The Extension Service recommends that 90 per cent of the bolls be open before defoliating. This should be especially true in the "low spots" and rank cotton. The last places to fully ma-

It kills harmful insects and it gives an opportunity to rotate cropland.

Applied properly, defoliants can be economical, but improper use can be costly and dangerous. An arsenic solution can kill people, cattle, pets, insects, or about anything that comes in contact with it. Care should be exercised to not allow wind to carry it into pastures or feed crops.
