PAINT CREEK'S COTTON IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

What is Paint Creek community doing in the way of improving its "cash" crop? That is a problem that confronts most communities, and Paint Creek farmers are attempting to solve it by first trying to find the best cotton and then to distribute that variety over the entire community. This year Mebane 140 and Mebane 141 will be tried for the first time. Already some forty-five bushels of certified seed of the above varieties have been purchased.
