

POPULATION OF HASKELL TO EXCEED 3,000, PRELIMINARY REPORT SHOWS

Minimum Electric Rate Schedule Is Adopted By the City Council

Rate "Pegged" at Minimum Level; No Maximum Rate Fixed

At a called session of the City Council Friday night for the purpose of conducting a Rate Hearing as provided in a recently enacted City Ordinance, Aldermen voted unanimously to adopt a schedule fixing the minimum rates that can be charged for electric service in Haskell.

The rate schedule as adopted "pegs" the minimum rate but does not fix a maximum rate and electric utility companies are not required, under provisions of the new schedule, to lower rates to the minimum level fixed in the schedule.

Commercial Service - Minimum monthly bill \$2.00, which allows consumer the first 25 kilowatt hours used per month.

Residential Service - Minimum monthly bill \$1.20, which allows consumer the first 15 kilowatt hours used per month.

Small Power Service - \$1.00 per horsepower per month, which allows consumer 20 kilowatt hours per month.

Off-Peak, or intermittent water heater service - 1c per kilowatt hour per month.

D. T. DOTSON DIED MONDAY AFTER LONG PERIOD OF ILLNESS

Final Rites Held Tuesday For Former Public Official

D. T. Dotson, 57, prominent Haskell resident for the past 34 years, a former public official and the father of Sheriff Olen Dotson passed away at the family home in this city Monday afternoon at 12:50 o'clock following a lingering illness which had confined him in bed for more than a year.

Mr. Dotson, a native Texan, was born Sept. 23, 1882 in Bosque county, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Dotson. When a young man he moved to Erath county and there was married to Miss Maud Fouts October 5, 1902. Four years later Mr. Dotson moved to Haskell county and was engaged in farming for a number of years. After retiring from active farming, he was employed in the general merchandise store of S. L. Robertson & Company in this city and later with the West Texas Utilities Company in the early 20's.

During the administration of W. C. Allen as Sheriff, Mr. Dotson served for some time as a deputy sheriff.

In 1929 Mr. Dotson was appointed Justice of the Peace for Precinct 1, a post held for more than five years, being elected for two terms in the office, retiring in 1935 because of failing health. During his long residence in Haskell, Mr. Dotson lent his active support both as a private citizen and a public official to every worthy civic movement. He had been a member of the Baptist

AAA Compliance Checking Starts On Texas Farms

Starting in the Valley and working north, the AAA this week begin the tremendous task of checking the compliance with the farm program of more than 400,000 agricultural producers. The work will be completed by the last of August.

In each Extension Service district meetings of county committees, Agricultural Conservation Association secretaries, and county performance supervisors will be held as the work moves northward. B. F. Vance, assistant state AAA administrator explained. Following the district meetings, sub-district and county meetings will be held for the training of county performance reporters.

All county performance reporters are local men employed by the local associations, the administrator pointed out. In checking compliance on a farm, the reporter uses an aerial photograph, measuring all the field on the farm, numbering them on the photograph, and identifying all crops, land uses and soil-building practices. Checking of compliance on a

farm is done only when the producer or his authorized representative is present, Vance declared, and in most cases the producer assists the reporter in his work.

**AN ORDINANCE**  
Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_\_  
An Ordinance of the City of Haskell, Texas, fixing and prescribing the Minimum Rates To Be Charged By Any and All Electric Light and Power Manufacturers, Producers or Distributors, For Electricity, Sold or Supplied Within The City of Haskell, Texas and Adopting Rules and Regulations in Connection With Service and Imposing Penalties For Violations Pursuant To An Ordinance Adopted By The City Council of The City of Haskell, Texas, On The 10th Day of April, A. D. 1940.

WHEREAS, on the 26th day of April, 1940, a hearing was had in accordance with the provisions of the Charter and ordinances of the City of Haskell, Texas, and in accordance with the ordinance enacted by the City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas on the 10th day of April, 1940, relative to the regulation of the rates and services of persons, companies and corporations selling, furnishing and/or supplying electricity, light, power, water, gas, telephone, or sewerage service to the City of Haskell, Texas, and its inhabitants;

Be It Ordained By The City Council of The City of Haskell:

**Article I**  
Definitions  
A. The term "company," "utility," or "public utility" as used herein, means all persons, firms, partnerships, or corporations, whether private or municipal, now or hereafter operating in the City of Haskell, Texas, any generating plants, any distribution system, any wires, poles, or lines, property or equipment, while using any of the streets or alleys within the said city, for the purpose of carrying on its business, or generating, distributing or selling electric current for light, power or other purposes.  
B. The term "gross rate" as used herein, is defined as an amount one-ninth (1-9) in excess of the rates prescribed in the schedule hereinafter contained.  
C. The term "net rate," as here-

in used, means the rates as set out in the schedules hereinafter fixed, or an amount one-tenth (1-10) less than the gross rate.  
D. The term "small power service," as herein used, is defined as a service required for all electric motor and/or aggregate of electric motors not exceeding ten rated horse-power in size.  
E. The term "large power service," as herein used, is defined as a service required for an electric motor and/or aggregate of electric motors of more than ten rated horse-power in size.  
F. The term "consumer," as herein used, is defined as any person, firm or corporation using electric current from any company, utility, or public utility, as hereinabove defined.  
G. The term "continuous service," as herein used, is defined as service to a consumer and/or consumers available and usable by consumer and/or consumers during the whole and entire day of twenty-four hours without interruption except interruptions resulting from accident and/or accidents or from causes beyond the control of the company, utility or public utility as hereinabove defined.  
H. The term "off-peak" service, as herein used, is defined as a service of electricity to a consumer for water heaters for water heating purposes only, available and usable by consumer intermittently during the day of twenty-four hours with times of service and availability of service determined solely by the company, utility or public utility as hereinabove defined.  
I. The term "commercial service," as herein used, shall have its ordinary, common and everyday meaning.  
J. The term "residential service," as herein used, shall have its ordinary, common and everyday meaning.

**Article II**  
Schedules  
The following schedules of rates are hereby adopted and fixed as the minimum rates which may and/or shall be charged for electric service hereafter furnished by any public utility, as hereinabove defined:  
1. Continuous Service:  
A. Commercial Service Rate Schedule: Minimum Monthly Bill \$2.00, which allows consumer the first 25 kilowatt hours used per month. The next 25 kilowatt hours \$0.08 per kilowatt hour used per month. The next 50 kilowatt hours \$0.06 per kilowatt hour used per month. The next 200 kilowatt hours \$0.03 per kilowatt hour used per month. All over the above, \$0.015 per kilowatt hour used per month.  
2. Residential Service Rate Schedule: Minimum Monthly Bill \$1.20, which allows consumer the first 15 kilowatt hours used per month. The next 10 kilowatt hours \$0.08 per kilowatt hour used per month. The next 25 kilowatt hours \$0.05 per kilowatt hour used per month. All over the above \$0.02 per kilowatt hour used per month.  
3. Small Power Service Rate Schedule: \$1.00 per horse-power per month, which allows consumer 20 kilowatt hours per horse power. All over the above, \$0.05 per kilowatt hour used per month.  
4. Large Power Service Rate Schedule: For the reason that the rate to be charged for each large power installation by the company, utility or public utility is and should be governed by surrounding circumstances which vary with each particular consumer of large power, no minimum rate shall be fixed for such connection.  
B. Off-Peak Service:  
Schedule: \$0.1 per kilowatt hour used per month.  
The above rates are fixed as minimum rates, and any company, utility or public utility, as herein defined, is authorized to fix a maximum rate in accordance with its or their desires; but the maximum rate must be the same for the same class of users and no combination of rates which will reduce the minimum, as above fixed, shall be permitted.  
Where a consumer maintains a business and a residence in one and the same building and desires to obtain light and power through one and the same meter, the "residential service rate schedule" shall govern where the connected load used for residential purposes is greater than the connected load used for business purposes; or where a consumer maintains a business and a residence in one and the same building and desires to obtain light and power through one and the same meter, the "commercial service rate schedule" shall govern where the connected load used for business purposes is greater than the connected load used for residential purposes; however, the consumer may maintain separate meters for residence purposes and business purposes where a business and a residence are maintained in one and the same building.  
Where a consumer desires to obtain off-peak rates for water heaters used for water heating purposes and also wishes to use light heat, and/or power for other purposes, the company, utility, or public utility shall maintain a separate meter for such off-peak service connection, and in all other cases of combined service, except in combined residence and business, above mentioned, separate meters shall be required and maintained for each particular type of service requiring the application of a different rate schedule.

Whenever temporary service is required by the consumer, the utility shall have the right to charge in addition to the rates above set out, the actual costs of making any necessary connections from their lines to the consumer's lines and of the disconnecting thereof, or such part of such cost as may be agreed upon by the utility and consumer as being reasonable.  
**Article III**  
Discount  
The consumer may, at the company's, utility's, or public utility's option, be billed at a gross rate, and the difference between the gross and net rates above specified will constitute a discount for payment within ten days from the date of the monthly billing; however, discounts shall not be allowed or permitted which reduce the rates set out in the schedules above.  
**Article IV**  
Regulations  
(a) The utility may require reasonable security for the payment of its bills, and shall not furnish service to any consumer who is in default in payment of any indebtedness for electric current to the utility.  
(b) Wiring, apparatus, machinery or appliances of the consumer shall be installed and maintained in accordance with good electrical practice and all governmental regulations.  
(c) The ordinary method of connection between the utility's distributing system and the consumer's service wires will be by overhead wires. If the consumer shall desire to have connection made in any other way, special arrangement will be made between the consumer and the utility, by which the connection will be made and maintained at the consumer's cost.  
(d) The utility shall, without rental or other charge, furnish a meter for the registration of electric current. The City of Haskell shall have the right at any time to inspect such meter and to pass such regulations as to testing it as may be necessary to ascertain and insure its accuracy and efficiency.  
(e) The consumer shall provide and at all times maintain, free of expense to the utility, and at a suitable and easily accessible location within the premises to be supplied with electric current, sufficient and proper space for the installation of meters or other similar devices of the utility, and shall also provide the necessary meter board, wiring and meter loops.  
(f) The utility shall supply electric current only through meters or other measuring device furnished and owned by it. The utility must be notified when the consumer desires to have such meter or other measuring device installed, relocated, changed, or removed.  
(g) The duly authorized agents of the utility shall have access at all reasonable hours to the premises of the consumer for the purpose of inspecting wiring and apparatus, removing the utility's property reading meters and other purposes incident to the carrying out of the contract. The utility, however, does not assume the duty of inspecting the consumer's wiring, machinery, or apparatus, and will not be responsible therefor.  
(h) The consumer shall properly protect the utility's property on the consumer's premises, and shall permit no one but the utility's agents, the City of Haskell and

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**Article V**  
The penalties for violating any provision of this ordinance shall be as are provided and set forth in an ordinance heretofore passed by the City Council of the City of Haskell on the 10th day of April 1940 and entitled:  
"An Ordinance of the City of Haskell, Texas, a City of more than 500 inhabitants duly and legally incorporated, operating under general laws of the State of Texas, regulating and imposing duties and restrictions on certain public utilities now enjoying or which may hereafter enjoy any franchise or public privilege, providing for the regulation of rates; authorizing hearing after notice for purpose of regulating, determining, fixing, altering, changing rates and compensation to be charged and collected by public utilities; and providing for the passage of ordinances, resolutions or orders in relation thereto and providing for appeal by any one effected, the giving bond during pendency of appeal or suit; defining terms 'rate,' 'corporation,' 'person,' 'public utility,' or 'utility' 'community' under provisions of this ordinance prohibiting any gift or rebate of any service rate or commodity or as to rate or service; prohibiting the making or granting any unreasonable preference or advantage to any corporation or person; providing each public utility or person shall submit to the commission for inspection its books, records, schedules, submit to investigation and inspection and providing for attendance of witnesses upon any hearing; the City Council shall have jurisdiction in the regulations, compensation, regulating rates, charges, fares of all public utilities; providing for the fixing of reasonable standards for measurement of quantity, quality pressure, initial voltage or other conditions pertaining to the supply of the product, commodity or service furnished or rendered by any public utility, providing for system of accounts to be kept by any utility and filing reports; prescribing penalties, fines and forfeitures and declaring an emergency."  
**Article VI**  
Should any section, article, provision or any part of this Ordinance be held and declared to be unconstitutional and void by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall in no way affect the validity of any of the remaining parts of this Ordinance, unless the part held void is indispensable to the operation of the remaining parts. The City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas, hereby declares that it would have passed those parts which may be valid and omitted any parts which may be unconstitutional at the time of the passage of this ordinance.  
**ARTICLE VII**  
Emergency Clause  
The fact that the City Council recently granted a franchise to a company for the purpose of distributing electricity to the citizens of Haskell thereby making two concerns in the City of Haskell existing for the same purpose, brings about a situation where a rate war may arise between two said competitors, which may not be to the best interest of the public generally and best serve the public welfare, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that this ordinance be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication, and the rule calling for the reading of ordinances at three several meetings be suspended, and it is so ordained.
