



Have you ever seen spots or floaters in your vision? You may not know this, but this is an extremely common occurrence with many people. I have seen many people in my office over the years that are concerned about this "black gnats" or "specks". While most of these cases have been of a benign nature, some, however, have

Spots (often called floaters) are small, semi-transparent or cloudy specks or particles within the eye that become noticeable when they fall within the line of sight. They may also appear with flashes

The inner part of your eye is made up of a clear, jelly-like fluid known as the vitreous. Occasionally, small flecks of protein and other matter become trapped during the formation of the eye before birth and remain in the vitreous body. Spots and floaters may also be caused by the deterioration of the eye fluid or its surrounding parts, or by certain injuries or eye diseases.

Spots are generally semi-clear specks of various shapes and sizes. They may also appear as threadlike strands or cobwebs within the eye. Since they are within the eye, they move as the eye moves and seem to dart away when you try to look at them directly. Most spots are normal and rarely cause blindness. But, spots can be indications of more serious problems, and if you see them you should have a comprehensive eye examination to determine the
