## Vickie Daniel gets custody by default

### **By SHARON HERBAUGH Associated Press Writer**

LIBERTY, Texas (AP) — After the longest child custody trial in Texas history, Vickie Daniel was allowed to keep her two youngest children by default — but that was good enough for her. "I didn't understand what had happened at first," Mrs. Daniel said late

Thursday, after jurors voted that neither she nor her sister-in-law, Jean

Daniel Murph, should be awarded custody of the children. But when a child-custody jury makes that ruling, Texas law pro-vides that custody and all rights automatically go to the natural parent — and once that was explained, Mrs. Daniel was a happy woman.

"I am elated," she said, amid congratulatory hugs from spectators and relatives in the packed courtroom. "I'm so happy I'm going to go home and hug my children."

Jurors had deliberated almost two hours before deciding not to name a "managing conservator" for the two young sons Mrs. Daniel bore former

Texas House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. — a man she is accused of killing.

The jury had three options in deciding custody of Franklin Baldwin Daniel, 3, and Marion Price Daniel IV, 1.

They could have awarded the boys to Mrs. Murph, their aunt; to Mrs. Daniel, their natural mother, or to neither woman - the option they finally chose.

"Say some prayers and take care of those kids," said Mrs. Daniel's attorney, Richard "Racehorse" Haynes, as he shook his client's hand. Haynes said the decision bolstered his "unbroken, unbridled faith in the

jury system," and was the "most acceptable verdict for Vickie Daniel and the system."

Under the "neither" ruling, all rights - including visitation - are denied Mrs. Murph and the rest of the powerful Daniel family.

"I think the issue is closed now," said one of Mrs. Murph's attorneys, Andrew Lannie. "I don't foresee an appeal."

Mrs. Murph, who said she plans to spend the next few days working as executrix of Daniel's estate, said, "I'll say an extra prayer every day for those boys and I'll go on living.

Mrs. Daniel has been charged with murder in Daniel's Jan. 19 shooting death. Her trial has been set for October.

Mrs. Murph filed the custody suit after her brother's death. In the resulting six-week trial, she contended her sister-in-law was an unfit moth-

But Haynes portrayed Mrs. Daniel as a woman victimized by a husband who beat and sodomized her, abused her two children from her first marriage, fondled his own son's genitals, smoked marijuana, drank to excess and had a "weird" relationship with his sister.

Witnesses for Mrs. Murph — including Daniel's father, former Texas Gov. Price Daniel Sr. — questioned those allegations and depicted Mrs. Daniel as an emotionally unstable woman who might harm her children.

## Texan predicts big backing for budget

#### **By CHARLES RICHARDS Associated Press Writer**

WASHINGTON  $(A\dot{P})$  — If everybody got the same reaction from their constituents that he did, Texas congressmen will solidly back President Reagan's spending cuts when the proposed budget hits the House floor for a test vote next week, Rep. Phil Gramm, D-College Station

"People of my district definitely want to cut the budget," Gramm said, although he stopped short of the prediction several days ago by Gov. Bill Clements that two-thirds to three-fourths of the 24-member Texas delegation will support the president's budget. "I hope he's right, but I've not had the opportunity to

speak to all the members of the Texas delegation yet," Gramm said.

Clements made his prediction after visiting with Reagan Tuesday, at the end of a 2-day stay in the nation's capital during a governors' conference. He said he would "twist some arms" to help win Reagan more votes among the Texas delegation.

The governor had invited the Texas congressmen most of whom have been back in their districts during the Easter recess — to come to Austin on Thursday to talk about the president's recommendations. That meeting was scrubbed, however, because of the

death of the son of Texas GOP state chairman Chet Upham.

If Clements proved correct on his prediction, at least 16 Texas congressmen would vote for the bipartisan Reagan budget bill introduced by Gramm and Rep. Delbert Latta of Ohio, the ranking Republican on the House Budget Committee.

The Democratic leadership in the house is trying to get support for an alternative budget, offered by Budget Chairman Rep. Jim Jones, D-Okla., that gives less money for defense than Reagan has asked and restores cuts to social programs axed by the president's proposal.

"How the Texas delegation is going to vote, I don't know. I feel we're going to have strong support --certainly more than half. I'd be delighted if we could reach the total the governor has said are possible," Gramm said

Eight Texas congressmen and 38 other Democrats have formed a coalition known as the Conservative Democratic Forum that has given Reagan hope of winning his fight in the House

The Democrats hold a 243-192 edge in the House, but the Republicans are expected to vote as a block for the Reagan plan and 26 of the 46 CDF members would give the GOP the magic 218 votes needed for a majority in the 435-member House.



## lifted before weekend?

Will grain embargo be

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan, poised to fulfill one of his key campaign promises, is reported set to lift the Soviet grain embargo amid "strong indications" he will do it before the weekend.

A White House source, who asked not to be identified, said Thursday that there was a 90 percent chance the embargo would be lifted. Various reports, quoting administration officials, said it was definite

Officially, the White House insisted that no decision had been made

"The president has had this matter under consideration day in and day out. As of this moment, the head man has not made a decision," Reagan's spokesman, Larry Speakes, told a White House briefing Thursday.

He added, however, "I obviously know a great deal more than I want to state," and the White House source tere were "strong indications" the announcement would come today.

The most common expectation was that Reagan would wait until the commodity and stock exchanges close for the weekend, to avoid disrupting trading.

Speakes described Reagan as eager to end the embargo but said he is studying "what kind of signals we'd be sending" to the Soviets and the rest of the world.

The embargo was imposed by former President Carter in January 1980 as retaliation for th iet intervention in Afghanistan.

'Reagan's campaign pledge to lift the ban was thwarted by U.S. fears of a possible Soviet intervention in strike-torn Poland, although the president has come under considerable pressure from farm groups.

Published and broadcast reports said the embargo apparently would be phased out gradually, with the Soviets at first allowed to buy U.S. wheat and soybeans but not corn. But Edwin Meese III, the president's counselor, said Thursday, "I don't know how you phase out an embargo.

Agriculture experts say that if the president ends the embargo, one reason could be that there is an abudance of wheat in the United States, compared with other commodities such as corn and soybeans.

If corn is excluded from any easing of the embargo, it probably would be due to the uncertain prospects for this vear's U.S. crop.

During his successful campaign for the White House last year, Reagan repeatedly vowed to end the embargo as soon as possible if he were elected.

"I will, when elected, fully assess our national security, foreign policy and agricultural trade needs to determine how best to terminate yet another of the inequitable and ineffective policies of the Carter administration," he said on July 3

Reagan, who was backed by a Republican party platform calling for the embargo to be "terminated immediately," said the ban hurt American farmers more than it did the Soviet Union.

A well-placed source on the Senate Agriculture Committee said last week that Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C. chairman of the panel, told the White House it would have to lift the embargo by next Monday if the Reagan farm bill is to have a chance of getting through Congress.

Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige said last Saturday that Reagan possibly would lift the embargo within the next two weeks, if the president is convinced that the Soviets are not about to intervene military in Poland

WASHING-TON - When it comes to the energy business, hindsight is better than forecasting. It's very easy to be wrong. Two policy-makers with the U.S. Department of Energy conceded that pre-Lana dicting the future Cunningham and seeing that forecast hit right on the button has been difficult in recent years. But under President Reagan and his administration, Rich Williamson and Lou Pugliarisi are prophesizing relaxed controls on the oil industry and fewer employees in DOE.

The two charge that government's nosing into the petroleum industry in the past few years has messed up the business, but that Congress could have headed it off at the pass when the Arab oil embargo hit in 1973-74. Williamson, assistant director of policy development, is involved in drawing up policy for all energy areas. Pugliarisi takes the role of dealing with planning and evaluation functions

THE TWO MEN LAUGH at the analogy of the DOE depicted as the ogre of energy. They don't decide the

policy - Congress and the president do that. But, they admit, they realize that often it is the DOE which gets the blame.

The U.S. began entangling itself in the energy web back in 1973. 74, according to Williamson. Following that Arab oil embargo, "there were a lot of regulations put on. These created distortions in how the market operated. The federal government got further involved."

In his opinion, the private sector knows how to handle the petroleum market "if we get rid of the regulations and provide a stable framework.

In looking back to that time, Pugliarisi pointed the finger at Congress "who just couldn't face the fact that the price of oil had gone up. Congress just couldn't face the fact that energy would be more expensive. You no longer could get oil at \$5 a bar-

That embargo, claimed Williamson, was the "first major signal of the declining production of oil and gas in this country...that we had too much reliance on foreign oil."

The United States had become vulnerable to major changes in the world oil market, the men said. "With oil selling at \$35 a barrel, it would make sense to begin drilling for more," said Pugliarisi

But Congress believed the controls would keep prices down at their low level, instead of letting the oil compete on world market levels. The two men recognized that even though prices would have gone up, it would have been more gradual and far ea-sier for the public to accept.

## Love apologizes for bug hoax

CHICAGO (AP) - City Schools Superintendent Ruth B. Love has apologized for a hoax about electronic bugs in her office and car, but Mayor Jane Byrne says she is not wholly satisfied.

The mayor called the episode "rather disgusting" and said that despite the apology there are "at least 15 unanswered questions" about the matter.

Miss Love disclosed Thursday that Deputy Schools Superintendent Charles Mitchell, in an effort to discourage actual bugging, fabricated a report to her that the bugs were found in a sweep of her office and official car. Mitchell has resigned.

Asked if Miss Love also should resign, Mrs. Byrne said, "That's up to the school board.

"I'm sure that the teachers, the administrators, the children and the parents all looked forward to a leadership role (from Miss Love) that was full of integrity and beyond reproach, and I think it hasn't been a very good week for the students, the administrators or the teachers.

Miss Love said she took "full responsibility" for the episode and apologized to Mrs. Byrne, the school board and the city.

Official reaction ranged from sympathy from some school board members to criticism from Alderman Edward Burke, who said the the week's "antics" made the board a "laughing stock across the nation.

School board members agreed the hoax had tarnished Miss Love's credibility, but generally supported her and urged a return to school business

The Rev. Kenneth Smith, school board president, said that although the incident was "injurious" to the board and school system, he still believed in Miss Love's ability to run the system.

Miss Love, who took office last month, told a news conference that Mitchell admitted "the information he had provided related to 'bugs' in my office were untrue

Miss Love said she was told a Detroit investigator identified as Richard Lowe found seven bugging devices in her offices and car.

Mitchell, who worked for Miss Love when she ran the Oakland, Calif., school system, said in a statement that Lowe does not exist and that he fabricated a story "to serve as a precautionary measure to discourage the possibility of future wiretaps.'

Reports of the bugging had aroused suspicion because the FBI and local investigators could not find Lowe.

Mitchell said he was "security conscious" because the Oakland school superintendent before Miss Love had been assassinated. He was referring to Marcus Foster, former Oakland superintendent, slain by members of the terrorist Symbionese Liberation Army

Mrs. Byrne said she saw an official FBI report showing Miss Love told agents she was advised to "stay away from the (Chicago) police - you can'ttrust them

She said she holds no grudge against Miss Love for the reported remarks, but said such criticism could hinder police effectiveness

The superintendent said last weekend that electronic bugs were found in her offices and in her official car. On Tuesday she said neither she nor Mitchell had seen the devices but they were found in a sweep of her office April 4 or 5. A second sweep April 9 by a Chicago investigator found nothing, she



## Man planned killings-suicide

SUNNYVALE, Calif. (AP) - An unemployed car salesman who fatally shot his teen-age wife, baby daughter and another couple before killing himself planned the shootings because his wife had left him earlier in the day, police say.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. prison population grew 4 percent during 1980, the fastest rate of increase in three years, according to a private national survey.

In its April edition, Corrections Magazine reported that as of Jan. 1, 1981, federal and state correctional facilities held 320,583 inmates, 13,376 more than on

the same date a year ago. The survey, the magazine's seventh annual study of prison populations, counts sentenced adult felons serving more than one year in state and federal prisons

This year's total includes 6,889 prisoners held in county jails because of overcrowding in state prisons, an increase from last year's figure of 6,296. The total also includes 18,157 adults living in state and federal halfway houses and work-release facilities. But the study did not include an estimated 158,000

prisoners in local jails, serving short sentences or awaiting trial.

While populations in state prisons were increasing, the federal Bureau of Prisons recorded its third straight decline in inmates. There were 21,449 federal prisoners at the beginning of this year, compared with 24,921 at the beginning of 1980.

The decline in the federal prison population can be attributed to the FBI's continuing emphasis on the investigation of complicated white-collar and organized criminal cases rather than small-scale bank

## Gov. Clements signs shock probation bill

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Gov. Bill Clements signed into law Thursday a bill that would prevent a repeat of former Judge Garth Bates' "shock probation" after spending four months in prison for bribery.

The bill was part of the governor's anti-crime package. A key provision would

increase the number of crimes that would make a defendant ineligible for shock probation, including homicide, rape, rob-bery, kidnapping and

a first offender sentenced to 10 years or less a brief taste of prison life in order to deter him or her from committing future crimes.


Bates, a former Houston district judge, was sentenced to eight years for accepting a bribe from a defendant. A judge other than the one who sentenced him granted Bates shock probation after he had

served four months. The new law would permit only the original sentencing judge to grant shock probation.



Storms whip south, east **Texas** towns

### **By The Associated Press**

Three people are dead after a pair of tornadoes touched down in Southeast Texas, ripped through mobile homes in Sealy, Brookshire and Columbus and left a trail of downed trees and power lines.

The National Weather Service said one tornado touched down in Beaumont and another came down east of Columbus. Observers reported a third tornado in the Southeast Texas town of China and funnel clouds were sighted in Harris, Austin, Live Oak, Jefferson and Orange counties.

Beaumont authorities reported no serious injuries from the tornado that touched down near the Magnolia Gardens housing project in that city on Thursday. High winds blew out windows, tore the roof off a restaurant carport, damaged the front of a store, uprooted trees and downed power lines in the city.

One person died when a small plane crashed in a residential area southwest of Houston as a thunderstorm pushed by winds up to 65 mph blew through the city, authorities said.

Another person was killed when a cement truck slid on a rain-slick Houston highway and collided with two cars. A 19-year-old man died Thursday morning when a car in which he was a passenger skidded on a wet street in San Antonio, collided with another vehicle and struck a utility pole, authorities said.

Numerous minor injuries were reported in Houston and at one point during the mid-morning storm a police dispatcher said there had been so many traffic collisions he could not find an ambulance.

Scaffolding and a steel beam from the 75-story Texas Commerce Tower under construction in the downtown area apparently were blown loose by the high wind and fell on top of the fifth floor of an annex to the Houston Chronicle building across the street.


## **Beautiful warm** weekend ahead

## Detectives head home after questioning soldier

FORT BENNING, Ga. (AP) - Two detectives investigating the killings of seven blacks in Buffalo, N.Y., headed home today to report what, if anything, they discovered in questioning a soldier here.

The officers, who caught an earlymorning flight to Buffalo, would not comment on their investigation, but Buffalo Police Commissioner James B. Cunningham said Thursday that the inquiry was "the hottest lead we've had yet" in the slayings late. last year.

Cunningham would not say if the soldier was a suspect in the slayings. A white 25-year-old Army private from Buffalo was placed in the stockade here after a stabbing incident involving a black soldier.

Army authorities refused say if the soldier being held in the stabbing incident was the center of the Buffalo investigation, saying only that the New York detectives were in the stockade questioning someone.

On Thursday, law officers presented a warrant and searched a soldier's belongings, said Lt. Col. Robert Brown, the private's commanding officer. Brown said several items were removed but he did not know what they were.

A source who asked not to be identified said the belongings were those of the white Buffalo man.

About the stabbing incident, which had many witnesses, Brown said: "Near as I can tell, it was totally unprovoked. He grabbed a black soldier ... from the rear and stabbed him once in the rib cage and once in the arm.

The white soldier was wrestled to the ground and a paring knife, "presumably swiped from the mess hall," was taken, Brown said.

The 25-year-old Buffalo man joined the Army on Nov. 13 and reported to Fort Benning for basic training Nov. 19, according to Army records.

one supplier drops out, another will rise to take its place. And if one country refuses to buy from a second, the latter will find a market for its oil.

As the world markets expand to include newer sources, the U.S. still will depend upon the major suppliers, he said. "We shouldn't expect significant amounts of crude oil from frontier areas."

China is one of those promising new markets. But both policy-makers were skeptical about China adding much to the world market until after they meet their own needs.

The United States' energy future appears brighter to the two men. Pugliarisi explained that Reagan's hoped-for changes should be the catalyst.

"You will see implementation of the president's program as outlined in his campaign," he said. "This move toward market-pricing has been demonstrated with decontrol of gas pump prices. There is a move to decontrol the natural gas pricing poli-

cy, to allow greater access of public land and to reform the regulations and reporting information of the industry.

However, the two men conceded not all their predictions hit the target. The most recent forecast from the DOE which received national publicity came with the decontrol of gas at the pumps.

ORIGINALLY, IT HAD been announced that gasoline prices wouldn't rise more than 5 to 10 cents a gallon. And when those prices surged over that mark to 15 cents and higher, consumers became angry.

In the past two weeks, however, those pump prices have been slowly sliding downward, they said. And Williamson pulled out an article from The Wall Street Journal to back up his statement.

"Our analysts projected there would be an overshoot, and then the prices would come back down. That is what is happening now," he said.

And while some government forecasters were calling for an astronomical \$2 a gallon price by the end of 1981, both DOE men denied that will occur. But they hastily pointed to possible breakups in the world market which are "unpredigtable" and

could force up the gas prices. Williamson added another note,

saying that the public was unaware of a price increase on imported oil from OPEC which hit the States shortly before the gas pump prices were decontrolled. That unusually large jump included the OPEC price hike

If Reagan carries out his campaign promises and cuts the regulations that are impeding a chomping-at-the-bit petroleum industry, Williamson expects to see "a much smaller Department of Energy. If you got rid of those regulations you could reduce the employment by 2,000 peo-

Forecasting for as volatile a business as energy is difficult, they admit. "If you must forecast, do it often," Williamson said with a laugh. "It's very easy to be wrong, and that's one of the pitfalls of forecasting.'

Residents warned to stay inside after chemical blast

HIGHLAND CITY, Fla. (AP) — Hundreds of people were warned to stay indoors with the windows closed today until a cloud of chlorine gas released by a chemical plant explosion dissipated, officials said.

"It's lying stationary right now and doesn't appear to present any hazard," Polk County sheriff's Sgt. Tom Holcomb said early today. "It's dissipating right

now. We're just going to let Mother Nature take its course." Holcomb said the smokey cloud was three miles southeast of Aquachem Inc., which was rocked Thursday by a blast that left one worker critically burned.

The plant was totally destroyed by the mid-afternoon explosion, and Highland City Fire Chief Henry Sheffield estimated damage at \$750,000. The plant employs 40 people.

Three fire trucks were ordered to standby throughout the night. Holcomb said rescuers at the scene reported several popping noises throughout the afternoon and night which they believed were small explosions of other chemicals in the plant.

Polk sheriff's Major Don McDaniel speculated the explosion was caused by spontaneous combustion that occurred as workers were unloading a cargo of chlorine gas from a railroad tank car.

Workers and residents were cleared from the area immediately

Holcomb said the cloud of toxic chlorine gas and smoke was estimated Thursday to be two miles wide and about 500 feet in the air.

Authorities initially said the cloud had drifted away from the plant in a southeasterly direction. But it then changed course slightly and moved eastward toward the small Polk County cities of Lake Wales and Frostproof.

Lake Wales, which is located about 18 miles southeast of the plant, has about 10,000 residents; Frostproof approximately 3,000.

Although Lake Wales and Frostproof are in a mostly rural area of central Florida, Holcomb said the area is "pretty congested" and estimated there were several thousand people living in the path of the cloud.



District Judge Charles Ramsay delayed the court appearance of Ed-ward E. Williams, 39, when his attorney, Robert Montgomery of Pasadena, reported he was given short notice and had a conflicting court appearance on Thursday, a court spokeswoman said.

Williams, who re-signed Monday as band director of Alamo Heights High School in San Antonio, remained free on \$5,000 bond set by New Braunfels Municipal Judge David Perkins last week.

The Comal County Grand Jury last week returned an indictment charging Williams with raping a 14-year-old freshman band student.

Police charged that the rape occurred between 11 p.m. April 12 and 3:30 a.m. April 13 in a New Braunfels motel room. They reported the evidence included a medical examination and motel receipt.

The girl's father filed a complaint at 8:10 a.m. on April 13 at the Bexar County Sheriff's Office in San Antonio and the complaint was transfer-red to the Comal County District Attorney's office, which has jurisdiction. The indictment was returned two days later.

New Braunfels police detective J.W. Buntyn and Alamo Heights Act-ing Police Chief Roger Terry arrested Williams on April 16 in the school district tax office near the high school and took him to New Braunfels where he posted bond.

## Snelson bill gets approval

AUSTIN - The Senate Wednesday gave final approval to a bill by Midland Sen. W.E. "Pete" Snelson that regulates persons who are engaged as professional counselors.

The Senate passed Senate Bill 606 with little opposition after suspending the constitutional rule requiring that a bill be considered on three separate days

SB 606 creates a review board to license professional counselors and provides educational and training requirements such counselors must meet.

Snelson said the bill is similar to measures passed by the Senate in the previous two sessions but which stalled in the House.

"(SB 606) will provide professional status to a group of people who are providing a service that's important," Snelson said.

The bill now goes to the House for consideration.


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

## Protestants threaten retaliation

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BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) - Protestant extremists, angered by Roman Catholic rioting spurred by the death fast of a jailed Irish Republican Army member, threatened today to retaliate against the IRA and its supporters.

The threat of a Protestant backlash raised fears of new sectarian violence in this British-run province, where Roman Catholics militants have promised to unleash a campaign of terror if hunger-striker Bobby Sands dies.

Sands, 27, was reported near death on the 55th day of his hunger strike in Maze Prison, outside Belfast. Offi-cials of Sinn Fein, the IRA's political front, said he could be dead by Monday.

Sands' family requested today the European Commission on Human Rights intervene and launch an investigation of prison conditions. Two member of the 21-member commassion reportedly left from Strasbourg, France, today for London to assess the situation. However, Sands had said earlier that he could not see what good such intervention would have "at this very late stage."

## Truck drivers seek police protection after shootout

### By The Associated Press

A gun battle between striking miners and coal truck drivers that left four men wounded has prompted eastern Kentucky coal company operators to call for police protection and warn that the area is on the verge of "war" because of the 26-day United Mine Workers walkout.

The shootout took place near Belfry, Ky., as a 10-truck convoy was returning to the non-union Mary Helen Coal Co. after making deliveries. The truckers said they were ambushed by pickets, but union miners, who had been trying to close the mine, said the truckers started the shoot8ng.

A group of independent coal companies, meanwhile, met in Charleston, W.Va., Wednesday to form a new association in an effort to end the strike by the 160,000-member UMW. The Unionized Coal Employers Association may sign an independent contract with the UMW.

Negotiations between the UMW and the Bituminous Coal Operators Asso ciation, the industry's bargaining arm, have broken down. Members of the Pikesville Coal Op-

erators Association met Wednesday night with Kentucky State Police Commissioner Merion Campbell following the shootout.

## Oilman begins huge buffalo memorial

BUFFALO GAP, Texas (AP) - Wealthy Texas oilman Jack Grimm, who has searched for everything from Noah's Ark to the Loch Ness monster, is using blasting powder for his latest project - a 2,000-foot cliffside memorial to the American bison.

Grimm and 200 guests perched atop a limestone mesa Grimm owns near here for Thursday's dedication ceremonies, which he opened with a black powder blast.

Grimm said the monument will rise 40 feet high and stretch 2,000 feet along the side of the mesa, making it about four times the area of the Mount Rushmore relief. Buffalo Gap is about 10 miles southwest of Abilene, Texas.

New York sculptor Richard Burks says the limestone mural will cost about \$3 million and take from five to seven years to finish. He said the mural will chronicle the buffalo's life in North America - showing Indians hunting the animals, their near-extinction and ultimate return.

He said the mural will give the illusion of the "endless plains of the buffalo.

"It's going to be the tragedy of the buffalo," Burks said. "If it's going to last a million years, you've got to spend a little time on

Last summer Grimm mounted an expedition to search for the Titanic, which sank in the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Newfoundland in 1911. He has said he will return in June to scout 14 locations where the ship might have gone down.

In the past, Grimm has financed expeditions to find, among other things, Noah's Ark, the Loch Ness monster and East Texas' legendary monster, "Bigfoot."

He also is putting together an expedition to search for the lost continent of Atlantis,

## Texas House rejects Blue Law repeal

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Speaker Bill Clayton says a "Bible Belt" feeling about Sunday is what killed a bill repealing Texas' 1961 "Blue Law."

Pressure from automobile dealers and department stores might have had something to do with it, too.

House members voted 82-59 on Thursday to table a bill repealing the law that says stores may not sell 42 categories of merchandise on both Saturdays and Sundays. The items include cars, clothing, appliances, furniture and household goods.

Many House members wore buttons, provided by the automobile dealers' lobby, that said "Preserve Our Right To Rest." "A lot of people are going to have a lot of explaining to do,"

grumbled Rep. Bill Ceverha, R-Dallas, a sponsor of the bill. Earlier, he had told the House 69 percent of Texans polled by

## Reagan won't allow Castro to export communist revolution

### **By JAY PERKINS Associated Press Writer**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President George Bush says the Reagan administration intends to develop a policy that would keep Cuban President Fidel Castro from supporting revolution and exporting it to Latin America.

Bush also told the American Society of Newspaper Editors on Thursday that the administration has received "clear and direct signals" that China's leaders accept the U.S. intention to retain ties with Taiwan.

The comments came in a question-and-answer session after Bush delivered a speech focused almost exclusively on domestic issues. In that speech, Bush delivered a thinly veiled warning to House Democrats, saying voters support Reagan's economic proposals, and indicated the administration would not allow the proposals to be cut to pieces. All the questions to Bush, a former CIA director

and Reagan's crisis management chief, focused on foreign policy.

Bush said Castro was both supporting and export-ing revolution in the Western Hemisphere. He said

the administration had no intention of allowing this to continue.

"They are both taking place and we are unrelaxed about that. We believe we should shape a policy that will keep Castro ... from exporting and supporting revolution, going right into a vacuum out there," Bush said.

"We believe the United States has a role in concert with our allies and in concert with our friends here to see that that does not result in the overthrow of countries that are friendly to us," he said.

Bush denied the administration was abandoning the human rights policy that was a keystone of the Carter administration's foreign policy.

"When you see slaying in Salvador and something of this nature, we are totally unrelaxed about it," he said. "But on the other hand, we believe the preceding policy of slapping our friends around and then being silent in the face of ... imposition by leftist forces of terror in Central America, being silent about that, we don't think that's a realistic human rights policy."

It stopped raining for a minute and while the weatherman was adjusting his wet suit, Midland Lee and Midland High snuck in a baseball game. And the Rebels, who have been waiting for over a week to discover whether or not they share the first half District 5-5A baseball title with Abilene and Abilene Cooper, finally found out. But the Bulldogs, playing like a

team that fully expected a piece of the playoff pie, prolonged the suspense as long as possible ... a full nine innings...or almost as long as our dear reader has waited here to learn the

The Rebels finally pushed over three unearned runs in the top of the ninth, two innings after it should legally have been over, for a 3-0 win. And Alan Koonce, who seemed to gain strength as the game progressed, fin-ished it off with a fitting flourish, fanning the side on 10 pitches for three of his 13 strikeouts.

IT WAS A tense contest in which things could have fallen apart for either side in a twinkling, if both teams hadn't kept coming up with the

vital plays it had to make to preserve the scoreless status for eight in-

nings. "Our kids played so well. It was a tough one to lose," said Midland Coach Tim Whalen, "But the thing that takes some of the sting out of it is that a city team gets to share the title... and it couldn't happen to a finer person than Ernie Johnson."

Doug McClain, who came in at the start of the ninth to relieve starter Joel Castaneda, who had Lee scoreless despite nine walks, was touched for the Rebel runs, the first two scurrying home on breaking pitches that dipped into the thick, wet mixture in front of the plate and slithered away for wild pitches.

"That's the way Doug pitches. He's got to keep that ball low and when it gets away from the catcher, he's in trouble," Whalen explained. Randy Pepper drilled a one-out sin-gle to center. Randy Velarde ground-

ed to first baseman Jerry Zachery, who lost the handle momentarily as he looked to second for the possible double play and all hands were safe. Barry Blackwell walked to load the

bases and as Ron Smedley lunged at a low-breaking curve in a bunt attempt. The ball broke into the dirt and bounced to the screen as one run scored. Then, with Koonce up, another wild pitch let in a run before Koonce delivered a run-scoring single.

**KOONCE PITCHED** a five-hitter while Lee garnered only four off Cas-taneda and McClain. Koonce didn't allow hit hit over the final five innings. Castaneda had a no-hitter going until Bill Dern beat out an infield roller down the first baseline with one out in the sixth. On a drier field, third baseman Teddy Bartley might have made the play, but his feet skidded from under him on the wet turf. It became academic two batters later when Chris Parker lashed a single to left.

Until the ninth, it was game of big defensive plays. Lee threatened in the second when two walks and an error loaded the bases with one out, but Castaneda struck out Velarde and got Blackwell on a pop to second. DALLAS (AP) - Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn, who twice has sided with the players in their disputes with management, finds himself firmly on the owners' side in the dispute over free-agent compensation that could lead to a player walkout May 29.

"This time the owners are clearly right," Kuhn said during an interview broadcast Thursday night on radio station KRLD-AM. "I have publicly been on record for a long time as believing that there should be compensation of some kind. I'm very strongly of that view. I think it's an important need of the game.'
