good Morning America" Feb. 10, and more calls and letters

#### Scientists being wooed away from schools

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Small Genentech and Biogen are wooing some scientists away from universities, and one researcher says that's the only way to get artificially produced products like interferon and insulin on the market.

Charles Weissmann, co-founder of the gene-splicing firm Biogen, said Wednesday at the privately organized First Annual Congress on Recombinant DNA Research that research costs are going up, and government and private foundations can't be expected to finance such risky ven-

Biogen is working on the commercial production of interferon, a natural substance that may be a weapon against cancer.

Some firms have tapped top university scientists, most of whom have maintained their academic affiliations. But the private labs, with the lure of good pay, also attract young researchers from the college campuses for staff jobs.

Herbert Boyer of the University of California at San Francisco, who along with Stanford University's Stanley Cohen was awarded a basic patent in gene-splicing techniques, is a co-founder of Genentech.

Cohen is connected with CETUS, a Berkeley, Calif., firm that plans to offer its stock to the public within the next few weeks.

Harvard University briefly considered entering the gene-splicing sweepstakes itself but later decided against the move. Harvard's Walter Gilbert, another prominent biologist, founded Biogen with Weissmann, who is from the University of Zurich.

But others, like biologists Arthur Kornberg and Paul Berg of Stanford, both Nobel laureates, have steadfastly avoided participation in commercial ventures, saying that the responsibility of a scientist is to his research, not to the applications of that Scientists who do venture into com-

mercial applications may reap huge rewards. Weissmann and Boyer have become millionaires on paper as a result of their participation in private Some critics have charged that be-

cause such researchers must keep their work secret to protect their investments, the flow of scientific information will be slowed. But John Baxter, of University of

California at San Francisco, doesn't think the need for secrecy is interfering with basic research. "I haven't noticed any change," said Baxter, who organized the recombinant DNA conference.

"The secrecy has always existed, and it's appropriate." he said. "If you have an idea, you want to try it out.

### Doctors grow living skin for future transplants

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) -Starting with a few cells in a test tube, doctors are growing living skin that they say may someday permanently cover the wounds of burn victims.

"This is the first time that a fullthickness, living skin has been made in the laboratory and transplanted," said Eugene Bell, who directed the development at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The first experiment with a human transplant of the material, called "skin-equivalent tissue," is now under way, and a report on earlier animal tests was published today in the journal Science.

Eventually, scientists may learn to grow other organs in the test tube, he said. His team is already working on the re-creation of blood vessels.

"We think we have begun essentially a new line of research," he said. Unlike artificial skin, which must eventually be replaced with real skin from the victim's own body, doctors say this material will permanently cover the wound and will never have

to be removed. The test-tube skin lacks hair or sweat glands, but that "does not mean that other cell types cannot be ultimately included in these grafts,"

Bell said. Natural skin is made up of two layers - the dermis, or inner layer,

and the epidermis, or outer layer. The scientists remove a tiny skin sample from the patient, extract a few dermal cells and multiply them in





### Wat Thai temple nears completion

By KEN LUBAS The Los Angeles Times

LOS ANGELES — A Thai temple bell chimed in a gentle August breeze. A Thereavada Buddhist monk's bright orange robe fluttered about his legs as he hurried across the redtgiled courtyard so as not to be late for evening prayers.

Another monk, Phramaha Sala, watched his approach from the tem-ple door, turned and invited a visitor to view the evening rites.

The prayers, he said in broken English, would be those recited by his order for more than 2,500 years.

With that, Sala moved to join the others gathering under the shadow of a massive golden Buddha, not in Thailand, but in Los Angeles.

Wat Thai a temple built in the ar-chitectural style of temples throughout Thaila,d, is nearing completion. Under construction for seven years, all that remains to be added are ornately carved teak window frame

landscaping. When the temple is dedicated next spring, it will be the first of its kind in the nation, according to the monks.

During a conversation after the evening service, temple secretary Sawat Yingyuad noted that plans for the temple, drafted by a local architect to meet city building codes, were initially put together by the Thai Department of Religious Affairs.

"In terms of architecture," Yingyuad said, "it is the only true Thai temple in the United States. The peo-

ple are very pleased."
Yingyuad said property on which the temple stands was donated by one of the 20,000-member congregation. "We started off first ... in a con-verted house," he recalled. "We were

there for three years, but because of zoning difficulties found it necessary Yingyuad said the more than \$250,-000 spent on construction of the temple was raised both locally and in

The importance of the temple was noted by Evan Poe, a monk.

"The temple is the visual focal point of the Buddhist way of life ... It is where ceremonies are observed, prayers recited and special meetings held."

Poe also noted that the temple has. traditionally been home for the monks, who renounce all wordly possessions, cut their hair and shave their eyebrows in following Buddah's teachings as his disciples.

"It is the focal point of our cere-monies and festivals," Poe said.

At the moment Wat Thai is home for eight months, three temporarily ordained. The temple also permits lay members of the congregation to experience monastic life.

The daily life of a Thereavada monk is basically structured around morning and evening prayer, break-fast and lunch — no dinner is eaten and temple duties and the ministry.

Unlike Western religions, weekly services are not held, except as part of the religious calendar. The temple is always open.

Currently, it is the rainyseason in Thailand, and under the religious calendar the monks are prohibited from making overnight pilgrimages. As a result, monk activities away from the temple are limited to such activities as house blessings and occasional

"That is part of the reason we will be holding services of a sort at which sermons are given, on Sundays through the end of September," said Peter Akson; another monk.

'However, it must be understood that people may seek blessings at anytime," he said. As he spoke a group of visitors stopped at the door, took off their shoes and bowed before two different claimed as she

images of Buddha after entering. The first was the massive goldencolored statue, the second a smaller

green figure. The golden figure, the monks noted, was cast especially for the temple in ceremonies in Thailand attended by the Thai kings. The second is a wooden reproduction of Phra-Kaeow, a jade Buddha which sits in the Grand

"It's magnificant," a visitor exclaimed as she approached the monks. Another spoke excitedly in a foreign tongue — later explained to be Vietnamese. She was a visitor from Chicago, also impressed by the tem-

ple's ornate appearance.
Sawat said he didn't doubt that the temple is becoming a tourist attrac-tion as well as religious center. "It is the only one of its kind in this country," he said.

The film, "Achieving Sexual Maturity," was made for college freshmen viewing but was shown at a local high school during a family living class. It contains frontal nudity and examinations of male and fe-

male genitalia. A lawsuit filed by the president of the state-wide Moral Majority, Michael Farris, is intended to force the state to release a list of school districts that have ordered the 1973 film by Ben Nor-

The state contends that any such court order would be an invasion of privacy.

Norman said he produced and directed the color film for Filmfair, an educational filmmaking company. He advertised for participants in the film, and the professional models and actors who were selected all were told what was expected of them. They were teenagers.

### Title IX court battle looms

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - An anti-Title IX ruling by a federal judge in Michigan has sent shock waves throughout college athletics, but only one thing seems certain - the issue is headed straight for the Supreme

"I think that's a good bet," said Ruth Berkey, the NCAA's director of championship events for women.

Berkey, like many in upper-level athletic management, declined futher comment until she can personally review the ruling. But the power of the federal government is at the heart of the issue ruled upon Monday in Detroit by U.S. District Court Judge Charles W. Joiner.

The decision came in a suit brought against Ann Arbor Public Schools by Arthur Othen. Othen demanded that a women's golf team be started at Ann Arbor Pioneer High School so his daughter could compete in the sport. Joiner ruled that colleges and pub-

"I think the ramifications will be disastrous," said Chuck Guerrier, director of the Women's Law Fund in Cleveland and author of a book on Title IX.

An attorney for the plaintiff in the Michigan case, Jean L. King, says an appeal to the 6th U.S. District Court of Appeals in Cincinnati is being consid-

But other cases raising the same point of law are pending in other cities and the questin, nearly eveyone agrees, ultimately will be decided by the Supreme Court.

A Department of Education spokesman said Friday in Washington that the department would decline comment until it sees the court rul

The immediate results of the Joiner decision are open to debate.

"There isn't any effect," said King. "The ruling applies only to the Eastern Distict of Michigan and there are three state laws that prohibit sex discrimination."

BUT ONE effect might be to lessen the power of investigators for the Office of Civil Rights who have been inspecting athletic facilities throughout the country for discriminatory practices against women.

"If you're an athletic director sitting out there somewhere and OC investigators show up, you can say, 'I don't think you have any standing because a federal judge in Michigan has ruled that you do not," said one athletic official. "Besides, the Reagan administration has been saying they want to get government out of

our lives, to reduce regulations. "The OC tries to bluff and scare you. They've been out there counting showerheads and locker stalls. Now the institution will be in a much more solid negotiating position. They don't have to acquiesce to everything the investigators say.'

Ironically, Joiner's ruling came only six weeks after women's athletics scored a major victory at the NCAA convention in Miami.

By thin margins, the NCAA membership voted to sponsor women's championships and bring women into the governing stucture of the formerly male-dominated association.

And the NCAA hinted at the time it might negotiate a compromise on its Kansas City suit or forget it altogeth-

"This will have no effect on the NCAA's commitment to women's athletics," an NCAA spokesman said.



### Francie Larrieu defeats Groos in record 2-mile

NEW YORK (AP) - Veteran Francie Larrieu outdueled. Margaret Groos and smashed her world indoor best for the women's two-mile race Friday night at thre USA-Mobile indoor track and field championships at Madison Square Garden.

The diminuitive 28-year-old Larrieu, who has been racing competitively for half her life and has been on two U.S. Olympic teams, was timed in 9 minutes, 38.1 seconds in breaking her previous indoor record of 9:39.4, set in 1974.

Groos, of the University of Virginia Track Club, also went under the old mark, clocking 9:38.3.

This was Larrieu's sixth indoor chapionship. She won the two-mile in 1977 and the mile in 1975, 1977, 1978

Earlier, Evelyn Ashford, sporting a long sleek racing suit similar to that of a speed skater, came within onehundredth of a second of breaking the women's record in the 60-yard dash.

Ashford, streaking the distance in her filmy, stretch fabric - a uniform that she has adopted this season and that has been criticized by some track officials - was timed in 6.63 sec-

The indoor mark is 6.62 seconds set

recently by Alice Brown. Brown was no factor Friday night, finishing fourth in 6.80. Jeannette Bolden placed second in 6.69 and Chandra Cheeseborough took third in 6.72.

The victory was the third straight national indoor title for Ashford, the world's top-ranked sprinter in 1979 who missed most of the 1980 outdoor campaign after suffering a pulled hamstring muscle in May.

Meanwhile, Stanley Floyd, the men's indoor record holder in the 60 won his specialty in 6.15, well short of his mark of 6.04. But it was good enough to beat LaMont King of Arizona State University, who finished in

### Steve Kemp continues to swing hottest arbitration bat 000 instead of the \$120,000 he wanted, and outfielder Mike Vail, who'll

Steve Kemp continues to swing the hottest bat in baseball salary arbitration hearings where players had a slim edge over owners in 21 cases heard this year.

Eleven players, including Kemp, won their arbitration arguments and 10 lost. But two of the losers — Oakland's Mike Norris, Dave Collins of Cincinnati — wound up with higher salaries than seven of the winners. Kemp, who won an arbitration hearing for his \$210,000 salary last year, came away with \$600,000 for 1981. Arbitrator Monroe Berkowitz an economics professor at Rutgers University, chose that figure instead of

the \$360,000 submitted by the Tigers. Under salary arbitration rules, there is no compromise. Both sides present their proposals and arguments backing those numbers. The

arbitrator picks one or the other. Few players have benefitted from the system as much as Kemp has. He earned \$75,000 in 1979, and his two arbitration victories have increased his income by an astounding eight times in just two years.

The Tigers had offered Kemp \$150,000 last year. His victory then cost them \$60,000, cheap by today's baseball standards. He batted .293 with 21 home runs and 101 runs batted in last season and those numbers helped him at the arbitration table again. This time the club's loss to the slugging outfielder came to a whopping \$240,000.

Kemp's \$600,000 is the second largest arbitration award ever, behind only the \$700,000 relief pitcher Bruce Sutter took home from the Chicago Cubs last year, when players won 15 of the 26 arbitration cases. The Cubs had offered Sutter \$350,000 and were stunned by the loss. They traded the reliever to St. Louis last December and he has since signed a rich new

Norris, runner-up in the 1980 American League Cy Young balloting, thought his 22-9 season and 2.54 earned run average were worth \$450, 000. The A's said \$300,000 and were supported by the arbitrator. Norris shrugged off the setback, saying, "I figured I'd just get rich or richer." He had made \$34,000 last year.

The A's also won their case against outfielder Tony Armas, who was their most productive hitter last season, batting .279 with 35 home runs and 109 RBIs. He had asked for \$500,000 but arbitrator John Klagle went with the club's offer of \$210,000, which still represents an increase of

\$176,000 for Armas. Last year, the A's lost five arbitration hearings, costing the club about \$167,500 more than it wanted to pay in salaries. The victories over Norris and Armas saved Oakland \$340,000 this time around.

Collins was one of three Cincinnati players beaten at arbitration hearings. He was granted the club's offer of \$267,500 instead of the \$360,000 he wanted. Now he is reported heading for Atlanta in a proposed trade for outfielder Gary Matthews. The other Cincinnati losers were pitcher Paul Moskau, awarded \$90,

some arbitration winners received. Besides Kemp, the big money winners were reliever Ed Farmer of the Chicago White Sox, who will be paid \$495,000 for 1981 instead of the \$300,000 the club had offered; catcher Rick Cerone of the New York Yankees, jumping to \$440,000 - \$90,000 more than the team figure; and first baseman-designated hitter Jason Thompson of California, who'll get \$395,000 instead of the \$250,000 the Angels would have preferred.

Behind Norris, Collins and Armas in the losers' column were pitcher Greg Minton of San Francisco (\$180,000); Vail; Wayne Nordhagen of the White Sox (\$160,000); Seattle's Julio Cruz, who also lost his hearing last year (\$106,000); Moskau; Rick Sutcliffe of Los Angeles (\$85,000); and







### Cattle speculators reap rewards of 'sure thing'

Congressman fears dealers worked on signal, in concert

By JAMES H. RUBIN **Associated Press Writer** 

WASHINGTON (AP) — A group of cattle speculators reaped about \$110 million in profit betting on a sure thing in the commodities futures trading market, an Iowa congress-man charged Friday.

Rep. Neal Smith, D-Iowa, said that-32 traders, possibly acting in concert, made at least \$3.4 million apiece by selling futures contracts at what could have been a prearranged sig-

Smith said he could not prove a conspiracy. But he said his staff uncovered the signal that predicted "with 100 percent accuracy" when the market would turn around each month over a 15-month period ending in April 1979.

He said that on 14 of 15 occasions the 32 traders sold cattle futures at the same time: when the signal predicted rising prices of cattle futures would begin to drop.

"You can use your own judgment" about the possibility of a conspiracy, Smith told a news conference. "It's hard to prove if you didn't empanel a grand jury.'

Smith said he turned over the names of the speculators to the feder-al agency with jurisdiction over the market, the Commodity Futures

**Trading Commission.** Randell Moore, a commission spokesman, said the agency will have to study the report before comment-ing. But he said "this is the first time we've received information about these so-called signal points."

Smith declined to reveal the names of the traders. But he said they included officials of the nation's largest cattle feedlots, meat packing and grain companies. Many of them are affiliated with each other, Smith

He said the losers in the alleged scheme were smaller producers whose costs are greater than the big commercial feedlots, grain companies and meatpackers.

The speculators sell futures at a price that is profitable for them but not for smaller producers, Smith

The futures trading market is meant to provide a hedge against losses for cattle producers. A futures contract is a promise to deliver the commodity at a particular price.

But Smith alleged that the market has been rigged by the bigger producers to prevent their smaller competitors from selling contracts at a

office. The formula for triggering the signal is "really quite simple," Smith said. Every time the futures price

goes above the cost of feeding cattle by those other than the 422 largest cattle feeders, the price will drop.

He said the system worked "every single time" between January 1978 and April 1979, the period examined by his staff, and presumably is still But he said by exposing the system it will "effectively destroy the ability of cattle futures traders involved to reap unjustified profits.'

From now on, he said, the 32 traders can not automatically count on finding buyers when they plan to sell at the allegedly prearranged signal.

### Water office created

WASHINGTON (AP) - Interior Secretary James Watt said Friday he is creating a new Office of National Water Policy to better coordinate government action on water development.

The new office will "assist states and counties plan their water needs," Watt told reporters at a briefing.

As one example of a lack of planning in the past, Watt said, "The East Coast is facing a drought and not enough attention has been paid to that problem."

Watt sidestepped a question whether the new office would take the place of the Water Resources Council, a controversial interagency review group created by United States" issued this week by \$ the Carter administration. He said further details would be announced

### Ten states produce most of nation's farm exports

WASHINGTON (AP) - Most of the massive U.S. farm export business is being accounted for by 10 states which are the leading producers of commodities most in demand from foreign buyers.

Those states accounted for about 60 percent of the total value of farm commodities exported in the fiscal year that ended last Sept. 30, according to a new analysis by the Agriculture Department.

Values of commodities exported last year totaled a record of \$40.5 billion, up 27 percent from about \$32 billion in 1978-79. Department experts predict a further gain this year to \$47

The leading states last year, in order, were: Illinois, \$3.64 billion; Iowa, \$3.27 billion; California, \$3.17 billion; Texas, \$3.09 billion; Kansas, \$2.21 billion; Minnesota, \$2 billion; Nebraska, \$1.93 billion; Indiana, \$1.71 billion; North Dakota, \$1.46 billion; and Missouri, \$1.44 billion.

State rankings in U.S. farm export trade are an annual exercise by the department, initiated years ago to help emphasize the importance of foreign markets to American farmers and the overall U.S. economy.




