Our 64 face stitches are almost completely covered up, so visibly, we are well!

Dave, our families, and myself will never be able to tell how thankful we have been for the cards, visits and expressions of love we have received from our friends. . . . We had no idea we had so many!

Although there have been a lot of "bad" things turned up by the accident, there can't possibly be anyone in the world any luckier. We are lucky that our face is almost without a scar despite 64 stitches; the bad part is that half of it is without feeling; We had a slight brain concussion; but it has made the past two weeks seem as only two or three days. Tuesday our doctors X-rayed our bad arm again and discovered that the shoulder was broken; this will take another three weeks of care and we don't know what sort of paper we will be able to put out.

We will do our very best as always, please continue to broadminded and sweet.

Our area newspapers have been wonderful for they have published the Herald. We received many telephone calls from San Angelo, Lubbock and Dallas, as well as points in between, to help us, so we are indebted to many many businesses and people since our accident.


