Work of the draft boards wil begin immediately after registra-tion day, Oct. 16. At that time all men of the nation from 21 to 35 years of age inclusive, will register for possible military duty.

Additional New Fire Apparatus

Fire fighting equipment of the local fire department now ranks with the best in any city in this section, following delivery this week of a new American La-France engine with a pumping capacity of more than 600 gallons per minute. The new engine is of-ficially rated as a 500-gallon pumper but easily exceeded this rating on an official test made by an inspector of the State Fire Insurance Commission Tuesday. The apparatus carries 1,000 feet of standard fire hose and full complement of fire-fighting equipment, ladders, pike poles, axes lights, hand extinguishers, etc., and also has a 100-gallon booste tank and 150 feet of small hose.

Prominent Resident, Former Public Official, Died Friday

R. H. Davis, 82, prominent Has kell resident and former public official, died at his home in this city Friday evening at 8 o'clock He had been in feeble health for several years but had been critically ill for only a few days prior to his death.

During his long residence here. Mr. Davis had been identified with various business enterprises, and held several positions of public trust. He served as deputy county tax collector, and for several years as assessor and collector of the Haskell independent school district. Mr. Davis was elected Justice of the Peace in 1936, but resigned from the office during the following year because of failing health. He was active in church and civic affairs and had been a member of the Baptist Church since the age of 13.

A native of Mississippi, Rober Harvey Davis was born January 18, 1858, at Koscinsho, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Davis. He came to Texas when a young man and married Miss Mary Hargrave Glass February 25, 1883 a Wheelock, Texas, and they resided in Robertson county before moving to Haskell in 1906.

cies of bird. Sportsmen killing whitewing doves with bands on their legs are asked to return them to the Game Department office in Austin or

to the game manager at Victoria. Whitewing doves nest only in the Valley and in scant numbers in Southwest Texas counties. Their natural range is being depleted as more and more land is cleared for citrus groves and vegetable farms.

Game department biologists hope to learn much of the habits of whitewings before making definite recommendations concerning ways to aid in increasing the whitewings. It is hoped to ascertain how long the birds live. how many times they will nest in a year whether they travel north after leaving the nest or how soon some of them go to Mexico ahead of the regular migration, which usually comes with cold weather. and how far they move from their nesting areas to their feeding grounds

Sportsmen in the Valley and hunters going into the Valley for whitewing shooting have been co-operating with the Game Department to the fullest extent.

Do Ducks Drown Themselves? The contention of many veteran duck hunters that a wounded duck will dive to the bottom and drown itself by holding onto vegetation has been brought up again, A Texas Game Department warden reports that during the last hunting season he saw a duck wounded by a long shot. He marked the spot where the fowl hit the water but did not see the bird come to the surface. Reaching the spot, he observed bubbles coming up. Reaching down, he found the duck. Blades of grass, apparently broken from the main growth on

Capitol Squirrels Increase

Persons visiting the state capitol in Austin will see more squirrels scampering around the spacious lawn surrounding the capi tol building. The Game Depart-

ment last spring placed fifteen squirrel nests, made of old logs, in trees on the grounds. A recent check of nine of the nests disclosed that squirrels were using five of them. Several had young squirrels, from eight to nine weeks of age, in them.





Japan and The Axis

Announcement of Japan's new alignment with the Rome-Berlin Axis, although not unexpected, was a somewhat dramatic gesture which has perhaps created more excitement than its importance warrants. It does not materially change the situation which already existed except that it may cause Americans to realize more clearly that Britain is the only powerful friend we have in the world.

It is difficult to see how either Germany, Italy or Japan will benefit very much by the new agreement or treaty, whatever it may be, as neither is in a position to help the other to any great extent. All have their hands full in their own spheres already, and neither has any raw materials, armaments or cash which can be spared to aid a totalitarian partner.

In fact all three nations are faced with grave economic problems, including the danger of serious shortages of essential materials and even food. Germany is somewhat better situated than Italy or Japan, being in a position to continue to rob her conquered neighbors to supply her own needs, but it is unlikely that she will share the lot with Italy

and Japan to any appreciable extent, Japan has been bled white to continue her war against China; Italy has made little headway in the Mediterranean or in Africa, and Germany so far has been thwarted in her boasted intention to crush England. So the new combination appears to be principally a move for propaganda purposes - to bluff the United States and intimidate smaller na-

Weather and The War

Not only England, but a large part of the whole world is speculating on what effect the coming of bad weather may have on German bombing raids. It has been generally believed that the storms and fogs soon to be prevalent over Britain and the English channel will serve to hamper the German attacks.

It has been observed, however, that in some instances in recent weeks successful German air raids have been made in spite of heavy clouds and rain. British bombers have also inflicted much damage on the Germans at times when the weather was apparently unfavorble.

A Builder of Ships

An important and unusual career ended a few days ago in the death of Lewis Nixon, one of the greatest of modern shipbuilders at the age of 79. A native of Virginia, Nixon was graduated from the Navla Academy at the head of his class in 1882, and was transferred to the Navy's construction corps two years later.

In 1890 at the age of 29, he designed the battleships Oregon, Indiana and Massachusetts of Spanish-American War fame, and then resigned from the Navy to enter shipbuilding in civil life. After a few years as superintending constructor of the Cramp shipyard in Philadelphia, he organized and headed the Crescent shipyard at Elizabeth, N J., where he built 100 vessels in six years, includ-

ing many ships for the Navy. Subsequently he headed various other shipyards and munitions works and was internationally known as one of the world's greatest industrialists. He was received in special audiences by the king of England, the czar of Russia, Popes Pius X and XI, the king of Belgium and the presidents of several Latin-American countries.

In addition to his many industrial activities Mr. Nixon devoted much attention to politics and was leader of Tammany Hall, besides holding several state offices at various times and being a delegate to seven Democratic national conventions, the




