There will be an early out Tuesday, April 9, at 1:15 p.m. and the Junior High District Track Meet begins at 3:00 p.m.

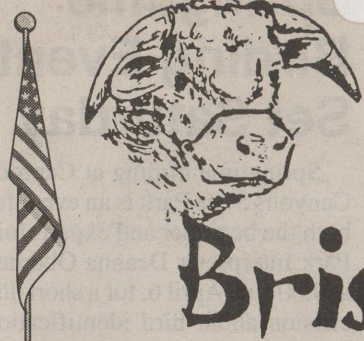

Voting Places Announced For April 9 Runoff Elections

Both the Republican and Democratic parties will have runoff elections on Tuesday, April 9, and the voting places have been announced for both.

In the Democratic runoff, voting will be:

Precincts 1 and 3: Silverton City Hall

Precincts No. 4 and 5: O. C. Rampley Field House, Silverton ISD

In the Republican runoff, voting will be:

Precincts 1, 3, 4 and 5: Silverton Senior Citizens Center

Precincts 2 and 6: Catholic Center, Quitaque

Early voting opened for both runoffs in the office of County & District Clerk Bena Hester in the

Briscoe County Courthouse on April 1, and will continue through April 6, from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. each weekday.

If you voted in the first primary, you may vote in that same primary in the runoff. It is illegal to vote in the first Democratic Primary, then vote in the second Republican Primary.

If you did not vote in the first primary, you may vote in whichever runoff election you choose.

In the General Election in November, you will select which candidates for whom you wish to vote by either splitting your ballot and voting for each candidate, or voting a straight ticket ballot by marking a single square near the top of the ballot.

Telephone Co-op To Have 49th Annual Meeting

Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has announced plans for the annual meeting of members.

The meeting this year will be Friday, April 5, at the Ezra Jones Cafeteria, Tulia High School. Registration begins at 7:00 p.m. and a light buffet meal prepared by the school cafeteria staff will be served.

Kenneth Littlefield of the vigo Park exchange and president of the board of directors, will welcome guests and a short business meeting will start at 7:30 p.m. The meeting will report on the cooperative performance over the last year.

Directors will be elected to three seats on the board. Those whose terms are expiring are Elton Cantwell of Bean and Silverton, Ronnie Johnson of Gurley, and Littlefield.

The cooperative is celebrating its 52nd year and its 49th annual meeting. There will be door favors for everyone and a large number of door prizes will be drawn for throughout the meeting. A grand prize of \$52 will be drawn for and given to a resident of each exchange.

The directors have given approval to refund capital credits allocated for 1991. Checks will be mailed March 29 and the refund amount is about \$430,000.

The Democratic Party runoff holds the local race between incumbent Precinct 4 Commissioner Gary Weeks and challenger George Reed. One will be nominated to appear on the General Election ballot. There is also a runoff between Ron Kirk and Dan Morales for U. S. Senate.

The Republican Party runoff ballot features Elizabeth Ray and Dale Wainwright, Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2; Tom Price and Tim Taft, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals Place 1; David Richards and Paul Womack, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals Place 2; Cathy Cochran and Guy Williams, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals Place 3.

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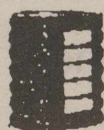

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Obituary

DR. ROBERT N. MUCKLEROY

Dr. Robert Neville Muckleroy, 73, former director of the physical medicine department at St. Paul Medical Center, was remembered at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday at Laurel Land Funeral Home in Dallas.

Dr. Muckleroy died Thursday of a heart attack in Waxahachie.

Friends and family said his career was marked by his kindness.

"He was outstanding in all ways," said James Roetto of Denison, a retired physical therapist who worked with Dr. Muckleroy at St. Paul Medical Center. "He was also interested in doing anything he could to make sure patients got good care whether they were his patients or someone else's."

His wife, Diana Muckleroy of Ovilla, who was her husband's office manager for 15 years, said he "was kind and good and he was

very honest, and all of that endeared him to his patients."

Born October 28, 1928, in Cleburne, Dr. Muckleroy attended high school in Cleburne and graduated from Sunset High School in Oak Cliff in the 1940s. He served in the Marine Corps for two years guarding Japanese prisoners in the Philippines after World War II.

He earned a bachelor's degree of science from Texas A&M University and earned his medical degree from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School in Dallas in 1959. He later specialized in physical medicine and rehabilitation.

Before settling permanently in the Dallas area, Dr. Muckleroy ran a private practice in Silverton, Texas. He also served as the medical director of state rehabilitation hospitals in New Mexico and Arkansas.

Dr. Muckleroy was director of the physical medicine department at St. Paul in the 1980s, his family said. He also worked at other Dallas hospitals--including Baylor and Presbyterian--and served as director of the former Caruth Memorial Rehabilitation Hospital in Dallas.

He had a private practice in Dallas that closed in 1998, the year he retired.

Dr. Muckleroy served briefly on the board of the Age of Steam Railroad Museum at Fair Park. He also was a member of the American Medical Association, Sierra Club,

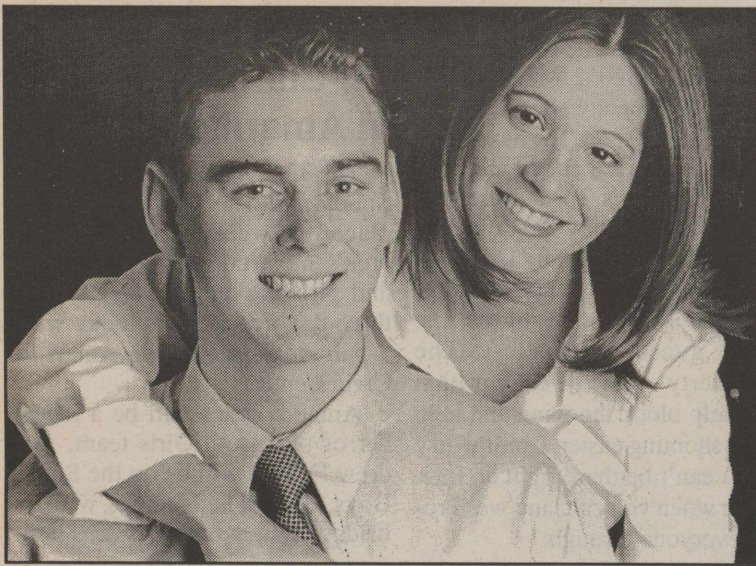

Fifth and sixth grade girls will play at 6:30 and fifth and sixth grade boys will play at 7:15 p.m.

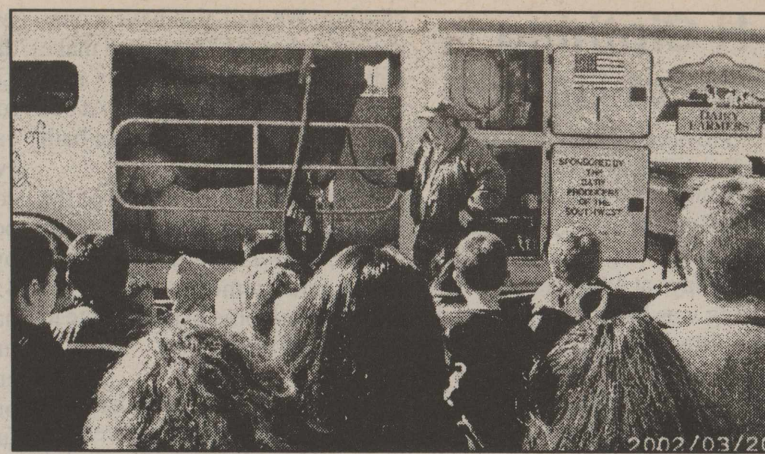
