

Lives of Permian Basin's illegal Mexican aliens filled with fears, tears

 unwanted and uncared for by its own nation begins two years ago for Irma along a remote stretch of countryside between Presidio and Del Rio, where the muddy waters of the Rio Grande turn golden in the desert sunlight as they slash through awesome gorges shrouded by sheer bluffs and towering pinnacles from whose ledges the depths yawn temptingly.
 Irma and her children have long-awaited this day, for they have spent the last several months separated from her husband, who has been forced to journey northward into los Estados Unidos in order to help them survive. He has provided for them all right, at the expense of blisters on his hands and the sacrifice of his own physical, spiritual and emotional needs and those of his family as well, but all the material things in the world cannot replace the love and caring of a husband and father.

AND SO IT was that nightfall finds a man, his wife and their five children ranging in age from 3 to 15 carefully approaching on foot the rippling river from the dogwood and tasajillo along the Mexican shore. They are quiet, wary, afraid. They know La Migra watches the river closely and even has devices planted in the mud that detect a person's footsteps.
 But they are determined not to fall victim to the same pitfalls into which many other would-be *mojados* plunge in seeking a fair chance in life. They have arranged for an American citizen to drive their car from Ojinaga across the International Bridge to Presidio and downstream to Redford, a remote settlement a few hundred yards inside the United States, where it should be awaiting them this very-moment.

From the reeds and brush that crowd the Mexican lowlands a small rowboat is eased into the breakers, then mother, father and five children climb within. It is cramped, confined, and as a single paddle is wielded to leave gentle whirlpools in its wake, the water slashes a few inches from the rim. The river is not wide here, perhaps 30 yards, and yet in a way it seems as broad as untold centuries.

The mountains and cliffs painted against the nocturnal veil ahead look no differently than those behind. The sky seems jeweled with the same stars, the earth strewn with the same desert vegetation. The air tastes no better, no worse, than that receding aft, and yet all because the river signifies the imaginary boundary be-

tween one nation and another, one world and another, once they set foot on the mud on the opposite shore they will have committed a crime against the most powerful of all nations.

ALTHOUGH ONCE before Irma's husband has been captured by *la Migra*, on this night they are not to be denied. They reach the American bank safely, climb into their car, and drive away into the new hope that indwells the dark horizon beyond the *Camino del Rio*. They are now *mojados*, all of them, from the smallest baby to the oldest man.
 And a life of constant anxiety awaits them.

Irma's husband found farm work in Kermit and later in Morton, before the attraction of higher wages brought them to Midland. Elfida and her fiancé, meanwhile, already were in the United States, having crossed over similarly at Redford and labored in Andrews before the demand for construction workers lured them to the Tall City.

And even though a job as a heavy equipment operator at a downtown construction site was readily available for Elfida's husband, exploitation of him is evident, she says with expressionistic gestures of her arms.

"He's underpaid because he's illegal," she claims, explaining he makes only \$4.15 an hour operating a loader. "The legals who do the same work make more." She does note, however, that company benefits are good, providing for insurance and vacation — something unheard of for laborers in the Ojinagan fields.

ELFIDA SAYS her husband also suffered abuse at the hands of *la Migra* when he once crossed over and was captured. She cringes when she remembers, and says she asked him not to tell her all the details, that it tormented her too much.

All she will say is, "La Migra got their dogs after him and he was bitten while they were chasing him."

It was a bad experience for her husband, and for her. She hopes it never happens again, but she never knows what the next day will bring her family.

And it is this uncertainty that is the hardest element of all to bear. She realizes every morning when her husband leaves for work that it may be the last time she sees him for a long while, or forever. With realistic awareness of their dilemma, Elfida and her husband have worked out a plan should the reimposed Border Patrol raids on construction sites

claim him.
 "Anytime he's not home by 8 p.m., I'm supposed to pick the car up from work, because I'll know he's been captured," she explains quietly.

BUT EVEN IN consideration of the most serious calamities, she is able to grasp a measure of humor. "One time he had to work till 10, and I had a heart attack because I thought *la Migra* had taken him." She smiled, but it was one filled with submerged tragedy.

Their plan is even more detailed. Should she and her little boy be left alone with no way to survive in *los Estados Unidos* while her husband is returned to Mexico, "I would just wait for him," she says. "I know he'd be back. It would be so much easier and less risky for him to come back to us than for us to go after him." She laughed in anticipation of her next thought. "He may not have any shoes left on his feet, but he'd make it back."

Elfida says she was aware of the ban against the raiding of places of employment that was in effect from April, 1980 until Jan. 15 of this year, but to a large degree she still did not feel a measure of safe-

ty during that time. "Because we do not speak or read English, we're constantly in fear and don't know if what people tell us is true or not true," she explains.

LINES FURROW her face, replacing the smiles. "Though I've been jesting and laughing, the situation is very serious," she says grimly. "We ourselves know, first of all, we're not here on any kind of legal status, and that in itself creates fear. (The lifting of the ban) makes the fear increase, especially when we saw those people being dragged away from their homes on our way over here (for the interview)."

"If we live in constant anxiety of what the next day might bring," she adds after a moment of reflection. "I might say everything's fine, but that's not true. (The worry about apprehension) is always in the back of our mind." And then a smile parts her lips again. "We take a lot of aspirins."

So why did they cross over into the United States — and remain here — when they are forced to live in such constant dread of the next moment? "To work," Irma explains simply. "There's very little work in Mexi-

co."
 But Elfida's answer is more profound, more to the heart of the matter. "We don't necessarily come here because of the work, but because there's a better way of living here," she says, seriousness filling her dark eyes. "We can provide better for our families."

Sacrifices. Survival at the expense of dignity and education. Only one of the sisters' six children attends school in Midland, because the language barrier instantly would set them apart as *mojados*.

Despite abuses, anxiety and fear, Elfida and Irma say they have every intention of remaining in the United States — and returning again and again if they are sent back to Mexico. "Si that can be expected," says Elfida, and grim determination fills her features. "Our belief in this country and desire for it is so great the risks are worth it."

Even if they must hide — and keep on hiding, every day of their lives.

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market was little changed today despite signs that interest rates have stabilized and tensions have eased in Poland.

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Filipinos voted today in a plebiscite to establish the legal basis for President Ferdinand E. Marcos to win more years in power in an election.

The balloting was generally peaceful, but one shooting was reported and there were charges of vote fraud.

The state-run Philippine News Agency said a village official was shot to death at a polling place in the southern province of Zamboanga del Sur.

The mayor of Zamboanga City, 540 miles south of Manila, said police raided a hotel and found cartons of forged "yes" ballots.

Marcos predicted a landslide vote in favor of constitutional changes he is proposing, and the state news agency said turnout among the 25 million voters was heavy.

But a random check of polling places in Manila and elsewhere showed a small turnout.

Noting that the nation's second-largest commercial bank, announced today that it was leaving its prime lending rate unchanged at 17 percent and interest rates fell slightly on the nation's credit markets.

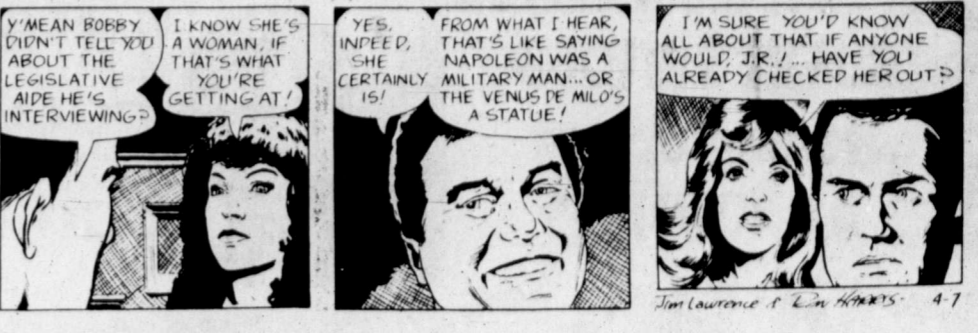

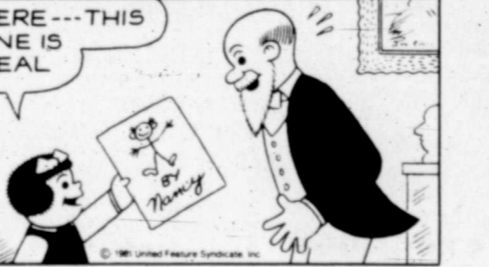

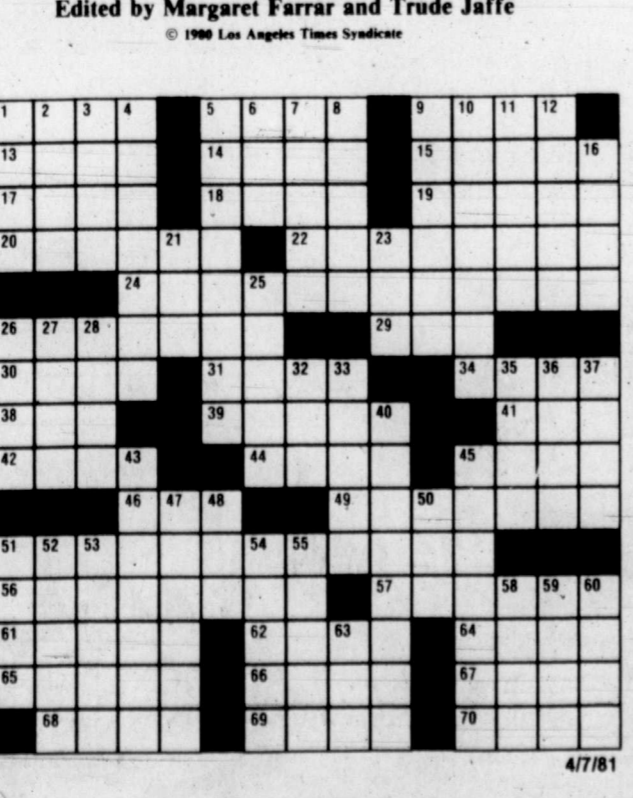
The rest of the play was simple. Declarer cashed the ace and king of spades, followed by the two top hearts, sluffing a club from his hand. Then he continued with dummy's top diamonds. West refused to ruff, in an attempt to hold his queen of trumps for a better purpose, but to no avail. Declarer simply crossruffed hearts and clubs. Whichever defender held the high trump was welcome to it whenever he chose to overruff, but that was the last trick for the enemy.

This hand graphically demonstrates the necessity for selecting which finesse you take with care. The diamond finesse was vital to the success of declarer's plan. The spade finesse was not even needed!

Your play to the first trick could decide the fate of the contract! A writer once remarked: "There's no such thing as a blind opening lead, only dead opening leads!" Facelift tightens skin, can't make it younger

Dear Dr. Solomon: Can you tell me what's involved in facelift operations, and how successful they are? I don't understand how the skin of a 50-year-old woman can be made more youthful. — Millie

Dear Millie: A facelift is not designed to make the facial tissues more youthful; as you suggest, this is not possible. But a facelift can remove some of the signs of a less youthful skin, such as wrinkles.

Dr. Reuven Snyderman, of the Rutgers Medical School, compares the process to taking a tuck in a rubberband that has lost its elasticity. No one can make the rubberband more elastic, but a tuck can be

taken in it to give it a tightened effect. The same holds true for the face. The skin is pulled toward the ears and some of it is trimmed away. To avoid any appearance of scarring, most incisions are made at the hairline. The operation takes about four hours, with the patient hospitalized no more than overnight. While there is a good deal of discoloration as a result of the procedure, there is very little pain. The discoloration disappears after about eight days.

An operation designed just to remove the lines around the eyes can be done in from one and one-half to two hours under local anesthesia. The patient is able to return home immediately after surgery. The operation itself is only slightly uncomfortable and also results in some discoloration which may last up to several days. Incidentally, one of every 30 facelift patients is a male.

'Scared' man rescues girls

WHITEFACE, Texas (AP) — Waco Reynolds says he didn't feel brave — "just scared to death" — when he crawled through a window to rescue two teenagers lost in the smoke-filled corridors of a burning dormitory at a West Texas home for girls.

Reynolds, a superintendent at Girls' Town, located about 48 miles southwest of Lubbock, says he heard the girls' cries for help after they were left behind in the confusion of a hasty evacuation when the facility's main dormitory was gutted by fire early Monday morning.

Fire officials said the fire, which started in the living room of dormitory about 2 a.m., spread quickly and the 44 girls and 11 houseparents escaped with only the clothes on their backs.

An investigator was expected to be at the rural West Texas girl's home today to search for the cause of the blaze.

Reynolds says he was awakened about 2:15 a.m. and ran from his home to the nearby dorm.

"The girls were running out of both ends of the dorm. Then we discovered that two were missing and I heard them hollering so I went back in through a window," he said.

"There was a lot of smoke and I couldn't see anything, so I started crawling in the floor."

Reynolds said he called out until he found the two girls.

"I told them to 'grab ahold of my shirt, then we went out the back. I wasn't hurt, mostly just scared to death."

Misty Shaw, 15, sustained minor burns on her hand, while 14-year-old Leila Parvin and Reynolds escaped unscathed. Several girls received minor cuts and scratches while crawling out of windows to escape the blaze, officials said.

Wanda Cooper, wife of Girls' Town executive director Marshall Cooper, said smoke detectors in the building apparently were not triggered and one of the girls discovered the fire when she woke up "gagging on the smoke."

Firefighters from four surrounding communities brought the blaze under control about 6 a.m.

A fire department spokesman estimated damages at \$500,000, not including all of the girls' belongings lost in the blaze.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I've tried kicking the smoking habit on several occasions, but without success; however, I have been able to make the switch to low tar and nicotine cigarettes without increasing the number of cigarettes I smoke each day. Since my total nicotine intake therefore is decreased, wouldn't this be considered a form of withdrawal? — Brad

Dear Brad: While reducing nicotine intake by changing to low tar and nicotine cigarettes is desirable, it is not the same as breaking the habit entirely. Having made the switch, however, you may now find it easier to quit altogether.

Lawrence Garfinkel, vice president for epidemiology and statistics for the American Cancer Society, has reported on a study of smokers who broke the habit some time after changing to low tar and nicotine cigarettes. Among men who smoked low tar and nicotine cigarettes in 1965, 41 percent had stopped smoking by 1972; on the other hand, only 35 percent of men who smoked high tar and nicotine cigarettes were able to quit during that period. Among women, the corresponding figures were 27 percent and 20 percent.

Dear Dr. Solomon: How can you keep a usually active child in bed when he has a fever? — Mrs. J.B.

Dear Mrs. B.: While it is important to try to keep a child with fever quiet, it is not necessary that he be confined to bed. The same objective may be achieved by having him read, watch television or participate in similar quiet activities.

Yale dorm evacuated

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — The Yale University dormitory where actress Jodie Foster lives was evacuated briefly Monday when an anonymous telephone caller threatened to blow it up unless accused presidential assailant John W. Hinckley Jr. was released, police said.

Students were allowed to return to Welch Hall, a freshman dorm, after police made a brief search and found no bomb, a police spokesman said. Authorities termed the bomb threat a "crank call."

Miss Foster, 18, received several letters and notes from Hinckley before President Reagan and three others were wounded in Washington March 30.

Investigator theorize the Hinckley's infatuation with the actress may have motivated the alleged shooting.

Mark White is surprise witness at custody trial

LIBERTY, Texas (AP) — Texas Attorney General Mark White, a surprise witness in a child custody suit, testified today that the late Price Daniel Jr., once his political opponent, was a sober person and "not a big drinker."

Details of very stormy marriage revealed in letters couple wrote

LIBERTY, Texas (AP) — He didn't like the way his wife cooked, the way she greeted him when he came home from work or her sweet tooth. She didn't like being treated "like a peasant with no sense" and warned him that his throne "will crumble one of these days and you're going to need someone who loves you."

me but for anyone." Price was apparently quite particular about his meals, asking Vickie to make weekends special. "I WOULD LIKE a good, hot meal Saturday noon and a hamburger with two pieces of cheese Saturday night, or vice versa," he wrote.

In a list of things he should do to improve the marriage, Daniel wrote: "Do not lose my temper. Do not retaliate or try to get back. Try, try, try to avoid what Vickie calls put-downs, especially when they are being interpreted by her as being mean or bad."

White said he knew nothing of such incidents, only what he had read in the newspapers. "I'd find that very difficult to believe about him," White said under questioning by Richard "Racehorse" Haynes, attorney for Mrs. Daniel. "Certainly if that were true, that would have an affect (on his opinion of Daniel.)"

On Jan. 19, Price Daniel Jr., former speaker of the Texas House of Representatives and son of one of Texas' most powerful families, was shot to death. Vickie Daniel, his second wife, is charged with his murder.

Free on \$50,000 bail, with her murder trial not expected to begin until summer, she says the shooting was an accident, that she remembers firing a warning shot at Price but doesn't remember hitting him.

Despite their attempts, the lists failed to heal the wounds. Mrs. Daniel came across the list later and wrote Daniel a letter in another attempt at reconciliation.

Murph testified he had never observed any actions by Mrs. Daniel before Jan. 19 that were detrimental to her children. When asked by Haynes if he had evidence Mrs. Daniel had done anything since then that was not in the best interests of her children, Murph replied, "Killing their father."

Details of their stormy marriage are revealed in letters the couple wrote to each other in 1979. The letters were submitted as evidence in a lawsuit filed by Daniel's sister, Jean Daniel Murph, in an attempt to gain custody of the Daniels' two sons.

Her No. 1 complaint about her husband was that he belittled her. "Never make fun of or put me down," she admonished. "Kid, yes. Joke, yes. But no snipes."

The letter ends in an elaborately scrawled "Love you" and a smiling stick figure of a girl.

highest amount of water escaping as a gas comes during the hot, dry summers while the least comes during the winters. For example, Reed's numbers reflect that only 1.02 inches of water evaporated off the ponds during December 1980. But there was 12.06 inches leaving as a gas during July 1980 when the area was experiencing a drought and heat wave.

ponds should be "relatively impermeable," he said. The state has ruled that holding areas for toxic wastes, such as chemicals, should be built with a clay liner. This keeps the seepage down to one-tenth of a foot per year, the hydrologist explained. But that requirement of a clay liner doesn't apply to sewage holding ponds.

WHILE SEEPAGE figures from the older ponds were far lower than that of the new lagoon, Reed explained "organic slimes that build up on the bottom of these ponds is impermeable and inhibit seepage to a point. "The new pond is bare soil; it has no organic buildup," he continued. That buildup takes six months to one year in a new pond. "The old ponds get tighter and tighter, and this buildup impedes the flow of water through the bottom."

EVEN SO, REED believes the 270 gallons per minute is high seepage. The 900 gallons also is a very high figure. A second, more definitive look at the seepage will come at the end of six months. By this time, Reed and Associates will have evaporation data from Midland, something they didn't have on this report. Reed said the firm has set up evaporation pans close to the holding ponds and "now we're getting good data on evaporation." They also have installed gauges at the ponds to measure accurately the change in storage.

Mohr gives hospital board 'a gesture of cooperation'

Director-elect Wanda Mohr offered "a gesture of cooperation" to the board of directors of Midland County Hospital District this morning, as the board convened in a special meeting to canvass the votes from Saturday's election.

Mrs. Mohr, who will be installed along with incumbent Ed Magruder at the next board meeting on April 29, said she feared the directors might consider her a rebel.

"You will find that I am surprisingly intelligent and surprisingly cooperative," she explained to the incumbent members. "And I am looking forward to working with you."

"We will make every effort to see that not only you — but the rest of us (including directors and trustees) fully understand the changes that have been taking place in the governance of the hospital and the hospital district," current president of the board Magruder said.

Implicating the current Tribrook management study results, Magruder said the hospital board's own policy changes will "be in operation shortly" after the boards decide "how they (the policy changes) will be put into force and effect and how the govern-

ments will operate." Magruder further suggested that after all decisions had been made and a new management agreement with the trustees was drawn up, the investigators for Tribrook be asked to examine the changes and "make their analysis of these changes."

"I don't want to cause trouble," Mrs. Mohr explained. "And I don't want to start taking over the administration. I did it (ran for office) because I care."

Magruder agreed, "We all do." He continued to say the board had to work together. "If we fail as an individual, then we will contribute to the failure of the district."

As for the voting results, the board passed a final total of 15,333 votes counted resulting in candidate voting as followed: Ed Magruder, 4,421; Thomas P. Ingram, 3,740; Dr. Henrie Mast, 3,956; Wanda Mohr, 3,818; and one write-in vote for Ken Turnbow.

Swearing in ceremonies for Dr. Mast will be conducted at the June meeting of the board, as he will be unable to attend the April or May meetings.

In other hospital news, the board of trustees will meet with the Joint Commission on Hospital Accreditations at a closed noon meeting at the hospital to discuss the upcoming survey.

Hinton nominated

WASHINGTON (AP) — Deane R. Hinton, a career diplomat who is assistant secretary of state for economic and business affairs, is being nominated as the new U.S. ambassador to strife-torn El Salvador.

If Monday's nomination by President Reagan is confirmed by the Senate, Hinton would replace Robert E. White, another career foreign service officer who is being retired next month on the grounds the State Department has no assignment for him.

White says he is being fired for opposition to what he called the Reagan administration's "ready-made doctrine that the solution for El Salvador lies with the introduction of large quantities of armaments and military advisers."

High court grants benefits in First Amendment case

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a broad interpretation of the First Amendment, the Supreme Court says a worker who leaves his job because of religious principles can collect unemployment insurance.

The high court, in an 8-1 ruling Monday, authorized unemployment benefits for Eddie C. Thomas, a Jehovah's Witness who worked for a year at the Blaw-Knox Foundry and Machinery Co. of Indiana.

Thomas had worked in the company's sheet steel division, but when that closed he was assigned to a section making turrets for military tanks. He asked for another transfer but was told all the other company jobs involved armaments manufacturing, in which he refused to participate.

Thomas sought unemployment insurance, but

the state refused and was upheld by the Indiana Supreme Court.

In reversing the Indiana ruling, the court said, "The employment, once acceptable, became religiously objectionable because of changed conditions."

Chief Justice Warren E. Burger, writing for the majority, warned the nation's courts that they "should not undertake to dissect religious beliefs."

Lee Boothby, attorney for the Americans United for Separation of Church and State Fund, called the decision "a vindication of individual belief."

Americans United had filed a friend of the court argument in Thomas' behalf.

In a busy day, the court also:

—Left intact the 1979 prison-escape conviction of Sara Jane Moore,

servicing a life sentence for attempting to assassinate President Gerald R. Ford in 1975. The escape conviction extended the date Ms. Moore will become eligible for parole from 1985 to 1986.

—Agreed to consider whether 16-year-old Monty Lee Eddings, convicted of killing Oklahoma state trooper Larry Crabtree, can be sentenced to death. The outcome could fix a minimum age for the death penalty nationwide.

MX hearings scheduled

WASHINGTON (AP) — The exact locations have been determined for the Air Force's public hearings in Texas on the proposed MX missile system.

The hearings will be held in four Texas cities — Austin, Lubbock, Amarillo and the Panhandle town of Dalhart.

Hearings also are scheduled in New Mexico, Utah and Nevada.

The first public hearing in Texas on the draft environmental impact statement released last December about the potential effects of the massive MX system will be held at the auditorium of the Lyndon B. Johnson Library in Austin.

Stock market rallies

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market was little changed today despite signs that interest rates have stabilized and tensions have eased in Poland.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, which plunged 12.87 points Monday, was up .18 points to 994.42 on Tuesday.

But losers held a narrow edge over gainers among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

A surge in interest rates led to Monday's broad declines in stocks and sent some bond prices to record-low levels.

But Citibank, the nation's second-largest commercial bank, announced today that it was leaving its prime lending rate unchanged at 17 percent and interest rates fell slightly on the nation's credit markets.

The NYSE's composite index fell .03 to 77.26. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index fell 79 to 363.52.

Big Bond volume reached 18.88 million shares over the first two hours, down from 20.89 million in the comparable period Monday.

American Telephone & Telegraph, which fell 1 point Monday, was the most active issue, up 1/4 at 52 1/4.

Trading included blocks of 100,000 shares and 25,000 shares, each changing hands at 52 1/4 a share.

With a lessening of fears in Poland, gold prices fell sharply today, and precious metals issues traded lower.

ASA fell 2 1/2 to 52 1/2; Dome Mines was off 2 1/4 at 87; and Hecla Mining slid 1 1/2 to 24 1/2.

Filipinos vote on constitution changes today

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Filipinos voted today in a plebiscite to establish the legal basis for President Ferdinand E. Marcos to win six more years in power in an election.

The balloting was generally peaceful, but one shooting was reported and there were charges of vote fraud.

The state-run Philippine News Agency said a village official was shot to death at a polling place in the southern province of Zamboanga del Sur. The mayor of Zamboanga City, 540 miles south of Manila, said police raided a hotel and found cartons of forged "yes" ballots.

Marcos predicted a landslide vote in favor of constitutional changes he is proposing, and the state news agency said turnout among the 25 million voters was heavy. But a random check of polling places in Manila and elsewhere showed a small turnout.

Voting was mandatory, with prison terms prescribed for those who didn't. But prosecutions were considered unlikely.

The plebiscite is the first political exercise since Marcos lifted martial law in January. It is expected to result later this year in the first presidential election in 12 years. But regardless of the outcome of the plebiscite, Marcos is certain to hold on to the power he has held for nearly 16 years in this Pacific archipelago of 49 million people.

The constitutional amendments provide for election of a president with sweeping powers who would serve six years, would choose his own prime minister, could be re-elected as many times as he could win and would name a 15-man executive committee to succeed him in case he is incapacitated. He and his subordinates would enjoy lifetime immunity from prosecution for "official acts."
