This year Mebane 140 and Mebane 141 will be tried for the first time. Already some forty-five bushels of certified seed of the above varieties have been purchased. Texas Special and Qualla are the two varieties which seem to be the most popular at present. Among the farmers who have purchased Mebane 140 seed are: John Bray, Frank Simmons, O. E. White, O. W. Cox, Mr. Middlebrook, H. G. Hammer, R. L. Medford, Wesley Brown, John R. Watson, and Noah Lane.

The Vocational Agriculture students have purchased around twelve bushels of certified Mebane 141 for their cotton projects. 


