Announcement was made Thursday that application for a franchise for the construction and operation of an electric light plant and transmission lines in Haskell would be filed with the City Council at their regular meeting Thursday night, Dec. 21.

Applicant for the franchise will be H. S. Leon, local theatre owner, and associates French M. Rob-

ertson, attorney, and A. A. (Jack) Bradford, Rule banker and owner of the Public Chevrolet Company here. The three all reside in Haskell. The application will ask for a 40-year franchise, it was reported.





Shipping Problems

American exporters who have goods and materials ready to ship abroad to fill orders already placed are having difficulty in obtaining vessels to transport them. It is reported, for example, that half a million bales of cotton are at Gulf ports awaiting shipment, with few ships available.

Increasing quantities of manufactured goods, in addition to farm products, are also crowding various American ports, awaiting foreign vessels to carry them to countries which can not be reached by our own ships, because of the war zone ban imposed by the neutrality act.

Additional handicaps to the movement of goods from the United States to belligerent countries and their neutral neighbors are seen in advancing freight rates and higher war risk insurance pre-

Rates on cotton from Gulf ports to Liverpool have doubled and the cost of transporting wheat has almost trebled since the war began, according to

the United States News.

Most of the Allied merchant ships are engaged in transporting war supplies and in keeping open their own foreign trade routes, so neutral vessels are in great demand, with so many American ships tied up through being forbidden to sail in waters ignated as danger areas.

Whether some means to relieve the shortage of available shipping can be found later is one of the serious problems created by the war.

"Detroit employees, the highest paid in world, have actually experienced more strikes, in dustrial strife and lost wages during the last three years than during the previous twenty. In the 10year period from 1927 through 1936, the idle man days in Michigan because of strikes totalled 1, 185,559, with 97,605 workers involved. But in the single year of 1927, in Michigan the total of idle days due to strikes reached the staggering figures of 3, 924,752, with 354,499 workers involved. These are official figures from the United States Department

of Labor. In view of these facts, the board asks citizens to communicate with their congressmen, urging repeal of the Wagner Act, in the interest of industrial

The 1940 Census

It is estimated that about 121,000 people will be employed for varying periods during the taking of the 1940 United States census, and the questions to be asked will cover a wider range than ever

Among the new questions will be several dealing with employment and housing conditions, concerning which inadequate authentic information now available to the government. Among other things, enumerators will ask whether dwellings occupied are rented or owned; what equipment, such as radios, refrigerators and other conveniences, are installed in homes; what fuels are used for heating and cooking; whether homes are mortgaged, and if so for how much.

Beginning on January 2, census takers will begin obtaining information concerning factories and business enterprises. The canvass of individuals will begin on April 1, and data obtained will be considered as of that date, regardless of the actual day on which the enumerator calls.

The task of the Census Bureau in 1940 will be tremendous one-quite different from that imposed by the first census of 1790, when very few questions were asked and the total population of the country was a little less than four million.

U.S. Marine Base In Alaska Only 54 Miles From Russia

For the first time in the territorial history of Alaska, a United States Marine detachment is now permanently based in that vast northern dominion, whose jutted coastal lines extend far out into the Bering Sea and only all short Squad Lettermen of connecting with the mainland of the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics by a scant 54 miles.

Alaska is only one of the many new stations to be opened by the Marine Corps incidient to the increase of personnel authorized by President Roosevelt. Four Marine Corps recruiting stations are now functioning at full capacity in Texas and are located in the post offices at Houston, Fort Worth, Austin, with the District Headquarters in the Allen Bldg., Dal-

The establishment of the Alaskan station gives the corps a wide field of activity in the western hemisphere in view of the fact that four U. S. Marines are included in the complement of men with Admiral Richard E. Byrd in his Antarctic Expedition.
