A suspended sentence of two years and a prison term of eight years were assessed against two defendants in criminal cases heard in 39th District Court Tuesday, when the criminal docket for the term was called by District Judge Dennis P. Ratliff.

Marvin C. Lee, charged with theft, was assessed a term . of eight years in the penitentiary, to run concurrently with previous sentences imposed. The defendant, charged by Grand Jury indictment with theft of a quantity of maize from a Haskell county farmer, entered a plea of guilty through his attorney, Wallace Sanders, appointed by the court.

A negro, Leo Johnson, charged with theft of cattle, received a two year suspended sentence when he entered a plea of guilty to the Grand Jury indictment. Johnson was charged with complicity in the theft of a cow from a Munday livestock buyer. He



World financial power will pass-nay, is already passing from London to New York. A financial world which has been accustomed to look to Threadneedle Street is going to look to Wall Street and to Pennsylvania Avenue.

This tendency has been marked before the war broke. There no longer seems any doubt of the result. Whether we like it or not, whether we want it or not, the United States is rapidly becoming the financial center of the world

The relationship between the British pound and the American dollar is a weather vane that shows how this wind blows. Britain did not even try to maintain the pound sterling, but dumped it without support even before fighting started. dropped immediately from \$4.68 to as low as \$3.73. During the four years of the World War it never fell below \$4.51.

The whole financial relationship is different today from that of 1914. Then a sudden and unexpected war knocked the props out from under the American stock market. In 1939, a long-expected and well-discounted war saw an immediate advance in U. S. stocks. In 1914 the United States held about \$1,900,000,000 in gold, perhaps 20 per cent of the world's supply. Today it holds more than \$16,700,000,000 in gold, above 60 per cent of the world's supply.

The trade of South America is literally being dumped into our lap. Already orders have begun to come here from Brazalian and Argentinean, Colombia and Venezuelean firms supplied from Germany and Britain whose sources of supply have been cut off by the war.

This is not a question of the United States

launching a campaign of financial imperialism or dollar domination. It is a fact, and it is happening today whether we like it or not, whether we want

When the war is over the United States is going to be in a position which will dominate the finanal and economic rebuilding of a shattered world The position will be such that it will have to exerrise this leadership, not from any wish to dominate but simply to protect its own interests. It will be the world's great creditor country, the world's great source of material and facilities for rebuilding.

"Marketing quotas are meant to supplement the conservation program by assuring farmers planting with their acreage allotments their efforts to adjust supplies will not be nullified by non-cooperators," George Slaughter, chairman of the State Agricultural Conservation committee pointed out.

If markeing quotas are in effect a non-cooperator will be required to pay a penalty of three cents per pound on all cotton sold in excess of the marketing quota set for his farm Slaughter explained. Farmers planting within their acreage allotments will be able to market all their cotton without penalty.

In a recent opinion, Federal Judge James V. Allred of Houston declared marketing quotas were legal in the first suit to reach the courts testing their legality.



stoves and furnaces. Fire strikes with such appalling suddenness that people are apt to lose their heads and unnecessarily expose themselves and their families to danger. Much of this could be avoided if plans were made as just what every member of the group would do should fire be discovered and how they escape from the building.

Some fire hazards are especially dangerous and cause many fires. High on this list the mis-use of electriity. The rules: Never tamper with fuses or wiring. Always disconnect appliances when finished with them. Use only appliances and cords bearing safety approval labels. Employ a skilled electrician for all repairing and extension of wires. Be certain the work complies with the requirements of national and municipal electrical

Remember never to permit anyone in the home to clean clothing with gasoline, benzine, or any in-flammable liquid. This practice is especially dangerous because a pilot light of a gas stove or a tiny spark of static electricity developed by rubbing cloth together in the cleaning process is all that is required to ignite the vapor and cause an explosion. Many persons have been killed and injured in

Still another hazard that causes numerous fires is paint or oilburst into flames and set the house on fire. A tightly closed metal can is the safest place for them. Guard against permitting rub-
