Major News Events In Haskell County During Last Half of 1938

Outstanding events transpiring in Haskell county during the last six months of 1938, together with major business transactions and persons in the news are reflected in the following brief paragraphs taken from issues of the Free Press from July 1 to December 31, 1938:

July 1, 1938. Outstanding event of this section is expected to be the Auto Race Meet to be staged on Fair Park Speedway here Sunday and Monday, July 3 and 4. All Haskell stores will be closed Monday, the 4th.

July 5, 1938. A crew of more than 200 WPA laborers are working on a seven-mile stretch which will complete Highway 120 from Haskell to the Throckmorton county line.

July 22, 1938. Architects revised plans for the county hospital are being prepared under which the county will qualify for a \$35,000 PWA grant to supplement the bond issue voted for the building.

August 5, 1938. One of the largest forgery rings to operate in this section in many years was believed broken with the arrest by Haskell county officers of three Albany residents this week, who admitted in statements to officers that they had passed more than \$3,000 in worthless checks in a score of West Texas towns.

September 2, 1938. Haskell county voters polled 3,812 votes in the second primary in nominating four county candidates and six candidates for state office.

September 16, 1938. In their first game of the season, a non-conference affair played at Crowell, the Haskell Indians lost to the Wildcats, 7-0.

September 23, 1938. Checks covering cotton price adjustments payments were being received by Haskell county farmers, and it was estimated that a total of \$400,000 would be paid out within the next month.

October 7, 1938. A district office of the National Youth Administration was opened in Haskell with Ted Weaver in charge as district supervisor. The
