President performing duties despite pain

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite some pain, President Reagan is exercising, visiting with friends and performing limited official duties as he recuperates from a gunshot wound that the FBI says may have been made by a special, explosive bullet.

The bullet could have blown up at any time, even while doctors were removing it from the president's chest Monday night, FBI spokesman Roger Young said Thurs-

But Young said the bullet that ricocheted off the president's limousine and lodged in Reagan's left lung never exploded, although the one that pierced press secetary James S. Brady's brain apparently did. Brady remained in critical condition, but was reported making satisfactory progress.

Reagan was reported making excellent progress at George Washington University Hospital, and White House aides said he probably will be released next week.

The White House said today that the president had another restful night and, when the report was issued at 6: 45 a.m. EST, was still sleeping after having been awake until about 10 p.m.

Reagan awoke within an hour, however, and held an early-morning meeting in his room with top aides Edwin Meese III, James A. Baker III and Michael K. Deaver. "His progress is super," hospital spokesman Dr. Dennis O'Leary said Thursday, but he added that Reagan would not be fully recovered by April 23, when aides said he still

plans to begin a six-day trip to California and Mexico. "He's had a major injury and he's had a major surgical procedure and I don't expect him to be 100 percent of normal in three weeks," O'Leary said. "That's not a reasonable expectation for anyone."

O'Leary said the president is capable of making any decisions, but "there is some effort to limit" his activity so he'll get well more quickly.

Meanwhile, John W. Hinckley Jr., charged with attempting to assassinate Reagan, was found competent to stand trial. He wore a white bulletproof vest during a court appearance Thursday and was ordered to remain in an institution for further sanity tests while a federal grand jury investigates the charges against him.

The FBI's tentative finding that the .22-caliber shots fired in Monday's assassination attempt were "devastator (exploding) bullets" raised further questions of whether Reagan was in graver danger than originally report-

Administration actively preparing Polish aid

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration, declaring that the Polish crisis has become "far more serious" in the last two days, is actively preparing for the possibility of Soviet military intervention while accelerating economic aid to Poland.

Pentagon analysts said Thursday that new signs of intensified military preparations along the Polish border are sparking increased U.S. concern that the Soviets might use force to quell the trouble communist country's labor and political unrest.

At the same time, Vice President George Bush an-nounced that the United States will send new food aid to Poland and will consider further economic assistance.

The Polish crisis appeared to ease early this week when the Solidarity union cancelled a threatened general

But this brought no relaxation of readiness among Warsaw Pact troops in and around Poland. Maneuvers continued and the Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda denounced what it called "anti-socialist" activi-

Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said Thursday that the Soviet Union had taken military steps in the previous 24-48 hours that made the situation in Poland 'far more serious.'

'We are taking...steps" in case the Russians do move against Poland, he told the Senate Budget Committee.

The defense chief did not describe the steps being taken, but aides said he referred to consultations with allies on possible political, economic and diplomatic responses not military preparations. Sources in the U.S. military command structure said no American forces were being placed on alert.

The United States and other Western countries have been accelerating their assistance to Poland, reasoning that a political accomodation between the Polish government and the new independent union movement will be more difficult if Poland's economy continues to deterio-

After a meeting Thursday with Mieczyslaw Jagielski, the Polish deputy prime minister, Bush said the administration plans to sell Poland dairy products, including dried milk and butter, at concessionary prices.

Officials said Poland was given permission to buy \$73 million worth of dairy products payable in Polish zlotys. The offer, they said, represents a discount of about \$20

Bush said the administration is considering other forms of assistance. He did not elaborate, but sources had said Wednesday that the administration may allow Poland to defer repayment on a \$2.5 billion loan. The administration already has permitted Poland to defer \$88 million in debt

Prem's troops regain control of Thailand's capital

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) -Troops loyal to Prime Minister Prem Tinsulanonda seized control of this Thai capital today and crushed a two-day-old coup attempt by rebel generals. Two people were killed and five were injured in brief fighting.

The deaths were the first reported in six coups or attempted coups since

A passing civilian and one rebel soldier were killed when loyalists returned the fire of rebel troops at the royal palace, military and official

sources said, adding that the civilian was killed by a stray bullet. Three other rebels were injured in the brief

struggle, the sources said.

Later in the day, two more rebels were slightly wounded when they tried to run a road block, witnessess

The 60-year-old Prem, who had strong support from the Thai royal family, ordered his troops to march on Bangkok after all-night negotia-tions with rebel leader Gen. Sant Chitpatima produced no results, mili-

The loyalist forces met no opposition until they reached the royal pal-

At the same time, Prem ordered troops within the city who had not openly supported the cou to take contol of the approximately 30 radio and television stations in Bangkok. They complied and met no resistance.

Less than two hours after Prem's forces closed the airport and swept into the city in the early morning, the coup leaders fled or were captured.

Government forces surrounded the last band of about 300 rebels at army headquarters. The rebels gave up without a fight after an hour-long standoff and returned to their barracks to the cheers of thousands of civilians who had gathered in the area, witnesses said.

Military and embassy sources said the 59-year-old Sant fled to Burma in a helicopter. Sant's main supporter, 1st Army Commander Lt. Gen. Vasin Israngkul Na Ayuttaya, surrendered to Prem at the prime minister's emergency headquarters in Korat, 150 miles to the northeast, the government radio reported.

Four other coup leaders were under government "protection," according to a government radio report.

"The matter has ended peaceful-Prem said in a statement released in Korat. "The officers and troops who joined in the coup were misguided, but it indicated they were well-disciplined and obey their commanders.

"I will give fair judgment to all. Let

us forget what happened and look to the future and continue to work for our country," the statement said.

The coup, which began early Wednesday morning, started unraveling during the night when the head of the national police force defected from the rebels, and the naval chief of staff denied he was part of the conspiracy.

Sources had said that Sant could count on the support of only 55,000 of Thailand's 160,000 army troops. The rest remained loyal to Prem.

Campaigns approach conclusion

The sign-waving, the speeches, the advertisements that poke you at every turn — they all will disappear Saturday when the citywide elections and school bond issue will be decid-

Compared to past years elections when the heat was turned on with citizens jockeying for positions in the mayor's race or the school board contest (as with last year's annual footrace), or with strong opposition voicing its ideas on a school bond issue (such as two years ago), this year's competition has been relative-

For a change, no organized group has voiced a protest to the Midland Election

Independent School District's \$6.6 million bond issue.

If the proposal passes, \$5.6 million will go to construct two new elementary schools. One school will be located in north Midland and will take the overcrowding pressure off other ele-mentary schools. The other will be a new De Zavala School to replace the built in 1928. School officials expect to locate the replacement next to the current school in an effort to begin redeveloping the Hidalgo Park area.

THE OTHER \$1.05 million of the bond issue will go for improvements

to Midland and Lee high schools, with Midland High also to get a new library and a larger band hall.

None of the four candidates vying for two positions on the school board is against the bond issue per se.

Seeking Place 3 are Ann Page, a former board member, and Dickie Gatlin, an accountant with Gene Sledge Drilling Corp. Fighting it out for Place 4 are Gary Hopper, news producer for KOSA-TV, and Michael Butler, assistant director in the city's public works department.

Butler is the only candidate who strayed from the straight "yes" ticket on the bond issue. He is opposed to the idea of a new library for Midland High and criticized the school board's past negligence in not providing prop-er maintenance for the schools, thus leading to a need for the new De

Three seats on the Midland City Council are up for grabs and two of those could see new people sitting there come May when they take of-

Only Gordon Marcum II is unopposed in his re-election bid to Place 2. Marcum has sat there four years and is looking for a third term.

ALL CANDIDATES have cited the need to plan for Midland's growth in light of the boom the oil city is experiencing. Also cropping up with that growth are problems, such as traffic coordination, paving and streets, that the council candidates are listing as irritants they need to

Going for Place 1 on the council are two new faces: Giffert Alstrin, president of Western State Bank, and Jesse Hatfield, owner of No. 1 Sports Place. Incumbent Doris Howbert decided four years was enough and it was time to let someone else have her



Texas Electric Service Co. will begin a program April 15 to provide financial incentives to encourage customers to replace worn or obsolete air conditioning and water heating equipment with more energy-efficient

equipment.

Details of the program will be available at that time.

"The goal of our Residential Load Management Program will be to hold down electricity price increases by holding down the number of new power plants we have to build," said TESCO President Bill Marquardt.

Equipment with a higher Energy Efficient Ratio rating costs more than lower-rated equipment. Therefore, to encourage customers to buy energysaving equipment, TESCO will pay part of the difference in cost, he

"We will be actively encouraging our customers to install this equip-

Common-law wife charged in shooting

ODESSA — The common-law wife of an Odessa man has been arrested and charged with attempted murder in a shooting incident here early Thursday morning.

A spokesman for the Ector County Sheriff's Department said the 23year-old woman was taken into custody after an investigation into the shooting of Rickey Ray, 24, of 206 W. 47th St

Ray was shot twice in the head about 3 a.m. Thursday. Initial reports said the couple was surprised in their home by an intruder who exchanged gunfire with the woman before escap-

Ray remained in critical condition this morning at Medical Center Hospital. Formal charges are expected to be lodged against the woman later ment because this is an effective way to slow the rate of growth in the need for electricity during the summer 'peak load' season,' Marquardt said.

Customers who install high EER air conditioners or heat pumps and solar-assisted or energy-recovery water heaters will make a direct contribution toward this goal.

He noted that the cost of a new power plant today is more than three times the average cost of the plants now used by TESCO.

Because high-efficiency equipment uses less electricity, customers who install it will save money on their bills

as long as the equipment is in use.

"But the initial cost of this equipment is higher than that of lower-efficiency units. So our program is designed to encourage customers to replace outmoded equipment sooner, and encourage them to invest in higher-efficiency units, than they might otherwise consider," Marquardt said.

Complete information on types of eligible equipment and amounts of financial assistance will be available when the program goes into effect on April 15

Task force study blends scientific into supernatural

ATLANTA (AP) — In a workroom papered with graphs and maps, one chart shows the age of the victims. Another plots their heights and weights. There's even one that shows the temperature at the time each victim was last seen.

Nearby, science blends into the supernatural. Nearly 20 poster-size drawings are tacked to room dividers, each purportedly showing what the killer looks like, each submitted by an avowed psychic — and each different from the others.

At task force headquarters, where the hunt is on for the killer or killers of 22 young blacks, no lead goes ignored, officials say.

The headquarters was opened to reporters for the first time Thursday, and Public Safety Commissioner Lee Brown gave a guided tour. Meanwhile, Hartford, Conn., televi-

Meanwhile, Hartford, Conn., television station WFSB quoted sources as saying a Hartford man was being questioned there in connection with the Atlanta killings. Police Chief George Sicaras refused to comment on the report.

But in Atlanta, Brown denied anyone from Atlanta was questioning the man, identified as Larry Marshall, "about 34." And a spokesman for Brown said the special task force investigating the slayings had "no interest" in Marshall. Marshall's extradition to Georgia was being sought in connection with an attempted robbery warrant, not for the child slayings, the spokesman said.

Almost 90 people, including 40 investigators, are assigned to the investigation, and it's costing the city an estimated \$170,000 a month. No ar-

rests have been made, and the list of victims is growing.

Two new victims — 13-year-old Timothy Hill and his friend, 21-year-old Eddie Duncan — were fished from the Chattahoochee River this week and added to the task force's list of unsolved cases, which now totals 22 deaths and two missing children since

Among the investigators' theories is that a killer is responding to publicity. Duncan, the oldest victim so far but retarded and described as child-like, was last seen March 20, the same day bat-carrying vigilantes began patrolling the housing project where he lived

In some other deaths, investigators have said the killer might have placed the bodies in certain locations in reaction to publicity.

At the task force headquarters, computer terminals sit atop rows of desks, giving investigators access to thousands of bits of information gleaned from police records and public tips.

"We're not overlooking anything," said Brown. He described the computer system as "state-of-the-art."

While conducting his first news conference in task force headquarters, Brown packed reporters, technicians, photographers and cameramen into a tiny conference room with walls covered with charts.

He said the charts indicate the task force is looking for any combination of factors that link the victims to some common factor and that could lead police to the killer or killers.

Food, energy prices rise sharply

WASHINGTON (AP) — Inflation at the wholesale level surged at a 16.2 percent annual rate in March — the steepest climb in eight months — as food prices resumed their rise and energy costs accelerated from an already quickened pace, the government reported today.

The 1.3 percent March increase was the largest since last July's 1.7 percent and compared to February's 0.8

The Labor Department said the price of finished energy-related goods rose 6.1 percent in March, at least partly due to President Reagan's Jan.

Food prices, which had dropped 0.6 percent at the wholesale level in February, climbed 0.8 percent in March, led by a brisk 19.4 percent increase in prices for fresh and dried vegetables.

The index, which is adjusted for seasonal variations, usually gives a good indication of the future trend of

prices at the consumer level.

It has risen at an annual rate of 12.5 percent for the first three months of 1981, above the 11.7 percent rate for all of last year but well below the 17.5 percent recorded in the first quarter of 1980, a department spokesman said.

The 6.1 percent rise in energy prices was well above the 3.6 percent increase in February and was the fifth straight large monthly advance, the new report said.





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

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Syrian troops blast Lebanese Christian city

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Syrian roops, stationed in Lebanon as peacekeepers, blasted Zahleh, the Mideast's largest Roman Catholic city, this morning with tank and rocket fire in a bid to stop rightist Christians from strengthening their militia base

The rightist Voice of Lebanon radio said five Syrian rockets hit a city hospital at daybreak, causing casualties among patients and staff. It was the third straight day of shelling.

The government of Christian President Elias Sarkis and Moslem Prime Minister Shafik al Wazzan called an emergency meeting to try to find a way to end the shelling of Zahleh and of the Christian east sector of Beirut.

Police said 82 people have been killed and 245 wounded in the two cities. Nearly all the reported casualties were Christians.

The Voice of Lebanon broadcast urged the government to replace the 22,000 Syrian troops - who have policed a Moslem-Christian armistice since a cease-fire calmed the 1975-1976 civil war — with units of the newly rebuilt Lebanese army. Former Lebanese President Camille Chamoun, head of an alliance of rightist Christain militias and parties, called on the United Nations to send peacekeeping troops to replace the Syrians.

Spokesmen for leftist groups said they would oppose any move to have the Syrian forces removed, saying the Lebanese army command tilts toward the rightists.

In Tel Aviv, the Israeli command said today its forces also mounted an overnight attack in war-stricken Lebanon, the third such raid reported this week. Residents of the area also reported the attack.

Seaborne Israeli raiders killed two Palestinian guerrillas in an ambush about 12 miles south of Beirut, the Lebanese capital. The raid apparently was carried out in line with Israel's policy of preemptive strikes aimed at heading off Palestinian guerrilla attacks on the Jewish state.

Israeli Radio also quoted Deputy Defense Minister Mordechai Zippori

as saying Israel "will not stand quiet if there is a threat to the Christian community" in Lebanon. But there was no indication the latest raid was tied to the Syrian shelling.

"We shall not allow the peaceful Lebanese population to remain the target of aggression," Chamoun said in a statement.

The Syrian command issued a communique saying its troops fired on Zahleh to block construction by Phalangist militiamen of a road linking Zahleh, a city 30 miles east of Beirut, with the Mount Lebanon district, power base of the nation's 700,000 Maronite Christians

The Phalangist-operated Voice of Lebanon said dozens of wounded civilians lay unattended in the streets of Zahleh because ambulances could not reach them. The radio said 30 families were feared buried in the rubble of an apartment building that collapsed under heavy gunfire.

In Washington, the State Department called the shelling of Zahleh "indefensible" and said, "We hope that all parties involved in the fighting will immediately stop and forestall further casualties among the

The Beirut police department described Thursday's shelling in that city as the heaviest Syrian crackdown on the rightist Christian strongholds since a month-long bombardment in 1978 killed 1,200 people.
One resident of the Christian sector,

Nadia Trad, told The Associated Press by telephone, "It was sudden hell, sudden death. Shells rained and rained and the blasts were maddening. I just don't know how I made it to the bunker?

Bachir Gemayel, the Phalangist military commander, said a Syrian rocket exploded a few yards from his car and wounded his driver. Ge-mayel, whose father heads the Phalangist Party, said 26 Christians were killed and 138 wounded in the Syrian barrage from positions just behind the "Green Line" separating the Moslem and Christian sectors of the capital.

Air traffic was diverted from the Beirut airport during the shelling and after direct rocket hits spread smoke and fire through the port eight foreign-flag ships moved out of the har-

WASHINGTON (AP) - Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger scoffs at reports he felt Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. was encroaching upon his turf after President Rea-

'We don't worry about turfs in this territory," Weinberger told reporters Thursday. "This is a very large turf in the Department of Defense and foreign policy is a very large turf and we each have enough to occupy us fully. There were no clashes or disagreements or anything of that

White House officials who requested a onymity have said Haig and Wein, rger disagreed about their responsibilities in the tense hours after Monday's assassination attempt on

"I simply brought him up to date on

some of the activities that I had taken in connection with my responsibilities with the military command and advised him as to what those had been,' Weinberger said, denying he and Haig "had words."

Despite assurances by both men that there were no serious differences, the New York Times reported today that Weinberger was upset by Haig's television appearance after the assassination attempt.

The newspaper said Haig left the situation room and headed for the briefing room without telling anyone. "The next minute we looked up and Haig was on television," a source familiar with the incident told the Times. "There was a look of anguish on Weinberger's face. He said, 'I can't believe that. What is that guy doing and under what authority'

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


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

Workers describe modern sweatshops

NEW YORK (AP) — Describing rooms reminis-cent of those where freedom-seeking immigrants worked in near-slavery at the turn of the century, two women have testified that the sweatshop is thriving in New York and New Jersey.

Wearing a ski mask to protect her identity, one woman said Thursday at a state and federal labor hearing she sews dresses with 30 other women in a large windowless room with a single door that almost always is locked.

She said she is paid \$1.30 for a dress that takes two to three hours to make and sells in fancy department

Authorities seeking legislation to prevent the abuse of workers in the garment industry say the woman is one of thousands who work in sweatshops under poor health and safety conditions

The findings of the hearing conducted by the New York state and federal labor departments are to be used in a report to Congress and the New York Legislature in support of laws to end abuses in


Suggestions for improving conditions included licensing owners of garment shops and forcing them to keep accurate books, with stiff penalties for violations.

The other masked woman, who called herself Sarah, said at her sewing job in The Bronx, when someone is accidentally stabbed with a needle by a sewing machine, her employer "uses pliers" to pull it out but doesn't take her to a doctor. The employee must continue working.


Sweatshop workers can make as little as \$57 for 40 nours work, according to testimony.

Frederick Siems, an executive vice president of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union, testified at the hearing he was "surprised to learn" sweatshops still existed.

But he said it was easy to see how the shops can exist with the large influx of immigrants who "are so exploitable that it's enough to make you cry.

Other fireworks seized after blast

NEWPORT, Ky. (AP) - Enough fireworks to fill several trucks were seized in raids on four locations near here after an explosion in a secret fireworks

factory killed two people and injured 25.

The explosion rocked the town's main shopping area Thursday and damaged 100 homes and 80 businesses, Fire Chief Ralph Quitter said. Debris was scattered over a wide area.

"There were tons of fireworks in there," said Thomas Stokes, assistant supervisor of the Cincinnati office of the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. Fireworks are illegal in Kentucky.

Kentucky Adjutant General Billy Wellman ordered 33 National Guardsmen into the city to prevent looting of the damaged six-block area. Stokes said he wanted to question Victor Schar-

stein, 40, of Newport, in connection with the blast. Three weeks ago Scharstein rented the garage that was ripped apart by the explosion, City Manager Ralph Mussman said. Stokes said the four unspecified locations where agents and police conducted the raids were connect-

ed with the operation in Newport. He did not elaborate but said the investigation still was under way. The four locations where other fireworks were seized — in the cities of Covington and Ludlow and in Kenton County - were within five miles of New-

The two dead men apparently were employees of the factory, Stokes said, adding it would take some time to identify them although some identification was found

"I have about five names, but the condition of the bodies will make it extremely hard to identify them," said Dr. Fred Stine, Campbell County Coro-

Officials in Newport, a city of 21,000 people across the Ohio River from Cincinnati, could provide no cost estimate for the damage, but Mayor Irene Deaton said she would ask Kentucky Gov. John Y. Brown

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



ON THE ROAD Use extreme caution around school areas

By SUE ALFORD Traffic Safety Planning Midland College

Though Midland has a good safety record around schools, it is a picture that could change in an instant if we don't observe school zones ... and that "we" means students and drivers. With increasing outdoor activity for youngsters, especially around school grounds, it is appropriate to discuss those often maligned school zones.

Is my concern unwarranted? I don't think so. Statistics on school related accidents in general show that most of them occur 45 minutes before and within two hours after school closes for the day. These accidents tend to be on week days, in areas without traffic controls, often in midblock, with a child running or crossing from behind a parked

vehicle.

Now, Midland youngsters are walking and biking to school more often with our nice weather or if they're bused to school, they are biking and playing around neighborhood schools in those high risk hours after school. Thus, it becomes imperative that each of us drive with care around schools during these final months of school because kiddos will have their mind on the soccer or baseball game on the school and playgrounds rather than on safety.

A couple of specific safety practices which are not nearly as time consuming as often lamented by motorists, are: (1) stopping when approaching the front or rear of a school bus that is stopped on an undivided roadway; (2) slowing down in school zones to allow reaction time and room in case there is an

to allow reaction time and room in case there is an unexpected darting pedestrian; (3) stopping for pedestrians in crosswalks; and (4) teaching traffic safety to our children (either actively or by exam-

Safety practices which should be taught to kids at Safety practices which should be taught to kids at home and school are: (10) proper bus behavior—especially coming and going to the bus stop by the safest route and staying seated on the bus; (2) bicycle safety rules—especially riding with traffic and walking bikes across intersections; and (3) pedestrian safety rules—especially walking facing traffic, crossing at intersections or crosswalks and never going into the street from between parked

All this may seem cliche, but traffic safety is far from a household word and very few families consciously discuss traffic safety practices. The best way to initiate the traffic safety habit in our families is by setting a good example and, then, by explaining the safest route to and from school to any children in the family. The safest route would be a put a with the the family. The safest route would be a route with the most sidewalks, designated crosswalks, marked intersections and regulated speed limits.

Prevention of accidents can be a reality of each of us assumes the necessary responsibility and allows the necessary extra time to get safely through school

Navy to begin talks for Trident submarine

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy says it will begin negotiations for the ninth Trident ballistic missile submarine before Sept. 30, but it has not said whether it plans to award the contract to the nation's only Trident-building shipyard.

The Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp. in Groton, Conn., and Quonset Point, R.I., is constructing the first eight Tridents. The Navy said in a statement Wednesday that the

contract for the ninth Trident submarine will contain different terms and conditions those in the contract for the first eight submarines. The Navy did not say with whom the negotiations would be conducted. The only other U.S. shippard that builds submarines is the Newport News Ship-

building & Drydock Co. in Newport News, Va. The Electric Boat Division has been criticized in recent weeks for its performance in building submarines, and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger has said he may consider building Tridents outside the United States.

Meanwhile, an option under which Electric Boat would have built the ninth Trident submarine under the same contract terms as the first eight expired at midnight Tuesday.

Navy Vice Adm. Earl B. Fowler, Jr., told The Associated Press that the corporation refused to extend the Navy's option to build the ninth Trident under the contract terms of the eighth. "We asked the company to extend it and they did not wish to extend it," he said. The option set the price for a ninth Trident subma-

rine at \$400.6 million. The Navy's latest estimate is that one Trident costs \$1.2 billion.

Funds have been authorized for a ninth Trident submarine in fiscal year 1981, but a contract has not yet been awarded.


