Research May Aid in Preventing Fungal Cotton Disease

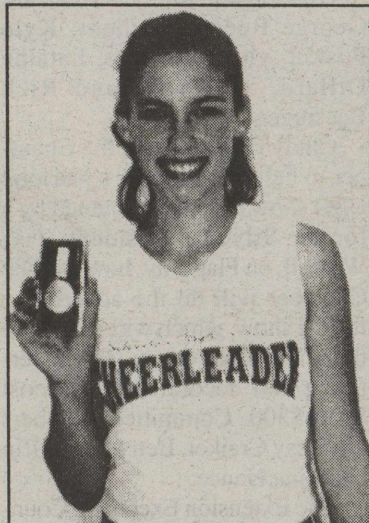

Cotton usually emerges well when planted under ideal conditions. But, a little-known disease, *rhyzopus oryzeae* may cause cotton to die before it even reaches the surface.

If the crops do not break through, they quickly decline because of root rot. Fungicide treat-

ment of cotton seeds, which is effective against other damping-off diseases, does not affect the *rhyzopus oryzeae*, a relative of bread mold.

Charles Howell, USDA plant pathologist in College Station, has used the fungus *trichodema virens* to devise a biological control treatment for the disease. The treatment is grown in liquid cultures.

The solids are then dried, and the granules are used to control the *rhyzopus oryzeae* by preventing germination. This research may aid in saving substantial amounts of money lost annually due to seedling diseases.

Contact Officials Before Moving Traps

Boll weevil eradication is beginning its second year on the High Plains, and one obvious difference this year will be the number of traps placed around cotton fields.

The increased number of traps is necessary for making treatment decisions, and foundation officials seek growers' cooperation in protecting them.

Foundation personnel follow specific guidelines in placing traps around cotton fields so they will be effective in attracting weevils and provide good information on weevil activity. Traps are placed to optimize their usefulness while providing the least disruption to farm operators.

Where possible, traps are set next to existing structures such as fence or telephone posts. When this is not possible, employees try to place the traps so they will not be in the way when growers are working the fields.

Growers may believe, however, that some traps are in the way and decide to move or remove the traps. Doing so can hamper the progress of the eradication program, officials say.

Producers are asked to contact their field unit supervisors before moving or removing any trap. The supervisors will find a placement for the traps that meet program goals and reduce interference to farmers' operations.

Occasionally a piece of equipment will clip a trap and knock it down or break it. Also, inclement weather can damage traps or blow them down.

Traps are checked weekly, and growers will quickly grow accustomed to the schedule for their fields. Should they notice damaged or downed traps between regular inspections, growers should contact their field unit supervisors with the information so the traps can be repaired or replaced.

Well-maintained traps allow foundation personnel to monitor weevil activity and make proper treatment decisions. Damaged or missing traps may result in extra treatments to ensure that weevils don't have the opportunity to infest fields unnoticed.

Growers may contact their district offices for more information.

The Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation is a nonprofit, grower-initiated and funded organization dedicated to eliminating the cotton boll weevil from the state in the most cost effective and environmentally responsible manner possible.

Cotton Planting Progresses Well

High Plains cotton producers have moved ahead with the 2002 cotton planting at a fairly typical rate, according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

According to PCG officials the majority of the irrigated crop is now in the ground.

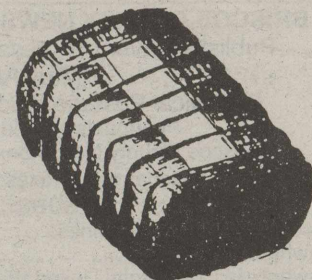
A recent series of cool nighttime temperatures, some reaching as low as the mid-thirties, have slowed early development and/or emergence in some cases. The overall net effect this will have is difficult to predict at this time.

The other side of the coin, however, is the area's non-irrigated acreage. Producers with non-irrigated acreage are mostly still in a wait and watch mode as they look for additional rainfall to help bolster already present underground moisture and assure the crop achieves a strong start.

Some fields of cotton seedlings were hailed out in storms that occurred during the past week or so. It is considered too late to replant cotton now.

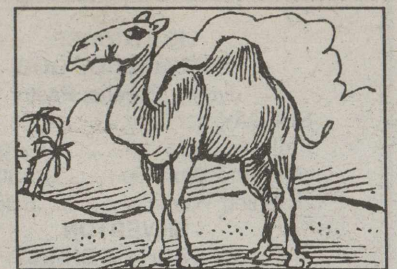

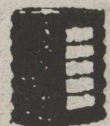

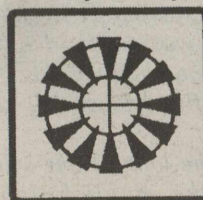

If you have no access to air conditioning, use fans or open windows to stay cool. Take cool baths or showers and wear a hat

and light-colored cotton clothing. The elderly and people with chronic diseases, such as Parkinson's disease, diabetes, heart disease, or high blood pressure are usually more susceptible to the heat and should be more cautious.

Problems Plague St. Augustine Lawns

Provided by Brandon McGinty County Extension Agent Agriculture

St. Augustine lawns are drying out all over the Southern United States. Although dry lawns are normal with the coming of summer, conditions appear to be worse this year. A combination of factors may be causing this extreme dehydration: environmental stress, disease activity and excess levels of phosphorus. When lawns are stressed in the summer, they are more prone to suffer from freezes and diseases such as Take-All Root Rot, Brown Patch and Gray Leaf Spot.

Your first weapon in the fight against lawn difficulties is patience. It is too early in the season to tell how much grass will recover. Next, don't use excess nitrogen fertilizer. This may force more growth than the root system can handle.

Finally, don't apply herbicides to the lawn's stressed areas. To lessen dryness and increase density, fertilize properly, use a proper mowing height and water frequently.

helping to kill certain crop pests. USDA scientists have developed a coating that keeps insect cadavers intact by improving storing, handling and environmental tolerance. Parasitic worms called nematodes are able to survive inside undamaged insect cadavers and kill other pests. The nematodes do not cause harm to humans or the environment. Furthermore, the nematodes have bacteria that live inside them. Using this bacteria, the nematodes will infect the pest and destroy it within 48 hours then feed off the recently deceased host and reproduce inside it. Currently, most nematodes are released through a liquid spray solution. This is usually more expensive than chemical pesticides. The cadaver method will make this cheaper, but application techniques still need to be modified before they can be used by farmers.

Cotton Market weekly

A Service Provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

Prospects for another round of healthy export sales and shipments combined with the weakness of the U. S. dollar momentarily contributed to a bullish mood in the cotton market recently. Solid gains from speculative and trade buying

helped the market set a 13-day high at the New York Cotton Exchange; however, it proved to be a one-day rally.

Although healthy sales and shipments were expected, USDA's weekly report showed sales were

slightly higher than most in the market had anticipated. Net export sales of 2001-02 U. S. cotton totaled 185,700 bales for the week ended May 9, up two percent from the previous week and 29 percent more than the four-week average.

Export shipments also were supportive as 227,500 bales were distributed. The figure was seven percent higher than the previous week and a one percent increase from the four-week average. Interestingly, Turkey, China and India were the top three buyers of U. S. cotton as well as the top shipping destinations.

Online cotton sales also received

a boost this week. Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 9,225 bales of cotton online in the week ended May 16. The week's total was a considerable increase from the previous week's sales of 1,015 bales. Prices received by growers selling their cotton online range from 26.44 to 29.22 cents per pound compared to a range of 25.04 to 34.18 cents per pound the prior week.

In other news, the U. S. dollar continues to weaken on the world market, making U. S. cotton prices even more enticing to potential importers. While the cotton market

did not react directly to a dip in the U. S. dollar futures index, the weakness of the U. S. currency continues to operate constructively in the background.

"Over time it'll become the most influential factor in cotton prices," one market analyst predicts.

Meanwhile farmers and others involved in agriculture are breathing a little easier following President George W. Bush's signing of the new farm bill on Monday. Still, it will be several weeks before producers have something they actually can apply to their farming operations.

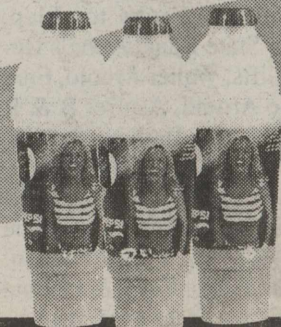

The hostesses presented the newly-married couple with a comforter set.

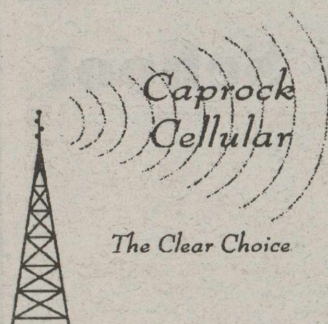
