

FATAL TO PIONEER HASKELL MERCHANT R. D. C. Stephens, 73, Died Sunday Afternoon at

HEART ATTACK IS

Home Here

A sudden heart attack Sunday afternoon ended the long and useful career of a pioneer Haskell merchant, Rile David C. Stephens, 73, civic and business leader in this city for over half a century. Mr. Stephens died at the family home in West Haskell Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock. a few minutes after he was stricken with a heart attack.

Owner and proprietor of the Stephens Grocery, Mr. Stephens had gone about his customary duties in the store Saturday, and his sudden death came as a distinct shock not only to relatives but to the entire community.

A native Kentuckian, born
Oct. 11, 1866 in Logan county, he

came to Texas as a youth and in July, 1899 came to the small community of Haskell and had made his home here continuously since that time. Shortly after coming to this section Mr. Stephens engaged in business as a retail grocer, a profession which he followed thirty years. Mr. Stephens also served four years as Treasurer of Haskell county, and was actively identified with the upbuilding and development of this section over a span of fifty

A member of the Christian Church since childhood, Mr. Stephens was an elder in the First Christian Church in this city at the time of his death. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge and had held a number of offices of trust in the organization.

On March 19, 1893, Mr. Stephens was married to Miss Temple P. Pearsey, member of a pioneer Haskell family and the couple were the parents of four





LET'S TALK TURKEY

— how to make Fresh Hot Dishes from cold left-over turkey

By Dorothy Greig

T is the third and fourth days in the progress of a roast turkey that begin to be a bit of a problem. The noble bird has been reduced pretty much to scraps.



Turkey and Noodle Scallop is one way to make delicious use of cold left-over turkey.

There's lots of meat still left, but not enough to make a real show. Besides, by that time the family needs a little variation. Here are two ways to do it:

First, we can make a most de-licious Turkey and Noodle Scallop. This Scallop brings that cold tur-key to the table as a fresh hot dish, savory, satisfying and full of good

Turkey and Noodle Scallop package (6 ounces) noodles can condensed cream of mush-

room soup cup milk ounces velveeta cheese

teaspoon salt
pinch pepper
tablespoons chopped green pepper, cooked
tablespoons chopped pimiento

tablespoons chopped pimiento cups cooked turkey (diced) tablespoons buttered corn flakes

Cook the noodles in boiling salted water until tender, about nine minutes. Put the cream of mushroom soup in a saucepan and stir well. Then add the milk and heat, but do not boil. Stir the cheese (sliced) into the mushroom sauce and heat until the cheese melts. Remove from fire and add the sea sonings, chopped green pepper. (which has been cooked 8-10 minutes in boiling water) chopped pimiento and diced turkey. Turn the mixture into a buttered casserole and sprinkle with rolled buttered corn flakes. Bake in a moderate (\$50°F.) oven for about 30 minutes. Serves 8.





Cattle Testing Program Will Be Theme of Meet

An important meeting of Haskell county livestock owners, especially dairy cattle owners, will be held in this city on December 18, in the District Courtroom, at 2:30 P. M. Dr. L. R. Noyes, Assistant Inspector in Charge, Bureau of Animal Industry, Fort Worth, Texas will be principal speaker at this meeting.

Dr. Noyes will discuss the Bang's Disease (Infectious Abortion) testing program which is being sponsored by the Federal Government. Many cattle in this county have this disease, according to G. R. Schumann, County Agent. Where a herd of cattle infected with this disease, a serious loss to the owner results therefrom due to the loss of the calf crop. Also, this disease cattle is of constant danger to human beings as people drinking milk from animals may get Ungulent Fever. Last year, a number of cases of Undulent Fever human being were reported Haskell and adjoining counties.

All farmers and livestock owners are urged to come to the meeting and hear the Bangs testing program explained and learn how they can have their cattle tested. There is no charge for naving yaur cattle tested for this disease when the work is done by the bureau of Animal Industry.

Protest Trade Pacts

Protests against the reciprocal trade policies of our State Department are becoming more numerous and may have an important influence on the next session of Congress. The National Grange, representing nearly a million farmers, has just voiced its unalterable opposition to any curtailment of excise rates on commodities of which the United States has surplusse.

A national cooperative association of 350,000 dairy farmers has filed formal arguments against a proposed trade agreement with Argentina. Labor, through its international union of mine, mill and smelter workers, has added its protest against State Department generosity to cheap foreign com-

Attacking a proposed reduction in the four-cent copper excise tax now protecting the American mining industry, the mine workers contend that the only result of a reduction in the amount of the tax would be to reduce the price of copper and to reduce wages and employment in domestic copper mines, wages being geared to the price of copper.

It is charged that zinc, cattle, lumber and petroleum have been "traded," and that copper and other domestic items which are competitive against foreign production are threatened.

As one recent writer puts it: Charity begins at home-and here we have millions of unemployed and million in need. Opening our trade gates to foreign dumping will not make jobs for American

Mine Story Doubted

American military experts are inclined to scoff at the story which has been going about to the effect that Germany has a magical "magnetic" sea mine which is attracted to its target by the steel

It is pointed out that the "pull" of a magnet decreases very rapidly as distance from the attracted object increases; also that magnetic impulses are

not readily transmitted through water. They recall that during the World War a government board of experts, headed by the late Thomas A. Edison, to study ideas for new weapons, explored the magnetic mine theory and pronounced

it impracticable. Even if some such mine could be made to work it would almost certainly endanger a vessel that attmepted to plant it, as well as those which might come along later.

Most navies do have types of electric mines however, which are equipped with long "feelers" or attennae attached, so that the bottom of a vessel brushing against them will automatically set off the explosive. The Germans may have an improved type of this sort of mine.

The greatest barrage of sea mines ever planted consisted of 70,000 laid in the North Sea by the British and American navies during the World War. Less than one-half of them were recovered




