
### Streams In Desert Places

### WHEN TEARS FLOW

Weeping and wailing in the big trial scene is something that happens not only in the movies. In actual life too, especially in serious criminal cases, gusts of emotion often ruffle the judicial calm of the courtroom.

This raises a touchy problem. Won't the tears of the victim, or of the victim's family, stir prejudice against the person accused of the crime?

The danger is real. The poet Ovid said tears can melt iron. They can also shape the minds and conquer the hearts of a jury. In some circumstances a court will find an outburst so compelling as to invalidate the entire proceedings. Then, in all fairness to the defendant, there must be a new trial and a new jury.

In one case involving seduction, the accusing girl collapsed on the witness stand. Her mother, coming to her aid, broke into a torrent of tears. "Nobody knows how we have suffered over this trouble!" she wailed. "Lord have mercy on us!"

Such poignant drama, in full view of the jury, was held the grounds for a new trial. The court said there was too much chance that sympathy, not reason, would guide the jury to its verdict.

However, in less extreme circumstances, the law relies on timely action by the trial judge to minimize the possibility of prejudice. For example:

In a manslaughter case, the victim's aunt began weeping at the sight of his bloody clothing. The judge had the woman escorted from the courtroom to regain control of herself. He also cautioned the jury not to let the incident affect its judgment.

These steps, an appellate court ruled later, were enough to protect the defendant's rights without having to start the proceedings all over again.

After all, perfect composure is too much to expect from people who are reliving dire and dreadful events. Besides, at a second trial emotions might flare just as irresistibly as at the first.

## SMALL BUSINESS CENTER TO OPEN SOON IN ASPERMONT

A Small Business Development Center, the first formed in a rural area in the nation was recently organized in a meeting at Aspermont and Oscar Dickerson, of Aspermont, made the announcement to the Lions Club Wednesday.

Early federal approval is expected. Afton Willingham a Paducah CPA, was chosen as its executive director and Aspermont was chosen as its headquarters. A sub-office will be established in Paducah.

In a meeting at Haskell last week, Willingham briefed the group on his activities since the application was filed for the center last May. They already have their charter. Counties included in the jurisdiction number 15 and they are—Briscoe, Cottle, Childress, Dickens, Jones, Haskell, Hall, Hardeman, Knox, King, Kent, Stonewall and Motley.
