

## How Motorists Pay

Representing the results of six years of study report by Chairman Joseph B. Eastman of the Interstate Commerce Commission appears to refute the contention that highway transportation is subsidized by the government. The study was made by Mr. Eastman in his former capacity as Federal coordinator of transportation.

The study regards the special taxes levied on motor vehicles to finance highway improvement and maintenance as the equivaelent of the railroad's investment in rails, right-of-way and other property. On that basis, highway transport is seen as the least subsidized of all modes of tranporta-

In 1936, for example, it is stated that the total net subsidy to transportation was 193 million dollars, of which water transport received 66.6 per cent, the railroads 18.5 per cent, air transport 10.8 per cent, and motor transport only 4.1 per cent.

In the period from 1921 through 1937 the Federal, state and local governments expended on highways the tremendous sum of 31 billion dollars of which all but a few million dollars were paid by motor vehicle users. Thus, it is indicated by the report, motor vehicle transport has always paid its own way, and earned on merit the competitive position it now occupies in naitonal trasportation. Efforts to penalize it would serve to handicap a great and indispensable transport facility.

Statistics are usually rather dull reading, bu some facts recently compiled concerning the world's telephones might well be a source of pride to the people of this country. For the United States now has one-half of all the telephones in the world.

The world total was estimated to be 41 million before the outbreak of the present war in Europe which has doubtless reduced the number considerably in the belligerent countries, and approxi-mately 20 million of these are in the United States New York City alone has more than all of France and three times as many as the whole continent of

Americans make more than 90 million telephone calls every day, or over 1,000 each second, which is an average of about 223 a year for every man, woman and child in the country. Taken together, people in the rest of the world make only about 15 calls per capita annually.

The retail price of sugar reached the peak immediately after the world war and averaged 19.4 cents per pound in 1920. These high prices prevailed when the United States market was controlled by foreign sugar producers. In 1923, which was five years after the armistice, the average retail price was 9.9 cents per pound, but when the domestic prdoucers of sugar cane and sugar beets have been permitted to produce two-thirds or more of the sugar requirements of this country the retail price per pound has been around 5 cents. If American consumers had paid 9.9 cents for sugar in 1938 as they did when foreign sugar controlled the mar-1923 the sugar bill for the United States would have been \$1,253,000,000. As it was, sugar consumers saved \$600,000,000 in 1938 alone.

Before the present Federal sugar control expires next December, not only the growers of sugar cane and sugar beets from 22 producing states, but housewives and sugar users all over the United States are expected to unite in protest against a continuation of the existing policy which favors foreign producers who have in the past brought about exceedingly high retail prices when permitted to dominate the United States market.

All information and assistance ecessary for participation in the AAA program can be obtained free of charge at the county AAA

"No farmer should pay any kind of fee for information or assistance in doing the 'paper work' connected with the AAA pro-gram," George Slaughter, chairman of the state committee, declared. "All such services are furished without cost by the county AAA office, and farmers are in rited to take advantage of it."

Persons who are charging fee: for such services have no official status and cannot be depended upon to furnish accurate and complete information, the chairman continued, pointing out that any farmer using such assistance will have only himself to blame if errors in forms and applications result in loss of payments. 
