Farmers, Businessmen Invited To 1966 Omnibus Farm Bill Meeting Tuesday

Farmers and others interested in the 1966 Omnibus Farm Bill recently passed by Congress will have an opportunity to closely examine the new programs at a Farmers Meeting to be held Tuesday, Oct. 5, in Knox City.

Sponsored by the Kerr-McGee Farm Center in Knox City, the meeting will be held in the Knox City School Cafeteria at 7:30 p.m.

Featured speaker will be Don Johnson, executive vice president of the Plains Cotton Growers Association in Lubbock. A well-known authority on farm legislation, Mr. Johnson has spent the past eight months in Washington, D. C., working in the interest of Texas farmers on the 1966 legislation which is expected to be signed into law by the President within the next few days.

Little or no information concerning the new bill has yet been made available to the public. It is expected that Mr. Johnson's talk will do much to enlighten local farmers and give them an opportunity to obtain answers to many questions they may have on the various programs included in the farm bill.

The meeting is one of the many special activities planned by Kerr-McGee Oil Industries as a service to farmers of this area. The company recently purchased the Knox City holdings of Wood Chemical Co.

John Lippard, manager of the Farm Center, called the information expected to be derived from Johnson's talk "vital to every farmer and business man of the area. I know that few, if any,

Patrick Shannon Receives National Honor This Week

One student at Knox City High School has been honored with Letters of Commendation for his high performance on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST) given last spring.

This student is among 38,000 students across the nation recognized for scoring in the top two percent of students who will complete high school in 1966. The Commended students rank just below the 14,000 Semifinalists announced last month.

Harold Bankston, the school's principal, has announced that the Commended student is Patrick Shannon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fuller Shannon.

John M. Stalaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation said: "These students are being recognized for their outstanding performance on the qualifying test. Theirs is a notable academic achievement."

"In rigorous competition like the Merit Program, it is unavoidable that many fine students will miss being named Semifinalists by a narrow margin.

Nevertheless, the student in this situation is very capable and deserves general recognition for his distinguished effort.

"The Commended students have considerable ability, which should be developed through further education. They deserve every encouragement, and their promise is great. They represent an important intellectual resource which our nation needs."

Only the highest scoring students in each state, the Semifinalists, remain eligible for further consideration in the competition for Merit Scholarships. Although students receiving Letters of Commendation advance no farther in the Merit Program, their names are reported to other scholarship-granting agencies and to the colleges they named at the time they took the NMQST as their first and second choices. NMQST also reports home addresses, test scores, anticipated college majors and career intentions of the Commended students to the same colleges.

Since the tests have been given in Knox City, Shannon is the third student to receive this honor. Melanie Verhalen received the honor first in 1961, and James Hopkins received it in 1963.

The Knox City Greyhounds galloped past the Rochester Steers here Friday night with a 33-16 win.

Alex Watson, end, lit the spark for the three touchdown first half by picking up a punt and running it 50 yards for the first TD. Halfback Philip Williams ran 45 yards for the second touchdown, and then made the conversion.

In the second quarter, Jerry Myers threw a 39 yard pass to Gary Posey, and Williams made the extra points, leaving a score of 21-0 at the half.

In the second half, Williams took two more pitchouts from Myers for one 52 yard and one

85 yard run. Rochester's Tommy Holmes ran 35 yards for the Steers first touchdown in the third quarter. Olson LeFevre ran for the extra points. LeFevre also galloped 45 yards for a score in the fourth period and then took the ball across for the conversion.

Final score was 33-16. Knox City does not have a game scheduled for this week end. They will play Monday, there, Oct. 8.

SCS Committee Complete Farm Tours In Knox

The Knox County Great Plains Conservation Program Committee made their annual tour during their regular meeting in September. The purpose of the tour is to inspect accomplishments of the Great Plains Conservation Program. The committee inspected the Clarence and Carl Hitt farms west of Rochester.

Clarence Hitt prepared his G.P.C.P. contract in October of 1962 and with Cost Share Assistance from the G.P.C.P. and technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service in Knox City established 102 acres of coastal bermuda grass. During this growing season Hitt has harvested over 240 bales of hay per acre from this enterprise.

Carl Hitt prepared his G.P.C.P. contract in February of '63 and received the same assistance as Clarence. Carl's enterprise is a cow calf operation. At the present he is operating with about 140 animal units.

These G.P.C.P. contracts are two of 100 contracts now in effect in the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District obligating \$100,624.35.
