Highlight of the evening will be a program by Doppler Dave Oliver of Amarillo.

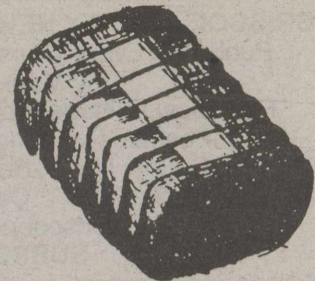

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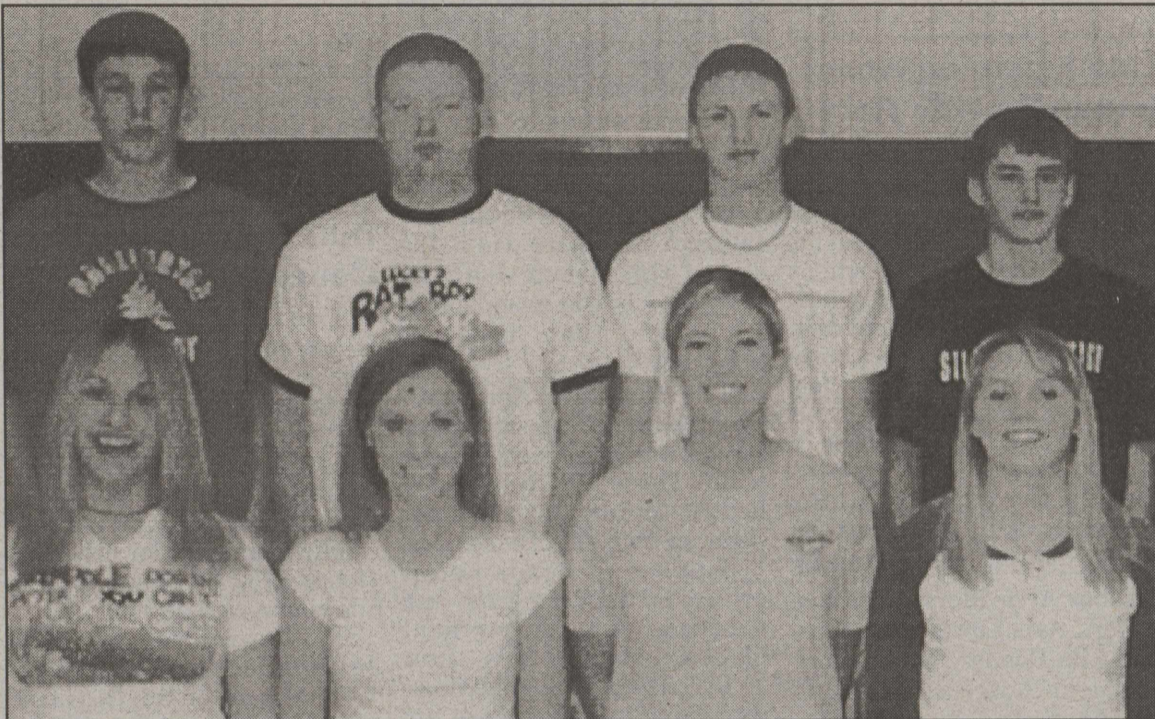

It has been determined that traffic crashes, half of which involve alcohol and other drugs, are a leading cause of death and serious injury for young people (ages 15-19). Therefore the State of Texas and interested citizens are supporting "Project Graduation," a program promoting drug/alcohol-free parties for high school students. The Texas Department of Transportation pledges \$250 each year to provide mini-grants as "seed money" to high schools who support Project Graduation activities, and concerned citizens are asked to join in.

Survivors include a daughter, Genella McCoy of Needles, California; a son, Ronald Gale Grimland of Arizona; a

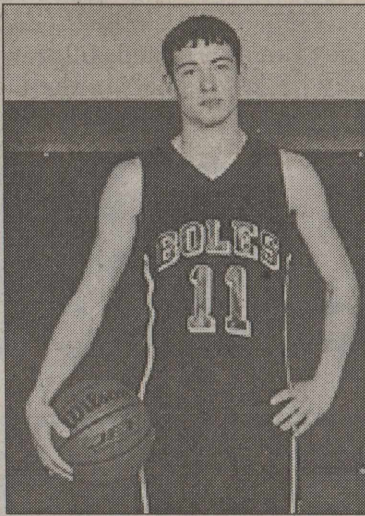
**Late Emerging Wheat Improving With Rain**

Recent rains have been just what the doctor ordered for our drought-stressed wheat crop. If good moisture conditions continue, the wheat crop may certainly make a comeback. One question I am getting is "What kind of yield can I now expect?" The answer to this question is largely dependent on the condition of the wheat prior to receiving the recent moisture and what the

rest of March and April have in store for us. There are three components that contribute to yield. Those are: number of heads, number of seed per head, and weight of each seed.

Number of heads determined by seeding rate and tillering. A healthy wheat plant will usually have three to five tillers that contribute greatly to yield (or more under good irrigated conditions). The two or three most productive tillers usually develop in the fall. Secondary tillers that develop in late winter and early spring can and do contribute to yield. How much they contribute to yield will be very much tied to March and April weather.

Number of seed per head is largely affected by conditions that are present the two weeks prior to jointing, and the conditions that are present during and immediately after flowering. The potential number of seed is determined when the plant switches from a vegetative to a reproductive stage of development. This will likely occur over the next two to three weeks (March 4-24). The rains we have recently received should give us conditions for a high number of seed per head. How many of those potential seed actually develop will be determined later.

Seed weight will be based on conditions present during grain fill, with wet, moderate temperatures promoting high seed weight.

Fields with wheat that have just recently emerged. Even under the best of situations, these fields are unlikely to produce a "normal" yield.

## Bits & Pieces of News

More about the old refrigerators. Valeria Weaver said before there were ice boxes, there were water safes. Water would drip down inside a box and keep the food cool. She told us their family took milk, cream, eggs and butter to the produce house to sell. They had a separator that separated the cream from the milk.

You would also make butter out of the cream. If you had a churn, you would put the cream in it and turn the wheel and soon it would separate and there would be butter. This always fascinated me, to see it become a solid from a liquid. We used a jar, and you could actually see the butter begin to form. When margarine came in, my mother bought a bag that you squeezed. When it made a solid, you would break a little red-looking module inside the

bag and then it would make a beautiful yellow. Gee, what a lot of fun our children and grandchildren missed.

Vernell Vance told us her folks got the first refrigerator in Turkey after the war. Teresa Sutton bought her first one from Kate Fowler. Wanda Strange's first refrigerator was a Kelvinator. It was good when they traded it off many years later. Shirley Reynolds said she had a Kenmore and it also was good.

Valeria said she thought she had lived in every house in town. She would work on them and get them all fixed up and then they would sell out from under them. Hey Valeria! I just happened to think: they were getting an interior decorator and you were paying them!

Those waxed bread sacks we talked about last week had another good use besides putting food in them. We used old flat irons that must be heated on the stove. Then you put on a handle and ironed your clothes with it until it got cold and then you took another off the fire to use. Sometimes it would get black and those wax sacks were used to iron on before you touched your clothes with the iron. Then the gas iron came in. You would fill it with kerosene and light it. That was a nice change over the flat irons. By the way, why did they also call them "sad" irons? One of the ladies said maybe it was because it made you sad to have to use them.

The lady, Carolyn Reed, who takes blood pressure at the Senior Center, wanted to know about horses. We had to ask Pascal Garrison and Clifton Stodghill. This is the saying: "No white feet, he's good. Two? Three? Four, dog meat!" Fill me in on this if you know. Pascal said those white hooves would soften and crack. His family always looked for ones with good black feet.

Alvie Francis dropped by the church to pick up tickets for The Passion of the Christ. He told me his grandfather came to this country in 1891.

He bought four sections in Floyd County and four in Briscoe. He had 700-800 head of cattle. He had horses, too, but the Indians stole them. Alvie said he and his family really had it good even though he lived in the country. In 1929 his dad put water in the house and a commode. His father made a windcharger in 1937 and the family had electricity from it. The windcharger charged a 32 volt battery. They also got butane and bought a refrigerator. Mr. Francis built a radio when very few people had one. They had a lot of company on Sunday afternoon as people would come over to listen to it. In 1947, they got 110 volt electricity from the power company.

Those who gave blood were surprised with a call from a lady who had actually received blood. That was a nice touch.

They say if you go to see The Passion of The Christ, you will not be the same when you come out. Since Jack had to be at the hospital in Plainview at 6:15 a.m. Monday, I could not go, but plan to. It will show about a month and a half.

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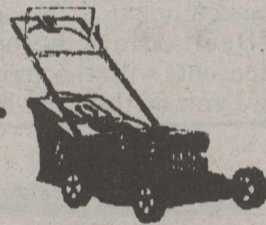

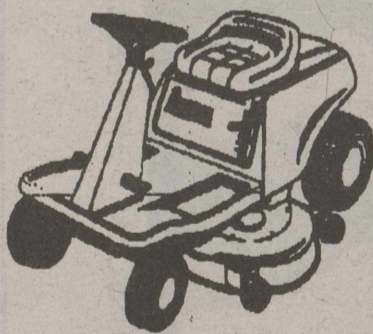

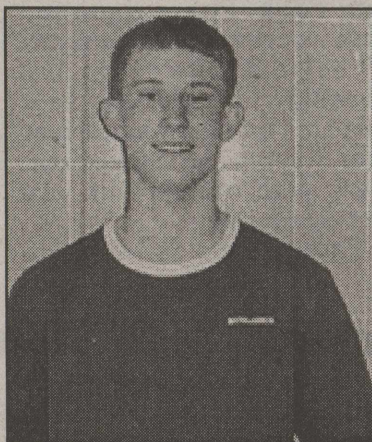

There will be no Teamkid meetings (Monday, Mar. 15) during Spring Break week. It will resume on Monday, Mar. 22.

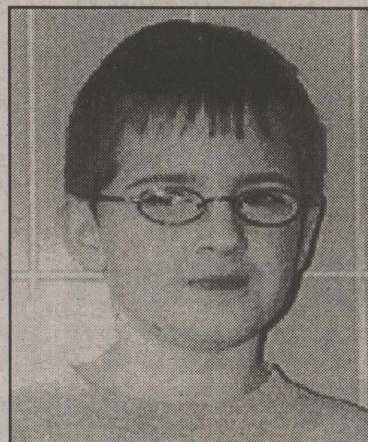

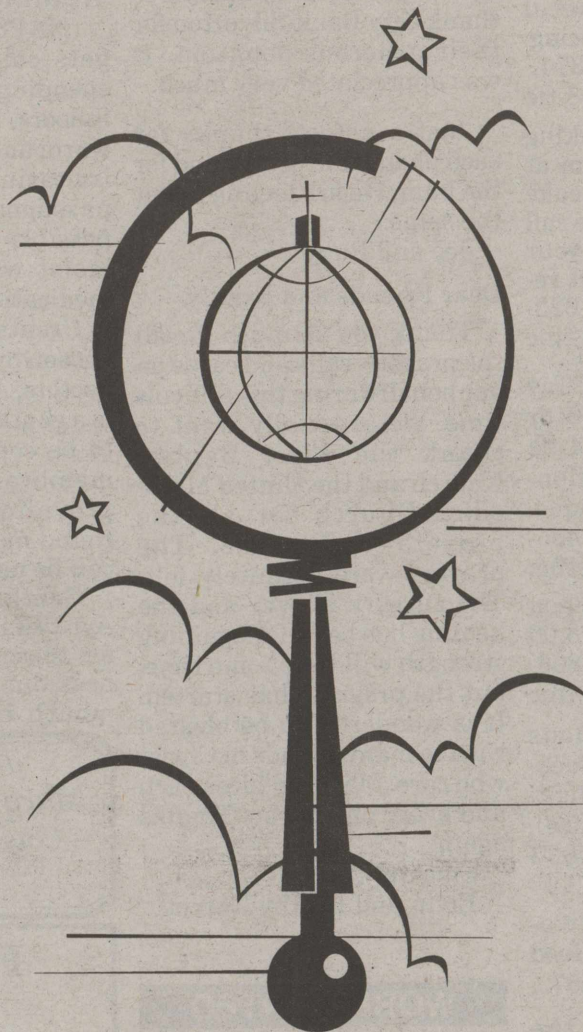
