Prospects take ominous turn in Poland

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - Labor and government leaders raced against time today in talks aimed at averting a nationwide general strike in this Soviet bloc country racked by political and economic turmoil. A government leader warned a strike would be "the threshold of a precipice."

There was no sign of a breakthrough as Lech Walesa, leader of the Solidarity independent union, met with Deputy Premier Mieczyslaw Rakowski in a government building in Warsaw. Warsaw Pact military maneuvers continued in and around Poland, an ominous background

The Soviet news agency Tass quoted a Polish Communist Party official as saying, regarding a general strike, "our country has no reserves that would enable it to survive this catastrophe economically. Therefore the structure of our state and its very survival are at

The official, Kazimierz Barcikowski, spoke at a meeting of the party's Central Committee which gave its ruling Politburo a vote of confidence to deal with the situation after stormy debate.

After flexing its muscles in a four-hour warning strike Friday, the union, angered by the beating of three members in Bydgoszcz on March 19, threatened an indefinite general strike starting at 6 a.m. Tuesday (11 p.m. EST tonight) if its demands are not met in the last-ditch talks. The chief demand is dismissal of those responsible for the beatings.

Solidarity leaders alerted regional chapters to await the final strike order by 8 p.m. (1 p. m. EST.) "We face a general strike with effects that may be

catastrophic," said Rakowski, deputy premier and chief labor trouble shooter for the government in comments reported by the Polish news agency PAP from the session of the party's central committee.

"The general strike would be the threshold of a precipice," he was quoted as saying.

Rakowski told reporters before the meeting with Walesa: "The prime consideration is to remove reasons for the enormous tension in the country as a result of the Bydgoszcz conflict.'

Walesa said the government must negotiate seriously and not stall for time if the union is to be able to rescind its strike call.

Solidarity's deputy chairman, Andrzej Gwiazda, said "at the moment we are exactly where we have been before - nowhere.

Another union leader, Andrzej Słowik, said a strike would be a last resort. "We don't want it, the government doesn't want it, the people don't want it. But we have no other way.'

The Warsaw radio broadcast excerpts of a speech made at the party meeting by Internal Affairs Minister Miroslav Milewski. He said people "who hanker after power and are irresponsible in their actions" have penetrated

"The time has come to curb the widespread lawlessness

and lack of observance of the law," he said. In addition to stating its support of the Communist leadership, the committee called on government officials to meet with Polish workers in their factories and told workers to "put an end to strikes," the official PAP news agency reported.

The statement, issued after 18 hours of often-stormy discussion ended at 3:50 a.m., also called for an explanation of the Bydgoszcz incident, which precipitated the current grave labor crisis.

The 10-million-member labor federation charges that police in the industrial city beat up 23 union activists March 19 - the first police violence against the independent labor movement reported since the nationwide strike wave last summer.

Solidarity staged a four-hour warning strike Friday. Warsaw Radio said the Central Committee's resolution called on party members "to counteract the influence of the enemies of socialism on individual cells of Solidarity, and to carry out consistent counter-action against the transformation of this union into a political organization causing a state of social tension and anxiety.'

Hijackers let deadline pass

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - Airplane hijackers described as fanatic Moslems by Indonesian sources let another deadline pass today without apparent harm to their 55 hostages, including two Americans. The hijackers, who wounded an American during an escape attempt Sunday, are demanding \$1.5 million ransom and freedom for 80 "political prisoners" in Indonesia.

Thai police sharpshooters ringed the plane and a group of Indonesian commandos was reported at the Bangkok airport.

Thai officials said they oppose Indonesia yielding to the hijackers' demands, which have been altered several times since the Garuda Indonesian Airlines DC-9 was seized Saturday. There was discussion with Indonesian authorities about a commando attack on the aircraft.

A Thai official who has been briefing reporters on the crisis said that as the 9 a.m. EST deadline approached, the hijackers were told that 38 prisoners had been rounded up from Indonesian jails. He said their names were provided by telegraphed message from the Indonesian government and the hijackers said they would respond to the announcement later.

The hijackers, without explanation, reduced their prisoner-release demand to 80 people from 84 and allowed two officials to take food aboard. The Thai announcement that 38 prisoners were being assembled could not immediately be confirmed with Indonesian officials, who earlier balked at meeting the demands.

Government sources in Jakarta, the Indonesian capital, said the demands would not be met. The sources, who asked not to be identified, said Indonesia would allow Thai officials to attempt a peaceful settlement with the hijackers. If the attempt fails, one source said, "we will move in.

The five gunmen, armed with machine guns and explosives, originally demanded that 20 prisoners be freed: When Indonesian President Suharto agreed, the hijackers increased the number to 84, and agreement again was announced Sunday.

In Jakarta, Indonesian Vice President Adam Malik said the government "is fully responsible to solve the hijacking tragedy by all means as soon as possible" but would not comment beyond adding, "negotiations are under way."

Sharpshooters surrounded the Garuda Indonesian Airways DC-9, parked about a mile from the terminal building at Bangkok's Don Muang airport.

At an adjacent military field, an Indonesian DC-10 stood by. It arrived Sunday night carrying the nation's deputy intelligence chief, and according to the sources, about 50 Indonesian commandos.

An American shot by the hijackers Sunday was reported in stable condition today at a Bangkok hospital. A British captive escaped through an emergency exit earlier Sunday as airport workers refueled the plane.

Thai government spokesman Trairong Suwankiri said the hijackers had demanded the dissidents be freed and flown, along with the mone and a list of names, to Bangkok) He said the gunmen would then release the hostages, but take the plane to a new, undisclosed location.

Thai Prime Minister Prem Tinsulanond had said earlier that Indonesian Deputy Intelligence Chief Benny Moerdani asked for permission to use force to "clear up the problem." But Prem said he replied that the use of force would depend on how violent the hijackers became.

The Indonesian government has said the hijackers are members of a "certain illegal movement."

Sources in Jakarta, the Indonesian capital, identified the movement as Komando Jihad, or Holy War Command, an outlawed guerrilla group dedicated to turning Indonesia into a Moslem theocracy. They said the some of the group's members are trained in Saudi Arabia and one of the hijackers is a Saudi national

Officials in Jakarta banned publication in Indonesia of any news about the hijacking that is not a government statement.

The Midland Independent School District administration's attempts to sell a \$6.6 million bond package to the public next month is eliciting mixed reactions from the two candidates who have filed for the Place 4 school board seat.

Competing in the April 4 election for the spot vacated by board member Marshall McCrea are Gary Hopper, Midland bureau chief and news producer for KOSA-TV, and Michael E. Butler, assistant director of the city's public works department.

Although Hopper, a native Midlander and a graduate of Lee High School, said he is supporting the school bond proposals, he is speaking out against recurring bond elections which he believes have been held too

The current bond proposal calls for \$1.05 million in renovation to Midland and Lee high schools, the construction Election school board

of a new elementary school, in addition to the building of a new facility to replace aging De Zavala Elemen-

"THESE BOND ELECTIONS would not have to be held so often if current facilities are maintained," he said. "I think it's a shame De Zavala is in the shape it's in. These schools should have never gotten in this shape

However, Hopper said the constructive side of the bond issue will alleviate overcrowding, which has become inevitable due to increased elementary school enrollments.

"The elementary school playgrounds are full of portable classrooms," he said. "You can see the

appearance this afternoon the House and Senate have a wide range of problems to consider - primarily concerning state spending and redis-

Bush, an adopted Texan who once lived in Midland and still has a home in Houston, comes to Austin from a speaking appearance in Fort Worth. Bush's aides said he would land at


Austin's Municipal Airport about 2:30 p.m. and take a motorcade to the Capitol. After a brief news conference in the Senate chamber and a visit with

WASHINGTON (AP) - Well into the last month of tax-paying season, the government is still waiting to hear from nearly half its contributors.

As of March 20, less than four weeks from the April 15 deadline, federal returns were lagging about 2.5 percent behind the pace at the same time last year, an Internal Revenue Service spokesman said late last week.

During Sunday's search, police found the barrel of a 20-gauge shotgun believed to have been used in Friday's fatal shooting of 23-year-old Sylvester Carey, investigators said.

U.S. says Polish crisis avoidable

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration says there are signs a major crisis in strike-torn Poland may be avoided, although "a heightened state of readiness" of Soviet troops along the Polish border leaves the situation "very, very

Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr., who had said the weekend could be crucial to peace in Poland, said Sunday that moderate elements in the Polish government "seem to be surviving."

An intervention by the Red Army is 'neither imminent or inevitable," Haig said, but he added: "I do believe that that varies hour to hour by various postures taken by Soviet, forces....The situation is still very, very tense."

An announcement by the East German news agency ADN in Berlin said "new units" have been sent to join Warsaw Pact military maneuvers now under way on Polish soil and along its border, as Poland's large independent labor union, Solidarity, prepares for a general nationwide strike on Tuesday.

If the Soviets do intervene in Poland, said Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger, the United States would consider a "broad spectrum of activity - political, economic, diplomatic.

Weinberger, appearing on ABC's "Issues and Answers," declined to

say whether a U.S. "military re-

sponse" was also a possibility. Weinberger and Sen. Charles Percy, R-Ill., in a separate interview, agreed that any movement by Soviet troops into Poland would end the possibility of any future arms limitation talks with the Russians.

Percy, appearing on CBS' "Face the Nation," also said he has "reason to believe" the Carter administration was considering providing military armaments to China in the event the Soviets intervened in Poland. But he said he does not know whether the new administration is still considering the plan, although it was an "ongoing project" a month before Reagan took office.

As the administration watched and worried about the Polish situation, Haig sounded a trace of optimism.

"I think there are some signs that perhaps a major crisis can be avoided if the moderate elements in the political leadership continue to prevail and maintain their influence," Haig said in response to the question of whether the administration views the Polish situation as being any "less critical" than it did late last week.

Haig said Friday that the weekend "could be critical" in determining whether there could be a peaceful outcome to Poland's internal prob-

Reagan asks workers to help rebuild economy

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan, beginning a week of personal lobbying for his economic program by appealing for labor support, wants workers who built America to "join in rebuilding it," his spokesman says.

Reagan was addressing the AFL-CIO conference of building and construction traders this afternoon at a Washington hotel. White House press secretary James

S. Brady said the president's speech would point out the "failure of past economic policies and how working men and women are the people who suffer from inflation. Brady, briefing reporters Saturday,

also quoted Reagan as saying "we have not yet begun to fight" for the tax cut portion of the economic package. "He feels very strongly that this program has to move forward as a package," Brady added. He said Reagan's "biggest night-

mare" was that Congress will change his economic program, cutting in the wrong places or by the wrong amount "and then it won't work and in two years everyone will be back with renewed cynicism and dashed hopes.

Reagan believes that "all economic recovery packages are not created equal," Brady said.

The president will spend a large share of his time this week lobbying for his program to slash nearly \$48.6 billion from the federal budget and to cut federal income taxes by 30 percent over 31/2 years.

Besides the speech to laor, Reaga was scheduled to confer this afternoon and Tuesday with Republican members of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee.

On Wednesday, Reagan will make the first in a series of speeches to state legislatures when he travels to Springfield, Ill. Additional trips will be made later next month, he added. Brady described the address to a

joint session of the Legislature as having a "power to the states" theme and at the same time plugging Reagan's proposed economic program. Like Congress, the Illinois Legisla-

ture is under divided political control. Democrats control the Senate and Republicans the House. Meanwhile, Reagan is tentatively

scheduled to sign a bill Tuesday that scraps a scheduled April 1 increase in dairy price supports. The measure, approved by Congress on Friday, represents the president's first major legislative victory in his efforts to trim the budget.

The administration says eliminating the subsidy increase will save the federal government \$147 million this year and will spare consumers from price increases of 71/2 for a gallon of milk, 10 cents for a pound of butter and 9 cents for a pound of cheese.

Brady said the bill will be signed Tuesday if the necessary technical paperwork that formally transmits the bill to the White House is finished. Otherwise, he said, the increase will take effect automatically on Wednes-

Toward the end of the week, Brady said, the administration plans to announce a relief package for the U.S. auto industry. He said the package will concentrate on regulations and will not include what Reagan plans to do about Japanese imports.

Although Hopper said he is not anticipating any conflicts between his affliation with KOSA-TV and a possible school board seat, his opponent is disagreeing. "What's going to happen when the school board goes into executive session?" said Butler. "Will Hopper take the First Amendment? I wish someone would ask him

Butler, who has lived in Midland for seven years and was an administrative assistant to the city manager before he transferred to the public works department, said he filed for the school board seat because he is concerned about the quality of education students are receiving in the Midland public schools.

"What sparked my interest is that eventually, I've got to hire the product and I am concerned about people working with me who have been socially promoted through the school system," he said. "The first thing I would be interested in doing is establishing a system-wide achievement test which 11th and 12th graders would be required to pass before

BUTLER SAID he also is concerned

about failing communication between teachers and the school board and the administration. "Dr. (James) Mailey (school superintendent) has an idea and the school board has an idea, but they rarely seem to meet," he said. "I

think with my association with teachers, I can bridge the gap and reach a common understanding." An example of incohesiveness within the school system, Butler said, is the school board's stance on holding teachers strictly accountable for failing students, while the administration

wants responsibility shared. "There's no give-and-take between the two," Butler said. Butler also believes a comprehensive program should be established concerning scholastic standing and

student participation in athletics. "We have to decide if we are going to let a student play with five F's or five D's. If a student is going to be a representative at an athletic event, he should also be able to represent the school on a scholastic level.'

In addition to policies affecting athletes, Butler said a consensus should be established concerning discipline programs at elementary schools. 'Again, there is no consistency. Principals are given too much flexibility and the overriding policies ought to come from the school administra-

ON BILINGUAL education, Butler said "as long as the federal government is involved, we're going to have to provide for it because it's still mandated by the state constitution. However, if the student hasn't mastered English by the fourth or sixth grade, he should be pulled out of the system. After sixth grade, he is starting to make a drain on the system." Butler, whose wife is a seventh grade teacher at Goddard Junior High. holds a bachelor of administration degree in political science and public administration from Texas A&M University.

Abscam trial set for sole senator indicted

Prosecutors also fighting charges of entrapment

NEW YORK (AP) — Prosecutors beset by rulings of government entrapment face their most troublesome Abscam case today with the trial of Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr., the most powerful politician indicted in the FBI sting.

Williams was one of the first to meet with undercover FBI agents posing as representatives of favorseeking Arab sheiks, but the 61-yearold New Jersey Democrat was the last to be indicted.

"I will survive," predicts the 22-year Senate veteran whose current term expires in 1982. The sole senator indicted in the sting maintains he is

"totally innocent." Prosecutors face an uncertain task in the courtroom this time since a federal judge in Philadelphia last year threw out the convictions of two Philadelphia city council members on grounds of governmental misconduct and entrapment.

The convictions were overturned based on the most controversial Abscam evidence: tapes of a June 28, 1979, session involving the council members and Williams. The government is appealing the reversal

The 13 other Abscam convicts are appealing on similar grounds.

Barring success of last-minute maneuvers to delay the trial before U.S. District Judge George C. Pratt in Brooklyn, jury selection was slated to begin today from a panel of several hundred people.

The trial is expected to last up to

The Williams' case has been the most troublesome for the Justice Department

Like six House members who have preceded him to the Abscam courtroom, Williams is accused of agreeing to introduce a private immigration bill on behalf of a phony Arab sheik.

Both sides acknowledge it is radically different than those before it, if for no other reason than the conduct of Mel Weinberg, the convicted con man hired by the FBI to help set up the sting.

Lawyers for many of those already convicted have used tapes of early meetings involving Williams and Weinberg in efforts to prove entrapment and governmental misconduct in their clients' cases.

Williams, chairman of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee until the Republicans gained Senate control in January, is accused. of bribery and conspiracy involving an alleged promise to introduce an immigration bill to allow the purported Arabs to stay in the United

Standing trial with Williams is Alexander Feinberg, a 72-year-old lawyer from Cherry Hill, N.J., and longtime Williams' associate.

Mayor Angelo Errichetti, of Camden, N.J., was severed from the trial because the Justice Department agreed it would not further prosecute those convicted in earlier Abscam cases unless they won appeals. Retired contractor George Katz of Fort Lee, N.J., was said to be seriously ill and also was severed.

In addition to the charge involving

the private immigration bill, Williams also is charged with agreeing to accept a concealed 18 percent interest in a Virginia titanium mine. In return, he allegedly agreed to do everything in his power to obtain military contracts for the mining venture.

The supposed Arabs were going to finance the deal with a \$100 million loan at favorable interest rates, the federal indictment charges. The charges further allege that as part of the conspiracy, Williams and the others agreed to later sell the mining company to a group of foreign businessmen for \$70 million.

Jury selection process begins in New Orleans Brilab trial

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The federal case called Brilab opened today in U.S. District Court, as prosecution and defense began the process of selecting an impartial jury for a trial that could last a half

The 12 jurors and their alternates could spend the next five months - or more - in U.S. District Judge Morey Sear's court, hearing the reams of evidence in the case, U.S. Attorney John Volz estimated.

The five defendants, who include reputed Mafia chieftain Carlos Marcello and former state Commissioner of Administration Charles E. Roemer II, are charged with conspiracy, racketeering, and mail and wire fraud.

Their indictments stemmed from their involvement with Joseph Hauser, 49, a three-time loser on insurance fraud convictions.

Hauser allegedly connected the defendants with insurance executives willing to trade payoffs for lucrative state insurance contracts.

The insurance men turned out to be undercover FBI agents, with Hauser as their stalking horse.

Hauser agreed to go undercover for the FBI after pleading guilty in Phoenix, Ariz., to a a scheme in which numerous union welfare and pension funds were bilked for millions in multi-state transactions. In his deal with the FBI. Hauser was to use his

Security ordered for Little's retrial

SALINAS, Calif. (AP) - Special security precautions were ordered today when the second murder trial of former Symbionese Liberation Army member Russell Little opens in a Monterey County

Little was convicted of the 1973 slaying of Oakland School Superintendent Marcus Foster and the attempted killing of Robert Blackburn, then assistant school chief. But last year, the state Supreme Court reversed the 1975 conviction, saying the trial judge gave an improper instruction to the jury

Defense attorney Stuart Hanlon said he may call William and Emily Harris to testify on Little's behalf. The Harrises are in prison on convictions stemming from the kidnapping of newspaper heiress Patricia Hearst in 1974.

Sheriff Bud Cook declined to discuss all the security measures

Medicine chest isn't best place for medicine

Dear Dr. Solomon: I have a sisterin-law who believes she's an expert in everything. Regardless of the topic, she has an answer. Her latest gem is that the bathroom medicine chest is not the place for drugs. If a medicine chest is not meant to be used for medicine, what is? - Carrie

Dear Carrie: I don't know aboutyour sister-in-law's track record in other areas, but in regard to what she says about the medicine cabinet, she happens to be right. Drugs can be kept anywhere in the home that is cool and dry, and where they cannot be reached by children. The bath-room, on the other hand, is often warm and damp, the very kind of environment that tends to diminish the effectiveness of medications. This can be a serious problem, especially for drugs that are purchased in fairly large quantities for use over an extended period of time. The potential complications should this occur are apparent. If a drug loses its effectiveness because it is not stored properly, a physician may prescribe a larger dose. However, when the prescription is refilled and the patient obtains a new supply, the same dose may prove to be excessive.

I would add one more precaution in handling of medications — keep the container tightly closed. This not only is a safety measure, but helps assure the drugs' continued potency.

Dear Dr. Solomon: One of my closest friends and another woman with whom I work recently had surgery for breast cancer. My friend first became aware of a lump in her breast through self-examination; the other womandid not know she had a tumor until her

doctor informed her of it. While I try to make it a practice of performing breast self-examination routinely, there are many times that it slips my mind, and other times when I know I do a haphazard job. Medical facilities in my community have sponsored mass screening programs for high blood pressure and a variety of other diseases, and I'd like to know why they don't do the same for breast cancer. Do you know of any reason?

Dear Sue: Mass screening for breast cancer is not performed because it is not practical; that is, the cost of conducting such a screening is not worth the benefits that would be achieved.

Dr. Michael J. Brennan, professor of medicine at Wayne State University. School of Medicine in Detroit,

notes that the cost of screening all women 40 to 70 years of age in the United States would have to be kept within \$4 a year if it were to be economically practical. Actually, his experience in poviding such screening to 10,000 women as part of a cancer control demonstration project shows that the cost is about \$60 for each examination.

The best approach to breast cancer prevention is self-examination plus regular screening of high-risk women. Included in this category are women who have never been pregnant, never given birth, or who had a baby at an advanced age, Other women at risk include those with a history of breast cancer in their families, and those who have had a mastectomy, oophorectomy (removal of an ovary), or some benign breast abnormality.

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

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
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


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Midland's housing need

Most Midlanders probably would agree with the reasons that prompted more than 100 residents to show up last week at City Council chambers protesting an apartment complex planned for construction just east of Midland Drive in far West Midland.

Their fears are obvious and understandable; they're fears with which most people can relate. The neighborhood in question is a working class mix. The residents aren't wealthy; they work hard for what they own - including their homes.

The residents of that neighborhood, like most others throughout the nation, have heard the horror stories about low-income housing projects that can become eyesores in communities and shelter undesirable individuals. Some rental subsidy projects have suffered abuse and neglect, and been transformed into examples of the kind of housing projects Midland doesn't want or need.

But Midland has a problem. There isn't enough housing to go around and the city is experiencing a tremendous in-migration as it has for a number of years. To provide for the burgeoning population, Midland literally needs all the housing it can get.

The supply-and-demand factor boosts prices here to the point that housing becomes unaffordable for the elderly on fixed incomes, the handicapped and low-income workers, and a difficult stretch for workers living on a limited budget. It's important that Midland's growth doesn't overlook the housing needs of low-income workers or the elderly anymore than the needs of those who can

The fact that 40 of the units would be rented on a rental subsidy basis while 46 would be rented on a competitive market basis should help relieve the anxieties of neighborhood residents who seem to fear a rundown apartment complex that would diminish the value of their own property.

It really wouldn't be wise for the city to get involved since the site in question already is zoned for apartment construction. The real question to be answered here is do the interests of the landowners inthe location under consideration take precedence over the needs of the Midland population as a whole in regard to housing.

As much as we can appreciate the concerns of the landowners, the answer to that question has to be an unequivocal no.

Wars are fought in jungles and in U.S. living rooms

If I were an advisor to El Salvador, my first and most urgent recommendation would be to expell the foreign press and impose strict censorship of

You may think that is a shocking recommendation coming from a member of the press, but actually it is only common sense. There is no virtue in refusing to admit the key role press coverage plays in the kind of war that is being fought in El Salva-

The world has become a small stage, thanks to the communications revolutions, and wars, even one as small as that one in El Salvador, are fought on a global basis. Not only do the arms and money for both sides flow in from outside nations, but so also are the psychological, diplomatic and political aspects of the war fought on a global basis.

The communists know this. Not only are they supporting the guerrillas in El Salvador with arms and money, but they have activated their worldwide net of propaganda and disinformation. Their number one object tive, just as it was during the Vietnam War, is to prevent the United States from effectively supporting the gov ernment which is opposing the com-



A captured North Vietnamese officer told Gen. Lewis Walt, the U.S. commander of I Corps in Vietnam, that while the Americans were winping on the battlefield, they were losing the war at home. He was, of course, exactly right.

In Vietnam, we stupidly failed to realize this and so by manipulating American public opinion, the communists were able to force not only our withdrawal from Vietnam, but to insure that once we did withdraw, we would not prevent them from finishing their task. Today, Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos are all communist.

The same pattern was repeated in Nicaragua and to some extent in Iran as American newsmen placed the role of unwitting pawns in a global psychological war. It is beginning to be repeated in the El Salvador war.

It is important to understand that war has not changed, but what has changed is communications technology, primarily the predominance of television. World War II was just as grim and horrible, just as much a combination of failures and success, as the Vietnam War. But in World War II, the U.S. imposed strict censorship. What the American people learned about the war was controlled The war was reported to the American people on strictly a good-guysversus-bad-guys basis and we were the good guys. Furthermore, Nazi and Japanese agents and sympathisers were not allowed to operate freely in the United States. There was no film coverage of the horrible fire bombings of Dresden and Tokyo followed by demonstrations, peace marches, teach-ins, and mock war crimes trials. In other words, we fought an all-out war, not only militarily, but psychologically, politic ally, and diplomatically. Every American who was old enough to be aware remembers that every German and every Japanese was depict ed as a total villain without any re deeming virtues.

Frankly, most civilians don't have the stomach for war. They may support national objectives in theory, but if they have to look at the bloody carnage in color on their home creens, they will be repelled by it This natural repugnance is then exploited by communist propaganda agents to erode the political support of the U.S. government, to disparage the government we are trying to help, and to enhance the image of the communist forces.

Because the communists do not allow the free press to witness their side of the war, the viewer ends up with a one-sided picture. When they do admit a Western newsman, they do so only to accomplish a specific objective and they carefully control what he is allowed to see.

If we are going to put down communist subversion, then we had better learn from our past mistakes and understand that the war must be fought in the United States living rooms as well as in the jungles of Ei-

'Psychic probers' seeking hazy ESP gap

WASHINGTON - In James Bond circles, nothing is too farfetched to be dismissed. The Central Intelligence Agency, for example, has been toying for years with the idea of using extrasensory perception in its work spurred on by the suspicion that the Russians have somehow succeeded in opening an ESP gap.

I've already reported on the Pentagon's \$6-million-a-year research to develop ESP weapons that can brainwash or incapacitate enemy leaders by thought transfer, deliver nuclear bombs instantaneously thousands of miles away by psychic energy, or even create a protective "time warp" to make incoming Soviet missiles explode harmlessly in the past.

These wacky projects have support from the Defense Intelligence Agency, which reports that the Russians have been doing intensive research in the field for nearly 50 years. The DIA even credits the omnipotent Kremlin scientists with successfully demonstrating ESP's deadly potential on insects, a possibility that should bring joy to farmers and backyard gardeners - and strike terror in the insecticide industry.

The ClA, though historically less alarmist about the Red Menace than the Pentagon spooks are, has also been monitoring Soviet ESP research and pondering the possibility of less bizarre psychic weapons. A top-secret report on the subject by a CIA scientific expert has been examined by my associate Dale Van Atta.

The analysts estimated that "the Soviet military and KGB have had a covert applied parapsychology program since the mid-1960s." This was the period when the CIA was experimenting with hallucinogenic drugs on unsuspecting Americans and with foot powder that would make Fidel Castro's beard fall out.

The CIA warns that the Soviets may be "ahead of the U.S. in parapsychol-

' Evidence of Soviet progress is sketchy because the Kremlin's voodoo scientists, the CIA suspects, have gone undercover. Intelligence sources estimate that at least 200 Soviet experts in various disciplines are working on ESP weapons development.

The CIA report identified several specific areas of suspected Soviet study

'Electrostatics of telekinesis," or the ability to move objects by mental concentration.

The area of Soviet ESP research that really has the CIA's mouth watering is the possibility of "remote viewing" by telepathy from thousands of miles away. Who'd need a mole in the Kremlin if a psychic

sitting at a desk in Washington could zoom in mentally on a super-secret Soviet missile site or a Politburo

They wish their working conditions were anywhere near as enjoyable. Instead, Quayle pays an experienced congressional employee a starting salary of about \$14,000 a year with just eight days of vacation

Cabinet system's limits shown by auto import indecision

By ROWLAND EVANS AND ROBERT NOVAK

WASHINGTON - The Reagan Cabinet system spent a month wrestling with Japanese auto imports only to reach a non-solution so worrisome that at the March 19 Cabinet meeting Deputy Secretary of State William P. Clark had to come to the rescue.

Clark expressed the absent Secretary Alexander Haig's wishes that the State Department take the lead in trade talks with Japan, putting Special Trade Representative William Brock in a supporting role. Quick agreement meant that the State Department, not deeply involved until now, was coming in to execute policy after failure of Cabinet government to shape it clearly in its first serious

The administration consensus reached was U.S. support for a "unilateral voluntary quota" on Japanese auto exports, but nobody in the administration is quite sure what that means. Who wi'l determine whether the quota — "unilaterally" and "voluntarily" set by Tokyo — is too high? The arrival on stage by the State Department insures the Japanese will not be roughed up to "unilaterally volunteer" a quota smaller than they

That scarcely amounts to coherent administration policy. The new Cabinet system has failed to approach agreement on an issue where Presient Reagan himself is ambivalent. This suggests the chaos that would have ensued in the Cabinet over tax olicy had not Reagan's position been o hard in pressing for rate reduc-





Instead of presenting the president with a unified recommendation on auto imports, the Cabinet exposed its own inherent splits. These disagree ments transcend the auto import crisis and go to the basic question of governmental intervention in the

Three millionaire businessmen in the Cabinet - Transportation Secretary Drew Lewis, Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldridge and Labor Secretary Ray Donovan - favor intimate cooperation between government, business and organized labor in rebuilding the economy. Heads of those departments are not ordinarily involved intimately in drafting high economic policy, traditionally a Treasury function.

But under the Reagan Cabinet system, a task force on the auto industry headed by Lewis very nearly established a limit on Japanese imports as administration policy. The traditional economic policy-making departments, headed by the Treasury, belatedly counter-attacked against what they called Lewis's "runaway" task

By March 11, Lewis had been stopped cold; the Cabinet was hopelessly split. Treasury and the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) wanted the issue taken to the president's desk in disagreement. But Lewis protested, contending this violated Cabinet government. Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan was talked into it, giving the protectionists more time to finagle a low quota or other import limitation.

The complicating factor was that nobody was entirely certain what the president would do if the matter reached him in disagreement. "The old man is not all that tough on this one," one anti-quota White House aide confided to us. Worried about the sick auto industry, Reagan is torn between free trade philosophy and his sympathy for the U.S. companies and workers. That led to a March 17 Cabinet-level

luncheon out of which leaked inaccurate reports about capitulation by Treasury and OMB to a Japanese quota. The only agreement was on the 'unilateral voluntary' quota now so deeply steeped in ambiguity.

Behind this is a genuine lack of consensus in the Cabinet over how economic policy should be conducted. Pro-quota partisans believe that willingness by United Auto Workers (UAW) President Douglas Fraser to scale down workers' benefits in return for the Chrysler benefit should not go unrewarded. "We can't let Doug down," Labor Secretary Donovan said in one meeting.

"I think we ought to let Doug simmer in his own juices," an anti-quota Cabinet colleague said later. That fits

But for their part, Lewis and other Cabinet businessmen regard Stockman as a non-businessman who does not understand the problems of troubled industries. A smaller group has been trying to



Search for bodies ends

COCOA BEACH, Fla. (AP) - The search for bodies amid the broken concrete and twisted metal of a collapsed five-story condominium has been halted by officials who say the 11th body pulled from the rubble probably is the last.

The whereabouts of several workers who may have been at the building site when the collapse occurred Friday still were unknown. But authorities no longer believe they were pinned beneath the tons of debris. The search for bodies ended early today.

The remains of 22-year-old Darrell Nowakowski were found Sunday afternoon, 48 hours after the accident that one inspector termed the worst construction disaster in Florida history. The bodies of 10 other construction workers were found Friday and

Meanwhile, teams of investigators from state and federal agencies interviewed survivors and studied the rubble-strewn site.

Cocoa Beach Fire Chief Robert Walker said several workers still were unaccounted for, based on information pieced together from relatives and witnesses. But the list was "nothing firm," he said.

Mike Mervis, a spokesman for Univel Inc., the contractor and co-developer of the ruined Harbour Cay condominium, said investigators from the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration would meet today with company officials. Univel was also conducting its own investigation into the

Several workers at the site had charged the pace of construction was so fast that concrete throughout the condominium wasn't given enough time to dry.

Investigators have refused to comment on the charge.

Mervis said the company would decide within two weeks whether to rebuild the 45-unit structure, part of a planned five-building, \$10 million riverfront project with condominium apartments starting at

Officials said about 80 percent of the units had been bought. A condominium saleswoman, who asked not to be identified, said she had received several calls from peple lookig for bargains in the wake of the

"They were calling in to see if anyone had canceled so they could get a good deal," she said.

Nowakowski's body was pulled from the dusty wreckage of what had been the second floor of the

The young man had begun work on the project as a glazier just one day before the building collapsed, said his father, Con Nowakowski, a Brevard County insurance agent who insured Harbour Cay.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas senators and representatives now know where they stand before legislative districts are redrawn according to 1980 census figures. 'Profiles" that show exactly the 1980 population and racial makeup of each Senate and House district, down to rural areas in the rest of the state will be held this the neighborhood area, have been prepared for each week. senator and representative.

and House districts in 1983 Legislature is the big question

The same holds true for the 24 present congressional districts plus the three new districts awarded Texas for population growth the past decade.

Many consider redistricting the No. 1 task of the 67th Legislature because it will affect every legislative and congressional district, and indirectly every voter in the

If the legislative redistricting cannot be completed by the end of this regular session on June 1, the task will be turned over to a constitutionally-decreed redistricting board - the lieutenant governor, speaker, attorney general, land commissioner and comptroller. All are Demo-

If the Legislature cannot agree on new congressional districts, the matter could be considered by a special legislative session called by Gov. Bill Clements, a Repub-

Hopes are high now that legislative redistricting can be completed by June 1 with each house writing its own

There is plenty of speculation that a special session may be required for congressional redistricting because of the limited time left, plus growing pressure to turn legislators' attention to the 1982-83 budget. Clements has

warned legislators to cut \$2.5 billion from the planned \$26 billion state spending bill to handle the cut in federal funds because of President Ronald Reagan's austerity pro-

One public hearing has been held by the House redistricting committee, covering most of the non-metropolitan House districts in East Texas. Hearings for other

Beginning about April 13 the committee will hold two Just what the boundaries will be for those 181 Senate weeks of hearings for the big city House districts including Harris, Bexar, Nueces, Dallas, Tarrant, Travis, Jefferson and El Paso counties.

The House hearings will get non-legislative input from a 24-member advisory committee, named by Clayton, which has been invited to sit in on every hearing.

The House committee's aim is to report the final bills on House districts and congressional districts the week of May 4 with the House redistricting bill to be debated the reek of May 11 and the congressional bill the week of May

The Senate redistricting committee, which includes all 32 members of the Senate, has a different approach. Subcommittees will hold hearings throughout the state to

For the next three weeks the Senate plans to adjourn on Wednesday so senators will be able to attend the hearings

The first hearing will be Thursday for much of East Texas at the Smith County courthouse in Tyler. The next day, Friday, there will be a hearing at the Lubbock County courthouse for West Texas.

The next week there will be a hearing at Corpus Christi on April 9, Thursday, for South Texas and the Valley. On Friday, April 10, the hearing will be in San Antonio for the Bexar County metropolitan area.

Indictments due in Wood death?

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - A federal grand jury has heard all the witnesses it subpoenaed, and federal officials have indicated indictments could be handed up soon in connection with the assassination almost two years ago of U.S. District Judge John

The panel recessed Friday after the 10th and final witness, Theresa Starr Jasper, 23, went to jail rather than tell what she knows about the shooting in front of Wood's townhouse.

Federal officials refused to answer

questions about when the grand jury would reconvene, although indications were the panel might come back together Wednesday.

Targets in the investigation have been identified as El Paso brothers Jimmy and Joe Chagra and convicted hit man Charles V. Harrelson, who is married to Ms. Jasper's mother.

Ms. Jasper was ordered jailed 60 miles away in Uvalde County Jail after she refused to answer about a dozen questions while she was in front of the grand jury, despite being granted immunity from prosecution.
Officials said she had the key to the

jail "in your pocket" because she could e release whenever she decided to answer the grand jury's questions. They had her jailed in Uvalde because of overcrowded conditions in the Bexar County Jail at San Anto-

FBI director William Webster said in Washington, D.C., last week that officials know who ordered Wood's assassination and who carried out the contract and that a solution in the case was imminent.

Dallas newspapers quoted sources

as saying federal officials had a tape recording of a conversation between the Chagra brothers last year in a federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan., in which Jimmy Chagra told his brother that he hired Harrelson to kill

Daniel hearing continues

LIBERTY, Texas (AP) — It was back to court again today for what has to rank as one of the most unusual child custody cases in Texas history.

Liberty County prosecutors view the case as a dress rehearsal for the murder trial of Vickie Daniel, 33, who has pleaded innocent by reason of self defense in the Jan. 19 shooting of her husband, former Texas House Speaker Price Dan-

Daniel's sister, Jean Daniel Murph of Richardson, went to court almost immediately, contending her sister-in-law is an unfit mother and asking for custody of the Daniel's two children, Franklin Baldwin, 3, and Marion Price IV, 1.

But the child custody trial, now going into its third week, has been but "a preliminary to the main event" from the start.

Mrs. Daniel's attorney, Richard "Racehorse" Haynes, began taking her through the events leading to the shooting. She said she got a rifle, loaded it and ordered her husband to leave their ranch home after he had kicked and beaten her in a dispute concerning their proposed divorce.

She said she "heard a funny sound" but didn't actually recall firing the shot that killed Daniel. 'In my nine years of prosecuting, this is the

first time I've seen a case develop in this manner," said Assistant District Attorney Jerry

Haynes sought at first to have any questions about the shooting barred from the custody trial, but then Mrs. Daniel waived her Fifth Amendment rights and testified to the events surrounding the

The protests by Haynes may have been a ploy by the flamboyant lawyer to get J.C. "Zeke" Zbranek, Mrs. Murph's attorney, to press for revelations about the shooting, Andress speculates.

That, Andress said, would open the way for Haynes to delve into the prosecution's evidence before the murder trial began.

Andress said he's not concerned about a premature release of the information.

"The defense has an opportunity to see the state's evidence anyway, so they won't get an advantage," Andress said.

Haynes began delving into the investigation of the shooting last week. In questions to members of the Liberty County sheriff's department, Haynes was critical about the failure of investigators to photograph and record evidence at the Daniel residence the night of the shooting.

Haynes suggested the sheriff's department was partial to Daniel and his family.

Chief Deputy Clay Autrey testified that in the two weeks following Daniel's death Mrs. Murph paid him \$1,860 to provide guards for the Daniel home while he was supervising the investigation of the

Autrey said he was given \$7 an hour to arrange for off-duty deputies to guard the home and paid them \$6 an hour, keeping \$1 fro him-

Liberty County Sheriff C.L. "Buck" Eckols was unaware of the arrangement, Autrey said.



Demeaning, abusive treatment caused death of Army private

FORT BENNING, Ga. (AP) - An Army private who was ordered to a drill field hours after he was released from a hospital was subjected to demeaning and abusive treatment" before he died of heat stroke, an Army investigation has concluded.

Maj. Roland J. White, who conducted the investigation, said the treatment of Jeffrey Ray Savoy, 17, resulted from "his superiors' actions, insensitivity and lack of concern for his condition.

Results of White's investigation last fall were published Sunday in The Atlanta Journal and The Atlanta Constitution. They were obtained by the Atlanta Journal under the Freedom of Information Act,

Savoy, a recruit from Kent, Wash., died of heat stroke Sept. 16, 1980 the same day he was released from a hospital. He had lost 40 pounds during his month-long hospital stay, but doctors were unable to find any physical illness.

The Army documents indicated that, despite the hospitalization, Savoy's superiors

Roderick's journalism career, which spanned more than 50 years, included founding several area radio stations and El Paso's first television station. After a stint as a \$30-a-week Associated Press reporter in Oklahoma, Roderick moved to Texas, where he published The Plains Journal, The Lubbock Evening Journal and The Lubbock Avalanche-Jour-

nal before coming to El Paso. Roderick became president of the El Paso Herald and The Times in late 1928, just eight days before his 28th birthday.

Scipps-Howard, publishers of his competition, The Post, purchased The Herald in 1931 and consolidated the two newspapers.

The same year, Roderick filed application with the Federal Communications Commission for a radio station permit. Radio station KROD — the "ROD" standing for Roderick - went on the air in 1940 as a 250-watt station.

Later, he organized radio station KSIL in Silver

City, N.M., and KOSA in Odessa. Eventually, Roderick organized Newspaper Print-

Karen Ann Quinlan's survival gave parents time to adjust

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - For six years now, the plight of Karen Ann Quinlan has fired controversy over the legal and moral obligations of keeping someone artificially alive after the person's brain

But long after the highly publicized legal battles that won her family the right to remove Karen from life-sustaining apparatus, there lingers a question that has proved just as puzzling.

"No one has ever determined why Karen went into a coma," her father, Joseph Quinlan, said during a recent interview.

The leading theory is that Karen, who turned 27 on Sunday, had unknowingly mixed alcohol and a tranquilizer at a birthday party for a friend.

However, Karen's parents say their daughter did not have a drug problem. And a New York neurologist recently disclosed that his examinations of Karen and her medical records show she simply had too much to drink at the party and choked probably on her own vomit - and was without oxygen for up to a half-hour.

Immediately after Karen's parents initiated legal action to have their adopted daughter removed from a respirator, rumors that the young woman had a history of alcohol and drug abuse began to surface. A roommate, Robin Croft, denied the rumors, but

used drugs at least once. 'Karen was not a drunk," Ms. Croft said in 1975.

"Karen drank a lot but she could consume a lot. We went out to tie one on about once in a week, but it wasn't a problem.

"Karen was new to the drug habit," Ms. Croft continued. "She might have taken a few pills for a high but she wasn't that impulsive. She looked be-

On April 14, 1975, Karen and several friends went to a local tavern to celebrate a friend's birthday.

A boy drove her back to the cottage she shared with Ms. Croft, Mrs. Quinlan said.

"When he went to check her later, she was breathing badly," she said.

Mrs. Quinlan said Karen was given mouth-tomouth resuscitation, and the police were called. However, the damage was done. Karen had stopped breathing, and her brain had been without oxygen for up to 30 minutes.

When she was admitted to Newton Memorial Hospital, the diagnosis was "drug-induced coma," but her parents disagree with that analysis.

Doctors have considered four possibilities: Mixing drugs and alcohol; a chronic blood sugar problem; a 2-week-old head injury, and possible lead poisoning from her work in a ceramics factory.

Karen also had started a crash diet the day of the

fateful party, doctors learned.
But Dr. Julius Korein, a noted neurologist who examined Karen and hundreds of other coma patients, says none of these theories is valid.

"Karen Ann Quinlan was drinking gin and tonic and choked," he insisted in a recent telephone interview with The Associated Press.

"There was no evidence to indicate a drug-alcohol reaction. She had less than a therapeutic dose of Valium in her blood.

"She was drunk, she choked - probably on her own vomit - and was without oxygen for 15 to 30 minutes," says Korein, a professor of neurology at the New York University Medical Center and chief of electroencephalography at Bellevue Medical Center in New York City.

Administration officials at Newton Memorial Hospital, where Karen initially was taken, declined to comment on her condition when she arrived there. However, the Quinlans' attorney, Paul W. Armstrong, says Korein had full access to all her medical records and should be well aware of her condition.

Police reports showed when a rescue squad arrived on the scene, Karen was "blue, not breathing and pulseless," Korein says.

Later, she developed aspiration pneumonia, he

Based on his Oct. 10, 1975, examination, Korein found Karen was not "brain dead" but was in a 'persistent vegetative state."

The neurologist says Karen stands no better than a 1,000-to-1 chance of recovering.

Myers, boss at Social Security, to be lowest paid employee

WASHINGTON (AP) - At about \$2,000 a year, Robert J. Myers figures he will be the lowest paid employee in the Social Security Administration. And he'll be one of the bosses, at that.

The 68-year-old Myers will help chart policy as a deputy commissioner, the second highest position in

Myers will continue to draw a \$49,000 federal pension from his earlier career at Social Security from 1934 until 1970. But the customary \$51,000 salary for his job will be reduced by the amount of his aonuity.

Myers also is giving up an equivalent outside income from work as a consultant and professor that he said had pushed his earnings into the six-figure


His appointment by the Reagan administration marks both a return and a restoration of Myers, who fired a well-publicized salvo at Social Security's liberal leadership when he quit as chief actuary in

Even before he quit, Myers broke with civil service protocol by writing signed articles for Reader's Digest and other magazines assailing "expansionists" whom he charged "could soon steer Social Security down a dangerously unsound financial

In a resignation letter printed in the Congressional Record, Myers warned that Democratic holdovers from the Johnson administration "have not - and will not - faithfully and vigorously serve the Nixon administration. Rather; they will exert their efforts to expand the Social Security program as much as

Today, the white-haired Myers speaks in mellower tones, saying the movement to expand Social Security "greatly slackened off after 1972" and ardently defending the program against charges that it is not a good buy for young workers.

Myers is on an interdepartmental task force preparing options on how the Reagan administration can put the troubled \$136 billion program on a sound footing both for the near future and the next cen-

Myers was on a Reagan transition task force that recommended sweeping changes in Social Security, including a gradual shift to age 68 instead of 65 for full benefits, a phase-out of spouses' benefits and changes in benefit formulas to lower both initial payments and cost-of-living increases.

Myers also served on the National Commission on Social Security. He voted with the majority in favor of a higher retirement age, but voted against its call for using general revenues to pay for half of Medi-Myers has been an outspoken critic of "double

dippers" - federal workers who draw both civil service and Social Security pensions. He has found that 80 percent of civil service retirees also qualify for Social Security at 62 and-Medicare at 65. "They're getting windfall benefits," said Myers,

who added that from his own work outside government in the past decade, he and his wife could draw a "phenomenal" Social Security benefit of \$1,000 a month were he not still working.

, The Reagan administration has proposed an immediate end to the minimum Social Security benefit of \$122 a month, charging that it goes to many federal workers and others who are not poor. Critics contend many poor elderly women would be harmed by eliminating the minimum payment.

Myers says double-dippers usually get far more than the minimum from Social Security. "Generally, I believe in phasing things in, but there are times when I believe in quick action," he said. But he added, "If I was not in step with the Reagan administration, I wouldn't be here."

Oscars mean gold for stars, studios

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - After spending nearly \$3 million on an advertising blitz to promote the nominees, the film industry is awaiting the results of tonight's Academy Awards with visions of bulging box-office re-

The 131/2-inch, gold-plated statuettes may look prestigious on a shelf, but the real gold associated with the Oscars comes in different forms.

For instance, a winner such as last year's best actress - Sally Field, star of "Norma Rae" - could expect a jump of several hundred thousand dollars for each subsequent film and the pick of scripts.

The best-picture award often means an extra \$5 million to \$10 million at the box office, according to industry experts, as well as increased revenue from television, cable and

Film companies attempted to sway Academy voters by spending between \$2 million and \$3 million on trade paper advertisements, special screenings and the like during the past weeks. After the awards are announced, new ads will tout the win-

United Artists expanded the potential audience for "Raging Bull" by bringing it into 690 theaters last Friday. The film was nominated for eight awards, and its star, Robert De Niro,

is the favorite to win as best actor. Said a company spokesman: "The film market is slow right now, and we're hoping that 'Raging Bull' will

pick up a number of Oscars.' Paramount, with "Ordinary People" expected to win for best picture, had no plans to widen the film's re-

lease, although it certainly would ac-

cept new bookings. The film is now playing in 400 theaters. The film's director, Robert Redford, is considered a good bet for best director.

Universal, with Sissy Spacek the favorite as best actress in "Coal Miner's Daughter," doesn't plan to rerelease its film. Said Gordon Armstrong, the company's advertising, publicity and promotion vice president: "The last trip around was not too successful, and the picture has about played itself out. An Oscar is not too important unless it's for best picture and/or a lot of awards."

Industry experts note the annual celebration by the Academy of Motion Pictures, Arts and Sciences also has an impact worldwide. This year's telecast will be viewed in 65 countries with an audience predicted to be 300

The ABC television network will carry the ceremonies in the United States, beginning at 9 p.m. CST. Johnny Carson returns as emcee, and Lucie Arnaz stars in the opening number, appropriately entitled "Hoooray for Hollywood!"

Meanwhile, movie fans who want to place a wager on their favorite nominee are out of luck this year in Nevada. State gaming authorities have outlawed non-sport betting in casino sports books.

"This year the Oscars will have to go on without us," said oddsmaker Bob Martin, considered by many to be the dean of Nevada oddsmakers. In previous years Martin has set odds on the Oscars along with his other betting propositions.

Nevada gaming authorities cracked down recently after a wave of publicity over Martin's bet-taking on the identity of the villain who shot J.R. in the popular "Dallas" televi-

ABC affiliate cancels show when staff hoax made public

NEW YORK (AP) - ABC's New York affiliate has canceled what was supposed to be an audience-participation program on the grounds that the contents were largely made up by several employees.


The cancellation reportedly came after a man from Queens filed suit because his name had been used without his permission, according to a station

Bill Fyffe, the vice president and general manager, appeared on the air Saturday at 7 p.m., the show's starting time, to announce that "Airmail Special" was being canceled immediately.

Fyffe said what had been billed as an audienceparticipation program was largely the concoction of several employees of the show. They had misled not only viewers, but the show's host, John Johnson, and several WABC reporters who appeared intermittently on the program, he said.

An unidentified source told The New York Times the incident that led to the lawsuit began when the show decided to do a feature about "how to lose your New York accent." A staff member on the show suggested attributing the letter to one of his neighbors in Queens. The neighbor, Phil Medici, sued the station after the segment ran.

In his announcement, Fyffe said that "most of the letters were made up by members of the program




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Oil producers rush to cash in on \$1 billion loophole

(c) 1981, Dallas Times Herald WASHINGTON — During the past two months dozens of oil producers have rushed to cash in on a \$1 billion loophole opened in federal regulations after President Reagan decontrolled oil prices.

The oil companies are taking advantage of a program originally created to encourage investments in risky and expensive techniques to extract oil from old oil fields.

Although the program expired with the end of crude oil price controls on Jan. 28, the Energy Department interpreted existing rules to give com-panies two more months in which to qualify for re-imbursements, which can run up to \$20 million per project.

The response was, in the words of one Energy Department document, "phenomenal."

In order to get the maximum reimbursement in February and March, many producers are submitting claims for pre-paid costs of projects that won't even begin until 1982. Producers are contracting with drillers, chemical companies and, in some cases, their own subsidiaries for goods and services that won't be used until the mid-1980s, according to Energy Department officials.

Moreover, the producers are squeezing money out of the program to back projects that, under decontrol, almost certainly would be profitable without the subsidy.

"These expenditures are not the kind we were trying to encourage,' said Ben McRae, a lawyer with the Energy Department. "The program was not to help people subsidize projects that would be undertaken "People are taking advantage of a

loophole in the regulations. But if everything is done exactly by the regulations it is completely legal." When the accountants caught up with the lawyers, the Energy Department filed notice that it was going stop the two-month extension on

The program was designed to foster what the oil industry calls tertiary production.

Tertiary production techniques involve a range of methods to squeeze some extra production out of depleted oil wells. Normal, or primary, recovery usually leaves about two-thirds of the oil in the ground. Waterflooding is the next step, or secondary recovery. It involves pumping water into the oil reservoir near a producing well to force out as much as 10 percent more of the original oil.

"People always say, 'Nobody can be that good,'" says UCLA's Coach Larry Brown, a former Smith understudy. "They dismiss him as some kind of goody two shoes. But that's the way he is ... a good, caring person.

Nobody says that about Knight, the curly-haired terror who kicks chairs, grabs players by the nape of the neck and

occasionally shoves a tormentor against the wall - as he did Saturday night to a Louisiana State fan with whom he got into a shoving-cussin' match. It happened in the lounge of a suburban Cherry Hill, N.J., motel after Knight's Hoosiers had crushed te Bayou Tigers in the NCAA semifinals.

"WE DIDN'T trade shoves," Knight said later of the incident. "I did the shoving. We didn't trade insults - he did the insulting."

Thus the NCAA Championship Final in Philadelphia's Spectrum, one of sport's premier spectacles, focuses the spotlight on the two brain trusts on the sidelines, subordinating the activities of the young men on the floor.

They are the two foremost college coaches in the country, moving into sacred spheres once reserved for such predecessors. as Phog Allen, Hank Iba, Adolph Rupp and John Wooden.

SMITH, NOW 50, a disciple of the immortal Phog Allen at Kansas, has a record of 19 winning seasons in the 20 he has been at N.C., 429 victories and 142 defeats, not counting the playoffs. This is his sixth time in the NCAA's Final Four, exceeded only

by Wooden's 11 times and 10 victories. The late Rupp made the finals six times, winning four. This is No.3 for Knight, whose Hoosiers won in 1976.

Knight, 40, a sub on the great Ohio State teams of the early , 1960s which included Jerry Lucas and John Havlicek, has established a remarkable record of 228 victories and

He is a born winner.

HE ALSO is a man with a split personality, arrogant and insulting often with the press, a strict disciplinarian whose dress codes went out of style a quarter of a century ago.

"I learned how to deal with the press from Woody Hayes," he once said, "and how to control my temper from Tom Weis-

He laughs at his subtle joke, referring to a coach who lost his job for socking an opposing player and a golfer with a renowned short temper fuse - both Ohioans.

He intimidates. Once after telling a player he must cut his long hair, the player, Mika Midday, replied, "Coach, I'll shave my head if you say so."

Yet, Bobby at times he can be witty and utterly charming. He also maintains tremendous influence over players who stay with him, encouraging them to get their degrees.

SMITH ALSO is a stickler for discipline, but without resorting to the big whip. He is thorough and inventive. Friends and former players say they never recall seeing him embarrass an athlete in public.

Says one rival coach: "Most of the guys who knock Dean are those who've spent time losing to him.

Knight, Smith match proves intriguing Long grind ends tonight

By MAL FLORENCE (c) 1981, The Los Angeles Times PHILADELPHIA — Indiana meets North Carolina Monday night at 7:15. p.m. for the NCAA basketball cham-

pionship at the Spectrum. That's one confrontation. The other matches the Hoosiers' Bobby Knight against the Tar Heel's Dean Smith. They're highly regarded

coaches with contrasting personalities and philosophical concepts about the game.

This matchup seems to intrigue the

collegiate basketball coaches gathgame

Knight is seeking his second NCAA championship. He won here in 1976 with a team that went 32-0. The present team hasn't matured yet (only one senior starter), Knight says, and could be even better next season.

Indiana (25-9) was struggling in December with a 7-5 record, including a 65-56 lost to North Carolina at Chapel Hill. But the Hoosiers haven't been extended during the tournament. They're winning now the Knight way crowding man-to-man defense and a patient, passing game offense.

SMITH'S teams have made the round of four six times during his successful 20-year career at Chapel Hill. The Tar Heels have advanced to the final game twice - against UCLA in 1968 and Marquette in 1977.

Mutliple defenses - zone, pressure and man-to-man - are Smith's style. He also substitutes liberally while Knight basically uses seven or eight regulars.

Knight is a demanding coach, sometimes tempestuous and a person who can't seem to avoid controversy. Smith is diplomatic and controlled and coaches somewhat like the chairman of a board.

Indiana is considered slightly more physical than North Carolina, but the Tar Heels may be quicker than the

"Indiana has great mental discipline," said Washington Coach Marv Harshman. "They don't get upset when something goes wrong, because they know if they do what Bobby says it will be all right.

"I WOULDN'T say that Knight coaches by fear but his players are afraid to lose. Smith coaches more from love, a father figure. But North Carolina is disciplined in its own way,

Harshman said that North Carolina has better individual talent than Indiana, but adds: "I thought LSU had much better talent than Indiana and they lost in the semifinals (67-49)." Oregon State Coach Ralph Miller,

whose Beavers were top-ranked part

of the season but lost an opening round tournament game to Kansas State, says that defense is the key to Monday night's game.

"I have a gut feeling that Indiana will win," Miller said, "but it's not a strong opinion. Whenever you get this far in the tournament, the team that plays the best defense usually wins. Both teams are good defensively, but which philosophy will be the best -Smith's or Knight's?'

Knight and Smith play down any significance of two, great coaching minds matching wits. But they will

Smith, like Knight, has done an admirable coaching job this season. North Carolina (29-7) has peaked at the right time and got to the final game by beating Virginia, 78-65, in the third meeting between the Atlantic Coast Conference schools. The Cavaliers won the first two games, but not the one that really mattered.

SOME PEOPLE are saying here that this is really a pressure game for Smith because he "hasn't won the big

"I think that's foolish criticism," he said. 'The years we've been here we weren't picked to win it. I think we've played awfully well in the NCAA. I think it (not winning the big one) is a compliment. Most teams would like to get to the final four every year and not win it. And if we win it, it will be one question I won't have to answer. Whether we win or lose, I'm not going to be a better coach than I am now.

Smith's clogging zone defense bothered Virginia's 7-4 center Ralph Sampson, who got only 11 points and 9 rebounds. Knight will, as usual, rely on his man-to-man alignment.

"I've never met a team that is as physically intimidating as Indiana without fouling you," Harshman said. They just get their bodies right up into you. What you try to do is sort of con them - start something offensively they recognize and then go to something else before they can

KNIGHT says that the Tar Heels present a problem because they "go from one defense to another as well as any team in the country.'

As for his own defensive philosophy, he said: "If I went to a zone, Henry Iba and Pete Newell would disown me."

Knight has sought the counsel of Iba, the former, great coach at Oklahoma A and M and Newell, who won the NCAA title as California's coach in 1959. Newell is here and has spent considerable time with Knight.

FROM A personnel standpoint, it would seem that North Carolina has a better front line with 6-9 Sam Perkins. 6-9 James Worthy and 6-6 Al Wood, who scored a record 39 points in the semifinal game against Virginia.

But Knight says that his 6-9 center. Ray Tolbert, was the Big 10's most valuable player and 6-10 Landon Turner is capable of breaking open a game - as he did against LSU.

North Carolina has competent guards in Jimmy Black and Mike Pepper, but Indiana's Isiah Thomas, sophomore All-American and his team's floor leader, may be the best guard in the country. How Wood and Thomas perform co-the key to the

In the third place or consolation game preceding the title affair, LSU (31-4) meets Virginia (28-4).

JIM MURRAY Campaneris... a baseball legend

Los Angeles Times PALM SPRINGS -- The California Angels run out on the practice field,

laughing, joking, hats on backward, little boys in grown men's uniforms. The needle is out, the mood is joyous, the rookies look happy just to be there. Off on the sides stands a somber, serious individual, a silent little man, leaning on his bat, on the California Angels, but not of them. He looks like a man who just heard he has been passed over for sergeant --

This is Dagoberto Blanco Campaneris, of Matanzas, Cuba, by way of Raytown, Mo. A baseball legend, but you'd never know it.

If there were justice in this world, Dagoberto should probably be the surest of these athletes around him to go to the Baseball Hall of Fame one day -- but Dagoberto knows full well there's now such thing.

DAGOBERTO Campaneris has, for 18 yers, been one of the best players in baseball. Only five players in the history of the game have stolen more bases. They are all in the Hall of Fame except one - and Lou Brock soon will be. The others are all the Who's Who of the game - Ty Cobb, Eddie Collins, Honus Wagner, Max

Bert Campaneris is probably the most shortchanged super star in the history of baseball, at least today. He has stolen more bases than any active player. Six times he led the league in steals. He set the league record for fewest times caught stealing in a

But, if anyone remembers Dagoberto Campaneris, it's for throwing a bat and nearly decapitating a relief pitcher in the 1972 playoff series. Campie, playing for Oakland at the time, had demoralized the Detroit Tigers' pitching staff in the first two games. In the second game, for instance, he led off with a hit, stole second, then stole third, then scored on Joe Rudi's single. In the third inning, he singled again and scored. In the fifth inning, he singled, then scored on a wild pitch he had attracted by pretending to dash for home on the pitcher's windup. The Tigers' manager, none other then Billy, himself, Martin, took this in stride which is to say that he instructed his pitcher, Larrin Legro, to drill Cam-paneris with an ankle-high fastball. The pitcher did, nearly fracturing the bone. Campaneris sailed his bat back out at him but Campie's control was off. And he missed. And he got suspended from the playoffs.

THE OAKLAND A's of the early 1970s were a raucous, brawling bunch of mustachioed brigands who took over baseball the way Morgan's pirates took over the Dry Tortugas. The headlines went to the Jacksons, the Vida Blues, the Catfish Hunters, the Sal Bandos and Blue Moon Odoms anybody but the silent, brooding shortstop who, day-in and day-out, was the catalyst for this improbable crew of tempermentalists. "George is still concerned about the fourth and fifth year," Schneider said. "The fast ball is Ron's 'out' pitch and George is asking what hap-pens if it goes after three years. He wants Ron to develop another pitch that could increase his longevity. I

think he could be satisfied if he feels comfortable that Ron is making good progress on developing a third pitch and doesn't get complacent because

he has the money."



Overlooking Campaneris became the real national pastime. Campie stole more bases, for instance, than Maury Wills, but Maury got the ink.



HE HIMSELF blames the usual bugaboo of the Carribbean athlete, language. "I'm Spanish," he explains carefully, as he stands around the batting cage with the other pensioners trying to eek one more year of baseball out of creeking legs. "If I am American and speak good English, I get honors. This way, I get, 'Hey, Campie, catch the ball!'"

Because he's playing at an age when most shortstops should be on a front porch rocker -- Campie's 39 -- he is heeling away at his lifetime figures, diminishing his decimal stature. But, so far as Hall of Fame consideration is concerned, it probably doesn't matter. "Dummy" Hoy never made it,



Congressional delays blamed for late checks

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress should permit government agencies to spend in advance of specific appropriations or else millions of people may face more frequent delays in getting their money, a new report to Congress suggests.

In the most complete report yet on an 11-day delay in approving money bills last October, the General Accounting Office said in a report now being studied in congressional offices that such gaps "have become the norm rather than the exception" as the appropriations process gets bogged down in wrangling over such touchy issues as abortion.

The GAO, a congressional watchdog agency, noted that in the last 20 years, 85 percent of agency appropriation bills have been passed after the beginning of a new fiscal year.

Last October, checks were delayed for 100,000 people going to school on the GI Bill, 22,000 victims of black lung disease, 1.6 million people in a nutrition program for mothers and infants and numerous others, the congressional auditors said.

'Had the funding gap continued for another week or two, federal payments would have been cut off to such large groups of beneficiaries as recipients of food stamps, veterans' compensation and military retirement pay," they said.

NAACP kicks off Klan alert

DETROIT (AP) - The Michigan NAACP says "a new climate of hate and terrorism against blacks in the United States" has prompted it to begin a "Klan Alert" program against the Ku Klux Klan and other extremist groups.

State leaders of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People met in Battle Creek Sunday to kick off what they say will be a non-violent attack on such groups, the Detroit Free Press reported in today's editions.

Honduras balks at prisoner deal

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) - The military government of Honduras apparently is reneging on a deal to free 15 jailed Salvadoran and Honduran leftists reportedly promised to the hijackers of a Honduran airliner before they surrendered in Panama.

"The army isn't planning on letting any leftist guerrillas leave for Panama," Maj. Julion Armando Pavon, the armed forces' spokesman, said Sunday. He added that the government has no plans for deportations of any kind.

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Vets say VA gave them shaft on Agent Orange

WASHINGTON (AP) - A lot of veterans aren't happy with the attention they got at Veterans Administration hospitals when they asked if exposure to the herbicice Agent Orange in Vietnam damaged their health.

A survey by the Veterans Adminis tration, made public Friday by Rep. Toby Moffett, D-Conn., showed that four veterans in 10 said "no" when asked if they felt "that the symptoms you reported were given the proper attention during the course of your examination.'

A third of the veterans reported going to a private doctor, outside the VA hospital system, because of a problem they associated with Agent

And only 17 percent who responded said they were told the results of laboratory tests.

As a result of that response, directives went to every VA medical center ordering that veterans be given written notice of the test results, according to Dr. Barclay Shepard, a VA official who directs the agency's Agent Orange research program.

In an interview, Shepard said his 'gut feeling" is that veterans are getting complete examinations, even if many of them do not perceive them that way.

The physicians I talk to seem to be dedicated, hard-working people," Shepard said. "I have reviewed the program and I come away with the feeling they know what they're doing and they do a good job.

So far, nearly 45,000 Vietnam veterans have asked to be examined to see if their health was jeopardized by possible exposure in Vietnam to the herbicide.

During the war, 12 million gallons of the substance was sprayed to destroy vegetation so U.S. forces could observe communist troop movements in the jungles.

Agent Orange contains dioxin, a deadly contaminant. Some veterans groups contend that as a result of exposure, an unusually high number of disorders have ocurred in Vietnam

Among the symptoms they list are kidney and liver damage; birth defects in the children of veterans; cancer, especially testicular cancer and tumors not normally found in young men; fatigue, weight loss and insomnia; a loss of sex drive; changes in skin color; sensitivity to light; numbless in the hands or feet; psychological changes; and chloracne, a severe skin disorder.

The VA is conducting scientific studies, but the results will not be known for years.

We are still gathering information," Shepard said. "We don't have any solid scientific evidence to date that suggests there is a direct cause and effect relationship between any disease and exposure to Agent Orange among Vietnam veterans.

The survey was taken among only a handful of veterans who have been examined.

Moffett was critical of the VA's program and of President Reagan's decision to close 91 storefront counseling centers where veterans could seek advice.

"Despite the very real concerns of the veterans, and despite their continued pressure on the VA to help them find answers, the VA has responded by burying its head in the sand," the congressman said.

The survey; taken among veterans who visited seven VA hospitals, found that 196 had a poor or "only fair" overall impression of their examinations and only 150 rated the exams good or very good.

Students may buy answers after SAT test has been taken

NEW YORK (AP) -The College Entrance Examination Board has voted to allow college applicants who take the Scholastic Aptitude Test to buy copies of the correct answers and their own answers to the test.

The decision comes at a time when several groups are urging a national "truth in testing" law requiring that every student get the information upon request.

The board decided Friday that students who take advantage of that option will be charged \$6.50 above the regular test fee, which was \$9.25 this year. The fee has not yet been set for next vear

The test is given 12 times annually, but the College Board said the new option will only be available for five test dates - Nov. 7, Dec. 5, May 1 and June 5, all Saturdays, and one Sunday, June 6.


Rep. Ted Weiss, D-N.Y., who has sponsored a national "truth in testing" law, said the College Board's action would improve chances penalties in cost, reducfor the passage of such a law this year.

New York State passed such a law last year over the objections of the testing industry, which argued the law was a costly, unwarranted intrusion into the college admission process.

The College Board, saying the law meant test questions could be used only once, immediately cut the number of test dates in the state to 'five a year and added a \$1.75 surcharge. Students must pay another \$4.65 if they wanted copies of their test form and the answers. College Board officials

President Reagan, three others wounded

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan was wounded in the left side in an assassination attempt Monday. His press secretary and two officers also were shot.

Reagan was conscious and his condition was stable, according to top White House aide Lyn Nofziger. Another spokesman, David Gergen, said the president had walked into the hospital and "a decision is now being made whether to operate to remove the bullet."

ABC News reported that the bullet had punctured a lung.

A White House spokesman had first said that Reagan was not hit when a gunman fired four to six shots at him as he emerged from the Washington Hilton Hotel.

Three other men were hit, including presidential press secretary James S.

"I can confirm that the president was shot once in the left side," Nof-ziger said at George Washington Hospital, where Reagan and Brady were taken.

"A bullet entered his left side. He's in stable condition and conscious and Mrs. Reagan is at his side."

Nofziger said, "The president was shot in the left chest. The bullet did not hit the heart.

"He is not undergoing surgery at this time," Nofziger, the White House political director, said. But, he added. 'my understanding is the bullet is still in him."

The Secret Service said John Warnock Hinkley Jr., 22, of Evergreen, Colo., was arrested. Secret Service spokesman Jack Warner said the suspect had fired a .38-caliber revolver.

Bush returning to Washington

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Vice President George Bush flew to Washington Monday after learning President Ronald Reagan had been wounded in an assassination attempt, according to a Bush spokesman. It was not known immediately if Bush's plane was airborne for Austin when notified of the shooting.

According to a report by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, an employee in the Secret Service office downtown saw the televised report of the shooting, notified the command post at the Hyatt Regency, where Bush had spoken, and the command post radioed the vice president at

was reported in critical condition at the Washington Hospital Center.

A television cameraman who was near the alleged assailant said Brady was shot in the forehead. The cameraman said the gunman "just opened up and started firing," about 10 feet from Reagan

Hank Brown, a cameraman for ABC, said he saw a white man with blond hair in his 30s fire at Reagan from about 10 feet away with a .38-caliber pistol.

He said Brady appeared to have been hit in the head.

"He just opened up and continued squeezing the trigger," Brown said. He said the assailant did not say anything. Brown said the man appeared to have "penetrated the press

Washington police said at least four

shots were fired. A reporter's tape recorder picked up six loud reports.

The burst of gunfire sounded as Reagan left the Washington Hilton Hotel after addressing a union convention. The president strode smiling from the hotel and walked toward his limousine a few paces away. He turned to acknowledge the shouts of "Mr. President" from newsmen seeking to question him.

Then came the burst of gunfire, at least four shots, perhaps as many as

Reagan appeared momentarily stunned. Secret Service agents drew their pistols as others hustled Reagan into the limousine. One shot apparently hit the automobile before Reagan got into it, blasting a hole in the rear window.

Hijackers let deadline pass

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Air-plane hijackers described as fanatic Moslems by Indonesian sources let another deadline pass today without apparent harm to their 55 hostages, including two Americans. The hijackers, who wounded an American during an escape attempt Sunday, are demanding \$1.5 million ransom and freedom for 80 "political prisoners" in Indonesia.

Thai police sharpshooters ringed the plane and a group of Indonesian commandos was reported at the Bangkok airport.

Thai officials said they oppose Indonesia yielding to the hijackers' demands, which have been altered several times since the Garuda Indonesian Airlines DC-9 was seized Saturday. There was discussion with Indonesian authorities about a commando attack on the aircraft.

A Thai official who has been briefing reporters on the crisis said that as m EST deadline approached the hijackers were told that 38 prisoners had been rounded up from Indonesian jails. He said their names were provided by telegraphed message from the Indonesian government and the hijackers said they would respond to the announcement later.

The hijackers, without explanation, reduced their prisoner-release demand to 80 people from 84 and allowed two officials to take food aboard. The Thai announcement that 38 prisoners were being assembled could not immediately be confirmed with Indonesian officials, who earlier balked at meeting the demands.

Government sources in Jakarta, the Indonesian capital, said the demands would not be met. The sources, who asked not to be identified, said Indonesia would allow Thai officials to attempt a peaceful settlement with the hijackers. If the attempt fails, one source said, "we will move in."

The five gunmen, armed with machine guns and explosives, originally demanded that 20 prisoners be freed. When Indonesian President Suharto agreed, the hijackers increased the number to 84, and agreement again was announced Sunday.

In Jakarta, Indonesian Vice President Adam Malik said the government "is fully responsible to solve the hijacking tragedy by all means as soon as possible" but would not comment beyond adding, "negotiations are under way."

Sharpshooters surrounded the Garuda Indonesian Airways DC-9, parked about a mile from the terminal building at Bangkok's Don Muang

At an adjacent military field, an Indonesian DC-10 stood by. It arrived Sunday night carrying the nation's deputy intelligence chief, and according to the sources, about 50 Indonesian commandos

An American shot by the hijackers Sunday was reported in stable condition today at a Bangkok hospital. A British captive escaped through an emergency exit earlier Sunday as airport workers refueled the plane.

Thai government spokesman Trairong Suwankiri said the hijac ers had demanded the dissidents be freed and flown, along with the money and a list of names, to Bangkok. He said the gunmen would then release the hostages, but take the plane to a new, undisclosed location.

Thai Prime Minister Prem Tinsulanond had said earlier that Indonesian Deputy Intelligence Chief Benny Moerdani asked for permission to use force to "clear up the problem." But Prem said he replied that the use of force would depend on how violent the hijackers became.

The Indonesian government has said the hijackers are members of a "certain illegal movement."

Sources in Jakarta, the Indonesian capital, identified the movement as Komando Jihad, or Holy War Command, an outlawed guerrilla group dedicated to turning Indonesia into a Moslem theocracy. They said the some of the group's members are trained in Saudi Arabia and one of the hijackers is a Saudi national.

Reaction to bond package mixed

The Midland Independent School District administration's attempts to sell a \$6.6 million bond package to the public next month is eliciting mixed reactions from the two candidates who have filed for the Place 4 school board seat.

Competing in the April 4 election for the spot vacated by board member Marshall McCrea are Gary Hopper, Midland bureau chief and news producer for KOSA-TV, and Michael E. Butler, assistant director of the city's public works department.

Although Hopper, a native Midlander and a graduate of Lee High School, said he is supporting the school bond proposals, he is speaking out against recurring bond elections which he believes have been held too frequently.

The current bond proposal calls for \$1.05 million in renovation to Midland and Lee high schools, the construction Election school board

of a new elementary school, in addition to the building of a new facility to replace aging De Zavala Elementary School.

"THESE BOND ELECTIONS would not have to be held so often if current facilities are maintained," he said. "I think it's a shame De Zavala is in the shape it's in. These schools should have never gotten in this shape.

However, Hopper said the constructive side of the bond issue will alleviate overcrowding, which has become inevitable due to increased elementary school enrollments.

"The elementary school playgrounds are full of portable classrooms," he said. "You can see the

Polish leaders cancel planned general strike

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - Independent labor leaders on Monday called off a nationwide general strike that had threatened this Soviet bloc nation with its worst crisis in months of political and economic strife.

The decision to suspend a walkout Tuesday came after nearly seven hours of talks between Lech Walesa, leader of the independent union Solidarity, and Deputy Premier Mieczyslaw Rakowski. At issue were several union demands, especially punishment of those responsible for injuring three union members in a beating March 19 at Bydgoszcz, 170 miles northwest of Warsaw

The government agreed to suspend

'Common sense and moderation have won," said Walesa after the

Rakowski had warned that a strike could be "catastrophic" and bring the nation to "the threshold of a precipice." Warsaw Pact military maneuvers have been in progress in and around Poland and reportedly had been extended because of the situa-



U.S. says Polish crisis avoidable

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration says there are signs a major crisis in strike-torn Poland may be avoided, although "a heightened state of readiness" of Soviet troops along the Polish border leaves the situation "very, very tense.'

Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr., who had said the weekend could be crucial to peace in Poland, said Sunday that moderate elements in the Polish government "seem to be surviving.'

An intervention by the Red Army is "neither imminent or inevitable," Haig said, but he added: "I do believe that that varies hour to hour by various postures taken by Soviet forces....The situation is still very,

very tense.'

An announcement by the East German news agency ADN in Berlin said 'new units" have been sent to join Warsaw Pact military maneuvers now under way on Polish soil and along its border, as Poland's large independent labor union, Solidarity, prepares for a general nationwide strike on Tuesday.

If the Soviets do intervene in Poland, said Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger, the United States would consider a "broad spectrum of activity - political, economic, diplomatic.

Weinberger, appearing on ABC's "Issues and Answers," declined to say whether a U.S. "military re-

sponse" was also a possibility. Weinberger and Sen. Charles Percy, R-Ill., in a separate interview, agreed that any movement by Soviet troops into Poland would end the possibility of any future arms limitation talks with the Russians.

Percy, appearing on CBS' "Face the Nation," also said he has "reason to believe" the Carter administration was considering providing military armaments to China in the event the Soviets intervened in Poland. But he said he does not know whether the new administration is still considering the plan, although it was an "on-going project" a month before Reagan took office:

As the administration watched and worried about the Polish situation, Haig sounded a trace of optimism.

"I think there are some signs that perhaps a major crisis can be avoided if the moderate elements in the political leadership continue to prevail and maintain their influence," Haig said in response to the question of whether the administration views the Polish situation as being any "less critical" than it did late last week.

Haig said Friday that the weekend "could be critical" in determining whether there could be a peaceful outcome to Poland's internal prob-

Reagan asks workers to help rebuild economy

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan, beginning a week of personal lobbying for his economic program by appealing for labor support, wants workers who built America to "join in rebuilding it," his spokesman says.

Reagan was addressing the AFL-CIO conference of building and construction traders this afternoon at a Washington hotel.

White House press secretary James S. Brady said the president's speech would point out the "failure of past economic policies and how working men and women are the people who suffer from inflation.

Brady, briefing reporters Saturday, also quoted Reagan as saying "we have not yet begun to fight" for the tax cut portion of the economic package. "He feels very strongly that this program has to move forward as a package," Brady added.

He said Reagan's "biggest night mare" was that Congress will change his economic program, cutting in the wrong places or by the wrong amount "and then it won't work and in two years everyone will be back with renewed cynicism and dashed hopes.

Reagan believes that "all economic recovery packages are not created equal," Brady said.

The president will spend a large share of his time this week lobbying for his program to slash nearly \$48.6 billion from the federal budget and to cut federal income taxes by 30 per-

cent over 31/2 years. Besides the speech to laor, Reaga was scheduled to confer this afternoon and Tuesday with Republican members of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee.

On Wednesday, Reagan will make the first in a series of speeches to state legislatures when he travels to Springfield, Ill. Additional trips will be made later next month, he added.

Brady described the address to a joint session of the Legislature as having a "power to the states" theme and at the same time plugging Reagan's proposed economic program.

Like Congress, the Illinois Legislature is under divided political control. Democrats control the Senate and Republicans the House.

Meanwhile, Reagan is tentatively scheduled to sign a bill Tuesday that scraps a scheduled April 1 increase in dairy price supports. The measure, approved by Congress on Friday, represents the president's first major legislative victory in his efforts to trim the budget.

The administration says eliminating the subsidy increase will save the federal government \$147 million this year and will spare consumers from price increases of 7½ for a gallon of milk, 10 cents for a pound of butter and 9 cents for a pound of cheese.

Brady said the bill will be signed Tuesday if the necessary technical paperwork that formally transmits the bill to the White House is finished. Otherwise, he said, the increase will take effect automatically on Wednes-

Toward the end of the week, Brady said, the administration plans to announce a relief package for the U.S. auto industry. He said the package will concentrate on regulations and will not include what Reagan plans to do about Japanese imports.

"NO ONE CAME to me and pushed me to run. I wanted to do this," he said. "I have covered enough politics in my job to know that when someone is pushed to run, they will lose interest after six months. I don't have to look over my shoulder and I don't have an ax to grind."

Although Hopper said he is not anticipating any conflicts between his affliation with KOSA-TV and a possible school board seat, his opponent is disagreeing. "What's going to happen when the school board goes into executive session?" said Butler. "Will Hopper take the First Amendment? I wish someone would ask him

Butler, who has lived in Midland for seven years and was an administrative assistant to the city manager before he transferred to the public works department, said he filed for the school board seat because he is concerned about the quality of education students are receiving in the Midland public schools.

'What sparked my interest is that eventually, I've got to hire the product and I am concerned about people working with me who have been socially promoted through the school system," he said. "The first thing I would be interested in doing is establishing a system-wide achievement test which 11th and 12th graders would be required to pass before graduation.

BUTLER SAID he also is concerned

about failing communication between teachers and the school board and the administration. "Dr. (James) Mailey (school superintendent) has an idea and the

school board has an idea, but they rarely seem to meet," he said. "I think with my association with teachers. I can bridge the gap and reach a common understanding. An example of incohesiveness within the school system, Butler said, is

the school board's stance on holding teachers strictly accountable for failing students, while the administration wants responsibility shared. "There's no give-and-take between the two,' Butler said.

Butler also believes a comprehensive program should be established concerning scholastic standing and student participation in athletics.

"We have to decide if we are going to let a student play with five F's or five D's. If a student is going to be a representative at an athletic event, he should also be able to represent the school on a scholastic level.

In addition to policies affecting athletes, Butler said a consensus should be established concerning discipline programs at elementary schools. 'Again, there is no consistency. Principals are given too much flexibility and the overriding policies ought to come from the school administra-

ON BILINGUAL education, Butler said "as long as the federal government is involved, we're going to have to provide for it because it's still mandated by the state constitution. However, if the student hasn't mastered English by the fourth or sixth grade, he should be pulled out of the system. After sixth grade, he is starting to make a drain on the system." Butler, whose wife is a seventh grade teacher at Goddard Junior High, holds a bachelor of administration degree in political science and public administration from Texas A&M Uni-

Abscam trial set for sole senator indicted

Prosecutors also fighting charges of entrapment

NEW YORK (AP) - Prosecutors beset by rulings of government en-trapment face their most troublesome Abscam case today with the trial of Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr., the most powerful politician indicted in the FBI sting.

Williams was one of the first to meet with undercover FBI agents posing as representatives of favorseeking Arab sheiks, but the 61-yearold New Jersey Democrat was the last to be indicted.

"I will survive," predicts the 22year Senate veteran whose current term expires in 1982. The sole senator indicted in the sting maintains he is. "totally innocent."

Prosecutors face an uncertain task

in the courtroom this time since a federal judge in Philadelphia last year threw out the convictions of two Philadelphia city council members on grounds of governmental misconduct and entrapment.

The convictions were overturned based on the most controversial Abscam evidence: tapes of a June 28, 1979, session involving the council members and Williams. The government is appealing the reversal The 13 other Abscam convicts are

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mittee until the Republicans gained Senate control in January, is accused of bribery and conspiracy involving an alleged promise to introduce an immigration bill to allow the purported Arabs to stay in the United

Standing trial with Williams is Alexander Feinberg, a 72-year-old lawyer from Cherry Hill, N.J., and longtime Williams' associate.

Mayor Angelo Errichetti, of Camden, N.J., was severed from the trial because the Justice Department agreed it would not further prosecute those convicted in earlier Abscam cases unless they won appeals. Retired contractor George Katz of Fort Lee, N.J., was said to be seriously ill and also was severed.

In addition to the charge involving

the private immigration bill, Williams also is charged with agreeing to accept a concealed 18 percent interest in a Virginia titanium mine. In return, he allegedly agreed to do everything in his power to obtain military contracts for the mining venture.

The supposed Arabs were going to finance the deal with a \$100 million loan at favorable interest rates, the federal indictment charges. The charges further allege that as part of the conspiracy, Williams and the others agreed to later sell the mining company to a group of foreign businessmen for \$70 million.

Jury selection process begins in New Orleans Brilab trial

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - The federal case called Brilab opened today in U.S. District Court, as prosecution and defense began the process of selecting an impartial jury for a trial that could last a half

The 12 jurors and their alternates could spend the next five months - or more - in U.S. District Judge Morey Sear's court, hearing the reams of evidence in the case, U.S. Attorney John Volz estimated.

The five defendants, who include reputed Mafia chieftain Carlos Marcello and former state Commissioner of Administration Charles E. Roemer II, are charged with conspiracy, racketeering, and mail and wire fraud.

Their indictments stemmed from their involvement with Joseph Hauser, 49, a three-time loser on insurance fraud convictions.

Hauser allegedly connected the defendants with insurance executives willing to trade payoffs for lucrative state insurance contracts.

The insurance men turned out to be undercover FBI agents, with Hauser as their stalking horse.

Hauser agreed to go undercover for the FBI after pleading guilty in Phoenix, Ariz., to a a scheme in which numerous union welfare and pension funds were bilked for millions in multi-state transactions. In his deal with the FBI, Hauser was to use his

Security ordered for Little's retrial

SALINAS, Calif. (AP) - Special security precautions were ordered today when the second murder trial of former Symbionese Liberation Army member Russell Little opens in a Monterey County

Little was convicted of the 1973 slaying of Oakland tempted killing of Robert Blackburn, then assistant school chief. But last year, the state Supreme Court reversed the 1975 conviction, saying the trial judge gave an improper instruction to the jury

Defense attorney Stuart Hanlon said he may call William and Emily Harris to testify on Little's behalf. The Harrises are in prison on convictions stemming from the kidnapping of newspaper heiress Patricia Hearst in 1974.

Sheriff Bud Cook declined to discuss all the security measures

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

Medicine chest isn't best place for medicine

Dear Dr. Solomon: I have a sisterin-law who believes she's an expert in everything. Regardless of the topic, she has an answer. Her latest gem is that the bathroom medicine chest is not the place for drugs. If a medicine chest is not meant to be used for medicine, what is? - Carrie

Dear Carrie: I don't know about your sister-in-law's track record in other areas, but in regard to what she says about the medicine cabinet, she happens to be right. Drugs can be kept anywhere in the home that is cool and dry, and where they cannot be reached by children. The bathroom, on the other hand, is often warm and damp, the very kind of environment that tends to diminish the effectiveness of medications. This can be a serious problem, especially for drugs that are purchased in fairly large quantities for use over an extended period of time. The potential complications should this occur are apparent. If a drug loses its effectiveness because it is not stored properly, a physician may prescribe a larger dose. However, when the prescription is refilled and the patient obtains a new supply, the same dose may prove

I would add one more precaution in handling of medications - keep the container tightly closed. This not only is a safety measure, but helps assure the drugs' continued potency.

Dear Dr. Solomon: One of my closest friends and another woman with whom I work recently had surgery for breast cancer. My friend first became aware of a lump in her breast through self-examination; the other woman did not know she had a tumor until her doctor informed her of it. While I try to make it a practice of performing breast self-examination routinely, there are many times that it slips my mind, and other times when I know I do a haphazard job. Medical facilities in my community have sponsored mass screening programs for high blood pressure and a variety of other diseases, and I'd like to know why they don't do the same for breast cancer. Do you know of any reason?

Dear Sue: Mass screening for breast cancer is not performed because it is not practical; that is, the cost of conducting such a screening is not worth the benefits that would be achieved.

Dr. Michael J. Brennan, professor of medicine at Wayne State University School of Medicine in Detroit,

notes that the cost of screening all women 40 to 70 years of age in the United States would have to be kept within \$4 a year if it were to be economically practical. Actually, his experience in poviding such screening to 10,000 women as part of a cancer control demonstration project shows that the cost is about \$60 for each

examination. The best approach to breast cancer prevention is self-examination plus regular screening of high-risk women. Included in this category are women who have never been pregnant, never given birth, or who had a baby at an advanced age. Other women at risk include those with a history of breast cancer in their families, and those who have had a mastectomy, oophorectomy (removal of an ovary), or some benign breast

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

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
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Midland's housing need

Most Midlanders probably would agree with the reasons that prompted more than 100 residents to show up last week at City Council chambers protesting an apartment complex planned for construction just east of Midland Drive in far West Midland.

Their fears are obvious and understandable; they're fears with which most people can relate. The neighborhood in question is a working class mix. The residents aren't wealthy; they work hard for what they own - including their homes.

The residents of that neighborhood, like most others throughout the nation, have heard the horror stories about low-income housing projects that can become eyesores in communities and shelter undesirable individuals. Some rental subsidy projects have suffered abuse and neglect, and been transformed into examples of the kind of housing projects Midland doesn't want or need.

But Midland has a problem. There isn't enough housing to go around and the city is experiencing a tremendous in-migration as it has for a number of years. To provide for the burgeoning population, Midland literally needs all the housing it can get.

The supply-and-demand factor boosts prices here to the point that housing becomes unaffordable for the elderly on fixed incomes, the handicapped and low-income workers, and a difficult stretch for workers living on a limited budget. It's important that Midland's growth doesn't overlook the housing needs of low-income workers or the elderly anymore than the needs of those who can

afford more expensive housing.

The proposed apartment complex would benefit Midlanders with widely ranging needs - the elderly and handicapped previously noted, low-income workers who need a little assistance in meeting monthly bills and newcomers who merely need a place to live until more permanent accommodations can be found. The fact that 40 of the units would be rented on a rental subsidy basis while 46 would be rented on a competitive market basis should help relieve the anxieties of neighborhood residents who seem to fear a rundown apartment complex that would diminish the value of their own property.

Rather, it seems that the economics of the situation would encourage the complex's managers to properly maintain the entire complex in an acceptable fash-

The property owners who showed up at the council meeting seemed to want the city government to get involved in the apartment question. Any decision along that line likely will come at the April 14 public hearing on the matter.

It really wouldn't be wise for the city to get involved since the site in question already is zoned for apartment construction. The real question to be answered here is do the interests of the landowners in the location under consideration take precedence over the needs of the Midland population as a whole in regard to housing.

As much as we can appreciate the concerns of the landowners, the answer to that question has to be an unequivocal no.

Wars are fought in jungles and in U.S. living rooms

If I were an advisor to El Salvador, my first and most urgent recommendation would be to expell the foreign press and impose strict censorship of

You may think that is a shocking recommendation coming from a member of the press, but actually it is only common sense. There is no virtue in refusing to admit the key role press coverage plays in the kind of war that is being fought in El Salva-

The world has become a small stage, thanks to the communications revolutions, and wars, even one as small as that one in El Salvador, are fought on a global basis. Not only do the arms and money for both sides flow in from outside nations, but so also are the psychological, diplomatic and political aspects of the war fought on a global basis.

The communists know this. Not only are they supporting the guerrillas in El Salvador with arms and money, but they have activated their worldwide net of propaganda and disinformation. Their number one objective, just as it was during the Vietnam War, is to prevent the United States from effectively supporting the government which is opposing the communist troops.



A captured North Vietnamese officer told Gen. Lewis Walt, the U.S. commander of I Corps in Vietnam, that while the Americans were winning on the battlefield, they were losing the war at home. He was, of course, exactly right.

In Vietnam, we stupidly failed to realize this and so by manipulating American public opinion, the communists were able to force not only our withdrawal from Vietnam, but to insure that once we did withdraw, we would not prevent them from finishing their task. Today, Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos are all communist.

The same pattern was repeated in Nicaragua and to some extent in Iran as American newsmen placed the role of unwitting pawns in a global psychological war. It is beginning to be repeated in the El Salvador war.

It is important to understand that war has not changed, but what has changed is communications technology, primarily the predominance of television. World War II was just as grim and horrible, just as much a combination of failures and success, as the Vietnam War. But in World War II, the U.S. imposed strict censorship. What the American people learned about the war was controlled... The war was reported to the American people on strictly a good-guysversus-bad-guys basis and we were the good guys. Furthermore, Nazi and Japanese agents and sympathisers were not allowed to operate freely in the United States. There was no film coverage of the horrible fire bombings of Dresden and Tokyo followed by demonstrations, peace marches, teach-ins, and mock war crimes trials. In other words, we fought an all-out war, not only militarily, but psychologically, politically, and diplomatically. Every American who was old enough to be aware remembers that every German and every Japanese was depicted as a total villain without any redeeming virtues.

Frankly, most civilians don't have the stomach for war. They may support national objectives in theory, but if they have to look at the bloody carnage in color on their home screens, they will be repelled by it. This natural repugnance is then exploited by communist propaganda agents to erode the political support of the U.S. government, to disparage the government we are trying to help, and to enhance the image of the communist forces.

Because the communists do not allow the free press to witness their side of the war, the viewer ends up with a one-sided picture. When they do admit a Western newsman, they do so only to accomplish a specific objective and they carefully control what he is allowed to see.

If we are going to put down communist subversion, then we had better learn from our past mistakes and understand that the war must be fought in the United States living rooms as well as in the jungles of El Salvador.

'Psychic probers' seeking hazy ESP gap

WASHINGTON - In James Bond circles, nothing is too farfetched to be dismissed. The Central Intelligence Agency, for example, has been toying for years with the idea of using extrasensory perception in its work spurred on by the suspicion that the Russians have somehow succeeded in opening an ESP gap.

I've already reported on the Pentagon's \$6-million-a-year research to develop ESP weapons that can brainwash or incapacitate enemy leaders by thought transfer, deliver nuclear bombs instantaneously thousands of miles away by psychic energy, or even create a protective "time warp" to make incoming Soviet missiles explode harmlessly in the past.

These wacky projects have support from the Defense Intelligence Agency, which reports that the Russians have been doing intensive research in the field for nearly 50 years. The DIA even credits the omnipotent Kremlin strating ESP's deadly potential on insects, a possibility that should bring joy to farmers and backyard gardeners — and strike terror in the insecticide industry.

The CIA, though historically less alarmist about the Red Menace than the Pentagon spooks are, has also been monitoring Soviet ESP research and pondering the possibility of less bizarre psychic weapons. A top-secret report on the subject by a CIA scientific expert has been examined by my

associate Dale Van Atta. The analysts estimated that "the Soviet military and KGB have had a covert applied parapsychology program since the mid-1960s." This was the period when the CIA was experimenting with hallucinogenic drugs on unsuspecting Americans and with foot powder that would make Fidel Castro's beard fall out.

The CIA warns that the Soviets may be "ahead of the U.S. in parapsychol-

ogy." Evidence of Soviet progress is sketchy because the Kremlin's voodoo scientists, the CIA suspects, have gone undercover. Intelligence sources estimate that at least 200 Soviet experts in various disciplines are working on ESP weapons development.

The CIA report identified several specific areas of suspected Soviet

"Electrostatics of telekinesis," or the ability to move objects by mental concentration.

'Extremely low frequencies of electromagnetic radiation for information transmission." This may have been what the KGB was up to when it bombarded the U.S. Embassy in Moscow with microwave radiation for nearly 20 years

- Remote monitors and stimulators to determine - or influence another person's physical condition by telepathy, like a Haitian witch doctor might try.

Instead, Quayle pays an experienced congressional employee a starting salary of about \$14,000 a year with just eight days of vacation - and the staff is told to expect to work overtime and weekends for

- Obviously chagrined at being in the minority for the first time in 26 years, Senate Democrats have stoutly resisted the demeaning "minority" label. Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., has had his official stationery imprinted "Office of the Democratic Leader," and Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., calls himself "Democratic whip." Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., is the man who introduced Budget Director Dave Stockman to then-presidential candidate Ronald Reagan, and Kemp says he's glad he did. "Stockman is an intellectual giant who can get along with people," Kemp claims.

Cabinet system's limits shown by auto import indecision

WASHINGTON - The Reagan Cabinet system spent a month wrestling with Japanese auto imports only to reach a non-solution so worrisome that at the March 19 Cabinet meeting Deputy Secretary of State William P. Clark had to come to the rescue.

Clark expressed the absent Secretary Alexander Haig's wishes that the State Department take the lead in trade talks with Japan, putting Special Trade Representative William Brock in a supporting role. Quick agreement meant that the State Department, not deeply involved until now, was coming in to execute policy after failure of Cabinet government to shape it clearly in its first serious

The administration consensus reached was U.S. support for a "unilateral voluntary quota" on Japanese auto exports, but nobody in the administration is quite sure what that means. Who will determine whether the quota — "unilaterally" and "vol-untarily" set by Tokyo — is too high? The arrival on stage by the State Department insures the Japanese will not be roughed up to "unilaterally volunteer" a quota smaller than they want.

That scarcely amounts to coherent administration policy. The new Cabinet system has failed to approach agreement on an issue where President Reagan himself is ambivalent. This suggests the chaos that would have ensued in the Cabinet over tax policy had not Reagan's position been so hard in pressing for rate reduc-

Instead of presenting the president with a unified recommendation on auto imports, the Cabinet exposed its own inherent splits. These disagreements transcend the auto import crisis and go to the basic question of governmental intervention in the Three millionaire businessmen in

the Cabinet - Transportation Secretary Drew Lewis, Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldridge and Labor Secretary Ray Donovan - favor intimate cooperation between government, business and organized labor in rebuilding the economy. Heads of those departments are not ordinarily involved intimately in drafting high economic policy, traditionally a Treasury function.

But under the Reagan Cabinet system, a task force on the auto industry headed by Lewis very nearly established a limit on Japanese imports as administration policy. The traditional economic policy-making departments, headed by the Treasury, belatedly counter-attacked against what they called Lewis's "runaway" task

By March 11, Lewis had been stopped cold; the Cabinet was hopelessly split. Treasury and the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) wanted the issue taken to the president's desk in disagreement. But Lewis protested, contending this violated Cabinet government. Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan was talked into it, giving the protectionists more time to finagle a low quota or other import limitation.

The complicating factor was that nobody was entirely certain what the president would do if the matter reached him in disagreement. "The old man is not all that tough on this one," one anti-quota White House aide confided to us. Worried about the sick auto industry, Reagan is torn between free trade philosophy and his sympathy for the U.S. companies and

That led to a March 17 Cabinet-level luncheon out of which leaked inaccurate reports about capitulation by Treasury and OMB to a Japanese quota. The only agreement was on the 'unilateral voluntary" quota now so deeply steeped in ambiguity.

Behind this is a genuine lack of consensus in the Cabinet over how economic policy should be conducted. Pro-quota partisans believe that willingness by United Auto Workers (UAW) President Douglas Fraser to scale down workers' benefits in return for the Chrysler benefit should not go unrewarded. "We can't let Doug down," Labor Secretary Donovan said in one meeting.

"I think we ought to let Doug simmer in his own juices," an anti-quota Cabinet colleague said later. That fits


the view of OMB Director David Stockman, who as a Michigan Republican politician remembers no favors toward him or Reagan from the UAW. But for their part, Lewis and other Cabinet businessmen regard Stockman as a non-businessman who does not understand the problems of troubled industries.

A smaller group has been trying to hammer out policy in line with the March 19 Cabinet decision: Haig, presidential aides Edwin Meese and James Baker and trade representative Brock.

But deep-seated ideological and stylistic differences between Dave Stockman and Drew Lewis, and between Treasury supply-siders and Transportation interventionists leave nobody happy. The dismay with which all parties look to the outcome suggests the limits of Cabinet government when the president himself is of two minds.

Search for bodies ends

COCOA BEACH, Fla. (AP) - The search for bodies amid the broken concrete and twisted metal of a collapsed five-story condominium has been halted by officials who say the 11th body pulled from the rubble probably is the last.

The whereabouts of several workers who may have been at the building site when the collapse occurred Friday still were unknown. But authorities no longer believe they were pinned beneath the tons of debris. The search for bodies ended early today.

The remains of 22-year-old Darrell Nowakowski were found Sunday afternoon, 48 hours after the accident that one inspector termed the worst construction disaster in Florida history. The bodies of 10 other construction workers were found Friday and

Meanwhile, teams of investigators from state and federal agencies interviewed survivors and studied the rubble-strewn site.

Cocoa Beach Fire Chief Robert Walker said severworkers still were unaccounted for, based on information pieced together from relatives and witnesses. But the list was "nothing firm," he said.

Mike Mervis, a spokesman for Univel Inc., the contractor and co-developer of the ruined Harbour Cay condominium, said investigators from the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration would meet today with company officials. Univel was also conducting its own investigation into the accident

Several workers at the site had charged the pace of. construction was so fast that concrete throughout the condominium wasn't given enough time to dry. Investigators have refused to comment on the charge.

Mervis said the company would decide within two weeks whether to rebuild the 45-unit structure, part of a planned five-building, \$10 million riverfront project with condominium apartments starting at

Officials said about 80 percent of the units had been bought. A condominium saleswoman, who asked not to be identified, said she had received several calls from peple lookig for bargains in the wake of the

"They were calling in to see if anyone had canceled

so they could get a good deal," she said. Nowakowski's body was pulled from the dusty wreckage of what had been the second floor of the

The young man had begun work on the project as a glazier just one day before the building collapsed, said his father, Con Nowakowski, a Brevard County insurance agent who insured Harbour Cay.

True agrarian revolution pledges to end shortages

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) - Romania, the "developing nation" of the Soviet Bloc, is suffering stubborn shortages of meat, milk, sugar and other commodities.

President Nicolae Ceausescu, who has headed the Romanian Communist Party for more than 15 years, has promised a "true agrarian revolution." He also has confessed for the first time to misgivings about his years of emphasis on factories instead of farms.

He has not disclosed any new investments in agriculture, however. There is speculation that the new revolution may be more propaganda than practice.

Shoppers in Bucharest, the country's capital and best-supplied city, line up in the street for meat. Deliveries of milk are sometimes sold out to crowds directly from the sidewalk

Sugar has joined the list of products in sporadic supply. Even wine, among the country's most renowned products, has disappeared from

many shops The shortages appear to be the result of poor

weather last year, inefficiency and inexperience on the state cooperative farms, which control 90 percent of the farmland, transportation problems and the government's determined export program to bring in badly needed hard



Despite the scarcity on the home market, Romania still supplies meat for dollars to the U.S. Army. Western economic analysts think it also sells meat to the Middle East for oil



Indictments due in Wood death?

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - Afederal grand jury has heard all the witnesses it subpoenaed, and federal officials have indicated indictments could be handed up soon in connection with the assassination almost two years ago of U.S. District Judge John

The panel recessed Friday after the 10th and final witness, Theresa Starr Jasper, 23, went to jail rather than tell what she knows about the shooting in front of Wood's townhouse.

Federal officials refused to answer questions about when the grand jury would reconvene, although indications were the panel might come back together Wednesday.

Targets in the investigation have been identified as El Paso brothers Jimmy and Joe Chagra and convicted hit man Charles V. Harrelson, who is married to Ms. Jasper's mother.

Ms. Jasper was ordered jailed 60 miles away in Uvalde County Jail after she refused to answer about a dozen questions while she was in front of the grand jury, despite being granted immunity from prosecution. Officials said she had the key to the

jail "in your pocket" because she could e release whenever she decided to answer the grand jury's questions. They had her jailed in Uvalde because of overcrowded conditions in the Bexar County Jail at San Anto-

FBI director William Webster said in Washington, D.C., last week that officials know who ordered Wood's assassination and who carried out the contract and that a solution in the case was imminent.

as saying federal officials had a tape recording of a conversation between the Chagra brothers last year in a federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan., in which Jimmy Chagra told his brother that he hired Harrelson to kill

Joe Chagra is a lawyer. Jimmy Chagra is serving a 30-year term for continuing criminal enterprise, after having been accused of being a principal figure in drug smuggling into

the United States from Colombia. FBI agents searched Joe Chagra's house on Feb. 27 and seized a tape recording of a telephone conversation last year between Chagra and Harrelson in which Harrelson mentioned the shooting.

Harrelson was convicted in the 1968 contract killing of Hearne grain dealer Sam Degelia Jr. He was released on parole in 1979, and is being held now on unrelated state charges

U.S. District Judge Adrian Spears sentenced Ms. Jasper to an indefinite jail term after she refused twice on Friday to answer questions asked during her hour-long session with the

Daniel hearing continues

LIBERTY, Texas (AP) - It was back to court again today for what has to rank as one of the most unusual child custody cases in Texas history.

Liberty County prosecutors view the case as a dress rehearsal for the murder trial of Vickie Daniel, 33, who has pleaded innocent by reason of self defense in the Jan. 19 shooting of her husband, former Texas House Speaker Price Dan-

Daniel's sister, Jean Daniel Murph of Richardson, went to court almost immediately, contending her sister-in-law is an unfit mother and asking for custody of the Daniel's two children, Franklin Bald-

win, 3, and Marion Price IV, 1. But the child custody trial, now going into its third week, has been but "a preliminary to the

main event" from the start. Mrs. Daniel's attorney, Richard "Racehorse" Haynes, began taking her through the events leading to the shooting. She said she got a rifle, loaded it and ordered her husband to leave their ranch home after he had kicked and beaten her in a dispute concerning their proposed divorce.

She said she "heard a funny sound" but didn't actually recall firing the shot that killed Daniel. 'In my nine years of prosecuting, this is the

first time I've seen a case develop in this manner," said Assistant District Attorney Jerry Andress, who will prosecute Mrs. Daniel on the

Haynes sought at first to have any questions about the shooting barred from the custody trial, but then Mrs. Daniel waived her Fifth Amendment rights and testified to the events surrounding the

The protests by Haynes may have been a ploy by the flamboyant lawyer to get J.C. "Zeke" Zbranek, Mrs. Murph's attorney, to press for revelations about the shooting, Andress speculates.

That, Andress said, would open the way for Haynes to delve into the prosecution's evidence before the murder trial began. Andress said he's not concerned about a pre-

mature release of the information. "The defense has an opportunity to see the state's evidence anyway, so they won't get an ad-

vantage," Andress said. Haynes began delving into the investigation of the shooting last week. In questions to members of the Liberty County sheriff's department, Haynes was critical about the failure of investigators to photograph and record evidence at the Daniel residence the night of the shooting.

Haynes suggested the sheriff's department was partial to Daniel and his family.

Chief Deputy Clay Autrey testified that in the two weeks following Daniel's death Mrs. Murph paid him \$1,860 to provide guards for the Daniel home while he was supervising the investigation of the

Autrey said he was given \$7 an hour to arrange for off-duty deputies to guard the home and paid them \$6 an hour, keeping \$1 fro him-

Liberty County Sheriff C.L. "Buck" Eckols was unaware of the arrangement, Autrey said.



Demeaning, abusive treatment caused death of Army private

FORT BENNING, Ga. (AP) — An Army private who was ordered to a drill field hours after he was released from a hospital was subjected to 'demeaning and abusive treatment" before he died of heat stroke, an Army investigation has concluded.

Maj. Roland J. White, who conducted the investigation, said the treatment of Jeffrey Ray Savoy, 17, resulted from "his superiors' actions, insensitivity and lack of concern for his condi-

Results of White's investigation last fall were published Sunday in The Atlanta Journal and The Atlanta Constitution. They were obtained by the Atlanta Journal under the Freedom of Information Act.

Savoy, a recruit from Kent, Wash., died of heat stroke Sept. 16, 1980 the same day he was released from a hospital. He had lost 40 pounds during his month-long hospital stay, but doctors were unable to find any physical illness.

The Army documents indicated that, despite the hospitalization, Savoy's superiors

Capt. Frances C. Baker and Sgt. James Edmonds - believed he was faking illness when he left a work assignment on the day of his release from the hospital, went inside a building out of the 98-degree heat and began vomiting.

Witnesses whose statements are recorded in the documents obtained by the Journal say Savoy vomited repeatedly but was denied water by his superiors and was dragged, at Edmonds' orders, until his pants were pushed down around his knees

Karen Ann Quinlan's survival gave parents time to adjust

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - For six years now, the plight of Karen Ann Quinlan has fired controversy over the legal and moral obligations of keeping someone artificially alive after the person's brain

But long after the highly publicized legal battles that won her family the right to remove Karen from life-sustaining apparatus, there lingers a question that has proved just as puzzling.

"No one has ever determined why Karen went into a coma," her father, Joseph Quinlan, said during a recent interview.

The leading theory is that Karen, who turned 27 on Sunday, had unknowingly mixed alcohol and a tranquilizer at a birthday party for a friend.

However, Karen's parents say their daughter did not have a drug problem. And a New York neurologist recently disclosed that his examinations of Karen and her medical records show she simply had too much to drink at the party and choked probably on her own vomit oxygen for up to a half-hour

Immediately after Karen's parents initiated legal action to have their adopted daughter removed from a respirator, rumors that the young woman had a history of alcohol and drug abuse began to surface. A roommate, Robin Croft, denied the rumors, but indicated that Karen was a social drinker and had used drugs at least once.

"Karen was not a drunk," Ms. Croft said in 1975. "Karen drank a lot but she could consume a lot. We went out to tie one on about once in a week, but

it wasn't a problem. "Karen was new to the drug habit," Ms. Croft continued. "She might have taken a few pills for a high but she wasn't that impulsive. She looked be-

fore she leaped. On April 14, 1975, Karen and several friends went to a local tavern to celebrate a friend's birthday. A boy drove her back to the cottage she shared

with Ms. Croft, Mrs. Quinlan said. "When he went to check her later, she was breath-

Mrs. Quinlan said Karen was given mouth-tomouth resuscitation, and the police were called. However, the damage was done. Karen had stopped breathing, and her brain had been without oxygen for up to 30 minutes.

When she was admitted to Newton Memorial Hospital, the diagnosis was "drug-induced coma," but her parents disagree with that analysis.

Doctors have considered four possibilities: Mixing drugs and alcohol; a chronic blood sugar problem; a 2-week-old head injury, and possible lead poisoning from her work in a ceramics factory.

Karen also had started a crash diet the day of the fateful party, doctors learned. But Dr. Julius Korein, a noted neurologist who

examined Karen and hundreds of other coma patients, says none of these theories is valid. 'Karen Ann Quinlan was drinking gin and tonic

and choked," he insisted in a recent telephone interview with The Associated Press.

"There was no evidence to indicate a drug-alcohol reaction. She had less than a therapeutic dose of Valium in her blood.

"She was drunk, she choked - probably on her own vomit - and was without oxygen for 15 to 30 minutes," says Korein, a professor of neurology at the New York University Medical Center and chief of electroencephalography at Bellevue Medical Center in New York City Administration officials at Newton Memorial Hos-

pital, where Karen initially was taken, declined to comment on her condition when she arrived there. However, the Quinlans' attorney, Paul W. Armstrong, says Korein had full access to all her medical records and should be well aware of her condition. Police reports showed when a rescue squad arrived on the scene, Karen was "blue, not breathing

and pulseless," Korein says. Later, she developed aspiration pneumonia, he

Based on his Oct. 10, 1975, examination, Korein found Karen was not "brain dead" but was in a 'persistent vegetative state.'

The neurologist says Karen stands no better than a 1,000-to-1 chance of recovering

Slashed Picasso painting worth \$300,000 repairable

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) -Damage done by an unidentified vandal to the \$300,000 Picasso painting "Jug and Skeleton" can be repaired, authorities said today.

Someone cut a three-quarter inch gash in the painting over the weekend. The work was one of 374 by Picasso on display at the Louisiana Museum of Modern Art in Humbleback, north of Copenhagen. The exhibition was loaned by the French gov-

Police had no clues to the identity of the vandal, who evaded a complex security system which included television surveillance.

The exhibition opened March 7 and since then has been seen by more than 70,000 people. Nearly 4,000 came Sunday, many hoping to see the slashed painting, but it was removed and will be shipped to Paris for repairs.



Robert J. Myers figures he will be the lowest paid employee in the Social Security Administration. And he'll be one of the bosses, at that.

The 68-year-old Myers will help chart policy as a deputy commissioner, the second highest position in the agency

Myers will continue to draw a \$49,000 federal pension from his earlier career at Social Security from 1934 until 1970. But the customary \$51,000 salary for his job will be reduced by the amount of his aonuity

Myers also is giving up an equivalent outside income from work as a consultant and professor that he said had pushed his earnings into the six-figure

His appointment by the Reagan administration marks both a return and a restoration of Myers, who fired a well-publicized salvo at Social Security's liberal leadership when he quit as chief actuary in

Even before he quit, Myers broke with civil service protocol by writing signed articles for Reader's Digest and other magazines assailing "expansionists" whom he charged "could soon steer Social Security down a dangerously unsound financial

In a resignation letter printed in the Congressional Record, Myers warned that Democratic holdovers from the Johnson administration "have not - and will not - faithfully and vigorously serve the Nixon administration. Rather; they will exert their efforts to expand the Social Security program as much as

Today, the white-haired Myers speaks in mellower tones, saying the movement to expand Social Security "greatly slackened off after 1972" and ardently defending the program against charges that it is not a good buy for young workers.

Myers is on an interdepartmental task force preparing options on how the Reagan administration can put the troubled \$136 billion program on a sound footing both for the near future and the next cen-

Health and Human Services Secretary Richard S. Schweiker has said there are only three choices: raise taxes, raise the retirement age or lower bene-

Myers was on a Reagan transition task force that recommended sweeping changes in Social Security, including a gradual shift to age 68 instead of 65 for full benefits, a phase-out of spouses' benefits and changes in benefit formulas to lower both initial

payments and cost-of-living increases. Myers also served on the National Commission on Social Security. He voted with the majority in favor of a higher retirement age, but voted against its call for using general revenues to pay for half of Medi-

Myers has been an outspoken critic of "double dippers" - federal workers who draw both civil service and Social Security pensions. He has found that 80 percent of civil service retirees also qualify for Social Security at 62 and Medicare at 65.

"They're getting windfall benefits," said Myers, who added that from his own work outside government in the past decade, he and his wife could draw a 'phenomenal" Social Security benefit of \$1,000 a month were he not still working.

The Reagan administration has proposed an immediate end to the minimum Social Security benefit of \$122 a month, charging that it goes to many federal workers and others who are not poor. Critics contend many poor elderly women would be harmed by eliminating the minimum payment.

Myers says double-dippers usually get far more than the minimum from Social Security. "Generally, I believe in phasing things in, but there are times when I believe in quick action," he said. But he added, "If I was not in step with the Reagan administration, I wouldn't be here.

Oscars mean gold for stars, studios

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - After spending nearly \$3 million on an advertising blitz to promote the nominees, the film industry is awaiting the results of tonight's Academy Awards with visions of bulging box-office re-

The 131/2-inch, gold-plated statuettes may look prestigious on a shelf, but the real gold associated with the Oscars comes in different forms.

For instance, a winner such as last year's best actress - Sally Field, star of "Norma Rae" — could expect a jump of several hundred thousand dollars for each subsequent film and the pick of scripts.

The best-picture award often means an extra \$5 million to \$10 million at the box office, according to industry experts, as well as increased revenue from television; cable and

Film companies attempted to sway Academy voters by spending between \$2 million and \$3 million on trade paper advertisements, special screenings and the like during the past weeks. After the awards are announced, new ads will tout the win-

United Artists expanded the potential audience for "Raging Bull" by bringing it into 690 theaters last Friday. The film was nominated for eight awards, and its star, Robert De Niro, is the favorite to win as best actor.

Said a company spokesman: "The film market is slow right now, and we're hoping that 'Raging Bull' will pick up a number of Oscars.'

NEW YORK (AP) - ABC's New York affiliate has canceled what was supposed to be an audience-participation program on the grounds that the contents were largely made up by several employees.


The cancellation reportedly came after a man from Queens filed suit because his name had been used without his permission, according to a station

Oil producers rush to cash in on \$1 billion loophole

(c) 1981, Dallas Times Herald WASHINGTON - During the past two months dozens of oil producers

have rushed to cash in on a \$1 billion loophole opened in federal regulations after President Reagan decontrolled The oil companies are taking ad-

vantage of a program originally created to encourage investments in risky and expensive techniques to extract oil from old oil fields. Although the program expired with

the end of crude oil price controls on Jan. 28, the Energy Department interpreted existing rules to give companies two more months in which to qualify for re-imbursements, which can run up to \$20 million per project.

The response was, in the words of one Energy Department document,

In order to get the maximum reimbursement in February and March, many producers are submitting claims for pre-paid costs of projects that won't even begin until 1982. Producers are contracting with drillers, chemical companies and, in some cases, their own subsidiaries for goods and services that won't be used until the mid-1980s, according to Energy Department officials.

Moreover, the producers are squeezing money out of the program to back projects that, under decontrol, almost certainly would be profitable without the subsidy.

"These expenditures are not the kind we were trying to encourage," said Ben McRae, a lawyer with the Energy Department. "The program was not to help people subsidize projects that would be undertaken

"People are taking advantage of a loophole in the regulations. But if everything is done exactly by the regulations it is completely legal."

When the accountants caught up with the lawyers, the Energy Department filed notice that it was going stop the two-month extension on March 19. That was only 12 days before the loophole would have been closed anyway, on March 31.

Before the department acted, however, producers qualified for at least \$1 billion that can be recovered through the program, according to industry estimates.

Between Reagan's decontrol announcement and March 19, more than 80 new projects were filed with the Energy Department. That compared to 323 projects that were filed during

the first 13 months of the program. In addition, payments claimed under the program by the existing projects between December and January jumped from \$151 million to \$251 million. The February and March payments are expected to be higher

The program was designed to foster what the oil industry calls tertiary production.

Tertiary production techniques involve a range of methods to squeeze some extra production out of depleted oil wells. Normal, or primary, recovery usually leaves about two-thirds of the oil in the ground. Waterflooding is the next step, or secondary recovery. It involves pumping water into the oil reservoir near a producing well to force out as much as 10 percent more of the original oil.

At that point many oil fields are depleted and must be abandoned. But in certain cases another 10 percent or so of the original oil can be recovered by through tertiary methods such as pumping chemicals, carbon dioxide or steam into the reservoir to loosen or dissolve the oil.

Most of the tertiary techniques are risky because each oil reservoir is unique and little information is available about how different types will respond to different tertiary meth-

ods.
To encourage oil producers to take that risk, the Energy Department in 1979 devised the Tertiary Incentive Program to offset some of the costs of getting a project started. For each project begun after August 1979 an oil company can be reimbursed for 75 percent of the expenditures on the

Thus the NCAA Championship Final in Philadelphia's Spectrum, one of sport's premier spectacles, focuses the spotlight on the two brain trusts on the sidelines, subordinating the activities of the young men on the floor.

They are the two foremost college coaches in the country, moving into sacred spheres once reserved for such predecessors as Phog Allen, Hank Iba, Adolph Rupp and John Wooden.

SMITH, NOW 50, a disciple of the immortal Phog Allen at Kansas, has a record of 19 winning seasons in the 20 he has been at N.C., 429 victories and 142 defeats, not counting the playoffs. This is his sixth time in the NCAA's Final Four, exceeded only by Wooden's 11 times and 10 victories. The late Rupp made the

finals six times, winning four. This is No.3 for Knight, whose Hoosiers won in 1976. Knight, 40, a sub on the great Ohio State teams of the early 1960s which included Jerry Lucas and John Havlicek, has established a remarkable record of 228 victories and 68 feats.

He is a born winner.

HE ALSO is a man with a split personality, arrogant and insulting often with the press, a strict disciplinarian whose dress codes went out of style a quarter of a century ago.

"I learned how to deal with the press from Woody Hayes," he once said, "and how to control my temper from Tom Weis-

He laughs at his subtle joke, referring to a coach who lost his job for socking an opposing player and a golfer with a renowned short temper fuse - both Ohioans. He intimidates. Once after telling a player he must cut his long

hair, the player, Mika Midday, replied, "Coach, I'll shave my head if you say so." Yet, Bobby at times he can be witty and utterly charming. He

also maintains tremendous influence over players who stay with him, encouraging them to get their degrees.

SMITH ALSO is a stickler for discipline, but without resorting to the big whip. He is thorough and inventive. Friends and former players say they never recall seeing him embarrass an athlete in public.

Says one rival coach: "Most of the guys who knock Dean are those who've spent time losing to him.

SMITH'S teams have made the round of four six times during his successful 20-year career at Chapel Hill. The Tar Heels have advanced to the final game twice - against UCLA in 1968 and Marquette in 1977.

Mutliple defenses - zone, pressure and man-to-man - are Smith's style. He also substitutes liberally while Knight basically uses seven or eight

Knight is a demanding coach, sometimes tempestuous and a person who can't seem to avoid controversy. Smith is diplomatic and controlled and coaches somewhat like the chairman of a board.

Indiana is considered slightly more physical than North Carolina, but the Tar Heels may be quicker than the Hoosiers. "Indiana has great mental disci-

pline," said Washington Coach Marv Harshman. "They don't get upset when something goes wrong, because they know if they do what Bobby says it will be all right.

"I WOULDN'T say that Knight coaches by fear but his players are afraid to lose. Smith coaches more from love, a father figure. But North Carolina is disciplined in its own way, Harshman said that North Carolina



Los Angeles Times PALM SPRINGS -- The California

Angels run out on the practice field. laughing, joking, hats on backward, little boys in grown men's uniforms. The needle is out, the mood is joyous, the rookies look happy just to be there. Off on the sides stands a somber, serious individual, a silent little man, leaning on his bat, on the California Angels, but not of them. He looks like a man who just heard he has been passed over for sergeant --

This is Dagoberto Blanco Campaneris, of Matanzas, Cuba, by way of Raytown, Mo. A baseball legend, but you'd never know it.

If there were justice in this world, Dagoberto should probably be the surest of these athletes around him to go to the Baseball Hall of Fame one day -- but Dagoberto knows full well there's now such thing.

DAGOBERTO Campaneris has, for 18 yers, been one of the best players in baseball. Only five players in the history of the game have stolen more bases. They are all in the Hall of Fame except one -- and Lou Brock soon will be. The others are all the Who's Who of the game - Ty Cobb, Eddie Collins, Honus Wagner, Max

Bert Campaneris is probably the most shortchanged super star in the history of baseball, at least today. He has stolen more bases than any active player. Six times he led the league in steals. He set the league record for fewest times caught stealing in a

But, if anyone remembers Dagoberto Campaneris, it's for throwing a bat and nearly decapitating a relief pitcher in the 1972 playoff series. Campie, playing for Oakland at the time, had demoralized the Detroit Tigers' pitching staff in the first two games. In the second game, for instance, he led off with a hit, stole second, then stole third, then scored on Joe Rudi's single. In the third inning, he singled again and scored. In the fifth inning, he singled, then scored on a wild pitch he had attracted by pretending to dash for home on the pitcher's windup. The Tigers' manager, none other then Billy, himself, Martin, took this in stride which is to say that he instructed his pitcher, Larrin Legro, to drill Campaneris with an ankle-high fastball. The pitcher did, nearly fracturing the bone. Campaneris sailed his bat back out at him but Campie's control was off. And he missed. And he got suspended from the playoffs.

THE OAKLAND A's of the early 1970s were a raucous, brawling bunch of mustachioed brigands who took over baseball the way Morgan's pirates took over the Dry Tortugas. The headlines went to the Jacksons, the Vida Blues, the Catfish Hunters, the Sal Bandos and Blue Moon Odoms anybody but the silent, brooding shortstop who, day-in and day-out, was the catalyst for this improbable



If you want a shortstop, get Bert Campaneris. If you want an emcee, get Billy Martin. Dagoberto only gives his name, rank and serial number

"I'm Spanish," he explains carefully, as he stands around the batting cage with the other pensioners trying to eek one more year of baseball out of creeking legs. 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



Congressional delays blamed for late checks

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress should permit government agencies to spend in advance of specific appropriations or else millions of people may face more frequent delays in getting their money, a new report to Congress suggests.

In the most complete report yet on an 11-day delay in approving money bills last October, the General Accounting Office said in a report now being studied in congressional offices that such gaps "have become the norm rather than the exception" as the appropriations process gets bogged down in wrangling over such touchy issues as abortion.

The GAO, a congressional watchdog agency, noted that in the last 20 years, 85 percent of agency appropriation bills have been passed after the beginning of a new fiscal year.

Last October, checks were delayed for 100,000 people going to school on the GI Bill, 22,000 victims of black lung disease, 1.6 million people in a nutrition program for mothers and infants and numerous others, the congressional auditors said. "Had the funding gap continued for

another week or two, federal payments would have been cut off to such large groups of beneficiaries as recipients of food stamps, veterans' compensation and military retirement pay," they said.

NAACP kicks off Klan alert

DETROIT (AP) - The Michigan NAACP says "a new climate of hate and terrorism against blacks in the United States" has prompted it to begin a "Klan Alert" program against the Ku Klux Klan and other extremist groups. State leaders of the National Asso-

ciation for the Advancement of Colored People met in Battle Creek Sunday to kick off what they say will be a non-violent attack on such groups, the Detroit Free Press reported in today's editions.

Honduras balks at prisoner deal

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) - The military government of Honduras apparently is reneging on a deal to free 15 jailed Salvadoran and Honduran leftists reportedly promised to the hijackers of a Honduran airliner before they surrendered in Panama. "The army isn't planning on letting

any leftist guerrillas leave for Panama," Maj. Julion Armando Pavon, the armed forces' spokesman, said Sunday. He added that the government has no plans for deportations of any kind.

At last He stood up again and returned to the disciples--only to find them asleep, exhausted from grief.

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Vets say VA gave them shaft on Agent Orange

WASHINGTON (AP) - A lot of veterans aren't happy with the attention they got at Veterans Administration hospitals when they asked if exposure to the herbicice Agent Orange in Vietnam damaged their health.

A survey by the Veterans Administration, made public Friday by Rep. Toby Moffett, D-Conn., showed that four veterans in 10 said "no" when asked if they felt "that the symptoms you reported were given the proper attention during the course of your examination.'

A third of the veterans reported going to a private doctor, outside the VA hospital system, because of a problem they associated with Agent And only 17 percent who responded

said they were told the results of laboratory tests. As a result of that response, directives went to every VA medical center ordering that veterans be given written notice of the test results, according to Dr. Barclay Shepard, a VA official who directs the agency's Agent Orange research program.

In an interview, Shepard said his 'gut feeling" is that veterans are getting complete examinations, even if many of them do not perceive them that way.

"The physicians I talk to seem to be dedicated, hard-working people," Shepard said. "I have reviewed the program and I come away with the feeling they know what they're doing and they do a good job."

So far, nearly 45,000 Vietnam veterans have asked to be examined to see if their health was jeopardized by possible exposure in Vietnam to the herbicide.

During the war, 12 million gallons of the substance was sprayed to destroy vegetation so U.S. forces could observe communist troop movements in the jungles.

Agent Orange contains dioxin, a deadly contaminant. Some veterans groups contend that as a result of exposure, an unusually high number of disorders have ocurred in Vietnam

Among the symptoms they list are kidney and liver damage; birth defects in the children of veterans; cancer, especially testicular cancer and tumors not normally found in young men; fatigue, weight loss and insomnia; a loss of sex drive; changes in skin color; sensitivity to light; numbless in the hands or feet; psychological changes; and chloracne, a severe skin disorder.

The VA is conducting scientific studies, but the results will not be known for years.

We are still gathering information," Shepard said. "We don't have any solid scientific evidence to date that suggests there is a direct cause and effect relationship between any disease and exposure to Agent Orange among Vietnam veterans.

The survey was taken among only a handful of veterans who have been examined.

Moffett was critical of the VA's program and of President Reagan's decision to close 91 storefront counseling centers where veterans could seek advice.

"Despite the very real concerns of the veterans, and despite their continued pressure on the VA to help them find answers, the VA has responded by burying its head in the sand," the congressman said.

The survey, taken among veterans who visited seven VA hospitals, found that 196 had a poor or "only fair" overall impression of their examinations and only 150 rated the exams good or very good.

Students may buy answers after SAT test has been taken

Examination Board has voted to allow college applicants who take the Scholastic Aptitude Test to buy copies of the correct answers and their own answers to the test.

The decision comes at a time when several groups are urging a national "truth in testing" law requiring that every student get the information upon request. The board decided Fri-

day that students who take advantage of that option will be charged \$6.50 above the regular test fee, which was \$9.25 this year. The fee has not yet been set for next year.

The test is given 12 times annually, but the College Board said the new option will only be available for five test dates - Nov. 7, Dec. 5, May 1 and June 5, all Saturdays, and one Sunday, June 6.

Officials said about 75

percent of the 1.3 million to be offered five times a The College Entrance high school juniors and year in New York State. seniors who take the test each year take it on those


dates. Rep. Ted Weiss, D-N.Y., who has sponsored a national "truth in testing" law, said the College Board's action would improve chances for the passage of such a law this year.

New York State passed such a law last year over the objections of the testing industry, which argued the law was a costly, unwarranted intrusion into the college admission process.

The College Board, saying the law meant test questions could be used only once, immediately cut the number of test dates in the state to five, a year and added a \$1.75 surcharge. Students must pay another \$4.65 if they wanted copies of their test form and the answers. College Board officials

said the test will continue

"Unlimited publication of test questions and answers after one-time use, as required under New York law, is not workable for the board at this time and may never be without unacceptable penalties in cost, reduction of services, and grave risk to test fairness and quality," College Board president George H. Hanford said.

In the year since the law was passed, no more than 8 percent of the students who took the test on a given day in New York asked for copies of the tests and answers.

Spokesmen for both the College Board and Educational Testing Service said the decision had nothing to do with two recent incidents in which students successfully challenged test answers, forcing the board to upgrade scores of

thousands of students. "Even before the students had access to the answers, there were students who raised questions about questions and adjustments were made," said board spokesman Robert C. Seaver.
