Cattle producers can expect to spend extra money to feed their breeding stock through winter, especially if dry weather continues. Much of the lower Gulf Coast and Southwestern and Eastern regions are still facing severe drought conditions. Hay is extremely hard to find, and available hay has been stored since last year, so nutrition content is low. Producers are feeding range cubes, range meal, and liquid feed to livestock as sources of energy and protein. 


