Carl L. Garrett, special agent of the Office of the Inspector General who lives in Temple, completed his investigation here last Thursday of the cotton warehouse fire which was de-stroyed Sept. 16.

Mr. Garrett had us make a number of pictures of the scene in which to complete his report. There were 2,237 bales of uninsured cotton in the building, and over 800 of them have been salvaged "due to the fire department here and elsewhere who assisted and the fine cooperation of all . . . if they hadn't kept water on it for days, we couldn't have salvaged much," the agent told us. He was high in his praise of

the volunteer firemen. * *

Committee is charged with the responsibility of studying the rowing juvenile crime problem the state with particular emphasis on developing a program or its prevention.






