



General David L. Brainard, 82 years old on December 21, is the last living survivor of Greely's Artic expedition, which made history from 1881 to 1884 by its explorations in the far north.

Brainard was a sergeant in the regular army lieutenant for his heroism in connection with the salary for 1939 is said to be \$75,000 expendition, of which he was one of only seven survivors, the remaining 18 having died of starvation, except one who was shot for stealing food from his comrades.
